A NEW FORMULA OF AGREEMENT ON DEBT MORATORIUM IS PRESENTED

Latest Proposal Telephoned to Washington in Hope that a Reply Might Be Obtained Before Negotiations Are Reopened This Afternoon Between United States and French Representatives.

PARIS, July 6.—The Havas news agency today said Finance Minister Pierre Flandin, United States Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon and United States Ambassador Walter Edge today had arranged a new formula of agreement on the Hoover war debt moratorium proposal which would be telephoned to Washington in the hope that a reply might be obtained before three o'clock this afternoon when negotiations are to be reopened.

PROBLEM OF DELIVERIES IN KIND IS STUMBLING BLOCK TO AGREEMENT

PARIS, July 6.—The sole stumbling block to completion of a Franco-United States accord on the application of President Hoover's war debt plan today appeared to be the problem as to whether deliveries in kind by Germany should or should not be suspended.

The United States is willing to delegate this issue to a commission of experts, with the understanding that its decision will be in harmony with the spirit of the President's proposal that there should be a real and entire suspension of reparations payments by Germany during one year.

Negotiations between Secretary of the Treasury Andrew T. Mellon, Ambassador Walter Edge and Pierre Flandin, the French Finance Minister, so far have failed to produce an understanding on this point. As the United States understands it, the French position is that France accepts the idea of the commission, but on condition that its decision will be along French lines. France believes it is impossible to cancel reparations already made for deliveries in kind.

Just before noon today it was announced at the United States embassy that another meeting between the French and United States negotiators had been called for three o'clock, and that both sides hoped that the unsettled point would be clarified.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—Although the remaining difference was described as "crucial" because it might affect the spirit of the moratorium proposal, President Hoover today hoped that his representatives in Paris would be able to reconcile the French and United States viewpoints.

Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon and Ambassador Walter Edge had fresh instructions from their chief for today's negotiations in Paris. They were told not to accept a French plan to give unlimited freedom to technical experts who would work out details necessary for a year's suspension of war debt and reparations payments.

The remaining point of variance, which a high administration authority described as both crucial and critical, involved reparations in kind.

France suggested that arrangements with reference to these reparations, which would amount to \$200,000,000 more between July 1st, 1931, and June 30, 1932, be left wholly to the technical experts. The United States insisted, however, that these negotiators be instructed to evolve a plan in no way affecting the principle of the president's idea.

WILL ACT AS ADMINISTRATOR OF DEBT.—TORONTO, July 6.—Sir William Mulock, Chief Justice of Ontario, was sworn in on Saturday as administrator of the province to designate during the two months' leave an absence of Hon. W. D. Ross, Lieutenant-Governor. The ceremony was performed at the presence of Premier Henry and members of the Cabinet, the oath of office being administered by E. J. Lemaire, clerk of the Privy Council, Ottawa.

THE WEATHER
WARM, WITH LOCAL THUNDERSTORMS
Depressions of considerable intensity are centred over Northern Quebec and Northeastern Manitoba, while pressure is relatively high over the greater part of the Southern States. THE PREPONDERANCE OF WOMEN IN GREAT BRITAIN GROWS

LONDON, July 6.—Preliminary summaries of the census taken on April 26th, show the population of England and Wales totals 39,947,931. This figure exceeds that of the 1921 census by 2,061,232. The new total shows 19,138,844 males and 20,809,087 females.

The present excess of females over males represents a ratio of 1.087 to 1.000, which is higher than any corresponding ratio period to 1921, and compares with the pre-war ratio of 1.068 to 1.000.

A WELL KNOWN COATCOOK MAN PASSED AWAY
Mr. Andre Rousseau Died Saturday After Two Years' Illness—Occupied Position on Canadian Customs Staff for Fifteen Years.

COATCOOK, July 6.—Coatcook and vicinity today mourns the loss of one of its most prominent and esteemed citizens in the person of Mr. Andre Rousseau, who passed away on Saturday. Mr. Rousseau had been a member of the Canadian Customs staff at Coatcook for the past fifteen years.

Mr. Rousseau was born in the County of Beauce in 1862, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Rousseau, who at one time resided in Cookshire. In 1890 he married Miss Anna Dundin, of Huntingville, and came to Coatcook to reside thirty-one years ago. At that time he was the popular proprietor and owner of the Grand Central Hotel, Cookshire.

Mr. Rousseau was an honored member of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, of the Coatcook Zouaves, the Coatcook branch of the Knights of Columbus and the Canadian Order of Foresters. In failing health the past two years, Mr. Rousseau was obliged to relinquish his official duties last year.

Besides his widow and one son, Mr. Hubert Rousseau, Wellington street, Mr. Rousseau leaves two twin granddaughters, Jocelyn and Pauline Rousseau; three sisters, Mrs. George Dumont and Mrs. A. Mignault, of Cookshire, and Mrs. H. Dumont, of Coatcook, and seven brothers, Messrs. Joseph Rousseau, of Rimford, Me., Ulric Rousseau, of Cookshire, Edouard Rousseau, of Montreal, Moise Rousseau, of Sherbrooke, Onesime Rousseau, ex-mayor of Coatcook, and Achille Rousseau, of St. Hyacinthe.

The funeral service will be held tomorrow morning at St. John's Evangelist Church at 9 o'clock (D.S.T.) Burial will take place in the family plot at Cookshire.

EXPLORER WILL TRY TO LOCATE ITALIA PARTY
General Umberto Nobile, Italian Explorer Who Commanded Dirigible Italia, Will Be Aboard Russian Ice-Breaker Malinin, Which Sails for Archangel on July 15.

MOSCOW, U.S.S.R., July 6.—General Umberto Nobile, Italian explorer who commanded the dirigible Italia, will be aboard the Russian ice-breaker Malinin when she sails for Archangel on July 15 for an expedition into the far north. He hopes that he may find Raoul Amundsen and the men of the Italia expedition.

Many Arctic experts have expressed a belief in the possibility that the six men of the dirigible's crew who are missing, as well as Amundsen and his aid, who disappeared after flying to the rescue of the Italia, may be found in the region of Cape Flora.

MARSBORO MAN WAS DROWNED NEAR MEGANTIC

Eli Roy, 29, Waded into Water on Horseback and Was Thrown from Horse—Body Recovered Shortly After, But Artificial Respiration Failed.

LAKE MEGANTIC, July 6.—In the sight of many holiday seekers, including his wife and three small children, Eli Roy, of Marsboro, was drowned at Victoria wharf, eight miles from here, yesterday afternoon. Roy, who had occupied a farm in Marsboro for the past two years, had driven his family in a buggy to the resort and had unhitched the horse. On horseback, Roy waded into the water, but his steed became frightened. In the resulting attempt of the horse to reach land the rider was injured and disappeared beneath the surface.

The body was recovered shortly afterwards, but all attempts at respiration failed. It is surmised that the injuries Roy received when he was thrown off the horse were largely responsible for his death. Dr. Dube, the district coroner, is conducting an inquest today.

