

HAMBURG, Oct. 29.—The hereditary Prince of Odenburg, who is engaged to Copenhagen, will marry, it is thought, the Princess Royal, Caroline of Denmark. This marriage will be very important for the North.

The regular Swedish army consists now of 42,000 men.—The conscription of young men from 20 to 25 years of age is now in progress.

A letter from Kingston, Jamaica, of Nov. 27 states that one or two vessels, from the United States had recently arrived at the port of Kingston, and that the duties on imported goods had been reduced 25 per cent.—Phil. Gaz.

A letter from Havana to a gentleman in Baltimore dated 23d December last mentions that the Royal troops had taken Boguilla de Piedras, and got to the sword in the hands of the King.

Letters from the Havana mention that it is the intention of the Spanish Government to change the religion of the Kingdom from the Roman Catholic to the Episcopal communion, and Mr. Pineda, who has the superintendence of an academy of the arts, is adopting measures for carrying this design into execution.

The New York papers furnish accounts from London to the 19th Nov. inclusive, four days later than former advices—according to these, the price of grain was rather on the rise.

COURAGE OF GEORGE III.
The King terrified, during the course of his reign, by a number of anonymous letters, threatening his life, all which he treated with uniform indifference. A nobleman, who is now no more, and who during many years was frequently about his person, as well as in his own court, assured me that he had seen several of these letters, which he showed me particularly when at Westminster. While residing there during several seasons, he never saw any of the anonymous letters mentioned, nor to ride out on particular days, on certain roads, if he valued his safety; but the King never failed to mount his horse, and to take the every road indicated in the letter. Speaking on the subject to that nobleman, he said, "I very well know that any man who chooses to caricature the life of a monarch, will place, like an angry man, a riding net, as I do constantly, with a single quarry and a bushman. I can give you a hundred instances where it will not do it in a half hour or thereabouts."

A SERIOUS JOKE.
