Accessible accommodations in Québec

Hotels

Hotels are definitely the most common form of accommodation. They also provide the most options in terms of accessibility, particularly larger hotel chains that follow American standards. Establishments in this category offer single rooms, suites or furnished apartments with kitchens. Hotels also provide services such as a concierge and daily housekeeping.

FAIRMONT LE MANOIR RICHELIEU

Charlevoix

Nestled between mountains, forest and the scenic village of La Malbaie, the Fairmont Le Manoir Richelieu attracts guests with a taste for luxury. This hotel offers visitors the elegance of an international resort in a charming natural setting. Its restaurants feature regional cuisine and local ingredients and are sure to please the most discerning gourmet. Whether in Charlevoix or across the country, Fairmont Hotels always provide peace of mind when it comes to accessibility, thanks to their high standards. You can even enjoy the region's legendary landscapes from the comfort of your well-appointed hotel room—a luxurious way to commune with nature!



GÎTE DU MONT-ALBERT IN PARC NATIONAL DE LA GASPÉSIE

Gaspésie

A hiking hot spot, Parc national de la Gaspésie gives visitors access to an extraordinary mountain environment. Mont Albert is one of these breathtaking mountains. Gîte du Mont-Albert, a magnificent four-star hotel, offers its guests all the comfort they could wish for. It's known for its hospitality, fine local cuisine and unique decor. This hotel is equipped with two adapted rooms. One of them requires the use of a patient lift due to the presence of three steps.

This hotel on Montréal's South Shore is adjacent to the Longueuil metro station and close to the Casino de Montréal and La Ronde amusement park. It is a popular hotel among budget-conscious tourists visiting the city who don't want to cut corners on comfort! For the fourth consecutive year, the Sandman Montréal-Longueuil is a Défi sportif AlterGo partner hotel. Some rooms have been renovated with adapted beds and washrooms to accommodate athletes with reduced mobility, and the pool now features an access ramp. You'll enjoy this calm retreat in the vibrant city of Montréal!



AUBERGE DES GALLANT

Montréal

This remarkable hotel, restaurant and spa is nestled in the heart of a bird and deer sanctuary on Mont Rigaud. Its modern rustic style pays tribute to its natural setting without sacrificing on luxury. You'll love the warm atmosphere and top-notch service. The restaurant highlights local ingredients, providing visitors with a unique taste of Québec. Delicious! Brownie points for accessibility: the adapted rooms' floor-level showers are smartly designed.



HÔTEL DE L'ITHQ

Montréal

The Hôtel de l'ITHQ is located in the same building as the Institut de tourisme et d'hôtellerie du Québec (ITHQ), in the heart of Montréal, a stone's throw from the Quartier des Spectacles, between Quartier Latin and Plateau Mont-Royal. Proud of its four stars, this teaching hotel features 42 rooms, including a room perfectly adapted to the needs of people with disabilities, and offers unparalleled accommodations with service and comfort worthy of the world's finest hotels.



CENTRE SHERATON MONTRÉAL

Montréal

Just steps from many of Montréal's most popular attractions, the Centre Sheraton Montréal offers the perfect location from which to explore the city's bustling streets, day or night. You'll enjoy the fabulous rooftop terrace, luxurious lounges and 825 modern rooms and suites. Ongoing hotel improvements and staff training guarantee a high standard of service for persons with disabilities. The Centre Sheraton Montréal received the 2015 Hotelia Award for accessibility.



RENAISSANCE MONTRÉAL

Montréal

Renaissance Montréal's trendy urban design is sure to seduce you with its creative vibe. Nevertheless, you'll want to resist the temptation to linger inside: this hotel is at the heart of the action in downtown Montréal! The hotel scores high on accessibility thanks to its adherence to American standards, which are stricter than those in Québec. What's more, the Renaissance Montréal has implemented an accessibility policy adapted to the disabilities of each guest by way of customized services. This innovative approach earned the establishment the Hotelia Award for accessibility in 2016.

LE MONASTÈRE DES AUGUSTINES

📍 Québec City and Area

Le Monastère des Augustines' unique concept blends culture, heritage and holistic health. With Québec now a predominantly secular society, its religious structures are being repurposed in unique and interesting ways. Le Monastère des Augustines is a perfect example, providing a distinctly 21st-century version of a secluded retreat. While the silent breakfast may feel unconventional, it's a wonderfully tranquil way to start your day. This restored former cloister offers meditation classes, massage therapy, spiritual concerts, wellness workshops and creative activities. Simply divine! Le Monastère is the perfect place to reconnect with yourself without the added worry of accessibility. Persons with disabilities will feel right at home, although the washrooms could benefit from a few adjustments. That said, Le Monastère offers a truly unique experience at a very reasonable rate!



HÔTEL-MUSÉE WENDAKE

📍 Québec City and Area

This accessible indigenous experience is not to be missed! Featuring longhouse-inspired architecture, the Hôtel-Musée Wendake is bordered by theme gardens and hiking trails. Visitors to this boutique hotel can view and purchase original Wendake crafts and creations by other Amerindian nations. A Labrador tea ceremony takes place each day at 3:00 p.m. near the central fireplace. And don't forget to visit the museum, an institution created to protect and promote the heritage of the Wendat people. The museum's mandate is to teach and popularize the history, culture and art of the Wendat people and other First Nations in order to give visitors a better understanding of their present way of life.

Tourist residences

This type of accommodation describes a complex of cottages, apartments or furnished houses that include kitchen facilities and one or more bedrooms. They afford guests a certain degree of autonomy and are generally booked for longer stays, allowing visitors to avoid the cost of repeated restaurant visits! Perfect for "slow travel" tourists who prefer to immerse themselves in the local scene.

