## LONGBOAT DID NOT SHOW IN MARATHON

Race Was Won by American Runner, Though Italian Failed Few Yards From Finish

## ITALIAN MADE GALLANT STRUGGLE

London, July 24.—It would be no exaggeration in the minds of any of the 100,000 spectators who witnessed the finish of the Marathon race to-day to say that it was the most thrilling athletic event that has occurred since that Marathon race in ancient Greece, where the victor fell at the goal and with a wave of triumph, died. The race itself, with 58 of the best men drawn from the runners of four continents competing, the enormous cosmopolitan assemblage including the Queen of England and the dramatic incidents at the end, combined to make an historic day. Nine English and six American runners started in the Marathon race, John F. Hayes, the Irish-American A. C. runner, being the victor. Hafferson, of South Africa. He was the oldest among the runners, having 34 years to his credit, and he made a remarkable pace, but Hayes was the better man. The first Englishman to finish was twelfth. He was W. T. Clarke. Duncan, the former English champion, who won the preliminary English trial, fell out at the twelfth mile and like several other contestants were taken into a motor car and brought to the stadium. The three Canadians, Wood, Simpson (the Indian), and Lawson finished in fifth, sixth and seventh place respectively, and with the representatives of the United States deprived England of its claim in the leadership of the long running branch of athletics. It will not escape any laurels from the brow of Hayes, who won a good race, to say that the hero of the day was the Italian, Dorando. The admiration and sympathy of every person in the stadium went out to the gallant Italian, who, although he did not win, deserved to win and did more than the limit of his powers than any other man who ran.

Just before the end of the race all eyes were focussed on the Stadium gate, where the contestants were to enter. Finally a runner which turned out to be Dorando staggered down the incline, leading to the track. He stood. Stevens had a thorough and practical

## PERFORMANCE OF PAGEANT

Large Crowd of Spectators Yesterday Saw a Splendid Project.

A large assemblage followed the performance of the pageant with interest and appreciation last night. All the minor defects have been corrected and everything points to a brilliant success to-day. There was no dragging or confusion at the entries and all the scenes showed an increase in vigor and faithfulness of portrayal. Especially was this so in all those scenes in which the Indians take part and the snake dance and calumet dance evoked a tumult of applause. The Dollard scene too was far more realistic as the men in the fort held their fire much better and the attacks and ruses of the Indians seemed natural and characteristic. Chiefs American Horse, Scourface, Soray, and Deep Sky, are splendid specimens of a passing race and would attract attention anywhere. Monsieur Raymond as Cartier in the first two scenes was inimitable and his fine voice is a feature of the pageant. Several statues have just been added to the court scene at Fontainebleau. Here, an Apollo, one or two leering satyrs and some griffins lend a classic effect which is in harmony with the Bacchus and the dancing of the fauns. The pavane as usual received a hearty ovation, in fact the evening was one round of continuous applause. One of the strongest scenes and probably the one which demands the most acting is the Fontainebleau scene. Monsieur d'Artois gives a faithful representation of the haughty old count whose fiery valor is in no way diminished by his advancing years. Monsieur A. Larue is worthy of congratulation in the role of the passionate Valrennes, and Monsieur O. Morin as the envoy should meet with recognition.

There is no doubt that the march

then turned to the left, although a red cord had been drawn about the track in the opposite direction for the runners to follow. It was evident that the man was practically delirious. A squad of officials ran out and expostulated with him, but apparently he was afraid that they were trying to deceive him and fought to go on to the left. At length he turned about and started on the right path. Then followed an exhibition never to be forgotten. Dorando staggered along like a man in a dream, with arms shaking and legs tottering. People had lost thought of his nationality and partisanship was forgotten. They knew nothing of him, as he had not been mentioned among the probable winners but they realized that his struggle must have been a terrific one to bring him thus right to the threshold of victory.

Dorando staggered on toward the turn and dropped to the ground exhausted. According to the rules of the race, physicians should have taken him away, but sympathetic track officials lifted him to his feet and gave him support. Four times Dorando fell in the three hundred yards that separated him from the finish and three times after the doctors had poured stimulants down his throat was dragged to his feet and finally was pushed across the line with one man at his back and another holding him by the arm. His part in the race for all practical purposes was ended when he entered the Stadium, for unless he received assistance he could not have finished.

Hayes entered the Stadium less than a minute behind Dorando and finished fresh. In the excitement he failed to get even from his own country the reception he deserved. It is a question whether public opinion will ever support another Marathon race here. Dorando's condition when he finished and the condition of many of the contestants in to-day's event led people to think it is worse than prize fighting or bull fighting. The American athletes are sending to Italy their congratulations on Dorando's magnificent fight for victory.

The Italian Dorando should have been out of the race three miles from home. He ran well for 21 miles but had come too fast and had to be assisted even before he reached the Stadium, but not to the same extent.

## MAGNIFICENT PARADE ON PLAINS FOR PRINCE

One of the 'Grandest Sights Ever Seen in the Ancient Capital—Immense Crowd Present

## TRANSFER OF BATTLEFIELD PARK.

One of the most magnificent spectacles that has ever been witnessed in the Ancient Capital, the military town par excellence of the Dominion, was undoubtedly the naval and military parade which took place yesterday morning, when His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales reviewed the greatest mobilization of troops which has ever taken place in Canada. Added to the Canadian troops was a large detachment of the navies of three nations, there being nearly 4,000 British sailors, 500 French and 400 American sailors in the parade which passed before the heir to the throne of Great Britain.

From early morning the troops began to march to the Plains, and when the Prince arrived the full naval and military force was ready to march past. The stands were packed to their utmost capacity with a distinguished gathering, among whom were quickly distinguished Earl Roberts, Lord Strathcona, the Duke of Norfolk, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. B. L. Borden, Sir Fred. Borden and members of the Military Council, the admirals and officers of the British, American and French fleets, Hon. Mr. Fielding, Premier Whitney of Ontario, and many prominent citizens of the Dominion.

The Prince of Wales left the Citadel, accompanied by Earl Grey and suite, at 10.15 a.m. and proceeded to the Plains of Abraham. En route to the ground made sacred by the shedding of the blood of heroes, H.R.H. halted at the age and weather-beaten monument to Wolfe and paid homage to the memory of one of the heroes who will ever live in the history of the Ancient Capital and of the Dominion which has sprung from the early work of the French pioneers headed by Samuel de Champlain.

Meantime the various regiments were marching on to the plains for the review, and the town was alive with martial music as the corps proceeded to the ground. Every available man of the twelve thousand or more men who have been assembled here was on duty for the occasion, and the 8th Royal Rifles, the 9th Regiment of Voltigeurs and the Queen's Own Canadian Hussars turned out as representatives of the local forces. The Quebec men fell in at the Drill Hall and marched out to the Plains, and they received quite an ovation en route. They deserved all the honor accorded them, for they showed up well and gave every evidence of a claim to be numbered among the leading and most effective corps of the country.

When H.R.H. reached the Plains he made a careful inspection of the troops and sailors assembled and seemed well pleased with the fine showing made by Canada's citizen soldiery. The mounted forces in particular claimed attention owing to their number and soldierly appearance and fitness. H.R.H. was accompanied on his inspection by Earl Roberts, and the latter evidently seemed greatly interested in the representatives of Canada's soldiery, with whom he has already had effective and satisfactory experience.

