

## Historic Pictures of H.R.H. the Duchess of Connaught Taken at Coronation Solemnity and on Canadian Soil



HER ROYAL HIGHNESS, THE DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT, consort of the Governor-General of Canada, whose serious illness in London has called forth a widespread expression of heartfelt sympathy from the Canadian people, with whom Her Royal Highness has been living for the past twenty months. During her sojourn in Canada Her Royal Highness passed through two critical illnesses, on each of which occasions she was a patient in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal. On her return to England a few weeks ago she underwent a surgical operation which, at the time, was considered successful. Unfortunately, a relapse occurred, and a second operation became a necessity. From the effects of this Her Royal Highness has not yet recovered. For some days her condition was so grave as to cause intense anxiety to the members of her family. In the above picture Her Royal Highness is gowned in the magnificent robes she wore at the Coronation Solemnity of Their Majesties the King and Queen.



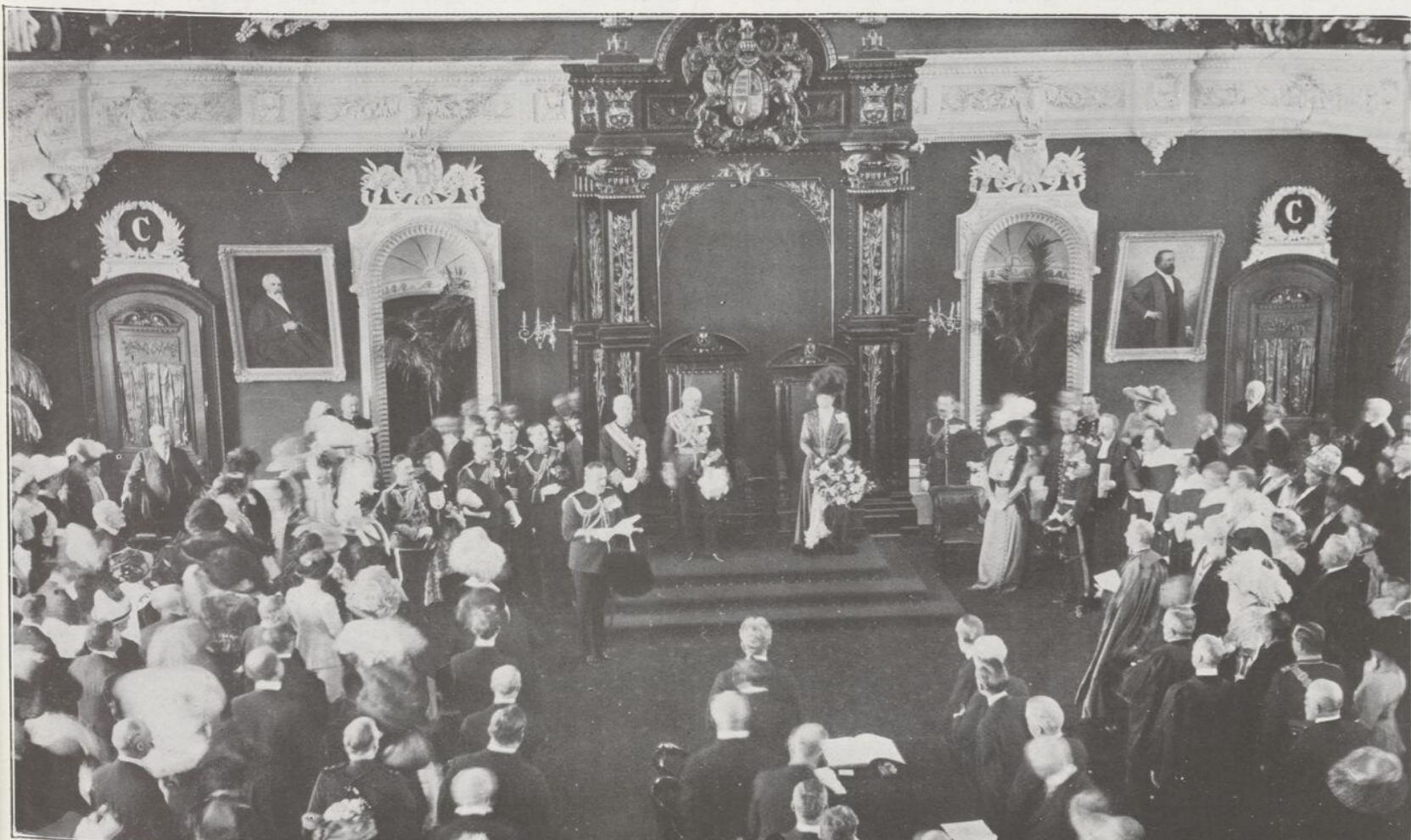

# First Picture of a British Sovereign and a Canadian Governor-General Riding Side by Side on English Soil



**THE CASE WHICH HELD THE ORGAN ON WHICH THE GREAT PURCELL PLAYED**—The latest antiquarian sensation in London is the discovery of a beautiful old organ-front which two hundred years ago stood in Westminster Abbey. Its claim to such great fame seems well substantiated by the pedigree held by the present owners, Messrs. Hindley, of Welbeck street. It is of further interest to antiquaries inasmuch as it encased the organ on which Purcell and many other famous organists played. The rich carvings with which it is embellished lead its owners to believe that they were probably the work of the great English master carver, Grinling Gibbons, to whose rare skill many London churches owe their finest interior decorations.

