THE NORTHWEST TROUBLE

In reference to the Northwest trouble in 1873, Mr. Schultz, now a Senator, made a speech in the House of Commons, in which he said:—

I warn honorable gentlemen against placing too much reliance on that which is at best but a very tangible idea of the relations between the crown and themselves, and that whenever they are convinced that they have been unfairly dealt with...

Again, Mr. Dickenson, of the Inland Department, as far back as 1877, said to the Minister:—

Should the buffalo become exterminated, it is not to be expected that the starving Indians will refrain from helping themselves to the supplies to be found in the stores of the Hudson's Bay Company and other traders...

Father Lacombe, in the same year, said that the buffalo would be extinct in about eight years at the then rate of slaughter. The slaughter has continued, and in addition to the then suggested evils, Dewdney has been appointed to govern the country. It is plain from all the facts before the public that the whole number of the Indians now at the Northwest have been compelled to take the course they have adopted because their natural food has disappeared...

The Government of New South Wales have expended £20,000 in purchasing an official residence at Sydney for the Naval Commander in Chief on the Australian station.

THE TERMINUS.

MUNITIONS OF WAR.

IGNORANCE OF CANADA

It is impossible not to notice with regret the ignorance of the geography of the Dominion, which most of the English press have displayed in their treatment of the news of the halfbreed rising in the Northwest. In one or two of the earlier telegrams a gross misconception was apparent as to the actual position of Prince Albert, which in one case was described as being in Ontario.

Again, the Daily News labours under the belief that the Canadian Pacific Railway has not been carried further West than Qu'Appelle, in spite of the many intimations of its rapid progress through the Rocky Mountains which have appeared in both the English and American press during the last six months. And, lastly, we may notice that the Saturday Review seriously states that the Dominion force will have to march through miles of interminable forest before it can reach the rebels, the Reviewer evidently assuming that the country between Qu'Appelle and Prince Albert is of precisely the same description as that between Port Arthur and Winnipeg.

EXCITING NEWS!

Big Bear, Poundmaker, Little Child and all Indians West of Battleford on the War Path.

Four White Women in the Hands of the Savages.

Who are Maltreating them in a Fearful Manner.

Two Settlers from Ontario Murdered.

Scores of Homesteads Burned in the Eleanor District.

News from General Middleton's Camp.

The General's Proposed Plan of Action.

Montreal Garrison Artillery Called to the Front.

By telegraph to The Mercury.

TORONTO, May 1—The Globe's despatch from General Middleton's camp says:—There are plenty of supplies here now except ammunition. We remain here till its arrival. The General held a review this morning. The troops all looked and marched well.

There is nothing new in camp. We expect to advance when the supplies from the Northcote and Gatling guns arrive. It is probable the General will not attack the rebels in their present position, but keeping out on the open prairie from five to ten miles from the river, pass east of Batoche, and on up to the Pritchard's, the Hudson Bay Coy Crossing. Thence it is probable relief will be sent to Prince Albert, after which the police cooperate in an attack on Batoche from the direction of Prince Albert and on the Carleton side of the river.

A SEVERE ENGAGEMENT LIKELY. The Mail special says the troops will advance today and a severe engagement may be looked for within the next few days.

WHITE WOMEN CAPTURED. CALGARY, May 1—A courier has passed at Red Deer River bringing news of the capture of four white women by Big Bear's bands. The river is unfordable and a raft will have to be built, but there is enough timber among the women captured by Big Bear there are two wives of missionaries. All are being frightfully maltreated. General Strange will rush through to Edmonton, and then, if possible, take his troops by boat to Fort Pitt and Battleford. The 140 lodges belonging to Big Bear are some where near the trail north of this. The average day's march on foot has been nearly 20 miles. Almost a whole march has been made on the 65th on foot and cheerfully many freight teams have been left stuck fast in the mud. The nine pounder has been dragged through by twelve horses. We have been here little more than an hour and already one raft is nearly completed although the boys had to be hauled a considerable distance. A large force of the 65th are busy at this work. It is feared however that crossing this river will delay the column all day for the river is swift and has few good landings.