After the inspection the Prince of Wales entered the Royal box in the grand stand, where the formal ceremony of the handing over of the title deeds of the Plains of Abraham and St. Foye to the Governor-General was proceeded with. This was a very simple function. The Prince called Earl Grey to the front and made the following address:—

"It affords me the greatest pleasure to hand over to Your Excellency, the representative of the Crown in Canada, the sum of \$450,000 which, through the patriotism of British citizens in all parts of Canada and of the Empire, and the generosity of French and American sympathizers has been entrusted to me, in order that the historic battlefields of Quebec, on which the two contending races won equal and imperishable glory, may be acquired for the people of the Dominion, and preserved under the special supervision of the sovereign, as a permanent shrine of union and peace. I place in your hands, as representative of the Sovereign, the charge of this sacred ground which it is my pleasure to be able to present to you on the 300th birthday of Quebec as a gift to the people of Canada and the Crown."

The Governor-General replied to the Prince's address as follows:—  
"As Governor-General of Canada and in the name of the Government and of the people of the Dominion, I accept this sacred trust which Your Royal Highness, the heir to the throne, has graciously placed in my hands."  
This accomplished the grand military and naval march past began. H.R.H. took up a position on horse back in front of the grand stand, and attended by Earl Roberts and Earl Grey inspected the various regiments as they marched past. The spectacle, as already stated, was one of the most magnificent ever witnessed here. The sight of the immense body of soldiers and sailors as they swept by with all the precision and steadiness which training can give made a sight which will live long in the memories of all who beheld it. The troops were greeted with thunder of applause by the immense crowd who had assembled to witness the parade, and as night began to descend the bluejackets captured

a more than liberal amount of admiration. Close contenders with the sailors were the little detachment which have so worthily represented the Northwest Mounted Police during the present celebration. The Highland regiments and the artillery also came in for special attention. On the conclusion of the royal review H. R. H. proceeded to the monument des Braves where honor was also done to the memory of other little less famed generals than Wolfe and Montcalm in the history of Quebec. The Prince returned to the Citadel via St. Foye, St. John, De Salaberry, St. Cyrille, Claire Fontaine and Grande Allee, being received with the greatest of enthusiasm along the entire route. When the Prince arrived on the Plains he was given the royal salute by the troops.

## THE STATE BALL.

One of the main features of yesterday's programme was the state ball given by the Province of Quebec to His Royal Highness. As may be surmised this portion of the programme was in no way neglected, and at 9.30 most of the three thousand invited guests, had taken up their positions in the main corridors of the Parliament Buildings to await the arrival of His Royal Highness, who left the Citadel at 10.45, and proceeded by a cavalry escort arrived at the buildings ten minutes later. Notwithstanding the hour, thousands lined the streets between the Garrison Club and the Parliament Buildings and as His Royal Highness arrived he was received with prolonged cheering. As he entered the buildings he was given a salute by a detachment of the 7th Fusiliers, of London, Ont., Sir Louis Jette, Sir Louis Gouin and other distinguished civilians and military men awaited His Royal Highness at the main door of the building and as he alighted from his carriage, was immediately ushered to the Legislative Assembly Chamber, where he occupied a seat on the Speaker's Throne, having Countess Grey on his left.

Both the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly Chambers had been specially decorated for the circumstance as had also the corridors of the building, and the guests soon filled every available space in either of the chambers; the Assembly floor and galleries being particularly crowded, owing to the fact that the Prince remained there most of the evening, keeping up a conversation with a number of the guests including Field Marshal Earl Roberts, Lady Pole-Carew, Sir Louis Jette, Sir C. A. Pelletier, Premier Whitney, Mrs. F. C. Roy and Hon. Mr. Weir.

Dancing was kept up in both chambers to the strains of two well balanced orchestras and at midnight, supper was partaken of in the basement of the building. His Royal Highness escorted Mrs. A. Turgeon to the supper room, while Earl Grey escorted Mrs. J. C. Kaine.

Almost immediately after supper His Royal Highness drove back to the Citadel, while the guests continued until an early hour this morning.

Morris, of the 46th regiment, Port Hope, of the Canadian team, had won the grand aggregate at Bisley. Next to the King's prize this is the most honorable achievement of the meet. It is understood that this is only the second time that this honor has been won by a Canadian.

## TOUCHING INCIDENT AT THE PAGEANT

Dual Tribute Will Be Paid to Montcalm and Wolfe on the Plains.

Immediately at the close of the Royal Pageant, this afternoon a new and charming incident will be performed, when Wolfe and Montcalm's army will march together across the Plains to Wolfe's Monument, at the base of which Wolfe's prototype will lay a wreath of immortelles with the following inscription: "To the honor of Montcalm," and in turn, Montcalm's representative will deposit another wreath with the inscription: "To the honor of Wolfe," beside it; the two wreaths lying side by side on the historic field of battle where the two heroes met their death wounds. This should be a very touching incident, and shows that nothing has been left undone by the executive, even to the minutest detail, to pay proper respect to the heroes of those days.

## AUTOMOBILES.

Several complaints have been made  
to us of the practice of driving auto-  
mobiles beyond the legal speed, not-  
ably on the Ste. Foye road, where it  
is claimed they are some times run at  
the rate of 25 or 30 miles per hour.  
Besides being illegal the practice is  
at all times dangerous, and especially  
so at the present time when the city  
is crowded. The authorities should  
be on the lookout for the offenders.

## CANADIAN PROGRESS

The Scottish-American, which always  
takes an intelligent and kindly inter-  
est in Canadian affairs, thus com-  
ments on the official statistics of the  
trade of the Dominion for the year  
1907:

According to the Canadian annual  
statistics just published the total  
trade of the Dominion for the calendar  
year 1907 was \$646,150,000, of which  
\$273,325,000 were exports, and \$372,  
825,000 were imports. The exports  
showed an increase of \$3,849,000, and  
the imports an increase of \$52,758,000  
over the previous year. The figures  
for the fiscal year 1908, which ended  
with March 31st, make, approxima-  
tely, a similar showing.

Naturally its bordering neighbor,  
the United States, is a good customer  
of Canada. Last year Canada im-  
ported from there goods to the value  
of \$222,882,000, which was an increase  
of \$26,455,000 over the previous year.  
Then Canada's exports to the United  
States exceeded more than the aggre-  
gate of all the rest of North America,  
including Cuba and the West Indies;  
and more than twice its trade with  
South America or Asia, and four times  
that with Oceania. In its trade with  
the United Kingdom Canada gives prac-  
tically, a preference of about 30 per  
cent in customs duties; and its im-  
ports from there aggregate in value  
\$96,849,000, an increase over the pre-  
vious year of \$19,204,000, but its ex-  
ports thereto decreased by \$8,458,000.

Capitalists of the United States are  
finding Canada a good field for in-  
vestment. Since 1897 they have in-  
vested in no fewer than one hundred  
and fifty important industries. Dur-  
ing the year 1897 over 58,000 persons  
emigrated from the United States to  
Canada, taking with them at least  
\$49,000,000 in money and property.

