

RUSSIANS HOLD DVINSK FRONT IN EXCELLENT LINE OF TRENCHES

Despite Constant Fierce Attacks They Have Held Enemy Off Thus Far. Enemy Has Gained No Decisive Advantage, Their Attempts Being Paid for with Heavy Loss of Life. Russian Defence is Improving Every Week, and if World Thinks Germans are Driving this Army Before Them it Makes a Gross Mistake, says London Times Correspondent.

London, Sept. 20.—(Special)—The Times to-day published the following despatch from a correspondent with the Russian forces, sent on Saturday from Dvinsk:

"I spent three days on this front, where a terrific battle is raging almost unceasingly. When attacks die away at one place they begin instantly at another. The nearest front is only twelve miles from Dvinsk, whose deserted streets resound with the detonations of heavy gunfire.

"The Russians are holding the Dvinsk front in an excellent line of trenches, three deep, and despite constant fierce attacks supported by concentrations of heavy artillery, they have held the enemy off thus far. Many times the first line has been taken by the enemy, then retaken by our counter-attacks. The Germans are twice or thrice our strength and have enormous superiority in guns as always, but hitherto they have gained no decisive advantage, their attempts being paid for with heavy loss of life.

"The character of the Russian defence is improving every week, and if the outside world thinks the Germans are driving this army before them it makes a gross mistake. If the Riga and Dvinsk stories are typical of Russian rearguard operations, their nature is such as should cause more depression among the Germans than among the Russians, and, with winter approaching and no important objective attainable before the season changes, I believe the German commanders must now recognize a growing anxiety."

RUSSIANS FORCED ENEMY TO FLEE.

Petrograd, Sept. 20.—(Special)—"A fortified position of the enemy near Novoseltry, southeast of Olti, was attacked on the front and the enemy was dislodged. Our troops in pursuit extinguished a fire on a bridge over the Sty, which the enemy had lighted. Part of our forces again turned the enemy in their retreat and forced them to flee into the forest. We occupied the village of Kolki.

"On the west front between the River Stubela and the line from Dubno to Kromoniz our troops attacked the enemy in many places and recaptured parties of prisoners, for we strove to take advantage of disorders which have become frequent in the enemy's ranks.

"On the Soroth front engagements local in character continued in the immediate vicinity of the river. Near the village of Dakovitch, on the Strument River south of Pinsk, one of our detachments was seen holding back a German battalion with machine gun fire. It annihilated about two companies of the enemy.

"In the region of Kolki our cavalry charged the enemy's entrenchments and captured several machine guns and about a hundred prisoners, suffering only insignificant losses in return. Near the village of Kulni, north of Kolki, a squadron of our men chased an Austrian squadron into the marshes, took fifty prisoners, captured a number of field kitchens, and saved from the marshes some fifty horses. The rest of the horses perished.

"According to the testimony of Austrian prisoners, there were cases during the recent operations wherein detachments of the enemy remained in one spot for several days, unable to extricate their artillery from the marshes.

"On the Stokholda are reported cases of Austrians disguising themselves as peasants in order to cross the river for the purpose of installing machine guns."

MORE "SUCCESSES" CLAIMED BY TURKS.

Constantinople, Sept. 20, via London.—(Special)—A statement issued by the War Office says:

"Our reconnoitering parties near Anafarta on Saturday night drove away similar parties of the enemy and successfully threw bombs into the enemy's trenches.

"Our artillery successfully bombarded Saturday the enemy's camp near Kemikle Liman.

"Near Sddul Bahr our artillery silenced the enemy's guns which had bombarded the centre of our positions.

"Our reconnoitering detachments approached the trenches of the enemy near Kerevagedere, which were successfully attacked with bombs.

"On Saturday afternoon our Coast battery bombarded the Osman positions of the enemy's artillery and infantry near Seddul Bahr. In the afternoon a warship of the Patrie class and hostile batteries on the mainland near Seddul Bahr shelled our coast batteries for one hour without damage."

