PEARSON, DULLES MAY VISIT DEW LINE

Devastating Blast

Philadelphia Rocked As Granary Explodes; 3 Dead, 4 Badly Hurt

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — A devastating explosion reduced a four-storey granary to flaming rubble Wednesday night and cut a 10-block swath of damage through Philadelphia's busy downtown section.

The earth-rocking blast left at least three missing and feared dead, with four on the critical list. Scores of others — some of them late-evening shoppers headed home — were treated for injuries of varying degree.

Not until the cold morning air cleared away the pall of black smoke was the extent of the destruction fully revealed. As far as the eye could see there were broken windows, smashed automobiles and scattered debris.

The scene of the explosion was at 30th and Market streets, two blocks west of the Schuylkill river which separates the downtown portion of the city from West Philadelphia.

Across the street from the blasted building — the mill plant of the Tidewater Mill and Elevator Co. — the new Philadelphia Bulletin four-storey building took the full fury of the blast.

Windows were reduced to glass powder, ceilings fell, partitions were hammered out of shape and office furniture was overturned. The explosion was felt 25 miles away.

Workmen in the demolished plant's warehouse said they were alive "by a miracle." An employee of a nearby business place said "it seemed as if a train roared at us and then burst with hellish fury."

There was an instant of brutal shock, then long moments of horror and tension. Firemen and police searching the red-hot debris for dead and injured worked under strain, well aware of the chance that another blast might occur.

The explosion was blamed by the milling company's night superintendent on collected dust. Samuel Purdy said he was attempting to light a pilot light in a drying vat when the blast was touched off. The building collapsed almost immediately, and burst into soaring flames.

Purdy and three of four other employees of the milling firm escaped with injuries. Two of four drivers for a grain-hauling concern were also listed as missing. James Pierce, who was in the granary's front office with the two other drivers listed as missing, said he emerged from the blast alive "by the sheer accident of fate."

"There was a sudden flash, and I was blown under the desk. Only the desk saved me. I crawled through the debris calling to the other guys. But there was no answer. It was pitch black."

It was an explosion such as the city had never experienced before. Pedestrians 10 blocks from the scene were bowled over. Clerical workers were jolted from their seats in the Pennsylvania Railroad's 14-storey office building a block and a half from the blast.

Scarcely a building within a 10-block radius escaped damage. The financial toll couldn't even be estimated. George Barrett, building supervisor for The Bulletin, said the newspaper's new plant had suffered damage into "the many thousands of dollars."

And that was only one building among scores.

Russian Navy Building At Top Speed

New York — (AP) — Admiral Jersaud Wright, supreme allied commander of the Atlantic, said Wednesday that Russia's fast-expanding navy is powerful enough to threaten domination of the Atlantic.

"Should war come today," he said, "the battle of the Atlantic would be one hell of a fight."

Wright, who commands all naval forces for the 15-power North Atlantic Treaty Organization, told an Overseas Press club luncheon:

"Today the Soviets are the world's second naval power in vessels on hand and first naval power in rate of new construction."

White House Concerned Over Proposed Publications Tax

OTTAWA — (CP) — The proposed new tax on Canadian editions of United States magazines, subject of Commons controversy, also has caused concern in the White House at Washington.

Prime Minister St. Laurent, returning Wednesday from a three-day visit with President Eisenhower and Mexican President Cortines, told reporters that Mr. Eisenhower and U.S. State Secretary Dulles expressed concern over the tax which would be levied on advertising revenues of some Canadian editions of foreign magazines.

He said the U.S. leaders had been "worried lest this tax interfere with the free flow of ideas across the border." However, they had not asked for its removal.

"I explained to the president and Mr. Dulles the tax was not represented to them," Mr. St. Laurent said, without elaborating. He indicated the question may be discussed further by Mr. Dulles and External Affairs Minister Pearson, who is remaining in Washington until Friday.

As Mr. St. Laurent arrived by air, dispute over the tax was being renewed in the Commons during debate on the March 20 budget of Finance Minister Harris.

The tax, to take effect next Jan. 1, is a 20-per-cent levy on advertising revenues of Canadian editions of foreign periodicals — those containing special Canadian advertisements not printed in the magazine's domestic edition.

Three journalist-members discussed the question in Wednesday's debate.

The tax was warmly supported

U.S. Press Protests Tax Move

New York — (AP) — The Inter-American Press Association has protested to Canada that a proposed tax on some foreign magazines entering Canada would "immediately jeopardize" the free flow of information between countries of the Western hemisphere.

James G. Stahlman, president of the association, said in a second telegram of protest to Prime Minister St. Laurent that "such punitive action by your government is at bewilderingly sharp variance with the history of Canadian-U.S. relations."

The telegram, released by the association's office here Wednesday, was sent the prime minister at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., while he was meeting there this week with President Eisenhower and President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines of Mexico.

The 20 per cent tax announced by Finance Minister Harris in his budget speech March 20, would be levied on the gross advertising revenue of Canadian editions of foreign magazines.

