BRUSSELS NAMES PEACE COMMITTEE

To Offer Assistance
To Japan And China
In Effecting Peace

Brussels Conference Committee, in Effect, Has a Double Mandate, to Offer Its Good Offices for Restoration of Peace and to Reply to Japan's Refusal to Attend Parley Called Under Provisions of Nine-Power Treaty—Reliable Indications Were That Britain, United States and Belgium Would Be on Committee.

Brussels, November 4.—The Brussels Conference of nineteen nations decided today to empower a sub-committee to offer its aid to Japan and China in effecting peace between the two nations, and reliable indications were that Great Britain, the United States and Belgium would be on the committee.

Italy and France also probably would be represented. The committee, in effect, has a double mandate—to offer its good offices for the restoration of peace, and to reply to Japan's refusal of an invitation to attend the Conference here, called under provisions of the Nine-Power Treaty which pledges respect for the territorial integrity of China.

The committee was to be named at a Conference session opening tonight, with the Conference adjourning until then to permit delegates to be received by King Leopold.

The mandate given to the committee stipulates that, in extending its offer of aid to Japan and China in seeking peace, it must make clear that this aid is offered, if wanted—it will not be imposed.

The sub-committee will study both Japan's communication of refusal to the Conference invitation and an additional statement issued in Tokyo, defining Japan's position. Several delegates said they received the impression that Japan had not closed the door to negotiation or to mediation efforts through third parties, provided they be countries possessing real interests in the Far East.

NO SUGGESTION OF
COERCIVE MEASURES

Brussels, Nov. 4.—The Brussels Conference on the Far East, which today got down to work after yesterday's opening, was called by Belgium at the suggestion of the powers under the terms of the nine-power treaty, signed at Washington in 1922, which guaranteed the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of China.

The treaty was signed by the British Empire (the United Kingdom, Canada, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and India), the United States, France, Belgium, Italy, the Netherlands, Portugal, China and Japan. Later it was adhered to by Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Bolivia, and Mexico.

In addition to the signatories, Belgium invited Germany and Russia to attend the Brussels conference. Continued on Page 2, Col. 4.

LAST YEAR FOR
SEIGNEURS TO
COLLECT RENTS

Seigniorial Dues that Must Be Paid Next Thursday a Relic of Feudal Days in New France.

Montreal, Nov. 4.—A relic of the feudal days, when the "habitant" of New France paid his "rentes" in pigs and poultry—that is, if he was short of cash, and frequently he was, history records—seigniorial dues come due next Thursday. For history also says there was a "good time to be had by all" when the "seigneurs' tenants gathered at the manor house to deposit their dues; the cackling of captive fowls and the clinking of wine-filled glasses lent a sound of sympathy to the pleasant occasion. There always was good fellowship between the "habitant" and his "seigneur" when they met to square their debts.

Seigneuries—grants of land—once dotted the shores of the St. Lawrence from Montreal to Quebec, and were given by the King to favored subjects. The "seigneur" allowed the French-Canadian "habitant" to settle on the land and in return the tiller of the soil paid "rentes" to his landlord for use of the property. He paid in cash if he had enough of that, and in kind if he had not.

"Rent" amounted in value to a few cents an "arpent," not much smaller than an acre, and there were lesser dues, too, the farmer was obliged to pay. Another condition demanded service in time of war. The dues were payable every November 11th, Michaelmas Day. And the custom, like the seigneuries, have survived to this day, though in

French Freighter Attacked By
Two Spanish Insurgent Planes

"La Corse" Escaped Undamaged When Several Bombs Were Dropped in Attack in Mediterranean—French Cruiser Escorted Freighter to Marseille.

Barcelona, Nov. 4.—Two Spanish insurgent planes attacked the French freighter La Corse in the Mediterranean off this port today. Several bombs were dropped near the ship but it escaped undamaged.

In response to appeals for assistance, the French cruiser Suffren sped to the side of the freighter and escorted it on its route to Marseille. The attack occurred several miles off Mataro, which is fifteen miles northeast of this Catalan capital. The La Corse is a 643-ton freighter plying between Marseille and French North African ports.

TRADE AGREEMENT NEAR
London, Nov. 4.—The full Spanish Non-Intervention Committee was convened today to authorize Great Britain to solicit co-operation in Spain toward withdrawal of foreign troops as London carried on commercial negotiations with the insurgents.

Great Britain, with her industries needing raw materials such as Spain's rich deposits of mercury, iron, copper and pyrites, was reported to have all but arrived at an agreement with insurgent Spain.

The twenty-seven nation non-intervention committee was optimistic of making a tangible move at last toward withdrawal of foreign soldiers from the civil war—although there was not complete harmony on the British plan of withdrawal. It was expected the committee would authorize an approach to both the Valencia Government and the Franco regime to solicit co-operation in the withdrawal plan.

Both London's most ardent pro-peace newspapers, the Daily Mail, and the most enthusiastic pro-Valencia newspaper, the Daily Herald, said Great Britain was convinced that Franco would win the war. The Herald said the Government had "decided to accord de facto recognition to General Franco's Government" because it had decided Franco "is going to win."

The reported British-insurgent trade agreement would involve an exchange of "agents." Technically it would not constitute formal recognition of the "seigneurs" but would be a stride in that direction.

Montreal—which has 140 seigniorial tenants—there is not much room for cultivation. Proprietors of the seigneuries, which have been handed down from father to son when not taken over by the government, always have collected the dues, based on civic valuation of the property.

This may be the last year the present-day "seigneurs" will collect the "rentes." Last year, intention was, by Act of the Legislature, that a syndicate redeem seigniorial dues and permit liberation of tenants by paying capital and interest on their holdings up to November 11, 1938. EXECUTIONER'S AXE
IS BUSY IN BERLIN

Berlin, Nov. 4.—The executioner's axe fell three times today, decapitating three Germans—Peter Sausen, twenty-nine; Adolf Rembe, thirty-five; and Robert Stamm, thirty-seven—sentenced to death by the People's Court for alleged espionage and high treason.

