

BRUNEAU IS ACCLAIMED MAYOR

Full Slate Goes In Without Opposition

Closing of nominations Tuesday at Westmount City Hall without any sign of opposition to the Westmount Municipal Association slate for a series of elective posts in the municipality resulted in the election by acclamation of A. Sydney Bruneau, Q.C., as mayor and the balance of the municipal association nominees.

Rooming House Uneasy 'Truce' May Continue

Evidence that the battle between rooming-house keepers and the City of Westmount, is to be seen in the recent verdicts of Recorder Stocker against A. Ruttinger of Elm avenue and J. Kivriskis, Metcalfe avenue.

Commenting on the situation, E. Menard of the Westmount Guest House and Property Owners Association said that while the group had a temporary understanding that the city would not press cases until the Therrien case appeal is concluded, there are many operating illegally in the city at the time who are not members of the association. He expressed the hope that the new council, to be sworn next week, will continue the 'truce' until after the Therrien case is settled.

Officials of the city report that the Ruttinger and Kivriskis cases were taken on points outside the understanding with the association of which Mr. Menard is president.

It is generally believed that the 'truce' would be continued by the new council until the Therrien case is heard but so far no date has been set by the Supreme Court for it.

Mayor Bruneau will hold office for two years, as did his predecessor, J. A. deLalanne.

The nominations were made by the Westmount Municipal Association on December 11th and the association's complete list of candidates were affirmed.

The six aldermen and their terms of office are: Alfred Powis, one year; G. G. Ryan, one year; J. C. Cushing, two years; Hugh G. Seybold, two years; Michael Garber, Q.C., three years; and Frank E. H. Gates, three years.

Elected to Westmount School Commission for three year terms were William P. Carr and A. Reid Tilley.

Mrs. Dent Harrison and R. Panet-Raymond were elected to the city's library trustee board. Mrs. Harrison will complete the term vacated by J. E. L. Hollyer, who resigned, while Mr. Panet-Raymond will serve three years.

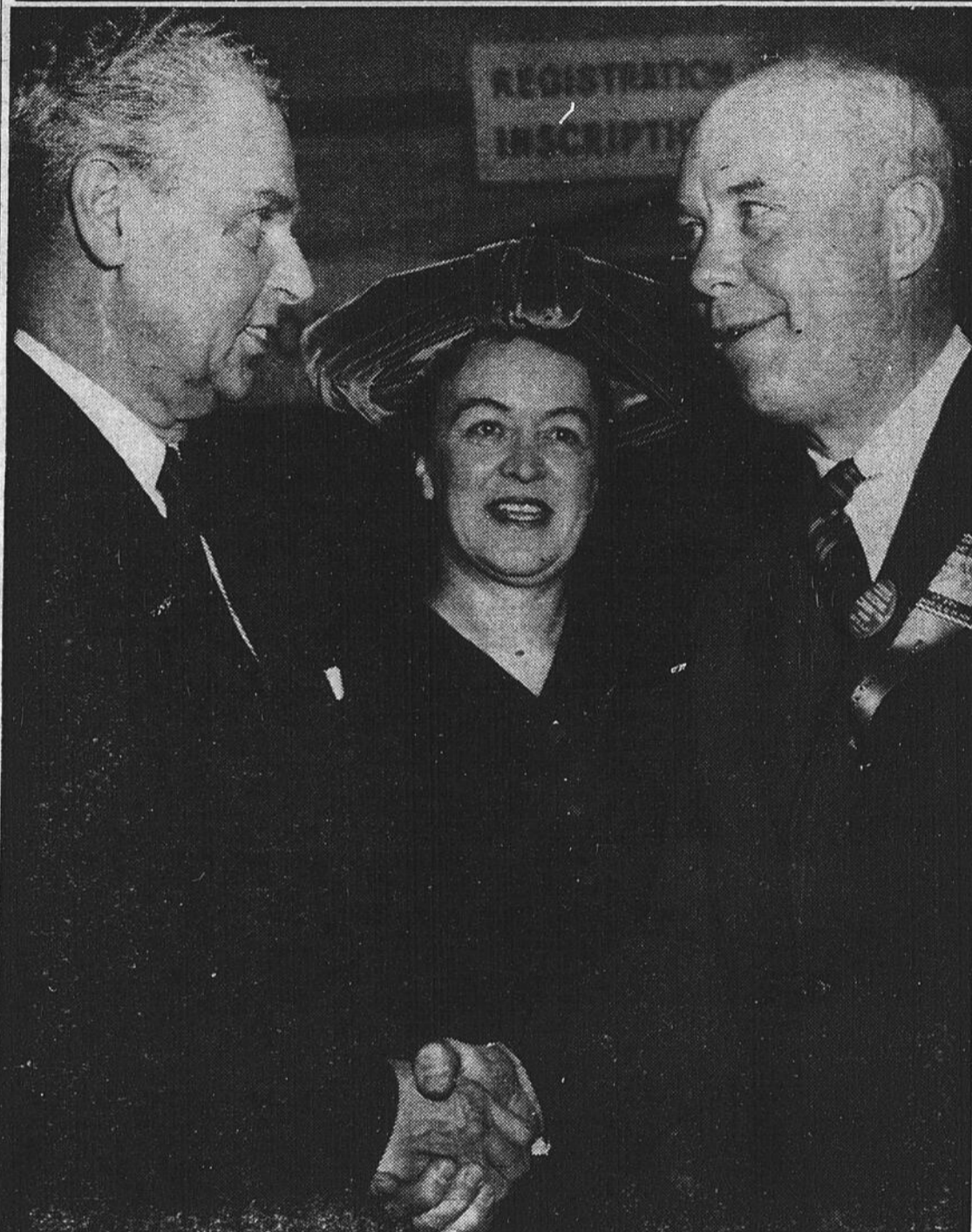
Installation of those elected will take place soon at Westmount City Hall.