**AN HISTORIC PICTURE OF INTEREST TO CANADIANS**—On the occasion of the recent royal review at Woolwich an opportunity was given The Standard's photographer in England to take what may safely be termed an unprecedented picture. ## THE LATE FOUNDER OF GRACE DART HOME.

**THE RECENT DEATH** of Mr. Henry J. Dart, founder of the Grace Dart Home, removed a striking personality from business and philanthropic circles in this city. Mr. Dart had been ill since February, and was suffering from cancer. The late Mr. Dart was president of the wholesale drug firm of Chapman Dart & Co., 155 Craig street west, and the founder of the Grace Dart Home. It is doubtful if any man in Montreal took a more active part in charitable work of practically every kind, than he did. He was bound up heart and soul in the Grace Dart Home, the work of which has been carried on mainly through his efforts and has grown from an institution which was at first only capable of caring for two or three patients until it is now

regarded as one of the leading institutions of its kind in the city. The Home was dedicated to the memory of Grace Dart, his second

daughter, by his first wife. It was while this daughter was still a young woman that Mr. Dart decided to enter into this branch of work, and opened a portion of his own home for the treatment of tuberculosis patients. While it was only possible to treat two or three patients in the Home as it was then known, the work

gradually grew, and Mr. Dart's three daughters by his first wife, did most of the work connected with the institution. Each of these in turn fell a victim to and died of tuberculosis. Even after the loss of his whole family, which his friends state was due to overwork and exposure in the work undertaken by them, Mr. Dart still continued, and some ten years ago moved the institution from the east end to its present home near Richmond Square. While of late years it became impossible for him to finance the institution completely on his own accord he interested friends in the project, with the result that the present Grace Dart Home is now in a flourishing condition, and capable of accommodating quite a number of patients, who are unable to procure accommodation at any of the local hospitals, the Home being reserved for those who are refused admittance to other hospitals.

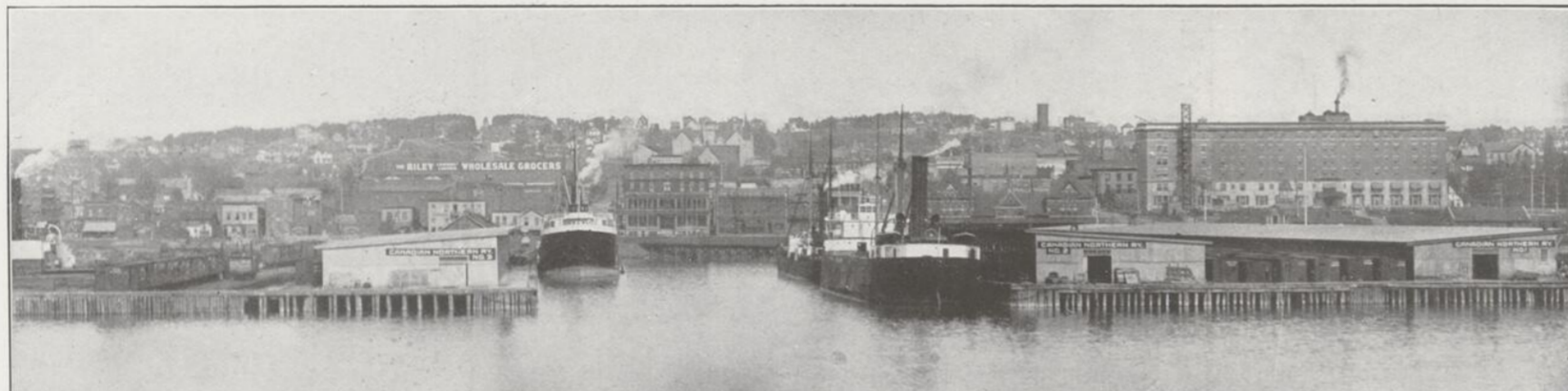
It is a notable feature of the life of Mr. Dart that while he was so constantly assisting the afflicted, but very little of his work was made public. Mr. Dart was born on the Isle of Jersey, on November 27th, 1847, and came to this country when still a very young man, being accompanied hither by his brother, the Rev. Rural Dean Dart, at present located in St. Lambert, and a sister who resides with her brother at St. Lambert, these being the only three members of the family.