Sausen allegedly joined the French Foreign Legion in 1936 and later was caught spying in Germany. Stamm was found guilty of high treason by attempting to form an illegal Communist organization. Rembe was accused of treasonable activity.

CORN LOANS TO
BE FINANCED BY
U.S. GOVERNMENT

Borrowers Will Be Limited to Farmers Who Complied with 1937 Soil Conservation Programme.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The Government came to the aid today of United States corn growers disturbed by low prices and arranged to finance 1937 corn loans at the rate of forty-four to fifty cents a bushel. The loans, similar to those made by the Agriculture Adjustment Administration in previous years, will be handled by the Commodity Credit Corporation with a \$75,000,000 advance from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

Borrowers will be limited to those farmers who complied with the 1937 soil conservation programme, and within specified "corn limit areas." These areas are Illinois and Iowa and parts of Indiana, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, South Dakota and Wisconsin.

"It is expected that the operation of the corn loan programme in the corn limit areas, where corn surpluses are involved," Agriculture Secretary Wallace said, "will provide a more orderly system of marketing and prevent the glutting of corn markets early in the marketing season when corn prices usually are low."

The amount of the loan will depend on the quality, or moisture content, with a top of fifty cents a bushel for corn of 14½ per cent moisture and a low of forty-four cents for 20½ per cent. Farm leaders had suggested a flat sixty-cent loan. The loans will bear four per cent interest.

GERMANY AGAIN
ASKS RETURN
OF COLONIES

Berlin Newspaper Points Out that Italy, as a Member of the League of Nations, May Raise Question at Geneva.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—Germany's demands for return of her colonies were reiterated today by the newspaper Essen Nationalzeitung.

Declaring that because of "the growth of Germany's military strength and the German spirit of determination" the country can no longer "be treated as a pariah from the colonial point of view." The newspaper said the Reich will find increasingly effective ways of advancing its demands.

Emphasizing the importance of the support given Germany on this question by Premier Mussolini, the Nationalzeitung said that Italy, as a member of the League of Nations, may raise the colonial question at Geneva.

"The colonies were stolen," the newspaper said "by a dictated treaty (Versailles) to which Germany is no longer subject. They constitute property illegally held by their administrators. Germany firmly demands her African colonies because she needs them to live."

Prospects For Trade Pact Between
Britain And U.S. Appear Brighter

Officials of United States Foreign Trade Council Express Belief "Chances for Trade Agreement Between Two Nations Are Very Good."

Cleveland, Nov. 4.—A suggested trade bargaining treaty between United States and Great Britain came before the National Foreign Trade Council for discussion today, with President Eugene P. Thomas expressing belief "chances of such an agreement are very good."

"The general expectation is there may be early developments in the line of a treaty with the United Kingdom," said Thomas, former vice-president of U.S. Steel Corporation.

"We believe the chances of such an agreement are very good. High British officials have viewed it with favor. When the mechanics will be completed is another matter."

Dr. Henry F. Grady, vice-chairman of the United States Tariff Commission and one of the discussion leaders in the reciprocal trade agreements session, declared the United States tariff agreement programme "is going to move ahead rapidly."

"It is anticipated," Dr. Grady said, "there will be a number of announcements in the months ahead. We are hopeful that it will be possible to make an agreement with Great Britain."

Thousands Of Fresh And
Well-Equipped Chinese
Troops Guard Shanghai

Aided by Additional Reinforcements, Premier Chiang Kai-Shek's Youthful Legions Are Putting Up a Furious Battle Against Japanese Veterans—Chinese Positions in Rear Areas of Shanghai Termed "Formidable."

Shanghai, November 4.—Thousands of fresh Chinese troops, well-equipped and thoroughly disciplined, poured into Chinese positions today on the Shanghai front.

"During a personal inspection, I witnessed the arrival of the new troops from the west, smart-looking and apparently utterly unafraid of Japanese bombing planes overhead," stated James A. Mills, Associated Press foreign staff correspondent.

Aided by these reinforcements, Premier Chiang Kai-Shek's youthful legions fought furiously against the Japanese veterans. Ignoring the circling bombing planes and the Japanese heavy artillery, the Chinese time and again lashed out at the Japanese troops. The result was that Japanese positions along the south bank of Soochow Creek became almost untenable.

"I found the Japanese had landed at only one place along Soochow Creek, where they drove a narrow wedge into the Chinese position south of the creek. But the Japanese foothold here was so precarious it was doubtful if it could survive a Chinese counter-attack, which was due shortly," continued Mr. Mills.

The Chinese positions in the rear areas are formidable. It was considered likely the Chinese could succeed in holding up the Japanese for some time. It also was apparent the Chinese intend to hold their right

flank on the International Settlement boundary. There they were completing powerful barbed-wire entanglements and sandbag barriers contiguous to positions of the British and French guard outposts near Hung-jiao road.

LAST TRIBUTE
PAID POPULAR
'DICK' SHEPPARD

Crowds Throng Streets as Vicar of St. Martin's-in-the-Field Is Laid to Rest with Great Pomp at Canterbury Cathedral.

London, Nov. 4.—London paid a last and demonstrative farewell to popular Canon "Dick" Sheppard today.

Following a brief service in the Church of St. Martin's-in-the-Field, which Canon Sheppard made famous while he was its vicar, the coffin was carried in procession along the Thames Embankment under an autumnal sky to St. Paul's Cathedral.

Thousands lined the streets and joined in the procession as it passed. The cathedral was thronged with notables as well as with the common-folk for whom "Dick" Sheppard had an uncommon appeal. Outside St. Paul's mounted police were forced to keep the crowd back.

In the great cathedral the service was conducted by Dean W. R. Matthews, who told the congregation, including a representative of the King and a host of the clergy: "I do not trust myself to speak of what his love meant to us. In the shock of the first news of his death I said a light seems to have gone from the sky. For a long time we shall feel that."