Space Heater Explodes; Fire Damages Dwelling

Flames raced through a third floor dwelling at 165 Selby Street late Monday night, at the height of the week's cold spell.

The fire started at the residence of B. Campbell Jr., when a space heater exploded, causing a flash-fire in the hallway. Firemen under Captain Albert Avery and Lieutenant Harold Rowe of the Westmount Fire Department, confined the fire mostly to the hall. Damage to the area was reported to be extensive.

Chief E. G. Durocher stated that all occupants got out safely through the back door, seeking shelter with neighbours. At the time of the outbreak, it is estimated the outside temperature was close to 15 degrees below the zero mark.

The owner of the building, B. O. Campbell Sr., of 163 Selby St., began taking stock of the damage early Tuesday morning.

Fire In Wiring

A fire which is believed to have started in faulty wiring caused light damage here Friday at the supper-hour. The blaze broke out in a building at 320 Elm Avenue, and shortly could be seen shooting out of a skylight. Firemen tore down part of a wall to extinguish the fire. No one was injured.

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Westmount Rotarians Present \$15,000 More To Weredale Treasury

A cheque for \$15,000.00 was presented by Ernest E. Mills of the Rotary Club of Westmount to Ewart A. Everson, president of Weredale House Wednesday. This Club of Westmount, which have been held in the latter money is derived from the annual carnivals of The Rotary part of June, since 1942, on the grounds of Westmount Park, St. Catherine St. W., at the Glen.

Here, once a year, for a full week Westmount Rotarians act as carnival men, in order to raise money for the underprivileged, the sick and the homeless. The support by the many friends of the club, and citizens at large, does the rest.

Weredale House, which is a Red Feather Agency, was formerly the Boys' Home of Montreal, established in 1870 for the purpose of providing care for boys who would otherwise be homeless, irrespective of creed, colour or condition. Its new name, "Weredale House", came about through the establishment of a new building in Weredale Park, near the corner of Atwater Avenue and Dorchester Street, in 1930. Since moving into Weredale Park, almost three thousand boys have been provided with all the cares of home, and in addition, a club programme which includes sports, cultural activities and camping.

A new addition to Weredale House was urgently needed to provide accommodation for an additional 25 boys, thus increasing the sleeping facilities to 185 beds. This addition was recently completed at the cost of \$95,000.00, made possible through bequests and contributions from friends of Weredale, amounting to \$80,000.00. The Rotary Club of Westmount donated the balance to complete the project.

This contribution is only one of the many received by Weredale over the years from the Westmount Rotarians, as they are, and always have been greatly interested in the work being done in providing care for the homeless boys through the Weredale House Organization. The Club is particularly interested in the development of the Weredale Summer Camp at Lake L'Achigan, for which it provided the initial fund in 1934 for the pur-

chase of the land, and the erection of the main camp buildings. Since then, Westmount Rotarians have followed with keen interest, the activities of the camp, and the Club has made further contributions which have resulted in additional sleeping huts and provided increased accommodations for the senior boys, new boats and waterfront facilities.

Recently, the Rotary Club of Westmount made it possible for the purchase of adjoining land to guarantee adequate drinking water and to provide for future expansion.

Specialization Said Keynote For Modern Realty Business

Speaking before members of the Westmount Rotary Club, Wednesday, a real estate brokerage executive discussed Montreal's real estate assessment plight.

