Alderman Gross named acting mayor for city for next three months

• There is no increase in the rate of 18 mills in the coming year.

• There is a slight jump of .2 mills in the overall tax.

The comments were made by Mayor J. C. Cushing at City of Westmount Council, Monday night, just before approval of a by-law to levy an assessment to meet current and other expenses of the city and to levy the school tax imposed by statute for year 1962-3.

BALANCED BUDGET

The City's revenue for year 1963 is estimated at \$3,645,780. Included in the balanced budget is revenue of \$2,101,610, based on a municipal tax of 18 mills on assessed taxable valuation of \$16,756,000.

Public works of \$889,470 and public safety, \$835,415 are the largest items under city's expenditures.

ACTING MAYOR

Alderman F. W. Gross, commissioner of public health and welfare, was appointed, on motion by Alderman M. L. Tucker, Acting Mayor of the City of Westmount for the months of November and December 1962 and January 1963, at council meeting Monday night.

A thermometer, required to replace the one damaged beyond repair in the recent snow storm, valued at \$285, was purchased for the public works department. The thermometer, as explained by Alderman P. A. Ouimet, QC, commissioner of public works, is an electrically-operated Taylor Recording Temperature instrument used

have, but we can only do this in voluntary contributions during the campaign to enable us to reach our minimum goal of \$270,000," the co-chairman said.

"Support is urgently needed," said Mrs. Bourgeois, "because mental retardation is the most significant handicap among children in our society today.

"In every 1,000 births, 30 children are mentally retarded," she pointed out. "Compare this to the seven out of every 1,000 children who have rheumatic heart disease, the three point five (3.5) stricken with cerebral palsy and the two afflicted with blindness.

"Yet 29 of the 30 can be materially assisted.

"Of these, 25 are educable and reach a level of self-support in simple occupations; and four are trainable and with special training they can work away from home in sheltered workshops. Only one in 30 is custodial, always requiring help for even the simplest human needs," Mrs. Bourgeois said.

Thieves use owner's coat for meal cloth

Three brothers, two of them juveniles, enjoyed a meal of bread and jam in the basement of Clement's Market, 4820 Sherbrooke street, Wednesday morning. They used the owner's white coat for a table cloth. Apparently they were in the market when the store closed Tuesday night.

Along with free food, they got \$50 in cash and cigarettes.

The eldest of the three may be charged with contributing to juvenile delinquency. They pleaded guilty and along with detention, will pay back some \$70.

POWER TAKE-OVER

Mr. Hyde went on to stress that he had always favored the principle of private enterprise and that this had always been the policy of Premier Lesage and the Liberal Party.

"I shall oppose any extension to public-ownership to any other field of private enterprise" said Mr. Hyde.

BASIC ISSUE

"The basic issue today is whether the people want to continue with honest and progressive government or whether they would consider retreating 20 years to the system of favoritism, kick-backs and scandals of the Union Nationale."

NEW WAY OF LIFE

Mr. Hyde referred to the Liberal campaign in 1960 when Mr. Lesage adopted as his theme that Quebec was not only in need of new men in govern-

We bow our heads in memory of them

FORTY-FOUR years ago the world stood on the brink of change but the big push in mid-summer of 1918 brought about the collapse of the German army. The Armistice, which proved to be a "scrap of paper" was signed on November 11.

World War I veterans vividly recall mud and trenches and 'Over the Top' with hordes of men clashing in hand-to-hand infighting. They recall the vision at Mons, the laugh from Old Bill's Better 'ole, and the buddies that fell by their side. Many World War II veterans find it hard to reconcile themselves with the hallowed name "veteran" but they, too, have their memories of battle horror and indefinable comradeship.

