Robert Wilson Party Entertain Weredale Boys

The Robert Wilson Scottish Concert Party which is appearing at Victoria Hall this week entertained the boys at Weredale House, Weredale Park, Westmount, on Monday night.

The 160 boys who are resident in the home jammed the auditorium and applauded the various artists who had to come back for encore after encore.

Robert Wilson, who is known as "The Voice of Scotland", is regarded as the finest singer of Scottish folklore songs. Garbed in the kilt he charmed his youthful listeners with renditions of Scottish numbers. Alec Finlay, Scottish comedian who is hailed as Sir Harry Lauder's successor, kept the boys in an uproar of laughter as he entertained them with his "pawky" humour and flow of stories.

The boys joined in singing some of the better known Scottish songs which added to the enjoyment of the evening.

Another artist who found favour was Will Starr who gave out with the accordion. The duo, Kenyon and Fewings in a novelty musical act, showed their versatility with a number of instruments which held the boys glued to their seats.

Mr. Carlette took Mr. McDougall to the hospital in his car immediately after the accident where a cut on his left elbow was given two stitches.

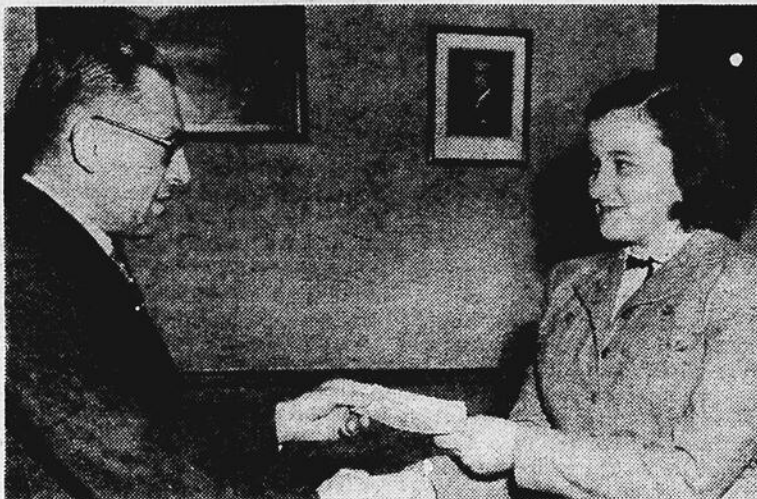
Both parties told the police neither saw each other prior to the accident.

Local Residents to Get First View of Princess

Princess Elizabeth and Prince Phillip will pass through Westmount on the afternoon of October 22 on their way from Dorval airport to the Windsor Hotel where they will stay during their brief sojourn in Montreal.

Coming west the party will take Sherbrooke street in Notre Dame de Grace then N.D.G. avenue east to Victoria avenue, down Victoria to Sherbrooke street and east to Peel street before entering the Windsor Hotel.

While not so extensive as the tour of King George and Queen Elizabeth in 1939, Westmount residents will have good vantage points all along Sherbrooke street.

This will be the first of thirteen trips called for in the itinerary mapped out by the committee in charge of arrangements for the Royal visit.

On the evening of their arrival the Royal Couple will attend a hockey game at the Forum and will enter the building by the Atwater avenue door. They will proceed from the Windsor Hotel by way of Peel street and St. Catherine street to the Forum. They will arrive at the Forum at 8.15 p.m. This is trip No. 2.

At 10.15 p.m. the Princess and her Consort will leave the Forum to return to the Windsor Hotel which will conclude the official programme for the day.

On October 23, ten different trips have been arranged which will take the Royal Couple to McGill University and Molson Stadium where school children will be assembled and later to the Baseball Stadium where French school children will be given an opportunity of seeing the Royal Couple. Vickers shipbuilding yard will be inspected in the east end.

From Vickers the party will come west to the Chalet on top of Mount Royal where luncheon will be served.

