BOY, 6, UNHURT WHEN STRUCK BY AUTOMOBILE

Narrowly Escapes Injury As He Steps Into Path of Car on Greene Ave.

Six-year-old Hugh McDonald, 212 Selby street, narrowly escaped serious injury when he stepped directly into the path of an automobile driven by Albert Clement, 5129 Cote St. Antoine road, on Greene avenue, at the corner of Staynor, at 1:35 p.m. on Saturday.

According to information obtained by police, the mishap occurred when the youngster, who had his attention focussed on an automatic snow loader which was proceeding south on Greene, suddenly ran onto the street from behind one of the trucks following the loader.

He was struck and knocked down by the car driven by Clement, which was also going south on Greene. Clement stopped immediately after the accident and took the youngster to the Western Division of the Montreal General Hospital where he was found to have escaped injury. He was detained there, however, by Dr. Forster, and was kept under observation for about two hours.

Speakers Urge Public To Study Education Report

We have now reached the turning point in Protestant education, declared Mrs. A. Stalker and V. C. Wansbrough, headmaster of Lower Canada College, both members of the Protestant Education Survey committee, in addressing a large audience at the Roslyn School auditorium on Monday night, at a meeting of the Roslyn Avenue Home and School Association.

The public was urged to study the report of the Committee copies of which were available at the meeting, and make its wishes known. If this opportunity for a complete reorganization were allowed to pass, the speakers asserted, the whole cause might be lost for a generation.

"There are ten school board members for every eight teachers," said Mr. Wansbrough, in speaking of the large number of small boards, some controlling only one school. "There are 360 school boards in Protestant Quebec, 1400 members in all, to administer the education of but 75,000 children." In Scotland only 35 local educational authorities were required for a school population of 1,000,000.

Mrs. Stalker drew attention to the problems of the one-room rural school where the youngest and least experienced teachers, many still in their teens, attempted to teach all subjects in all seven grades under conditions of almost total isolation.

Alderman Alex. Edmison Calvary Church Speaker

On Sunday night in Calvary church, Alderman Alex Edmison will speak on the theme, "The Challenge of Youth to the Church and Community. This theme has been chosen to focus attention upon the position of youth in our land at the present time, and also to be in keeping with the general theme of National Education Week. Young people of the congregation will conduct the service of worship. High School and College students are particularly invited to attend.

At the morning service the sermon will be delivered by the Rev. A. F. Pollock, B.D., who has recently terminated a very successful ministry at Ormstown. Previous to his ministry there, Mr. Pollock served for a number of years in Ottawa as minister of the First Congregational church. F. N. Stephen, B.A., past president of the Protestant Teacher's Association of Quebec, will conduct the service of worship and speak on behalf of the teaching profession.

PUBLIC MEETING CALLED FOR FEB. 18 IN CITY HALL; LEASE PASSED BY COUNCIL

If Project is Approved Theatre Will be Built on Site Between Greene and Olivier Avenues Above Western — By-Law Allows City to Lease Land for 40 Years At \$1.00 Per Annum

A special public meeting of proprietor-electors to decide upon adoption or disapproval of a by-law allowing the city to lease land to Montreal Repertory Theatre for 40 years at a nominal rental of \$1.00 per year was called for Saturday morning, Feb. 18, at a regular meeting of the City Council Monday night. The assembly will be held from 9 until 10 o'clock in the City Hall.

The theatre by-law was given its third reading and unanimously carried by the Council on Monday, thus greatly strengthening the possibility of the erection of the building here. However final decision on the new law must come from the proprietor-electors who have the right to demand a poll if they so desire.

The by-law first came before the City Council last week. As well as the 40-year lease on the \$1.00 per annum basis, it allows exemption of the M.R.T. from all administration taxes for the first 20 years.

The site of the proposed structure is between Greene and Olivier avenues, north of Western avenue. As yet no announcement regarding the size of the building or its seating capacity has been made by the M.R.T. However it is believed that it will have a seating capacity of approximately 800 persons and be specially equipped for the production of amateur plays and concerts.