CHALETS U

📍 Eastern Townships

Located in the charming Magog-Orford region, Chalets U offer two single-level cottages that can house up to six people, providing excellent accommodation for persons with disabilities. The cottages are comfortable, modern and spacious, and surrounded by nature. The Chalet des Diligences provides visitors with a spectacular view of Lac Orford and the mountains, while Chalet Malaga's beautiful forest setting is nestled between Lac Malaga and Étang Holland. A large number of nearby adapted activities are also on offer. Visitors can go skiing at Mont Owl's Head, take a stroll through the Marais de la Rivière aux Cerises marsh, sample wines at the Cep d'argent winery and explore the city of Magog. There is something for everyone!

Bed and Breakfasts

(known as "gîtes" in Québec)

This category includes privately owned residences that provide overnight accommodation. B&Bs can house up to 15 people in a maximum of five bedrooms, with breakfast included in the price. Because these establishments are usually owner-occupied, staying at a B&B gives visitors the chance to get to know their hosts. Quebecers are well known for their hospitality, and a B&B will make you feel right at home!

GÎTE VITA BELLA

📍 Laurentians

As the first and only fully accessible B&B in Québec, Gîte Vita Bella has been profiled on AMI-télé, the province's accessible media television station. Its accessibility is just the first in a long list of impressive features. Located on a mountainside with a lake view, its natural setting will take your breath away, particularly in the fall when the trees come alive with colour. This three-bedroom B&B is decorated in the style of a traditional Québec country home. It's the perfect spot for a relaxing getaway—or an invigorating encounter with nature!



REFUGE DU MOULIN D'EAU

📍 Saguenay–Lac-Saint-Jean

Boasting a combination of traditional and modern design and decor, this B&B will welcome you with open arms! Located in La Doré, the Refuge du Moulin d'eau is within walking distance of the Moulin des pionniers and an eight-minute drive from the Zoo de St-Félicien. Perfect for a weekend getaway! However, it is only partially accessible. The washroom has a number of shortcomings and access to the restaurant requires visitors to mount a few stairs.





Vacation centres

These establishments offer all-inclusive packages that comprise lodging, restaurant meals or kitchen facilities, entertainment and recreational facilities. If you're looking for a fun-filled family vacation, vacation centres are an excellent option. Some also offer summer camps—the perfect break from the day-to-day routine for children and adults alike. A number of vacation centres specialize in catering to persons with disabilities.

TOP PICKS



AUBERGE LA CLÉ DES CHAMPS

Bas-Saint-Laurent

Located in Saint-Cyprien and founded in 1994, Auberge la Clé des Champs is a vacation and recreational training centre for people living with disabilities. It offers flexible vacation packages throughout the year for natural or host families. The Auberge is a modern, secure and functional facility that provides a stimulating environment and customized, enriching experiences. Its 26 rooms are all accessible, making it the perfect destination for sports or cultural groups!



CAMP MASSAWIPPI

Eastern Townships

Affiliated with the MAB-Mackay Rehabilitation Centre, Camp Massawippi is for campers living with motor, hearing or visual impairments. It is located on a beautiful 19-acre site on the shores of Lac Massawippi, in Québec's Eastern Townships. In addition to summer camp programs, it offers a weekend respite camp, school and group events, and a wide range of activities. The Mab-Mackay Rehabilitation Centre in Montréal also runs a day camp. The camp has a private beach with tons of nautical activities: canoeing, kayaking, sailing, rabaska, pontoon boating, tubing and, of course, adapted water skiing—all supervised by a team of lifeguards. A safe and stimulating environment!

Youth hostels

Youth hostels offer lodging in rooms or dormitories along with restaurant services or kitchen facilities. They also provide 24-hour security. While there is no maximum age limit at these reasonably priced establishments, their target clientele are millennials. If you're looking for peace and quiet, a youth hostel may not be the right fit.

TOP PICKS



TADOUSSAC YOUTH HOSTEL

Manicouagan

The Tadoussac Youth Hostel invites you to enjoy its relaxed and friendly atmosphere while you're visiting this enchanting region of Québec. Come for the breathtaking views of the Saguenay Fjord and fall in love with the magnificent natural surroundings. The hostel offers a number of outdoor activities in the surrounding area and regularly hosts concerts that are popular among locals. Although it has been rated as only partially accessible, it is still a viable option. Space can be tight, particularly in the elevator, bedrooms and public restroom, and the entry ramp is a bit too steep. That said, the entire hostel is accessible. Bonus: they have a patient lift on site!



AUBERGE INTERNATIONALE DE RIVIÈRE-DU-LOUP

Bas-St-Laurent

Fabulous sunsets, breathtaking views, a rare natural setting and delicious local cuisine—all this and more awaits you at the Rivière-du-Loup youth hostel. Visitors can discover the Bas-St-Laurent's marine ecosystem and take part in outdoor activities such as cycling and hiking. Although the hostel isn't completely accessible, many will find that it meets their needs. The shortcomings are most prominent in the washrooms and at the entrance: the building is only accessible through a side door and the thresholds to the adapted rooms are raised by a few centimetres. If you are athletically inclined, the hostel could provide an inexpensive way to explore this magnificent region of Québec!

Educational institutions

This category includes schools, universities and colleges that rent out rooms normally reserved for students. While this is not the most glamorous option, it is definitely budget-friendly and offers a quieter alternative to a youth hostel. The best of both worlds for those with limited funds.

TOP PICKS



UQAM RESIDENCES

Montréal

In many cases, accessibility and luxury go hand in hand. However, the UQAM student residences can be rented during the summer, providing Montréal accommodations without breaking the bank. The decor is minimalist yet functional. It is definitely the best value for your money! The downtown location can't beat: Sainte-Catherine Street, the Gay Village and the Quartier des spectacles—Montréal's entertainment district—are at your doorstep.



LES STUDIOS HÔTEL - UNIVERSITÉ DE MONTRÉAL

📍 Montréal

Overlooking Montréal and just steps away from Mount Royal Park, this summer hotel is open from May 1 to August 24. Les Studios Hôtel offers 400 single, double, and triple occupancy rooms and a number of free or paid amenities on site (self-serve kitchens, Internet, parking, etc.) or nearby (athletic centre, massage therapy, grocery store, etc.). Its proximity to downtown makes it the perfect place to stay.