Dean Matthews briefly recalled Canon Sheppard's varied and laborious career, embracing all manner of people, fixedly towards the goal of peace and salvation. He referred to him as a "primitive Christian in the modern world, with a sensitive spirit to which the thought of the cruelty and oppression in our civilization was a constant torture."

"Let us admit he was not perhaps always prudent," Dean Matthews added. "He was ready to ignore conventions; to care nothing for his reputation. He was willing to become a fool for Christ's sake."

SHELLS FALL NEAR
BRITISH OUTPOSTS

Shanghai, Nov. 4.—Japanese forces driving down Chinese north of their Soochow Creek positions today bombed the Jessfield Park area near British army outposts. As Shanghai skies cleared Japanese planes bombed the right flank of the Chinese line extending westward from Shanghai.

The Japanese drive suffered a setback, a Chinese spokesman declared, when Chinese artillery destroyed two of three bridges, the Japanese engineers had thrown over Soochow Creek. He added, however, that severe fighting was in progress on the south bank beyond Rubicon village.

There were persistent reports that the Chinese were on the verge of withdrawing from the entire Shanghai peninsula, but the reports were without confirmation.

Foreign observers said the first Japanese objective apparently was the Hungjiao airfield three miles southwest of Rubicon. They stated the Japanese were making only slow progress.

LABOR LEADER
WHO PROVIDED
DRAMA IS DEAD

Stories that Sprang Up Around Jim MacLachlan's Life and Exploits Are Legend—Gained Headlines for Many Years.

Gloucester, N.S., Nov. 4.—Death has closed the aggressive career of James B. "Jim" MacLachlan, fiery Labor leader whose challenging Scottish burr ever rang in war against capitalism and the employer.

His flame had waned gradually since 1921. Convicted of sedition, branded a Communist and atheist, expelled from the ranks of the United Mine Workers by John L. Lewis, he retired from active participation in Labor politics to a dairy farm near here. There he died yesterday.

Advocate of sabotage—"warring from within" he called it—first to urge a strike he made 100 per cent. by withdrawal of maintenance men, yet he held the respect of thousands of men.

Once he told a U.M.W. meeting a chance encounter with a former schoolmate, a girl driven into the streets of Glasgow, had enlisted him in his never-ending war against capitalism and for labor.

As I gazed into the painted face of that poor girl, I swore to myself that I would never turn back in the Labor movement until I had helped

open its final and most important hearing in Ottawa, attended by representatives of all the governments and many public organizations. It is expected that sittings will be concluded by July 1.

COOKING CLASS IS FEATURE OF SHORT COURSE

Seventeenth Annual Course,
Including Work in Agri-
culture and Household
Science, Inaugurated Yes-
terday at Lennoxville.

The seventeenth annual Short Course, including lectures and demonstrations on agriculture and classes in Household Science, being held for three days this week in Lennoxville under the auspices of the County Agricultural Organizations, the Women's Institutes, Lennoxville Branch of the Quebec Department of Agriculture, Lennoxville Experimental Station in co-operation with Macdonald College, got under way yesterday with an enrolment of forty-eight, twenty-five girls and twenty-three boys, which is about the same as last year's attendance.

In the past, the classes were overcrowded, and it was believed that several of the boys and girls who attended were doing so with more of an idea of sport than of the knowledge gained. Therefore, it was decided that a fee of one dollar would be charged, to eliminate those who might not be really in earnest. This was done last year, and it was found that the classes were not overcrowded and better work was accomplished, so that method was adopted again this year.

This course of lectures and demonstrations on agriculture is arranged to meet the needs of the younger men engaged in farming, who have not the time to attend a short course at the Agricultural College. Likewise, in many schools, very little training is given in Household Science; therefore, the committee has arranged for a course in Household Science for the girls. It is felt that the young people of today, who are to keep abreast of the times, must grasp every opportunity to equip themselves for their life-work. Farming is becoming more complex every day. Those engaged in agriculture must study the scientific and business principles underlying successful farming. Every farmer should grasp every opportunity of profiting by the experience of others. The lectures and demonstrations have been so arranged that they will be of interest to everyone who is able to attend, and in order to encourage the young people to take part in the courses, prizes will be offered to those doing the best work.

Men and women who are experts in their line have been secured to lecture and demonstrate to the boys and girls. Last year a sewing class was held for the girls, but this year it was decided that a class in cooking would be carried out. This class, which is being held in Douglas Hall, is under the direction of Miss Hazel B. McCain, superintendent of Quebec Women's Institutes, at Macdonald College, and she is being assisted this year by Mrs. D. A. Finlay, of Lennoxville, and Miss M. Siddall, of the Sherbrooke High School staff. The girls were divided into six groups of four, and were given practical advice on the preparation of breakfast, menus, their

RETIRED ADMIRALS CRITICIZE UNIFORMS

London, Nov. 4.—A couple of retired admirals have been leveling caustic criticism at naval uniforms. Admiral Sir William Goodenough would have only dashing young officers attired in full dress uniform. He would like admirals in a plainer, dicker attire "which didn't draw blatant attention to the imperfections of their physique."

end such things forever." The stories that sprang up around his life and exploits are legend. A hard fighter and bitter opponent, with a flair for starting statements, MacLachlan was probably the most prolific source of news in Eastern Canada from his rise to power in 1918 until his banishment from orthodox Labor ranks in Cape Breton five years later.

He was born in Ecclefechan, Scotland, in the same house as Thomas Carlyle, famous British historian, sixty-nine years ago. He came to Nova Scotia when a young man and almost immediately began his ascendancy to power almost equal to that of a dictator.

His problem was to sway his followers away from their individual hatreds and differences toward a common enemy. His pointed speech always were dramatized with liberal denunciation of some individual held up as the personification of the alleged evils of the capitalist system. He welcomed hecklers because he was able to silence them by his lightning thrusts and parries.

