The annual Easter flower show at the Westmount Conservatory this year features a larger display of tulips than ever before.

The show, which attracts thousands of visitors was officially opened yesterday at 8 p.m. The City Council and representatives of municipal organizations were in attendance. The conservatories are open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Week-days, and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

George Cooper, general manager, estimated that there are about 15,-

City Plans R.M.R. Scroll

The City of Westmount will present a scroll to the Royal Montreal Regiment (MG) on the occasion of the latter's 40th anniversary in November 1954.

At a recent meeting of the Municipal Council it was decided that this scroll, which will give the Regiment the "title, privilege, honor and distinction of marching through the streets of the City of Westmount on all ceremonial occasions with bayonets fixed, colors flying and bands playing" will be presented between November 11 and 14.

The Regiment will mark the occasion with a reunion, as well as a special service on Sunday, November 14, in honor of those who paid the supreme sacrifice.

The RMR, which has served in Westmount for the past 40 years, was first known as The Westmount Rifles. The City said that there has grown a mutual esteem between the citizens of Westmount and the Regiment.

Men from the Royal Montreal Regiment have formed active service battalions which saw service in two world wars.

Hobby Show Detail Set

Hon. D. C. Abbott, local Member of Parliament, will officially close the Westmount YMCA Hobby Show Saturday, April 24. It will mark the 12th time Canada's Finance Minister has brought down the curtain in the 18 Hobby Shows that have been held.

This year's show will be opened Wednesday by Mayor Roy L. Campbell.

Alan Ross, chairman of the entry committee, announced that this Saturday will be the last day for submitting entries. The Hobby Show office, located on the second floor of the Westmount YMCA, will be open from 10-12 a.m. and 2-5 p.m.

The entries themselves must be brought to the office by Monday, and the show will be open to the public from Wednesday evening to Saturday evening.

Exhibits will be on view from 3-5:30 p.m. and 7:30-10 p.m.

Mr. Abbott, in a letter to YMCA officials, expressed his willingness to participate in this year's show and wished them the best of luck. He will present all prizes, including the D. C. Abbott Cup, awarded annually to the best exhibit in the Hobby Show.

He said that he would arrive sometime earlier, in order to see the show itself.

The program is as follows:

Saturday, April 17: Last day to deliver entry forms to Westmount Y.M.C.A. from 10-12 a.m.

Monday, April 19: All exhibits except pets and cooking to be delivered to the Westmount Y. Late entries 20 cents each.

Tuesday, April 20: Cooking entries to be delivered between 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

Canon Oliver's address was entitled "In Praise Of Fools". The address was actually in two parts, one dealt with the month of April, and the second part with fools, or, so called fools.

In speaking of the month of April the Canon pointed out that it is a very important month marked throughout its 30 days by some very significant events, and dates.

The month starts off, the Canon said, as we all know with April

first, or better known as "All Fools Day". He then gave the dictionary definition of a "fool". It was his opinion that we should not dwell too long on All Fool's Day, however he pointed out that it does give us strange humans the diversion in our lives which we apparently seek.

April also marks St. George's Day, the anniversary of the battle of Vimy Ridge, the second battle of Ypres, and the famous naval engagement of the first World War fought at Zeebrugge.

000 plants on display. Although there are many different varieties of plants, the majority are tulips.

The tulips, of which there are 50 different varieties, were imported from Holland last fall for the show. The plants were kept outside in cold frames during the winter, and brought inside in March. The cold weather has no ill effects on the tulips.

Of the 50 varieties of tulips in the show Mr. Cooper stated that the more popular one would be, Darwin, Triumph, Parrot, Single and Double Late, Mendel and Breeder plants.

Besides the tulips in the show there are also 12 varieties of daffodils. Also included are dozens of varieties of other plants, such as Hyacinths, Astible, Narcissus, Polyantha Roses, Rhododendrons and Forsythia.

Mr. Cooper said that a great many of the plants are imported from China and Arabia, while on the other hand some of the more popular varieties are grown from seed at the conservatory.