LOGIS VACANCES - CÉGEP DE LA GASPÉSIE ET DES ÎLES

📍 Gaspé

Located in the centre of Gaspé, the CEGEP residence is the ideal summer lodging for solo travelers, families, or tourist groups. The buildings feature rooms with both single and double beds, and the apartments can accommodate up to 6 or 8 people. The Sports pavilion also offers a pool, gymnasium, climbing wall, and fitness room. It's the perfect home base for visitors wanting to explore the area!



RÉSIDENCE-HÔTELLERIE - CÉGEP DE RIVIÈRE-DU-LOUP

📍 Rivière-du-Loup

Residence Services makes rooms available year round for tourists. Whether you're just passing through town or spending more time getting to know the area, other than lodging, the residence-hotel offers visitors a variety of amenities, including

high-speed Internet, and access to the campus's community kitchens, athletic centre, student coffee shop, and cafeteria. Accessible rooms are also available for disabled guests.

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Campgrounds

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This category covers ready-to-camp accommodations, as well as campsites reserved for tents and recreational vehicles or trailers. Facilities usually include a variety of services. For many Quebecers, camping is a yearly ritual that borders on sacred. Pitching a tent can be a great way to immerse yourself in the province's outdoor culture.

TOP PICKS



PARC NATIONAL DU MONT-MÉGANTIC

📍 Eastern Townships

Parc national du Mont-Mégantic is the world's first International Dark Sky Preserve! Many of its campsites are accessible, including all those in the Franceville sector: 21 sites with two services (water and electricity) and 16 unserviced sites. With so many options, reserving a spot isn't usually a challenge! Nearby, you'll find hiking trails, a cycling path, playground, picnic area and a convenience store. When night falls, it's time for stargazing and roasting marshmallows by the fire.



HUTTOPIA TENTS IN PARC D'OKA

📍 Laurentians

Parc national d'Oka boasts a rich historical and natural heritage. The Calvary trail, with its four oratories and three chapels, is a complex of historic buildings that's unique in North America. In Grande Baie and Rivière aux Serpents, land and water come together to give birth to ecological jewels: the wetlands. Located near the service centre, Les Dunes campground houses a number of Huttopia tents. Fully furnished, these tents come equipped with everything you need to prepare meals. They also feature a space heater, two rooms with beds and a large sitting area. Two tents and one nearby sanitary building are adapted for persons with restricted mobility (Les Dunes 149 and 150). The campground also features an accessible trail and specially adapted Hippocampe wheelchairs for swimming. Oka beach awaits!



GATINEAU PARK CAMPING ON PHILIPPE LAKE

📍 Outaouais

Only a short drive from the city, Gatineau Park is an easy escape into nature. This summer, extend your outdoor adventure by spending the night! The popular yurts are circular structures with a cone-shaped roof and set on a wooden platform. Charming yet rustic, the four units are located at Philippe and Taylor lakes and can accommodate up to six people each. Even better: the Wanakiwin yurt is fully accessible. Bring your sleeping bag and food supplies and spend a night in this unique structure in the heart of the Québec forest!

AML CRUISES

Charlevoix

The AML whale-watching cruise on the St. Lawrence is not to be missed! Perfect for all ages, levels of ability and interests, it's an experience that will stimulate your senses and awaken your imagination. Set sail and enjoy refreshing salt-tinged air, magnificent landscapes and thrilling marine wildlife. The entertaining and informative naturalist guides will give you new appreciation for these elegant sea mammals. And remember: observing animals in their natural habitat is a responsible alternative to visiting them in captivity. Note that only the Baie-Sainte-Catherine departure point is wheelchair accessible. Reserve your whale encounter today!



CENTRE DE LA NATURE DE LAVAL

Laval

The Centre de la nature de Laval is an urban park extending over more than 50 hectares (124 acres). This family-friendly destination, site of a former quarry and landfill, is a rare example of this type of reclaimed green space in North America. The Centre's pasture, farm and tropical greenhouse are home to a variety of animal species. Don't miss the opportunity to hand-feed the goats. Hint: they also love to be petted! It's the perfect spot for a family outing—there's no better setting for a picnic.



PARC OMEGA

Outaouais

Europeans in particular will enjoy the living postcard that is Parc Omega, where visitors can have close encounters with North American wildlife. You'll ride in the safety and comfort of your car as you immerse yourself in the natural habitat of deer, bears and wolves. What could be more magical than feeding caribou carrots out of your hand? Just be aware—they can be messy eaters! You'll also want to get out of your car to enjoy the interpretive nature trails, aviary and traditional sugar shack.



ZOO DE GRANBY

Eastern Townships

The Zoo de Granby is a zoo, water park and amusement park all in one. In other words, the perfect family outing! The zoo is home to 1,500 animals, with close to 224 exotic wildlife species and 90 marine species. Presentations and workshops held throughout the day allow you to learn more about these animals and see them up close and personal! TOURS OF OLD QUÉBEC

Québec City and Area

Currently the only accessible guided tour available, the Double Decker "Bus rouge" is a great way to immerse yourself in the history of Québec and its capital city. The popular "hop-on, hop-off" option lets riders board and disembark as often as they like along the entire bus route. It's the perfect way to see the city at your own pace. Points of interest include: Place d'Armes, Musée de la civilisation, Place Royale, Old Port Market, Observatoire de la capitale and the Citadelle of Québec. It's hard to imagine taking in all these attractions in one day!



OLD MONTRÉAL

Montréal

Dating back to the city's founding, Old Montréal remains one of the city's most vibrant neighbourhoods. During the summer, the area comes alive in a flurry of outdoor activities. Take in the fireworks at L'International des Feux Loto-Québec, stop and enjoy one of the area's many street performers, follow along the Cité Mémoire multimedia tour or take an evening river cruise on the St. Lawrence. Making a complete round of the festivals on this list would be a feat in and of itself, and yet these are just the tip of the iceberg!