FIVE HUNDRED KILLED IN U. S. CELEBRATION

Largest Number of July Fourth Deaths in Recent Years Occurred When U. S. Celebrated 155th Anniversary of Its Birth.

NEW YORK, July 6.—The largest number of Fourth of July deaths in recent years occurred in the United States as that nation celebrated the 155th anniversary of its birth.

Close to five hundred persons lost their lives from various causes in the two-day celebration. Estimates from fire departments were but six or only one-half of what they were in 1930.

Automobile accidents and drownings were by far more numerous this year. One hundred and sixty persons, lured to the highways, perished in motor car mishaps, compared to eighty-one last year, while drowning fatalities totaled 181. Almost three times as many persons lost their lives in the water as compared with 1930 when the total was fifty-seven. Twenty-four died from the heat while fourteen were killed in aeroplanes.

INDEX FIGURE OF WHOLESALE PRICES DROPS

Virtually All Classes of Commodities Shared in Downward Price Movement During June.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—Index number of wholesale prices as computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics on the basis 1926 equals 100, fell from 73.0 in May to 72.2 in June, sixty-eight quotations were higher, 94 lower and 340 remained unchanged.

Vegetable products dropped from 59.8 to 58.7, lower prices for flour, bran, shorts, gluten meal, and canned peas and corn influencing the index more than gains for barley, flax, oats and rye. Animal products moved down from 72.7 to 70.9, weaker quotations for leather, steers, calves, lambs, and butter, more than offsetting gains for hogs, hides, and eggs. Fibres, textiles and textile products rose from 74.8 to 75.2 owing chiefly to better prices for silk and raw jute. Wood, wood products and paper fell from 80.8 to 80.2, because of easier prices for hemlock lumber, fir, spruce, and groundwood pulp. Iron and its products changed fractionally from 87.5 to 87.4, on account of lower quotations for shovels and spades. Non-ferrous metals and their products dropped from 63.6 to 62.7, easier prices prevailing for antimony, copper, silver and tin. Non-metallic minerals and their products advanced from 84.7 to 84.8, owing principally to higher prices for cement, plastic and dry press brick. Chemicals and allied products were 86.6 as compared with 87.0, being influenced by reductions in the prices of lithopone, quebracho and log wood extracts.

PLANE PLUNGED INTO CROWD
HILSON, France, July 6.—An aeroplane plunged into a terrified crowd of spectators in an attempt to take off today, killing five persons and injuring ten. The machine was about to rise on its baptismal flight with several passengers at an air show.

MAN ATTACKED AND ROBBED BY THREE THIEVES

Highwaymen Stole Between \$300 and \$400 from Hector Lachapelle Near Granby—Victim Left on Road in Unconscious Condition.

GRANBY, July 6.—Hector Lachapelle, employed at the creamery of Eugene Casavant at Ste. Cecile de Milton, was the victim of a hold-up on Saturday when he was attacked by three men on the highway near Milton. Lachapelle was driving in a horse-drawn vehicle on his way to pay the farmers for their cream, and had between three and four hundred dollars on his person. One of the robbers grabbed hold of the horse's bridle, while a companion struck the victim unconscious and rifled his pockets. Leaving the unfortunate man on the road, the highwaymen made good their escape.

A passing motorist brought the injured man to Granby, where Dr. Goyette examined him and found that his injuries were not of a serious nature. Lachapelle was able to give a description of his attackers, but no arrests have yet been made by the police investigating the matter.

FURTHER AID FOR PRAIRIES BEING PLANNED

Understood that Authority to Spend at Least \$50,000,000 of Federal Money Will Be Requested by Government Before Parliament Prorogues.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—It is authority to spend at least \$50,000,000 of federal money for the relief of Canada's unemployed and the famine-stricken farmers of the Prairie Provinces will, it is generally understood here, be sought by the Dominion Government before Parliament prorogues two weeks hence. How far this sum will go in meeting the urgent problem presented by what Premier Bennett terms "a national calamity," is impossible to say at the moment to say the emergency is receiving practically continuous consideration by the Cabinet, and the most reliable estimate is that not less than \$100,000,000 will be required from governments and municipalities to cope with the distressing situation produced by the total crop failure in southern Saskatchewan and portions of the other two Prairie Provinces, plus the grave unemployment problem.

OTTAWA RIVER CLAIMS EIGHT MORE VICTIMS

Two Other Children Had Narrow Escape When Heavy Rowboat Became Swamped.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 6.—A stiff wind churned the waters of the Ottawa river into death-dealing mood Sunday and caused the drowning of eight members of a cheery boating party.

A small, home-made rowboat in which the merry-makers, ten in number, were crossing from the mainland near here to an island in the middle of the stream, was left at the mercy of the waves when its outboard motor stalled. Some declare the craft capsized when the operator of the boat attempted to cast the motor overboard; a more generally held theory is that the overloaded craft was swamped by the waves.

The victims: George Racicot, aged twenty-eight, owner and operator of the boat. Edith and Liliane Racicot, five and two-and-a-half years respectively, his daughters. Maurice and Charles Laliberte, brothers, eight and ten years respectively, Ottawa. Alice Talbot, seventeen, of Ottawa, aunt of the Laliberte boys and domestic in the Racicot home. Calvin Frith, seventeen, Cummings Bridge, near Ottawa. Bernard Gosselin, seventeen, Montreal Road, near Ottawa.

Two young brothers, Roland and Leo Lacroix, eleven and nine years of age, saved their lives by clinging to the upturned boat until rescuers could row out from shore.

TRUMAN GAYLORD PASSED AWAY FROM HEART
SHELBY, Mich., July 6.—Truman Gaylord, 57, of Pittsburgh, Pa., vice-president of the Westinghouse Electric Company, died suddenly yesterday from a heart attack at his boyhood home here, where he was spending a brief vacation.

SINGING ABILITY FAILS TO SAVE MEN FROM JAIL

CHICAGO, ILL., July 6.—Three men went to jail last night because they could not sing. They were arrested by Policeman Patrick Gaynor on a street corner while fighting to decide which one should be the leader of their singing. He led the trio before Desk Sergeant Murin, who used to be a member of the police quartette, when there was such an organization. "Sing," said the Sergeant. They sang, but at about the fifth bar the Sergeant stopped them. "Your fighting may not have been bad," the Sergeant said, but your singing is terrible. Lock them up."

BAND FESTIVAL AT GRANBY WAS GREAT SUCCESS

Nine Bands from Eastern Townships Took Part in Musical Event—Sherbrooke Harmony Band Second Largest in Attendance.

GRANBY, Que., July 6.—Granby was truly a city of music yesterday, when nine bands from various sections of the Eastern Townships gave concerts at the Fair Grounds in the afternoon in connection with the annual band festival of the Province of Quebec Band Association.

