Westmount Needs Ten Guardians For Crossings

Ten crossing guardians are urgently wanted by the City of Westmount. Men or women who have some spare time on their hands and are prepared to give about 3¼ hours per day to this work should apply to N. T. Dawe, Personnel Officer, Westmount City Hall, or telephone FI. 8531.

Last year only four crossing guardians were employed, and the experiment worked out so well that it has been decided to increase the number of guardians.

Three additional intersections will thus be looked after, bringing the number to seven, all in the vicinity of schools.

The intersections where crossing guardians will be placed are: Roslyn and Western; Lansdowne and Sherbrooke; Cote St. Antoine and Roslyn; Western and Clarke; St. Catherine and Lansdowne; Olivier and St. Catherine; Roslyn and Western.

Guardians are paid at the rate of \$40 per month with no deduction for holidays, and must be on duty five days a week, Monday to Friday. They are equipped with a cap, either summer or winter type, raincoat, belt, and white shoulder straps, also small hand stop sign.

The duties are not hard—the principal object being to ensure that all traffic comes to a stop when the school children are crossing the roadway to and from school.

Crossing guardians are sworn in as special constables, and are invested with the necessary authority to enforce their orders to drivers of vehicles.

Pensioners or housewives living in the vicinity of the various crossing points, might find this job an easy way of augmenting their income or pocket money.

Applicants need not be residents of Westmount.

Westmount Mayor Elected As City Representative

His Worship Mayor J. S. Cameron of Westmount was named the official representative of the City to the forthcoming meeting of the Greater Montreal communities in connection with the Montreal Transportation Commission.

It was pointed out that communities, other than the City of Montreal, will attend this meeting to elect their representative to the five-man Montreal Traffic Commission.

The City Council members elected the Mayor and authorized him to name one other councillor later, in order that there be two voting representatives at the meeting which Westmount is allowed.

Westmount Receives Tax On Telephones and Sales

Figures issued by the accounting branch of the City of Montreal's finance department on Thursday on the receipts and distribution of the tax on telephones and the sales tax for the fiscal year 1949-50 which ended April 30, show that Westmount received from the tax on telephones \$7,015 and from the two-per-cent sales tax \$220,648.

Total amounts collected were: telephone tax \$400,352; sales tax, \$11,679,578.

Of the tax on telephones, which is collected for the City of Montreal by the Bell Telephone Company, Montreal received \$343,423, and the other municipalities as follows: Westmount, \$7,815; Verdun, \$22,626; Outremont, \$9,138; Montreal East, \$1,298; Montreal North, \$3,260; Montreal West, \$998; Town of Mount Royal, \$2,680; Pointe-aux-Trembles, \$2,074; Ville St. Laurent, \$4,744; Ville St. Michel, \$2,190.

Distribution of the sales tax was as follows: City of Montreal, \$9,695,058; Westmount, \$220,648; Verdun, \$638,749; Outremont, \$257,986; Montreal East, \$36,657; Montreal North, \$92,040; Montreal West, \$28,200; Town of Mount Royal, \$75,685; Pointe-aux-Trembles, \$58,574; Ville St. Laurent, \$133,931; Ville St. Michel, \$61,847; Lachine, \$236,233; Hampstead, \$26,330; Ville La Salle, \$76,816; Ville St. Pierre, \$40,815.

Of the months of the fiscal year under review, the heaviest was January when the receipts were \$1,499,569 or 11.92 per cent. December showed receipts of \$1,070,531 and was only the sixth month in volume of sales subject to the tax. May, with \$1,147,721 in receipts or 9.12 per cent was second; July, 1,114,761, or 8.86 per cent, was third; October, with \$1,083,955 or 8.62 per cent was fourth; and November, with \$1,081,821, or 8.6 per cent was fifth.

Cost of collecting the telephone tax was \$16,488, leaving the \$400,252 net for distribution among the 11 municipalities.

Cost of collecting the sales tax (the work of collecting done by the provincial government when it collects its own two per cent levy and the one per cent education tax where it is imposed) was \$484,036, leaving the net of \$11,679,578 for distribution among the 15 municipalities which participate.