At one meeting in Sydney Mines at which he presided two men were fatally shot in a brawl that followed some speaker's words. When he returned from serving a penitentiary term for sedition, a crowd of 8,000 met him in Glace Bay and made his homecoming a triumphal tour. Wherever Jim MacLachlan was, there was drama.

After the disastrous defeat of the U.M.W. in 1909, he was hunted from pillar to post. Somehow, with a few faithful followers, he managed to keep the Union alive until its recognition nearly ten years later.

In the turbulent post-war years in the coal and steel industry of Cape Breton MacLachlan ruled almost supreme. His word among the men was law—but he stepped too far.

The industry was in the throes of almost constant serious strikes. Troops twice had been called out and when steelworkers walked out after a dispute with their employers, MacLachlan ordered his miners out in sympathy. John L. Lewis immediately outlawed the strike and expelled him from the Union. That ended his direct connection with the U.M.W. but he still will be remembered in the Labor movement.

He ran unsuccessfully for the Dominion and Provincial houses. He edited the Labor Herald and The Miner. He was active in founding the Workers' party in Canada. He went to Russia and studied conditions under the Soviet rule. Then he disagreed with other Communists on matters of policy and withdrew from the party.

Russia declined, as did Japan, but Germany accepted.

The treaty stipulated that in the event of any threat to the territorial integrity of China the signatories should meet to consult together on methods to end the hostilities. In the present case there has not been the remotest suggestion of coercive measures, such as sanctions, against Japan.

The treaty binds the powers, in addition to respecting the sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity of China, to maintain the principle of equal opportunity for the commerce and industry of all nations and not to seek special rights and privileges that would impair any interests of other powers.

The Washington Conference was called primarily to discuss limitation of naval armaments and its chief work was formulation of the Washington Naval Treaty. The agenda, however, included consideration of "Pacific and Far Eastern questions," which resulted in the nine-power pact on China.

Thousands Of Fresh And Well-Equipped Chinese Troops Guard Shanghai

On all fronts in China, but neither Chinese nor Japanese were able to achieve clear-cut gains toward major objectives. From first hand observation and from communiques of the two factions it appeared that a temporary stalemate had developed.

In North China, the tide of battle shifted back and forth along the Peiping-Hankow railway with Chinese declaring their forces had launched an offensive which carried them northward across the Chang River, seventeen miles north of Changchun, in northern Hunan province. (Japanese at Peiping declared the Chinese attack was repulsed).

At Peiping, a Japanese communiqué said fifteen divisions of Chinese troops were in flight as Japanese advanced toward Taiyuan. Japanese were said to have reached Tainhsien, a walled city forty miles north of the capital. Two divisions of Red army troops were reported retreating in northeast Shansi. The Japanese eastern column was reported within forty miles of Taiyuan.

Despite despatched land battles, Japanese continued widespread aerial activities. Twenty bombs were dropped at Sungkiang, southwest of Shanghai, with a heavy toll of lives and damage to a power plant and a girls' school. Three points along the Canton-Kowloon railway were raided. Fourteen Japanese planes bombed Sochow, fifty miles west of Shanghai.

A Japanese spokesman announced that negotiations for proposed neutralization of Nantao, Chinese section south of the French Concession, were proceeding satisfactorily.

POPE PIUS RESTING AFTER ACTIVITIES

Vatican City, Nov. 4.—Pope Pius gave himself over to complete rest today.

The Pontiff spoke briefly yesterday at the inauguration of a new antechapel at the ancient basilica of St. John Lateran. Vatican sources said his doctor advised rest after this activity which followed so closely his return from Castel Gandolfo, his summer residence.

These same sources added, however, that the Pope was not ill. He is to go to the Sistine Chapel tomorrow to attend memorial services for Cardinals who died during the year.

FATAL ACCIDENT REVIEWED BEFORE COURT

Jurymen Retire During Debate In Damage Case

Argument Over Introduction of Stenographic Report of Declaration Allegedly Made by Plaintiff in Local Hospital Featured this Morning's Proceedings in Guerette-Clark Suit.

The jury hearing the \$15,000 damage action of Alfred Guerette, of this city, against Herbert Clark, of Montreal, retired from the Superior Court room late this morning during a debate over the introduction by defendant attorneys of the stenographic report of a deposition made by plaintiff in the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital.

The suit is the aftermath to an accident that occurred at the intersection of the Montreal and St. Elie d'Orford roads August 8th last when a motor cycle driven by Guerette collided with Clark's automobile. The mishap took the life of Jean Baptiste Dumont, who was riding on the rear seat of the bike, and caused serious injuries to Guerette.

Guerette testified this morning regarding the accident as plaintiff attorneys Samson and Guerin prepared to climax their case. It was during his cross-examination that plaintiff lawyers, Charles de L. Mignault and Benjamin Robinson, K.C., of Montreal, attempted to introduce into the records the deposition

Guerette made in the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital.

Guerette, cross-questioned by Mr. Mignault, declared the motor cycle had a rear seat. He stated one had been installed at a local garage and that Jean Baptiste Dumont was straddling this seat when the collision occurred.

"How was Dumont holding on?" asked Mr. Mignault.

"He was gripping a handle in front of him," witness replied.

"He was not holding you by the waist?"

"No."

Guerette was asked if he had given evidence while at the hospital. He replied that a man had come to question him "He questioned me concerning the bicycle, and not about the accident," he said.

"Was a stenographer present at that time?" asked Mr. Mignault.

"No," replied Guerette.

Mr. Mignault pointed towards Joseph Berin, official Court stenographer, "Was not Mr. Berin?" he asked.

Guerette replied that to the best of his knowledge no stenographer had been on hand.

Mr. Mignault flourished a document and asked Mr. Justice Hector Verret for permission to have Mr. Berin testify concerning the alleged deposition.

Mr. Samson objected. He regarded such proceedings as a trap. If Guerette had made a deposition it was while he was on a sick bed, still suffering from nervous shock as a result of his close escape from death, badly injured, and in no condition to be questioned. He did not know the nature of the deposition but he strenuously objected to its being entered into the records.