The oldest band in attendance was that from Three Rivers, founded in 1878, comprising sixty-five men in its personnel. The Harmony Band of Sherbrooke was the next largest, having fifty-five men, while the other bands taking part included Shawinigan Falls, forty-two men; Joliette, fifty men; Harmonie Belvoir de Valleyfield, forty men; Drummondville, forty-two men; St. Johns, thirty-seven men; St. Hyacinthe, forty-five men; and Granby, forty-five men.

The day's activities opened with the celebration of music in Minnie Park, after which the bands marched through the city in two sections. The first included the Joliette and St. Hyacinthe bands, who play in high pitch while the second section contained the seven other bands playing in low pitch. In the afternoon each band gave a short concert and these were followed by a concert by the massed bands. In the evening there was a banquet.

The preacher at the Mass was Father Ch. Beaudin, chaplain of St. Louis College.

THREE KILLED AS CAR STALLS ACROSS TRACK

Entire Family Wiped Out in Catastrophe at Valleyfield Level Crossing.

VALLEYFIELD, July 6.—A level crossing accident here on Saturday evening claimed the lives of three persons, Philip Decoste, aged twenty-six, of Massena, N.Y., his twenty-four year old wife and their three-year-old child.

The party had come to Valleyfield, bringing back some relatives who had been staying with them. They left the relatives at their home and started back for Massena. When reaching the crossing their view was obstructed by a string of freight cars and the driver could not see the oncoming train. They started to cross the tracks when their engine stalled in the path of the oncoming train, which struck the vehicle broadside. Mr. and Mrs. Decoste were killed instantly, while the youngest lived but a few minutes.

FERGUSON TO VISIT CANADA

CANADA-AUSTRALIA TRADE PACT DRAWN UP DURING PAST WEEK-END

Expect Document Will Be Presented Simultaneously in Ottawa and Canberra on Wednesday—Substantial Preferences Understood to Have Been Made by Both Nations.

McGOVERN IS CARRYING ON A LONE FIGHT

Suspended Member of British House of Commons Tried to Hold Meeting in Glasgow Green, But Was Unsuccessful.

GLASGOW, Scotland, July 6.—John McGovern, Independent Labor Party member of the House of Commons for Shettleston, Glasgow, suspended from the House last week for the remainder of the session for disobedience to the House rules, is carrying on his fight. McGovern was suspended after he repeatedly tried to question the Secretary-of-State for Scotland in connection with the imprisonment of lay preachers who had been speaking in Glasgow Green, where meetings are forbidden.

Yesterday McGovern attempted to speak on Glasgow Green himself. A large crowd had gathered. Immediately he arose, a police inspector demanded to see his permit for the meeting, and McGovern had none. The inspector took McGovern's name and those of a dozen supporters.

"If we are prosecuted and fined, the fines will not be paid by me or anybody on my behalf," McGovern declared. He also asserted he was securing legal opinion on the action of the Speaker of the House, which he deemed illegal because he felt the Speaker should have adjourned the House before allowing any servants of the House to cross the bar.

McGovern's attitude in the House had caused a brief fight between himself and colleagues on one hand and attendants of the House on the other.

STALIN FINDS PRESENT WAGE PLAN USELESS

Abandonment of Equal Wages for All and Return to Principle of Individualism Is Recommended by Dictator.

MOSCOW, July 6.—Radical changes in connection with the Russian industrial machine, involving the virtual abandonment of the current Soviet scheme of equal wages for all, is proposed in the latest public utterance of Joseph Stalin.

In a speech which closed the conference of industrialists June 23, which was only made public today, the "father of the New Russia," took stock of the country at the end of the first five months of the year. He then declared that several changes were necessary and outlined a future programme, embracing the following six points:

Readjustment of wages to make the scale commensurate with the type of labor performed; the halt of workers from shifting from one place to another to improve their living conditions. Remedy of the growing labor shortage by attracting more peasants to industries as agriculture progresses toward mechanization. Improvement of the organization of labor in industry in order to distribute the proper strength among factories and to end "irresponsible" methods.

To have the working class develop its own "intelligence" of such skilled workers as engineers and technicians. To change the policy toward specialists of the old order to attract more of them to industry. To increase the interior sources of industry and develop the piece-work system.

He also proposed the reversal to individualism from collective business administration, saying that new conditions demand new methods. Stalin accused some of his comrades of continuing to work on the old lines despite a fundamental change of conditions of developing industry which required new methods of management. Notwithstanding this, he asserted that "the production programme of 1931 is real and accomplishable."

"Fulfillment of the production plan depends solely on ourselves and on our ability to utilize the existing wealth of opportunities. This is proved by the fact that the large numbers of factories and industries already have exceeded our plans. The reality of our production plans is ensured by millions of toilers creating new life, by our will to labor and our readiness to work

CANBERRA, Australia, July 6.—A preferential trade treaty between Canada and Australia was drawn up over the week-end and is expected to be presented simultaneously in Ottawa and Canberra on Wednesday.

It is understood that Canada grants substantial preferences to Australia on dried, canned and fresh fruits, wines and other primary products and that Canadian lumber, canned fish and motor chassis will be allowed preferential entry into Australia.

CIVILIZATION PROVES TOO MUCH FOR ESKIMO HUNTER

Member of Arctic Expedition Became Violently Demented When Shown First Movie in Faroe Islands.

COPENHAGEN, July 6.—His first visit to civilization was too much for Otto Knudsen, Eskimo hunter of the Lange Koch Arctic expedition, who became violently demented when he saw his first movie at Thorshavn, Faroe Island. His companions overpowered him and lashed him to his berth in the steamer Tjaldir which brought him to Copenhagen yesterday.

CALGARY AGITATORS SEEM TO FEAR POLICE BATONS

On Hearing of Police Preparations Against Rioters, Indignation Meeting Adjourned to Vacant Lot.

CALGARY, Alta., July 6.—Calgary police stood by last night for riot that failed to materialize. Two hundred members of the National Unemployed Workers' Association gathered in the centre of the city to hold a mass meeting in protest against police action in arresting a dozen members of their organization during a disturbance last Monday.

Police ordered the crowd off the streets, and the meeting resumed on a vacant lot a few blocks from the city police station. Speakers at the gathering, which concluded without trouble, charged police with being brutal.

CAMP EXPLOSION RESULTS IN DEATH OF TWO PERSONS

Third Seriously Burned in Rushing to Assistance of Victims of Explosion Near Pittsfield, Mass.

PITTSFIELD, Mass., July 6.—Two persons died yesterday and a third was in a critical condition as a result of burns suffered in an explosion last night at Camp Greylack, Becket.

The dead were Albert H. Greb, aged 54, Pittsfield, caretaker of the camp, and Mrs. Lucy Stedley, aged 54, Pittsfield, a maid. Greb's wife sustained burns about the face and shoulders when she went to her husband's aid.

KOREANS SLAUGHTERED MANY CHINESE RESIDENTS

Night of Sorrow Reigns in Chinese Colony of Seoul as Natives Go on Murder Spree.