The wheat crop of Canada now aver-  
ages, approximately, 100,000,000 bush-  
els annually. Its mineral production  
in 1907 amounted in value to \$86,183,  
000, an increase over that of 1906 of  
\$6,183,000. There was in 1907 a de-  
crease of \$4,000,000 in its gold pro-  
duction, but there was a slight in-  
crease in the value of its copper pro-  
ductions, while that of coal increased  
from \$14,945,000 to \$24,560,000.

In 1907 Canada added 1,500 miles to  
its railways, the total now in opera-  
tion being about 28,000 miles; and it  
is estimated that during the calendar  
year 1908 about \$75,000,000 will be  
spent in railway construction. It is  
contemplated also to develop 400,000  
electrical horsepower from Niagara on  
the Canadian side. About \$2,000,000  
is involved in an important electric  
light and power enterprise to trans-  
mit the power to London, Ont.

But the cost of living is also in-  
creasing in Canada, as it is elsewhere,  
so much so that to meet it a royal  
commission has recommended an in-  
crease in salaries for the civil service  
employees of 12 per cent in Eastern  
Canada and about 25 per cent in  
Western Canada.

It is gratifying to find that our  
progress is becoming so marked that  
it attracts outside attention, and cer-  
tainly the bill of particulars thus  
given by our confreres goes far to show  
that such attention is not unwarranted.  
The tribute comes at a fitting moment  
in the middle of the fetes in honor of  
the great man whose labors laid the  
foundations of the growing nation of  
to-day, and chimes in with the senti-  
ment of all the speakers at the func-  
tions that the bud of to-day is but the  
promise of a splendid blossom of to-  
morrow, and of the still more glori-  
ous fruitage of the future. There is,  
however, one feature of the progress  
claimed by our confreres to which we  
cannot altogether assent, and that is  
the last item, the recommendation of  
the royal commission of an increase  
on the salaries of the civil service  
employees to meet the increased cost  
of living. This is a little premature;  
the recommendation of the royal com-  
mission is indeed a fact; but so far  
no practical action has been taken on  
it, and the civil service employees have  
not got their much-needed increase yet.

## LEADING OF THE BLIND.

In an interview with Sir Wilfrid Laur-  
ier published a short time ago in the  
Boston Transcript that optimistical  
gentleman expressed the opinion that  
"the people of Canada are not given  
to being influenced by parliamentary  
charges and investigations." The as-  
sertion has somewhat startled the  
Winnipeg Telegram which asks:

"Is it possible that the Premier has  
sized the situation up accurately? If  
he has, then our system of govern-

ment is a failure and has broken  
down at a point where the greatest  
strength has heretofore been supposed  
to exist. If there is one feature of re-  
sponsible government which, more than  
another, is supposed to be a check  
upon possible abuse of power, and a  
pulse by which the public can gauge  
the action of the various organs of  
the body politic, it is the untram-  
melled freedom of debate in the House  
and the unrestricted right of investi-  
gation by committees of the House  
into all matters of expenditure and  
administration. And if Sir Wilfrid  
Laurier is correct in his assumption  
that the people are not moved by the  
matters disclosed in debate or brought  
out upon investigation before commit-  
tees, it is time to enquire into what  
possible use or benefit there is in hav-  
ing either an opposition or a system  
of machinery for regulating the con-  
duct of the ministry."

The question would be natural  
enough but for two considerations  
which our contemporary seems to have  
overlooked. The first of these is that  
the Premier, who we are afraid is get-  
ting a little cynical with advancing  
years, is justified in believing that  
parliamentary charges and investiga-  
tions will have little practical effect  
on public opinion seeing that he and  
his followers were particularly active  
in rendering them a farce as far as in  
them lay. They refused access to the  
originals of some public documents;  
they fought against submitting others  
to the House; they encouraged writ-  
nesses in refusing to answer questions  
that might be damaging, and sustain-  
ed them in doing so; and when these  
devices failed in accomplishing their  
end they resorted to others more effi-  
cacious. Take for instance the com-  
mission of enquiry into the charges  
brought by the Civil Service Commis-  
sion against the administration of the  
Marine Department. It should have  
been finished and reported on before  
Parliament rose, but the Government  
killed it by neglecting to provide for  
Judge Cassels that relief from his  
Exchequer Court duties which it  
had promised. Or take, again, the en-  
quiry into Major Hodgins' charges  
against the Transcontinental Railway,  
when he was inveigled into withdraw-  
ing from the case by the representa-  
tion that it would be referred to an  
arbitration committee of experts, which  
has never been appointed.

And the other consideration is the  
"supplementary estimates." With a  
falling revenue and an increasing de-  
ficit, the supplementary estimates which  
provide public buildings, wharves, &c.,  
for the purpose of putting the elec-  
torate in a good humor, there never  
was a time before, to apply the words  
of one of the speakers at the fetes on  
Wednesday from the Dominion to the  
estimates, when these "expanded them-  
selves with gigantic steps." In the  
generous proportions of the bribes  
thus offered, Sir Wilfrid may be ex-  
cused for thinking that the electors  
will lose sight of parliamentary in-  
vestigations and charges.

But there are other things besides  
parliamentary investigations and  
charges, facts indisputably established  
and which cannot be plausibly ex-  
plained away, of which the electorate  
may very well take note. These are  
briefly put by the Mail and Empire  
as follows:

The extravagance and the graft were  
so great last year that, although our  
revenue was greater than ever before,  
there was a deficit of \$12,000,000.

For the coming year there will be a  
deficiency of from forty to fifty mil-  
lions of dollars.

At the same time, the Government  
has so impaired our credit by its dis-  
honesty and its recklessness that we  
cannot borrow at a reasonable rate.

We used to pay two and a half per  
cent for money in London and the  
capitalists were glad to lend it to us  
at that figure.

Now we are paying four per cent and  
the other day a loan at three and  
three-quarter per cent was actually  
not even half taken up.

These Ottawa pirates have taxed us  
until they have taken millions from  
the channels of trade that ought to  
be there.

Now they are attacking our credit  
in the money market, and are mak-  
ing it difficult for Canadian enter-  
prise to be successfully floated.

## MAKING A FOREST.

A striking little instance of the  
practical and immediate value of the  
growing tree was recited in anecdotal  
form by Archbishop Bruchesi, of  
Montreal, at the last annual meeting  
of the Canadian Forestry Association.  
The Archbishop having confessed  
naively that he had "not assisted in  
these ravages of the forests" nor seen  
what might be done for the preserva-  
tion of the woods, set out in simple  
terms the tale of what the tree had  
done for the village of Oka, down the  
Ottawa. He ascribed to the forests of  
St. Sulpice the protection and ben-  
efaction of the Indians of the district,  
and told how a far-seeing member of  
the community had saved the Indian  
village from the intolerable inconven-  
ience created by the adjacent sand  
hills.

The village had been menaced with  
engulfment. The animals in the barns  
and stables had been almost smothered  
in sand. Men of science had seen  
the thing and failed to suggest a re-  
medy. A priest of sixty years, M.  
Lefebvre, conceived the project of a  
plantation of pine in the moving sands.  
He had read of it somewhere in a  
book. He engaged the Indians of Oka,  
the children for the most part, to go

to the woods and bring in pine sap-

lings. He paid a few cents for each  
sapling. As the result of this labor of  
collection, M. Lefebvre was enabled  
to plant no less than 65,000 pine sap-  
lings in the sandy area. That was the  
end of the sandstorms. What was a  
waste of drifting sand some twenty  
years ago is now a gracious little  
forest of pine. The trees are from 20  
to 25 feet in height and though they  
were planted more closely than purely  
scientific calculation would have de-  
cided, only five thousand out of the  
original 65,000 trees have died.