Mr. Robinson said: "We merely desire to prove that..."

"I insist that if we are to debate over the matter that the jury be asked to retire," stated Mr. Samson.

Mr. Robinson saw no reason for that.

Philip Malloy, twenty-six-year-old former Norton Mills, Vt., resident who was the star witness for the Crown in the dramatic St. Pierre shooting affray in 1930, has had enough of the winter street jail's hospitality, judging by a complaint lodged against him in the Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon. For the complaint charges Malloy with attempted jail break.

The youth, smiling openly and apparently not one bit chagrined over the failure of his alleged attempted escape from the local "dungeon," appeared before Judge J. H. Lemay in the Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon and pleaded not guilty to the charge. He was remanded to next Wednesday.

Malloy also faced a charge of assault upon the person of Florent Morin, one of his confederates behind the bars of the local jail. The complaint said that Malloy punched Morin with his fist. It did not designate the point of contact. It may have been the nose or the eye.

To this accusation Malloy pleaded guilty.

Judge Lemay remanded him to next Wednesday for sentence.

Regarding the attempted jail break, prison authorities allege that Malloy obtained a piece of piping and with this succeeded in smashing the lock fastening one of the windows in his cell.

Malloy is at present awaiting trial before Court of King's Bench on a charge of having been found in possession of a car that had been illegally imported into Canada from the United States.

Philip Malloy was wounded and his brother, Rene, was killed in the shooting affray on the East Hereford border seven years ago. Pierre, alias Albert St. Pierre, border bootlegger, whose liquor the Malloy brothers were trying to hi-jack, was hanged for the murder of Rene Malloy.

Steel, Bethlehem, Wheeling Steel, National Steel, Crucible, Youngstown Sheet and Tube, General Motors, Chrysler, U.S. Rubber, Goodrich, Goodyear, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, J. I. Case, Oliver Farm, Anacosta, Kennecott, American Smelting, International Nickel, Douglas Aircraft, Westinghouse, American Can, General Electric, Du Pont, Texas Corp., Standard Oil of N.J., and California, N.Y. Central, Great Northern, Loews, Briggs Mfg., Philip Morris and Johns-Manville.

Rumors persisted something would be done by the United States administration regarding gold, and Dome, McIntyre and Alaska Juneau edged forward.

Outstanding news which might have inspired either buyers or sellers was scarce, but further sliding tendencies displayed by commodities apparently depressed sentiment.

Secondary bonds were also soft. Among items studied in board rooms before the start of trading were:

Stock Exchange members' collateral borrowings in October were off \$313,497,644 to a total of \$725,925,872. The sharp decrease was attributed largely to the corresponding downturn in securities prices.

The country's bank clearings, for the week ended yesterday, were up 3 per cent. in comparison with the same 1936 period. In the preceding week the gain over a year ago amounted to 1.1 per cent.

Price Brothers dropped a point to 19 1/2 and minor declines came out for Shawinigan, Canadian Nickel, Steel Car, Imperial Oil, Dominion Steel B. and Bathurst.

PRICE OF GOLD UP ON LONDON MARKET

London, Nov. 4.—So keen was the demand for gold in the London Free Market today that buyers paid a premium of eighteen cents an ounce over the parity price for the approximately \$2,000,000 available.

The price at which gold can be purchased here and shipped profitably to the United States is figured at \$34.76 an ounce. Today's Free Market price was the equivalent of \$34.94, representing the highest premium of the year.

COUNTRY AND DAIRY PRODUCTS PRICES

Montreal, Nov. 4.—Top grade eggs advanced one cent on local produce markets yesterday for the third successive day while other produce showed little change, although cheese and butter had a slightly tendency and potatoes were lower.

OCEAN RATES TO BE
HIGHER NEXT YEAR

Montreal, Nov. 4.—Advances in trans-Atlantic freight rates within the jurisdiction of the Canadian Freight Conference will go into effect January 1, W. C. Sproule, secretary of the Conference, has announced.

A "general revision" of trans-ocean freight rates is now under consideration by the Conference, Sproule said. "Most of the changes," he declared, "will become effective January 1, 1938, and will show advances in the present rates."

They are necessary, he asserted, to "bring earnings in line with

operating expenses, which have increased greatly during the last few years and recently very sharply." For a number of years, he said, carriers in the Canadian service had suffered severe losses; and even with many full-cargo sailings now, earnings did not meet expenses and provide for replacements and "reasonable interest."

"In revising rates," the secretary said, "they are not attempting to take advantage of the present tramp situation and scarcity of space, but rather to make prudent adjustments consistent with the cost of maintaining services."

Specific commodity rates, "unduly depressed" in the last few years,

would have to take greater increases than others. World freight rates on sea have been increasing rapidly in the last six to eight months, Sproule declared in further explanation of the proposal. In many cases, tramps with no regular schedules had been chartered at rates "far in excess of regular liners."

It was he who led the harassing tactics against the Italians when they first crossed the Ethiopian border. When the collapse of the tribesmen's opposition was imminent, Asfa Wosen tried to escape by airplane, but the machine crashed.

His wife is a daughter of Ras Sayoum, one of the generals who fought against the Italians.