SEOUL, Korea, July 6.—Twenty-nine persons were killed and about three hundred injured during the night in an outbreak of violence against the Chinese colony by a mob of Koreans. More than a hundred Chinese residences were destroyed and their helpless inmates dragged into the streets where they were slaughtered. Only those who succeeded in reaching the police station were saved.

LARGE LOSS FOR WELSH STEEL COMPANY

CARDIFF, Wales, July 6.—The Great Ebbw Vale Steel Company reports a total net loss for the past year of \$1,720,000. This increased the adverse balance carried forward to nearly \$10,000,000.

CHINESE CURRENCY OF GOLD BASIS

HONG KONG, July 6.—The new national government at Canton, organized in opposition to the Nationalist government at Nanking, announced today that it would put its currency on a gold basis toward the end of the year.

LONDON WRITER
STATES NELSON
WAS A SUICIDE

Thinks Hero of Trafalgar, With Superb Sense of Dramatic, Contrived to Become Target for French Bullet.

LONDON, Eng., July 6.—Trafalgar Day, the anniversary of the day Nelson hoisted his immortal signal and was shot and died in the Victory is celebrated annually. A writer declares that Nelson as good as committed suicide.

He got himself shot because society spurned his "Dear Emma," Lady Hamilton.

THE INFLUENCE
OF ENGLISH ON
PARISIAN GIRLS

Thousands of English Girls Work in Paris, Where They Have Made Deep Impression on Life and Viewpoint of French Colleagues.

LONDON, July 6.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily News says: All English girls in Paris, whether holiday makers, school-girls' wage earning residents or students, are classified by Frenchmen under the general and comprehensive title of "Les Miss."

"Les Miss," are very numerous in Paris, in fact, there are more English girls here just now than there have been before at this time of the year. All English girls in Paris are not tourists of course. Many are residents either from choice or necessity, and many earn their living in France because there is no work for them in Great Britain. There is a vast colony of secretaries, shorthand typists, translators, telephone operators, hotel clerks and dressmakers' assistants, all of whom are very like their sisters in London, except that they are usually a little better paid and consequently better dressed.

It is probably true to say that much of the present tendency of French girls towards greater economic and moral intelligence, their keener interest in physical fitness, their unquenchable desire to be the comrades and equals of their husbands and brothers, their widening knowledge of English literature and drama, and their growing taste for travel, can be traced to the unconscious influence and example of the "English Miss in Paris."

They have taught Paris to drink tea, for example, English tea-rooms catering for tourists abound, but besides these are many purely French establishments where English visitors rarely penetrate, yet where none the less four or five o'clock in the afternoon find crowds of Parisian girls drinking tea which ten years ago they would have despised as "insipid refreshment from the *outré* *Manche*."

They have taught Paris to drink tea, for example, English tea-rooms catering for tourists abound, but besides these are many purely French establishments where English visitors rarely penetrate, yet where none the less four or five o'clock in the afternoon find crowds of Parisian girls drinking tea which ten years ago they would have despised as "insipid refreshment from the *outré* *Manche*."

Swimming is another thing the English girl has taught the French. Statistics quoted, with many exclamations, by a sporting authority here the other day show that swimming and diving are now more popular here among girls than among young men. HISTORIC OLD
LONDON TOWER
IS SLIPPING

Estimated that Structure Has Moved Two Millimetres in Past Ten Years.

LONDON, July 6.—The Tower of London is slipping into the Thames! No one has noticed this backsliding of one of London's most ancient and venerable institutions, except the officials of the National Physical Laboratory, who keep their hawk-like eyes on every movement of everything.

According to their report, which has been issued, the Salt Tower at the Tower of London is moving towards the river bank at the rate of half a millimetre a year.

Meanwhile, the quay wall at the Tower is wandering off, too, but that is slipping away from the river bank. In the last ten years it has moved two millimetres.

Of course, if such a stout old pile as the Tower of London can slip away we might expect some of our newer buildings to be fairly dancing about.

But the National Physical Laboratory watch that. If there is any vibration or other movement anywhere they keep an eye on it. Even Scotland-yard has largely come under this notice—and has been regarded with suspicion—for observation.

Not only do the officials of this laboratory perform the service of watching the foundations of London's buildings, but they also conduct valuable researches into other matters.

For instance, they have helped considerably by their experiments in the designing and construction of aircraft.

They made very valuable contributions to the designs of the seaplanes that competed in the Schneider Trophy by air tunnel tests made on model airplanes.

The prophecies made by the laboratory experts on the highest speeds that would be made were proved to be very nearly correct by the actual performances of the machines in the race.

Again, the novel streamlining and shape of the airship R-101 were decided upon after elaborate tests on models that had been made by the laboratory.

fused with "l'Americaine," or the Italian or German girl, has a surprisingly strong influence in an important corner of Parisian psychology. French girls watch her step, sniff disapprovingly at the length and energy of it, and then proceed to imitate it with excellent results. French youths finding them selves frequently outclassed at swimming or tennis by girls from London or Manchester, develop a painful "he-man" complex and take to physical jerks.

Even the quaint hybrid word "Miss" (used here as a noun and pronounced "Mees") can produce surprisingly effects in Paris. I met a girl the other day who fills an important post in the State Railway Company's engineering department. She is French, but she is known everywhere as "Miss." As "Made-moiselle" it is felt she could not direct a department so successfully.

When the Gossip once starts a lie on its journey it is astonishing how hard it is to get it out of circulation. You may chase it and beat it over the head until it seems to have given up the ghost, but the next day it is still a healthy bacilli.

LET US REMOVE ANTAGONISM AND SUPPRESS PREJUDICE.

Because the men who develop electric hydro-power in the province of Quebec realize that they are basic partners in industrial enterprise, this province has made tremendous advances in the production of its natural resources and in providing employment for its increasing population.

Towns, villages and industries have been built up in Quebec through the close personal co-operation of the power developers. They realize that they must find customers for the power they have to sell, and they, therefore, promote the interests of their customers in every logical way.

We have not been as close as we should have been in alliance with the industrial promoters chiefly because of inherited prejudices and vendettas which may be cleared away in good time.

But Sherbrooke may soon join in the industrial activity of other towns, for it is the only city in Quebec, outside of Montreal, where residential and industrial advantage can be offered to factory operators.

The city has an abundant labour supply, and has all the magnetism of a metropolis in drawing further numbers to meet any demand.

In some way, in some method which will be profitable and advantageous to the city, the antagonism created by men fast disappearing from public influence or consideration should be removed so that we can overcome the difficulty of having first choice of all new commercial ventures. The Eastern Townships, under the right auspices, can be the industrial center of Canada, just as Lancashire and Yorkshire are in England.

FREEDOM OF THE MAN WHO OPPOSES.

The not-to-be-despised advantage of having a member at either Quebec or Ottawa who is persona grata with the administration in power is something worth thinking about.

Too long we have encouraged the demagogic type who may be against this and against that, and against everything but a desire for notoriety. So that the city has been in an antagonistic attitude towards those who could do it the most good.