If the M.R.T. succeeds in gaining permission to build the theatre it will attain an objective it has aimed at for some time now. Almost half of its members, who number over 3,000, are said to reside in Westmount and it is felt that this city would be the logical centre in which to construct a theatre for its own use.

The Theatre group has made use of Victoria Hall on many occasions during the past two years and has presented some of its most successful productions there.

Other matters attended to at the meeting of the Council included announcement of the annual winter masquerade ice carnival being held this evening at the Westmount Athletic Grounds.

BULLOCH SAYS POLITICAL JOBS ARE JUSTIFIED

Westmount M.L.A. Believes Politicians Should Help Unemployed

People who have been out of work for years and turn to their political representatives for jobs cannot be blamed; nor is there any reason why there should not be political dismissals, W. R. Bulloch, M.L.A. for Westmount, declared when speaking before the Prisoners' Aid and Welfare Association last Friday.

Mr. Bulloch made references to the recent speech by Ald. Edmison in which he criticized patronage at the Montreal City Hall and mentioned the number of persons who came to his office seeking work.

Mr. Bulloch stated: "It is not my purpose to discuss patronage at this time, except to say I too have experienced in a much larger way what he and his colleagues have passed through recently."

"What I would like to impress is this—my experience in meeting thousands of people who have sought positions since 1936 is something I shall ever value. It has taught me that to those who are putting up such a brave front, a word of cheer or a note of encouragement means a lot.

"When an election takes place and the elected representatives take their seats, into the minds of those out of work, comes the hope that perhaps their representative can do something for them. These people might have been looking for work for years, they have no connections with persons in authority. Who can blame them for turning to the man they elected.

"When I listen to the stories which are told to me day by day, there comes into my mind a greater regard for my fellowman and a strengthened resolve to carry out the motives which led me to enter public life—to try and provide everyone with a living, enough to eat and wear, a respectable home, some of the comforts of life and a sense of security in old age.

Malnutrition Main Cause Of Ill-Health Increase

Malnutrition, due in part to economic conditions and in part to ignorance, is largely responsible for the increase in sickness and ill-health among the poorer people of Montreal, according to Miss N. M. Howlett, R.N., Directress of the Social Service Department of St. Mary's Hospital.

The ignorance, she stated, arises out of people not knowing what to buy or having such limited resources that they do not shop to the best advantage. "Living out of cans" is a term she used as one of the phases of present-day life and one responsible for ill-nourishment.

While much is being done, the root cause of the matter was not being reached. This was a better standard of living conditions for the working and labouring classes who find themselves in serious straits today.

Last year, Miss Howlett said, 790 new cases came under the attention of the Social Service Department, together with 155 held over from 1937. In addition to this, 515 interviews were given to families or patients as to their care during convalescence and the preparation and administration diets prescribed for them by the doctors.

Visits to the homes of patients are made for this purpose and full instruction is given. This is particularly so in the case of diabetics who are made to understand what they can and can not eat, and the necessity for their attendance at clinics. A large number of cases coming under the department are in this class. In the majority of cases where insulin is required, the injections are given for nothing.

Educational Movie Shown On Palestine

Aiden M. Crawley Tells Problems of Holy Land In St. Andrew's Church

"From Abraham to Allenby," an educational film, shown under the auspices of the National Council of Education was presented by Aiden M. Crawley, journalist and traveller, in St. Andrew's church on Sunday night, following the regular devotional service.

Showing the conditions of the Jewish People in Palestine, Mr. Crawley spoke of occurrences in the Holy Land, and said that the solution of the present problems in Palestine might lie in the federation of Jewish and Arabs states, under the supervision of Syria. This problem is now being discussed and studied at a conference in London, to which the French and the Syrian have failed to send delegates. Syria is under French mandate.

Jews in Palestine at the present time, more especially the new immigrants, were living communal lives. In some instances even the care of babies had become communal affairs with seven or eight mothers of a community taking turns caring for all the children.

In his film, one of 24 dealing with Palestine in connection with Biblical and world history with the idea of bringing to life the customs, education, and changes in the country, Mr. Crawley has definitely caught the spirit of the subject.