ACTIVITY OF FRENCH ARTILLERY

Paris, Sept. 20, 2.30 p.m.—(Special)—The official statement given out this afternoon describes great activity on the part of the French artillery at various points along the battle line in France. The text of the communication follows:

"In the Artois district our artillery, last night, delivered a violent bombardment against the works of the enemy and interfered with their provision trains. The German batteries showed particularly activity in the environments of Arras and on the front along the Crinchon River, where the cannonading was accompanied by a spirited rifle fire and outbursts from the machine guns.

"The firing of the enemy was also fairly well sustained in the regions of Foucaucourt, Herleville and Tracy-le-Val, and brought out an energetic response from our side.

"In front of Pontenoy the Germans on several occasions opened with infantry fire, but they did not come out of their trenches. In the vicinity of Berry-au-Bac last night saw fighting with bombs, artillery and rifle firing. On the canal between the Aisne and the Marne we took possession, at a point to the east of Saignel, of a German listening post.

"In the Champagne district our artillery replied to a bombardment of

our positions to the north of Camp-de-Chalons, and checked the fire of the Germans' heavy artillery. To the north of Perthes a depot of munitions within the enemy's lines was blown up.

"Between the Aisne and the Argonne district the artillery of the enemy maintained its activity during all last night. This fire was answered with energy.

"In Lorraine our batteries continued their destructive fire upon the works of the enemy and brought into their field certain routes by which the enemy has been securing provisions.

"In the vicinity of Ban-de-Sapt French field artillery dispersed a detachment of German pioneers."

BRITISH FLEET BOMBARDS THE BELGIAN COAST

Paris, September 20.—The following official communication was issued by the War Office last night (Sunday):

"The British fleet, having bombarded the German organizations on the Belgian littoral, our heavy artillery in the region of Nieuport has operated in conjunction with it in shelling the batteries on the coast which had replied to the fire of the British warships.

"On the Artois front the fire of the enemy has diminished in intensity. Our artillery has continued the com-

DIRECT QUERY TO BULGARIA

Entente Allies Have Presented a Joint Note Asking That Position be Defined

BULGARIAN GOVERNMENT MUST STATE WHETHER COUNTRY IS WITH ALLIES OR CENTRAL POWERS.

Paris, September, 20.—The Entente Allies have presented a joint note to the Bulgarian Government asking in effect that it declare itself as between them and the Central Powers. The note, however, is not in the nature of an ultimatum.

The note, which was delivered to the Government at Sofia, two days ago, was sent in pursuance of a decision by the Allied powers to test the good faith of Bulgaria by submitting the recent concessions made by Serbia with the view of securing from Bulgaria a definite statement as to her position.

Although the note does not fix a date for a reply and is not an ultimatum, diplomats familiar with its contents say it is of a nature requiring Bulgaria to take a stand one way or the other. It points out that the Allied Powers are now prepared to offer the Serbian concession on Bulgaria's claims to disputed territory, and asks Bulgaria if the concessions secured through the joint offices of the Allies will bring about Bulgaria's co-operation with the other Balkan States.

What, if any, reference is made to Greece is not disclosed, but it appears to be considered that Serbia's concession should suffice to secure Bulgaria's adherence to the Balkan Union.

A visit paid yesterday to all the legations here of the Balkan States revealed them showing deep interest, bordering on agitation, on the latest turn of events. The general view expressed in Greco-Serbian quarters was that the note of the Allies brought the question to a definite issue which would not permit Bulgaria to avoid reaching a determination whether to cast their lot with the Entente Allies or with the Central Powers.

Officials and diplomats are now awaiting Bulgaria's answer to the allied note as the turning point in the Balkan situation.

AUSTRO-GERMAN MOVEMENT

Active Operations Are Likely Soon to be Under Way on Balkan Frontier

PLAN INVOLVES DIVERSION OF 500,000 MEN FROM EAST TO THE BALKANS.

Rome, Sept. 20.—(Special)—Active operations are likely soon to be under way along the frontiers of the Balkan States, the Tribune declares. It learns from competent sources. It says that an Austro-German movement has been planned for the latter part of October, the plan involving the expected diversion of 500,000 men from the Russian campaign to the Balkans, with the simultaneous securing of Bulgaria's advance in the move to open a route from Budapest to Constantinople.

GERMAN SUB. DISGUISED AS BRITISH CRAFT

Copenhagen, September 20.—Norwegian fishermen who have arrived at Stavanger on the southwest coast of Norway, say that off the Island of Utsine, near the entrance to the Gulf of Stavanger, a German submarine by mistake torpedoed another submarine.