This has been true in politics and in power development. The citizens lose out.

There is ever an attraction in the warrior who is at odds with the powers that be. The man in Opposition has ever the time of his life in Parliament. He can cheerfully say and do anything he likes without even consulting his leader. It is his opportunity to show his fellows what a real fighting fellow he is. Whilst in opposition an M. P. makes his mark. It is his misfortune to enter the House as a supporter of an administration which is in power and has been.

But he gets nowhere and gets nothing for his constituents.

After all we can thankfully say that Sherbrooke has both asked for and received less in the way of government favours than any city of its size in Canada.

Whereas Vancouver, New Westminster, Quebec, Montreal, Halifax and St. John live on the bounty of those who beseech and beleague the Dominion Treasury.

RICHMOND AND OTHER RAILWAY MATTERS.

Mayor W. J. Ewing, of the Town of Richmond, is making strenuous objection to the proposed removal of the C. N. R. district headquarters from that town, and has been urgent, incisive and logical in his presentation to the management of the Canadian National in Montreal.

From an economic viewpoint the C. N. R. would gain nothing by the demolition of a whole town. On the contrary it would mean a desertion which would only benefit the rival railway.

Richmond is both a pivotal point for the Eastern Townships and a geographically central point for an industrial center which is fast growing in volume of trade and in freight tonnage.

Like in all railway transportation there has been a falling off in revenue, chiefly on account of the door-to-door delivery by motor trucks and busses.

The railways still are, and must continue to be the chief means of economical transportation for the great bulk of the country's commerce. Railways are dependent upon volume if they would hold down their unit costs.

But they have been held in thrall by an overloading Board of Railway Commissioners which has destroyed initiative and delayed the prompt meeting of changing conditions.

One railway system has been looked upon as a milk cow for the gathering of taxes to the tune of \$18,000,000 in a year, whilst the other is maintained as a baby and drinks up all the milk and millions of dollars besides. The system is all wrong.

It is important that the people give earnest consideration to both local and national policies relating to the transportation problems. We must avoid expensive duplication of carrying tracks, and remove the costly plan of irresponsibility hidden behind political direction.

It is imperative that the investment in rail-

way securities be protected and the integrity of the country be upheld. Any other course would break down the efficiency of transportation and jeopardize the general prosperity.

Give the railway a free hand and an equal opportunity and remove the incubus of meddling by commissions composed of busybodies who think they know it all and consequently never learn anything.

But above all break up the cumbersome and clumsy collection of railways, steamships, hotels, ferries and other companies within a company, sell them in detail, and return to the free and open competition which alone inspires to business success.

Have I a constructive suggestion? Any intelligent railway man who gave study to the problem would have.

AN INTERESTED CITY.

Out in the Far West where they only think in millions — and borrow them from the East — a strong claque has been started by the Vancouver Sun on the old "Hands off the C. N. R." cry which so successfully bluffed the King administration into silence.

Every effort is being made to tie up the members of Parliament through their business interests and associations, and effectually put the quietus on any interference in the maladministration of the octopus. And a big corporation can spread its tentacles in cavernous places.

The Vancouver papers are incensed at the reference to the building of a C. N. R. hotel in that city at a cost of \$9,000,000 to the country. The C. N. R. loses money every year on its hotel system, and yet goes farther into more extravagant expenditures. The C. P. R. under private ownership, makes a profit on its chain of hotels.

The Conservatives are not "baiting" the C. N. R., but they will see that it is conducted on business lines and not on lines of extravagance and of inefficiency.

CLOSE UP THE MIQUELON RESORT FOR CREDIT EXTENSION.

It might not be an acceptable suggestion to make, but whilst France is bargaining for more time to pay its debts to the United States, why should not President Hoover ask France to close up the nest of bootleggers in the St. Pierre Islands.

These islands cost Washington more money than ever did the toll of the seas taken by the pirates of old. They might even be said to cost more precious lives than did these bold and bloody marauders who attacked, killed and drowned many hundreds of the early voyagers who were coming to America.

Washington found Ottawa complacent on the eve of an election, and surely the French Government, in its hour of stress and need, would agree to police these islands that they would be as dry as the Arctic zone.

Miquelon and its twin islands could, with the consent of the French Government, be made a nice little temperance resort for those who were fond of cod-fishing. As it stands to-day, it is the greatest menace to the Volstead Act, often called the noble experiment, but more frequently termed the object failure.

EDITOR'S NOTE BOOK.

Hon. Raoul Dandurand, Canada's delegate to the League of Nations, does not believe in disturbances or ought else which may provoke differences. When a Senator sought to have an inquiry as to why England could get along with thirty-two judges and Canada required one hundred and fifty-six, Senator Dandurand thought it should be a judicial enquiry—conducted by the judges who are to be investigated. On the same principle why not let every man be his own lawyer. Or we should have allowed the erring stock-brokers investigate themselves, for it had then been a financial question academically.

Toronto claims to have had twenty-five new industries locate in that city within the past six months, and of the quarter hundred more than half have to do with the manufacture of electric appliances—while radio, electric refrigeration, lead pencils, powder puffs, dictographs and automotive specialties figure in the list. We hope to make the St. Francis Valley the home of the textile, fabric and fabricating industry, but so long as our power utilities are politically operated, it is mighty hard to get the manufacturer to select Sherbrooke, with all its ideal advantages.

TEN NATIONS TAKE PART IN WHEAT PARLEY

Consider Ways and Means of Giving Effect to Conference Resolution — Ten Principal Wheat Exporting Nations of World Represented.

LONDON, July 6.—The ten principal wheat exporting nations of the world were represented at a preliminary meeting today of the continuing committee of the conference of wheat exporting countries which met in May.

The meeting was held in Canada House under the chairmanship of Hon. Howard Ferguson, Canadian Commissioner to Great Britain, who had been chairman of the larger conference.

In its resolutions of May 23rd the Conference of Exporting Nations of Wheat decided to create a continuing committee, the purpose of which would be:

(1) Establishment of a clearing house of information.
(2) To explore all possible avenues for greater utilization of wheat.

(3) Consideration of the draft agenda for the next conference. Today's discussions, it is understood, were confined to ways and means of giving effect to the conference resolution.

The countries represented were the Argentine, Australia, Bulgaria, Canada, Hungary, India, Poland, Rumania, Soviet Russia and the United States.

THREE VAGRANTS SHOWED BISHOP LITTLE RESPECT

After Being Given Meal, Visitors to Hearst Decided to Walk Off With Valuables.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., July 6.—Three men took advantage of the hospitality of a bishop, and robbed him after being given a meal, it has been revealed here.

The description of three men who had been given food at the Bishop's Palace at Hearst, Ont., was sent to Kapskasing, after loss of a number of valuables from the palace was discovered. Three men answering to the description were arrested at Kapskasing, and the missing articles were recovered. They are charged with theft.

PRESS COMMENT

BAITING THE NATIONAL RAILWAYS.