Westmount Air Cadet Sqdn. Marks 10th Anniversary

The entire Montreal area can be justly proud that ten years ago this week the first Air Cadet squadron in Canada was formed by a group of prominent citizens of the City of Westmount, including that City's late mayor Walter Merrill, K.C. Under the command of S/L H. P. Illsley the No. 1 (Westmount) Squadron attained a standard of proficiency that was second to none and as the various squadrons were organized across the Dominion, it was evident that this great youth organization would benefit thousands of teen-aged boys from coast to coast.

During the past war this unit produced more recruits for the armed forces and in particular the RCAF than any other cadet unit.

To-day the squadron is sponsored by the Air Force Veterans Association, Branch 84 (Que.) Canadian Legion and ranks among the best in the country. Recently the name of the Squadron was changed to: — No. 1 (West Montreal) Squadron in order to accommodate boys from the ages of 14 to 18 from any part of the Island of Montreal and District.

In an interview with the Commanding Officer, S/L H. S. Greene, he replied, "Last month the Minister for National Defence, the Hon. Brooke Claxton, announced to the Canadian people that the establishment for the Royal Canadian Air Cadets has been increased by 50%. This means that by mid-November we must increase our strength to well over the 200 mark in this unit."

S/L Greene went on to say "Any boy who is interested in joining the Air Cadets may do so by applying for information at the Westmount Junior High School, 20 Academy Road, Westmount, on any Monday or Thursday evening commencing Sept. 11th, or by telephoning F/L L. E. Weaver, EX. 3877 or F/O J. H. Barnes, DE. 7274."

"Instruction is given in ground and air subjects which include: — Navigation, Airmanship, Map Reading, Meteorology, Aero-Engines, Air-frame construction, Armament, Drill, Radio, and Leadership."

Snead Rated Best Golfer By Rotary Club Speaker

The development of golf; some of its intricacies, its outstanding players, and memorable moments were all outlined by Redvers MacKenzie, who spoke at the Westmount Rotary Club luncheon meeting Wednesday.

Coupled with this was an outline of some of the lifetime highlights of the speaker, who has been a professional golfer for 26 years, the last 22 of them at the Elmeridge Golf Club.

He called Slamming Sammy Snead the greatest golfer of the present day, pointing out that if he were an outstanding putter, he would be in a class by himself.

Referring to the performance given by Snead at the recent Canadian Open in Montreal, Mr. MacKenzie said that Snead was dead tired, as he had only missed four tournaments since Christmas time.

As a professional, the speaker said that it was not wise to tell any player too much in teaching him the game. He pointed out that in one particular case, a man was pivoting well until told so, and then he froze up so that his pivot was never the same.

"Up to the 1920's, it was common to win the Canadian open with a score of over 300," the speaker said, pointing out that such a performance today would

not rate a mention in any newspaper.

He explained that the development of golf in Canada has grown tremendously. There are 511 clubs in Canada and more than 6000 in the United States. Other amazing facts revealed that some 200,000 clubs are manufactured in Canada every year, plus 2,000,000 golf balls. In the United States the figures reach 3,000,000 clubs and some 2,000,000 dozen balls.

Mr. MacKenzie also explained that if the 340 dots in each ball were not there, it would only travel a distance of some 75 yards.

In naming some of the outstanding contributors to the game, the speaker recalled Harry Vardin, whose grip on the club is now universal, and who won the British open six times; Tom Morris who won many a tournament with low scores when the ball was leather covered and stuffed with feathers; James Bray, John Ball and Bob Jones, who never turned professional but won the British, American and amateur open all in the same year.

Introduced by Frank Carlin, who referred to some of Mr. MacKenzie's accomplishments in the hockey field, the speaker was thanked by Jack Burrows, a one-time student of his. Frank Kenwood presided.

Two Fine Films Start Saturday At the Monkland

"Nancy Goes to Rio," starring Jane Powell and Ann Sothern on the Monkland screen, is the latest string of tuneful romances produced by Joe Pasternak and stands out as the first bang-up musical hit of 1950.