They believe the sunken vessel had been disguised to look like a British submarine. The boat exploded and sank with her crew.

CONSCRIPTION FOR CANADA

IF IT COMES IT WILL BE FAULT OF NATIVE BORN CANADIANS.

St. Thomas, Ont., Sept. 20.—Judge Barron, of Stratford, in an address at a patriotic service at Trinity Church last night called for conscription in Canada. In time of peril, declared Judge Barron, people should not be free and independent citizens, and if the physically fit hold back when their services are required these should be made to go.

"If we have conscription in Canada," declared Judge Barron, "it won't be the fault of our British-born citizens but rather the fault of our native-born Canadians."

AMERICAN "FIRE" INVENTOR JAILED.

London, Sept. 20.—Charles Pray, the American who claims to have invented the "liquid fire" now being used by the German army, was sentenced to three months' imprisonment for giving false information as to his real identity. The court recommended that Pray be deported.

COMPLETE AND LASTING PEACE

British M. P. Told French Socialists That Liberation of Oppressed Was Wanted

IF LAST MAN GOES UP VOLUNTARILY, THEN BRITISH WILL ACCEPT CONSCRIPTION.

Paris, Sept. 20.—(Special)—"We do not want a premature, but a complete and lasting peace," said John Hodge, a member of the British Parliament, in an address last night at a meeting of French Socialists.

"We do not want conquest, but the liberation of all oppressed peoples. 'We are anxious to beat Germany,' declared Mr. Hodge, 'the voluntary service, but if the Government says we have had the last man by the voluntary system and must now have conscription, then I say we will have it.'

The meeting was the first of a series organized to explain to the French workers what Great Britain is doing in the war.

RECRUITING IN AUSTRALIA

Grand Total of Expeditionary Forces to Date Number 117,000 Men

THIS IS EXCLUSIVE OF 8,000 TROOPS OF CITIZEN FORCES FOR HOME DEFENCE.

Ottawa, Sept. 20.—Details of Australia's splendid record in raising men for overseas service are given by the Canadian trade commissioner in Melbourne. He states that on the 12th of August the commonwealth had organized, equipped and despatched 76,566 troops for active service abroad. At that time 40,400 troops were in camps in Australia for despatch to the front. The Government was determined to continue to train, equip and transport to the seat of war every available man presenting himself for service who succeeds in passing the necessary medical examination. To date the grand total of the Australian expeditionary forces raised had reached 117,000 excluding 8,000 troops of the citizens' forces mobilized for home defence. Reinforcements are going at the rate of 5,300 a month, and this number will be increased to 10,600 in October and 10,600 in November.

The various divisions comprise infantry, light horse, ammunition columns, artillery, engineers, army service corps, army medical corps, flying corps, veterinary sections, bridging, train and pay corps.

FRENCH PRAISES THE CANADIANS

Appreciates Action of Cavalry From Dominion in Fighting as Infantry

London, Sept. 20.—Field Marshal Sir John French, Commander-in-Chief of the British in the field, recently visited a Canadian brigade and delivered a speech to the men in which he said: "I wish to express appreciation for the splendid manner in which, early in the year when a Canadian infantry division suffered great losses, you volunteered to leave your horses and come out here. At the commencement you took the most prominent part in the battle of Festubert, where we not only gained a considerable amount of ground, but inflicted great losses on the enemy and captured a large quantity of material. Afterwards at Vimy you kept up the same fighting record, and since that, till a few days ago, you have been doing very hard work in the trenches.

"Your record will go down as one of the most splendid of British history."

SETTLEMENT BY BERNSTORFF

SUBMARINE WARFARE CAN BE ARRANGED BY NEGOTIATIONS IN WASHINGTON.

Berlin, September 20.—A full settlement of the submarine problem can probably be arranged by negotiations in Washington. Count von Bernstorff, German Ambassador to the United States, is in complete possession of information regarding the wishes and policy of Germany, so the Associated Press is informed, and has been given power to negotiate terms of settlement with the United States subject only to final revision and approval by the home government.