Inspired article from the Vancouver Sun. Eastern Tory politicians are making a dead set against the Canadian National Railways. They will make no political change out of that campaign.

Instead of trying to tear down the great organization Sir Henry Thornton has built up, they should co-operate and assist him in such fine constructive proposals as he advanced yesterday for combining the C.N.R. and C.P.R. coast steamship services.

The methods by which they seek to undermine confidence in the C.N.R. management simply undermine confidence in themselves and the Conservative party.

They attack the \$9,000,000 outlay on the National Hotel in Vancouver. The city paid \$17,000,000 for that hotel. Property worth that sum was needed to the railway on the express agreement that the hotel was to be built.

They criticize the C.N.R. for going into the hotel business at all. The hotels were there before the lines came under public ownership. And from a tourist standpoint, Canada's splendid system of railway hotels is the best drawing card this country has. Americans universally agree there are no hotels in the world to compare with them.

The C.P.R. has 75 millions invested in hotels, the C.N.R. only 22. With the hotel in Vancouver the total will be about 30.

"Competition" was Hon. R. B. Bennett's campaign slogan on railway policy. How can the Canadian National compete unless it has the equipment? And that equipment must be the best.

The public has confidence in the C.N.R. management because that management has been efficient. Was there ever a more hopeless muddle than the jumble of unrelated units taken over by Sir Henry Thornton in 1922? The operating deficit alone was in the tens of millions.

Last year, despite the depression, Sir Henry returned an operating profit of 26 millions. Expenditures, for all of the great improvement in service, have been reduced by 22 millions in eight years. Year by year, up to 1929, before the worldwide trade recession set in, Sir Henry's management had built up the operating surplus to the splendid total of 56 millions, within an ace of covering the whole interest owing to the public.

Skeptics of the calibre of the present sniping crew at Ottawa had predicted the line would never pay a dollar's interest.

This year the profit is naturally curtailed. Every railway has had the same experience. Even the C.P.R. halved its dividend.

Eastern jibes at C.N.R. expenditures developing the West come with ill grace in view of the hundreds of millions spent out of the public treasury in improving Eastern transportation facilities. Westerners contributed their full capital share of the 220 millions that the Dominion has invested in Eastern canals, and of the scores of millions in Eastern harbor development, intercolonial losses, Montreal bridges, etc.

The campaign of baiting the C.N.R. brings discredit upon only one institution in Canada—the Conservative party which sponsors it.

ALL SHOULD BEAR THEIR SHARE OF BLAME

Under the summer holiday season plan which has now been followed by Plymouth and Trinity United Churches for about a decade, the congregations of both these churches worshipped yesterday in Trinity Church under the ministry of Rev. Dr. W. S. Lennox. They will continue so to do during the month of July while Rev. Dr. G. Ellery Read, the minister of Plymouth Church, is having his holidays. 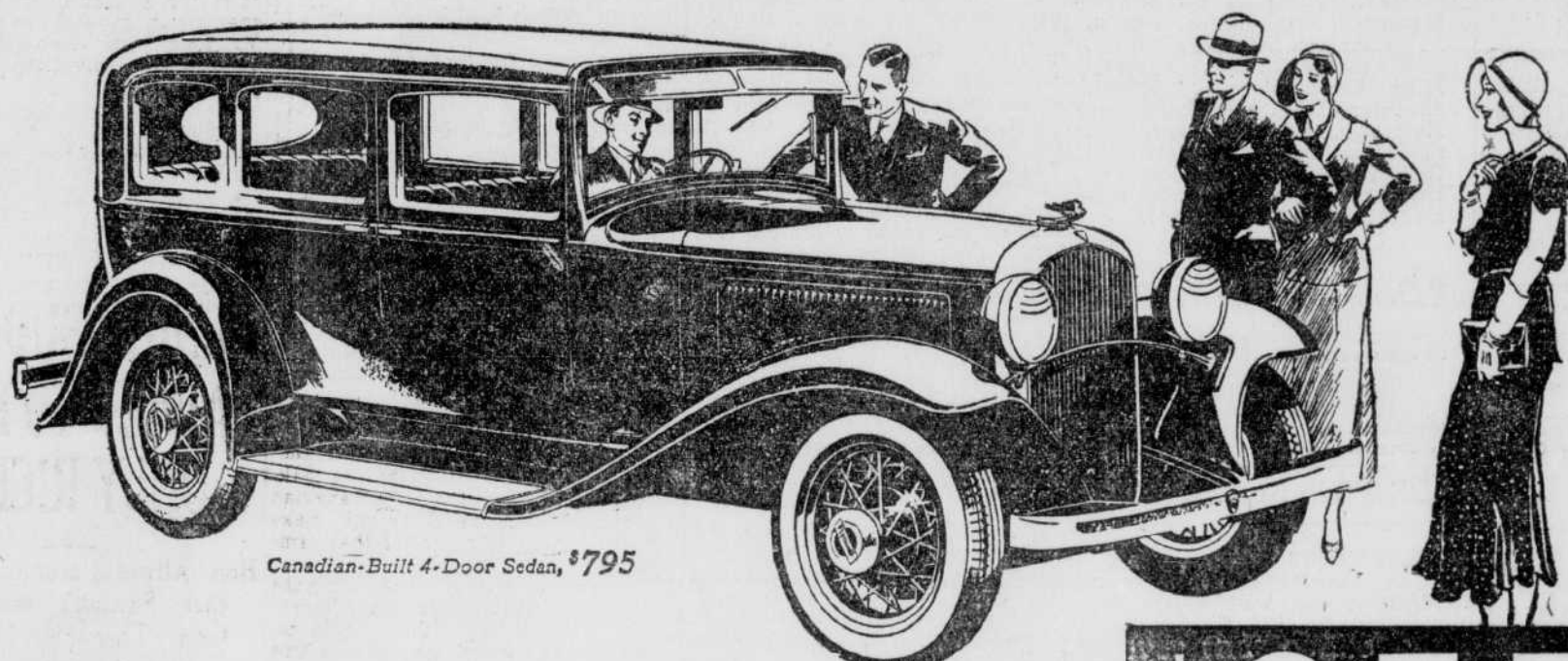

These increases follow a rise in the local market last week of 1c to 1 1/4c per lb. from 20 1/4c to 20 1/2c at the week's opening to a straight 21 1/2c market at the week's close on Saturday. It was the strongest week on the butter market in some time. Strength was given by definite indications that the peak of butter production in Canada has passed. Cheese prices at Montreal last week advanced roughly 1 1/2c per lb., closing the week at 11 1/2c to 11 3/4c per lb. for Ontario cheese, and 11 1/8c to 11 1/4c for Quebec cheese. A better demand for Quebec cheese developed. Cheese receipts at Montreal which have been going up weekly, eased off a little last week from the previous week's peak of 43,717. Further advances in local cheese prices are due today owing to higher country farms Saturday. June cheese is approaching its end and the competition for it apparently sent boards up.