TOP PICKS



FESTIVAL INTERNATIONAL DE JAZZ DE MONTRÉAL (EXTERNAL SITE)

Montréal

Ranked as the world's largest jazz festival by Guinness World Records, the Festival International de Jazz de Montréal has been synonymous with a passion for music for over three decades. The Festival hosts some 30 countries, 3,000 musicians and public entertainers, 1,000 concerts and activities—two-thirds of them free—in 15 concert halls and on 8 outdoor stages! And it all happens on a unique site designed to meet festivalgoers' every need, in the heart of Montréal's downtown core, in an area off-limits to vehicular traffic! An electrifying experience awaits you!



FESTIVAL D'ÉTÉ DE QUÉBEC (EXTERNAL SITE)

Québec City and Area

The Festival d'été de Québec plays host to 300 performances on 10 stages, over 11 summertime days of music-making, and is one of the biggest musical events in Canada. Set in the heart of Québec's historic district, the Festival's indoor and outdoor stages showcase international celebrities, rising stars and emerging artists across a spectrum of musical styles: rock, hip-hop, electronic, French chanson, jazz and world music. The entire city moves to the rhythm of this event! Every stage has reserved seating for disabled persons! These spaces, however, must be reserved in advance.



FESTIVOIX DE TROIS-RIVIÈRES

Mauricie

This music festival launches the summer season with nine days of festivities in downtown Trois-Rivières. Established and emerging artists take turns performing from morning to night on 15 indoor and outdoor stages. It also provides a great chance to explore one of Québec's smaller cities! This mostly outdoor festival is wheelchair-accessible. In fact, an entire section is reserved for wheelchair users at the Loto-Québec stage to ensure their comfort during performances. Note the presence of stairs at the Embuscade and Zénob sites. What's more, with a Tourist and Leisure Companion Sticker, companions of persons with reduced mobility can enter for free!



JUST FOR LAUGHS COMEDY FESTIVAL (EXTERNAL SITE)

Montréal

Québec comedians are some of the province's most well-known and beloved public figures. It can't be said enough: Quebecers love to laugh. And the Just for Laughs Comedy Festival gives them every reason to! Its mission is very simple: make people happy. Each year, this festival has Montréal in stitches at its galas, street performances, theatre shows and stand-up sessions. Approximately 1,700 artists from 19 countries descend on Montréal to give 1,600 performances—1,200 of which are outdoors and free! Every stage offers reserved seating for disabled persons, but finding accessible restaurants may be a challenge. Luckily, Place des Arts provides a few options.



OSHEAGA MUSIC AND ARTS FESTIVAL

Montréal

OSHEAGA is a European-style celebration of music and the visual arts that features several outdoor stages. The festival takes place at Parc Jean-Drapeau on Île Sainte-Hélène, an oasis of tranquility and greenery in the heart of Montréal. Osheaga presents fresh local talent and emerging national artists alongside some of the biggest names in the industry. More than 90 groups take to the stages over

several days, creating a summer festival atmosphere that is uniquely Montréal. A number of stages offer reserved seating for persons with disabilities. The adapted washroom, however, is a bit of a tight squeeze.



FESTIVAL DU NOUVEAU CINÉMA

Montréal

This festival presents more than 300 films from Québec and around the world, offering patrons immersive experiences, interactive performances and even a few surprise events. The 11-day festival is designed as a space devoted to discussions, meetings and sharing, where film fans can come together with artists and professionals to exchange ideas in an informal setting. Film isn't something to be kept cloistered in an ivory tower. This openness is what gives this festival its unique charm. The cinemas are relatively easy to access. The box office is less so, but reserving your tickets online will make the process much smoother!

Museums and historic sites

Just over 400 years have passed since the first colonial settlers touched Amerindian soil in what is now the province of Québec. This meeting of cultures is commemorated by several historic sites. The province's many museums also give visitors the opportunity to take a walk through history or discover the works of local and international artists.

TOP PICKS



MUSÉE ACADIEN DU QUÉBEC

📍 Gaspésie

The infamous Great Upheaval led many Acadians to resettle in Québec, starting in 1755. One million Quebecers are of Acadian descent and three million

Quebecers have at least one Acadian ancestor! Acadian descendants have left an indelible impression on the province's cultural landscape, and their contributions have helped shape modern Québec society. A historic site, the museum tells the fascinating and moving story of Acadians in Québec through its permanent exhibit, "Une Acadie québécoise" (a Québec Acadia). The museum also features works by Acadian artists in its temporary exhibits. The knowledgeable and helpful staff will be more than happy to answer your questions!



MUSÉE DU FJORD

📍 Saguenay-Lac-Saint-Jean

Part museum, part aquarium, the Musée du Fjord offers an entertaining learning experience for everyone. The live laboratory is home to more than 650 specimens in a giant saltwater aquarium. The touch tank lets you come into close contact with starfish, sea cucumbers, sea urchins and other marine species. The museum also offers a number of outdoor activities during the summer season. Enjoy these outdoor excursions and discover minerals, botany, fauna and the Fjord's history with the help

of enthusiastic guides. Also on offer: scientific excursions, a visit to the historic neighbourhood, a GPS rally and a visit to the Pyramide des Ha! Ha!, a monument commemorating the Saguenay flood of 1996.



BATTLE OF THE CHÂTEAUGUAY NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

📍 Montérégie

This Battle of the Châteauguay Historic Site commemorates the victory of Canadian troops over the invading American army on October 26, 1813. Visit the interpretation centre to discover how 300 Canadian fighters managed to defeat 3,700 Americans, an unrecognized episode in our history that recalls the importance of these militiamen who became heroes. The museum offers a tactile tour and provides an FM band system for the videos on display. The site also features a groomed trail stretching more than 14 km (8.6 mi.) between Ormstown and Howick along the Châteauguay River. The trails are accessible, although the lookout requires visitors to climb a four-landing staircase.