GREEK STEAMER ON FIRE AT SEA

Passengers and Crew are Now on Board Anchor Liner Tuscania on Way to New York

THE ATHINAI LEFT NEW YORK ON THURSDAY FOR PIRAEUS, GREECE, WITH FEW PASSENGERS.

New York, Sept. 20.—(Special)—The Anchor liner Tuscania was believed to be on her way to New York to-day bringing the passengers and crew of the Greek steamer Athinai, which was on fire and abandoned at sea, according to wireless messages received from Captain McLean, of the Tuscania.

The Athinai left New York last Thursday for Piraeus, Greece, carrying few passengers, a large general cargo and many bags of mail.

The position of the burning vessel was given in Captain McLean's message as latitude 40.54 north and longitude 58.47 west, about 200 miles nearly south of Sable Island and more than 500 miles east of New York.

FREIGHT HANDLERS OUT ON STRIKE

President of Longshoremen States Trouble was Not Authorized by the Association

New York, Sept. 20.—(Special)—Richard J. Butler, president of the New York District Council of the International Longshoremen's Association, began to-day an effort to settle the strikes of freight handlers at the terminals of several railway and steamship companies here.

The United Fruit Company's steamers, the West Shore, Lehigh Valley and Jersey Central railways have been affected by the various strikes now in progress.

Mr. Butler said that none of these strikes had been sanctioned by the Longshoremen's Association.

FINANCES OF ENTENTE POWER

French, Russian and British Chancellors Hold Conference in Paris

Paris, Sept. 20.—(Special)—Pierre L. Bark, Russian Minister of Finance, arrived in Paris to-day and conferred with Alexandre Ribot, French Minister of Finance. He will subsequently meet Reginald McKenna, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, either here or in London. At these conferences the financial problems of the Entente Powers are to be taken up.

DUMBA'S GO-BETWEEN AT NEW YORK

New York, Sept. 20.—(Special)—James F. J. Archibald, the American correspondent, who was intercepted by British authorities while carrying a message from Dr. Constantin Theodore Dumba, the Austro-Hungarian Ambassador, to Vienna, arrived here to-day on the liner Rotterdam.

Several secret service men boarded the Rotterdam at Quarantine early to-day, immediately went to Archibald's stateroom and questioned him for some time.

URGED TO DODGE BOMBS

BRITISH PEOPLE AGAIN WARNED TO STAY INDOORS WHEN GERMAN AIRSHIPS APPEAR.

London, Sept. 20.—London's commissioner of police, "in view of the possibility of further attacks by hostile air craft," has issued a further warning to the people of the city, recommending that they remain within doors during any subsequent air raid, and advising them to keep ready at hand, for dealing with incendiary fires, a supply of water and sand, which he regards as "best, simplest and most economical safeguard."

The commissioner says he has been experimenting with variously advertised fire extinguishers, and has come to the conclusion "that no reliance can be placed upon such appliances effectively controlling fires such as are likely to be caused by bombs, explosive or incendiary."

CONSCRIPTION TURNED DOWN

Government Expected to Decide That Voluntary System is Sufficient For Situation

GOVERNMENT WILL MAKE AN ANNOUNCEMENT ON QUESTION IN COMMONS TO-MORROW.

London, Sept. 20.—It is predicted with assurance by usually well-informed observers that the decision which the Government is expected to reach next Tuesday will be that conscription for the present remains inexpedient and that the voluntary system, aided by the new information obtained and improved methods of recruitment available from the recent national registration, continues to be Great Britain's best plan for coping with the military requirements of the future, for at least a year to come.

There is some speculation as to whether the newspaper and political campaign for conscription has not tended to strengthen this expected decision of the cabinet, inasmuch as it stirred up opposition which otherwise would have remained dormant. Echoes of an alleged plot by certain ministers to force the Government's hand are still the chief political gossip of the hour. The Daily News' revelations are ascribed to a desire on the part of the anti-conscriptionists to baffle the conscriptionists' plan by premature publication. The conscriptionists loudly proclaim the whole story to be a mere's nest.

GERMAN GOLD CAUSE OF STRIKES

Believed to be Responsible For Unrest Among Workmen Throughout Russia

Petrograd, Sept. 20.—We have good reason for believing that strikes that have broken out here and there have been procured by the free use of German gold. The strikers at one mill here were openly saying, "Why should we not strike work? The Germans have plenty of money without working for it."

