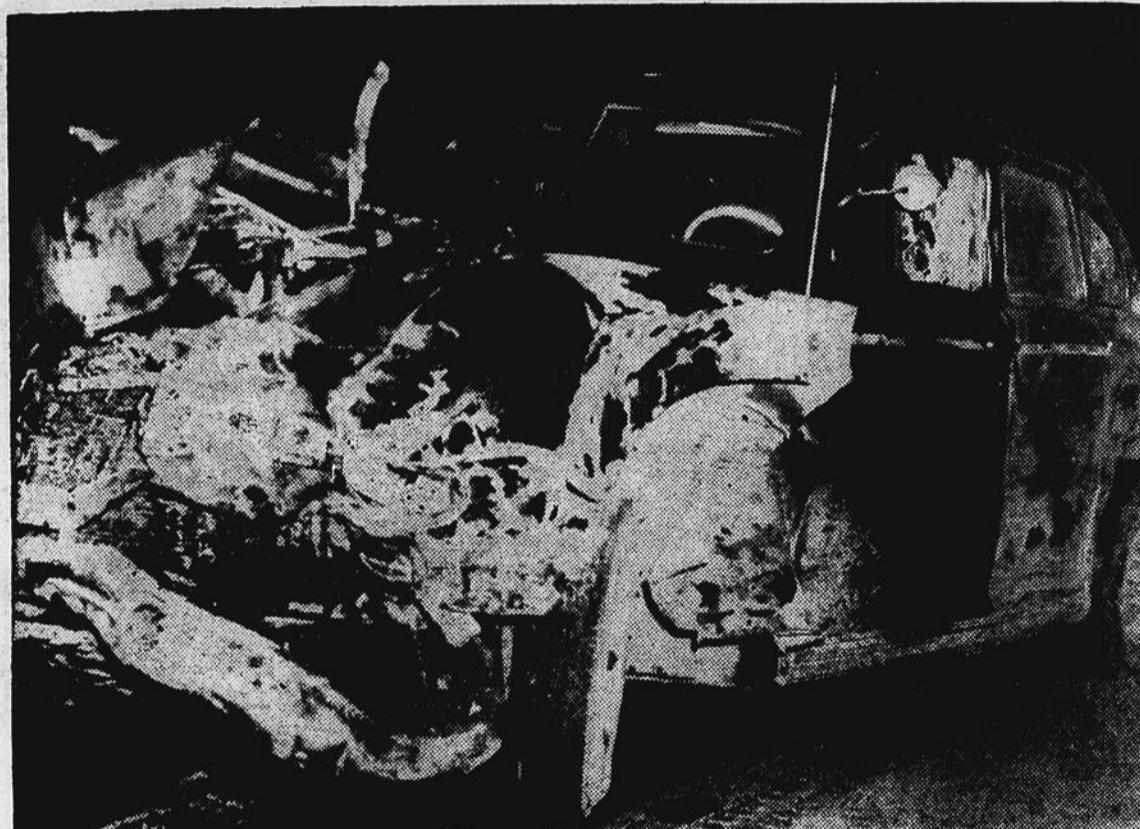

EMPIRE GAMES FOR WESTM'T?

Two Injured In Westmount Auto Crash



Head-on collision between two autos at Westmount and Victoria Avenues on Monday night resulted in both drivers being hospitalized with severe head injuries. Edgar Bruneau, 19, 4353 Oxford Avenue, driver of the car in left photo, and Donald Ryan, 36, 4866 Victoria Avenue, driver of car pictured above, being taken to the Homoeopathic. Ryan suffered a probable fracture of the skull and did not regain consciousness until two hours after the smash-up. Bruneau sustained severe lacerations to the left arm as well as undetermined head injuries. Westmount police stated both drivers were alone in their respective automobiles at the time of the accident, both being thrown out by the violent impact which caused doors of the cars to spring open. The Ryan car received the worst damage, its entire front being pushed in. Ryan's condition is reported "fair," as is Bruneau's, by hospital authorities.

armed with a letter from Col. Machum, officially requesting the Empire Games Federation to award the next contest to Canada. Lord will present the letter to Secretary Duncan of the Federation who is attending the Auckland meet. The permanent offices of the Federation are in London, England.

