taken from the mine at Bromont,
Quebec, now being opened up by Mr.John McEwen for the Montreal pur-
chases, and certainly finer spec-
imens have been found anywhere.

The rock is literally filled with

what is called No. 1. Asbestos, and

as these veins converge together

some very rich deposits must be

reached as they go down. Out of

1500 tons of rock displaced over 800

tons were pure asbestos. It seems to

be the opinion of mineral men and

scientists that these townships abound

in rich deposits of this valuable min-
eral.