Sunday, November 11, 1962, as veterans, members of the armed services, military bands, auxiliary and association women, scouts, guides, cubs and brownies, stand before the names of the fallen on cenotaphs in villages, towns and cities, they acknowledge a divine principle:

"Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

We may be thankful for our so-called freedom despite that scrap of paper of 1918 and waiting for the Russians to enter Berlin first. We may be thankful for the love of those that lay down their lives for us. We may have to fight again for that which we hold dear. But while we await the unfolding of trends of force, let us bow our heads in grateful thanks, lest we forget.

Dear Folks:

We, the editors of The St. Laurent News, The Monitor, and The Westmount Examiner, thank you for your letters-to-the-editor received Tuesday morning.

You put a lot of effort into these. A pity we aren't printing them in our respective papers.

You took the trouble to use different typewriters.

You took the trouble to use seemingly different signatures.

You took the trouble to use different subject matter.

You took the trouble to use different colors of stationery — green for The St. Laurent News, blue for The Monitor, and pink for The Westmount Examiner. This was particularly touching.

We're pleased

We appreciate a good lark. Unfortunately, this wasn't quite good enough.

First of all, why did you post all three letters at the same time? We noticed this by the postmarks afterward, but since all three of us receive our mail in one pile in the editorial offices of The Monitor Publishing Company Limited in Cote St. Luc, and since colored envelopes are not so common in our mail, these multi-hued, identical-size envelopes stood out like the proverbial sore thumb (or the ubiquitous politician at election time).

On closer look, the three signatures appeared to have been made with the same character-less ball-point pen. Then a routine check in Mother Bell's latest phone book failed to turn up any one of you.

So we concluded that some provided you with stationery, loaned you his pen, provided you with names and addresses, provided the four-cent stamps from the same sheet, (the perforations are uniformly off-centre — probably collectors' items!) and conveniently mailed all three letters, supposedly from widely-separated St. Laurent, N.D.G. and Westmount, so as to go through the same cancellation machine at the Montreal main post office at the same time.

Final remarkable point of coincidence: all three letters espoused the same political point of view relative to the forthcoming provincial gen-

eral elections. Now, we are not going to spoil the fun — and ruin our cherished political independence as newspapers — by mentioning here what point of view. That would be lending comfort to one side and embarrassment to another,

and would never do because the "planted" letter to the editor is an old tradition with all parties in these parts.

It's just that you don't often catch them at it so delightfully.

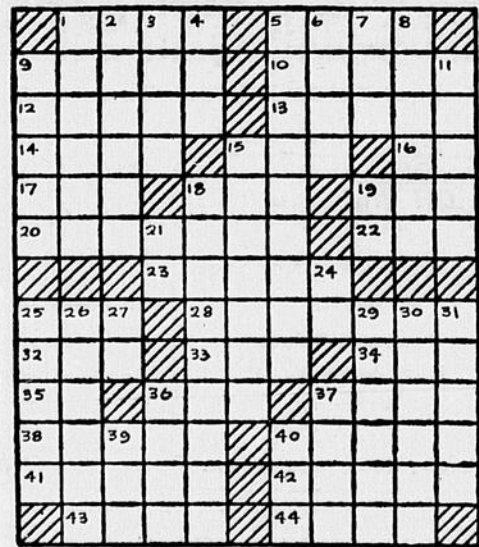

38 years with Bell, M.C. holder retires

Military cross holder Geoffrey S. Ridout, 7 Parkside Place, general operations supervisor for Bell Telephone's plant department, was honored Wednesday night on his retirement from the company after more than 38

years' service. More than 200 associates and friends attended the informal buffet supper held for the telephone industry veteran at the Ritz Carlton Hotel.

RECEIVES WALLET

Bell president Thomas W. Eadie presented him with the traditional "President's Wallet," and other presentations were made on behalf of the Telephone Pioneers of America and Mr. Ridout's associates. Mrs. Ridout was presented with a bouquet of flowers.

Awarded the Military Cross during the First World War, Mr. Ridout served with the Royal Engineers in Britain, France and Italy, attaining the rank of captain. He served with the Royal Canadian Artillery Reserve from 1926 to 1946, and during World War II held the rank of major with the 34th Field Regiment, RCA.