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MONTREAL MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS

📍 Montréal

If you would like to get a deeper appreciation for Québec art, this popular museum is not to be missed. The Claire and Marc Bourgie Pavilion houses a magnificent exhibit of Québec and Canadian art, from traditional to contemporary. The temporary exhibits are also worth a visit. Seemingly ordinary collections can surprise and delight, thanks to a modern design that leaves nothing to chance, especially when it comes to the selected artwork! Tactile tours are available for blind or visually impaired persons.



FORT CHAMBLY NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE

📍 Montérégie

Roughly 30 km (18.6 mi.) southeast of Montréal, Fort Chambly rises proudly at the foot of the Richelieu River rapids. Built in 1711 to defend the colony, this stone fortification was preceded by three wooden forts. Come and savour the cuisine of the inhabitants of New France while discovering garrison life. The fort has preserved the key elements of its original architecture. Featuring a tumultuous river, a huge basin and a wooded area, the fort's site is home to an incredible array of birds. It is also one of the rare places where you can stroll along the Richelieu. You'll feel as if you're walking in the footsteps of an 18th-century infantryman. Two accessible picnic tables are available—perfect for whiling away a relaxing day outdoors.



THE PLAINS OF ABRAHAM

📍 Québec City and Area

One of Canada's most important historical parks, and one of the world's most prestigious city parks, this was the site of many clashes for supremacy between the French and British empires. The park is the scene of the 1759 Conquest, which changed the fate of North America. Apart from its historical past, the site is to Québec what Central Park and Hyde Park are to New York and London: an urban park of outstanding value, the lungs of the city. A full 103 hectares (255 acres) of meadow and grassy knolls, decked with flowers or covered with snow, are there for residents and visitors to enjoy.

Many of the city's churches are worth visiting to admire their impressive architecture or simply to enjoy a peaceful moment of silence.

NOTRE-DAME BASILICA

📍 Montréal

A masterpiece of Gothic Revival architecture, Notre-Dame Basilica was built in just 35 months, between 1824 and 1829. A tour de force for a building of its size and scope! It is renowned for its magnificent interior in wood and the boldly modern design of the Notre-Dame-du-Sacré-Coeur Chapel. Its beautiful stained glass windows capture the imagination from outside and within the basilica. The entry fee includes a guided tour, which will deepen your appreciation of this magnificent landmark.



SAINT JOSEPH'S ORATORY

📍 Montréal

Perched on the northwest corner of Mount Royal, Saint Joseph's Oratory is one of the world's most visited religious sites. Each year, close to two million visitors make the pilgrimage to the 155-metre (508 ft.) tall basilica, which overlooks the city. And with the canonization in Rome of the basilica's founder, Brother André, more and more people make the trip to see this Montréal sanctuary. With a dome rising 60 metres (197 ft.) in height and measuring 39 metres (128 ft.) in diameter, the Oratory is a truly remarkable structure. Have no fear! A free shuttle service is available at the foot of the hill. Once inside, elevators whisk you to every level.



SAINTE-ANNE-DE-BEAUPRÉ SHRINE

📍 Québec City and Area

The Sainte-Anne-de-Beaupré Shrine, located only 20 minutes from Québec, welcomes almost a million visitors annually. This Basilica, dedicated to Saint Anne, the mother of Mary and grandmother of Jesus, is one of only five national shrines in Canada. The history of the shrine is beautifully told through its paintings, mosaics, stained glass windows, and stone and wood sculptures. Created by Auguste Labouret, the Basilica's 240 stained glass windows are some of the building's most magnificent decorative elements.

THE ACCESSIBLE OUTDOORS

Québec's boundless nature offers endless opportunities for relaxation, recreation, or just admiring the scenery, and Sépaq has activities for every season. From observation and discovery to hiking, nautical and aquatic fun, sports and adventure, or stays in campgrounds, cabins, or inns, the list is long and whets the appetite of nature lovers everywhere. Sépaq shows its commitment to the Québec government policy of *À part entière*, which safeguards the rights of people with disabilities, by offering innovative ways of making many of its activities accessible to all.

INCREASINGLY VARIED ACCESSIBILITY

Sépaq has invested in continuous improvement regarding accessibility for people with disabilities. The result is a series of measures implemented in various outdoor activity centres based on the vocation and situation of each. Since this is an ever-changing process concerning some 50 different establishments, each with its own dynamic, it would be inappropriate to list the details per facility.

Note that, at time of writing, accessibility cannot be guaranteed throughout the entire network. Prospective visitors must check accessibility at their desired destination, based on their needs and preferences. Information on accessibility is available for

parking, reception areas, public areas (catering facilities, shops, picnic areas, and playgrounds), sanitation (toilets, showers, sinks), trails, accommodations, and certain specific components (docks, watercraft, equipment).

A REMARKABLE EXAMPLE



LES TENTES HUTTOPIA DU PARC D'OKA

📍 Laurentians

In 2012, the team at Parc national d'Oka earned the *Mention Kéroul*, a distinction that honours managers who provide accessible services to persons with reduced mobility. That year, the park had really gone the extra mile in adapting ready-to-camp Huttopia tents to the needs of disabled guests. The two tents offer accessible countertops, tables, picnic tables, and door and window locks, in addition to access ramps and raised firepits. Each is also located near sanitary facilities with an accessible shower.

New on the park's accommodation menu are its two accessible Compact cabins. Consisting of a single room, each can accommodate up to four people, making them perfect for couples and families.

They're also equipped with an adapted kitchen, bath, and toilet, and are accessible by vehicle year-round.