M. Lefebvre, as Mgr. Bruchesi re-  
marks, had made no scientific study  
of forestry but he had studied the  
soil of Oka, had remembered some-  
thing of the workings of European  
forestry investigators and had deter-  
mined to put their theories and ex-  
periences to the test. He transformed  
a series of sand dunes, which had  
made the neighborhood of Oka almost  
non-habitable, into a thick and sturdy  
pine grove. Instead of the sand hills  
"there is to-day," in the quaint words  
of Mgr. Bruchesi, "a forest with its  
poetry, with its incomparable charm.  
I know it and I love it, and it is  
there that each year, when I have  
leisure, I go to pass some days of my  
vacation; and after having read some  
books or recited our prayers on the  
borders of the lake, we go into this  
forest where silence reigns completely,  
to rest ourselves on a veritable soft  
carpet formed of millions and millions  
of needles fallen from the pines which  
have become large. There is an odor  
of balsam there which strengthens  
you, and doctors might well send there  
those who suffer from lung diseases,  
and then, when the wind goes through  
these trees, there is the song, the in-  
comparable song, which moves you,  
which transports you—the song of the  
great pines."

The work of the good priest of Oka  
may have been a small thing in itself.  
But in its essence his experience has  
been of a sort to offer the greatest  
entrancement to the same economists

### POWER OF THE FETTER.

Crimes of Witch Doctors in Darkest Africa—Victims of the Superstition Die Every Hour. Terrible Poison Test to Discover Criminals—Savages Suffer Mostly From This Curse—Practice Black Arts.

The whites in barbarous Africa say that in spite of the evils the white race has inflicted upon the natives, the good they are receiving, especially the protection to life and property which the new Governments are giving them, vastly outweighs the evil.

All authorities have much to say of the horrible misery which fetich doctors impose upon the natives. They assert that fetichism is the cause of more crimes and suffering than all the active wars, epidemics, and cannibalism that afflict parts of the Dark Continent. These brutalities can be excused only because the people have always lived in savagery.

Lieut. Poupart, of the French army, who has been traveling thousands of miles in the French Congo, says that the victims of fetichism are falling every hour all over that vast domain. Many of the victims drop in their tracks and are dead in a few minutes.

They know who dealt them their death and so do all the natives, but they do not dare to breathe his name. It is the fetich doctor who has caused poison stealthily to be mixed with their food.

In January, 1906, while Poupart's party was passing through a little village they saw a vigorous young man surrounded by natives, who were accusing him of crime. A bowl filled with a red fluid was given to the young man, who drained it.

A few minutes later he fell on his face and was soon dead. He was a victim of the poison test. If his stomach had refused to retain the liquid and he had lived his innocence of the crime would have been proved. The poison killed him, and this was clear proof of his guilt.

Some days later at Mbeto the same party heard a great hubbub and found a woman on the ground covered with wounds. Her left shoulder and her right forearm had been cut to the bone, there was a gaping wound in her hip and her body was covered with contusions.

She had received no care, though her injuries had been inflicted several days before. The white men came in time to save her life. They dressed her wounds and cared for her until she was well.

She told them that her husband had died and in the course of his interment the fetich doctor cried out to the people that their friend had not died a natural death, but his wives had killed him. All the men in the village immediately set upon the unfortunate women and only one then lived to describe the crime.

Poupart on another day came across some women running at top speed with babies on their backs, pursued by a crowd of men who were hurling poisoned javalins at them. The fetich doctor had accused these women of looking upon the bier, a sacred object that had been taken out of its box for an airing. Any woman who even inadvertently should look upon this object would be put to death.

On the River Moun lives an old man with twenty-two wives, some of whom are young and attractive. For two years past it has been observed that every young man who has attempted to settle on the adjoining lands has mysteriously died. There is no doubt that the aged husband, in league with the local fetich doctor, has brought about their death.

Most of the tribes do not believe that a man dies naturally. Some enemy is always the cause of his death, and the fetich doctor is brought into the case and points out the criminal. Mr. Brel found at Ndombi in October last three natives weighed down by stones at the bottom of the box where they had lingered in agony for days because the fetich doctor suspected that they had cast a spell upon a boatman who had been drowned in a shipwreck.

On February 13 last Commandant Moll, in a lecture before the Paris Geographical Society, told of bereaved widows who had been compelled to take the poison test to show who were responsible for their husband's death. Some of the women survived, because their friends gave presents to the wizard, who thereupon mixed an innocuous dose for them. The bodies of the murdered women were eaten.

These are not isolated cases, but far and wide over Africa superstition is still claiming the lives of thousands. But the influence of the fetich doctor is already beginning to decline because it is now a crime severely punished under the laws of the Congo Free State, the French Congo, and all Rhodesia to practice the black arts of the fetich doctor. The bonds in which he has held the helpless people will some day be broken.

### RUSH TO THE FALLS.

The usual summer rush to Kent House, Montmorency Falls, has set in, and this favorite resort is again attracting great crowds of visitors and city folk by its delightful beauty. As an instance of the popularity of Kent House, it may be cited that on Sunday last the elevator carried no less than 6,000 people, who to escape the heat of the town had run down to enjoy a breath of fresh air at this cool and charming resort.

### Snake Cayuga's Mystery.

Lake Cayuga is one of the wonders of the eastern states. It is situated in west central New York and is upward of forty miles in length, with an average breadth of but three miles. One of its peculiarities is this: Although hundreds of persons have been drowned in its waters since the settlement of the adjacent territory, not a single corpse has so far been recovered, and it is a common saying that "Lake Cayuga never gives up its dead." Those who have made an attempt to fathom this mystery say that the bottom of this remarkable sheet of water is simply a series of large openings and craterlike cavities, the entire lake bed having the appearance of being one huge honeycomb, each of the well-like holes being reputed to be bottomless.

Another Cayuga mystery is its irregular tides. There is no stated time for their appearance, but when they do come they are very decided, the water often instantly receding 50 to 100 feet and as quickly returning with a roar that can be heard for miles.—Exchange.

### The "Magic Mirror" of Japan.

The "magic mirror" of Japan is a disk of bronze, usually from six to eight inches in diameter. It is silvered on the front, which is a little convex, and there is a raised pattern on the back, which is rather concave. The polished pattern is generally a landscape, flowers, animals or Chinese characters. It is not visible in the front of the mirror, but when strong sunlight is reflected from the front of the mirror to a wall or screen the pattern of the back is visible on the screen in bright lines on a black ground. Professor W. E. Ayrton, F. R. S., with Professor John Perry, F. R. S., was the first to give the true scientific explanation of this magical effect. It seems that the design on the back alters the convexity of the front, making it flat—in fact, along the lines of the pattern. Consequently the light reflected from the front is not dispersed at these points of the design, and they appear brighter on the screen.—London Globe.

