Rotarians Heard 'Talkie' Film On Bread Wednesday

The Staff Of Life And Its History Traced From Cavemen To Present Day—Shots Included Scenes From "Confucius to Joe Penner"—Bakers Increased Volume 20% in 1890, 96% At Present Time — Magazine And Radio Advertising Used Extensively — Tom Bignell Introduced Feature—Thanks Expressed By Percy Jarman.

Presenting a talkie film about "Bread" from the time of the caveman and the Romans down to the present day, or, as the theme song suggested, from Confucius to Joe Penner, Standard Brands Wednesday entertained the Westmount Rotarians at their regular weekly luncheon meeting at Victoria Hall. The event being arranged for by Tom Bignell, of Dent Harrison and Sons bakery.

Featuring some scenes of Cleopatra and Josephine and their hold over Anthony and Napoleon through man's inherent love of bread, the film included shots of bread-making in China, South America, Russia, Ireland and the United States, with time out being taken for singing of the popular ditties of the country and period.

Tracing the development of bread and yeast from 1890 when the bakeries had but 20 per cent of the bread business to the present day when 96 per cent of all bread is produced by bakers, Standard Brands showed the development of compressed yeast, originated in 1868, and inferred that the sudden increase in the use of baker's bread from the years 1914 to 1918 was the result of the housewife's taking man's place in the world of business while he went to fight, and consequently having no time for home baking.

In 1919 bakers had attained 60 per cent of the bread business and by 1926 had reached a figure of well over 90 per cent. About this time it was noted that householders were going in more and more for a variety of foods—fruits and vegetables were always in season, and canned goods in ever increasing numbers were being sold. From this was born the idea of variety in bread, and resulted in the coffee rolls, buns, etc., that are so popular today.

Starting with magazine advertising and working into radio in 1931 with three bakers and other programs, including the popular Joe Penner, the bakers determined to maintain their high percentage of the bread trade.

The film drew to a conclusion with a few shots of Penner, the super-salesman, inquiring if anyone in the audience wanted to buy a duck.

The film was introduced by Tom Bignell, who stated that he found he could rely on Standard brands. Thanks of the club were tendered by Rotarian Percy Jarman. President Henry F. King was in the chair.

LOCAL RESIDENT RECEIVES LETTER FROM EDWARD VIII.

Poem On Death Of Late King George V. Officially Recognized By His Majesty.

Barbara P. Brisbane, a Westmount resident and a teacher at Riverview School in Verdun, has received a letter of recognition from His Majesty, King Edward VIII, for a fine poem which she composed on the occasion of the death of His Late Majesty, King George V.

Miss Brisbane has been a life-long resident of this city, and at an early age displayed marked talent in music, poetry and artistic endeavour. Her sculpturing and portrait painting have won favorable comment from many noted art connoisseurs, and her musical accomplishments are of a very high degree.

Miss Brisbane's poem, "The King is Dead," is set to appropriate music which she composed herself. The two verses express most appropriately the grief and sorrow which swept over the Empire, and indeed the world, on the occasion of His Late Majesty's death, and the love and esteem in which he was so dearly held.

Prevent Spread Of Disease Urges McGill Dept. Letter

City authorities are anxious that citizens recognize the great part that they can play in the prevention of the spread of contagious disease. A recent letter issued from the Office of the Dean of the Faculty of Medicine at McGill University sums up the matter neatly. There is a remarkably high death rate from typhoid when in many other well-run cities it has been stamped out altogether. The tuberculosis death rate could be halved, the letter points out. The death rate among infants shows that further educational work among Canadian mothers is a dire necessity.

The letter as received by the authorities of the city of Westmount is as follows:—

Gentlemen:—
If the words "Public Health and Preventive Medicine" are to be of any significance or value to the people of this country, all necessary practical information must be disseminated in order that they may be guided in their efforts to help the cause of national well-being. It is not sufficient merely to know in a general way that certain established rules should be followed. Everyone of intelligence should be made aware of how to carry out the measures necessary to ensure the maintenance of health and saving of life.

Scrutinize, even casually, the vital statistics for Canada in 1934, and you will find evidence enough of the comparative failure of our efforts at prevention. It is well known for example, and admitted, that diphtheria is essentially a preventable disease, yet 232 deaths are recorded. True, this is a great reduction as compared with former years, but the rate in other countries is still lower.

Typoid fever, again, in all well regulated communities has become almost extinct, yet here in Canada during this last year there were 293 deaths, ample evidence of the failure to provide safe water and safe milk.

The deaths from tuberculosis during the past year—6,418—could be halved were the measures for combating the disease carried out with the same efficiency in our provinces as have been in some others.