What's more, Parc national d'Oka features various accessible discovery activities in addition to making special equipment available free of charge to visitors with reduced mobility:

- The Hippocampe, a recreational wheelchair that provides access to the beaches and aquatic activities of Lac des deux-Montagnes as well as year-round hiking trail access (the addition of a ski under the front wheel makes it possible to navigate the trails in winter)
- The Ski-vel, a piece of equipment on which a wheelchair can be installed for access to winter hiking trails

A boardwalk trail along the beach, set up for pleasant outings while protecting the natural environment

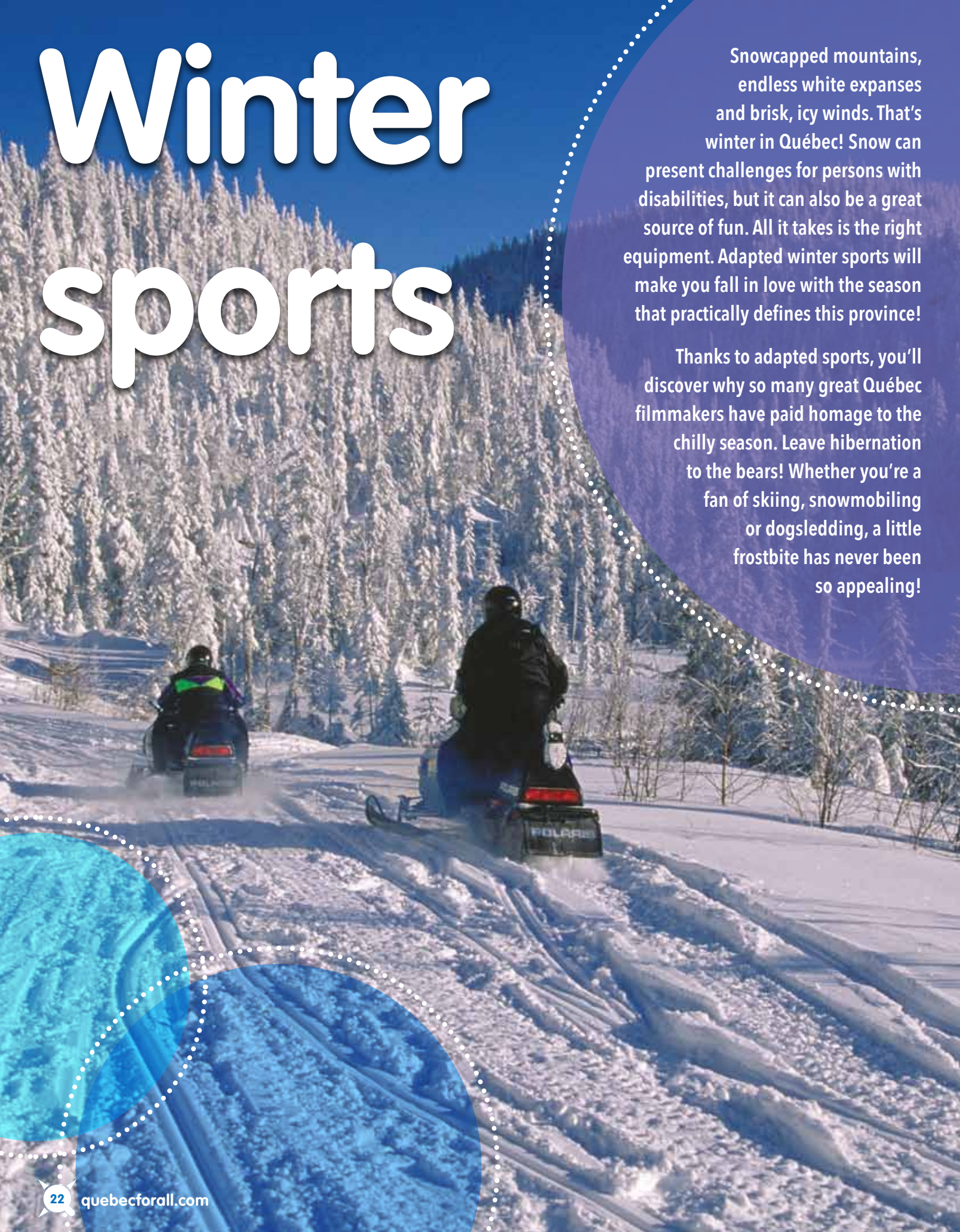

Winter sports

Snowcapped mountains, endless white expanses and brisk, icy winds. That's winter in Québec! Snow can present challenges for persons with disabilities, but it can also be a great source of fun. All it takes is the right equipment. Adapted winter sports will make you fall in love with the season that practically defines this province!

Thanks to adapted sports, you'll discover why so many great Québec filmmakers have paid homage to the chilly season. Leave hibernation to the bears! Whether you're a fan of skiing, snowmobiling or dogsledding, a little frostbite has never been so appealing!



Dogsledding

A traditional form of transportation among indigenous people in the far north, dogsledding has inspired Quebecers' imagination for generations. It may not be as popular as it once was, but no one can resist hopping on a sled when the opportunity arises! Dog teams generally consist of four to nine canines. The most popular breeds are Siberian Huskies and Alaskan Malamutes. The driver is called a "musher," a name that actually derives from the French word "marcher," meaning "walk!"

Animal lovers in particular will find this activity exhilarating. Dogsledding is really a team sport, and the musher has to guide his pack with confidence, discipline and compassion. When you first launch over the silent white snowdrifts, you will feel an instant bond with the dogs, the only sound their rhythmic panting as they joyfully release their pent-up energy.

Kinadapt maintains more than 20 km (12.5 mi.) of trails and is the only Québec company to offer adapted dogsleds. You can also take a ride on a sled operated by an experienced guide. For adventurers with more mobility, Kinadapt also offers skijoring, dog pack training sessions, snowshoeing, canicross, hiking, mountain biking, forest survival and orienteering sessions and maple syrup workshops.

Snowmobiling

Québec is the birthplace of snowmobiling. In the 1930s, Joseph-Armand Bombardier invented the first version of the snowmobile as a way to overcome rural isolation in winter. ..... Adapted skiing

You'll reach new heights enjoying this exciting sport! What better way to take in Québec's frozen landscapes while getting your daily dose of vitamin D? Beginners can develop their skills standing or sitting, depending on their needs. With adapted skiing, you don't have to be an athlete to hit the slopes! Fees usually include equipment rental, making for a relatively affordable winter outing.

