WHEREAS it appears by information on oath, that on the night of Sunday, the twenty-first day of May last, the Dwelling House, Barn, and Out-houses of George Cronkright, the Barn and Out-house of Joshua Odell, and the Barn of Richard Van Vliet, of Odelltown, were maliciously set fire to, burned and consumed; AND WHEREAS, for the ends of justice and for the security of the property of Her Majesty's Subjects, it is most expedient and necessary that the Perpetrators of these acts, so atrocious and alarming in their character, should not escape unpunished, I have thought fit by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council of this Province, to issue this Proclamation, and I do hereby charge and command all and singular Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs and other Officers and Ministers of Justice, and all others Her Majesty's loving Subjects in this Province, to be diligent and use their best endeavours to discover and bring to justice the person or persons by whom the said acts of violence may have been committed, in order that he or they may be dealt with according to law. And as an encouragement to the making of a discovery, I do hereby declare that whosoever will give such information respecting the said burnings as may cause the Perpetrator or Perpetrators thereof to be apprehended and brought to justice, shall receive a Reward of ONE HUNDRED and FIFTY POUNDS, current money of this Province, to be paid on conviction of him or them of the act or acts so committed as aforesaid. And I further offer Her Majesty's free pardon to such informant if he be an accessory to the said offences, but not a principal thereto.
