## Membership up in WMA

Membership in the Westmount Municipal Association has reached the 2,000 level, president J. H. Richer declared recently. This is an increase of 75 from this time last year.

We gladly welcome new members," Mr. Richer said. "This is the way for people to exercise their rights as citizens."

Mr. Richer said that the chief topic at the association's monthly executive meeting nowadays is the problem of metropolitan government and annexation proposals.

While firmly opposed to annexation, the association is studying "the possibility of greater cooperation between Westmount and Montreal regarding certain municipal services."

## Low tender for park work is \$188,364

Low tender for the first phase of construction to renovate Westmount Park is \$188,364, submitted by Charles Duranceau Ltd. The bids were opened Friday at City Hall.

Other bids were: Miron Company Ltd., \$264,015.61; Evans Contracting Company Ltd., \$242,937.50; Leslie L. Solty and Sons Ltd., \$193,382.31. Council is expected to award the contract at its regular monthly meeting to be held March 9, at 8:30 p.m. A meeting is generally held the first Monday of each month but it was deferred this week because of "insufficient business."

The first work to be done under the long-range program for the "rehabilitation" of the park will be primarily concern-

ed with site clearing, rough grading and redevelopment of the pond system.

According to a city spokesman, construction should begin about two weeks after the contract is awarded. It should be completed in June.

No date has been set for completion of the other much-discussed features outlined in a recent city newsletter, but it is expected that extensive planting, at least, will be carried on throughout the summer.

## Park plans draw protest in letter to Mayor

Dear Mr. Drury, I wish to congratulate you on your good intentions regarding the improvement of the Westmount Park.

Let me point out to you, however, that our sedate, serene, spacious park is well loved as it is, and well 'lived in', and that it serves its purpose admirably, which is the primary purpose of any city park: to provide relief from the arid formalism of the buildings and arteries all around it.

Let me tell you also that if anyone can improve on it (and no one can improve on nature short of leaving nature alone), it is certainly not the distinguished team

which gave Montreal the fussy, over wrought, provincial-fair-site-like Lafontaine Park. We don't want anything from them, here. We don't want a mixture of Versailles and North Pole New York in our midst, with or without Les Grandes Eaux.

We don't want ten-foot wide paved paths; anyone who wants that can take a run around the rest of the city. A park should be a place where to rest our feet on the springy grass, as well as our eyes on the shady green.

A park should be one place where our kids can fall without scraping their knees. We don't want all the wonderful 'empty' place (which I

love to cross barefoot on warm Summer days) taken up by the flower clock (which is an asset where it is), or by regiments of coniferous, or by arabesques of concrete. We don't want to sacrifice what we have, and like, for the pleasure of putting on a show for Sherbrooke street motorists. The park as it is now, is as close to nature as many children who flock to it every Summer will ever come to.

Westmount Park needs no big publicity front, no psychological gambit to attract people; and if it ever had all that, it would attract people on false pretense, and for the wrong reasons. I am making a survey

# Rotarians may hand over Unity Club to M.B.A.

The Westmount Rotary Club may soon relinquish its sponsorship of the Unity Boys' Club, The Examiner learned this week. It was revealed that Unity Directors and the general members have approved three motions to hand over the Boys Club building on Greene avenue to the Montreal Boys Association and surrender its charter.

No reasons were given for the possible move. Unity President W. Borden Empey was not available for comment.

It is believed that the possible transfer to the Montreal Boys Association would not take place until the end of April, at the earliest and that a final decision is still to be made by the local Rotary Club, sponsors of Unity for the past 20 years.

## Club started in 1944

The Montreal Boys Association is a Welfare Federation project of the United Red Feather Services. Two years after the inception of the Unity Boys Club in 1944 by the Rotary Club, the MBA was asked to come in to supervise and conduct Unity's programs. This arrangement remained in effect until 1950. Then, after a lapse of the two years the MBA once again resumed responsibility for the operation of the program and the maintenance of the Unity building. They also operate the East End Boys and Girls Club, the Pointe St. Charles Club, the N.D.G. Lion's Boys and Girls Club and two summer camps.