Examples of adapted equipment include:

Mountain Man: bi-ski with attached seat. Bi-skis can be maneuvered by one person with the help of ski poles or guided by a companion stationed behind the seat.

Dualski (or sit-ski): similar to the Mountain Man, the dualski's seat is more flexible with more points of articulation. It can also be maneuvered solo or by a companion.

Tandemski: as the name suggests, this ski is made to be used in tandem. A second person can attach their ski boots at the back using specially designed clips.

Three-track skiing with crutch-skis (outriggers): adapted equipment for single-leg amputees.

Four-track skiing with crutch-skis (outriggers): used standing up, this option is ideal for persons with motor skill difficulties who do not use a wheelchair.

Aboriginal Québec: Traditional territories are becoming more accessible

According to the adage, you need to know where you're from to know where you're going. These words couldn't ring more true for First Nations and Inuit communities, who value a strong connection to their ancestors. Naturally, Aboriginal peoples pass down knowledge out of a profound respect for tradition.



Origin stories



The history of Québec's First Nations dates back thousands of years. To discover the wisdom and know-how handed down over the generations, take a captivating trip to explore the roots of Aboriginal communities. If you're curious, museums, cultural centres and interpretive sites welcome visitors with reduced mobility. Accessible destinations include the Musée des Abénakis in the Centre-du-Québec region, which is the first Aboriginal museum in the province to showcase the Odanak community's history and traditions. In nearby Montérégie, the Maison amérindienne is a meeting place where visitors can share ideas and engage in discussion. The property also features a historically significant sugar bush. Further north, the Musée amérindien de Mashteuiatsh gives visitors a first-hand experience of the traditional and contemporary culture of Lac Saint-Jean's Innu. To the east, the Maison de la culture innue celebrates culture, language and inter-cultural relationships through its permanent exhibition, *The World of the Innu of Ekuanitshit*. And across the Saint Lawrence is Gaspé's Micmac Interpretation Site of Gespeg, where you can explore authentic Mi'kmaq traditions through the ages, their relationship to the land, as well as their history and culture.

Some other destinations include a traditional longhouse at the Onhoûa Chetek8e Huron site or Raquettes et Artisanat Gros-Louis, an artisanal workshop and store. From lively pow-wows to fire-side storytelling, there are countless opportunities to explore Québec's diverse and age-old Aboriginal cultures. Through music, dance, spirituality, legends, arts and crafts, encounter a whole new world that's close to home.

YOUR TICKET TO ADVENTURE

For thousands of years, First Nations peoples' relationship with nature, including its seasons and resources, has been rooted in respect. Aboriginals are experts in their ancestral territories, making

them ideal guides for all kinds of outdoor activities. Not only can you experience hunting and fishing in Aboriginal lodges, but you can observe Québec's incredible wildlife. The Innu community of Essipit is one of many destinations offering whale-watching tours. Stay at the Natakam condo hotel units, where you can wake up with the whales.

HOSPITALITY COMES NATURALLY

Kwe, kway, kwey, kwei, wachiyeh, wachiya, ullaakkut, ské:kon and bonjour are just some of the ways to say hello in Québec's Inuit and First Nations communities. There's no better way to experience age-old hospitality than at the Hôtel-Musée Premières Nations, a four-star hotel and shop in Wendake, near Québec City. The hotel also features the renowned La Traite restaurant, specializing in boreal cuisine.

WHAT ABOUT ACCESSIBILITY?

Many Aboriginal tourism businesses are developing and implementing accessible practices to meet the needs of all international travellers, whatever their situation. These new policies also follow the First Nations tradition of respecting community elders. More than ever, these strong inclusive values and

the growing trend toward accountability for universally accessible tourism allow First Nations businesses to provide visitors with great experiences. These are the values underlying the agreement between Kéroul and Québec Aboriginal Tourism.

The concept allows artisans to open their workshops to the public so they can share their knowledge and passion and sell products made on the premises. An ÉCONOMUSÉE® helps visitors discover local culture, support the regions and their local economy, and contribute to the promotion of unique and authentic products. In the current era of globalization and mass production, a little foray into the world of artisans and enterprises that value all things local can be a breath of fresh air.

What happens when you walk through the doors of an ÉCONOMUSÉE®? You are received! This word is more than a simple cliché or an empty promise; it is written into the DNA of all artisan members of the ÉCONOMUSÉE® network. An ÉCONOMUSÉE® has six components, one of which is "reception." While the artisan members of our Society are chosen for the quality of their work, they must also enjoy sharing their passion and their knowledge with the public.

When you arrive, be prepared for an ÉCONOMUSÉE® experience. You will get to meet and spend time with the artisan. The concept that began in Québec has expanded beyond the province's borders. There are economuseums in the Maritimes and on the other side of the country, in British Columbia. Seven countries in northern Europe have opened economuseums since 2008: Norway, Sweden, Iceland, Northern Ireland, Ireland, Greenland and the Faroe Islands.

Our artisans are passionate people who love to share their enthusiasm for their craft. Locations are accessible, largely open year-round, and offer personalized visits tailored to you. The artisans are at once fierce guardians of our heritage, creators of unique and authentic high-quality products, and promoters of sustainable and responsible cultural tourism, veritable experts with knowledge waiting to be shared and discovered. Just ask "Ben à Ben" from the Îles-de-la-Madeleine's *Fumoir d'Antan*, whose historic buildings are a testament to the golden age of smoked herring.

There is something for everyone. Heritage lovers will have a weakness for products with a strong local identity. Blueberries fall into this category, as do maple products, cheese made from the Canadienne breed of cows—whose origins date back to the early days of New France—and flour ground at one of the rare sites to feature a group of mills. Devotees of innovation will identify with the successes enjoyed by the viniculture industry or by the white porcelain that is the fruit of artisanal perseverance.

The list could go on and on. So why not head out and start meeting these exceptional ambassadors? They each have a story to tell that's their own—unique and authentic!