Col. Machum stated that the decision regarding the venue of the next games will be settled within the next four weeks, at a meeting to be held in Auckland.

Ald. Panet-Raymond Approached

Approached by The Examiner, Alderman R. Panet-Raymond, chairman of the Parks and Playgrounds of Westmount, stated that personally, he was rather intrigued with the idea of holding the 1954 games in Westmount. He however said that while he liked the idea, he would have to give it mature consideration before broaching the matter to the Council.

He felt quite sure that if it could be arranged, that the City of Westmount would get a great deal of publicity out of the games, but of course the question of expense would have to be taken into consideration.

Decrease Shown In December Traffic Accidents

There was a decided increase in traffic accidents for November, 1949, over the previous year, while the opposite was recorded for December, it was reported to the Westmount City Council members at a meeting recently.

A report for November, 1949, showed a total of 70 traffic and seven street accidents, with a total of 21 persons injured, while the November of 1948 report, shows 44 traffic, one street and a total of nine people injured.

The total number of accidents for November, 1949, was 79 and 23 people injured, while the total for the same month of the previous year was 45 and nine.

For December, 1949, there was a total of 57 accidents and 17 people injured. This, broken down, showed 49 traffic, two street and four other type, while the December, 1948, figures show 54 traffic, two street and one other type for a total of 57. The '48 report showed a decrease in the number of people injured, as there was a total of 13 mishaps reported.

Conquest Of Communism Outlined To Rotarians

"Dictatorship cannot stay still and it cannot win as long as there are free people to stand against it," Robert W. Keyserlingk, Managing Director of the Campion Press Limited, told members of the Westmount Rotary Club at their luncheon meeting, Wednesday.

The speaker, who has just returned from an extensive trip in Europe, cited the Communists expansion through military tactics, but said that at the same time they have suffered heavy setbacks in their political conquests.

Mr. Keyserlingk, who was introduced by Dr. Kenneth Carver, pointed out that fear was one of the dominating factors so far as politics in Europe are concerned today. He also maintained that Religion was the Communist's greatest enemy, and for this reason, they have tried to undermine the leaders of religion in many European countries.

He named some of the famous trials of the past few years, and said that these were held to bring

Garbage Collection Report Given to City Councillors

It was reported at the Westmount City Council meeting, Monday, that 916 tons of ashes and 639 tons of garbage were collected during the month of December. The report also went on to mention that there were 63,170 collections made. As the total cost was \$7,604.54 or \$4.89 per ton which averaged out to 12.04 cents per collection.

Routine matters concerning the maintenance work of the city's public works department were discussed.

Comfort Station Retained

The Council also decided to defer action on demolishing the comfort station situated at the Glen on Westmount Park. It is felt that the comfort station is still needed at this point.

Departmental reports were submitted for the information of the aldermen.

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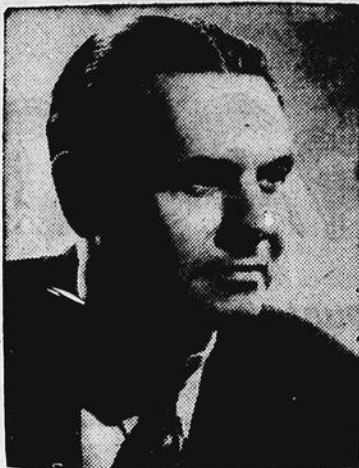
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The Pillar

"SUGAR PUSS"

Every newspaperman's dream is to write a book. But as the years slip by only a minute percentage of the boys who pound typewriters in city rooms across the nation ever carry out that ambition.

One name can be added to the list. Remember Al Palmer, the lad who used to write a fine Winchell-type column in The Herald before being silenced for publishing an item which didn't sit well with a certain biggie in municipal politics?

Al has brought out a novel, a very short novel, entitled "Sugar Puss on Dorchester Street". It is not, by any standard, a worthwhile piece of literature, but it has its interesting features, the chief one being that the unlikely tale is set in Montreal and that some of the characters bear a remarkable resemblance to a few of the metropolis' better known characters.

