

The Vast Mountain of Humanity Which Welcomed His Majesty to Norwich—Historic Picture



THE KING'S VISIT TO NORWICH: 11,000 SCHOOL CHILDREN WELCOMING HIS MAJESTY—Soon after His Majesty's recent visit to West Dean Park (from which place he opened by cable the Tuberculosis Hospital in Montreal), he visited Norwich, where he reviewed the Norfolk Territorials and laid the foundation stone of an extension to the Norfolk and Norwich Hospital. Over 3,000 men participated in the former function. Seeing that he was the first British Monarch to visit Norwich since Charles II. went there in 1671 His Majesty received an especially enthusiastic welcome. No incident in the reception pleased him more, however, than the greeting he received from 11,000 school children. On a shoulder of the long hill of Mousehold Heath the children were grouped. As His Majesty's carriage approached they sang the National Anthem with fine effect. The above picture illustrates this incident.

Remarkable and Striking Picture of a Racing Accident: The Recent Hunt Club Meet at Ottawa



REMARKABLE PICTURE OF A RACE-HORSE BREAKING ITS NECK IN A STEEPLECHASE—The central picture in the above illustration (No. 7) is a reproduction of a very unique photograph taken during the progress of a recent steeplechase on the track of the Hamilton Jockey Club. It shows Get-Along, a well-known jumper, in the act of turning a complete somersault after making one of the jumps, as a result of which he broke his neck, dying about half-an-hour after the accident occurred. His jockey (Franklin) was uninjured. The leading horse is Markkaman, which won the race, and the horse running beside Get-Along is Waterway, which fell at the next jump and badly injured its rider. The small pictures that are grouped around the centre-piece portray incidents connected with the recent fall opening of the Ottawa Hunt Club's new quarters. THE NEWEST NAVAL PORT IN GREAT BRITAIN—The national harbor at Dover, Eng., which was recently opened by H.R.H. the Prince of Wales. It is the result of twelve years' arduous work, and consists of a naval basin 610 acres in extent and a tiny commercial basin of 80 acres. The harbor is enclosed by the Admiralty Pier, 4,000 feet long; the "eastern" arm, 3,320 feet long; and the detached southern breakwater, 4,200 feet long. During the twelve years of work, as many as 2,000 men were employed at one time.

THE COLLIE: An International Story.

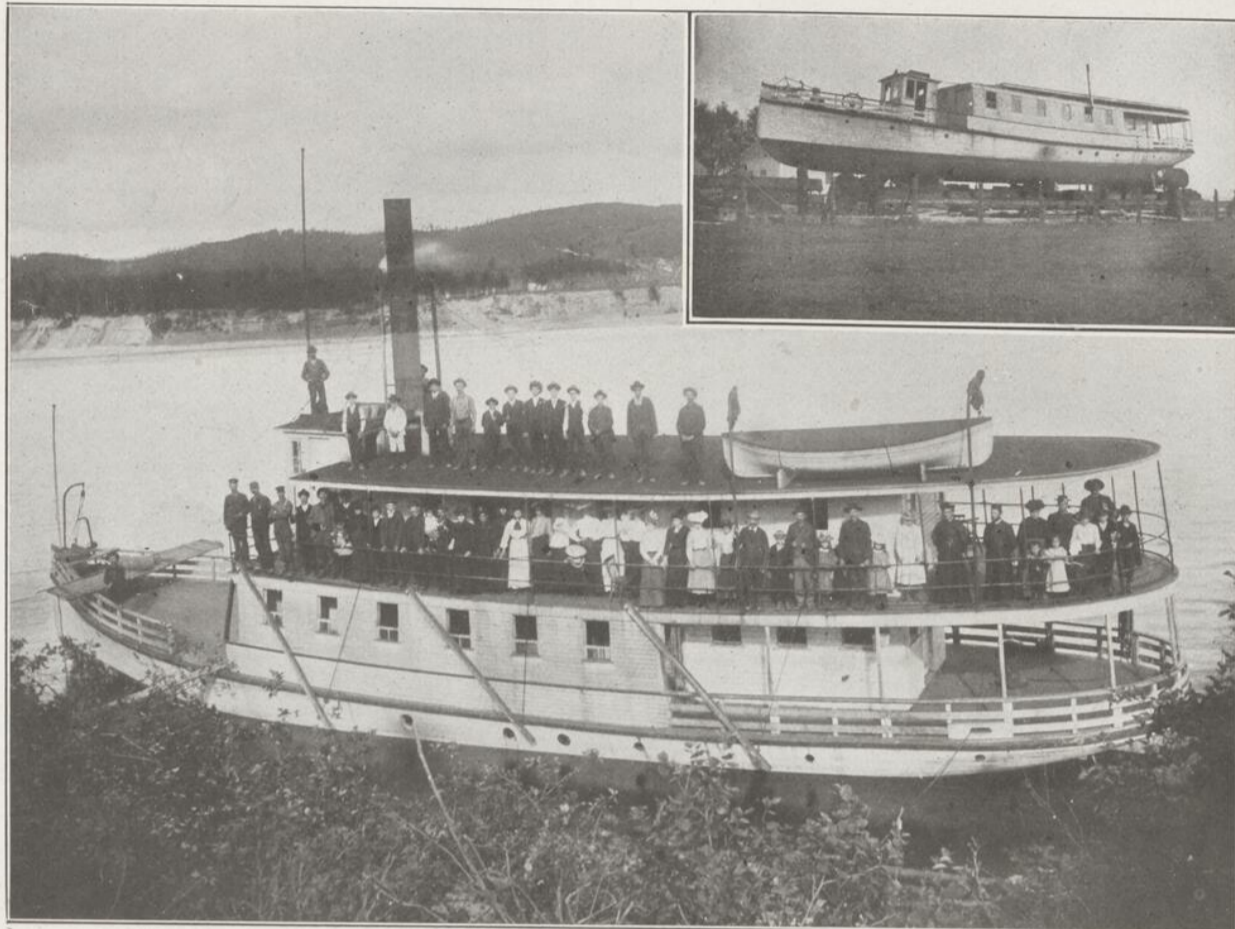
Canada has long been famed for its fine collie dogs. An international rivalry has sprung up between the collies exhibited by Montreal owners and those in the possession of Mr. Untermeyer, of New York. The victory has been awarded to each in turn, and the competitions have been extraordinarily keen. And now a former prominent Montreal