In other places, while some admitted that they had received German money, and said they did not need work, while it lasted, others talked patriotically about refusing to put a finger to their tools until all German managers and overseers had been dismissed by the Government, which, they say, was betraying the country by favoring the enemy.

IRISH PAPERS SHUT OUT FROM CANADA

THE GAELIC AMERICAN AND THE IRISH WORLD PRINTED IN NEW YORK.

Ottawa, Sept. 20.—The Gaelic American, a weekly paper published at 165-167 William street, New York, and the Irish World, a weekly paper published at 27-29 Barclay street, New York, have been refused the privilege of the mails in Canada and are prohibited from circulation in Canada in any way.

Under the terms of the order-in-council no person in Canada shall be permitted hereafter to be in possession of any such papers, or of any issue thereof, already published or hereafter to be published, and, further, any person in possession of any such papers shall be liable to a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding five years or to both fine and imprisonment.

GERMAN IN MONTREAL TAKES LIFE

Montreal, Sept. 20.—(Special)—At half-past eight this morning Joseph Mors, a German, living with his uncle and aunt at 580 Galt avenue, Verdun, committed suicide by shooting himself. No reason is known.

AUSTRIAN STABBED.

Montreal, Sept. 20.—(Special)—Alec Musolo, the Austrian who was stabbed last night, is reported still alive, but very low. Alette Hoverlock, a Roumanian, is held by the police in connection with the affray.

BRITISH NAVAL MISSION TO GREECE RENEWED

Athens, via Paris, Sept. 20.—The British naval mission to Greece has just been renewed for one year. Rear-Admiral Mark Kerr remains at the head of the mission.

The naval mission under Rear-Admiral Kerr has served since the latter part of 1913. It was sent to Greece for the purpose of reorganizing the Greek navy.

MORE CANADIANS NOW IN FRANCE

2nd Division Landed Safely on Continent It is Stated

MAY INCLUDE 5TH MOUNTED RIFLES, BUT PROBABLY NOT.

Ottawa, Sept. 20.—The Minister of Militia, announced last night that the Second Canadian Division were now all in France.

The division began crossing on Tuesday, moving a brigade a day, the last brigade landing in France without accident on Friday.

It is not thought that the above includes the 4th, 5th and 6th Mounted Rifles Brigade under Col. Smart, though it is possible that it does. The 5th Rifles were of the 3rd Contingent, and as it was announced recently their cavalry equipment was to be restored, it is not thought likely that they were of the division referred to above, though it is quite possible that they may have been.

The Montreal battalions with the Second Canadian Division are the 22nd "French-Canadians," under Lt.-Col. Gaudet; the 24th "Victoria Rifles," under Lt.-Col. John A. Gunn, and the 42nd Royal Highlanders of Canada, under Lt.-Col. G. S. Cantlie.

TO HANDLE CREDIT LOAN

Largest Underwriting Syndicate the Western World Has Ever Known Now Being Formed

New York, Sept. 20.—(Special)—The largest underwriting syndicate the western world has ever seen was in process of formation to-day to handle the proposed billion dollars credit loan to Great Britain and France, which has now shrunk, it was reported, to a sum, yet to be determined, between \$600,000,000 and \$800,000,000.

This mammoth syndicate will be nation-wide in its character and will comprise national and state banks and trust companies from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

FOUR ITALIAN VOLCANOS ARE ACTIVE

Paris, Sept. 20.—(Special)—Multiple eruptions of the Italian volcanoes are now occurring, says a despatch from Rome. Vesuvius, Aetna and Stromboli are all active, a singular phenomenon never before recorded. None of the eruptions, however, is of a character to cause alarm.

MANAGER OF CHICAGO FEDS GOES UNDER KNIFE

Chicago, Sept. 20.—(Special)—Joseph B. Tinker, manager of the Chicago Federals, was to undergo an operation to-day to relieve a kidney ailment which has prevented him from playing ball since early in the season. He had twice postponed the operation, as he regarded the pennant race as too close to absent himself from the game.