### Fighting the Inevitable.

Nearly all great scientific discoveries have been combated and misunderstood even by the intelligent. Even Sir Charles Napier fiercely opposed the introduction of steam power into the royal navy and one day exclaimed in the house of commons:

"Mr. Speaker, when we enter her majesty's naval service and face the chances of war we go prepared to be hacked in pieces by cutlasses, to be riddled with bullets or to be blown to bits by shot and shell; but, Mr. Speaker, we do not go prepared to be boiled alive."

The last words he brought out with tremendous emphasis. Steam power in men-of-war, with boilers which at any moment might be shattered by an enemy's shot—this was a prospect he could not face.

Yet in a few years he found himself in command of the largest steam navy the world had ever seen.

### A Mathematical Puzzle.

Here is a strange little puzzle, which has the same answer, independent of the fact that no two people solving the puzzle were born the same year and consequently use the same figures. Write down the figures of the year you were born and from this take away four. Add your age at next birthday if it comes before January, otherwise your age at your last birthday. Multiply the result by 1,000 and from this deduct 685,423. Substitute for the figures corresponding letters of the alphabet, as A for 1, B for 2, etc. The result is a Chinese table d'hôte which is used in this country for electioneering purposes. Strike out the first letter and transpose those that remain to form a word.

### Anemia.

The word anemia is of modern origin. It was first mentioned by Albert Michel in 1732 in a thesis entitled "De Anemia." However, if the nomenclature is new, the morbid condition indicated by the word was at all times well known. Hippocrates devoted several pages to a description of this particular condition, but Halle was the first to apply the term to a malady which was prevalent in 1802 among the miners of Anzin, in the north of France, and of which he gave a detailed description.

"A poison hat," he went on, "is one whose leather sweatband has been tanned with white lead, litharge and boiled oil. This compound gives a fine finish, but the leather so tanned, rubbed against the skin, may produce lead poisoning."

"Sweatbands that darken when exposed to an atmosphere containing sulphuretted hydrogen—that is the test—are poisonous. They contain nearly a grain of lead to the square inch, about thirty-seven grains to the whole band."

## GRAND WALKING

CONTEST NOW ON

Twenty-Four Students Start on a

2,000 Mile Walk from Montreal.

There is at present on foot a giant walking contest of 2,000 miles, undertaken jointly by 24 American and Canadian University students. The colleges represented are McGill, Toronto, Yale, Harvard, Cornell and Princeton, four from each. Harman of Yale, is now about 60 miles ahead of his comrades.

The walk is the most trying ever proposed on a large scale, and includes going from Montreal to Chicago via the Adirondack line to Utica, to Buffalo, Cleveland, Toledo and Chicago, then returning by the way of Columbus, O., Pittsburgh and Philadelphia to New York city.

It was proposed and launched by the Canadian Amateur Athletic Association, with the assistance of the Montreal Athletic Association, and the universities named were invited to participate, with the result that 24 husky plodders volunteered, or, rather, were chosen, by the athletic boards of each university to represent it on the walk.

The object is to establish some reliable authority regarding the power of endurance under certain kinds of diet, which the boys are following en route. Another object, and perhaps one that figures to a great extent with the participants, is that of obtaining material for the Olympic meet of next year.

There is still another object which lends an incentive to each to push ahead and do his best, and that is the desire to equal if not beat the record established last year by E. P. Weston in his Portland to Chicago walk, which is practically the same distance and was completed in 27 days. The Montreal association has donated three handsome silver trophies for the winners of the contest.

This mare was in line with the others when the barrier was released and Howard did not try to get away with her. For this he was set down for three days and fined twenty-five dollars. McGee was also fined for disobedience at the post. Starter McGinnis is anxious to give every horse a chance and an even break and the only way to do it is by keeping the boys under control. He was perfectly right in his actions of imposing fines.

The attendance was the largest of the meeting and the books claim to have handled over a thousand dollars to each race, which makes it look bright for racing in Quebec.

The first race saw Vardoe backed down to first choice at post time at 6 to 5, with heavy play on him. Howard took him to the front at the start and forced a fast pace all the way, winning by half a length under a hard drive. Alex Grant was always the contender and out-gamed Miss K. O. B. in the stretch run. The rest of the field were outclassed by the above named horses.

There was a rush for the books in the second race when they hung up the prices against Herman Johnson, the Toronto horse who has three races to his credit. Park Row, the winner, was always second choice and little or no play on him. When the gate was released Murphy hustled this horse to the front and was in front all the way, winning by only a head from Dandy Dancer, who was made too much of in the early part. Whisk Broom showed a fine burst of speed and outran the favorite in the last sixteenth.

In the third race McCabe avoided all the early race with Alilia taking no chances of being cut off at the turns. He waited until they had straightened in the stretch before coming on. Capar Sance, the heavily backed first choice, setting all the pace was tiring badly when challenged and could not stall off the winner. Martus was an easy third. Howard did not try to get away with Inventress, holding her at the post.

Gibson was the public choice in the fourth race on his previous performances. He ran true to form and landed the long end of the purse. Howard had the mount in this event and did his best to get away. He took Gibson to the front with a rush and forced a fast pace all the way and never stopped riding until the wire was passed. Dashaway and Trey of Spades fought it out all the way up the stretch, Dashaway outgunning Trey of Spades who hung back when the pinch came. The others were outrun all the way.

The fifth race of the afternoon was a most interesting affair. This was for the officers of the navy. Some first-class leppers went to the post in this event with Bally Castle opening favorite and the winner second choice. The impost on Bally Castle was too great for him to carry and he quit badly in the run home. Lieut. Saunders rode a great race with Geo. Lieber willing to wait until the end to make his drive. He rode up to orders and won driving. Lieut. Beasley set all the early pace with Marston Moore, who could not stand the drive at the end. Lieut. Buxton tried hard to get Bally Castle to the front at the end but he could not urge him along with such a heavy impost. When round the first turn, Grey Plume ran out, and going to the jump fell, while Rower did the same at the fifth fence. This was one of the best ridden races that has ever been seen over this track and will long be remembered by those who saw it.

The card for this afternoon, which should be a record day at the track is one of the strongest presented. It consists of five well filled races and there should be plenty of choice for the public. The first race will see a lot of good sprinters come to the post. Miss Felix, who was a little short, should win this race, with St. Noel second and Dashaway third.

The second race is for maiden two-year-olds and should be won by Lou-don, after her bracing luck at all. Flat Creek, after her race the last time out, will be right up. Precise also has a chance.

The third race is over the jumps and should be won by Geo. Lieber with Bally Castle second and Rover third.

The fourth race should be won by Hanibal Bey, who has worked fast since his last time out. Inventress will be the contender with Alilia probably third.

TEST OF BALL PLAYER

Many Who Shine in First Season

Fade Into Obscurity After-ward.

It is rather a singular circumstance that great baseball players fail, even if their first year in the major league is a pronounced success. There are so many examples bearing out this point that the shrewd manager now no longer considers that a good first year is proof of a player's competency to stay in the fast set.

At the same time there are few instances of a player being turned back who has done excellent work in his first two years of big league life. This second season is the turning point of the young player.

If he does good work he will last indefinitely; if he shows a reversal of form from his first year's gain, it is an indication that he can't stand the wear and tear of the big league whirlpool.

To better explain the point, take a few illustrations. For instance, a first year Young Cy Young, the left-handed pitcher, joined the Boston team he was the find of the season. He beat everybody in sight, and was looked upon as the most valuable finger in the country, because he had years of usefulness ahead.