AN EXCITING INCIDENT. Tuesday evening, April 28, before an hour and a half a raft had been completed and a rope made fast on the other side. The cannon was dismounted and set on the raft with two tons of ammunition and artillery horses—the whole making three and a half tons. The intention was to swing it to the other shore, but the current was too swift. The rope broke and it drifted down stream. Major Perry took a rope and swam from the raft to the shore. He was nearly gone, but managed to make the rope fast to a tree.

Some half breed eight miles down the river have lumber but refuse to give it up. The stream is 600 feet wide and very rapid.

HEAVY WORK FOR COL OTTER. The region north and east of here is full of hostiles, in fact all the Indians west of Battleford are in war paint. The settlers have all fled. John Walkieshaw and Albert Harkness, both from Ontario, were killed by Big Bear's band over a week ago. Their wives and the wives of the two missionaries are prisoners.

INDIANS ON THE WARPATH. Scouts from the north east say Otter will have a fearful time of it. Poundmaker, Little Child and all the rest are out, and a number of half breeds are directing them. Steele was to have sent word back when he reached Edmonton, but nothing has been heard. There is a perfect panic in the Eleanor district where scores of homesteads have been burned.

THE LATEST NEWS FROM WINNIPEG. WINNIPEG, May 1—Lt Swinford, 90th Batt, shot in the temple, is dead. Gen Middleton has made another reconnaissance, but seen nothing. The Northcote draws 28 inches of water; there is only 24 inches where she is stranded. The telegraph is open to Fish Creek Camp. The General is awaiting the Gatling gun and 30 day's supplies. The Indians have left their reserves at Touchwood and File Hills, whether through fear of the troops or preparatory to a rising is not known. The settlers are uneasy. Chief Factor McDonald apprehends no danger. The Quebec Cavalry left Qu'Appelle yesterday for Touchwood Hills. Old residents say the South Saskatchewan rarely rises before June or July, when the snow on the Rocky Mountains melts and fills up the Bow, the Belly and Red Deer rivers, its principal affluents. The Quebec Cavalry is going to Qu'Appelle to parley with the Indians. The York Rangers, Simcoe Foresters, and Winnipeg Cavalry are stationed at the fort. Extra precautions are still maintained, 100 men being kept under arms during the night with an extra guard. Geo Fisher denies that he is a councillor of Riel.

MONTREAL BATTALION CALLED OUT. MONTREAL, May 1—Much excitement was caused this morning by the announcement that Col Oswald's Garrison Artillery had been called out for service at the front. Col Worsley addressed the officers at five o'clock in the morning. Mr Atkinson, late 60th Rifles, is second in command. The brigade numbers six companies.

MOR TACHE'S VIEWS. WINNIPEG, May 1—Archbishop Tache expresses the opinion that the rebels were mainly Indians in Friday's fight with the troops. He believes Riel is a lunatic and thinks he will fight. He does not think there can be more than 350 half breeds at Batoche's. He is indignant at the rumors of disloyalty made against French Catholics.

From Montreal this Evening. By telegraph to The Mercury. MONTREAL, May 1—The Imperial Federation Committee have resolved to form a branch of the league in Canada to meet in the Windsor Hotel on Saturday afternoon, 9th May. Among these expected from Ottawa to take part are many members of both Houses. Resolutions will be submitted and in the evening a public meeting will be called, when addresses will be delivered by Principal Grant, of Kingston, Dalton McCarthy, M.P., Mr John Matthevs, of Toronto, Alex McNeill, M.P., Prof Foster, and probably Hon J Wilberforce Langley, member of the Nova Scotia Government, and Hon A C Boll, leader of the opposition in Nova Scotia. The Grand Trunk workmen went on strike this morning. 50 men, mostly French, returned to work, and there are policemen on guard. Athletic clubs have so increased in Montreal that last evening a company was formed to erect a clubhouse for snow-shoers and others at Cote des Neiges, to cost \$10,000. Bishop Fabre is ill. Judge J J Loranger is reported dangerously ill.