Mr. Ridout was born in Toronto and received his early education in Windsor and Regina before entering the Royal Military College, Kingston, in 1912. He graduated in engineering from the University of Toronto in 1922, and joined the Bell company as an assistant engineer in Montreal in 1924. In 1934 he was transferred to Ottawa as division plant superintendent, Eastern Ontario Division.

NAMED DIVISION PLANT SUPERINTENDENT

He returned to Montreal in 1940 on his appointment as general plant supervisor, Eastern Area, taking up residence in Westmount at that time. In 1947

Understanding and appreciation is the real flower of education

By VALENTINA RAHR

"Real learning involves comprehension and absorption, not just memorizing. We have good reason to look with a skeptical eye on the three-year old who can read. He may have memorized the symbols, but he probably hasn't had enough living to absorb and interpret the ideas he reads. Most of us didn't really bloom until college or later, so we need some faith and trust in life and growth. Motivation — an understanding and appreciation of the usefulness of certain facts — is the life and breath of most learning."

SENSITIVE POINT

The above comes from the Quebec Home and School Federation publication for October 1962, and touches on a sensitive point with most students who have a choice of where they may continue their university education, and who choose to attend a university in Great Britain or on the European Continent.

"Real learning is not just memorizing," commented Randall Marlin, Lansdown avenue, recently registered at Cambridge University. "In Canada and in the United States, there is no time set during the week or weekends for professors to meet with students informally to discuss and go over the week's work covered during lectures. The professors on this continent are so overworked, and their time is taken up dur-

ing the week, and often on Saturdays with evening and Saturday morning lectures added to their already full programme, that only a few hours remain on the weekends to spend with their families. Consequently, students and professors almost never meet outside the classroom. This gives the student no opportunity to talk about important points given during the lectures.

In Europe on the other hand professors have "teas" or "at homes" which are really specific times during the week or month when students are invited to drop in and talk.

NOT BY MEMORY

This system not only gives the student a chance to discuss his own theories and ideas on the material contained in lectures, but keeps him from learning by rote, or memorizing, all the necessary stuff needed to write a successful exam to get a passing mark at the end of the year. The birth of motivation — the real usefulness of facts absorbed in lectures, can only come after discussion and appreciation of material give at university."

Randall is working toward a doctorate in philosophy at Cambridge.

Parents show interest in youth program at 'Y'

This writer would like to say "Thank You" to all the parents who have taken the time and energy to come down to the Westmount YMCA with their children when enquiring about youth membership.

Many parents are pleased to learn that a university education with emphasis on child psychology, sociology, Christian ethics and business administration courses is required for a man or woman to be recognized as a Certified YMCA Secretary. This educational requirement is indeed a unique characteristic because there are community youth agencies not requiring this stringent requirement.

Facilities at the Westmount 'Y' include a swimming pool, completely equipped gymnasium, a modern Youth Lounge, an exercise weightlifting room, a handcraft room and a number of meet-

ing rooms. Private lockers are available to adult and youth members. Audio and visual aids such as tape recorders, movie projectors and phonograph players are examples of the modern equipment in constant use at the 'Y'.

ELECTRICITY and PUBLIC OWNERSHIP

THE NEED

Public ownership of the electricity generating and distributing system is an economic necessity.

Quebec needs —

- ★ Cheap power for industrial development;
- ★ Greater direct investment in industrial expansion;
- ★ Lower consumer power rates in many areas;
- ★ New jobs in new industries for a growing population.

A responsible government must act to achieve these objectives. The figures of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics show Quebec has lagged behind Ontario in both industrial development and her market share of manufactured goods. Statistics also show that the average rate for electricity to domestic consumers is higher in Quebec than in Ontario, and higher than the national average.

THE PROBLEM

The demands for cheaper power by industry and consumer have gone beyond the capabilities of the private companies, no matter how efficient they are — and several are efficient. Why?