From the time Abraham, a nomad sheik, came through the country, through the trek to Egypt and the flight through the desert, and the first settlement in the Promised Land, the film shows, in the topography and characters of today many of the scenes which existed a few thousand years ago.

Some of the chapters are, "Law-Making," "Public Administration," "The State and the Individual," "The Soviet Union in the World," "The Soviet Press," "Mass Activity," "The World War," "The Jewish Conflict," "The Freedom of Conscience and Opinion," "Public Education," "Public Health," and "The Family." There is a useful bibliographical note.

Temple Emanu-El Notes

Under the leadership of Mrs. H. J. Stern, a Sisterhood Child's Study Group for the purpose of adjusting the Jewish child to the modern world, is now being organized at Temple Emanu-El. Those young mothers willing to register may do so during the coming week.

The Sisterhood entertained at luncheon last Monday a group of German and Austrian Jewish emigrants who were passing through Montreal on the way to their new homes in Australia.

The Study Circle in current events and current literature, under the leadership of Rabbi Stern holds its next meeting on Wednesday morning, February 22nd at 11 o'clock.

Next Monday evening at 9.15, in the School for Adult Jewish Studies, Rabbi Stern will continue his observations on "Judaism as a Way of Life" and deal directly with man's place in the universe. The Hebrew class under the direction of Mr. Mendelsohn will meet at 8.15 o'clock.

Miss Frances Katz, B.S., directress of the Religious School, is now planning the program for the annual entertainment on Sunday, March 5th. The entire school will join in a masquerade and a Purim play will be presented by the Dramatic Group.