Leaving the Chalet the route will follow Cote des Neiges, Troie avenue, Decelles and De Serigny avenue to the University of Montreal. From there the party will proceed to the Canadair plant in Ville St. Laurent proceeding then to the City Hall of Montreal where a civic reception will be held. At 6 p.m. the Royal Couple will return from the City Hall to the Windsor Hotel.

On October 24 Princess Elizabeth and Prince Phillip leave for

The committee is composed of Councillors H. L. Blachford, Roy Campbell and R. H. Dean.

Guest House Assn. Demand Relaxed City By-Law

"We are all weary of the way the City Fathers have taken matters into their hands in a dictatorial manner and persist in depriving local citizens of the right to earn their bread in a respectable way," Elphege Menard, president of the Westmount Property and Guest House Owners, told a meeting of that association Tuesday night in Victoria Hall.

He said this was the reason the association had been organized—"to show the gang in the City Hall that we can strike, and hard."

He told the members that it was time for a show down with the mayor and aldermen. The association's executive was going to call for a meeting with them and if

they would fight it out in the courts, at Quebec and in the January municipal elections.

Mr. Menard said they were going to ask the city council for a re-zoning of the by-law banning guest houses from certain sections of Westmount. He wanted it to include all of the area south of Cote St. Antoine Road, Sherbrooke Street and Holden Avenue.

The president also stated that the association was going to ask the city to open up Sherbrooke Street between Roslyn and Greene Avenues as a commercial zone.

He stated that the association was going to ask for strict enforcement of the licensing of all guest houses as well as adherence to the city's health, fire and building regulations.

"We want to insist that our members maintain their establishments on a high level," he said.

The association wanted to play their part in keeping Westmount a clean, respectable, residential district. He called upon members to bear down on noisy tenants and drunken parties; to cater only to people of the highest calibre.

In the view of the association the guest houses had made the city a more desirable place to live in.

"In these times," Mr. Menard stated, "when costs are so high and accommodation so scarce, the guests houses of this community have been of great service to the Metropolis."

He pointed out that the guest houses provided homes for no less than 4,000 people. He said they were comprised of maiden ladies, who came from respectable families, but lacked the means to support expensive apartments; retired businessmen, who once held high executive positions; and white collar workers who held jobs in many of the city's large firms.

He added with some humor that some of these young white collar workers "no doubt work for the very people who are trying to turn them out on the streets."

Mr. Menard described the incongruity of the situation the guest house owners found themselves in. They invested their money in these establishments, paid taxes on them; yet were denied the right to put them to profitable use by the city council.

Speaking of the commercialization of Sherbrooke Street he told of the predicament property

I Remember

A series of articles by a retired coach and physical director recalling great athletes and great teams. Mr. Smith was 32 years of Westmount High as director of physical education (boys), and concurrently 28 years at McGill as wrestling coach.

My strong belief in the practice of developing the juniors each year proved its worth in the season of 1924-25 when the majority of our famous teams of the previous season had graduated fortunately leaving a few good players on which to build a team around.

In football the nucleus from the previous years championship team and others coming up from the senior B and junior teams who had both won their titles we were able to field a very powerful team. Albert Ayer was captain and half and his ability while running at full speed to kick a drop over the bar without breaking stride was ably supported by Henny Ewing a very tricky runner and plunger.

That future great, who later played standout ball on the big city teams in both football and hockey, Kenny Copland, was also a member. Christy Laing a very tall boy with a terrific boot averaging over 50 yards or most kicks and many times getting well over 60 yards was excellent. At quarter

we had a natural in Wilf Paterson who later played quarter on the Grey Cup Hamilton Tiger team. When Wilf was just a little shaver in the junior schools I happened to be passing when I noticed this little lad calling signals and I went over and asked him his name and age and told him to report to me when he entered high school as I wanted him for quarterback.

At snap we had John Woelever and he was good either on offence or defence, on the line we had three big men, Alex Marshall a real high knee plunging type; Chas. Lindsay a good two-way player; Chas. Hoffman, a tough hardy boy who loved the heavy going; Ewart Hines, a quieter type; and at O. S. Stew McNaughton and Art Allworth both light but good tacklers.