With the engaging, thrush-throated Jane Powell cast as a young girl who falls in love with love (a situation complicated by the fact that the man she chooses happens to prefer her youthful actress mother), the plot moves and unfolds its dramatic, romantic rapidly between two continents and song-and-dance sequences amid a variety of colorful backgrounds, among them a cruise ship, South American night clubs and backstage Broadway.

In a brief summary of the plot, Nancy (Jane Powell), seventeen-year-old daughter of actress Frances Elliott (Ann Sothern), gets the leading role in a South American playwright's new drama unwittingly snatching the plum from her mother. When she follows her mother to Rio to get the benefit of her coaching, she memorizes the passionate lines of the play aloud in her deck chair, leading her attractive but older fellow passenger, Paul Berten (Barry Sullivan), to believe that she is going to have an illegitimate child. In trying to be sympathetic to Nancy, he leaves her with the inference that he is in love with her. In Rio, Nancy's mother and grandfather (Louis Calhern) attempt to force Paul into a shotgun marriage with Nancy, but with the help of his secretary (Carmen Miranda) the amusing contretemps is straightened out with Paul finding romance with Frances, and with Nancy returning to her own-age sweetheart (Scotty Beckett).

"Nancy Goes to Rio" has a rich musical score, with songs to fit every principal in the cast.

Second Feature

Filmed largely in New York City, with its characters representing a cross-section of the varied types, rich and poor, which make this metropolis one of the most colorful cities in the world, "Side Street," which starts Saturday at the Monkland Theatre, offers a compellingly dramatic story, action-packed, fast-moving and marked by some of the season's most persuasive screen performances.

Told through the eyes of Paul Kelly, cast as a New York homicide squad captain, the story centers on the plight of a work-a-day young couple, Cathy O'Donnell, young expectant mother, and Farley Granger her ill-paid husband who through economic desperation resorts to robbery. When he subsequently tries to return the money it is too late and he finds himself hopelessly caught in a mesh which involves a shady lawyer and his sadistic ex-con pal, a blackmailing adventuress and a down-at-the-heel Greenwich Village night club singer. There is enough action for several pictures in the terror-ridden man-hunt and the excitement-pitched chase through the streets of lower New York in which the police finally catch up with a vicious murderer.

Westmount High Student Awarded Scholarship

Timothy Gilbert Collinge, 52 Academy Road, Westmount, a graduate of Westmount High School, is one of the five winners of a Sir James Dunn scholarship at Bishop's University.

Dr. A. R. Jewitt, principal and vice-chancellor of the university, announced the names of the winners of six of the major scholarships awarded by Bishop's University on Thursday.

Five of the awards were the Sir James Dunn scholarships and the other was the Sir Edward Beatty scholarship.

Bachelor of Science candidates who received Sir James Dunn scholarships were: Timothy Gilbert Collinge, Westmount High School, Margaret Jean Home, Lennoxville High School, Kent Thompson Smith, Sherbrooke High School.

Bachelor of Arts candidates receiving the same award were: Naomi Siddall Smith, Kings Hall School, Compton, and Rodney Sheppard Mills, Three Rivers High School.

These scholarships given by Sir James Dunn, president of Algoma Ore Properties Limited, are of the value of \$550 each, and are awarded to students entering the university with high matriculation standing. They will be receivable for two further years, on condition of a comparable standing being maintained in their university course.

The Sir Edward Beatty scholarship, valued at \$600, was awarded to an arts candidate, Annis Lee Scowen, of 3555 Atwater avenue. Miss Scowen is a graduate of St. Helen's School, Dunham, Que.

This scholarship was established by the Corporation of the University with part of a bequest in Sir Edward Beatty's will. It is open to competition in matriculation examinations and the winner receives \$200 annually for three years on condition he or she maintains a satisfactory standard in undergraduate work.

An eight-year-old boy, James Prince of 761 Greene avenue suffered a possible fracture of the right thigh when he was knocked down by a taxi while attempting to cross St. Antoine street, Monday afternoon.