In the past 18 months, the private companies, through no fault of their own, could not supply the demands for stable, heavy loads of cheap electricity of a new zinc smelter at Valleyfield, a new stainless steel mill near Sorel and a new newsprint mill at Chandler in Gaspé. All three are now served by Quebec Hydro.

THE SOLUTION

The future of Quebec demands that the problem be solved. New jobs are needed. A larger home market for our goods and services is essential. How can this be done?

- ★ Industrialization;
- ★ A single integrated electricity system;
- ★ Greater buying power through higher employment.

Only through public ownership of the electricity system can these objectives be realized. Quebec Hydro can finance modernization and expansion at reasonable rates of interest. The savings in Federal taxation and the payment of dividends can be employed in lowering power rates.

AN UNDERTAKING

Fair play demands that public ownership of our power facilities must be achieved in a climate of good faith and honesty. There must be—

- ★ Fair treatment of shareholders;
- ★ Recourse to the courts;
- ★ Protection of employee rights and jobs.

Concert with Canadian artists

On Monday, November 12, 8.30 p.m. at the Queen Mary road United Church, a concert open to the public at no charge will feature Kenneth Gilbert, brilliant organist, and Boris Brott, young Canadian conductor, in a concert devoted to the music of Handel and Mozart.

Kenneth Gilbert is well known to Montreal audiences. After winning the coveted Quebec "Prix D'Europe" in 1953, Kenneth Gilbert spent two years in Paris where he worked with Gaston Litaize. He became at the same time a pupil of the harpsichordist Ruggero Gerlin.

Since his return he has given many organ and harpsichord recitals, including two concert tours for Jeunesses Musicales of Canada as harpsichordist and commentator. He has been heard frequently on CBC radio and Television, and in Europe has played for the French radio and Radio Berlin (RIAS).

He was holder of a Canada

Council grant in 1961, and has recently recorded an extremely successful album of works by Bach for Baroque Records of Canada.

Mr. Gilbert is organist of Queen Mary road United Church, where he plays a Beckerath organ of Baroque principals. Since 1957 he has been in charge of the harpsichord classes at the Provincial Conservatory of Music. Last season, with Bernard Lagacé, he performed for Arts Organi the complete organ works of Bach.

In Europe

Boris Brott, presently in Europe as understudy to Maestro Pierre Monteux, will return to Canada this month for several concerts. He appeared recently in Montreal as conductor of the Concerts Under The Stars at the Chalet and on St. Helen's Island.

During the coming season he will conduct the Concerts Colone Orchestra in Paris as well as concerts in Italy, Sicily and the Scandinavian countries. He was finalist at the Liverpool International Conductors Competition last year.

The concert on November 12 will include six sonatas for organ and strings and the Adagio and Fugue in C Minor by Mozart, and will conclude with the Concerto for Organ and Orchestra op. 4 No. 4 by Handel and the Concerto Grosso in F.

This concert is made possible through a grant of the Performance Trust Fund of the Musician's Guild of Montreal. The music was written for performance by a Baroque Organ and chamber orchestra, and the concert will be given under authentic conditions and in a church hall as intended by the composers.

ment, but a new way of life. He referred to extracts from editorials and news items in both English and French daily papers, which had universal praise for the Lesage record during the two short years they had been in office. He stressed the fact that it was difficult to find a single daily of any standing which had not lauded the efforts which had been made and were still being made by Mr. Lesage to correct the abuses which had given Quebec politics a bad name for so many years.

HOSPITAL PLAN

He dealt at length on the new Hospital Insurance Plan, pointing out that in two years alone the Federal Government had contributed 160 million dollars to hospital care in Quebec, where nothing had been received under the previous administration.

ON EDUCATION

Mr. Hyde also discussed the rapid advances made in the field of education where the Liberal government had not only increased payments to schools and universities but had set up a Royal Commission on Education. The Commission is expected to submit a comprehensive report containing recommendations for a complete revision of the whole system of public education in Quebec for the first time in 100 years.