In those days, except in case of injuries, subs were little used as the starting team usually played the whole game. We were allowed to use a B player after the game had started, so we kept six on the

bench in case of injury; or, if we had a good lead we would send them in for experience. The basic plays and formations were the same on the three teams. When they went in to replace they were right at home.

In reading the papers of recent years it is very pleasing to see the number of noted tennis players that started their careers at the courts near the school such as Laird Watt, Gordy McNeil, George Robinson, Charles Leslie, Stew Veysey, Jim Spencer and many others. In skiing the school since 1922 have won the majority of titles in all classes.

In basketball we did not do well but at all times provided good opposition for our opponents, the season sandwiched as it was between the football and hockey did not leave us much time for training.

Hockey

In hockey though we were plagued with sickness through the season and had a number of our key men off in the early games nevertheless we were able to squeeze through and then go on to meet the winners of the city junior leagues for the provincial crown. In the first game we met the St. Augustine team and won and a week later we were called on to meet the Victoria team.

This game was played in the Mount Royal Arena following an earlier senior game. The starting time was near 11 p.m. and it was a three period game which finished with us on the top of a 4 to 3 score at 1 a.m. The following morning at 2 p.m. we were on the same ice to meet the strong and fresh Sons of Ireland team from Quebec, this game went into overtime and at the end of 90 min. it was still deadlocked 2 to 2 at the limit we were allowed to play.

The final game was a hummer with both teams playing wide open trying to score. With the score 2 to 1 against us we sent every man up trying to get the equalizer when the Sons got a breakaway and scored. We still kept trying and in another break the Sons scored the final goal. It was a heart breaker for the team as some of the players had played without a rest during the three games.

They certainly were iron men in those days. It was an insult to ask them if they were tired, needless to say they could not have done it in the hurry scurry type of hockey. It was all positional hockey then each man having his own man to cover.

The team had as its captain Jimmie Thomson and with him on the wings were Ken Copland and Larry Ireland. Larry was the son of that great sport and gentleman who never missed a school game, Rev. Canon Ireland of St. Philips. On defence, we had Christy Laing and Geo. Crombie, in goal Henny Ewing who played up forward as well. Our second line was Jack

The time and route of trip No. 1 is given below in detail.

Trip No. 1

At 4.45 p.m., the Royal Couple will leave the airport and proceed to the Dorval Traffic Circle and from there travel east along the provincial highway to 11th avenue, Lachine. At last I pulled a fast one on him. I had noticed his deep interest in a very charming young lady at the school. Using her as a foil I made up an imaginary story criticizing his play and wondering why he didn't go forward like the other players. It worked. In the game that afternoon Christy scored two touches and kicked three points. That was the first time he came out of a game really dirty. The other players wanted to know what I had given him.

To be a good coach it requires a good knowledge of psychology and knowing each boy in order to get the best out of him. And at all times giving him a reason for every move he is to make.

owners on that thoroughfare were faced with.

When Sherbrooke had to be widened and repaved considerable taxes were levied from these who owned property along it. On top of this they had been told they could not operate guest houses or subdivide their premises into flats or small apartments. Then to top it off the city council stood solid against commercialization of the street.

Yet, he stated, some of them had admitted that commercialization of Sherbrooke was inevitable. Councillor Panet Raymond said this.

Mr. Menard's vision for Sherbrooke Street was to make it into the Fifth Avenue of Montreal. He could see no reason why fashionable shops and offices were not allowed to operate there.

At the present time the only professions allowed to operate are lawyers, dentists, doctors, notaries, engineers and architects.

"There is not a person in this room," Mr. Menard stated, "who would want to decimate the high standard set by the City of Westmount."

"No one has any desire," he continued, "to see this beautiful tree lined boulevard become cluttered with Coca-Cola signs, and neon lights, noisy teenage hangouts and 'greasy spoons'; or a welter of seedy looking tourist signs."

He underlined the fact that the association was not anxious to become involved in a political fight or to become drawn into the coming January municipal elections.

There was no doubt, he thought, that that clique, the Municipal Association, would nominate their own candidates.