Current Events Club Argues Bombs, Taxes

The Quebec personal income tax and American hydrogen bomb tests were the main topics debated upon Tuesday at a meeting of the Westmount High School Current Events club.

It was explained to the students that both the federal and the provincial governments have the right to levy direct taxes on the populace, but to avoid double taxation the other provinces refrain from taxing the income of the people, and instead receive a grant from the federal government.

However, Quebec refused this federal grant, preferring to raise the money independently by levying an income tax that amounts to about 15 per cent of the amount that goes to Ottawa.

The curious fact about this is that the amount of money that would be raised from the provincial income tax is not as much as the amount of the federal grant.

The opinion was offered that the existence of this situation is perhaps due to the sensibility of French Canadians concerning their rights, and the provincial government might fear that in accepting the federal grant it will be losing some of the rights granted at Confederation.

Whatever the cause, the club came to the unanimous decision that this provincial tax, because it applies to a special income bracket only, and that 90 per cent

of the people who must pay the tax reside in Montreal and will receive only a minor portion from the tax revenue, is unfair to and disliked by those who must pay it.

It was also concluded that the head of the Quebec government should have tried to come to a previous agreement with the federal government about the amount of the tax that would be deductible from the federal income tax; but that a possible remedy of the situation would be an understanding with the federal government now.

The continuance of the hydrogen bomb tests in the Pacific was also a topic of discussion among the students, and most of them agreed that the United States cannot afford to stop these tests because of the danger of Russian superiority and aggressive power.

The club members were notified that the next meeting, to be held after the Easter holidays, would concern the election of new officers for next year and would probably be the last this year.

Final Tribute Paid Monday To J. L. Sabbath

Final tribute was paid Monday to J. L. Sabbath, 4375 Oxford avenue, prominent Montreal philanthropist and businessman, who died Friday at the western division of the Montreal General Hospital. He was 72.

Born in Australia, he came to Canada at the age of six and attended public and technical schools in Montreal. He established the J. L. Sabbath Wholesale Jewelry Company in 1906.

After retirement a few years ago, Mr. Sabbath travelled extensively in Europe and Israel and furthered education by granting personal scholarships.

He was patron of the Hillel Foundation, governor of the Jewish General Hospital, the Hospital of Hope, the YM-YWHA, and the Hebrew Free Loan Association. He was a life member of the Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue, member of the Board of Trade, Montefiore Club, B'nai B'rith, Masonic Order, Ionic Lodge No. 54, and Mount Horeb Chapter No. 6.

His wife, the former Rose Kert, and a son David predeceased him. He is survived by three sons, Dr. Joseph Sabbath, Bernard and Lawrence; and two daughters, Mrs. Sam (Beatrice) Hock and Phyllis.

Service was from the Chapel of Paperman and Sons, with burial in Shaar Hashomayim Cemetery.