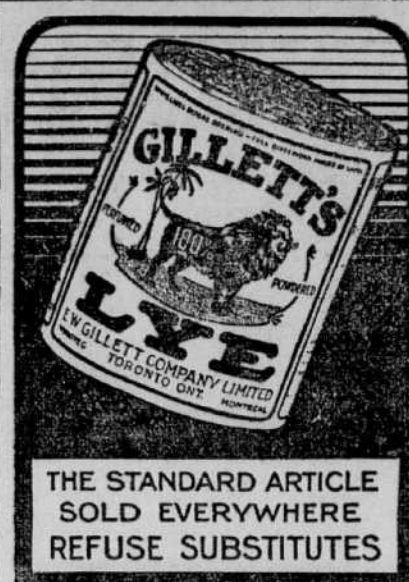

WILL ATTEND KNOWLTON MEETING.

A number of Sherbrooke delegates will attend the Associated Boards meetings at Knowlton this week. Mr. Fitzgerald, Secretary of the Sherbrooke Board, is organizing the Sherbrooke party.

PROBABLY SUFFICIENT POWER.

It is not anticipated that there will be trouble regarding power in Sherbrooke or at plants lower down this winter. Though Lake Memphremagog was lowered considerably by the break at Masar this has now been stopped and it is expected that with ordinary rains the surplus will be sufficient for winter power purposes.

IMMIGRATION SOCIETY DOES GOOD WORK.

A large attendance is expected at the Theatre Wednesday night for the war lecture as advertised elsewhere. This is under the auspices of the Daughters of the Empire and the net proceeds are for Patriotic purposes. Messrs. D. H. McLeod and W. M. Hillhouse, of the Eastern Townships Immigration Society, attended the Richmond Fair. The Society has placed some two hundred farm hands this summer, mostly secured among old countrymen out of work in Montreal, but who had previous experience in farming. In almost every case they have done exceedingly well. Many farmers of Richmond County spoke to the Society's agents of their satisfaction.

RECRUITING IN TOWNSHIPS.

A considerable number of recruits are now coming forward in the Eastern Townships to join the new regiments which are being organized in this province. If they have Scotch blood in their veins they incline towards the kilts and it is said that many who are not Scotch incline towards the Highland garb. Lieut. Turnbull is enlisting quite a number of men at his office in Sherbrooke. On the other hand it is expected a large number of men will join the 8th under Brigadier-General McNeill as it is expected to organize a full Eastern Townships company. Capt. Dodge, of Sherbrooke, has received a commission and is looking for E. T. men for the company.

WITNESSES IN CALARCO MURDER CASE IN TROUBLE.

Trouble arose on Saturday night between two of the witnesses in the Calarco murder case, resulting in the granting of a warrant against one of the parties for threats and assault.

The complainant is Peter Morrow, and the defendant, Joseph Farbow. It appears that Farbow and several friends came to Sherbrooke on Saturday evening. On returning to Capelton, Farbow started a row with Morrow in the Bendo boarding house and challenged him to fight with knives, sticks or any other weapons. The quarrel was resumed yesterday afternoon, when complainant came to Sherbrooke and laid a complaint.

The cause of the dispute is said to be jealousy over a girl. Complainant and defendant came from Lombardy and Calabria respectively, two portions of Italy of which the inhabitants have long been in a state of feud with one another.

ARMY GRAFTER SHOULD BE TREATED AS A TRAITOR.

Rev. Mr. Hamilton, of Toronto, Secretary of the Layman's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, occupied the pulpit in St. Andrew's Church yesterday forenoon. He dealt at length on the mission work of the Church and emphasized the fact that unless there was more of that spirit of brotherly love the church would become a waning institution. In the course of his remarks the speaker said that if the precepts laid down by Jesus Christ were observed there would not now be raging in Europe such a conflict. Speaking of politics the speaker said they were not only bad in Canada but throughout the whole world. It was a question of self aggrandizement for the individual or party. They could see how politics had affected Russia in connection with her war supplies. They had also an example of how graft was worked in Canada in connection with furnishing supplies for the troops. They had individuals who endeavored to pile up wealth at the expense of the country. He declared that such individuals should be treated in the same way as the traitors in the army, and

ITALY'S JELICOE

It was as Squadron Commander in the war with Turkey that the Duke of Abruzzi, made a name for himself in modern naval warfare, after winning a big reputation as a dashing sailor and explorer. A cousin of the King of Italy, the Duke is perhaps the most energetic and athletic member of the European Royal houses. He is one of the finest mountain climbers in the world, and his Polar expedition reached farther north than even Nansen's. He shared all the hardships of his men, lived on dog's flesh for weeks, and lost two fingers through frost bits while helping with the sledges. When the Duke was only fourteen years of age he showed a great liking for geography, mathematics, and for a sailor's life, so they sent him to a naval academy. The Duke has always led a Spartan life. Incidentally, he is the despair of match-making mamas.