The leading male character in the story, Jimmy Holden, bears a strong likeness to author Palmer himself. Holden is a natty dresser, a lad who would rather buy suits than eat; so is Palmer. Holden covers the night clubs for a Montreal daily; so did Palmer before taking off for greener pastures in the U.S.A.

An added note of interest is that the book is dedicated to Sean Edwin, the nom de plume of Ted McCormick, one-time editor of The Herald and author of the widely read Sound Track column, a column which Palmer did a pretty good job of emulating after McCormick had a difference of opinion with his employers and switched his allegiance to our town's morning journal. He has now left good old Montreal and one report had him on a tour of Europe after inheriting a small pile of green stuff.

But to get back to "Sugar Puss". She's a well constructed French-Canadian lass from the little village of St. Christophe in the Laurentians. But life in that quiet little community holds little interest for her and she finally achieves a five-year ambition and moves into Montreal. After a short fling as a waitress, she gets a job as a chorus gal, meets and falls in love with reporter Holden, gets involved with her crooked boss, and from then on reporter Holden has to turn on plenty of the old superman stuff in order to preserve the lives of the book's sympathetic characters and set the stage for a wedding march.

It is Palmer's first attempt, so far as is known, in the realm of fiction and, as such, it shouldn't be panned too severely. But I can't help reproducing the opinion of one "Sugar Puss on Dorchester Street" reader. Quote he:

"I've read worse novels than this — but I don't remember when."

H. H. Stikeman Speaks on Unused Income Appeals

A well known Westmount lawyer, H. Heward Stikeman, who resides at 48 Aberdeen Avenue, Westmount, told a meeting of the Society of Industrial and Cost Accountants of Quebec, in the Ritz Carlton Hotel, that there is no effective provision for appeal, against the Federal Government's campaign, urging corporations either to use their unused and undistributed income for expansion and development, pay it to shareholders, or face an additional tax themselves.

Mr. Stikeman said that some corporations have fair arguments to present at Ottawa, and that the burden of presenting these cases would fall on accountants.

However, there was no effective way of appealing, he stated, because the Government did not give much time. When the Government sent a registered letter to a corporation, it meant that it considered that the company had distributed its surplus among shareholders as dividends, and that the shareholders would be taxed as having received this additional income.

If the company had not decided to distribute this surplus, and did at a later date, it meant that the shareholder would be caught in the middle, and would be taxed twice.

Pres. J. H. Molson Outlines Plans For Children's Hosp.

John H. Molson, of 634 Clarke Avenue, Westmount, president of the Children's Memorial Hospital, outlined plans for the growth of the hospital at a meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of the C.M.H., presided over by the president, Mrs. Dent Harrison of 609 Roslyn Ave., Westmount.

Mr. Molson stated that the immediate objective would be to provide modern and adequate quarters for 250 active children's beds in private, semi-private and public sections. He noted that this wing would be attached to the west end of the existing main building, and would probably run with the grade, but tending to swing toward Cedar avenue.

Necessary Reconstruction

It was also proposed to do whatever reconstruction was necessary to the existing main wing, to accommodate not only all patients at present housed in outside huts, but in addition, to accommodate various departments which would be located in the main building, but which were at present scattered throughout the various buildings. Mr. Molson stated that a section of the nurses' home would be built also.

He pointed out that the main hospital was located on a site which was somewhat inaccessible for clinic purposes, and that probably the construction of a new out-patient department would be on the Guy and St. Antoine street property. This department would be adequate for existing needs, and could be expanded if necessary.

Auxiliary Praised

Mr. Molson paid tribute to the work of Mrs. Dent Harrison and the auxiliary, and to the splendid spirit of enthusiasm, energy and efficiency with which they tackled all programs in aid of the hospital.

He emphasized that the success of any of the plans outlined depended largely on the support of "well wishers" not only in subscribing to the cost, but what is equally important in giving freely of their time to assist in raising the necessary funds.

Mr. Molson described the major building and maintenance campaign to be held jointly with the Montreal General Hospital and the Royal Edward Institute during the month of May.

Hon. D. C. Abbott May Go After Property Profits

The Hon. D. C. Abbott, member for St. Antoine-Westmount, and Finance Minister at Ottawa, may take into account in his next budget, excessive profits made in the sale and re-sale of properties.