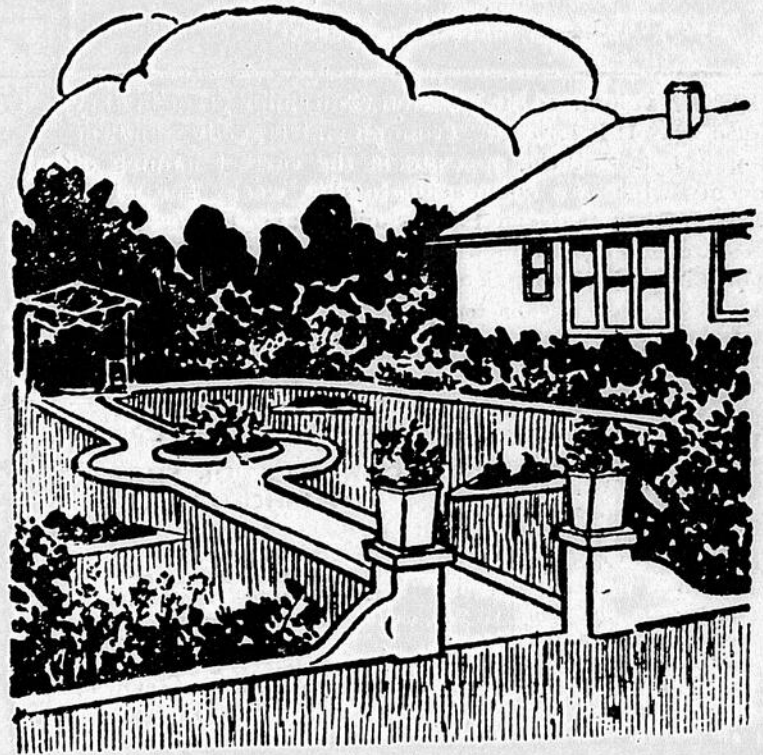

Significance of Easter

A Time of Upsurging Hope in the Minds of All Christians

There is probably no other holiday, or holy day, not excepting Christmas, which causes such an upsurging of hope in the thoughts and minds of those who call themselves Christians. All the hopes of that Season on "time" had been built on the coming of a Saviour who had, in the course of a short lifetime, suffered injury and insult and eventual death. But, in spite of all this, he had promised his resurrection and it had happened — and all the promise which began with the birth of a Christ Child was fulfilled.

This holy time has been called Easter

and is observed on the first Sunday following the paschal full moon, and this word "paschal" links up the old with the new testament in that it is derived from the Chaldee word Pascha, the equivalent of the Hebrew word Pesach. That name recalls the act of the Destroying Angel in passing over "the households of the Hebrews when he smote the Egyptians. So that this Easter festival commemorates the resurrection of Jesus Christ and the Hebrew celebration of the original "Passover".

That it falls in the spring of the year, makes Easter fundamentally a season of hope. All the trivial bits of ceremony which we have come to associate with Easter have, in their way, a significance. The baby animals, the first spring flowers, the candy easter eggs, even the Easter finery, are marks of a new and happier season. The winter snow and ice is going; new life is breaking through the cold earth on every side; the lambs are out on all the hills and gardens and buds are straining to burst their bonds.

Easter is a happy and a hopeful time, never more welcome than today with its promise and its fulfilment of an even older promise of life everlasting.

Tragedy and Triumph

(Rector of Trinity Memorial Church)

The last volume of Sir Winston Churchill's great history of World War II is entitled "Triumph and Tragedy," and the naming is apt. But the opposite is the correct naming of the events which we commemorate this week. The whole series of events between Palm Sunday and Easter is the greatest reversal of plans and hopes and expectations that the world has ever seen; also truest reckoning of real values.

We read in the story of the Temptation that when those three temptations were over the devil departed from Him for a season. But there were other times in His Ministry when Jesus must have been tempted. His mind was set on the Kingdom of God; and when they would have taken Him by force to make Him King after the Feeding in the Wilderness; and especially when He was brought in triumph into the Holy City, there certainly was a temptation to grasp the opportunity. But He knew that His Kingdom was not of this world; He knew that to accept an earthly kingdom would keep the minds of His disciples constantly set on things of this world; He knew that the way of suffering was the only way in which He could draw all men unto Himself.

So Jesus rejected the apparent triumph of Palm Sunday and proceeded to put things — earthly things — in their proper perspective. In doing it He sifted the people and the rulers. He forced them to take sides for or against Him; and the vast majority turned against Him. The apparent triumph apparently turned to de-

feat; and the natural result of the clash of unarmed holiness with forceful worldliness was the Cross.

feat. But in this case God had decreed otherwise. He had openly intervened in the world's history. Sin and righteousness, selfishness and unselfishness had clashed openly and God would not allow the end of the story to be even an apparent defeat. He had recognized Jesus of Nazareth as His Son at His Baptism. Now that same Jesus was again declared "the Son of God with power, ac-

ording to the spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead." The apparent victory truly faced had passed through apparent defeat into — not only the true victory, but the true victory justifying the righteousness of God who cannot ultimately allow unrighteousness to triumph.

