Apparently the fare hike works out to something near 27½%

Good Home Needed For The Old Equities

Donald Roney of 337 Hamilton Ave., Ottawa, in searching information about his ancestors, came to The Equity office yesterday. He wanted to look through some old copies to find an obituary of one J. McGill Roney who died September 23, 1882 in Portage du Fort.

As The Equity was founded in 1883, there would be no obituary from the previous September but Mr. Roney is of the opinion that some other paper was being published, perhaps in Portage du Fort, in 1882 and this might hold the obituary. If anyone has any information on this subject, Mr. Roney would be most pleased to hear from them. He is also hoping somebody might have an old photo which includes his ancestor, J. McGill Roney, who was a lawyer in Portage du Fort before his death in 1882.

On the subject of looking through old copies of The Equity, this office is now in an embarrassing position. We have had to store the old copies in an inaccessible place behind the press where they are of no use to anyone but we are willing to part with them if someone can come up with the proper solution. To be usable by interested people they should be on convenient shelves and there should be a large table or two with chairs or stools. The room for them should be protected from dampness, sunlight, dryness, children, cats, mice and termites as well as from "collectors" who might take clippings. Their home should be in Shawville, and under the care of someone who is really interested in them and who might

have time to go through them, repairing them, listing the missing copies and trying to track down some of these.

Anyone who is interested in this sort of thing may contact Mrs. Dickson at The Equity office to discuss it further. As the old copies of The Equity date back to 1883 they constitute a very important history of the area and seeing that they get a proper home is of utmost importance.

In the minutes of the July meeting it was noted that the Personnel Committee had approved certain increases; that for purposes of bookkeeping the value of the Ade Memorial donation was set at \$500 for the land and \$5000 for the building; that the hospital decided to continue as in the past re water rates to the town and that notes would be provided for publication in The Equity when Mrs. Dickson was unable to attend meetings.

Director Ken Smith suggested that the food in the kitchen be controlled by the cook and she be held responsible. A lengthy

Quebec Police Officers Checking Everywhere In Pontiac Sept. 4

Lots of people have been phoning the Quebec Provincial Police Campbell's Bay Detachment to ask if it is safe to cross the bridge at Portage today, in view of the alleged FLQ threat. The police are of the opinion that it is safe because as Corporal Laxton says, if it is the FLQ we are concerned with, "they are not criminals, just political". Freddie Laxton also believes that the threat came from outside Pontiac as last week's suspect has been tracked down and is no