But after that one good season Young had slumped to the ranks of the mediocre class. He is in the big league to-day simply because Pittsburg, which now owns him, hopes that he will recover his first year's form.

Simon Nicholls was the wonder of the Athletics last year, which was his initial dip in the fast set, but he is anything but a sensation this season. He is still on Mack's payroll, because of the chance that he may get back in his old gait.

Knight and Lord are former members of the Athletics, who shone one year and faded into obscurity afterward.

Other examples are seen in Doyle, Hogg and Niles, of New York, and going back a little farther, Lefty Davis, Jack Harper, lusty Miller and Gochbauer. There are many others.

A man like Cy Cobb is an assured fixture in the fast set, because he passed the dangerous second-year stage successfully. And so did men like Sherwood Magee, Frank Chance, Mike Donlin, Hank Wagner, Bobby Wallace, Eddie Plank and others of their class, who represent the best baseball skill and brains in America.

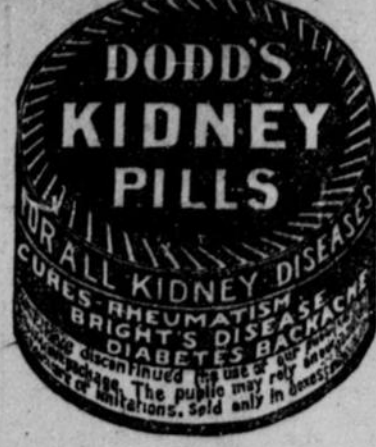

HERO OF THE ATLANTIC DEAD.  
Halifax, July 24.—The death occurred at his home in this city Monday afternoon of Rev. William J. Ancient, the preacher-hero of the wreck of the White Star liner Atlantic. His death came as a shock to the community at large. Although he had been in the best of health recently, his early demise was not expected. Mr. Ancient was stationed at Terrance Bay at the time of the wreck of the Atlantic, April 1, 1873, and by his gallant conduct in pushing out to the battered steamer was the means of saving two lives. His boat crew succeeded, in the face of tremendous seas, in rescuing the two last survivors, who were clinging to the masts of the stranded ship. This gallant deed won him renown, and when in 1905 a monument was erected to the drowned at Terrance Bay with money raised by friends of the dead, Mr. Ancient's part was fittingly eulogized. He came to Halifax shortly afterward, and became rector of Trinity Church. Then he went to Londonderry, and was rector there up to the date of his appointment as Diocesan Secretary of the Anglican Church, which position he held with the greatest satisfaction up to the time of his death. He leaves a widow and three daughters, one the wife of Rev. W. B. Sissam, and two at home. He was seventy-five years old.

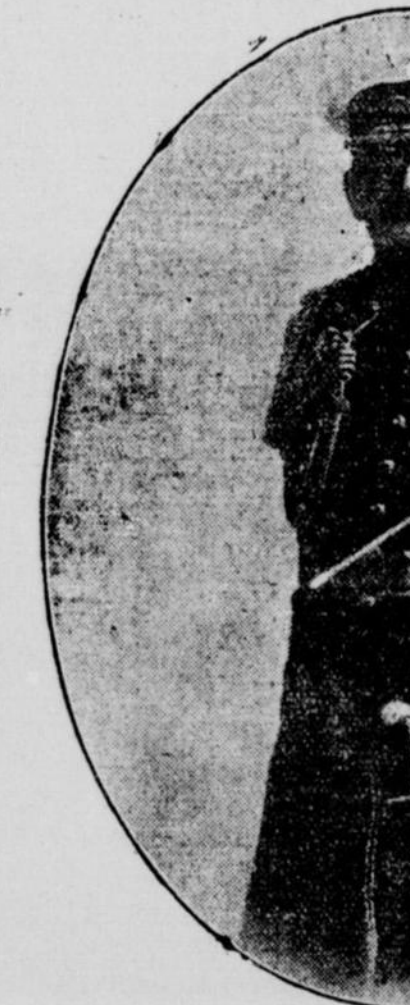
**PRINCE HAD AN  
EXCITING TRIP**

Experienced a Severe Gale and Snow  
Whaler Carried Away by  
Whale.

It developed to-day that the Prince of Wales had an exciting experience on his trip over the Indomitable, at first in a severe gale which threatened to prevent the arrival of the ship in time for the festivities, and later by seeing a whale run away with a small whale ship. This was the first ocean trip of the Indomitable and great interest was taken in her performance. On the night of the 15th she ran into a strong westerly gale with tremendous sweeping seas. So severe was the gale that the warship was reduced to bare headway of eight knots as against 18 she had been making. The gale lasted two days and was followed by two days of fog which again interrupted progress until it was feared the Prince could not keep his engagement at Quebec. When brilliant weather finally came the Indomitable was pushed to 23 knots, the Minotaur was left behind, and the last time made up so as to insure the Prince's arrival on time. Several splendid icebergs were passed off the Straits of Belle Isle. A little later a small whaling schooner was seen to harpoon a whale. The animal made a savage fight, darting off and dragging the craft about in a zig-zag course for some time until a well-aimed shot with another harpoon put an end to the whale's struggles. The ship was in contact with England or Newfoundland by wireless telegraphy throughout the entire voyage and a daily news sheet was issued with the latest bulletin information from both sides of the ocean. The Indomitable proved to be a magnificent ship running perfectly and without the slightest vibration, and showing herself capable of making 25 knots in good weather.

**LITERARY NOTES**

P. F. Collier & Son, of New York and Toronto, have published a Tercentenary History of Canada, from Champlain to Laurier, in three volumes, cloth. It is embellished with many full-page illustrations, portraits and maps, especially made for the work and is written by Mr. Frank Basil Tracy whose name is a guarantee for the excellence of its literary style. Its scope is vast and most clearly given in the words of the preface, "the work is designed to be an accurate, complete and connected story of the main currents of Canadian history from Champlain to Laurier. It has not been possible to go into side-fields and by-paths, but with the large figures and events, I have tried to be generous. Above all I have attempted to hold to the story form, so that whether sketching a battle, a change in government, a deep-seated social movement I may cause the reader to feel that all are parts of a great novel or drama, as indeed I conceive history in its true relations to be. Only enough comment has been inserted to point out the deeper meanings of history, and such comment, I hope, will be found to be, while sometimes strongly expressed, invariably fair and impartial."

We regret exceedingly that the pressure on our columns at this time precludes us from entering on a detailed notice. On rising from a perusal of this work we are satisfied that Mr. Tracey has very successfully attained the object at which he aimed. The Tercentenary history of Canada, while a history conveying much and full information to the student, and embellished with highly interesting portraits, and valuable maps, is something more than a history, it is an epic; it combines the solid information of a Livy or Thucydides, with the poetry and fire of the Iliad, and the deep insight into the spiritual nature of things of the tragedies of the great Greek dramatists, the comments which accompany it standing in the place of the Chorus. It is a work that is at once intrinsically valuable, and particularly fascinating, and appeals equally to the sober student and to the lover of romance. We have great pleasure in recommending it to our readers.

**HOW A GUN IS MADE.**

Casting Giant Weapons For Defence of Great Britain.