BILLETING OF SOLDIERS

GENERAL SIR SAM HUGHES BELIEVES IN METHOD FOLLOWED IN BRITAIN.

Toronto, September 20.—Sir Sam Hughes believed the British method of billeting soldiers in private houses is better than the Canadian one of housing them in one big camp, and he told an interviewer Saturday that Col. A. P. Deroche, of the General Headquarters Staff, was studying and would report on the situation.

"It is home influence that the men need," said Canada's minister of militia. "The trouble in large city camps is that the men have nowhere to spend their spare evenings unless they spend them on the streets, where the saloons are open and where the men are open to other temptations."

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO CONTROL FARMERS.

DUMBA DEFENDS HIS ACTIONS

CRITIZES TREATMENT IN AMERICA IN LETTER TO SECRETARY LANSING.

New York, September 20.—Dr. Dumba, the Austro-Hungarian ambassador, defends his actions in a lengthy letter sent to Secretary of State Lansing last Friday, and made public by the ambassador here last night.

Dr. Dumba protest against the request for his recall as unjust and complains of the restrictions imposed upon his communications with his home Government. He says that the diplomatic representatives of the Allies in this country enjoy uncensored use of the cables, a privilege which is denied him.

WOUNDED TO ENGLISH HOSPITAL

Marvellously Organized is Work of Medical Corps—Task Huge in Present War

The removal of the wounded from out of the firing line is one of the many problems in any war; in this the greatest of all wars, the problem is of gigantic magnitude. Still, the Royal Army Medical Corps tackle it magnificently and, in conjunction with the stretcher-bearers of the different regiments, achieve astonishingly successful results. The cost of that success is occasionally apparent to all who scan the casualty lists in the daily papers.

But despite the heroism of medical officers, orderlies, and stretcher-bearers, many men are killed after they are wounded—and incapable of assisting themselves—simply because it is a sheer impossibility immediately to remove them out of the danger zone. The reason generally for this is that when battles are in progress, the stretcher-bearers are not allowed to enter the zone of the enemy's fire. The stretcher-bearers are taxed to the utmost limit—and beyond it! Very often the fierceness of the enemy's fire prevents a wounded man from being picked up for some considerable time.

However, when the intensity of the battle does not prevent it, the men who fall badly wounded usually receive immediate attention from their comrades. That attention, though, is of necessity very slight; it consists of applying the first-aid dressing to the wound. Every soldier carries two of these dressings in his pocket.

"Unlucky" Wounded

As soon as possible the good Samaritan stretcher-bearers reach the wounded. The "luckiest" wounded are of course those nearest the stretcher-bearers' starting point. The most unfortunate wounded are those left behind when a slight retirement takes place—when, say, two or three hundred yards has been given away. Those poor fellows, if the enemy occupy the conceded ground, naturally fall into the enemy's hands. If the enemy does not occupy the ground those wounded have to remain until darkness falls to give the stretcher-bearers an opportunity of bringing them in. But, more often than not, the enemy, continuously sweeps that particular patch of ground with rifle and machine gun fire during the night.

By Many Stages

When a man is picked up by the stretcher-bearers he is taken to what is called the regimental aid post. This post is anything near the field of battle which affords protection from the enemy's fire. There the medical officer attached to his particular regiment examines the patient and dresses the wound. The next journey is on an ambulance wagon—generally a horse ambulance, sometimes an ordinary spring cart (without springs, perhaps)—and in it the wounded man is taken to the Divisional Field Ambulance tent some three miles away. The wound is again dressed, and an injection is given the wounded man in order to prevent tetanus (lockjaw).