SAVINGS BY TENDER

In discussing the master plan for roads and other public projects, Mr. Hyde pointed out that the Liberal policy of awarding contracts only after calling for public tenders had resulted in a saving of over 18 million dollars.

TWO YEAR RECORD

"There can be no doubt," said Mr. Hyde, "that the Liberal Government, by its forward looking politics and based on its two year record can proudly ask for a renewal of its mandate to provide honest and progressive government in the Province of Quebec."

TO MAKE EXPOSURE

Asked about the independents, Mr. Hyde, said that he would expose the kind of "independent" candidate we have in Westmount on Monday next at 6.15 p.m. "when we hold our public debate in Victoria Hall."

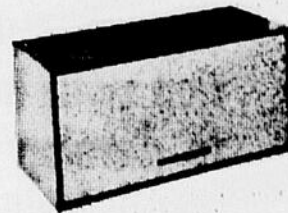

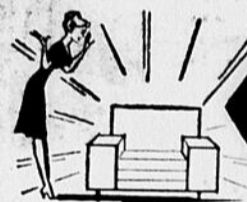

by the Public Works department.

Council approved a correction in the valuation roll in so far as it concerns the lower flat at 122 Arlington avenue. The correction resulted from Mrs. Schmidt's formal request for the ratification. She showed her husband's lease, Dr. R. C. Schmidt, of the premises which indicated an annual rental of \$2,100 and not \$2,700 as shown in the valuation roll.

Approval was granted the Secretary-Treasurer authority to effect all change of ownership of properties in the 1962-63 valuation roll which occurred since its preparation up to and including December 12.

ADJUST DEBENTURE DENOMINATIONS

Amendments were made to Council's resolution of September 10, 1962, authorizing the

call for tenders for the sale of \$1,074,000 of debentures. The head of the syndicate which purchased this debenture issue, Burns Bros. and Denton Limited, had requested that instead of receiving all the debentures in denominations of \$1,000 each, among the 1992 maturity, they receive three debentures with a denomination of \$100,000 and one with a denomination of \$25,000. The company agreed to pay a charge of \$70 to defray the additional cost involved in printing the change.

The original debenture setup required 764 signatures, the acting mayor told council.

PAY GARBAGE TRUCKS DAMAGE TO CAR

Damages of \$104.61 from the Insurance Reserve to Miss D. Cullen, covering damages to her automobile on Ingleside avenue, on September 10 were approved on advice of the City attorney, A. M. Weldon, QC.

The damage was caused by a city garbage truck which struck Miss Cullen's parked automobile while negotiating a turn from a lane onto Ingleside avenue. The city attorney was of the opinion that the city was responsible for the damage.

CAN PARK FOUR MORE CARS ON WESTMOUNT AVE.

Rescindment was made of Council's resolution, December 4, 1961, which prohibited parking on the north side of Westmount avenue from the Boulevard to Argyle avenue. This was a recommendation from the Administrative traffic committee. It resulted from requests of citizens in the area and will give parking space for four cars.

Prohibition of parking on the south side of Sunnyside avenue from Grosvenor avenue to Victoria avenue was lifted and the amended changed to "that no vehicle be parked on