Ronald Mills, manager of commercial and industrial real estate for a local brokerage firm, said the present Montreal assessment roll was arbitrarily adopted by city council, without recourse in the final analysis, to specialized experts in the field.

Presently, the city combines three methods of assessment, depending on the nature of the property. They are: determining of market value, the economic

method (which considers more factors than the first) and the method of probing construction costs. Although these methods are in keeping with advanced real estate management, said the speaker, the fact that city council has final say in such a controversial matter, leaves the way open for much criticism.

In discussing other "facets of his topic, "The Forward Look

In Real Estate," Mr. Mills noted that specialization was slowly becoming the keynote of most up-to-date real estate organizations. The era of the one-man real estate expert is fast disappearing, he said. With development of land gaining increasing momentum and becoming more

complex, a great variety of special services, must be provided by any large brokerage house. Such services may include, re-assessment of rolls which can be defended in the courts, or the pooling of the brokerage's administrative and managerial

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Hashomayim Marks 110th Anniversary

Two prominent figures in American Jewery will be guest speakers this weekend, at ceremonies marking the 110th anniversary of the 1,500 member Congregation Shaar Hashomayim. They are Dr. Solomon Grayzel and Dr. Abraham Neuman.

The first Sabbath Service of Re-dedication honouring the anniversary, will take place Saturday, at the Synagogue with Dr. Solomon Grayzel noted historian and scholar, as guest preacher.

The anniversary dinner will commemorate the incorporation of the "Congregation of English, German and Polish Jews" which the Legislature of Lower Canada authorized in the ninth year of Queen Victoria's reign, at the request of 36 of the estimated 150 Jewish citizens living here in 1846.

History

Modest "chambers", rented at \$10 monthly, in what is now the bustling financial district and was then known as Great St. James St., provided the first place of worship of the congregation which later was named Shaar Hashomayim and now occupies the handsome Westmount synagogue.

The founding fathers were immigrants from England, Germany and parts of the Russian Empire, but they had in common their attachment to the synagogue ritual known as Ashkenazic or German, as opposed to the Sephardic tradition of the descendants of the Spanish exiles Montreal's first synagogue, founded in 1768, was Sephardic.

It was this factor that led to the incorporation of Shaar Hashomayim, which stipulated in its first bylaws that the mode of worship would be modelled after that observed in the Bayswater Synagogue in London.

The congregation's first house of worship was erected just 99 years ago at 41 St. Constant St. (now DeBullion St.) which the minutes of 1858 described as "a very central location." In little more than a quarter of a century later this synagogue, which accommodated 200 worshippers, had been outgrown and was replaced by one with three times the capacity on what was by 1885 a "central location" on McGill College Ave.

In 1922 Shaar Hashomayim dedicated the present Westmount building, with a membership which had grown from 250 in 1900, to 525 when the new synagogue was dedicated. In 1948 the congregation opened a large extension to its premises which serves as its educational centre and represents a memorial to Rev. Dr. Herman Abramowitz, who died in 1947 after serving as Shaar Hashomayim's spiritual leader for 45 years.

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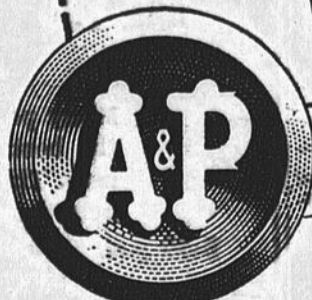

The Double Life


The succession of days from the middle of December to the middle of January brings to mind the interrelationship of the spiritual and the natural, the secular and the religious, in human life. The preparation for Christmas is in theory a religious preparation for a religious event with a gay family atmosphere; but New Year's Day is in most minds a secular event but with strong religious undertones. That is characteristic

Man belongs to two worlds; or if you prefer, he is a citizen of one world with two aspects — the sacred and the secular. He is of the dust of the earth, but he shares the nature of God, and he lives continually in that double world. He must go about

his everyday life, but in joy and in sorrow he is never allowed for long to forget that there is another life as well. We may allow the natural life the first place, because we are never free of it; St. Paul says "That is not first which is spiritual but that which is natural"; but we balance that with our Lord's words to His Mother: "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?"

