Kenneth Foster, 32, of Barry's Bay, received 2 large slugs in the abdomen last Wednesday afternoon in an unfortunate accident while rabbit hunting near Bristol. He was with his brother, Joe, 28, from whose 12 gauge shotgun the shots were fired. According to the Provincial Police who investigated, the two men were hiding and watching for rabbits. Joe got his sites on a rabbit which was running towards where Ken was hiding. Joe whistled a warning and Ken whistled back. Joe took the return whistle to mean all was clear whereas Kenneth did not recognize his brother's whistle as a warning. Thus, with signals misinterpreted all around, Joe fired and Ken received the shots in the abdomen.

The brothers were taken to Pontiac Community Hospital by Clarence Roy where Dr. S. E. McDowell attended the wounded man. The slugs had apparently ricocheted off a stone or tree into Fosters bowel which was cut in six places. He appeared to be in very serious condition upon admission to hospital but is doing well now.

At Rotary

So-Cred Leader

Appalled by the separatist attitude that thinking Canadians take towards "politics", National Leader of the Social Credit Party of Canada Robert N. Thompson told Shawville Rotary Monday night that if "politics" was to rise above its present level good men must take part in it with conviction.

Thompson, who has also been a farmer, teacher, law student, soldier and chiropractor, gave the first political speech to be heard

in Shawville this season to a group of Rotarians and their guests during their regular weekly meeting at Pontiac House.

As a devoted worker in the field of education, Mr. Thompson was a pioneer in Ethiopia where he organized an Air Force Training School and was principal of a Secondary School there and later served as Director of Provincial Education. He was sent on numerous special assignments to India, Pakistan, the Middle East, Europe and various African countries and is also credited with humanitarian efforts with the tribal people of the east African area and a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society.

However, it was about Social Credit that he came prepared to speak to Rotary Monday night.

He called for active participation in politics, not just passive criticism. He described the 27 years of Social Credit success in Alberta and the three in B.C.

Poverty in the midst of plenty, said Mr. Thompson, is not acceptable, and this concept formed the basis for the establishment of Social Credit which is not to be confused with Socialism, its exact opposite.

Mr. Thompson said he felt that government administration can never be as efficient as private administration and gave as an example the National Capital Commission going into the landscape gardening business rather than putting out the jobs on tender.

Without going into details, Thompson said the Social Creditists would like to see the Bank

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Portage du Fort: Up The Ottawa

Portage du Fort has now entered the 100th year of its age as an incorporated Village Municipality. By proclamation of the Government of the United Canadas in 1862 this incorporation came into force January 1, 1863.

The "Incorporated Village" comprised what had been the southern part of Range 1 in the Township of Litchfield. This area had already (1844) been surveyed into lots for the village whose beginnings were in the 1830's. Original titleholder to land in what is now the Village of Portage du Fort was Louis Elisha Bentley who received such Crown Patent on condition that he supply timber for governmental Public Works in the area. With his

wife Sarah Carey he eventually built his homestead on part of Lot 29 at the place called Bentley's Landing.

At the time of its incorporation the Village of Portage du Fort had a resident population in excess of 800 and a transient population as numerous. There were four churches: Anglican, Catholic, Methodist, and Presbyterian, with resident clergymen. For accommodation of the public ten hotels and as many boarding houses were available.

Its postal address was "Portage du Fort: Up The Ottawa" and it was a hive of industry with its grist-mill, woolen-mill, foundry, saw-mills, tanneries, quarries, factories, handicraft-shops, mercantile emporiums, professional

offices, and tradesmen ranging from agents to wheelwrights.

Here from 1855 to 1865 was published our district's first newspaper: The Pontiac Pioneer. Its editor, George Edward White, also won fame as supervisor of construction of Pontiac's first macadamized highway in 1857-58 from the wharf at Portage du Fort to the wharf at Havelock (Bryson), a distance of eight miles. It was ballasted in white rock to a width of thirty feet and was officially designated "Le Portage des Chats". Its total cost was less than \$25,000.00.

Anyone having or knowing where to see a copy of that historic newspaper is requested to inform this writer. There is a receipt in our county files, dated September 12, 1865, and signed by G. E. White. It reads: "Twelve Dollars payment in full due Pontiac Pioneer for the year 1864".

When the County of Pontiac was incorporated July 1, 1855, Patrick Foley Fox was mayor of Litchfield and a resident of this village. His 3-story stone residence on Mill Street is built for the ages. He was Pontiac's first Warden.

First Mayor of the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Portage du Fort and during the first decade of its existence was William O'Meara.

Before construction at this site of the Chenux hydro-electric power plant and dams the harbor at this village was at the foot of ten miles of chutes and rapids through which the Ottawa River plunged from the level of Coulonge Lake historic for its Fort built and occupied from 1680 to 1720 by the military engineer D'Ailleboust Sier de Coulonge. That unnavigable stretch of river was, from that time, known as Le Portage du Fort".

Now the hydro-electric plant and dams have flooded all those chutes and hushed their thunder in a silent upstream lake. This was the dramatic event which inspired.

Pontiac County's first Seat of Government ("Chef-Lieu") was in the village of Portage du Fort from July 1, 1855 until December 12, 1860, when County Council convened "on Lot 13, Range 1 of the Township of Litchfield at the village of Havelock (later to be incorporated as the Village of Bryson). The Village of Bryson remained Chef-Lieu until May 1916 although the County Building was destroyed in the fire that gutted this village in April 1914. County Council convened in Court House building, a beautiful Norman-French structure of gray stone with white trim.

On the 8th of September 1915 at a regular quarterly session of County Council convened in Court House at Bryson there was passed a Resolution "to defray the costs of a Private Bill through Quebec Legislature to change the Chef-Lieu of this county from Bryson to Campbell's Bay". This was the result of a resolution passed at the quarterly session of March 12, 1913, calling for such change. The final resolution carried by 15 to 5 votes; the first resolution carried by 12 to 6. Chief argument for the change was Bryson's lack of railway facilities. For that resolution were Councillors O'Reilly, Robinson, Davis, Hickey, Dagg, Dunn, Kennedy, Parker, Butler, Ward, Lebrun and Belec. (March 12, 1913). Against that resolution were Councillors Rimer, C. McNally, Barr, Coyne, Young and Beeman.

Pursuant to passage of said Private Bill the Special Session of County Council convened May 16, 1916. "in council hall in the village of Campbell's Bay". There sessions continued to be held until that hall was condemned and demolished.

Finally our County Councillors are again convening in a Provincial Courthouse building where expanding Provincial Departments are pushing them from pillar to post and (not-so) Civil Servants of our Provincial Government are relegating precious records of our Municipal Government to verminous dungeons.