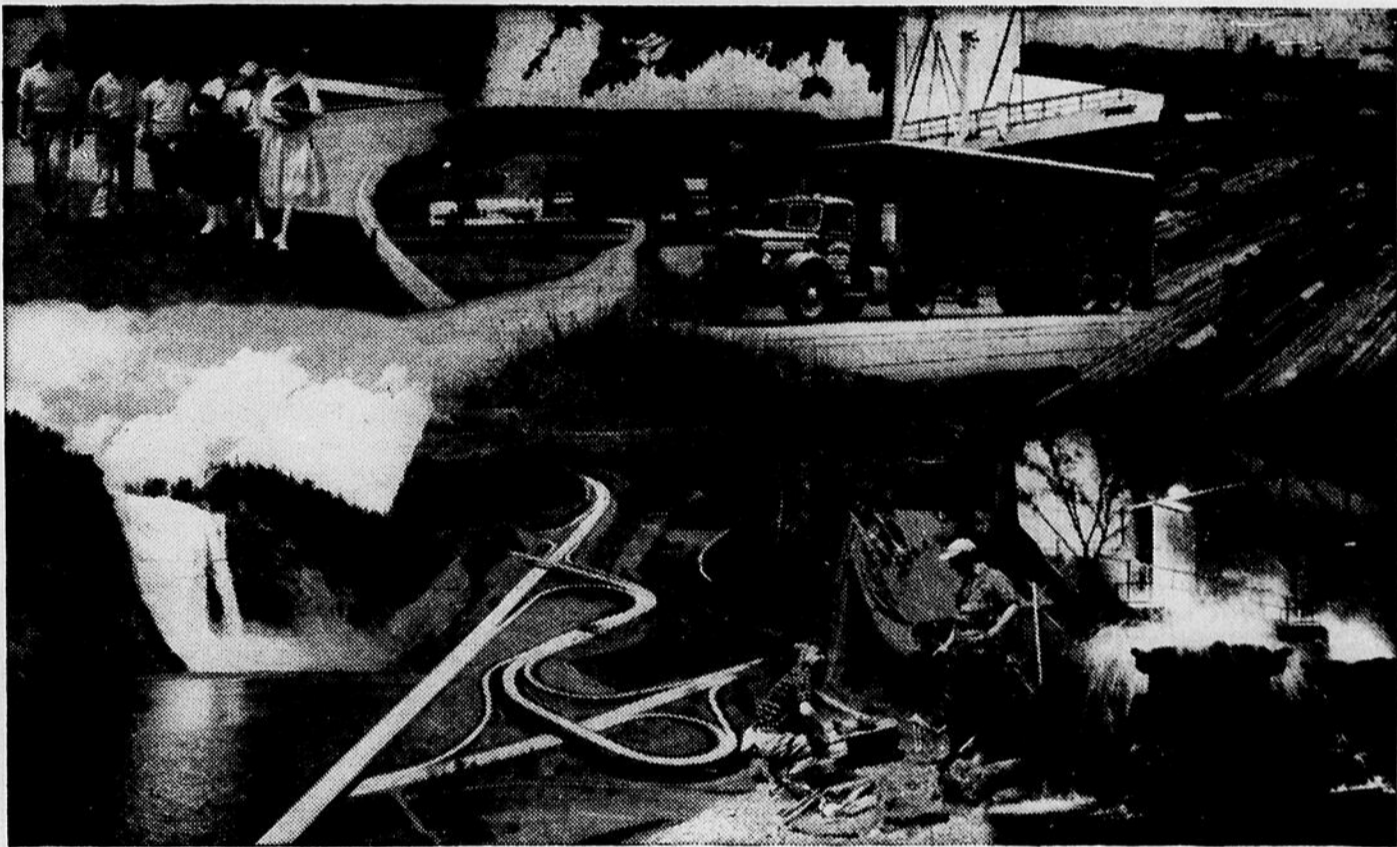
the north side of the avenue area. This change was recommended by the traffic committee as a result of change in the traffic pattern. It allows space for two more cars to park in this area.

PERMIT DANCING SCHOOL IN YMCA

The requirements of the by-law having been complied with, a permit was granted Mrs. Inge Weber for permission to establish a dancing school at the YMCA.

Redivision of several lots on Roslyn avenue and Rosemount avenue were approved. On Roslyn, the redivision consolidates all the owner's holdings into one lot, as required by by-law 555.

The owner of the Rosemount avenue lots, Stumol Company Limited, is planning to erect semi-detached dwellings. The plans were approved by the architectural commission on October 27, 1962. The purpose of the subdivision is to comply with the provisions of by-law 555.