breeder springs up in the Western States who has been gathering in all the collie prizes, defeating the famous Untermeyer animals with ease. The story of the collie and his development on the Continent of America is a fascinating one, and of interest to the thousands of dog lovers, readers of The Standard.

In the year 1897, shortly after the arrival of Mr. Alex. Smith (better known as "Auchincarnie") from Scotland, the Canadian Collie Club was organized through his efforts, assisted by Mr. Chas. Thomson, Mr. Arthur F. Gault, Mr. Alex. Robertson, Mr. Harry B. Hungerford and a few other collie fanciers. About two years later, through the assistance of this club, enough cash was raised to form the Montreal Can-

ine Association, which held its initial show in the Arena. Shortly after this show was over Mr. Hungerford moved to the United States, taking with him the best of his collies known as the "Mountaineers."

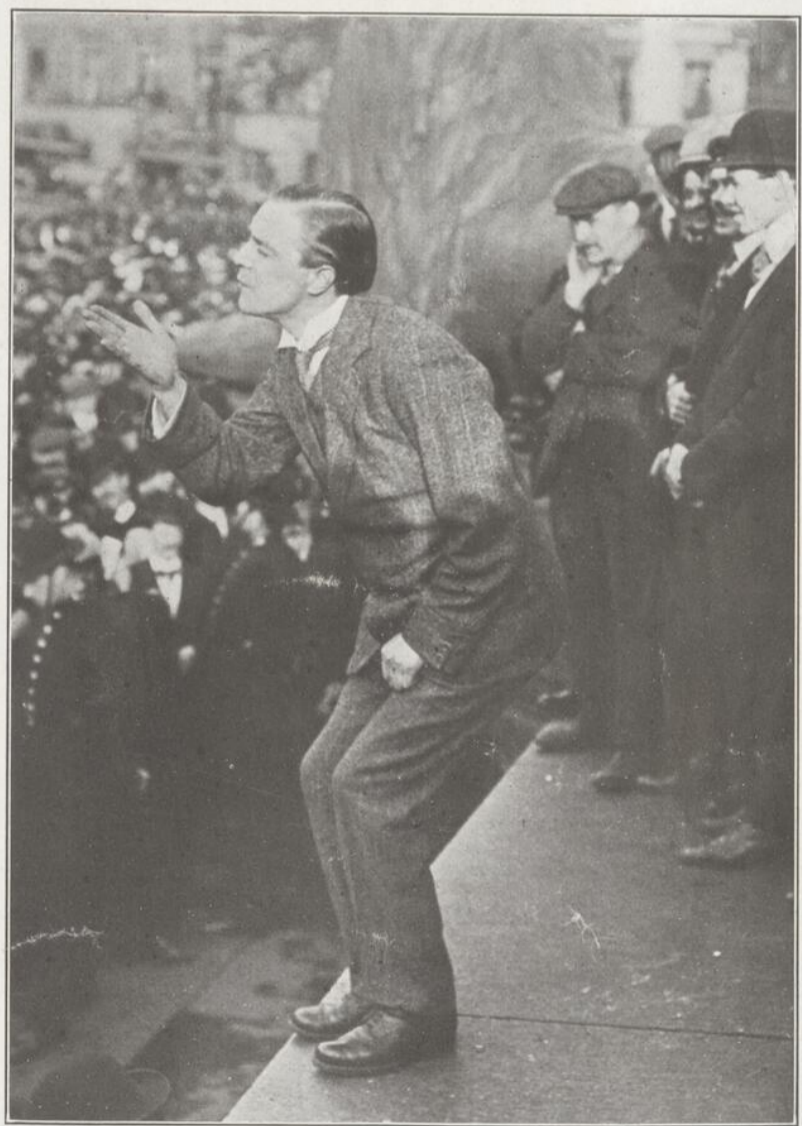

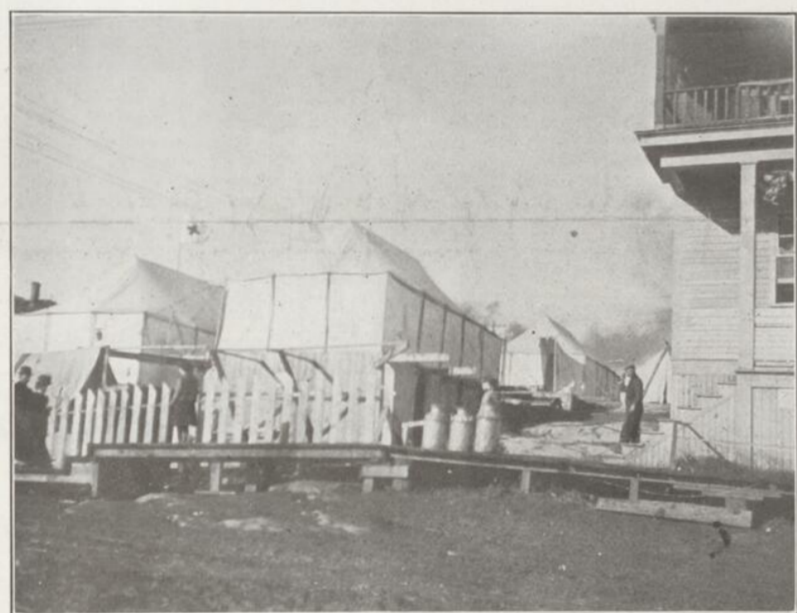

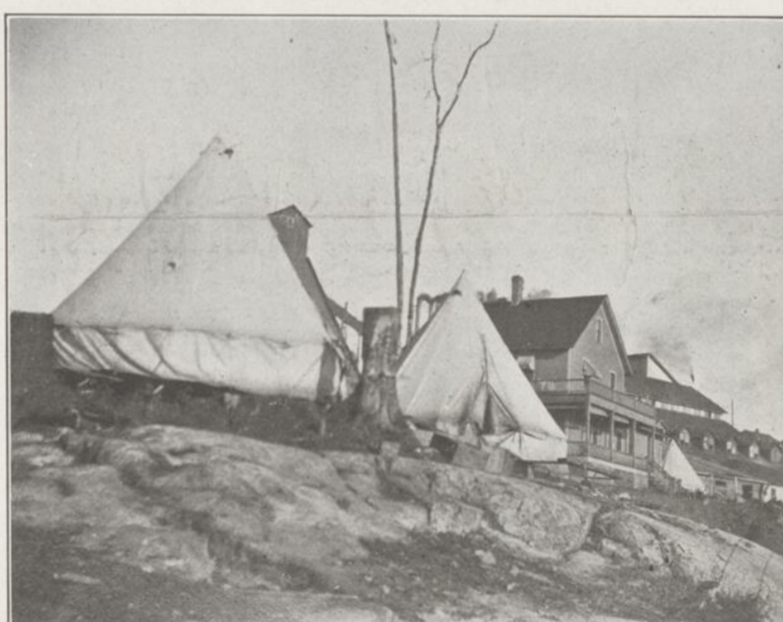
SHAKESPEARE: PORTELANCE.