"Is they do not stand for us," he declared, "then they will be against us."

"If this is the case we are fully prepared to go into battle with our colors flying high."

Rotary Told Weak Homes Cause of Delinquency

Allenby Ross, director of the Unity Boys Club, told the Westmount Rotarians this week at a dinner meeting held in the Unity Club's premises that the club was only one of a number of influences at work in the life of a boy or girl.

He stated that weak, disjointed homes were the cause of people crying in the courts, reform schools and health clinics.

"If the home is the foundation," he continued, "the influence of the school and church are the ingredients which make the foundation strong."

Mr. Ross told the Rotarians that nowhere in the world could progress be recognized where the influence of Godly education had been received by a form of technical knowledge only.

"The greatest technical advance," he declared, "unless properly directed, can only result in sorrow and a waste of effort."

"The boys' club cannot and must not attempt to replace the responsibility of the parents," he said. "I do believe that with the co-operation of the home, school and club that reasonable progress will be made."

He said the Unity Boys' Club came into being during the early part of the war when the City Fathers asked Rotary to attempt a constructive recreational program for children of lower Westmount and St. Henri.

In August last the clubhouse was opened to children between ages of eight and 14 and the first year saw an enrollment of 499 boys and girls.

"Some of the former irritants to the police," he stated, "are now settled into useful service in the club."

The objective of the club he said was "fun with a purpose", to encourage the members to work towards a number of activities

such as gym, reading, dramatics and crafts.

Mr. Ross pointed out that the club was for the children not the children for the club. It was not a matter of large displays where the children performed like trained seals. It was a program geared to the needs of the community.

In the coming season he saw the new accomplishment program as the big effort.

Its purpose was to provide the youths a goal on the basis of self competition; to stimulate new interests and give the enjoyment of new experiences; to give opportunity to the member to sense achievement and personal worth.

Important Defence Post Goes to Roy G. Peers

Roy G. Peers, of 487 Mount Pleasant Avenue, has been appointed vice-president of the Canadian Commercial Corporation, it has been announced by Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Defence Production.

Mr. Peers who heads the Roy C. Peers Co. Ltd., an international trading company with headquarters in Montreal, brings to his new appointment a wealth of experience. During the Second World War Mr. Peers was connected with the Ming Sung Company in Washington. He negotiated Canadian arms contracts while there running up to about 1,000,000,000 sales in two years.

He also served as executive director of the Joint War Production Committee set up by Canada and the United States.

Mr. Peers new job will be to co-ordinate and facilitate the integration of Canadian and United States defence production, much in the same manner as he did during World War II.

The Canadian Commercial Corporation is now the chief purchasing agent for the Canadian Government.

Mr. Peers was born in Birkenhead, England, but received his education in Toronto. He came here in 1945.

Mr. Peers will be associated in Washington with another local man, Sidney G. Pierce, who is in charge of the liaison office of the Defence Production Department in the U.S. Capital. Mr. Pierce was formerly Canadian representative

on the Organization for European Economic Co-operation.

Big and rugged, Mr. Peers is regarded as an excellent choice for this key position in Canada's defence re-armament program. For his services during World War II, he was rewarded with the M.B.E. and the Medal of Freedom with Palm, from the United States, the highest civilian decoration.

Dancing Classes Open On Sept. 15

During the summer, Miss Beetles and her staff of teachers travelled widely across Canada, the United States and England, taking refresher courses in their respective departments. They have returned and are planning for the opening of their classes, with new ideas, new techniques and the very latest methods of teaching all types of dancing, singing, piano, dramatic, diction and modelling. Miss Beetles announced that classes will commence September 15 and that registration is in progress at The Mary Beetles School.

Only a limited number of pupils will be enrolled in each class. Evening classes for business girls, advanced and beginners, are a feature of this school. Special attention is given to students wishing to train professionally, recreationally or for their mental and physical improvement.

Teenagers and children's classes will be arranged during

the day to synchronise with their school schedule, and classes for pre-school children from three years of age will be arranged in the morning or early afternoon.