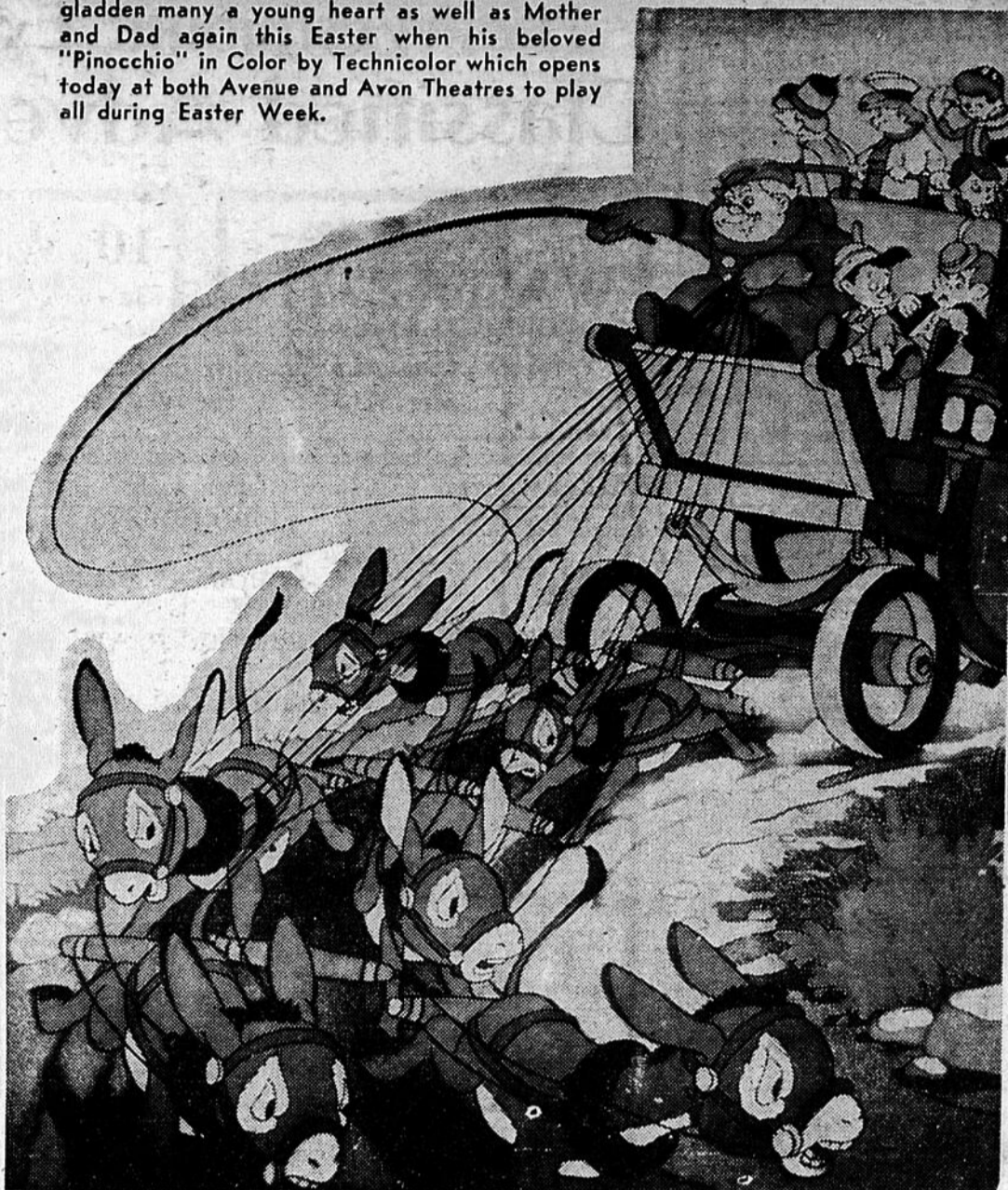

Fifth MRT Play This Season At Westhill

MRT's May production will be directed by Guy Beaulne, a French Canadian who has studied at the Conservatoire in Paris, and who has been active in Canadian theatre for many years.

