United States sells to us so much that we are not likely to be put on a footing less advantageous than the colonies would be on. But the United States would have no reason to resent being so treated, since it does not appear our trade. At the same time, as we all desire to maintain the friendliest possible relations with the United States, why should we not negotiate a reciprocity treaty which would give the United States better terms than other countries, even if somewhat less favorable than those granted to the colonies?

That is to say: If our grain gets a rebate of four cents a hundred, American grain will get one of three cents a hundred. Could Sir Charles and Colonel Denison fill the Northwest with people on the extra cent?

COLONIZATION IN QUEBEC.

Mr. Parent and his colleagues have very graciously indicated their respect for their former colleague, Hon. G. W. Stephens, by appointing him to a place on an important commission for which provision was made at the last session, and which has just been named. The importance of the commission cannot be overestimated, for it will have to take evidence touching the conditions under which the colonization of new territory proceeds in the Province of Quebec, the respective claims of the lessees of timber limits and intending settlers, the public works that are or ought to be provided to facilitate settlement, and all the other questions, some of them contentious in character, that affect this great work of building up Quebec on the basis of a large population established on the land. It was wise to add an English-speaking person to the commission, for a great deal of capital belonging to English-speaking people is invested in the lumbering industry and is otherwise concerned. The rigid uprightness for which Mr. Stephens has become almost famous in the community is itself a guarantee that the commission has been appointed with the object of arriving at a knowledge of the exact truth, and of applying the information obtained to the best purpose.

BON VOYAGE.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier left Montreal last night to take ship for England, where he is fated to be once more second only to the reigning monarch as the most interesting personality in a series of events upon which the eyes of the world will be fixed. Canada could not be more worthily represented, and it can truthfully be said that those of his own race, who rightly take a great pride in his personal triumphs, are not one whit more interested in his movements than Canadians of other descent. Canadian unity exists, at all events, to the extent that we cheer in common every Canadian, whatever his descent, who by distinguishing himself in the face of the world brings credit upon this land of his and of ours. The Premier has a difficult task on his hands, at least he seems to think so, but there is no room for doubt that he will acquit himself in all circumstances in such manner that Canadians everywhere will be proud of the First Canadian.

The Toronto Mail and Empire says: "If he (Sir Wilfrid Laurier) should stand out strongly and firmly for a preference to Canadian products, we shall get it." If Britain demands free trade with Canada, is our Toronto contemporary prepared to say that the Canadian Premier should endorse the demand?

WARRANT OUT FOR DR. DE OPPERT

Quebec, June 13.—(Special)—Dr. De Oppert, a Jewish physician, is a much wanted man in Quebec. He has been here for six weeks, staying at a good hotel, and has been an emigration representative for the Roumanian Government, and has boasted that in the next two years 600,000 Jews will be brought to Canada. He also claimed representation on the Bureau Hirsch's Association. This claim was promptly denied in a letter to the press from Mr. J. A. Jacobs, of the Hirsch Association of Montreal, the result of which the doctor has quietly changed his scenery, neglectful of his unpaid hotel bill and some \$800 he has borrowed from various acquaintances. The stranger, although a mere youth, has been acknowledged to possess remarkable ability from a surgical point of view, and to be an exceptionally clever practitioner. He is a linguist, who can converse fluently in seven languages, and his powers as a hypnotist has had several severe, but most successful tests in this city. While in Quebec he boarded at the St. Louis Hotel, drove daily for hours in a taxi, which he had agreed to pay for, and he had been seen to pay for contracted various debts, some of which attained pretty large proportions. He visited the hospitals frequently and is given credit for having performed two or three critical operations, the permanency of which he showed himself to be a skilful hand of the knife, and he also effected several cures by his system of magnetic healing. A warrant has been sworn out for his arrest. Detective Walsh is on the case.

MURDERED FOR A KETTLE.

Chicago, June 13.—Niles Brewsters is dead and Ed. Kuhn occupies a cell at the Central Police Station as the outcome of a fight in the kitchen of a well-known downtown restaurant. Both men were employed as assistant cooks and quarrelled over the possession of a kettle, a war of words ending in Kuhn seizing a big butcher knife and plunging it into the side of his opponent after he had been hurried against a steel range at his back. Brewster died while being taken to the county hospital.

AN EXCERPT FROM THE DIARY OF ONE OF THE HINDOO VISITORS

Translation from the memoirs of Colonel Katch-An-Katch-Khna, of the coronation contingent: "I remember that when I was in the ranks of the coronation contingent, I was struck by the fact that the Hindoo visitors were not allowed to smoke and fire, but they put us to live, such as I have seen in our own land. Long rushing carts that run on two wheels make the nights after a while, when we had the place is one of loud discord continually.

After a while, when we had the taken of the food prepared, and which the slave had much ado to keep free from the taint of these foreigners, unclean fingers, some small men, bustled up with their hands, and made figures and writings upon paper."

"How tall are you?" asked one. "Now I am only six feet and three inches, of which I become grievously ashamed, for I am only five feet and one-half feet. At that did these strange, hurrying little men stand me up straight and called 'shun.' Where at did I stand, they did look at me, and looked neither to the right nor left, but only as we do when the colonel sahib comes for to look closely at us."

