Geologist E. A. Hart Speaks To Shawville Rotary Club

Illustrating his address by a number of samples of metals found in Pontiac County, Mr. E. A. Hart, of the Quebec Metallurgical company and geologist at work on the Kirkham mining development near Phillips Lake, spoke to the members of Shawville Rotary club on Monday night.

In a most interesting way, he told of the historical growth of this district through millions of years and of the pre-Cambrian development of the Northern part of this continent. In this growth, there had resulted deposits of various types of metals; and there was every possibility that Pontiac district might, in the future, become one in which would be found ferrous and basic metals of many kinds.

He explained how surveying methods had changed, and how metals were being discovered by mapping the various districts from the air. He also told of the use of the magnetometer which, when drawn by a plane over a district, would record the possibility of metal deposits by the magnetic attraction of the earth over which it passed. Many questions were asked by the members about several local mining ventures. Interest was shown in the New Calumet mines which have almost closed during

Killers Forget Snakes' Good Deeds

About this time of year some of nature's most maligned creatures are emerging from several months of uninterrupted sleep to start doing favors for Ontario's farmers and gardeners. And in return they're likely to get nothing but abuse.

Ontario's snake population is usually awakened by the first warm days of spring. When these reptiles come out of hibernation they are lean and hungry, and sometimes a bit dazed. But that doesn't stop them from doing the right thing. First act of many of them will be to devour a few field mice or insects that have been plaguing the human population of the province.

But that won't stop the gardeners from swinging at them with spades, hoes or rakes. Nor will it stop the farmers from trying to crush their skulls beneath their heels. For snakes are about the least understood and most distinguished little creatures on the face of the earth.

They are cold-blooded, it's true, but not slimy. A snake's skin is dry except for the times when it has just emerged from water. And, when left alone, it won't bother any one. The only time a snake uses its fangs, venomous or otherwise, is when some one else picks the fight.

With the exception of a few rattlers and copperheads Ontario's snakes are of the non-venomous variety. And even the poisonous ones cause little damage. As long as no one seeks them out, they are seldom seen. Usually they keep to themselves go their quiet way and mind their own business.

In spite of this, humans, with few exceptions, have had a high disregard for the serpent ever since one of them got involved with an apple.

Sins of the present-day snake in this province, however, are few. Now and then they consume a few frogs, which isn't

good, or even the odd songbird. But most of them are content with insects, mice, rats and a few coarse fish, such as suckers. This is good.

And, strangely enough, most varieties are easily tamed. They make quiet, well behaved pets, although they can't be house-

and one of the easiest to tame. Next in line is the spotted milk snake, which looks vaguely like a rattler. Least tractable among the non-venomous Ontario snakes is the black water snake, which will resist domestication for six weeks or longer.

Now the advantages to keeping a pet snake around the house are few—they do more good when left in the natural state. They do make interesting pets

and in time will even obey signals and show a certain amount of affection for their masters, but the best bet for gardeners and farmers is simply to encourage the wriggling creatures, rather than slaughter them.

Given half a chance the garter snake, milk snake, water snake and even the rattler will more than pay for the space it occupies. The smaller ones will raise havoc with mice and insects, the larger ones with rats. And, given an opportunity to mind their own business, they'll do just that.

CATS

A cat doesn't bother with papers and deeds. The alley cat may be a sneak and a thief, according to human notions, but that is in sheer instinct for self-preservation. The well-fed cat, with a regular ration of fish and milk and meat, doesn't need papers because he just takes it for granted it is his house, his food, and the humans of the household are there to wait upon him. He takes as a matter of right the softest chair, the centre of the bed, and if a meal is late he helps himself—and no sense of guilt, but casting meanwhile a reproving eye on his slaves

broken. A snake that is offered a few encouraging tidbits will become semi-domesticated and stay around a house or garden indefinitely, paying for its keep by eliminating mice, rats and insects.

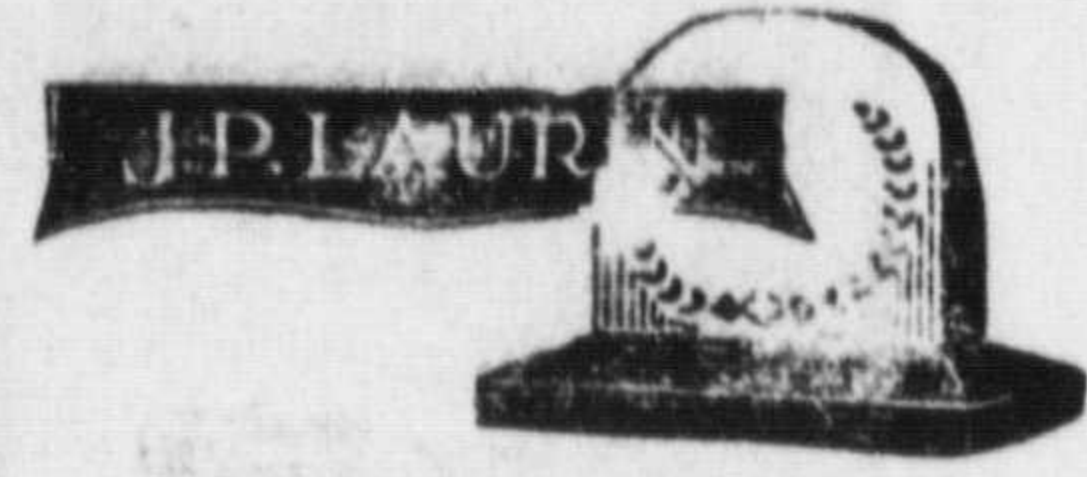
The best offerings to place in the paths of such reptiles are milk and fresh fish, although some types will ignore the milk. Fish offered as food must be fresh—snakes are not scavengers.

If you want to go further and keep a snake as a pet, taming it presents no problem. There are individual exceptions, but most snakes, captured and caged, will submit to handling and become trusting pets in the space of about three weeks.

Capturing the reptile is the first problem. If it is well equipped with fangs, such as the milk snake common to some sections of this province, a forked stick can be used. Or, swing a cloth in front of it until the snake strikes. Then, while its fangs are entangled in the cloth, seize it just at the back of the head. Nothing to it.

Once caged, the snake should be handled regularly, first with heavy gloves. It should be fed little or nothing for about a week, but given water regularly. After about a week offer a fresh fish. Although the reptile is not overly provided with grey matter, it will usually get the idea in a short time, and take food from the hand. From then on taming is a cinch.

The common garter snake, which spends its lifetime doing good deeds around the country, is the least dangerous to handle
