



TREASURY REPORT.

The annual report of the Secretary of the Treasury was laid before Congress on the 10th inst. The following is a brief summary: Revenue.—The payments into the treasury (excluding treasury notes) during the three first quarters of the year 1819, are estimated at \$19,281,013 10—...

NEW YORK, December 17. The Annual Treasury Report, mentioned in our last, will be found in the succeeding columns. On a hasty perusal, we find that the estimates of receipts and expenditures for the present year leave a balance in the Treasury of upwards of three hundred thousand dollars; but the estimates for the next year exhibit a deficiency in the Revenue, as we stated yesterday, of nearly five millions.

To guard against this deficiency, the Secretary respectfully suggests, that either the revenue be augmented, or the expenditure diminished. If the former alternative be adopted, a portion of the deficit, it is intimated, may be supplied by an addition to the duties now imposed on various articles of foreign merchandise, and by a reasonable duty upon sales at public auction; but in this case it is not believed, that any modification of the existing tariff can supersede the necessity of resorting to internal taxation.

But whether the revenue be augmented, or the expenditure diminished, it is the opinion of the Secretary, that a loan to some extent will be necessary; and he suggests, as the best mode of raising the money, the issuing of the requisite amount of six per cent. stock, which, it is remarked, is, at present, considerably above par.

The verdict of the coroner's inquest on the body of Mr. Stoughton was as follows: "That James Stoughton came to his death by a wound received from a sword cane, held by Robert M. Goodwin, and which entered, between the ninth and tenth ribs of the left side, from seven to eight inches." Mr. Goodwin is in confinement, and has employed counsel.

NEW YORK, December 24. Of the troops recently arrived at Havana, about one third are said to have died by the fever. A part of them were quartered upon the city, and one regiment was stationed in the convent of St. Domingos.

NEW YORK, December 24. Capt. Shankland, arrived at Philadelphia on Friday last, reports, that the Patriots were within 100 miles of Maracaibo, and an attack was daily expected. Gen. Morillo went up the Lake a week before the Morgana's sailing; the Royalists had left the forts and gone to Zulua—they were few in number, but determined to make resistance.

NEW YORK, December 24. In stating the verdict of the coroner's jury who sat on the body of the late Mr. Stoughton, we copied from the Evening Post. That paper of yesterday remarks (and we understand from the coroner) that the statement was imperfect.—The verdict brought in by the jury, consisting of twenty-four respectable citizens, all of whom signed it, not only stated the fact of the stabbing, but went on to pronounce the precise legal crime, in form and words of an indictment, namely, that Robert M. Goodwin is guilty of murder of malice aforethought.

BUFFALO, Dec. 14.—Last week, the sheriff of this county, in conformity with proclamation of the Governor, proceeded to Grand Island with a party of men, under Lieut. Hodges, for the purpose of removing those intruders who had neglected to leave the Island within the time prescribed by law. We learn, that about 20 families were removed, those next to Canada were taken to that shore, and those upon this side of the Island were landed upon our own, and all the buildings burnt, to prevent their being re-occupied. The inhabitants were permitted to take with them every thing they had of the least value.—Many of those people are said to be miserably poor, and it is unfortunate that they must be thrown upon the world at this inclement season without a shelter for their heads, but they had timely notice we have provided habitations elsewhere, in season.

THE GREAT CANAL. From the Courier Register, December 15. In this age of wonders, perhaps nothing more calculated to excite the admiration of the intelligent and reflecting part of the people, than that ninety six miles of canal, principally through a wilderness, should be completed in the short space of two years and five months, from the time of its commencement—yet such appears to be the fact. We have it from authority not to be doubted, that from Utica to near Salina the Canal is not only navigated; the navigation there, however, was not prevented by a small job of work which was not completed. The western part of the middle section has also been completed and navigated.

DARREN, Dec. 15.—The English ship Goudie, Capt. James Wyllie, from Grenock, for Savannah, cargo coals, dry goods, and iron castings for machinery, grounded on the south breakers off St. Simons, on Tuesday 7th inst. at 11 o'clock, A. M. The ship and cargo will be lost (except the weather continues moderate) in which event, some of the goods, sails, rigging, &c. may be rescued. Capt. Wyllie believed St. Simons light-house to be Tyre light house, and ran for it accordingly, which was the cause of his misfortune.

BOSTON Dec. 25. London dates to the 3d inst. by the Herald, Capt. Fox, from Liverpool. Delivered by the PRINCE REGENT on opening the Parliament. My LORDS & GENTLEMEN, I regret to have been under the necessity of calling you together at this period of the year, but the sedulous practices so long prevalent in some of the Manufacturing Districts of the country, have been continued with increased activity since we last assembled in Parliament.