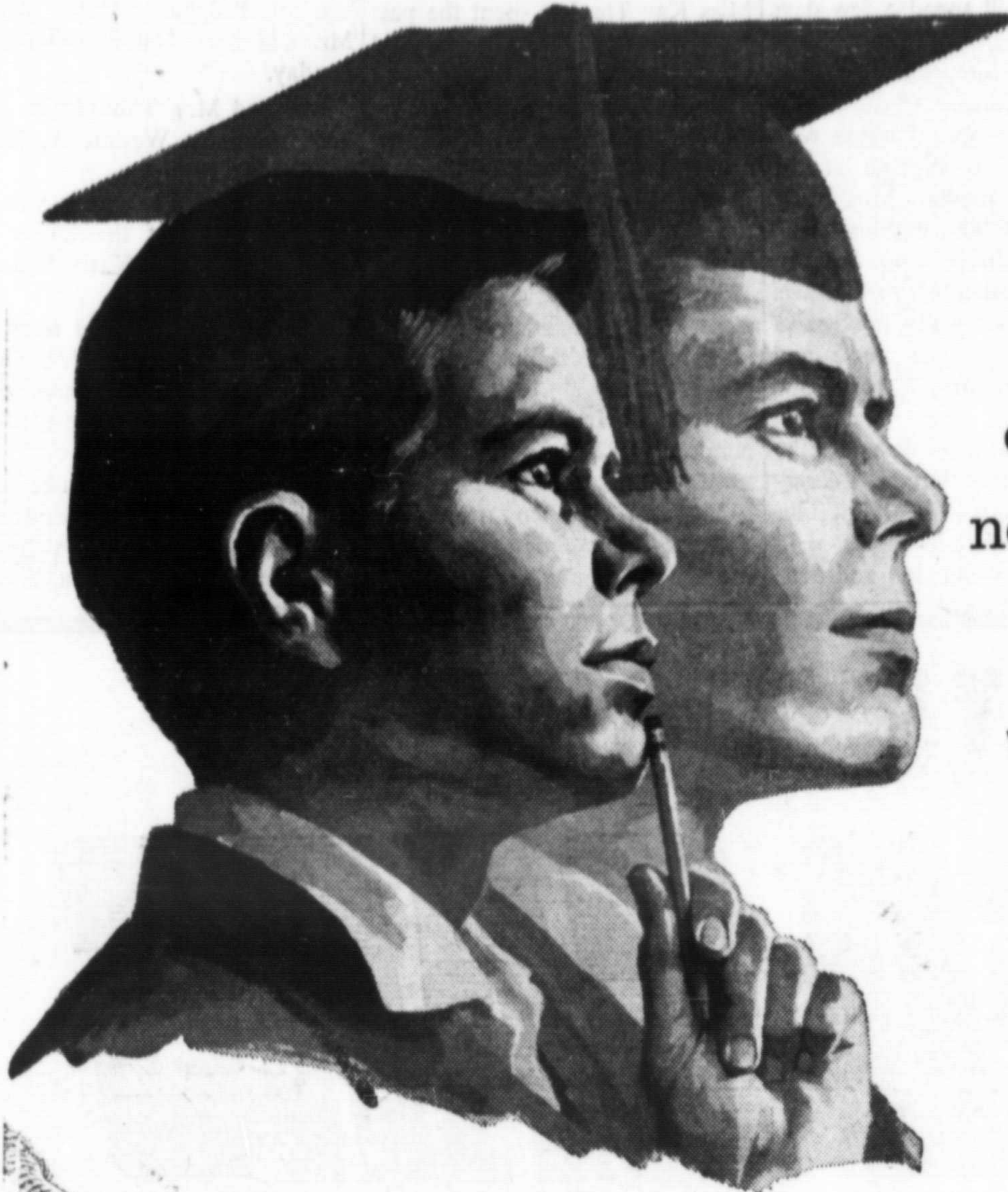

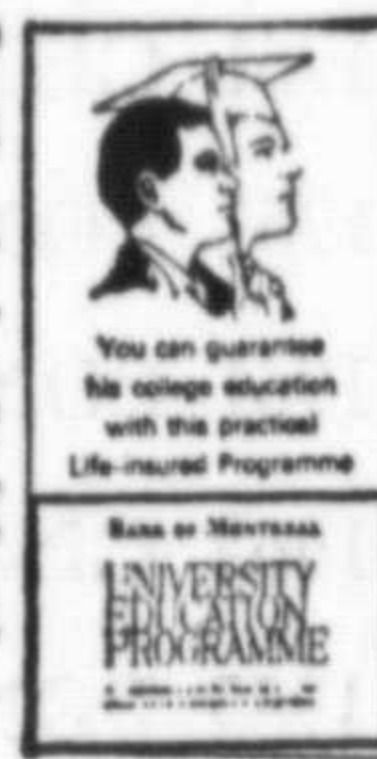

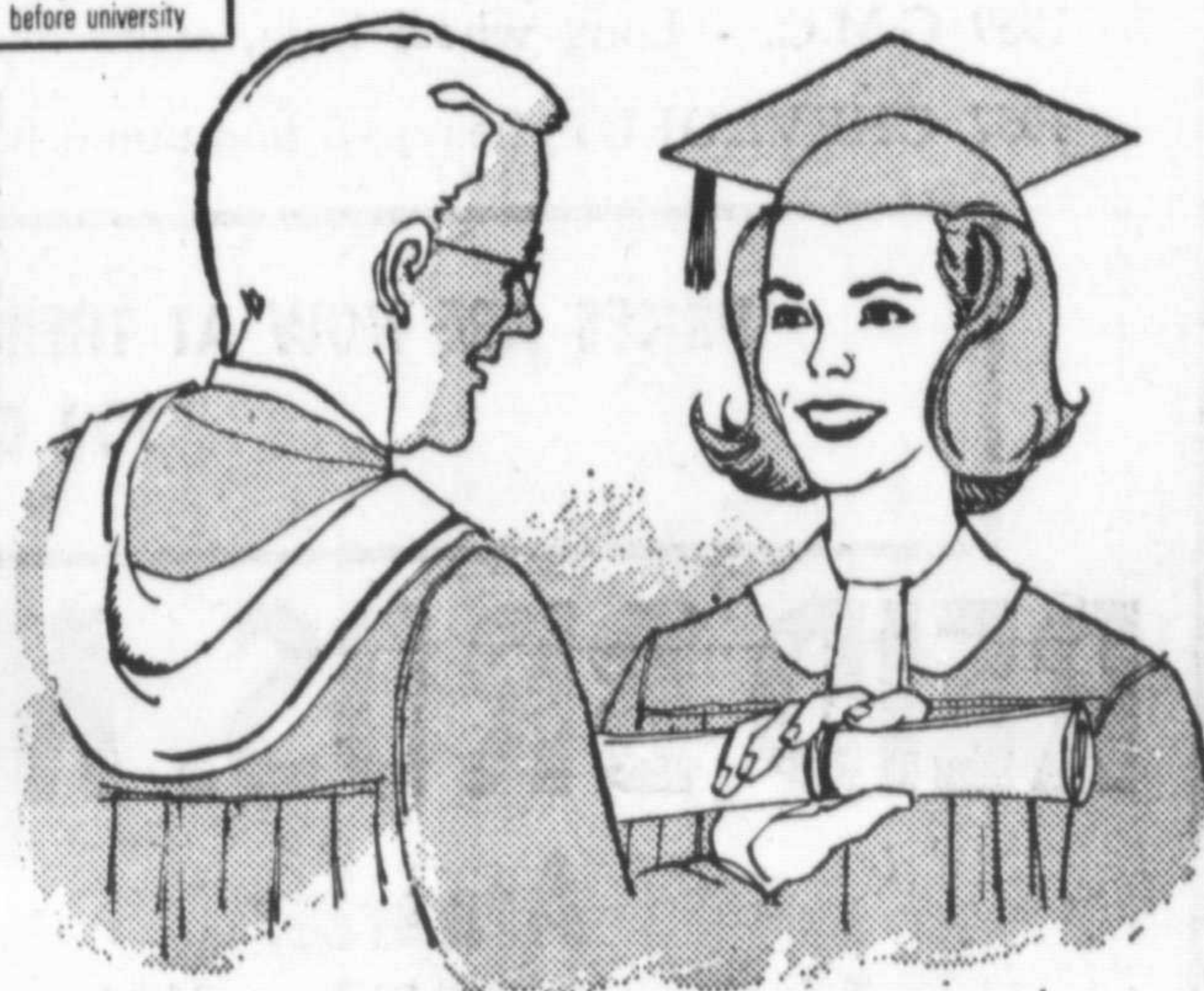

Rotary Hears Alex Macdonald On Insurance

Some members of Shawville Rotary are quite incensed about the fact that the Agricultural Society can't allow them to have a food booth on the grounds this year. After considerable discussion at Monday's meeting it was decided not to have any booth at all of any sort this year at the Fair. The Rotary had been given the opportunity to supply meals and barbecue chicken as in the past years but had declined the offer, wishing only to have the barbecue booth, but not the dining room. However the one without the other does not fit in with the regulations agreed upon between the Fair Board and the Midway people so unless the meal caterers provide barbecued chicken that specialty will be missing from the scene.

Court Report

Following is court held before District Judge Arthur Labbe at Campbell's Bay on August 23:

Cyril Mercier, 25, Chapeau, Que. pleaded guilty on a charge of having driven a motor vehicle while his ability to drive was impaired by alcohol. Miss Greta Lepine, Bryson, pleaded guilty on charges of assault on Mrs. Asa Ostrom of the same place and of having caused damages to the latter for an amount of \$7. She was ordered to pay the damages caused and the court costs. In default of payment 5 days in jail. The court was told that the two women got into an argument which ended by the accused assaulting Mrs. Ostrom and tearing her dress.

Laurent Bertrand, 53, of Fort Coulonge, pleaded guilty on a charge of having driven a motor vehicle while his ability to drive was impaired by alcohol. He was fined \$100. ordered to pay the court costs and in default of payment 8 days in jail.

On two other charges of having consumed alcoholic beverages in a motor vehicle in motion on public highway, and of having driven the same motor vehicle which was not equipped with two red lights at the rear in good operating condition, he was fined a total of \$35., ordered to pay the court costs and in default of payment 8 additional days in jail. He also was prohibited to drive a motor vehicle in Canada for a period of one month.

Three youths from Ottawa pleaded guilty on a charge of breaking and entering the St. Mary's School at the village of Quyon when they stole \$12.00 in cash and caused damages to the school. The parents of these young men told the court that they had paid for the damages caused and reimbursed the school authorities the amount of \$12.00 taken from the school.