Glenn Ford As Dick In "Big Heat"

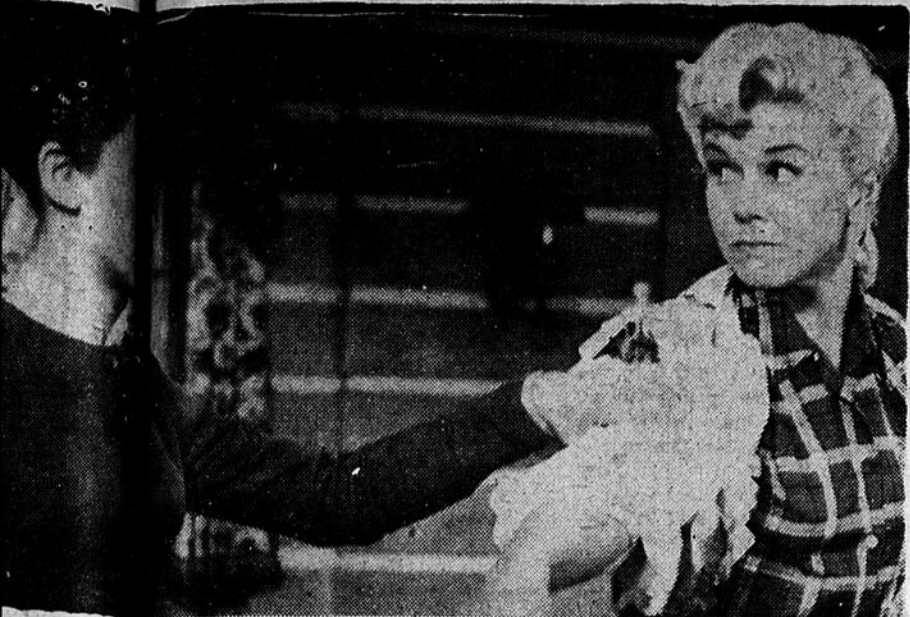
With Gloria Grahame At The Westmount

Women's Voluntary Services Annual Appeal April 6 To 17

The Women's Voluntary Services, Services Volontaires Feminins, Inc., is holding its annual campaign for funds from April 6 to April 17, when the people of Montreal will be asked to contribute \$10,000, the minimum amount necessary to carry on the work of this organization.

M. V. S. takes part in practically every phase of voluntary work in Montreal. Hospital Visiting Committees arrange parties and visits to patients in veterans hospitals and in many helpful ways bring pleasure and entertainment to sick and crippled veterans while the Flower Committee collect and distribute cut flowers to the wards. A Visiting Committee also calls on invalids in their homes in various parts of the city. Drivers are provided for blind people and crippled children. Workers are placed in hospitals, schools and individual jobs. Extending far across the world, W. V. S. collects and ships toys, blankets and clothing to sick and orphaned children in Korea and Greece.

One of the most important func-

tions of the W.V.S. is to provide a clearing house for voluntary workers and to fill the requests for workers in hospitals and organizations. In the past year, voluntary workers from thirty-three groups affiliated with W.V.S. were placed in nine hospitals and thirty-two agencies; in all, five hundred and three placements were made.

The importance of voluntary work cannot be over-estimated and the purpose of Women's Voluntary Services is to further and facilitate the operation of this work. We are confident that our appeal for support will meet with a generous response by the people of Montreal.

So to quadruple its capacity and provide a modern Eventide Home for women as well as men, the Salvation Army will embark on a million dollar campaign from May 3 to 17.

Led by Edgar F. Tolhurst, Campaign Chairman, a large group of women workers, headed by Mrs. Sydney A. MacSween, visited the Home this week to visualize the changes that must be made and make a neighborly call on the "senior citizens." They include two nonagenarians in "Josh" Hume, who is a sprightly 92; and Harry Saunders, just a year younger, who eagerly showed the visitors some finer points of the game of checkers.

The other rooms, however, were considered cramped in contrast. The smoking room and the recreation room, for example, are too small even now to provide elbow room for any large number of "guests".

Bonus Rule Distributes Talent, But Players Are Still Penalized

New York — Once again this year 11 youngsters are penalized by baseball's bonus rule.

Lifted for a spell, the regulation was restored last year after the Red Sox spent \$500,000 outbidding all other clubs for seven of the brightest prospects in sight.