And again, the fact that 10,570 deaths occurred from cancer in 1934 represents in some measure at least a failure to provide for early diagnosis and early adequate treatment.

The number of deaths from infantile diarrhoea and enteritis is 3,730. This furnishes incontrovertible proof that further education of Canadian mothers in infant hygiene is a matter of urgency.

That the problem of adequate maternal care needs much more attention is obvious from the fact that maternal deaths numbered 1,163, a proportion which does not reflect credit on the intelligence of the public or of the profession—it may be of both. That parents need further education in the care of their infant children is again revealed by the 7,774 deaths which occurred in 1934.

Council Adopted New Pension Plan To Aid Employees

By-Law Approved at Tuesday Meeting — To Benefit Those Thirty Years and Over on Westmount Pay-roll — Workers and City Both Contribute to Fund — Promotions Announced in Police Department — Suggest "Met" Commission Spend Share of Tax Receipts on Public Works — Easter Floral Display Now Ready.

A by-law providing a general pension fund for all permanent employees of the City was given first, second and third readings at the regular meeting of the Westmount City Council Tuesday night. The by-law will go into effect on May 1st.

The new pension fund will require that employees contribute 4 1/2 percent of their salaries, to which the City will add 2 1/2 percent. Under the new plan, employees who have at least 30 years' service and have attained 60 years of age, will receive a pension of 1-80th of their average salary, multiplied by the number of years they have been in service. Employees having at least 40 years' service and who have reached the age of 65 will receive 1-60th of their average salary for each year of service.

CREDIT GROUP HEARD WESTMT RESIDENT WED.

Francis Hankin Discussed
British North America
Act, And Effects Of
Changes.

Discussing the British North America Act in an address Wednesday evening before the Montreal Chapter of the Canadian Credit Institute, Francis Hankin, prominent Westmount resident, explained that three clear principles emerge from any consideration of changes which should be made in our Constitution.

In the first place, matters that have no effect on ones personal status or "entrenched" provincial rights, the federal Government should have power to amend the constitution without consulting the provinces.

Secondly, unanimous consent should be required from the provinces in respect to matters in which the provinces have entrenched rights, such as religion, language, education, civil rights.

Thirdly, on all other matters, it should be sufficient to obtain a majority in both federal houses and of the provinces.

Mr. Hankin said that civil rights and property rights should be regarded as "entrenched" matters so long as they were not subjects of a national character. He thought they could be decided by the Supreme Court, or, preferably, by Parliament. Those in Parliament were mostly reasonable people. "I don't think they would attempt to take away from the provinces matters of purely personal concern," the speaker said.

He viewed the need for change as of immediate concern and urgency. But the task was difficult, for it was only natural that the provinces should try to prevent the invasion of those rights he had referred to, and they were therefore, fearful of any amendments. Yet the importance of the need for amendments should make the provinces realize that they should not allow their fears to carry them too far and prevent the federal Government from taking the course which modern progress demanded.

Mr. Hankin, pointing out that the Canadian constitution was both written and unwritten, traced the growth of government in Canada from Confederation right up to the present time. The Balfour report of 1926, which took legal form in the Statutes of Westminster, made Canada and the other Dominions autonomous communities. But such independence

was qualified in some respects, one such qualification arising out of such an eventuality as the British Commonwealth going to war. Canada might desire to remain neutral, but as a member of the British Commonwealth would an enemy regard her as neutral? The only way Canada could ensure her neutrality would be to sever her connections with the Empire.

Turning to internal relations, the speaker after referring to the Quebec resolutions, said there had arisen in recent years the "compact" theory of Confederation. Its importance lay in the fact that those who accepted that theory said there could be no amendments passed without the unanimous consent of the provinces. He submitted that the theory was invalid both in fact and law; in fact, because the B.N.A. Act created a new condition in Canadian affairs under which every citizen of every province owed allegiance to the central government. It created a new democracy, and the principle of democracy was majority rule. He agreed, however, that a majority, however powerful, must take into account the vital matters entrenched in the B.N.A. Act.

But there were other matters of national importance which should be dealt with on the basis of majority rule. Unfortunately, in the interpretations of the B.N.A. Act by the Privy Council, stress was placed on local, provincial matters as against the wider, national matters, in spite of the tendency towards the development of a national economic life.

Mr. Hankin suggested that the powers given the federal Government in the B.N.A. Act were not sufficiently wide to cover all matters which might be construed as of national importance. The B.N.A. Act, for example, had little to say about social matters. He spoke of these things because economic conditions had changed vitally since 1867.