They were given a suspended sentence and ordered to furnish a personal bail bond of \$100. to keep the peace for a period of 12 months.

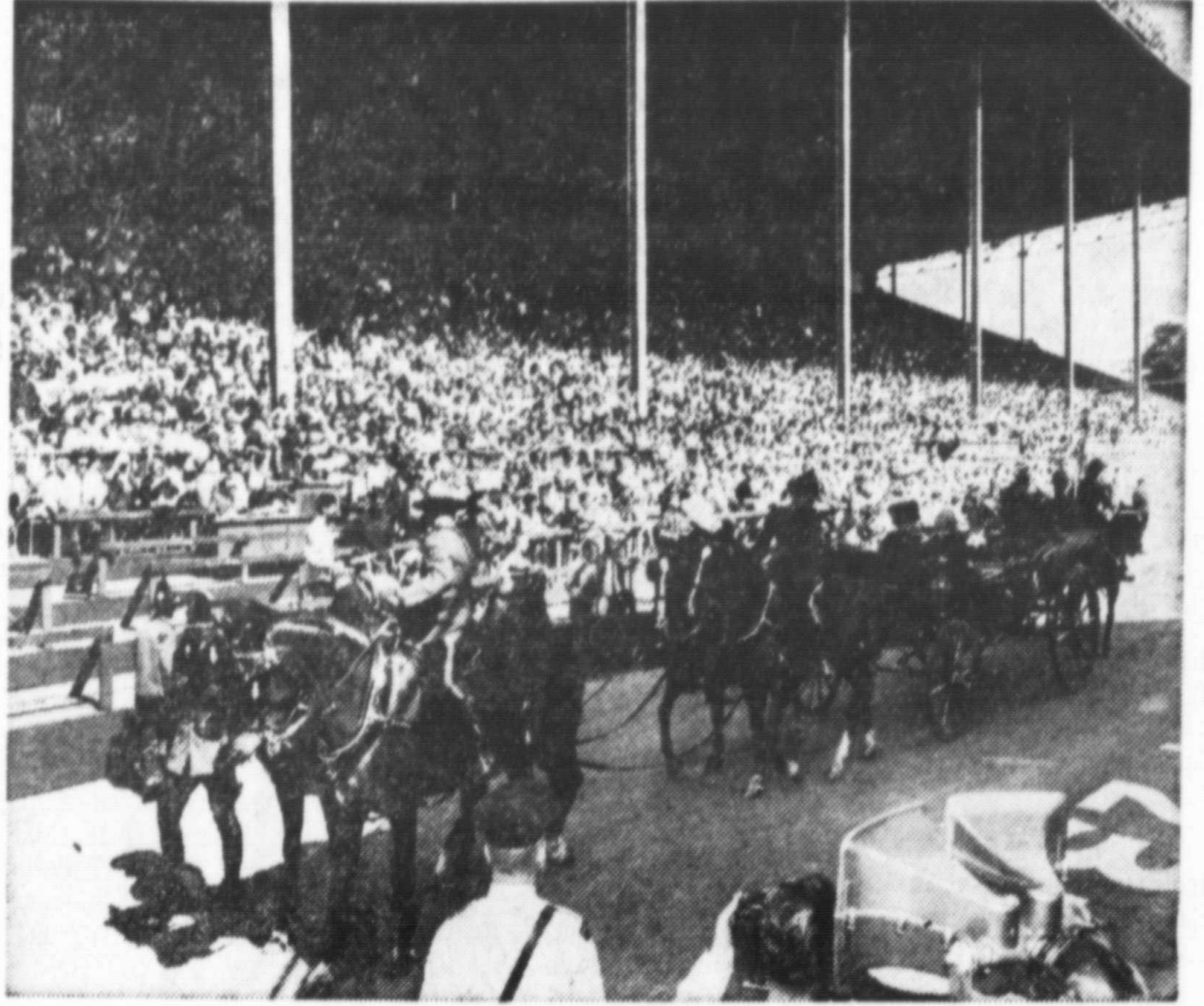

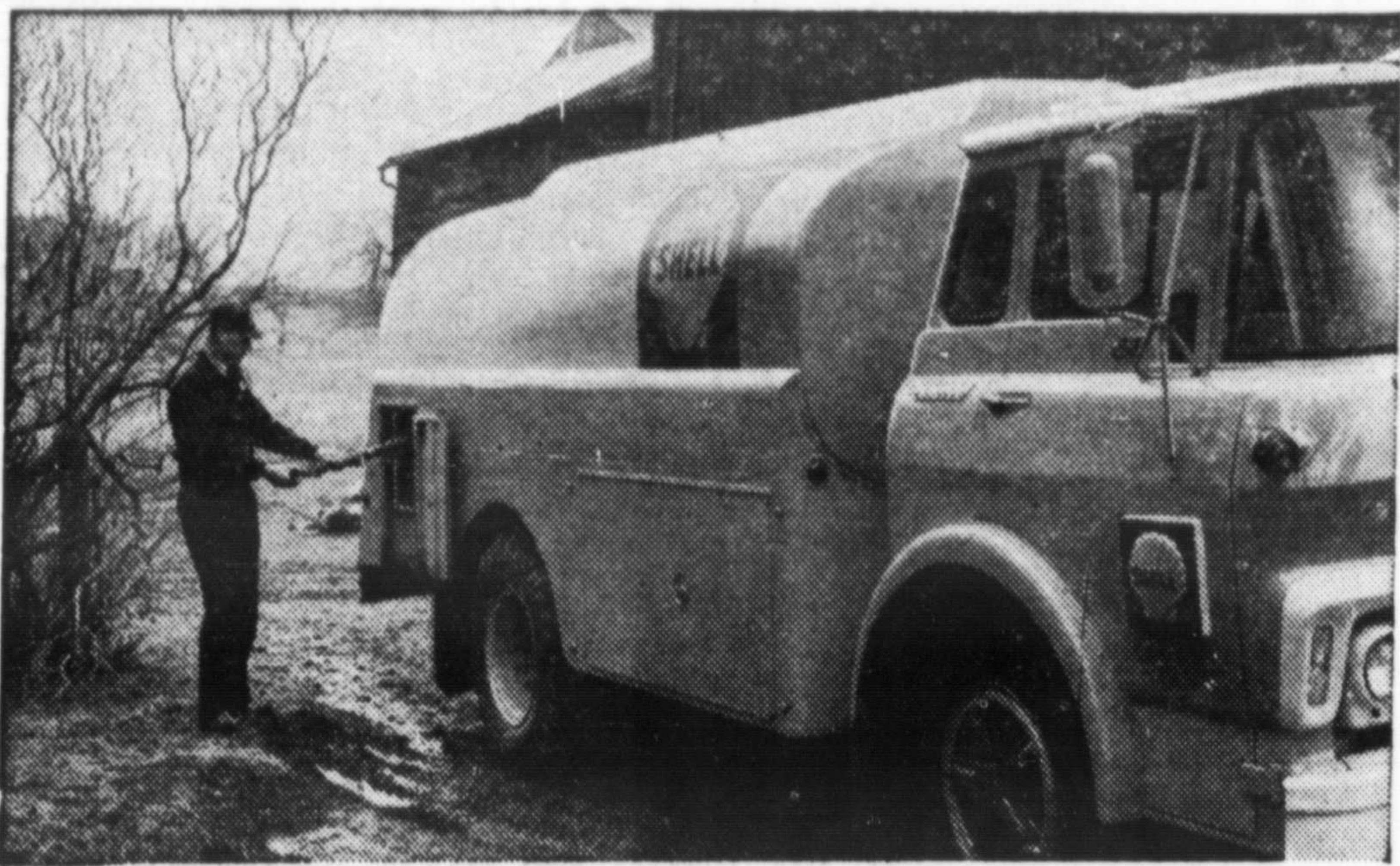
New High School Eases Crowding At Aylmer

Back to school. Mournful youngsters and gleeful mothers. Add it up — the day after Labor Day! This year in Aylmer, Catholic high school students will be lodged in their new school, St. Joseph's on Broad Street. The 22-room school includes a student cafeteria, snack-bar, kitchen, teachers' room, library, and gymnasium. Housing both French and English pupils, each under their own separate principal, the new school will release additional and badly-needed classroom space at St. Mark's School opened only last year, and overcrowded even on opening day. It is expected that some 250-English-speaking students will be accommodated in the new school which will offer a commercial course in addition to the regular grades 8 to 11 of the academic course. Arrangements have been made to permit students who have already completed Grade 11 to take the Quebec Commercial certificate in a single year at the new school instead of the usual two years of Grade 10 and 11.

Details of registration for the French classes are not available, but it is known that two Grade 7 classes of boys will be housed in the new school and some 200 high school boys as well. English classes will be co-educational.