Egg prices maintained the recent steady tone, being practically unchanged in all lines. Carlots were mostly 22c for extras, 17c to 17 1/2c for firsts and 15 1/2c for seconds, for other than British Columbia eggs, the latter being 1c higher. Quotations to retailers were steady, as follows:

PRODUCTION OF ARSENIC HIGH IN DOMINION

While Every Part of Canada Contributes to Output of Arsenic, Ontario Provides Principal Source.

Minerals containing arsenic have a wide-spread occurrence throughout the world, and one or another of them may constitute the principal metallic mineral in an ore; as, for example, smaltite in the silver ores of the Cobalt district. It is rarely, however, that a mine is operated for the production of arsenic alone. Almost invariably it is obtained as a by-product in refining ores that are mined principally for their content of some other metal, such as gold, silver, copper or lead. The main producing countries are the United States, Canada, Mexico, the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Japan.

The presence of minerals containing arsenic has been reported from practically every province in Canada. Production of the metal and its compounds have come mainly from the mines of Ontario, with smaller amounts from British Columbia and Nova Scotia.

In Ontario, arsenic was for many years recovered from the gold ores of the Marmora district, Hastings county, in the south-eastern part of the province. During the time these mines were operating, however, the demand for arsenic was much less than it has become in recent years, and the market price of the product was correspondingly lower. Production ceased in 1903 after attaining a maximum of 800 tons of white arsenic in 1902. At about this time the production of arsenic from the Cobalt district in Northern Ontario commenced, and in 1906 it is recorded that 201 tons of white arsenic were produced from ores from that district at a reduction plant built at Copper Cliff. Following this the refining plant of the principal mine at Deloro was completely remodelled for the treatment of silver-cobalt-arsenic ores and concentrates from the Cobalt district. This plant is now the main source of arsenic production in the Dominion.

Deposits of auriferous arsenopyrite are known in numerous localities throughout a belt extending for many miles eastward from Marmora in the townships immediately north of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway between Montreal and Toronto. It is possible that in the aggregate there is a large reserve of ore available, and that with recovery of the demand for arsenic many of the deposits could be profitably worked. In some places they were erected for the recovery of both gold and arsenic.

Arsenical ores have been reported from a number of other localities in Ontario, as in the Sudbury and Algoma districts; and a few years ago some shipments of arsenical gold concentrates were made from the mine at Honey Gage, about sixty miles from Sudbury. Since 1903, however, practically the whole of the Dominion's output has come from mines in the Cobalt district, which is in the northern section of the province along the line of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, about a hundred miles north of North Bay. The mines here are essentially silver mines, but typical ore contains large amounts of arsenides. Similar conditions apply in the adjacent districts of Gowng and South Lorraines. Ores from these mines have yielded an aggregate of some 57,000 tons of arsenic, or an average of about two thousand tons annually for the past sixteen years. Canada has thus become the largest producer of arsenic in the British Empire, and ranks second or third among the countries of the world as a source of this metal and its compounds.

It can hardly be doubted that many rich veins still remain to be discovered, and that the Cobalt region will long continue to supply arsenic as well as silver and cobalt. The arsenical and cobalt concentrates from the Cobalt district are sent to a refining plant at Deloro in Southern Ontario, where arsenic is recovered mainly as the oxide—white arsenic.

Arsenopyrite is of common occurrence in Nova Scotia, being found as a constituent of the ore in practically all the gold mining districts of the province. Mining has been carried on in some fifty different districts, many of them being in territory served by the Dominion Atlantic Railway. The mines have been operated in the past solely as gold mines. Even when attempts have been made to concentrate the ore after amalgamation, the concentrates have been sold to the smelters for their gold value only. Renewed attention has been directed to the possibility of utilizing these Nova Scotian deposits, and small shipments of arsenical concentrates have been sent to Europe, there being at present no plant in Nova Scotia for treating them. Although in certain parts of the province no-auriferous veins highly mineralized with arsenopyrite have been found, it is not believed that any of the known Nova Scotian deposits can be profitably operated for arsenic alone. The arsenic situation has improved in recent years, however, that the recovery of the metal, or its oxide, as a by-product from the high gold ores in certain districts should be both practicable and profitable.

Arsenical ores have been reported as occurring at a number of localities in British Columbia, both on the mainland and on Vancouver Island, among which is a prospect reported at Wolf Lake near Comox. But, although some of the prospects are promising, no ore bodies of commercial size have yet been proved. There is, however, a recovery of arsenic from the ore of the Nickel Plate Mine at Hedley, about twenty miles north of the international boundary. The concentrates from this mine are all sent to Tacoma, Washington, for treatment.

A GREAT MANY CHANGES MADE IN LABRADOR

Correspondent No Longer a Doubting Thomas Regarding Fine Work Being Carried On—Fine Hospital.

Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell has had many dreams for Labrador and his work there has made many of these come true, thanks to persistent effort, backed by public interest and generosity. Since 1892, many changes for the better have come about, and the new St. Anthony hospital, opened in 1927, by Sir William Alderdice, Governor of Newfoundland, is an outstanding example. It is a modern hospital of 75 beds, with the most recent equipment, and with one ward devoted entirely to children, many of whom are crippled from mal-nutrition. A special correspondent from St. John's, Nfld., had the following to say upon his return from the opening, at which time Dr. Grenfell was knighted by order of His Majesty, King George the Fifth.

"The writer has just had the pleasure of a very interesting visit to St. Anthony, and through the courtesy of Grenfell officials the scope and benefit of the work was viewed at close quarters. Some people must see to believe, and I, previous to my visit, may have deserved enumeration in this class; but, seeing the actual work and the result obtained, I am no longer a doubting Thomas. Faith, courage and an undaunted spirit have made possible the erection of a modern, fireproof hospital, with seven wards, operating room and staff quarters, to replace the old wooden building. In the erection of this new structure, all the skilled work has been done by Newfoundland men who have been trained by the Grenfell Mission. This splendid hospital stands as a monument to the life-work of Dr. Grenfell and a beacon of hope to the sick and suffering of Newfoundland and Labrador."

"Our next visit was to the Orphanage, a spacious, fireproof, serviceable apartment building, with modern equipment of kitchen and laundry; spots, dormitories and laughing well-conducted kiddies under the supervision of a matron.

"Our call at the Grenfell school was indeed a treat. The building has recently been remodelled and enlarged. The average attendance is 110 children. School-work is conducted in well-appointed classrooms.

"The Industrial Department, under the supervision of a trained teacher, is perhaps the main link in the chain of service so ungrudgingly given. Here it is that both men and women are trained in skilled handicrafts—trained to do work that can be commercialized and brings monetary returns wherewith to purchase the necessities of life.

"A visit to St. Anthony will repay ore, for contentment, industry and enlightenment prevail, and the Grenfell service which makes these things possible is deserving of whole-hearted support and co-operation."