Recitals for all departments are presented at the end of the season, but participation in these is not compulsory. CIVIL DEFENCE PROBLEM

Perhaps the Swedes Can Provide Us with the Answer

Every man woman and child in Sweden pays \$3.50 a year to cover Civil Defence costs. This was the story told to Brig. Guy Gauthier, Montreal civil defence co-ordinator by two civil defence experts from Sweden who visited here last week.

Residents of Sweden "live" civil defence declared Ake Sundelin, director general of the Scandinavian country's C.D. and Ivar Muller, his assistant. Every man physically able must put in 60 hours a year in training, and every youngster is trained in first aid at the age of 14.

The civil defence budget in Sweden is \$25,000,000 a year. This sum is spent in training and shelters.

The Swedes are a practical and realistic people and realize that civil defence is everybody's business. It does not sound unreasonable to expect a person to pay for his own

protection when looked at in the right perspective.

Most people have some sort of insurance policy either protecting life, limb or property and the principle is accepted without quibble that one must pay for protection.

Citizens are taxed for water, fire protection, sanitary and health departments which they pay because they realize that these services are necessary for their well being.

Why then should anyone object to a tax to ensure that measures will be taken to prevent disaster to himself and family in the event of an atomic bomb attack?

Why should citizens be allowed to leave all the work to Joe, while they continue to enjoy their leisure hours in some personal way?

It would appear that the Swedes have the answer waiting for volunteers is not a very efficient method of providing civil defence.

Too often it is the elderly persons and the physically unfit who are first to offer their services.

If we are attacked here, the services of many strong physically fit men and women will be required.

Instead of begging the federal provincial and municipal authorities for financial aid, wouldn't the average man feel better if he contributed his own money for his own self preservation.

We think so! A system of compulsory service in the civil defence organization would greatly assist this country to solve this perplexing problem which is especially important to cities, like Westmount, lying within prime atomic areas.

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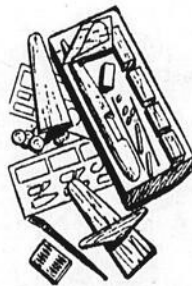
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Defeat Eastward In QRFU Opener Westmount Loses

Dave Peebles made good his boast that R.M.R.'s will be the team to beat this year for Q.R.F.U. senior honours. On Sunday afternoon the Army team whitewashed Eastward at the Maisonneuve gridiron 12-0 before close to 5,000 spectators.

Westmount were not so lucky as they fell to Lakeshore Flyers at Valois in a game which could have gone either way. The final result was Lakeshore 18 Westmount 12.

In the junior division N.D.G. Maple Leafs trounced Lakeshore juniors 56-0 on Saturday, at Trenholme Park, N.D.G. The N.D.G. team while vastly superior to Lakeshore were not quite value for the one-sided score. The newly

formed Lakeshore team showed fight all the way and with a few more games under their belt will improve. Solly Maestro's Maple Leafs do not seem to be as strong as they were last season. This is due to numerous changes as several of the players were over the junior age limit.

In one of two junior games played on Sunday St. Aloysius edged Verdun 6-0 in a game which was lost and won on fumbles. The new Auditorium park in Verdun was the venue for the game. Many complimentary remarks were passed on the excellent condition of the ground. St. Aloysius would appear to be the team to watch in the junior section. This will be the third year for most of the St. Al team and consequently they are a well drilled outfit.

East End Alouettes played to a five all tie with Point St. Charles at Montreal East. The shortness of the playing field prevented the teams kicking for single points as local rules were observed.

Sparkling the R.M.R. attack were Mike Maruska and Danny Johnston, who starred with the champions Lakeshore squad last season. Sandy Spence, one of the fastest men in local football, was a big factor in the Army win. Col. MacPherson, officer commanding the regiment, kicked off with Reg. 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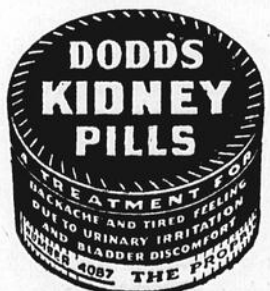
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