Our Lord naturally belongs to the world of supernature; and St. Paul reminds us that we must "seek those things which are above where Christ sits on the right hand of God." But on the other hand, Our Lord left that state which was naturally His and "for us men and for our salvation came down from Heaven" into this world where we naturally belong. So the two worlds are indissolubly bound together. So are the two sides of our life. We do not keep the sacred and the secular in two watertight compartments. The love of God affects the work we

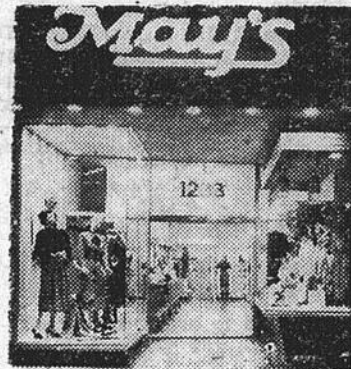

Seed Potatoes — Twenty-four thousand acres of 36 potato varieties were passed for certification as Foundation Class seed (the highest quality produced in Canada) by the Plant Protection Division, Canada Department of Agriculture, in 1956. Of this total the Sebago variety accounted for 10,521 acres, Katahdins for 3,877, Netted Gem 2,531, Irish Cobbler 2,028, Kennebec 1,353 and Green Mountains 1,870. The other varieties had much smaller acreages, ranging from 512 acres of Red Pontiacs down to one-tenth of an acre of Dakota Reds (Clark's No. 3). The total was 104 acres more than in 1955 but 1,464 less than in 1954.

The population of the Yukon Territory in 1951 was only one-third of its population in 1901.

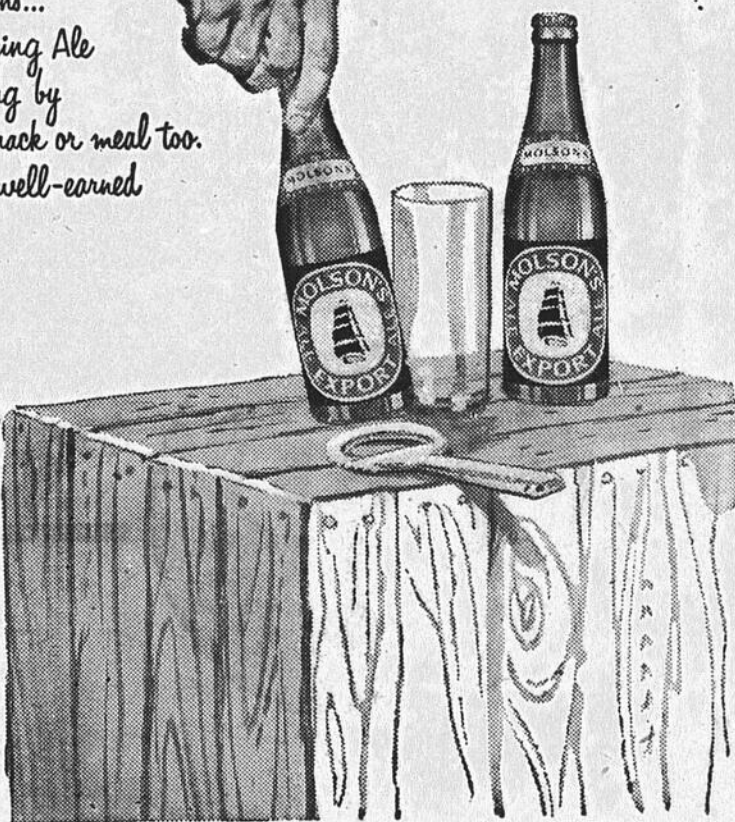


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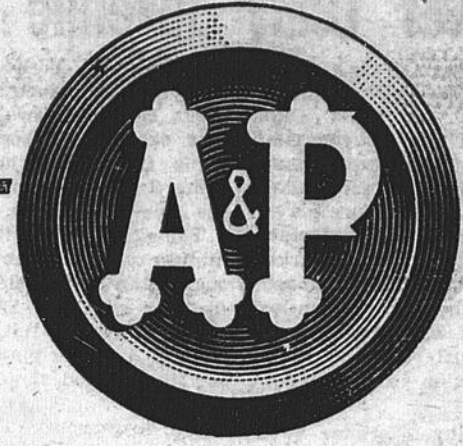
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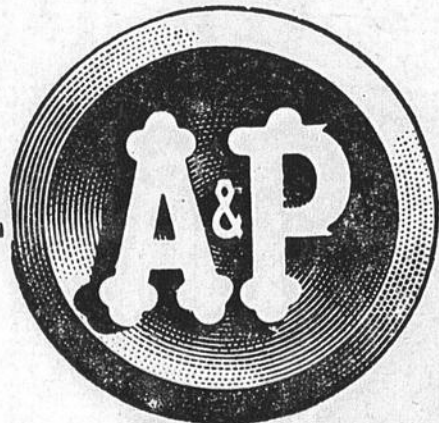
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