As Britain's oldest Colony and integral part of the British Empire, Labrador is fast coming into its own. For many long decades only explorers, the Hudson's Bay Co. and the fisherfolk knew it intimately. Today it is a country much talked about, having a future in which the general public takes a deep interest. One evidence of its value was found in the settlement of the boundary dispute between the Canadian and Newfoundland Labrador and the awarding of the Northern watershed, by decision of the Privy Council of England, to the Colony of Newfoundland. Time was when none knew, and few cared, where this boundary lay, but the interest excited by Great Britain, Canada and Newfoundland in the award has testified to a radical change of attitude toward Labrador. One consolation for Canada was found in the fact that none of this territory has gone outside the British Empire.

This putting of Labrador on the map and finding for these sturdy fisherfolk friends in the outside world has been largely due to the hospital and humanitarian work established by Dr. (now Sir Wilfred) Grenfell and his associates since 1892. Nor could he and his helpers have accomplished what has been done without the interest and generous aid of Mission friends and the public. When Dr. Grenfell arrived in Labrador he found an honest, hard-working people, totally lacking medical and surgical care, uneducated and without adequate schools, earning by diligence a precarious living through fishing, furring and sealing, and carrying on trade mostly through a system of barter. At the present time our northern fishermen are reclaiming their economic freedom, their hope and courage, in a chance to develop their valuable talents, almost lost in the hard struggle of life on the northern frontier. The question is sometimes asked whether this population—resident and transient—is worthy of the effort and money expended upon it. The answer seems to be that there is a sturdy, self-reliant people who are unhappy when taken from their natural environment and who contribute, all out of proportion to their number, to the wealth of the world in fish and fur.

As to the promise which this work holds out for the future, it may be stated that already a marked change for the better has taken place. Schools have been established, the contribution of the people themselves to Grenfell hospitals has increased, and foundation for further industrial development, and better social conditions, laid. When the trend, as at present, is toward centralization in cities, it would seem that any enterprise which tends to keep people in a country where their sturdy qualities and personal resources are developed, is worthy of consideration and support. The object of the Grenfell Mission from the beginning, and its policy throughout, has been and is to help these people to help themselves.

GIANT PLANE WITHOUT CREW IS DESCRIBED

Will Simply Be Receptacle for Heavy Load of Bombs Directed by Wireless from Base Miles Away.

A winged death machine dispatched from afar, defying all defence and raining merciless bombs from the sky on some great enemy city that is the latest contribution of science to the horrors of war. It is a giant armored airplane that operates without a crew its engine and course being controlled by a clock-work "brain."

Writing in the Daily Mail, Harry Harper describes the new weapon as a hollow metal hull which will contain no space for any human occupant. It will simply be a receptacle for a heavy load of bombs, on either side of the tapering stream-lined body will be metal wings; in the bow will be an engine and propeller which will operate automatically; and at the rear will be control surfaces which will also be automatic in their action. Inside the hull, placed carefully in a protected and armored container, will be the mechanical "brain" which will control this winged bomber, which as it rushes high through the air, the gyroscopes in the mechanical brain will establish electrical contacts instantly the machine shows any tendency to deviate from its course, and these in turn will cause a compressed air mechanism to function, which will move elevators, rudders, or so keep the pilotless craft in equilibrium upon an accurate course.

For governing the action of the "brain," a clock-work device will be installed, which will be set beforehand to operate at any given time. After a predetermined distance has been flown, this will cause the engine to stop, and the manless machine, with its deadly load, darts downward and rushes headlong to earth. It is now possible to combine with the gyroscopic form of control another device which operates in much the same way as do the paper music-rolls which we pass through our automatic pianos. Obtaining meteorological data as to the wind-strength and other conditions at varying altitudes along the course which the aerial Robot is to follow, those controlling the flight of the winged projectile will perforate a paper strip before it is launched. This strip will be inserted in an apparatus provided in the machine, and will constitute a special series of instructions for the flight. These "orders" the manless craft will obey implicitly as its interior machinery causes the paper strip to unwind.

It will be possible, for example, to make the airplane fly a certain distance at a predetermined height, and then climb automatically to some higher altitude. It may also be made to proceed for so many miles in one direction, then alter its path and fly for a certain time on another course, and afterwards, if necessary, resume its

SENATORS TOOK INITIAL GAME FROM MACKMEN

Good Pitching Was Rule in Major League Games Yesterday—Brooklyn Took Series from New York Giants.

NEW YORK, July 6.—The Boston Braves are finding a lot of work in their task of locating a satisfactory third baseman, but even if they find one, they will have to wait a long time before they can expect to see him in the field. The Braves' new third baseman, Fred Frankhouse, who did not perform with special brilliance after he was obtained from St. Louis last year, has suddenly blossomed out as a consistent winner. He has won all of his last five games, beating the Chicago Cubs twice and St. Louis, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia one each. And in this time Boston's opponents have made just twenty-seven hits. The best performance of them all came yesterday when Frankhouse limited the Phils to four hits in a duel with Ray Benge, who gave six, and won by four to two. Benge drove in two runs for the Phils, but Red Worthington evened things with a homer and Earl Sheely drove in two more runs.

Fine pitching was quite the rule in the major leagues yesterday as seven of the nine games were won on low hit hurling. Adolfo Luque and Jack Quinn, two Brooklyn veterans, got together and held the New York Giants to six blows as Brooklyn came through in the ninth to win by four to three and sweep the series. The New York team came in at the sixth on Mo. Ott's homer. The three straight victories put the Robins in third place only a half game behind New York.

Paul Derringer, of St. Louis, and Pat Malone, of Chicago, duelled for ten innings, each allowing seven hits. But Malone proved the stronger pitcher, winning by two to one. He pitched near perfect ball after the first inning and scored the winning run himself after clouting a double.

Some of the edge was taken off the opening of the American League's "crucial" series between Philadelphia and Washington by the fact that the Senators got no closer than two and a half games from the A's by winning all three games. But things looked up a bit after Washington slipped away with a neat four to two victory. George Earnshaw threw well for the champions, but fielded weakly. He gave only six hits, while Fred Marberry allowed eight, but helped toss away the game by making two errors.

Sammy Gray pitched a fine game for the St. Louis Browns in the opener, giving Chicago only four hits and not a walk to win by a three to one count. But Wallace Hebert and two successors proved less effective in the second clash, and the White Sox hammered out a six to five victory.

The other slugging match of the day came in Cincinnati where the Pittsburgh Pirates came from behind with a fifteen hit assault on the home pitchers and beat the Reds by six to four.

Danny MacFadyen, of the Boston Red Sox, gave the New York Yankees only seven hits in eleven innings, but was hard pressed to win as both teams threw away chances through errors. Arndt Jorgensen's wild throw in the eleventh proved the deciding factor, paving the way for a three-run rally and Boston's six to three triumph.

Wesley Ferrell, Cleveland's ace, got off to a bad start against Detroit, while the Indians were just beginning to bunch some of their six hits off Vic Sorrell when rain cut short the contest. The final count of the seven inning game was five to four for Detroit.