The child admitted running out between two parked automobiles, leaving the taxi driver, Paul Emile Racicot, no chance to avoid striking him.

Rushed to the Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital, he was treated by Dr. P. Wadman for the possible fracture and a deep cut under the chin.

Westmount City Hall Staff Change Announced

Major staff changes were announced at a meeting of the Westmount City Council held Tuesday night, with Percy E. Jarman, general manager of the City, and Charles W. Houston, secretary-treasurer, presently on leave of absence.

The two senior employees of the City were granted their leave of absence starting September 1, pending their retirement to become effective on January 1, 1951.

Both men complete a long and continuous service to the City. Mr. Jarman joined the staff in May 1908, after spending two years with the City of Outremont. Prior to that he worked at the Dominion Bridge Company, having started

to work there in 1904 after arriving in Canada from England. In November, 1914, after six years in the Engineering Department, he was promoted to City Engineer, and in 1930 was made General Manager.

He is a member of the Corporation of Professional Engineers for the Province of Quebec, and a member of the Engineering Institute of Canada.

J. J. Hughes, assistant general manager, has been named acting general manager by the Westmount City Council. His duties became official on September 1.

Also holding a long service record with the City was Charles

W. Houston. Mr. Houston joined the staff in August, 1911, and in 1913 was promoted to assistant secretary treasurer. In May, 1940, he was made secretary treasurer of the City, and has held that post since then. His retirement, like that of Mr. Hughes, will become effective only on January 1.

Andrew W. D. Swan, assistant secretary treasurer has been appointed acting secretary treasurer while Robert A. Bourdon has been moved up to take Mr. Swan's present position. The former city accountant, Mr. Bourdon's post is being handled by Ronald B. Seaman.

SCHOOLS OPEN AGAIN

—But It's Not Like it Used to Be

How time goes by. Here it's September, and the children are back at school. It used to be fashionable for editorial writers, recalling their own school days when the three R's were taught while the teacher held a rod in one hand, to picture all children as disconsolate at the thought of going back to school. Today, that is not the case. The great majority of school kids don't dislike school. Many are unhappy when illness prevents them from attending. That reflects the great changes that have come about in the methods employed by our educators, and in the type of teacher that now presides in the class-room. There will always be arguments between the old die-hards and the modern school about the relative merits of the old-fashioned and the present-day methods of educating our children. But there's no argument at all on the subject of the popularity of the school among the children. Personally, we think that settles the matter.

COMMONS ATTENDANCE POOR

Only Eleven Percent Present Saturday

Speaking of the children being back at school — how about appointing a truant

officer at Ottawa? A report in a Montreal daily states that attendance in the House of Commons hit an all-time low last Saturday, even though the defence estimates, involving hundreds of millions of the taxpayers' money, and the war in Korea, were under discussion. The report states that at one point during the afternoon session, only thirty-nine members were in their places and for the evening session the attendance at one stage sank to thirty-four. There are 262 members of the House.

Even when such an important member of the government as Hon. Lester B. Pearson, Minister of External Affairs, was speaking last Thursday attendance did not exceed sixty percent. Liberals and Conservatives were the principal offenders.

Apparently the absentees on Saturday weren't in committee, for the report from Ottawa states: "Many members, opposed to the idea of a Saturday sitting, preferred to go, instead, to the gridiron clash between the Ottawa Rough Riders and the Hamilton Tigers."

Under normal conditions the public wouldn't pay much attention to this, but just now with taxes about to go up and Canadian armed forces engaged in Korea, the average elector is liable to become considerably annoyed. With the probability of the present session being short, it is not too much to expect a good attendance in the Commons.

The atomic bomb made complacency an obsolete word.

If a man's socks are of ample size, why should they ever need mending? If a hole appears in one place it stands to reason that holes will soon appear elsewhere. Hence the socks might as well be discarded. I can't recall that anyone ever mended my socks, and yet I buy a dozen pair a year. Former Westm't Resident Dies in North Carolina

Many of his friends in Westmount will learn, with regret, of the death of Mr. Joseph Dean Hathaway at his home in Pinehurst, North Carolina, August 24.