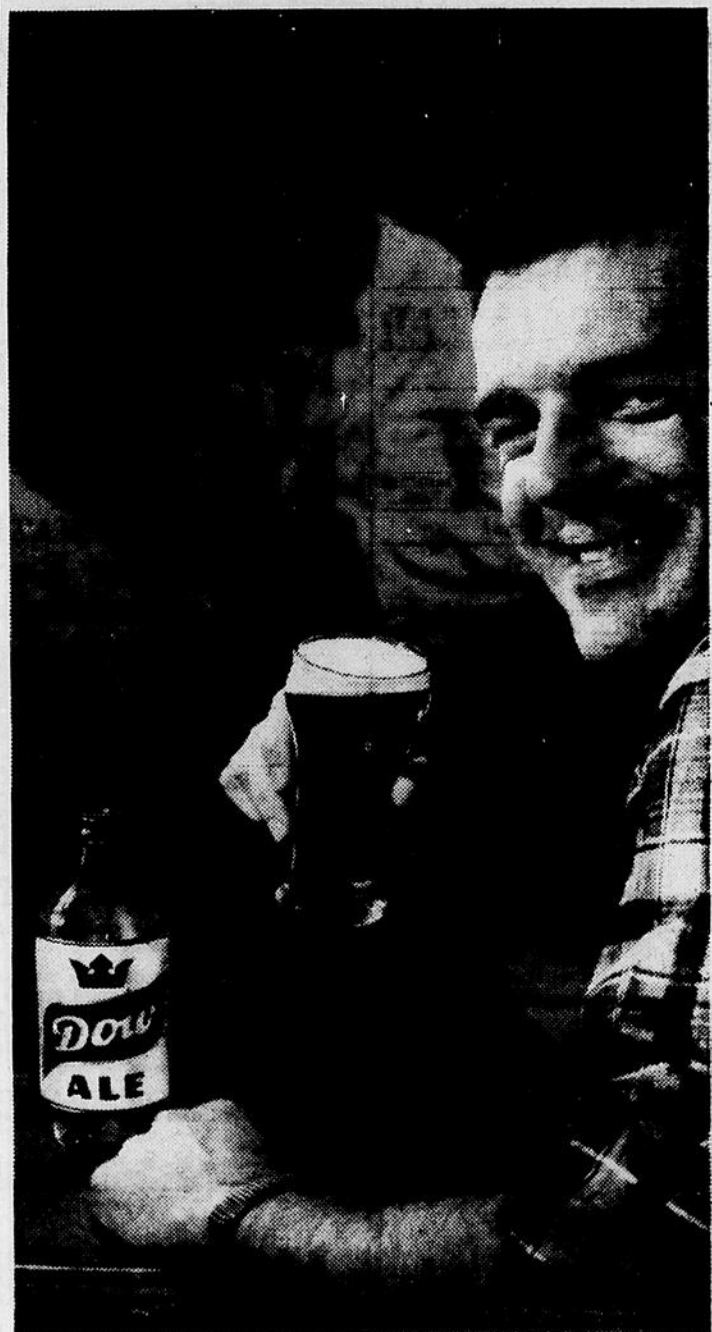

As things now stack up, Sherbrooke University have expressed their desire to cancel next Saturday's game (as nothing is actually at stake) and if the league upholds the request, the Warriors can get down to the serious business of bringing the championship home from Ottawa in the final to be played in the

Bytown November 10 against Carleton Ravens. Most observers feel that this is the year they can do it.

With the roster comprised of a good majority of seniors (14 in all) Kennedy realizes that should his team fail to avenge last year's defeat against Ottawa University, it will be quite some time before he grooms as formidable a collection of athletes again.

Bob Bourgault, perhaps the best lineman in the league has unfortunately been sidelined for the season with back trouble and now joins defensive stalwart Mike Green as a spectator. A rash of minor injuries has also been reported from the Warrior camp, but Kennedy feels that the lay-off this weekend will be a good opportunity for his team to "lick its wounds."