On his arrival in Montreal it was his intention to study for the ministry, but after working a short time in the employ of Messrs. Cross & Bancroft, he became an employee of the Kenneth Campbell Company, and was for years general manager of that concern, which was formerly located where the new Dominion Express Building now stands on St. James street. Some twenty years ago he entered business for himself in a firm known as the Henry J. Dart Company, and which was later changed

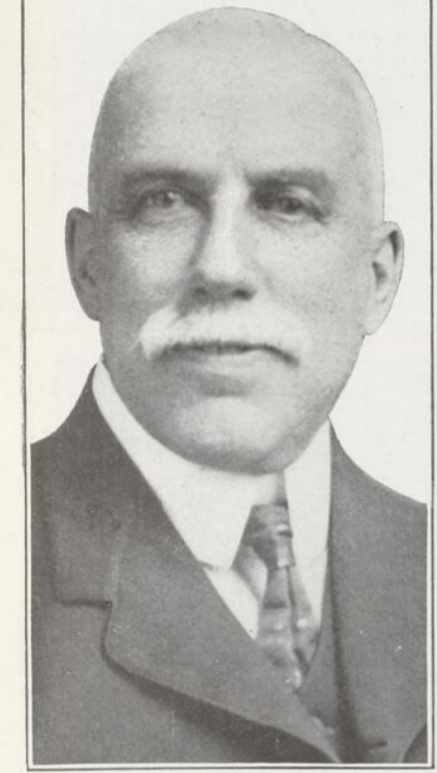

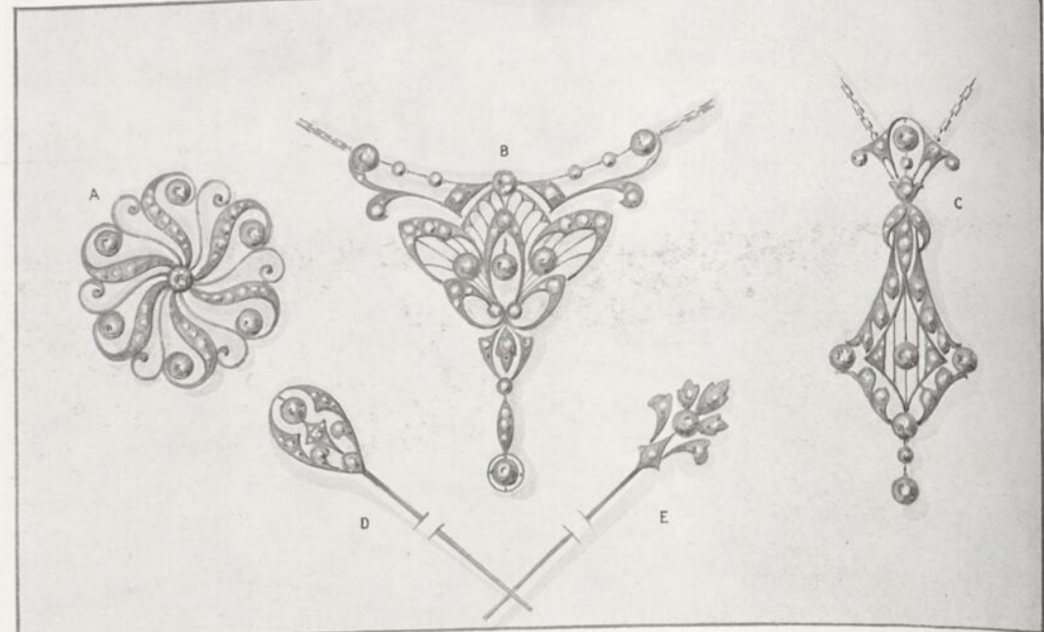

Dominion for his skill in art photography.

Mr. Notman was the eldest son of the late William Notman, who died in 1891 and who was the founder of the firm of William Notman & Son. The son received his education under the late Rev. Edmund Wood at St. John's school and entered his father's photography business in 1876. He became partner with his father in 1880 and since the latter's death had been the senior member of the firm.

Mr. Notman in 1884 made a trip from the Atlantic to the Pacific taking important photographs along the route in the interests of the Canadian Pacific Railroad. This was before the railroad was completed. Since then Mr. Notman has made six more trips from coast to coast, securing many valuable photographs, especially of scenery in the Rockies.

In 1901 Mr. Notman accompanied Their Majesties the King and Queen (then T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York) on their tour of Canada, having been appointed official photographer to the royal party.

About five years ago Mr. Notman made an extended tour of Newfoundland, obtaining many interesting photographs of people and places on the island.

Mr. Notman was a public-spirited citizen and took a keen interest in all movements for the public good.

He held the sincere respect of a large circle of friends and his death at a comparatively early age came as a distinct shock. Great sympathy will be extended to the bereaved family.

Besides his wife, formerly Miss Alice M. Claxton, Mr. Notman leaves three sons, William R., Wilfred M. and Keith C. Notman. He is survived by two brothers, Messrs. C. F. and G. R. W. Notman, of Montreal and two sisters, Mrs. H. M. Becher and Miss Notman, of Winnipeg.

Mr. Notman was a member of the Church of England in Canada and attended Christ Church Cathedral.