They have led to proceedings incompatible with the public tranquillity, and with the peaceable habits of the industrious classes of the community; and a spirit now fully manifested, utterly hostile to the Constitution of this Kingdom, and aiming not only at the change of those political institutions which have hitherto constituted the pride and security of this country, but at the subversion of the rights of property, and of all order in society.

I have given directions that the necessary information on this subject shall be laid before you; and I feel it to be my indispensable duty to press on your immediate attention, the consideration of such measures as may be requisite for the counteraction and suppression of a system, which, if not effectually checked, must bring confusion and ruin on the nation.

The necessity of affording protection to the lives and property of His Majesty's loyal subjects, has compelled me to make some addition to our military force; but I have no doubt you will be of opinion that the arrangements for this purpose have been effected in the manner likely to be the least burthensome to the country.

Although the revenue has undergone some fluctuation since the close of the last Session of Parliament, I have the satisfaction of being able to inform you, it appears to be again in a course of progressive improvement. Upon the Loyalty of the great body of the people I have the most confident reliance; but it will require your utmost vigilance and exertion, collectively and individually, to check the dissemination of the doctrines of Treason and Impiety, and to impress upon the minds of all classes of His Majesty's subjects, that it is from the cultivation of the principles of Religion, and from a just subordination to the lawful authority, that we can alone expect the continuance of that Divine favour and protection which have hitherto been so signally experienced by this Kingdom.

PARLIAMENT. In the House of Commons, Nov. 25d, an Address to the Prince Regent, in answer to his Speech from the throne, was read, and Mr. Tierney (the leader of the opposition) moved an amendment, or rider, disapproving of the conduct of the magistrates and military, in dispersing the Manchester meeting on the 16th August. A most animated debate ensued, which continued for two days; when the Address passed without a division; and the question on Mr. Tierney's motion, was negatived: For 120—Against it 381—Majority 261.

PARIS, Nov. 29. This day His Majesty repaired in state, to the Legislative Palace, and opened the session of the Chambers, by a Speech from the throne. The affairs of France are represented in the speech as being in the most auspicious situation; and the information was received by animated acclamations.

He congratulated the Chambers upon the favorable termination of the negotiations with the Holy See: upon the evident progress which was apparent in the trade, agriculture and fine arts, and upon the amelioration in the finances. He concluded his speech with recommending that the elections should be discontinued with the annual action of parties; and that "he should present laws for their confirmation which will give permanent security to all the interests guaranteed by the charter. [A fifth part of the Chamber of Deputies has been annually renewed by elections—it is now proposed to have the Chamber all elected at the same time, and for five years.]

When the members were called to take their oath, before the King, the Abbe GAROUCHE, though returned a deputy, was not called. French Funds, Nov. 29.—Five per cent. 58 to 69. Bank shares 146 1/2. There is a report, that M. M. DESOLES, GOUVION St. CYR, and LOUIS, have left the Ministry, and that their places are to be supplied by Royalists.

PARIS, Nov. 26.—The King has appointed PASQUIER, Minister of Foreign Affairs; the Marquis de LAUREN-MAGUIER, Minister of War; and the Sieur ROY, Minister of Finance. The Count DECAZES is appointed President of the Council of Ministers (Prime Minister). Dec. 2.—Lord SIDMOUTH moved, that the bill to prevent drilling and training, be read a second time. A debate ensued, and the bill was opposed; and it passed to a second reading without a division.

Nov. 20.—Carlisle, the vendor of Paine's Age of Reason, has been sentenced to three years imprisonment, and a fine of 1500l. and committed to Dorchester jail. In almost every part of the Empire, there are revived or augmented Yeomanry corps. The Courier asserts, that after all the noise about rotten-boroughs, it appears, that the three Champions of Opposition in the House of Commons, Mr. TERNER, Mr. BROGHAM, and Sir JAMES MACKINTOSH, all represent those boroughs!

The ten Royal Veteran Battalions have been filled up to 1000 men each, from the half-pay list. Sir FRAS. BURNETT has been prosecuted for seditious writings. Nov. 19.—The London Gazette of yesterday contains no less than fifteen loyal addresses from counties, cities, and corporations. The Courier contradicts the reports that Sir PHILIP BARKER is to supersede Gen. Lowe, as Governor of St. Helena. The latter will retire from ill health.

Liverpool, Dec. 1.—The operations of the Reformers, or Radicals as they are called, have had a serious effect on our commercial operations. It has checked the manufactures in a very considerable degree. The disturbances have now subsided; and it is understood that things are reverting to their usual course. Another letter says, The Collector of this port has refused to permit the landing of Paine's bones, being a contraband article. "We regret to announce the failure of a respectable American house here."