## Rotary retained sponsorship

Actual sponsorship of the Unity Club was maintained throughout the 20 year period, by Westmount Rotary. The Club had its beginning in 1944 when Westmount authorities saw themselves faced with the serious delinquency problem in the lower districts of the City. Boys and girls were running the streets forming gangs, destroying property and otherwise disturbing the peace. They had nowhere to spend their leisure hours, their homes were inadequate. Police and youth workers regarded the situation as serious.

Members of the Westmount Rotary Club immediately stepped in when the matter came to their knowledge and proceeded to form the Unity Boys Club.

During the intervening years between 1944 and 1950, Unity conducted activities on a part time basis in various locations. The present well-equipped building was erected in 1950. The Club has a full time staff and membership has grown to about 700 of which over 300 are girls.

## Firemen report quiet 2 months

January and February were "exceptionally quiet months" for the Westmount Fire Department, a spokesman said this week. No major fires have broken out thus far this year in Westmount.

The Department answered 62 calls in January, 12 of which were actually for fires.

The others included false alarms, flooded basements, smoking furnaces, gas leaks and residents locked in or out of their homes.

Figures for February are not yet available.

## St. Catherine

# No relief for hard hit street

St. Catherine street shopkeepers and residents, besieged for several weeks by the machine gun clamor of pneumatic drills together with rush-hour motorists, hampered in the twice daily race by detours and blocked lanes can expect no relief for at least three weeks.

Quebec Hydro crews today begin relocation of pipes along the north side of St. Catherine, six feet out from the curb. Inspiration Ltd., contractors, have just finished tearing up the south side of the street to relocate main electrical cables formerly under Western, removed for the subway.

Hydro will begin work at Atwater and St. Catherine, reaching the Westmount boundary in four days. They will continue along St. Catherine turning up Greene as far as Western.

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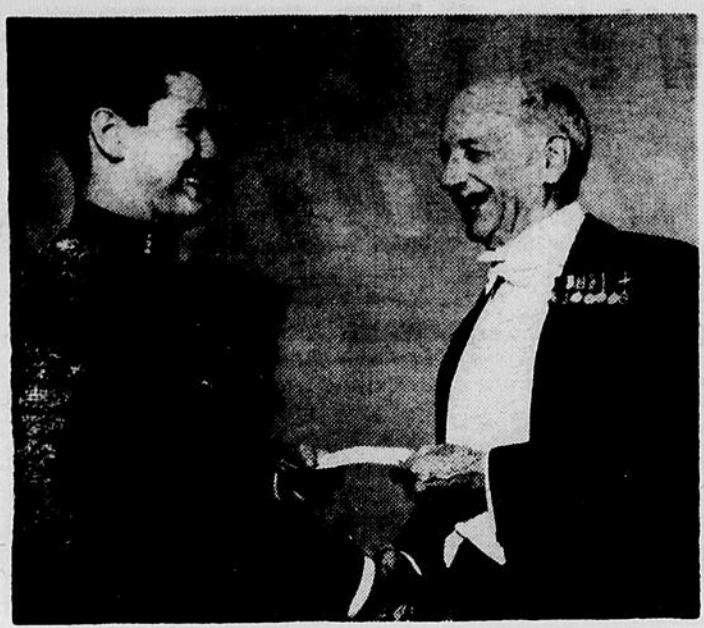

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## 2 policemen honored for cave-in rescue

Westmount Council this week paid tribute to the alert action of two city policemen who rescued a construction worker trapped 35 feet underground on January 27.

Sgt. Douglas Priestly and Constable Walter Richardson were both granted a week's holiday with pay for the hazardous rescue. The holiday may be taken anytime.

Officials who were on the scene believe that the worker would have suffocated had the rescue been delayed a minute. "There is no question but that by their actions they saved the man's life," said a spokesman. "They were really wonderful."

The accident occurred when wooden shoring collapsed at an excavation site on Wood avenue near St. Catherine. A 29-year-old worker, Nicola Perrazzino, was trapped in three feet of soil.

Sgt. Priestly and Constable Richardson, patrolling in the Public Safety vehicle soon arrived and plunged into the hole, ignoring the dirt still collapsing around them. They quickly cleared the soil away from the worker's head and applied oxygen from a portable resuscitator.