The association quoted the prime minister as saying in reply to the first protest that the levy would be exclusive on Canadian editions of foreign magazines and that regular editions sold in Canada would not be affected. The tax is to go into effect next Jan. 1.

Five Tots Dead In Ont. Fire

Casselman, Ont. — (AP) — Five young children died Wednesday when fire destroyed a farm home near this village about 35 miles southeast of Ottawa. It was the Ottawa district's 15th fatal fire since last Nov. 17.

Only one of the six children of Mr. and Mrs. Alcide Quenel survived the twilight blaze that levelled their home before the horrified eyes of the 23-year-old mother.

The victims were Helen, 5, Jeanguy, 4, Claude 2 and Francois and Francoise, five-month old boy-and-girl twins.

Their death resulted to 46 the number of persons killed by district fires this winter. Wednesday was the third in which five children died.

The surviving child, three-year-old Gerald, was with his mother who police said, was in the barn only a short distance away when the blaze broke out in the two-storey frame dwelling on a country road about five miles east of here.

Neighbors said she saw smoke pouring from her home as she left the barn. She rushed to the house but a solid wall of flame kept her out.

Two men from a neighboring home rushed to the scene. They raised a ladder to an upstairs window but were forced back by flames.

When the volunteer fire brigade from the nearby village of St. Isidore de Prescott arrived the house was burned to the ground.

The children's 25-year-old father, who was at work at a general store in St. Isidore de Prescott, was notified of the fire by phone.

Cause of the fire was unknown. The house was heated by a wood stove. Police said bodies of two children found lying on a bed-spring indicated they had been asleep upstairs.

Both In Washington; Defence Department Proposed Inspection

OTTAWA — (CP) — U.S. State Secretary Dulles and External Affairs Minister Pearson may inspect the DEW (Distant Early Warning) radar line in the Canadian Arctic.

An official of the external affairs department said today the trip has been suggested to Mr. Dulles and Mr. Pearson by officials of the defence department.

"Tentative feelers have been made concerning such a visit," the official said. "Nothing has been finalized but there is a possibility such a trip will be made."

The official said something more definite may be known on Mr. Pearson's return here Friday from Washington where he is conferring with Mr. Dulles.

Mr. Pearson remained in the American capital Wednesday for further talks with Mr. Dulles after attending a conference with President Eisenhower and Mexican President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va.

The official said "the trip will depend largely on Mr. Dulles' schedule for April."

The DEW line section in Canada is being built by the United States across 3,000 miles of barren Arctic lands from Frobisher bay in southern Baffin island to Tuktoyaktuk on the Beaufort sea near the Alaska border. It will be roughly along the 70th parallel and some 250 miles above the Arctic Circle.

The line, expected to be in operation in 1957, also extends into Alaska and Greenland and will cost and estimated \$1,280,000,000 to build.

Predict Adoption Of U.N. Peace Mission

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — (AP) — Some United Nations delegates predict that the Security Council will adopt a United States resolution to send Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld on a Palestine peace mission. But opinions differ on how soon the council might act.

One council member told a reporter that the vote should come Tuesday at the next council meeting of the American proposal. Another said further meetings would be necessary for full American answers to Arab — and possibly Israeli — questions on the aim and scope of the mission.

The forecasts of final approval were based on speeches to the council Wednesday by Egypt and Syria. These generally were considered moderate in tone.

Egyptian delegate Omar Loutfi and Syrian delegate Ahmed Shukairy both asked if Hammarskjöld would deal with anything beyond the 1949 Palestine armistice agreements. Both said they sought only clarification, and Loutfi asserted that Egypt is "always prepared to work hand in hand" with Hammarskjöld and the UN truce chief in Palestine, Maj-Gen. E. L. M. Burns of Canada.

Shukairy declared that Syria had nothing to hide, and would "welcome a survey of the extent of compliance with the armistice agreements." He asked, however, if Hammarskjöld would be as

signed to amend the agreements, and if he would be expected to deal with political, economic and financial problems.

Henry Cabot Lodge, chief U.S. delegate, said their questions could be "quickly and clearly answered" at Tuesday's meeting.

Calling for "urgent and early action," the U.S. resolution would send Hammarskjöld to the Middle East for discussions on reducing tensions along the armistice lines separating Israel and the Arab states.

And Israeli source said the resolution was acceptable to his delegation but that Israel would have "some observations" to make to the council. Israel's other two Arab neighbors, Lebanon and Jordan, so far have withheld comment.

Parliament Adjourns For Easter Recess

OTTAWA — (CP) — The Commons today began an 11-day Easter recess.

It adjourned Wednesday in the throes of the budget debate, a period of eight sitting days during which members can get almost anything off their chests that's bothering them.

Both the Commons and the Senate, which recessed last Thursday, return April 9. The Commons will resume its business with the fourth day of debate on the budget announced by Finance Minister Harris March 20.

Members aired a wide variety of subjects Wednesday before heading homeward.

H. A. Bryson (CCF-Humboldt-Melfort) said one step toward a sound Canadian agriculture program would be to fire Agriculture Minister Gardiner and establish parity prices for farm products.