"Afterwards did I look on the little man's face, which I did find to be marvellous much. So I did take him through our moving house and removed my turban that he might see whereof it was made, at which his wonder was great and moved me much to laughter, for though it could just be got into our moving house, when stretched out, yet was my brother's, him of the big frame, half again so long as myself."

"In return for my courtesy, said the little man to me: 'Put it on and come along with me.' At which I returned him my turban, and he did take it. 'The air is very cold in this great city, and it doth rain almost continually, which when I remarked, the little man did say, 'Yes, it is so. I mean the people with it are not satisfied. 'Look out there, Shorty, you will be sun over, cried a great voice seemingly from above me, with other words, though I have myself sometimes heard them from other men when we do make bad blunders on parade."

"I did move swiftly away into the friendly shelter of a door, when a high cart on two wheels dashed by me, which I did find to be a making mock of me. The streets were of a hard substance and of an exceeding roughness that made me think of my own home. Moving things like our moving house, but they did not have a ringing of bells, thereby provoking people to frenzy, for I did see scores rushing after these strange engines in madness."

"They moved not with smoke nor fire, but whirled along on a wire which I wished to reach up and feel, but my friend forbade me. 'It would kill you,' he said shortly, at which I laughed for long; for the wire was small and weak. 'The streets are many and unclean in this strange city, and the peoples are of two tongues. I like not their men who of stature are small and seem always to brood of things upon the ground, and they do look at me with a light and cheerfulness and life. Yet bold, for when I did look at a girl, she did not cast her eyes, but did only look at me as at a child and say: 'What a funny hat, I do wonder where he got it. Do these people smile at the sight of me, I think I will offer my best turban for one of their women to go back with me."

"As in Hong Kong, among the white people, so said I to my friend, 'I had of the juice of the grape, and babbled much at the mouth with loud vapourings and outpourings of vanity and a childish spirit. Many of such I saw and the night did not sleep, for I was full of them, and I did not know how to get myself a post against and did cry: 'Hello, did you; how do you catch your wind up there?' and other ridiculous and irrelevant sayings."

"The little man did speak often and again often of a mountain which he said they possess here. 'I will take you to the mountain,' said he, and he filled his chest with very much pride. 'Where is it? I ask him, for nowhere, for the great buildings that did shut out the light of the narrow streets, could I see anything. 'Hold hard,' he says. 'We are coming to it.' 'Thereupon I possessed my soul in patience and I did not move, for I did hold me into one of the swift-flying machines that had come to a standstill at the mere raising of his hand. Truly, he was a great man with my acquaintance, that at that strange object, I would not show my fear, however, when he did laugh and urge me, so sat upon a seat and held tight while we flew in and out of streets and up hills. I would not let the iron beast throw me, yet to be hard did I come, and at last, 'Get out,' said the little man."

"What do you think of it, my friend say, stretching out his hand. 'I know not what he meant. H. de Lovassoren, the Minister of Denmark at St. Petersburg, will be designated for the Paris Legation. The present Danish Minister at Paris, Herr J. H. de Hegemann-Landencrone, will go to Berlin at the end of the summer.

Upon recommendation of the committee investigating the status of technical education in the city, Mr. J. W. Hughes was added to the committee.

The question of Eastern manufacturers exhibiting at the Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition came up, and the various city manufacturers who wish to make displays at this exhibition, are requested to correspond with the Montreal secretary of the Manufacturers' Association, who has information in regard to the space and the exhibition to the Montreal manufacturers.

Six new members applied for membership and the applications were passed.

A BAD COLLISION

Tennessee Accommodation Train Telescoped Owing to Forgetfulness of Orders.

Chattanooga, June 12.—A fatal collision occurred on the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis Railroad to-day between Hooker and Summit, two small stations about twelve miles from this city. Three men were killed outright and about fifteen others more or less seriously injured. Possibly two or three of the wounded will die from the effects of their injuries.

One of the engineers overlooked his train and ran past the meeting place, Fireman A. Rankin, of this city, was horribly mangled, and died almost instantly. Engineer Rollins was badly injured, his legs being terribly crushed and a large hole made in his head and left side. His injuries are considered fatal.

Engineer George J. Ray, of the east mail, is seriously injured and it is thought fatally. His fireman, James Bernard, was caught under the smaller engine and literally burned to death. A handful of cinders and charred flesh was all that could be found of him. Express Messenger Webb, of the first mail train, was caught under the debris and died shortly after.

LAND CASE IN EXCHEQUER COURT

Ottawa, June 12.—Justice Burdette sat this morning in the Exchequer Court to hear a motion on behalf of H. E. Lyon, in the case of Lyon vs. MacKenzie, for an injunction to restrain the registrar of titles for South Alberta from registering any documents affecting the title to the lands in question in the cause until trial and judgment therein. The land in question is situated at Barrmore on the Crow's Nest Pass section of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and may be some valuable if the mining resources of the place are developed. The dispute is really on between H. C. Lyon and Malcolm MacKenzie, as to the priority of occupation of the lands. MacKenzie having succeeded to the rights of an Italian named Felix Montabette, a section man on the Canadian Pacific Railway, who claims to be the first settler on the land. O.C.R. contra. Judgment was reserved.

Another, probably his companion, had borrowed various guns from Guelph people and also left for parts unknown. It appears that the latter also victimized several Toronto people in like manner.