Perrazzino has been released from Montreal General Hospital after treatment for shock and internal injuries.

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## Pleads guilty to 3 holdups in Westmount

A 39-year-old Verdun resident pleaded guilty Friday to 25 charges of armed robbery, three of which occurred in Westmount.

Robert Beaudry, who had earlier surrendered to Verdun police telling them he was "fed up" living the life of a robber, pleaded guilty to the armed robberies of Paul's Service Store on Greene avenue, December 12; of the Patty Page store at 4901 Sherbrooke west on December 27; and of the Mays Ladies Wear Shop at 1233 Greene, on Monday, January 13.

Judge T. A. Fontaine of the Montreal Criminal Court will impose sentence next Wednesday.

Paul's was hit for \$40, Patty Page for about \$200, and Mays for \$75.

## Thoughts of Spring start in October for Conservatory men

Warm weather this past week surely brought thoughts of Spring — yet two weeks away — to the minds of many Westmounters. They are surpassed, however, by gardeners at the City Conservatory who have been thinking of Spring and planning for it daily since early Fall.

They do grow flowers and shrubs to be planted in city gardens in the Spring, but a mounting preoccupation is the preparation for Westmount's annual Easter Flower Show, a long-standing tradition here.

The show, this year, opens on Wednesday, March 25. Displays will be on view for three or four weeks.

Preparations began in November when many of 26,000 bulbs which are used were put into pots. They are generally kept in cold frames until February, then brought inside.

### Tulips are predominant

Meanwhile planting of the hundreds of varieties of other flowers for the show begins in earnest. Tulips are the mainstay and are complemented with over 5,000 plants and shrubs. Types to be seen include some 175 rose bushes, 1,500 flowering plants and profusions of azaleas, daffodils, lilies, lily of the valley, iris and others.

In recent weeks gardeners have taken time out from their

work with young seedlings to help instruct young homopians. Some 600 pupils from grades four and five of Roslyn, Westmount Park School, St. Leo's, and St. Paul's toured the greenhouses and delved into the art of horticulture with Parks Department chief, Wilfred Griffiths, head gardener, Eric Aho and his assistants.

Each pupils received a potted "fuschia" plant to take home. They are brought to school at the end of the year to be judged. Prizes are awarded in the Fall for the top "gardener" in each school.

**Queen's visit is unwise**

**Q**UEEN Elizabeth should not, we agree with the separatists, be brought to La Belle Province this year as planned.

Her Majesty's life is too precious to be exposed to the hotheads who would — and who have warned that they would — harm her.

Threats ordinarily are not and should not be sufficient to deter the Queen or her advisers in carrying out her rightful function as head of state.

Our reticence about seeing the Queen unnecessarily exposed here does not lie, therefore, in the presence of avowed "antis" (separatists are anti-confederationists and, by extension, anti-monarchists—and Her Majesty survives anti-monarchists by regular exposure to them in Britain).

It lies in the sad realization that our security arrangements simply may not be good enough.

**The strange re-birth of Dr. Harvey's 'Acacia'**

Sir, I have been reading, with great interest, about the proposed extension of Dorchester boulevard into Westmount. What particularly appealed to me was the suggested plan of using the beautiful trees, which bordered the old Dorchester street, as the centre of the new boulevard.

My personal interest is in one particular tree. It is the "Acacia" which stands in front of our old home at 4007 Dorchester street. This tree seemed to belong especially to us as it was on our property and, as you will hear, has a unique story to tell.

My late husband, Dr. F. W. Harvey, bought this property from T. B. Macaulay over forty years ago. We were the second family only to occupy this home until we sold it eight years ago.

When we bought the place, the "Acacia" was a beautiful tree, the only one of its kind in the neighborhood. Its sprays of fine leaves were so different from other trees and in the spring it reached its peak of beauty when the whole top was crowned with clusters of white flowers — how we loved that tree!

A few years later, we noticed a deep scar developing on the bark and realized something was wrong. Dr. Harvey immediately called the Westmount Park Tree Experts who told us the condition was serious and that the "Acacia" might live a little longer; however, the hazard which faced us was the possibility of the tree being blown down by a bad storm and severe damage resulting.