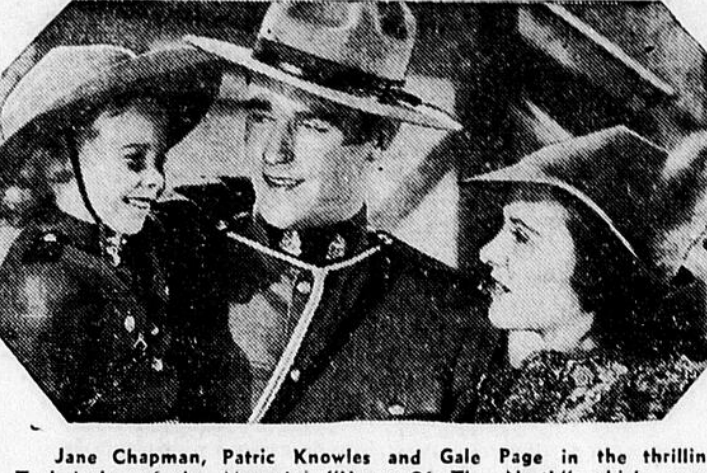

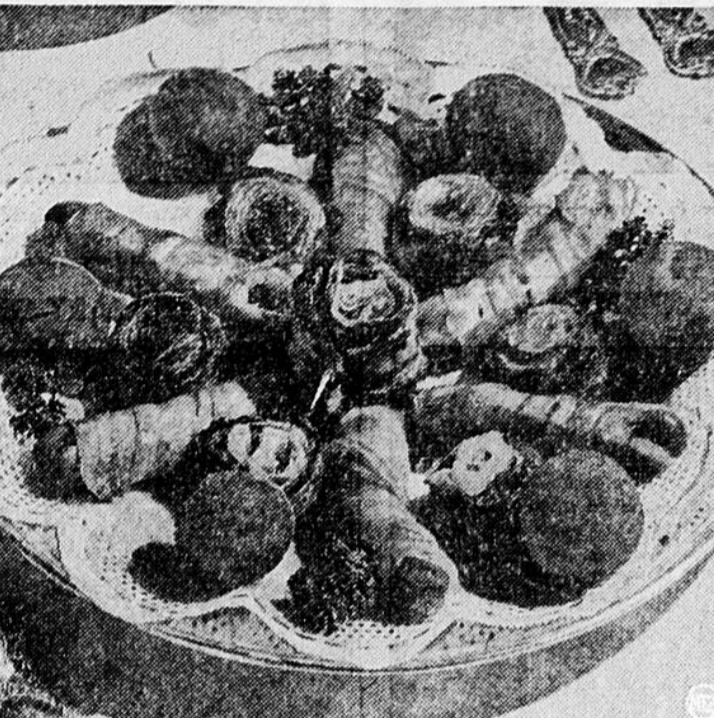

Lowly Frankfurters Put on the Dog



Frankfurter Quails (hot dogs split and stuffed with cheese) and bacon hamburgers (rolled in bacon and topped with broiled white onion) plus potato balls form the newest hot supper dish.

There will be two great fairs and new ways of cooking "hot dogs" this year.

Frankfurter Quails
Split frankfurters lengthwise. Fill with one-fourth inch stick of sharp cheese. (Savory dressing pineapple or pickle may be used for variety). Wrap each frankfurter, spiral fashion, with a whole slice of bacon, fastening each end with a toothpick.

Place in a baking dish or on a broiling rack, split side up. Bake or broil in a hot oven (425 deg. F.). Turn if necessary to cook the bacon thoroughly.

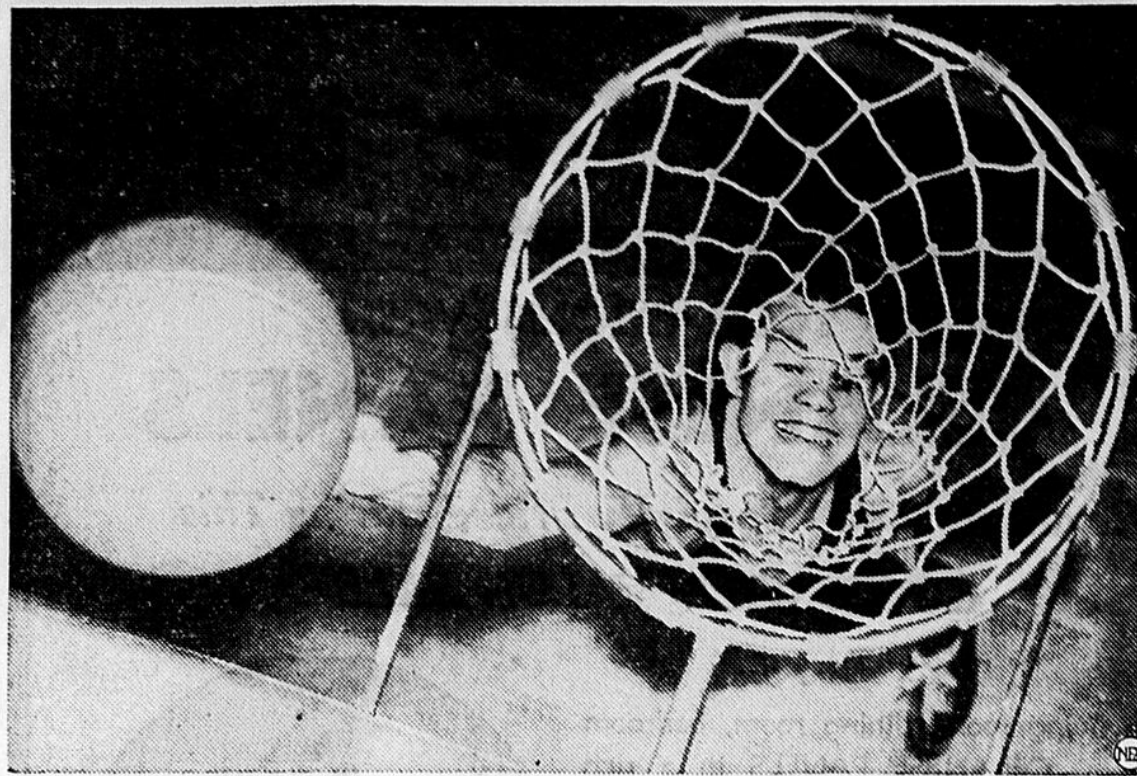