Although the British Navy is so widely discussed, the average man knows little or nothing of the ships and the guns that guard him. The Pall Mall Magazine contains an article setting forth how one of these giants of defence and destruction is wrought to perfection, and how the man who uses the gun is drilled and trained into that marvel of nerve and skill, the British naval marksman. Says the author:

Brains. She is all brains—not to be matched in the world for accuracy and strength together. In respect of her highly intellectual personality, a volume, but not an article, might do the big gun justice. She is made of a kind of steel evolved by a whole generation of inventors, and comes from Woolwich in solid blocks of it from Sheffield. Much technical education goes to its forging. Sheffield University is famous. The molten metal poured from a great crucible into trunnions. The stream is white-hot. It is so hot that the metal becomes acintic, with light enough to be photographed instantaneously in a shed that is otherwise twilight. And its temperature is judged to a nicety by the degree of whiteness. One skilled man does nothing else but judge it—wearing blue spectacles, as you look at the sun through smoked glass. Mr. Brock has nothing so fine in fireworks as the cascade of sparks that fall in gushes from the neck of the crucible while it is heated; and, "a fortiori," the fulguration of casting is beyond his powers. The tubes are to fit along their whole surface far more closely than a glove to the hand; and they must be flawless. Much more time is taken up in gauging and examining them than in any work beside—the innermost rifled tube especially. It is measured inside and out, all the way down its 46 feet of length.

First they do this measuring before it has been slipped in, and then afterwards to make sure that the tube has been nowhere squeezed. The examination of its fine surface for cracks, flaws, and errors of alignment is equally minute. They look it over inside with a sort of laryngoscope on a long pole—a mirror that carries a little electric lamp; and they take impressions of it, piece by piece, with gutta-percha wedged up against it. No defects can well escape the microscopic scrutiny. The tubes are specially hardened. The innermost tube has to withstand the extreme wear and tear of the travelling shell, that leaves the gun's muzzle at a rate of 2,600 to 3,000 feet a second, which is about 30 times faster than an express train. No steel that ever was forged could remain unaltered by such work, and the surface will be gradually dragged out still the tube projects at the muzzle. By then it will be time to put another in. But to make this tube and the others as hard as possible they are reheated in a vertical brick furnace after being cast, and are then—at an exact temperature—taken out and dipped into a deep pit of oil.

**WHAT TO EAT.**

Delicious Salads in Which Nuts Play  
a Prominent Part.

A few green peppers of the mild kind  
are a delightful addition to a plain  
tomato salad, and a few chives or  
tiny onions finely minced will enhance  
the flavor still further.

A pretty salad to look at is one of  
tomato jelly cut in strips. On each  
strip is placed a sardine. Arrange a  
bed of parsley in the centre of a plat-  
ter. Place the strips of jelly upon it.  
Decorate the top of each with mayon-  
naisse dressing and arrange stuffed  
olives in a circle around the edge.

For a creole salad cut the tops off  
of six sweet peppers, remove the veins  
and seeds without injuring the skin and  
place them in iced water. Chop a  
Spanish onion, two tomatoes and a  
red pepper, add a spoonful of chill  
sauce, a little salt, three tablespoon-  
fuls of cracker crumbs and enough olive  
oil to moisten well. Take the peppers  
from the water they are standing in,  
dry them and fill with the mixture.  
To serve, then cover with dressing and  
toserve, then cover with dressing and  
garnish with bits of cheese and stuff-  
ed olives.

Edible cups, such as the sweet pep-  
pers make, are most attractive for in-  
dividual services of salad. Tomatoes  
and cucumbers are often used in this  
way, and so are boiled beets (hollowed  
out), as well as apples and celery  
root. Best cups are suitable for shred-  
ed cabbage, diced potatoes, celery  
moistened with dressing or any mixed  
vegetable salad.

A mushroom salad will be a novelty  
to many. Peel twelve good sized mush-  
rooms and cut them into pieces. Saute  
them a few moments in a little butter,  
add two drops of onion juice and sea-  
son with mixture. Scoop out the in-  
side of a few chilled tomatoes—  
enough tomatoes to hold all the mayon-  
naisse—and fill the tomatoes. De-  
corate the tops of them with a spoon-  
ful of mayonnaise.

Walnuts and other kinds of nuts are  
now used in salads as never before,  
and they are used in eccentric ways.  
For instance, tomatoes hollowed out  
to form cups are stuffed with pine-  
apple and English walnuts, then ser-  
ved with a mayonnaise dressing on a  
bed of lettuce leaves. At an attractive  
luncheon the other day walnut  
meats were served with slices of han-  
nans and mayonnaise on a bed of let-  
tuce. Walnuts are even combined with  
potatoes in the following way: Cut  
potatoes into round balls. Boil them  
until tender, then cool, and to three  
cupfuls of cooked potato balls add a  
cup of shelled and chopped English  
walnuts, half a cup of boiled cream  
dressing and a half teaspoonful of  
grated onion. After tossing all to-  
gether heap it into a salad bowl lined  
with watercress. The salad will be  
better if prepared several hours before-  
hand, so that the dressing will flavor  
it sufficiently.

**WHITES WORK FOR BLACKS.**

Natives Have Now Become Masters  
In South Africa.

Many extraordinary facts regarding  
the position of the natives in the  
Transvaal are given in a series of re-  
ports just issued by the Transvaal  
Land Owners' Association.

The reports are made by special  
commissioners sent out by the asso-  
ciation. In one the writer says:

"It has become quite a common  
practice for white men to plow the  
land for natives. The latter pay the  
former so much per acre.

"A decided advance is noticeable  
among the natives as regards their  
method of cultivation. In former years  
most of the land was tilled by wo-  
men, who used the hoe, practically  
their only implement of agriculture,  
whereas at present it is quite common  
to see the men cultivating with plows  
drawn by their oxen or donkeys."

Another of the commissioners  
writes: "The rapid strides the natives  
are making towards civilization and  
the eagerness they display in en-  
deavouring to learn to read and write  
have of late become very marked. I  
regret to have to say it, but it ap-  
pears to me that the native children,  
as regards education, are compara-  
tively advancing more rapidly than  
the children of the poorer whites in  
the outlying districts."

"From conversation with the na-  
tives, they all state their willingness  
to work, but, as formerly stated in  
my report, not underground. They  
also strongly object to being recruited  
as they, without exception, all  
state that they have been cheated by  
labor agents to such an extent that  
they prefer to go and look for work by  
themselves, as then they will know  
what they will have to do and what  
the remuneration will be."

**AN ANCIENT BANQUET.**

Menu of a Christmas Dinner Served  
In Feudal Times.

"A Christmas dinner in feudal times"  
said an antiquary, "was served at 11  
o'clock in the morning. It began with  
plum pudding, or plum porridge, as  
they called it in their old fashioned  
way; a suet pudding stuffed with rais-  
ins, currants, prunes, mace, cloves  
and ginger."

sweet herbs."

"Geese and capons followed drench-  
ed with ambergris, and then came  
trumpets, for which I'll give you the  
recipe."

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## OLD CLOTHES OF ROYALTY.

Costumes Worn But Once Then Put Away For Good.

An enterprising English journalist wrote an interesting, if not instructive article recently on King Edward's clothes and what became of them after they had finished service. In the article the statement was made that the King never wore a pair of gloves more than once.