It was pointed out to Mr. Abbott by the delegation from the Emergency Council on Rent Control, which recently interviewed the Finance Minister, that the inflation of rents was due in no small measure to the spiralling prices asked and received in successive sales of the same property, more so in some cases than the high cost of construction.

Tax Profits on Sales

It was suggested to the Minister, that in preparing his next budget, he might raise some of the large sums needed to balance it, by taxing these excessive profits to the hilt. This might discourage some of the outrageous speculation in dwellings which eventually has to be paid for by the tenant.

Another suggestion put to Mr. Abbott, was that those landlords who have upped the rentals more than the 18 per cent and 22 per cent, might have the difference taken into consideration when he is making up the budget.

Mr. Abbott was non-committal about the suggestions but a gleam seemed to come into his eyes momentarily.

Big Building Year for City

A total of 71 permits issued by the Westmount Engineering Department made 1949 the largest in more than 20 years, it was announced this week.

The final figure was set at \$1,512,320; nearly a third more than the figure set in 1948, which was the largest year up to that time.

In a breakdown of the report, it was shown that 36 permits were issued for alterations; 12 for garages; nine for dwellings; six for conversions; four for additions; three for commercial establishments and one for an assembly building.

Westmounters Give Generously to Fund

Westmount residents have subscribed a total of \$13,264 to the fund to build the new Julius Richardson Convalescent Hospital for Children on Cote St. Luc in Notre Dame de Grace, campaign officials have announced. Public subscriptions now total \$295,000 out of an objective of \$360,000. Another \$360,000 to make up the total of \$720,000 is being sought from Quebec and Federal Government sources.

about doubt and fear of the things they stood for.
"They have changed their tactics to some extent, for, instead of striking as a hard core, they are working in small groups". He cited the recent peace meetings to be held in Montreal until members of the church discovered that it was a communist organization, with Father Clarence Duffy as the speaker.
"Despite the fact that definite arrangements for the meetings to

be held in a certain hall were not finalized, the group used this as a means of propaganda, stating that they are being persecuted and acting the role of martyrs", the speaker said.

"So for the year 1950, we have to cope with this big machine of combined operations", Mr. Keyserlingk said, "and don't think it will stop by itself, for a dictatorship cannot do that and won't do that," he warned before closing his address.

The speaker was thanked by Bill Abbott, while Percy G. Delgado presided over the meeting.

At the height of the storm on Saturday, a case containing a dozen empty beer bottles were blown off the verandah of a third floor flat at the corner of Greene and St. Antoine.

A little further up Greene, at the corner of Dorchester, a kindly motorist picked up an elderly lady who had been blown over and apparently had hurt herself on the icy pavement.

The sign blew off a candy store opposite Steinberg's on Greene Ave.

The Westmount side of Atwater was sanded all the way down on Friday night, in sharp contrast to the Montreal side which was sheer ice.

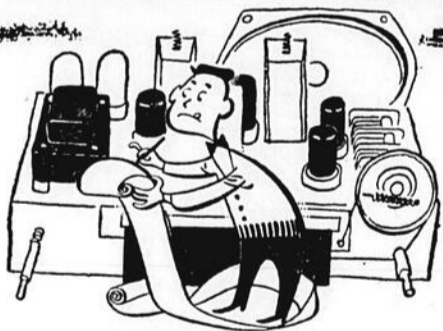

probably more financial benefit from the holding of the games here, than Westmount, that perhaps, Concordia would be prepared to share in the guarantee. The Province of Quebec would also gain in publicity if the games were held in the Province, and presumably would be prepared to help out in expenses.

Mr. Panet-Raymond agreed with the thoughts expressed.

Westmount Ground Suitable

Westmount is fortunate, in that the city possesses a first-class ground, with the track having the reputation of being one of the finest in Eastern Canada.

Seating would have to be more than doubled at the Westmount grounds, but it is understood that the present intention of the Council is to proceed gradually along these lines. The present seating capacity is around 5000. The Hamilton Civic Stadium where the last Empire Games were held in Canada, has a seating capacity of about 12,000.