A Memorial Service was held in Pinehurst on August 25 and the final last rites and interment will take place at his birth-place, Assonet, Massachusetts. Owing to the absence on vacation of his many intimate friends in Pinehurst, the date for interment has not yet been set. It is hoped, however, that sufficient advance notice will be received to enable friends from Montreal and Westmount to attend.

Mr. Hathaway was a resident of Westmount for some thirty years until his retirement as a Vice-President and Director of the Northern Electric Company in 1938. He was an industrialist of outstanding ability. In 1916 he was appointed Vice-President and General Manager of the British Munitions Company, Limited, King's Park, Verdun. This plant was designed for the loading of time fuzes under control of the Imperial Munitions Board. In June 1918 he was appointed President of the British Munitions Company and on January 28, 1920, Vice-President and Director of the Northern Electric Company, Limited. Mrs. Hathaway predeceased him in 1945.

PERSONALITIES IN SOCIAL REFORM By G. Bromley Oxnam
 For this significant study of great ideas and their social implications Bishop Oxnam has selected six heroic thinkers — and their pioneering work for a just social order.
 He writes of a scholar and his wife, a minister, an administrator, a "Saint", and a missionary — leaders to whom the word of today owes a large measure of gratitude. Their ruling convictions, their work and its consequences, the spirit and ardor which inspired them, are analysed keenly and objectively — bringing to many a new insight into the reform movements which have made our age a better one in which to live.

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Bishop Oxnam lets each of these six persons speak for himself — through his speeches, his autobiography, or other writings. Each one's central thesis is then interpreted in the light of its meaning and its value to the peoples of the world. **PERSONALITIES IN SOCIAL REFORM** is a highly meaningful book for today — a vivid personal account of the efforts of these pioneers.

In his FOREWORD the author wrote in part: "We have been catapulted into an era of change. It is not a question of change or continuity. It is a question of the nature of change. Is it to be the change of consent, or the change of coercion? Consent involves

democracy. Coercion implies dictatorship.

"In democracy, the free person, in co-operation with others who are free, reaches agreement concerning practices that give evidence of enriching personality. The role of personality is discounted by economic determinists. I think that men can lay hold upon scientific means to achieve moral ends. They would rebase and remotivate society to the end that God's will is done on earth as it is in Heaven. There is the reform that regenerates."

Following are the reformers selected: 1. The scholars Sidney and Beatrice Webb. 2. Walter Rauschenbusch the Minister. 3. The Administrator David E. Lillenthal. 4. Mohandas K. Gandhi the "Saint." 5. Albert Schweitzer the Missionary.

The Webbs labored tirelessly — in research, in writing in active work — to reform England's poor laws.

In 1907 Christianity and the social crisis stirred the thoughts of many. Its author was a young Baptist minister who believed firmly that the Kingdom of God could come on earth and set about proclaiming it vigorously in addresses and able books which were widely read.

David E. Lillenthal summed up his purpose as follows: "If the peoples of the world can be brought to see in actual demonstration that only by common labor can they exploit this new, vast knowledge for their own advantage, the hope for real peace can be brighter than it has ever been in history."

Gandhi, by living his principles of love and non-violence challenged the world and died a martyr—but