The measure calls for any free agent paid more than \$4000, including the first year's salary, to be carried by the parent organization for two years.

So, you see, the kid sits there twiddling his thumbs when he should be in a D or C league learning the tricks of the trade. He may get to run for somebody occasionally, or if he's a pitcher, to pitch a few innings in lost causes. The only place he isn't hit is in the pocketbook.

This year's excess baggage comprises:

Tigers: Pitcher Bob Miller, Infielder Reno Bertoia and Outfielder Al Kaline.

Braves: Pitcher, Joey Jay and Mel Roach (occupation unknown).

Yankees: First Baseman Frank Leja.

Phillies: Pitcher Tommy Qualters.

Pirates: Catcher Vic Janowicz.

Cardinals: Infielder Dick Schofield.

Red Sox: Third Baseman Billy

Consolo.
Giants: Third Baseman Joe Amalfitano.

Fortunately for the clubs and the managers, the national defense list somewhat negates the bonus handicap.

An athlete returning from the service doesn't count for a year, so isn't included in the official party when the player limit becomes 25 one month after the season opens, which this trip will be May 13. Thus the Giants are further benefited by the return of Willie Mays, the Dodgers by the presence of Don Newcombe and the Braves by the fresh start of young Chet Nichols, to name stars who come to mind offhand.

Baseball legislation against bonuses of any kind would end the foolishness, but the lawyers say this would be restraint of trade, violation of the right of contract or something. So to save the clubs from themselves, the bonus regulation was restored.

Instead of making a fuzzy-cheeked youth rich at the risk of ruining him before he as much as catches a baseball in the organized game, a much wiser system would be to distribute bonuses on a merit basis — say \$1000 every time he steps up a class and \$2500 when he reaches the majors.

Dodgers Hope Zimmer Follows Furillo - Won Batting Title Despite Beanings

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Don Zimmer was truck on the head by a pitched ball in the Columbus twilight last July 7, and carried away believed dead.

The brilliant young short-stop underwent two operations for the removal of pressure on the brain.

It was feared he might never play again, but he joined the Dodgers late in the season, worked with them before and during the World Series.

Zimmer, 23 and with four-and-a-half years in the minors, is rated one of the brightest prospects ever developed in the Brooklyn organization.

With Zimmer in the chain, the Brooks have peddled two short-stops, the remarkable Chico Carasquel to the White Sox and Bill Hunter, a year ago to the Browns, the latter for \$100,000.

It is significant that the Flatbush brass retained Zimmer, heir apparent to Pee Wee Reese.

Bean balls have ruined ball players, but many of those who have been struck on the noggin by a high hard one, and dropped as though hit by a bat, bounced back like a prize fighter with springs in his trunks.

Brooklyn hopes Zimmer emulates Carl Furillo. The Arm led National League batters after being skulled several times, so often that he took to charging opposing pitchers and managers.

More recently in the Colombia Winter League, Joe Lonnett, a

promising Phillies' catching prospect last season with Baltimore, was hit on the head by a Brooklyn farm swifty, Ed Jezek. The first report was that Lonnett wasn't expected to live, but he caught the next week-end.

While with Jersey City, Henry Thompson of the Giants was draped as though shot, rushed to a hospital, where the surgeon found he had more head armor than anybody he had ever treated. Hankus Pankus again demonstrated this at the Polo Grounds last summer when felled like a guy hit squarely on the old potato by Rocky Marciano. A drink of water and he was on first base.

Frank Chance frequently froze and seemed to have a blind spot on dusters, was whacked on the cruller 20 or more times, yet remained hard to get out with the Cubs for 13 years.

Chick Fewster wound up with a silver plate in his skull as the result of being hit by Jeff Pfeffer in an exhibition in Jacksonville in the spring of 1920, and put out for the campaign. The Yankee infielder again faced the large Brooklyn right-hander in the first exhibition of the next spring, and tripled. He played for a half-dozen more years.

Don Thompson of the Dodgers had his skull fractured in Montreal in mid-season, yet batted .346 the last two or three weeks.

Being beaned didn't handicap Billy Jurges at the plate, but it