Many Cities Bidding

Already Hamilton has filed a request for the 1954 games, and Toronto is expected to make a bid. Vancouver is also said to be in the market.

Col. Machum stated that first of all, Canada must secure the games before any offer can be considered, but he did advise that any city intending to bid should make its intention known to him at the earliest possible moment.

If the games are awarded to Canada they would likely be held in July 1954. They usually take eight days to run off, but the athletes from the competing commonwealth countries arrive well in advance of the date of the meet, and must be accommodated during their stay. In Hamilton they were quartered in one of the schools.

Boost for Westmount

Track and Field sports would get a much needed shot in the arm, both locally and throughout the Province of Quebec, if the games were held here.

Westmount would become one of the better known cities in the Dominion and throughout the Commonwealth, with Montreal and the Province of Quebec also getting their share of the lime-light.

QUEBEC FARMER GOES MODERN

But He Doesn't Like Income Taxes

Many Canadians have the popular impression that the Quebec farmer is a half-century behind the rest of the country in his farming practices. There are visions of slow-moving oxen tilling the soil with cumbersome plows. The habitant is thought of as someone from the pages of a history of medieval Europe.

No picture, however, can be farther from the truth. In the last ten years the Quebec farmer has made remarkable progress in scientific agriculture. Although one might see the odd team of oxen at work in some remote areas of Gaspé, most of the heavy work is now done by tractors. The horse cart has given way to the automobile as

a mode of conveyance to church and village. Many municipalities are keeping secondary roads plowed during winter to enable rural residents to make year-round use of their cars.

According to the Rural Electrification Bureau of Quebec, fifty per cent of farm homes in the province have been electrified — compared to 21 per cent in 1940. This has allowed the installation of electrically-operated machines, refrigerators, washing machines, radios. The Canadian Institute of Plumbing and Heating reports that of the 150,000 Quebec farm homes, 16.5 per cent have indoor plumbing, 25 per cent inside running water and 44 per cent hand water pumps inside the house. Bell Telephone statistics reveal that 45 per cent of Quebec's rural establishments now have telephones compared to 27 per cent five years ago. Use of commercial fertilizers, pesticides and other agricultural chemicals has increased considerably over the past ten years which has resulted in larger yields and better crops.

All this indicates that Jean-Baptiste is fast moving up front in Canada's farm parade. Yes, the Quebec farmer is going modern with his increased prosperity.

There is one modern device he doesn't like, however, and that is the income tax. How to make him pay it, and take some of the load off city dwellers, is a problem still to be solved — a solution, incidentally, that the government doesn't try too hard to achieve.

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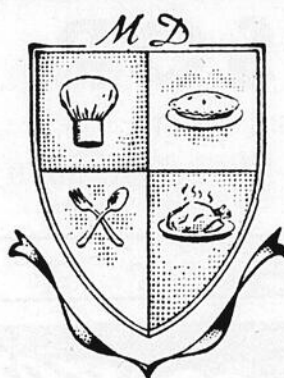
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Dr. Duthie to Speak At American Club

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Minute Mix

Registered domestic short-hair cats are bred not only for good looks but also for good dispositions, says Miss Camilla Harvey, Hampstead, who is studying for a Master's degree in psychology McGill, and whose hobbies include the Glamis Labrador Kennels Cote de Liesse Road, and the Glamis cattery at Greenbank, Ont. Already Miss Harvey has won forty first class and special honours for her domestic short-hair cats, and Glamis kittens are in good demand in Toronto, Buffalo and Detroit. If you were at the Toronto Exhibition in 1949 or 1948 you probably saw her series — mostly tortoiseshells, in which she specializes — including Paisley of Glamis which won a championship at the "Ex".

A rare cat, a five-color tortoiseshell, Trinket of Glamis, will be shown by Miss Harvey on February 20 and 21, at the cat show in Toronto. Penny Plain of Glamis, a solid black, will probably capture a few more points at the same show.

At the Glamis Cattery, which is run by Miss Harvey's aunt, Mrs. Sharp, at Greenbank, there are some lovely kittens which Camilla thinks may bring her further championships. There are also Abyssinian a Burmese Standard, Persians, and, of course, registered short-hair cats.