It nearly broke our hearts when "our" tree had to be cut down — the stump remained and the roots must have extended well out under the sidewalk. In time, we put in a border of flowers.

For fear they should succumb and go astray  
So when you are requested to pay up or be molested  
You will find it better policy to say:

"We never pay anyone Dane-geld  
No matter how trifling the cost,  
For the end of that game is oppression and shame  
And the nation that plays it is lost!"

I'm afraid I agree with Kipling.

# WHS Theatre Night draws 1200

By all accounts, the Westmount High Theatre Night was a great success. The turnout was high: about 500 saw the show Thursday night and about 700 on Friday. The enthusiastic crowds agreed the acting was of a high standard.

The show opened with "Before the Flood," a light satire by A. A. Milne. It was first presented early in the 1950's and must be the last dramatic work of the late A. A. Milne. It was published as one of The Best One-Act Plays of 1950-53.

It was indeed exceedingly funny, and the actors produced an excellent performance of tongue-in-cheek seriousness. Noah was played by David Smith, and Hannah, his wife, by Cheryl Richardson. Shem, Noah's eldest son, was played by Rod MacInnes. Kathy Kristof played Kerin, his wife. Rick Rahr played Ham, Noah's second son with Kate Lewis in the role of Ayesha, his wife. Richard Kaplan was Noah's youngest son, Japheth, and Gail Portnuff, his young wife. Meribal, Tova Wisenthal played Maribal's mother, and Roger Allaire was Nathaneel, a neighbor.

The staff director was J. Osborne, assisted by Miss C. Bone. Mrs. L. Osborne was in charge of costume design, and the prompter was Cathy Hanbridge.

The second play was "The Bespoke Overcoat" by Wolf Mankowitz. In this tragic-comedy, an overcoat, symbolizing the warmth and comfort denied to an old clerk in life is found for him at last, after death, through the humorous understanding of a drunken tailor who was his friend.

Acting with sympathy and humor, Michael Chodos played Morry, a tailor; Neil Charness, Pender, a warehouse clerk; Miles Buckman, Ranting, Fender's employer; and Robert Leopold,

a new clerk. Although unfortunately over the heads of some of the younger members of the audience, this play was greatly appreciated by the adults. It was directed by Miss V. Beynon and Miss J. Scantlebury. The prompters were Joey Sommerfreund assisted by Peter Cummings.

The third play — "A Marriage Proposal" by Anton Chekhov — is described as "A comedy of courtship in old Russia . . . almost a farce." The translation used was the Barrett H. Clark (1915) version.

An effective performance was given by Anthony Tremblay as Stephen Spepanovitch Tschubokov, a country farmer, Tova Wisenthal as Natalia Stepanovna, his twenty-five year old daughter, and Michael Tremblay as Ivan Vassiliyitch Lomov, Tschubokov's neighbor. This play was directed by Miss D. King and prompted by Suzanne Levine.

Colorful and entertaining were the songs and dancing from "State Fair" by Rodgers and Hammerstein. The songs were Our State Fair, It's a Grand Night for Singing, That's for Me, It Might as Well Be Spring, and All I Owe Ioway. The soloists were Fraser Adams, Cathie Duckworth and Dick Bourne, Vivia Stewart and Huntley Duff, Deidre Vogan, and Prue Hugman. Pure and Fraser also demonstrated their talent for comedy in their dance.

C. M. Drury said Monday that  
despite formidable competition,

mizing the formidable nature of  
world competition, the increase  
in trade and growth of world  
markets offers many new oppor-  
tunities to Canadian indus-  
try."

"If we look behind most suc-  
cess stories, we will find com-  
pany management that puts de-  
sign in the forefront of their  
productions and merchandising  
philosophy."

Mr. Drury noted that before  
the days of mass production, de-  
signers of vision and talent cat-  
tered to the needs of the early  
settlers in their work, in their  
homes, and at their leisure. "The  
early furniture of French Can-  
ada, especially, is part of our

rich heritage. The predominance  
of farming prompted the design  
of machines and devices which  
have greatly aided in cultiva-  
tion and harvesting. Today's de-  
signer can take inspiration from  
these past accomplishments."