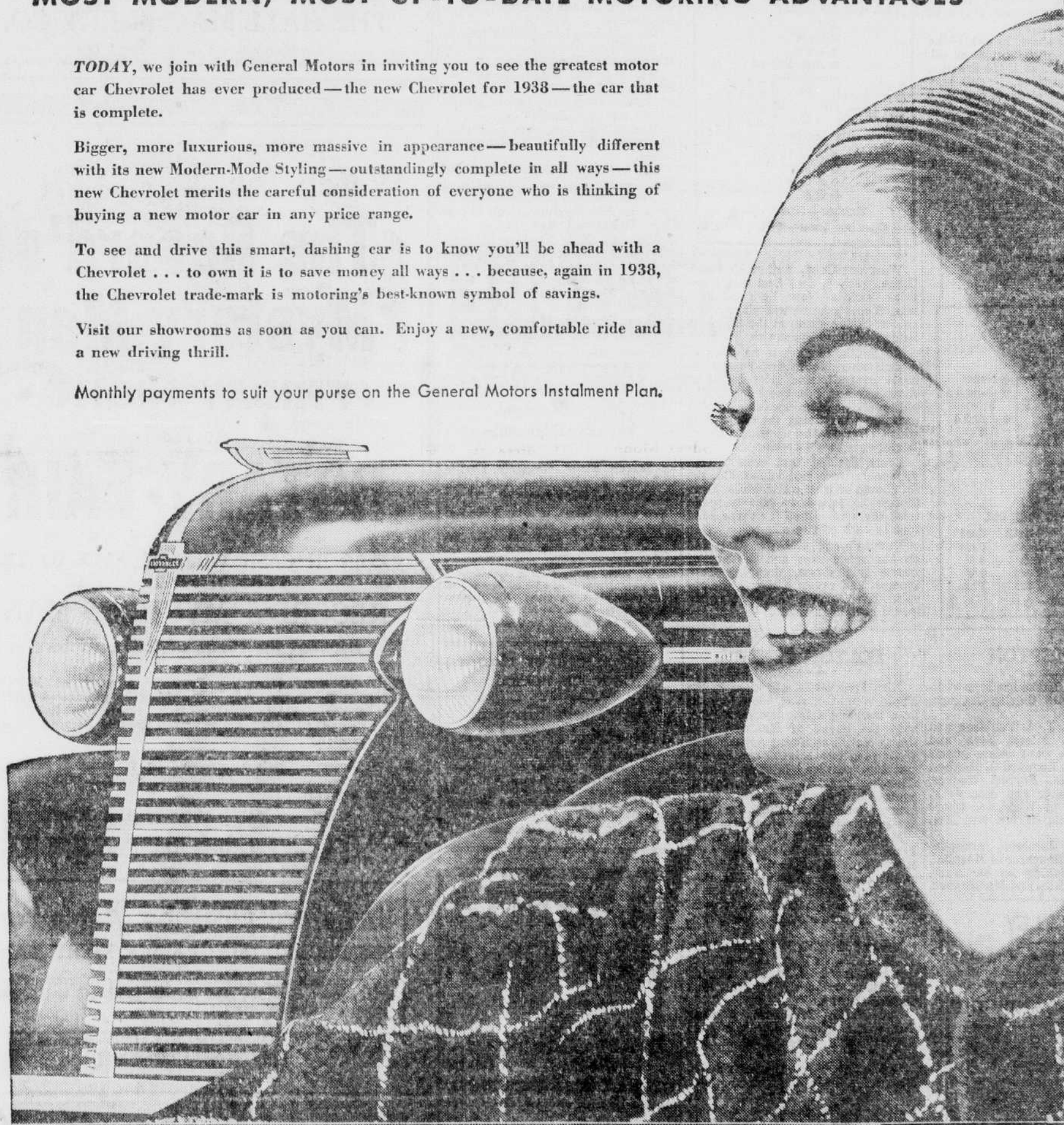

Watson, liked to say, perhaps all this doesn't prove anything, but it was fun for East and West while it lasted, and it must have been rather agonizing for the South player when he totted down the score for six hearts doubled with an overtrick against his "powerhouse."

It does go to show, however, the part played by distribution in the making of tricks, and if the example is rather accentuated, it still may keep the balance clear in the mind of a bridge player between high cards in the hand, and booked tricks in the play.

Apparently South must lose two tricks, so when his opponents defended with six hearts, he decided to take them for a ride. The double seemed the next best thing so far as his cards were concerned.

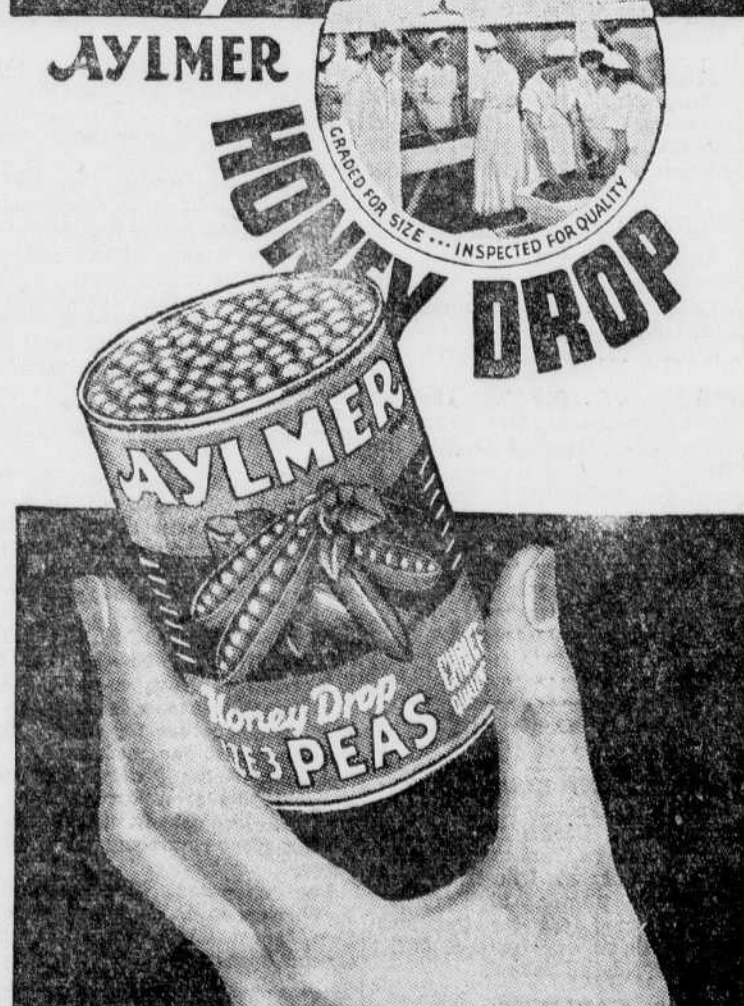

McGILL FRESHMEN TAKE LEAD OVER LOYOLA

Red Team In Win Over Bishop's College Squad

Led by Perry Foster, Freshmen Chalked Up Twenty-One to One Gridiron Victory Yesterday Afternoon — Bishop's First Team to Score on McGill This Season.