Advice from our seasoned travellers

KNOW WHAT YOU LIKE

Choose your destination based on your tastes (culture, outdoor activities, rest, etc.) as well as on accessibility.

Determine your abilities and whether they have changed since your last trip, especially if your limitation is related to an accident, illness or aging.

Take precautions and think “convenience”: remember to have at hand your travel insurance, medical record, doctor contact details, usual medications and first aid kit.

Before you leave, why not have a look at your wheelchair or orthopedic provider or manufacturer for a tuning?

GET THE MOST OUT OF YOUR TRIP THROUGH CAREFUL PLANNING

The more research you do on accessible locations, the more accessible your vacation will be. Even if you find an accommodating hotel, it still has to be located in an area with accessible restaurants, activities and transportation.

Talk to other disabled people with needs similar to yours.

Don't hesitate to visit forums, blogs and Web sites on accessible travel in order to view the comments of other disabled persons. Be sure the information is current.

TALK TO A TRAVEL AGENT

A travel agent who has been trained to meet the needs of disabled persons can make all the difference when it comes to the quality and enjoyment of your vacation.

BOOK AHEAD OF TIME

Accessible hotels generally have only a few rooms set aside for disabled guests. So it's always best to book in advance and request a booking confirmation if possible. It's also useful to know that urban centres offer a greater number of accessible rooms, that rooms with two beds are limited, and that accessible bathrooms sometimes come equipped with a shower or with a bath and this may vary from location to location. If you require a bath seat, mention this to your hotel establishment.

To make your travels easier and more enjoyable, we recommend that you reserve your transportation 48 hours in advance to clarify the special services required by the agent at the time of booking and learn about maps to the accompaniment.

SPECIFY YOUR NEEDS

Be sure to specify your limitations and any special needs when booking your lodgings and transportation. Also, contact the establishment again to confirm everything 48 hours in advance.

CAREFULLY PLAN YOUR ITINERARY

Knowing what to expect will make life a lot easier once you reach your destination. Often there is more than one way to get somewhere. Some locations are much more accessible than others. Will it be easy for you to travel to and from your destination? These are all things that need to be checked out!

HAVE A BACKUP PLAN

Even the best laid travel plans can go awry. What will you do when faced with an unexpected situation or obstacle (for example, a transportation strike, a wheelchair battery that suddenly stops working, a booking error, a room with a bed that isn't what was promised?) Be sure to have a plan B or the name of someone you can call for help making alternative arrangements.

ENJOY THE RIDE

Vacations are meant to be fun but are not always worry free. Keep in mind, however, that travel means you will step out of your comfort zone and that every problem has a solution.

So you've planned your trip carefully, you've consulted other disabled persons, and you have a plan B. Now it's time to enjoy your vacation and that included using humour to cope with any unforeseen situation that may arise. After all, such events are all part of the travel experience.

TOURIST AND LEISURE COMPANION STICKER

The Tourist and Leisure Companion Sticker gives free access to the companion of a person with a permanent disability or mental illness to participating tourist sites and leisure excursions.

Travelling with dignity

Montreal-Trudeau International Airport (YUL) opens a specially-equipped washroom and changing facility for people with reduced mobility that is the first of its kind at an airport outside Germany or the United Kingdom.

Travelling can be a major challenge for people with reduced mobility, severe disabilities or specialized needs. And while many airports and airlines offer wheelchair and other services for the disabled, few currently provide fully-equipped washroom and changing facilities specifically designed for them.

Montreal-Trudeau International Airport recently opened such a facility in its international arrivals hall, equipped with a winch and changing table for adults. A second facility will open shortly in the airport's domestic departures area, representing a total investment of nearly \$600,000 CAN.

"This is the first public hygiene room of its kind in Québec and in an airport in North America," says Philippe Rainville, President and Chief Executive Officer of Aéroports de Montréal (ADM), the administrator of Montreal-Trudeau. "In fact, it is believed to be the first of its kind in operation at an airport outside Germany or the United Kingdom. It improves the chances for people with reduced mobility to feel comfortable and able to explore and discover the world. We hope it will be the first of many changing rooms launched in Canada."

The facility was designed in consultation with several groups dedicated to defending the right to dignity for disabled people by ensuring they have access to rooms adapted to their special needs in public places. The groups included Kéroul, the Association de la Rive Sud pour la Déficience Intellectuelle, and the MEMO-Qc - Moelle épinière et motricité Québec. Changing Places in the United Kingdom was also a source of inspiration for the project.

In keeping with best practices developed by these and other groups, people wanting to use the hygiene room are asked to press a button near the door. This puts them in contact with an attendant who will quickly open the door. Following each use, an alert is automatically sent to the airport's cleaning crew to ensure the facility is always clean for people who need them.

Mr. Rainville notes that ADM strongly believes in catering to the different needs of Montreal-Trudeau airport users. The airport has been carefully designed to facilitate access to visitors with limited mobility and offers a range of special services for the visually and hearing impaired as well.

For example, the terminal entrances are equipped with oversized revolving doors and slow-motion buttons. Inside, the terminal

features wheelchair-accessible ramps, information counters, check-in counters, self-service check-in kiosks, public pay telephones, automated teller machines (ATMs) and even drinking water fountains. All washrooms feature doorless entrances and are equipped with toilet stalls adapted for use by people with limited mobility. In the international and transborder jetties, single-occupant unisex washrooms equipped with hands-free faucets and emergency call buttons are accessible to people in wheelchairs. Even the use of carpeting in the terminal has been minimized to facilitate wheelchair movement.

For the hearing impaired, TTY (text) telephones are available at every bank of public telephones in the terminal and boarding areas, and visual fire alarms (strokes) are also located in public areas. For the visually impaired, braille signs are located at entrances to all public washrooms and all elevators, escalators and moving sidewalks are equipped with braille signage.

"We are proud to be a pioneer and leader in this field," says Rainville, noting that ADM has also introduced a program called Children in First, which allows children with autism spectrum disorders and their families to familiarize themselves with the airport process, enabling them to travel for the first time.