As soon as vehicles are available—he is given another journey; perhaps a mile, perhaps five miles, to usually the nearest convenient church, school or convent. Here he gets something to eat and a very welcome rest. Here, if a immediate operation is essential for his life's sake, clever surgeons will, with the most impromptu of appliances, perform it. The next stage of the journeyings is taken in one of the motor ambulances to one of the casualty clearing stations. These are really hospitals in every sense of the word except that, necessarily, their situation and furnishings varies according to circumstances. These clearing stations are, usually, anything from twenty to fifty miles or more, from the firing line, and it is in one of them that the wounded soldier, first comes under the care of the nursing sisters. It is also the first time since leaving England, that he has the pleasure of again sleeping in a bed. Sometimes, in the course of a few days, anything between 200 and 500 men pass through a clearing station.

Improving All the Way

From the clearing station an ambulance train conveys the wounded man a little bit nearer "Blighty" (Tommy's name for England). The ambulance train is a moving hospital; it is fitted up with every possible regard for the suffering passengers; it bears staff of doctors, orderlies, and nursing sisters on board each train. Some of these hospital trains—those which have been specially built for the purpose since the war began—are most luxuriously fitted. From the train to a base hospital, or, perhaps, if accommodation is available, straight on to the hospital-ship, the wounded warrior is then transferred. If his wound is only of a slight character the soldier, of course, is not sent to England, but kept in the base hospital until he recovers. He is then sent back to the firing line. Otherwise he goes by hospital-ship and train to the British hospitals.

BETTER THAN IN 1870

German Critic Admits French Have "Will to Conquer"

In a frank review of the conditions faced throughout the present war by Germany and contributed to the Berliner Tageblatt, Major Morant says: "It must be admitted that the French have used every conceivable variation of tactics. They have tried to surprise us, to mislead us, to beat us hand-to-hand fights, and to overwhelm us by masses. What the French in the campaign of 1870 avoided in the greatest degree—namely, hand-to-hand fights with the German infantry—they now seek with all a means of decision. That shows their will to conquer. The French Army also seems to well in hand."

bardment of the German works and batteries.

"There has been cannonading and a struggle with bombs in the region of Roye. On the canal, from the Aisne to the Marne, we have maintained our bridgehead at Sapigneul, notwithstanding three German attacks.

"In Champagne the enemy has replied only feebly to the fire of our batteries, but has violently bombarded the region between the Aisne, and the Argonne.

"On the heights of the Meuse, notably in the region of the Calonne trench in the Forest of Apremont to the north of Flirey, in Lorraine and in the Vosges, our fire against the German organizations has appeared to be particularly efficacious. During the day four munitions depots of the enemy were exploded.

"Near St. Mihiel a German aeroplane covered by our barrier fire and attacked with a machine-gun by one of our aeroplanes, dipped abruptly within its own lines."

GERMANS NOW OCCUPY VILNA

London, September 20.—The Germans have occupied Vilna and by a wide sweeping movement to the north of that city have succeeded in almost, if not entirely, surrounding a portion of the Russian army which is fighting in the railway triangle between Vilna, Lida and Vileika.

At any rate the Russian forces in this district either must fight their way out eastward or retire in a south easterly direction, for the only railway left entirely in their hands is that which runs from Vilna to Lida and thence to Baranovitch.

The army of Field Marshal von Hindenburg, which took Vilna and has reached Vileika, to the east of Vilna, is working in close co-operation with that of Archduke Leopold of Bavaria in an effort to catch a part of the Russian army, an operation which has been so often tried without success since the Austro-Germans commenced their drive in Western Galicia in early May.

The Russians express confidence in the outcome of the battle which must be decided before complete success falls to one side or the other but with their northern armies closely held along the Dvina and the German flank well protected by their cavalry, which recently occupied Wlady, across the Vilna-Petrograd Railway, it seems impossible that any aid can come to them from that direction.

MINING ACTIVITY ON BRITISH FRONT

London, September 20.—A report from Field-Marshal Sir John French, issued, officially last night says:

"Since my last communication of September 15, no change has occurred in the situation on our front. There has been considerable mining activity on both sides, particularly opposite the southern portion of our front.

"East of Ypres our own artillery and that of the enemy have been active."