The powerful McGill freshman team beat Bishop's University twenty-one to one yesterday afternoon at the Molson Stadium. The Bishop's squad put up a game fight against the outstanding Redmen, and Scott's lofty boot from the McGill forty-yard line in the third quarter is the only point any team has scored against McGill all season.

After Jeff Scott had run back a long Foster punt to the Bishop's twenty-five yard line, the McGill line rushed through to break up Bennett's kick. On the first play, Sylvester, big McGill middle, broke around right end to go over-standing up for a touchdown. McGill's attempted convert was broken up.

The second quarter provided some good rugby, with both teams fairly evenly matched. Bishop's tried an attack featuring short forward passes, but without much success. McGill were content to use their heavy line bucks, backed up by Foster's kicking.

Just as the quarter was ending Scott returned a McGill boot to Foster, who was not given yards by the Bishop's tacklers. Bishop's were penalized and the ball brought to their forty yard line, from where Foster kicked to the deadline on the last play of the quarter to make the half-time score McGill six, Bishop's nothing.

The third quarter saw the big McGill team unleash a passing attack, both forwards and laterals. On the Bishop's forty yard line, Scott, McGill half, tossed a forward that proved good for five yards. On the next play Foster lateraled out to Moore on right end, and the latter dashed thirty-five yards for a touch, which was unconverted.

After the kick-off the Lennoxville team scored the only point that any team has chalked up this season against the conquering Redmen. Foster made one of his very rare mis-kicks, and Bishop's got possession on the McGill forty-yard line. After a nice buck for five yards through centre by Knox, Bishop's captain, Scott went back on second down, and booted high over the McGill line to McGill, who was smothered under an avalanche of tacklers for a rouge.

The ball was reintermingled on the twenty-five yard line, and Foster hoisted to Knox on the fifty-five yard line. McGill intercepted a forward pass by Greenwood on the first play, and gave the ball to McGill, who swept around right end for a thirty-five yard run and another major tally. The convert went wide, leaving the score at McGill 16, Bishop's 1.

The fourth quarter saw the Lennoxville boys throwing forward after forward, and Knox passed to Ken Willis for a twelve-yard gain. On the next play Knox again connected, this time to Scott for fifteen yards. But here the Bishop's parade stopped and McGill took a hand.

Glasse, McGill sub, made yards

twice on long plunges through the centre. Two completed forwards brought the ball to the Bishop's five yard line, from where Ross, McGill quarterback, knifed his way over the line. This touch also went unconverted.

McGill continued to press hard but the whistle sounded without any further scoring.

McLurg, Foster and Glasse were the best for the Redmen, while Knox, Magor, Scott and Greenwood were the outstanding Bishop's players.

HOCKEY MAKES 1937-38 SEASON DEBUT TONIGHT

Chicago Black Hawks Will Meet Revamped New York Americans and Detroit Oppose Toronto in Initial N.H.L. Games.

Crowding into football's time zone more than ever, professional hockey, the fastest game in the world and the most profitable in Canada, flashes onto the sports stage tonight for its 1937-38 season.

At Toronto and Chicago the National League will stage the earliest opening in its twenty-year history as the world champion Detroit Red Wings meet Toronto Maple Leafs and New York Americans play Chicago Black Hawks. Last year the schedule started November 6th.

Over the next six days other teams will swing into the schedule gradually, Montreal Canadiens appearing last as they meet Black Hawks in Montreal next Tuesday. The 192-game schedule does not end until March 20th, giving eager fans in seven cities almost five months of the sport.

In that time about one hundred and twenty young men, most of them in their twenties, will be paid salaries ranging from \$3,000 to \$8,000 and perhaps more to settle the questions that are plaguing earnest fans.

The most important of these is whether Red Wings will capture their third straight world title, something that has not been done since Ottawa's famed Silver Seven won the Stanley Cup for the third straight time in 1950.

Some fans are certain there isn't anything in the league to prevent Detroit doing it but it should be remembered that they finished last season's regular schedule only six points up on Boston Bruins and that they took everything they had to beat Montreal Canadiens and New York Rangers in the play-offs.

Another matter for speculation is whether King Clancy, newly-appointed coach of Montreal Maroons, can infuse his veteran players with enough of the Clancy drive to make them a potent Stanley Cup threat. Those who have seen the King crack the whip in training camp are betting he will.

The fans are wondering, too, whether Toronto Leafs' untied defence will stand up and whether Eddie Shore will return to his old form after a serious injury and lead Boston Bruins to their first cup victory in ten years.

It probably will be months before any of these questions is answered conclusively but tonight's games may give some indication of what Toronto's defence is like, whether Red Dutton's collection of stars and castoffs are imbued with the famed Dutton "keep punching" philosophy and what Bill Stewart, the referee-turned-coach, has been able to build at Chicago.

Will brittle-boned Charlie Conacher all in one piece and Syl Apps an outstanding star in his second year, Leafs look great up front. But Clancy is not on the defence as he was at the start of last season and Happy Day is gone to Americans.

Without Clancy's leadership and the steady influence of the veteran Day Toronto's defence cannot be as strong. Manager Conny Smylie is depending upon Red Horner, Jimmy Fowler, Reg Hamilton and Bob Davidson, a wingman he has converted for defence duty. Only Horner has more than a season of N.H.L. defence experience.

Detroit, on the other hand, does not seem to have a clink in its armor. Doug Young and Larry Aurie are back with the legs they broke last season in good shape and every other unit in the machine that won the world title last spring is clicking nicely under the finished coaching of Jack Adams.