Reception of Mr Phelps. By telegraph to The Mercury: BURLINGTON, Vt, May 1—A largely attended reception was given last night to Mr Phelps, the newly appointed minister to England, by our citizens.

LULL IN WAR FEELING

Afghan Matter to be Referred to the King of Denmark.

By cable to The Mercury: LONDON, May 1—There is a slight relaxation in the tension of relations with Russia, which appears disposed to entertain England's proposal to submit to arbitration of whether the convention of March 17 was broken by Russia. It is believed the King of Denmark will be selected as arbitrator if mediation be accepted.

LONDON, May 1—There is a lull in the war excitement pending the receipt of Russia's reply to Lord Granville's despatch. Rumors are current of a Russian advance towards Herat, but no credence is given to them. England's preparations for war continue unchecked. The Standard expresses its greatest dissatisfaction at the proposal of arbitration by a crowned head. It says that such a settlement would only shelve the matter for a short time.

Russia has established permanent garrisons at Krasnodorsk, Askabad and Chikisliar. The Ameer of Afghanistan has been gazetted a Knight Grand Commander of the Order of the Star of India.

NEWCASTLE, May 1—The directors of a large steamship insurance club advise its members not to charter steamers for Russian ports during May.

Penny Dinners. By cable to The Mercury: LONDON, May 1—Penny dinners to school children have fairly passed out of the experimental stage and are at once a success and a necessity. The children in the districts where they are provided are improved physically and also intellectually. In some districts half penny dinners are provided, wholesome satisfying meals, and yet, under careful management, covered by the small sum of one cent.

Important Legislation. By telegraph to The Mercury: ST JOHN'S, Nfld, May 1—In the Assembly last evening, the expediency of continuing relations with the United States involved in the fishery clauses of the Waddington treaty was discussed for several hours with closed doors.

Formosa Converts True. By telegraph to The Mercury: KINGSTON, May 1—The Convenor of the Foreign Mission Board of the Presbyterian Church received a telegram this morning from the Rev Dr McKay, of Formosa, dated Tamsui 21st April, stating that he had returned there and found the converts faithful.

A Miser's Death. By telegraph to The Mercury: PHILADELPHIA, May 1—John Murgatroyd, a miser, who died in hospital here, had \$25,000 sewed up in his shirt and \$25,000 in the bank.

Death from Hydrophobia. By telegraph to The Mercury: GEORGETOWN, S C, May 1—John Farrell died yesterday from hydrophobia. He was bitten by a dog in February.

Shot and Killed. By telegraph to The Mercury: YORKVILLE, South Carolina, May 1—Matthew Reid shot and killed Aaron Bryant last night. Reid escaped.

The Short Stabbing Case. By telegraph to The Mercury: NEW YORK, May 1—The trial of Richard Short, for attempted assassination of Phelan is proceeding. A jury is not yet secured.

Last Week's Failures. By telegraph to The Mercury: NEW YORK, May 1—There were 189 failures in the US during the past week.

From Ottawa this Evening. By telegraph to The Mercury: OTTAWA, May 1—Sir Leonard Tilley is somewhat better today. Ottawa ladies are organizing to assist families of volunteers at the front. It is said the Deputy Minister of Justice will go to England to argue the Liquor License case before the Privy Council. The House of Commons was in session all night and is still sitting at 2 pm today.

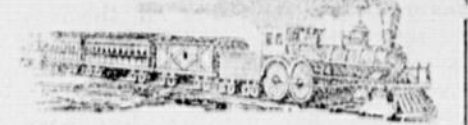