Mr. Hankin said the federal Government also should have power to protect the investor, and be enabled to ensure uniformity of legislation in respect to incorporation of companies. In respect to minimum wage laws it should have power to control, without, however, requiring uniformity. He believed also the right of the federal Government to enact social legislation should be made clear and definite.

G. BLAIR GORDON REVEALS TEXTILE CONDITIONS HERE

Taking the witness stand on Tuesday in connection with the federal enquiry into conditions of the Canadian textile industry, G. Blair Gordon, prominent Westmount resident, gave a comprehensive picture of the competitive element facing the industry in the form of Japanese textile prices, the effects of these prices, and the purchases in Canada of Japanese-made goods.

Mr. Gordon brought out many salient facts regarding conditions in the Canadian textile industry. As managing director of the Dominion Textile Company, and being affiliated in an executive capacity with several other large textile concerns, Mr. Gordon's information was authoritative.

Mr. Gordon stated that at certain points, Canadian textile firms had ceased to manufacture various lines, the reason being that it was practically impossible to dispose of present stock. "Because people are not interested in placing orders," said Mr. Gordon, "and this is because the Japanese quotations are so much below our prices. The inquiry is continuing.

Rabbi Berger Delivered Fine Passover Message

Addressed Congregation Of Shaar Hashomayim Tuesday Morning—Freedom and Service Go Together, Stated Speaker — Hope Can Grow Only Through Equal Freedom And Liberty For All.

At the Passover services held Tuesday morning in Shaar Zion Synagogue, Rabbi Julius Berger delivered the following Passover message, entitled "Passover—The Feast of Service," from the pulpit.

"Let my people go, that they may serve me!" (Exodus VII: 26) These few words contain the real significance of Passover. They contain the principle that only a free man can truly serve. Freedom and service go together. Moses repeated his theme over and over again to a hard-hearted Pharaoh. Ever since his time, it was meant to be an inspiration to all mankind. No greater need exists in the world today than for dictators or would-be dictators to understand that freedom can not be divorced from service if the safety of a land means anything.

How is freedom achieved? It is achieved neither through absence of restraint nor through an external force of regimentation. It is achieved through the inner urge of the truly liberated being to whom the practical worship of God, the Creator, can best find expression in the service to man, the creature. This service cannot be had by compulsion or violence. The fruits of the various dictatorships which have already been established are more than symbolic. Within each land—where dictatorship is tolerated—there is free, and between nations the ominous thunders of war are growing ever louder. When we speak of such land, we feel like Dante when he

took the hand of Virgil and was about to enter the nether regions over the entrance of which was written, "Abandon hope all ye who enter here."

We come in the last analysis to two things. We cannot build up a sound nation of unbound men. We cannot bind men into a rational state with an unethical motive. A change of method is not a change of motive, and a change of method is all that dictatorship offers us.

If hope is to be indulged for the future, we may be certain that it can only grow through a realization of the principle of Equal Freedom in the most emphatic manner. The principle would have all of us understand that the good of all and that the good of each must be harmonized by a government which is truly ethical. In other words, each should be left free to dispose of his own activities as he may deem most conducive to his own happiness, provided he in no way infringes on the equal freedom of others. Each should be left to dispose of the fruits of his own activities, of his own exertions, of his own acquired or inherited capabilities and faculties, as he may deem most conducive to his own happiness, again with the proviso mentioned heretofore. No nation achieves a permanent place of power in the world's history until it has learned to catch the vision of Israel's liberator: "Let my people go, that they may serve Me."

V. C. Wansbrough Spoke Before Roslyn Avenue School Parent Teacher Association.

V. C. Wansbrough, headmaster of Lower Canada College, addressed the Roslyn Avenue School Parent-Teacher Association Monday evening at the school, taking as his subject "The Teaching of History".

He urged the introduction of children to history through the medium of things of the "common-place present". Young children, the speaker stated, should be first introduced to the present day world, as a child is eager to learn about his own environment. For example, he pointed out, explaining the duties of a policeman led to the history of law and order; an electric light bulb led to the Industrial revolution; garbage collection to the death carts of the Great Plague of London; various present day religions to the Reformation, and the study of modern Ethiopia to an explanation of the feudal system.

History, the speaker continued, is important only insofar as it applies to the problems of the present day, and if it then fails to meet the test, it should be discarded. The close connection between history and geography was stressed, Mr. Wansbrough bringing out the necessity of teaching the "essential interdependence of the world."

RCMP COMMANDER ADDRESSED RMR OFFICERS THURS.

Addressing officers of The Royal Montreal Regiment Thursday evening in their mess, Inspector Royal-Gagnon, commanding the Montreal Division of the R.C.M.P., painted a vivid picture of Canada's west in the years following Confederation. He traced the history of the "Mounties", and threw valuable sidelights on the early Indians, traders, the building of the railways, and the Riel Rebellion.