Even with the rebuilding Dutton has done Americans are not impressive. In goal they have Earl Robertson, the youngster who made good as a substitute for Norm Smith of Detroit, in the Stanley Cup games, and Day and Johnny Gallagher, of Detroit, have been purchased to bolster a weak defence.

But their main hope of survival lies, as it has for two years, in the line made up of Art Chapman, Lorne Carr and Sweeney Schriner, the league's leading scorer for two seasons.

Stewart's leadership may make a great difference at Chicago but his new material is untied. He must place his reliance on the line made up of Doc Romnes, Mush March and Paul Thompson and the defence play of Earl Seibert and Marty Burke. He has a steady second line of Louis Trudel, Johnny Gotsdiner and Gler Brydson, but any games the rest of their win will be that much grayer.

CLAIMS ROMANCE TAKES MIND OFF HOCKEY

London, Nov. 4.—Romance has no place in hockey, according to George Redding, the former Hamilton, Ont., player who is coaching Earl's Court Rangers in the National League. He has made each of his players sign a pledge not to get married during the hockey season. Bobby Lee, of Montreal, Earl's Court centre, who put off his wedding in Canada to sail for England, has had to cable his fiancée in Montreal not to come over. They were to have been married here soon.

Redding explains that he considers that players should concentrate during the hockey season on winning games to the exclusion of everything else.

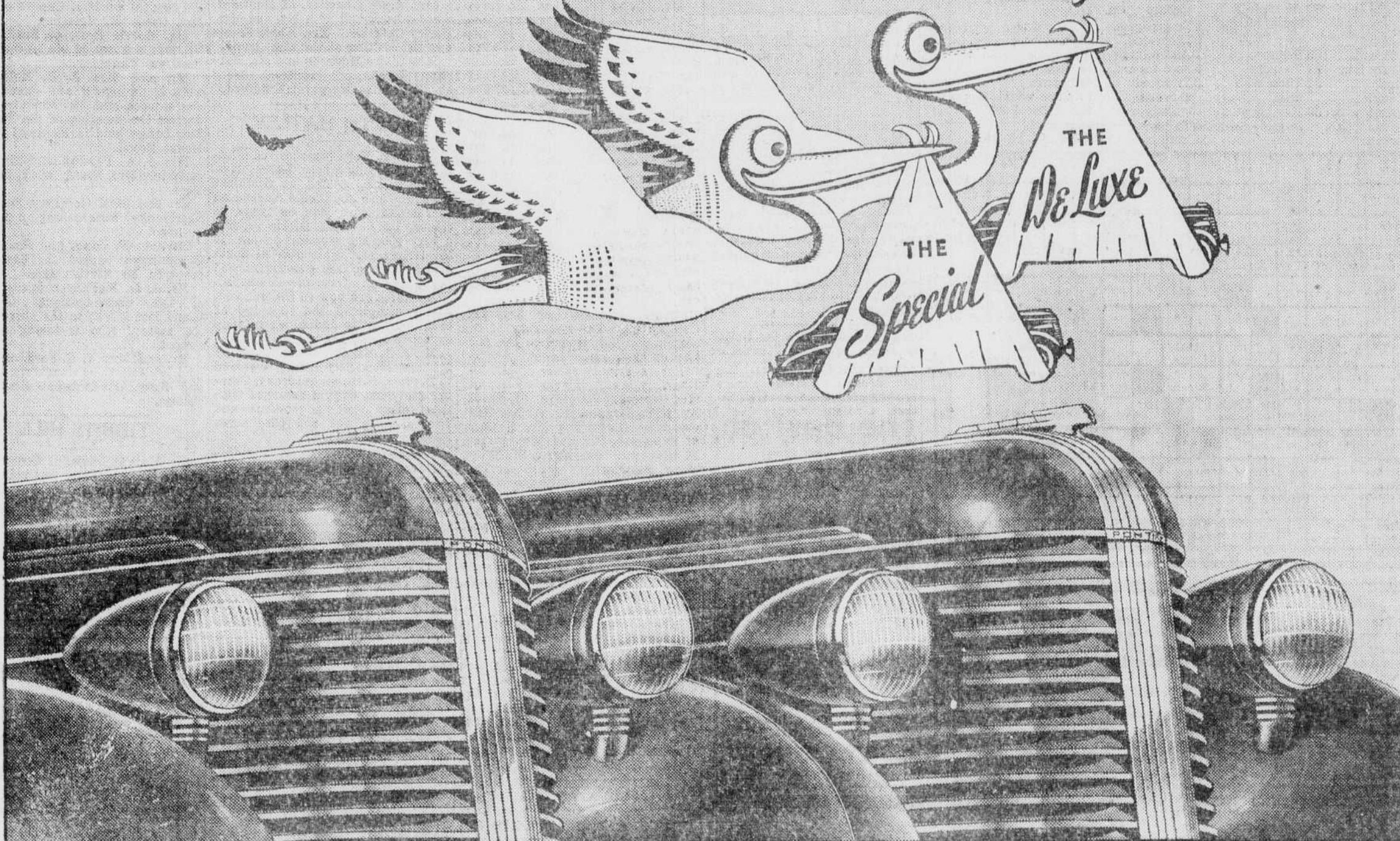

Lecture Entitled "A Cavalcade of British History" Given by Rev. T. W. Jones, M.A., B.D., Was Very Interesting.

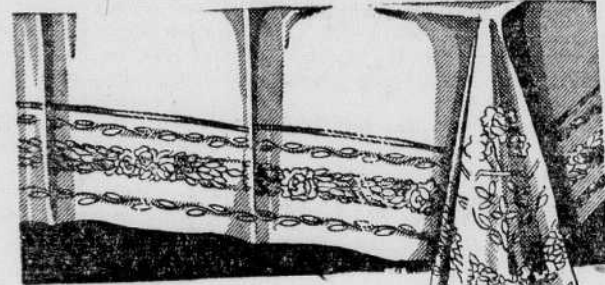