The little improvement in Cotton is in consequence of the long prevalence of Easterly winds, which has prevented arrivals. A London paper says, that by the earthquake in India, June 16, the whole district and territory of Yarkat, a county situated on the N. W. of Bombay, and including several towns and villages, have been destroyed with 2000 inhabitants. Viscount Lascelles has been appointed lieutenant of the county of York. The Earl of Egremont has also been appointed lieutenant of the county of Sussex.

An ordinance of Louis 18th, extends the amnesty of January, 1815, to the Duke of Grevench. All the banished, except the regicides, are included in the amnesty. The Moniteur of Nov. 22d announces the creation of eight new peers; count CLEMENTS de LIS, Dedeley d'Agier, E. de L'Aude, Gassendi, the duc de Prasin, and counts Cassa Bianca & de Segur. The princess of Wales was at Marseilles. It is stated that the king of England has had an interval of restoration to his reason.

Court of Kings Bench.—In consequence of the inquest at Oldham having been held without the coroner viewing the body, with the jury, as declared by law, the whole of the proceedings have been declared void by the court. PARIS, Nov. 14.—By an ordinance of the 10th Nov. his majesty has placed on active service 20,000 young soldiers of the class of 1818. The London and Liverpool Corn Exchange of Nov. 29 and Dec. 3, were well supplied, and wheat supported its last prices.

The ship Herald, Capt. Fox, arrived in Boston harbor on the 23d inst. in 17 days from Liverpool, having left there on the 6th.—She was laden with 1000 tons of goods. KINGSTON, (U. C.) Dec. 21. His Majesty's Ship Niagara, of twenty one Guns, which sunk in 1816, was last week raised and put upon the stocks, to undergo, we understand, a thorough repair. MARRIED. QUEBEC: THURSDAY, 6th JANUARY, 1820. We were favored, yesterday, with the Boston Centinel of the 25th ultimo, from which we have copied the Speech of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent at the opening of Parliament, From the contents of the Speech and the strong Ministerial majorities in both Houses, there can be no doubt that efficient measures will speedily be taken to guard against all danger of violence on the part of the discontented throughout the Kingdom. The wisdom of Parliament will also without doubt be directed to the alleviation of the existing distresses, and such other Legislative measures as the circumstances of the Country will permit, for the future quiet and welfare of the nation.

As there is perhaps no City in the world more deficient in the public Institutions of Charity than Quebec, so there is certainly none, in which the work of private Benevolence is carried on with more alacrity and vigour. The Military have, on all occasions, displayed a most laudable activity in seconding the efforts of the Citizens to relieve distress, and we have great pleasure in announcing to the public, that a Meeting has been held, during the present week, by the Officers of the 1st Battalion of the 60th Regt. at which a Subscription was raised, amounting to £21 for the support of the Emigrants in the Cape Hospital, and that the Non-Commissioned Officers and others, composing a Charitable association in the Corps, have since subscribed the sum of £3 2s. 1d. for the same purpose. A liberal donation for the same object will be received some time ago from the Officers of the 70th Regt.

Counterfeit Bills of the Quebec Bank.—Several persons, one an old offender from the United States, were committed to the Gaol of this City, on Tuesday last, for passing the first Counterfeit Bills on this Bank, which have hitherto appeared. They are Ten Dollar Bills in imitation of those first issued of Letter press, resembling the Army Bills. The counterfeiters must have calculated a good deal on want of discrimination in this community, to suppose that a plate imitation, such as theirs is, of Letter press, could impose on any great number of persons. However, ingenious the Counterfeiters may be, they must go to some large printing office, before they can produce any tolerable imitation of these Bills; and although the Army Bills were imperfectly counterfeited in the United States during the war, it is not to be supposed that the owner of such an office will, in present, suffer so infamous a transaction in his premises. We believe that very few of the present counterfeiters, have got into circulation here, and any persons on his guard, and acquainted with the true Bill will readily detect them.

Indeed the public cannot be too much on its guard against counterfeit Bills. There is probably not a Bank in America that has not had its Bills counterfeited. The multiplication of banks in the United States has produced great numbers of able engravers of Bank Bills; several of them have become dissolute characters, and employ themselves in counterfeiting, with a boldness and ability unexampled in other countries. We have reason to believe that some of them are settled in this Province or on the lines. However much the Americans may boast of their system of State Prisons, and confinement for life &c. with due deference to the Friends of humanity, particularly in the persons of thieves and malefactors, we cannot help thinking that the English System is the least expensive and most efficient.