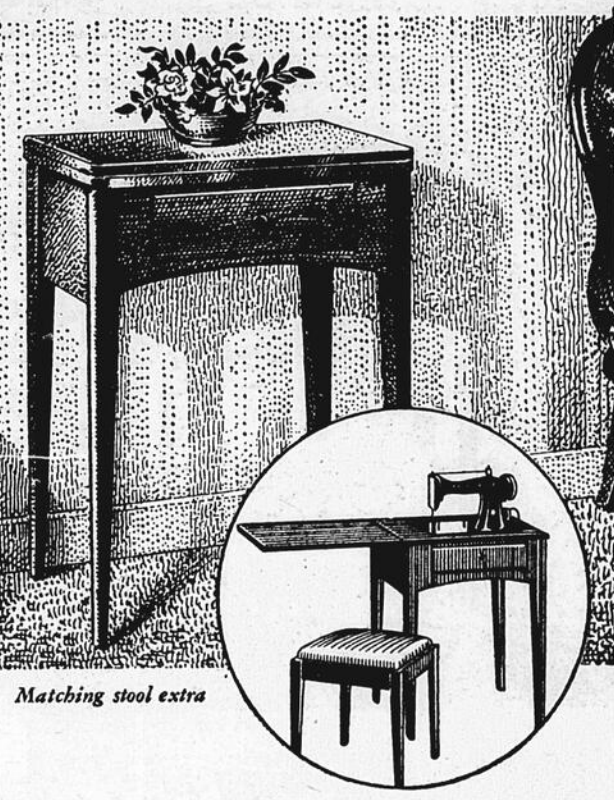
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
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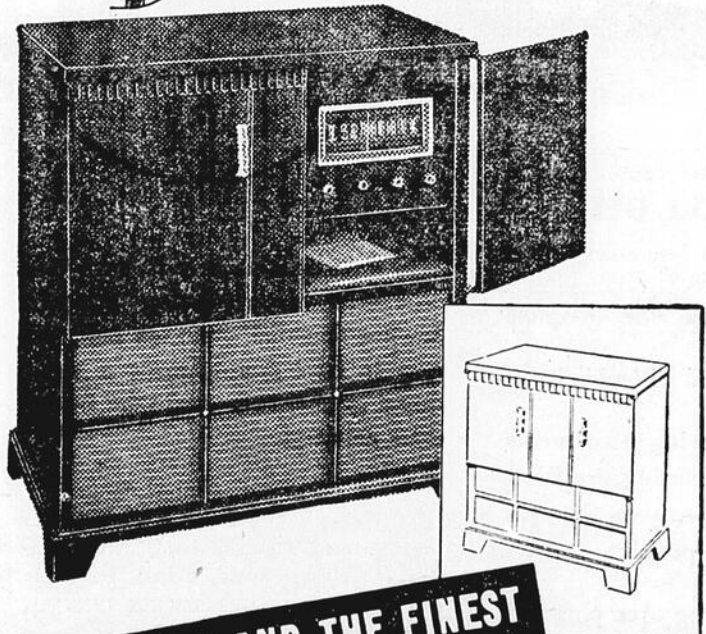

Make it Yourself

by PAULINE ROY

With autumn only a few weeks away and the fall school term about to commence 'tis time for us to give a thought to back-to-school wardrobes. School-age girls and boys from kindergarten to college are preparing for a new school year and, naturally must be outfitted for many different occasions.

Hand-knit sweaters, always popular, lead the field again this fall with a special accent on the tartan trend. You can make many attractive and original articles by knitting, and there's the economical side of it, too. No matter how thrifty or ingenious a homemaker is, there comes a point at which the budget balks and refuses to stretch another penny's worth. That's one reason why mothers all over Canada are knitting two, purling two, trying to keep the budget balanced and the whole family in sartorial splendor.

Whether you are a beginner or an experienced knitter there are one or two points of which you should make special note. One of these is tension. Before starting any knitted item be sure that you understand the stitch tension which appears at the beginning of the instructions for knitting. Tension is the number of stitches per inch you knit with a certain size needle and a specific yarn. To measure your stitch tension cast on 20 stitches and work 20 rows in stocking stitch. Now compare the number of stitches per inch in the piece you have knitted with the tension given in the instructions. If your tension is too loose try a size smaller needle. If it is too tight try a size larger needle. This simple test takes only fifteen minutes of your time before you start your knitted article, and may save you fifteen hours of your precious time should you discover half way through the garment that your tension is making the garment much larger, or smaller in size.

The diamond cardigans pictured here are particularly useful because they can be worn with so many different color combinations. The girl's cardigan in our picture is predominantly green and is coupled with a green skirt. At the same time, our model wears a

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