Out of this arose a discussion as to the necessity of considering gloves damaged by one day's service, etc., which went on until Lord Knollys, who is the King's inseparable companion, friend and servant, described in a moment of candor the story as ridiculous. Yet it was admitted that there are some things that the King uses only once, such as white evening ties, certain neckties and white evening gloves, which would be true also of many other masculine leaders of fashion.

The list of King Edward's quickly discarded garments would include also certain state robes which have appeared in public only once, such as those of the coronation and the costume of the Grand Master of the Knights of Malta. This last was worn at the Devonshire House ball when he was Prince of Wales at the time of the Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria.

Then, of course, there are certain regimental uniforms which have been worn just once in honor of some occasion. All these are put away in presses and are regularly overhauled and kept in good condition. Perhaps some day they will find their way to a museum to be shown as relics of Edward the Peacemaker.

In his ordinary dress the King is very particular as to cut and quality, but he wears his various suits as many times as any rich man of the world would. Then they share the fate of all discarded garments and become the property of some one else for various fates.

In regard to Queen Alexandra's wardrobe, she too has certain garments which are of historic interest and are put away to be looked at sometimes but never used again. Among these are her wedding gown and long tan gloves, the robes of the coronation and the military uniform of her Danish regiment. There are university gowns and hoods which have not been worn since the degrees they represent were conferred upon her.

The beautiful dresses which the Queen wears at the evening courts are seen but once. Sometimes a part of a gown is used again in another fashion. This applies particularly to the priceless collection of old lace of which she is so proud, and which is used over and over again in trimming her gowns.

If Queen Alexandra does not wish to use any of the trimmings of a dress again the garment is taken to pieces and the materials distributed. There is an inviolable rule in the palace that the recipient of any royal finery is never in any circumstance to wear a gown in the form in which it was worn by the Queen.

The Princess of Wales has a large and varied collection of uniforms, university gowns and Oriental robes of great value and beauty. During her visits to the British colonies and to India she received many honorary degrees. These garments are all guarded for posterity after the royal fashion.

In her ordinary wearing apparel the princess does not hesitate to be seen in the same gown many times, especially if it happens particularly to suit her somewhat severe style of good looks. After she has finished with them they are given to the various ladies of her household to dispose of.

After all, poor old Queen Elizabeth, who created a sensation with her one hundred and twenty gowns and thirty veils in the modest times in which she lived, would find herself behind her sister royalties of to-day, and her one hundred and twenty gowns would not go far toward making her considered a well-dressed queen.

## CRIME IN RANGOON.

Nowhere, perhaps, in the world are the methods of the criminal more subtle, and the difficulties in the way of bringing him to justice more numerous, than in Burma. People who really could throw light upon the commission of a crime are apt to keep their mouths shut, and the witnesses who come forward are often enemies of the accused man, who are prepared to commit the worst kind of perjury to get him hanged or imprisoned. These witnesses manufacture the most extraordinary stories, and tell them wonderfully well, so well that only an experienced judge can detect the falsehood in them. Quite recently one Manackji has been tried for the murder of one Manchoji, who died four years ago. Two men, who said they were eye-witnesses of the crime, came forward. One of them, Maung Tha Maung, related how he heard cries in Manackji's house, and, looking through a hole in a window or a door, watched Manackji during twenty minutes, whilst he beat Manchoji to death. The other witness, Sultan, was Manackji's cook; he said he was inside the house, and, stooping down to look through a hole in a partition, saw the murder committed by two men. He gave most elaborate details of the crime; Manackji and an accomplice took it in turns to beat Manchoji; they murdered him slowly, first one man and then the other taking a spell at the thrashing. The wretched victim's screams, loud at first, grew gradually fainter and more faint, until, at the end of four awful hours, he died. Sultan wanted the court to believe that he stood in a cramped position, with an eye glued to the whole in the partition during the whole of that time. The court was incredulous, however, and the prisoner was acquitted.

## THE HANDKERCHIEF.

There Was a Time When It Was an Unmentionable Article.

The evolution of the pocket handkerchief is odd and interesting. There was a time when it was an unmentionable thing, says Modern Society of London—an article to be kept out of sight and referred to only in a whisper. In polite conversation it was carefully avoided, and as to one's being caught using a handkerchief it meant social ostracism.

This state of things obtained up to the time of the first Napoleon, when the Empress Josephine brought it forward for a personal reason. The only defect in her beauty was an irregularity of the teeth, and to hide this she used a delicate little handkerchief, which from time to time she raised to her lips. Thus she was enabled to laugh occasionally. Seeing that it was a case of either laughter going out or handkerchiefs coming into fashion, the court ladies adopted the pretty pieces of cambric and lace.

In England the evolution of the article which is now so openly displayed by women was equally slow. There was a time when it was forbidden to mention it on the stage or to make use of it even in the most tearful situation, while the people in the gallery and the pit shed their tears into their laps. Even when it was mentioned for the first time in one of Shakespeare's plays it was received with hisses and general indignation by the audience. Little by little, however, the prejudice gave way, and a time came when the handkerchief could be flourished in broad daylight.

## A Coin in the Sea

A coin dropped in the sea will sink to the bottom, however deep it is, owing to the fact that the metal is heavier than the volume of water that it displaces.

It is a common but mistaken notion that the density of the sea increases with its depth and consequent pressure, as does the density of the atmosphere, which we all know is greatest at the earth's surface. The air, however, like all gases, is elastic, and when under pressure (as with its own weight), shrinks in volume and gains in density.

Water, on the other hand, is absolutely incompressible, and although the pressure in the sea increases at the rate of about one pound for every two feet we descend, the density of the water remains the same; consequently the penny continues to outweigh the water it displaces and the coin sinks until it finds a solid resting place. The pressure of the water has no influence at all on the coin acting as it does on all sides equally.

## Fast Days in Russia.

Fast days in Russia are numerous. Besides the ordinary Lenten period, which, however, in Russia is forty-eight days long instead of forty, they have three shorter periods of fasting—one of nineteen days in June, one of fourteen days in August, and another of thirty-three days in November and December. There are also three single days of fasting, of which two are also holidays.

Fasting is a serious matter in Russia, for fish, milk and eggs are forbidden as well as meats. The result is that the markets for such products are largely cut off for about one-third of the year and dairy farming becomes unprofitable, as strict observance of fasts is a weightier matter with the people than honesty or any other feature of our system of morals.

## Charles Lamb's Grace.

On one occasion when Edmund Clarence Stedman was visiting in New England he was called upon by the head of the house while at dinner to invoke the divine blessing. "I was rather surprised and for half a minute sorely tempted," said Mr. Stedman in relating the incident. "Then I rose to the occasion and asked a grace which I remembered." "But, Mr. Stedman," demanded a young woman of the party eagerly, "to what were you sorely tempted?" "To do as Charles Lamb did under similar circumstances." "And that was?" "He looked about the board and asked in surprise, 'Is there no plegman present?' The host shook his head. Then Lamb prayed, 'For this and all other mercies, O Lord, make us truly thankful!'"

When wit is combined with sense and information, when it is softened by benevolence and restrained by strong principles, when it is in the hands of a man who can use it and despise it, who can be witty and something much better than witty, who loves honor, justice, decency, good nature, morality and religion ten thousand times better than wit-wit is then a beautiful and delightful part of our nature.—Sydney Smith.