Charming Pets

The last mentioned are "just as sweet as they can be" says their mistress. Show cats are specially bred for amiability, and as all the registered domestic short-hairs are sold as pets, it simply isn't worth while breeding a bad-tempered cat.

These adorable registered short-hairs are descended from a cross between a Kaffir cat, a type of wild cat from Africa, and the European wild cat. The striped cobby or tiger cat, which is nearest to the wild cat, is not recognized in cat shows. An entrant must belong to the blotched tabby division, to the tortoiseshells, or the solid color division. Incidentally, the old-fashioned Maltese is not recognized unless it fits the new domestic blue class.

Show Cats

If you have a good-looking, short-hair blotched tabby, tortoiseshell or solid color pet, you can show it at a Canadian cat show, even though it is not registered, if you see that it is listed and pay Adams, a small fee. The cat shows are run by the American Cat Association (ACA) or the Cat Fanciers' Association (CAF). Montreal has had its fair share of shows, the most of them being held in Toronto and many Montrealers, including Miss Harvey, are trying to remedy this situation.

Good points in a domestic short-hair pussycat, says Camilla, include a short, cobby body, rounded ears and a fairly pointed face. Certain colors of eyes are a "must" for certain types of cats. For instance, reds, smokies and tortoiseshells must all have copper colored eyes; while silvers and blues must be green, and so on. Another thing to remember if you want to show your pet, is that a solid color cat can be entered in its division at the show even if it has a white locket under its chin and a white button on its tummy — but will lose points to a solid color cat without any white at all.

All Tortoiseshell Females

If you happen to have a male tortoiseshell cat, your fortune is in! The snag is that there are no male torties — none that are recorded anyhow. A huge sum was offered some time ago for a male cat and so far the money remained unclaimed. Red cats, on the other hand, are usually males.

In the United States, registered domestic short-hair kittens are about as expensive as Persians and other types, costing about \$75 each. In Eastern Canada, however, good registered short-hairs cost from \$20 to \$25, and color varieties marked with white, costing less. Seems not too expensive when you remember their angelic dispositions!

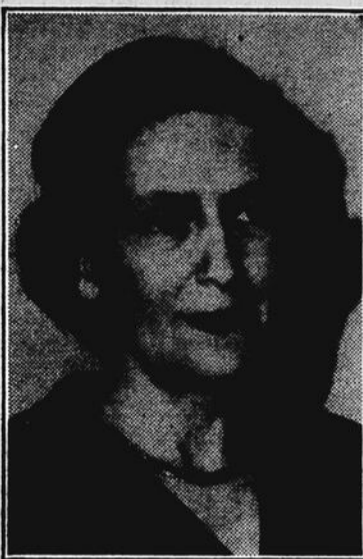

40 trolleybuses and 50 autobuses have been bought at a cost of approximately \$2,000,000.

a pathetic sight to watch Westmount youngsters wandering around within the borders of this fair city for the want of something to do. No rink to skate on and the only swimming pool, with the exception of the Y, to be found were on the outdoor rinks; not even a bowling alley to let off some steam.

Experts on juvenile delinquency pretty well all agree that sports activity is tops when it comes to battle this problem, which is no respecter of any particular community.

Real Challenge

This is not only a problem for the City authorities but a challenge to all parents, public minded citizens and service clubs. The City, after all, is only the means of co-ordinating the will of the public and unless the public can arouse themselves sufficiently to ask for an artificial rink and a swimming pool, then there is very little hope for improvement.

No doubt the big obstacle is money, but somehow or other thousands of dollars have been allowed to run down the drain sus-

staining open air rinks that lay idle for days and even weeks at a time. This wasted money could be far better put to use to build an artificial rink, where every dollar spent would produce results in the way of activity for the youth of Westmount.

According to Phil Wimmer, sports Monitor for the city of Montreal, plans are well underway for the erection of at least six indoor artificial rinks on the island of Montreal. Artificial ice plants are sprouting like mushrooms throughout the province of Ontario and in a lot of instances in communities not more than one quarter the size of Westmount. St. Laurent has an artificial ice arena, also Lachine, and two dollars will get you ten if Westmount has an artificial rink before N.D.G.