Walton, E.D., on the occasion of his retirement after 22 years' service from 1914 to 1936. Major Walton had been in command of No. 1 Company of the regiment for many years and his post has been filled by Capt. J. H. McBride, formerly second-in-command of the company.

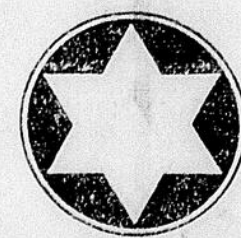

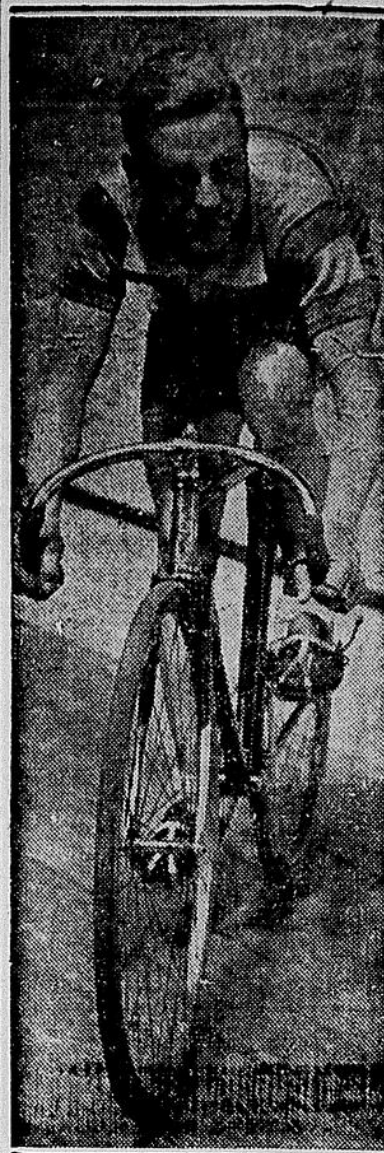

Another shock came when he learned his mother had moved from Howth, about three miles from Raheny, when the shops refused to extend further credit. It seems Jack had completely forgotten to take care of debts incurred before he set sail on his American tour of conquest.

Jack Doyle is definitely through in Ireland. As a lure for the curious, he can play the second-rate British music halls for a short period. The novelty will soon wear off and the Irish Thrush, who thought more of his good looks and fine tenor voice than a boxing career, may be wished on us again for another try at Hollywood.

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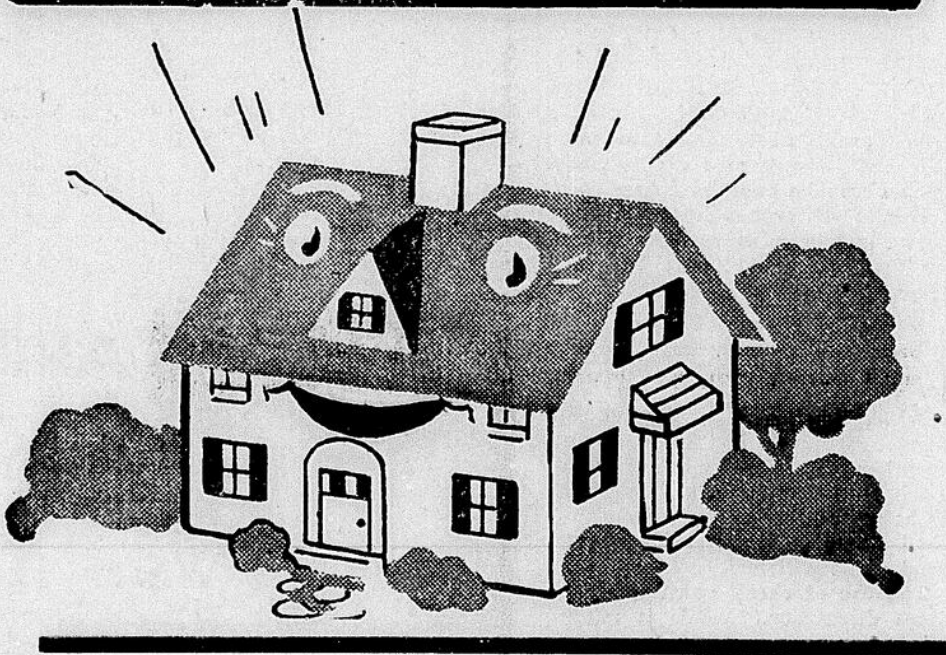