Do Canadians read Shakespeare? Probably not as much as they should; but it is interesting in this connection to find P. B. Casgrain, K.C., father of Hon. Senator Casgrain, and now resident in Quebec, in a recent article upon certain features of the great dramas, remark: "Confessing my unbounded admiration for Shakespeare, I follow and commend the advice of Garrick to his friends: 'Never let your Shakespeare be out of your hand or

your pocket.' I look on him as the best mirror of the material world and of human nature, as the most universal and truest painter and historian of mankind." Mr. Casgrain has made a profound study of the Bard of Avon, and among the most interesting results of his labors is a study of "Various Gallicisms and French Locutions in the Plays of Shakespeare." Being thoroughly at home in the two languages, Mr. Cas-

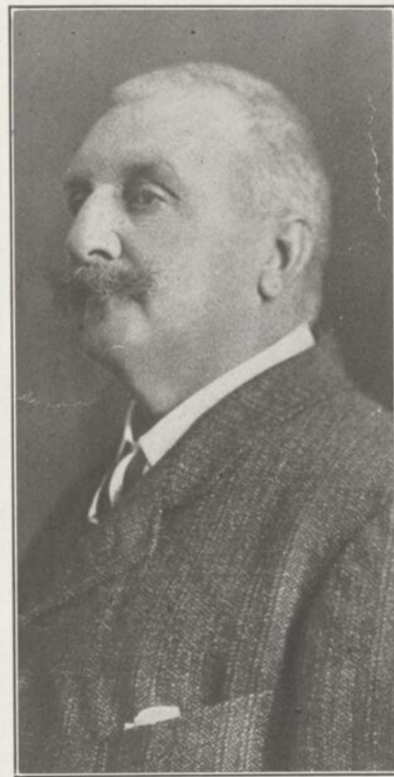


FIGHTING DISEASE AT COBALT—A house that was occupied by some of the nurses who attended the typhoid fever patients.

THE HONORABLE S. B. HEWARD.

Queen Wilhelmina of Holland recently conferred the honor of "Knighthood of the Order of Orange Nassau" on Mr. S. B. Heward, of this city. The distinction, which is a high one, was given for merit and faithful services rendered to Her Majesty's Kingdom by Mr. Heward, who has been Vice-Consul for the Netherlands since 1879—a period of 20 years. Mr. Heward has received the congratulations of Baron R. de Mares Van Swindere, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, and has also been the recipient of several letters from high officials in the United States and other parts of Holland. The London Times, in a recent issue, also referred to the honor under the heading "Court News." The Order is over 400 years old.

Mr. Heward is a nephew of the late Colonel Augustus Heward, son of the late F. H. Heward, Toronto, but has lived in Montreal since 1879. He was educated at the Upper Canada College, Toronto, and served on the American frontier during the Fenian Raid of 1866 under Lieut.-Col. Atcherley, Deputy-Adjutant-General, for which service he was given a medal. He also served at the front under the late Lieut.-Col. Osborne Smith in the Victoria Rifles, which regiment he joined during the Trent affair.

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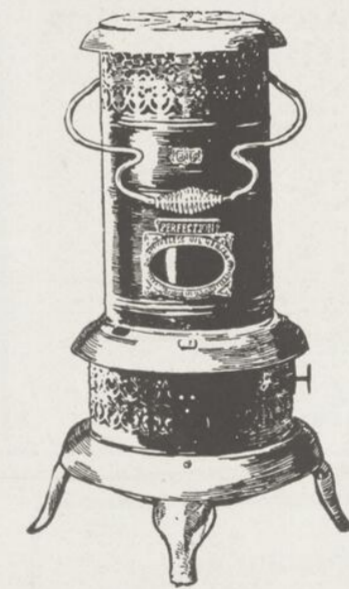
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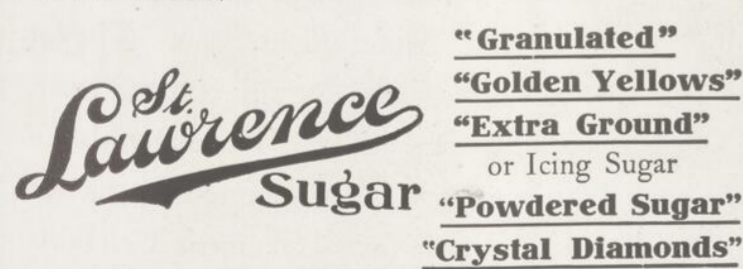

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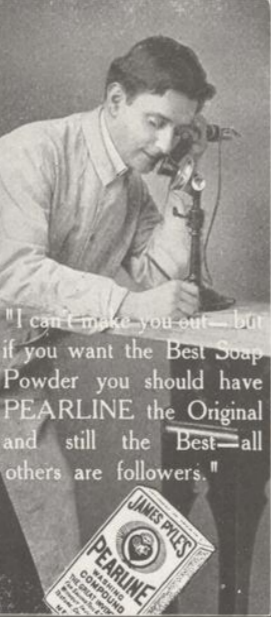