He was sure the minister would like to retire to his farm at Lemberg, Sask., but Mr. Gardiner "cannot afford to do that because of the unrealistic and poverty-stricken agricultural policies to which he had been a party in this country."

A stand-pat budget was wise at this time, aside from international considerations, the federal treasury faced an additional \$182,000,000-a-year payment as its share of the proposed national health insurance plan.

In the question period at the Commons opening, Justice Minister Garson rejected a suggestion of G. H. Castleden (CCF - Yorkton) that further executions in Canada be postponed until Parliament deals with the question of capital punishment.

Such a postponement, Mr. Garson said, would in effect be a repeal by cabinet of the law passed by Parliament.

Labor Member Accuses U.S. Of Sabotage

LONDON. — (Reuters) — A Labor member of Parliament said Wednesday he believed a Chinese saboteur was paid \$40,000 indirectly by the United States for placing a bomb on an Indian airliner that crashed off Sarawak last April.

Sixteen persons lost their lives in the airliner which was flying Chinese Communist officials from Hong Kong to Jakarta, Indonesia, for the Bandung Afro-Asian conference.

The charge was levelled by John Baird, who later was criticized by another opposition member, Percy Daines.

Daines said: "I understood Mr. Baird to say the American government have paid \$40,000 to commit a murder. Surely that statement is out of order and a deliberate slur and slander on a very great friend of this country."

Cheers from all parts of the House greeted his criticism. Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd told Baird: "I don't think you have any right to make that kind of insinuation."

Fierce Snow Storm In Man. Shatters All Existing Records

WINNIPEG — (CP) — The wind attacked today on the heels of a three-day storm, building up castles of drifting snow on highways already dotted with stranded cars.

The spring storm dumped as much as two feet of snow as it slashed at the eastern prairies after swirling in from Montana.

A snowfall record of 98 inches-set in the winter of 1881-82 — was smashed as the new fall on Winnipeg brought the winter's total to 98.4 inches.

With snow and rain predicted for Eastern Canada over the week-end, there is still no evidence that the storm which has devastated Western Canada, will affect this area.

One motorist died from a heart attack while shovelling his car free of a snowdrift.

Nils Bjerre of Regina, a Saskatchewan Power Corporation official, was rescued in the neighboring province after being trapped 44 hours in a snowbound car.

Bjerre went without food and sleep but escaped frostbite. A rotary plow pushing through the snow of a two-day blizzard discovered his almost-buried car.

A long-range effect of the storm was a heightened flood threat along the Assiniboine and Red rivers. However, Bruce B. Hogarth, Manitoba director of water resources, described the situation as "not anything urgent."

Towns and villages in Manitoba were packed with stranded motorists and rural schools were closed. Almost all highways and roads were blocked and ice and slush slowed traffic to a crawl in cities.

The weatherman forecast some snowdrifts in southern Manitoba and said 20-mile-an-hour winds would cause considerable

drifting on highways. Easter week-end would have below-normal temperatures and above-normal precipitation.

Chicago. — (AP) — Violent wind and snow storms, which struck crippling blows Wednesday to northern sections of the midwest United States, continued their assault today.

Many communities in the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin were virtually paralysed by the vigorous early spring storms.

The dust storms which smothered crops in the plains Tuesday and Wednesday abated. However, there was considerable dust still in the air today in western Texas and parts of Oklahoma and Kansas.

Stormy weather also hit eastern and southern sections of the country in the form of rain or hail and strong winds.

Blizzard-like conditions were reported early today in the Dakotas with blowing snow. Winds were around 30 miles an hour with gusts to 40. Temperatures dropped far below freezing.

Schools in many rural areas and cities were closed. Highway travel was slowed and air travel was curtailed.

Snow falls measured up to a foot in some places.

To Conduct Survey On Haiti Printing

Ottawa. — (AP) — Romeo Query, assistant Queen's printer and formerly associated with a group of Quebec newspapers, will make a two-month survey of printing facilities for the Haiti government.

The Ottawa-born Query, with the federal printing office since 1949, previously was comptroller of a group of four Quebec newspapers: Le Soleil and L'Evenement-Journal of Quebec, Sherbrooke's La Tribune and Le Nouvelliste of Trois Rivières.

The Canada branch of the International Labor Office said Wednesday the ILO is financing the technical assistance mission to help Haiti build up its printing organization. The 51-year-old Mr. Query was recommended for the survey by Edmond Cloutier, the Queen's printer.

Old, Dull, But Dangerous

The nations of the Middle East are snarling at each other. Once more we hear about a flurry of threats, charges, counter-charges and conferences.

The whole affair has a drearily familiar sound. The spokesmen of those small countries are like a number of ham actors reciting lines from an old, dull play.

And yet we are forced to pay attention to that creaking melodrama. Whether we like it or not, we are involved in the course of events.

Exactly the same kind of quarrel between pygmies in the past has embroiled the giants, and caused a general war.

No doubt there are a number of good people in both the Arab and Israeli camps. No doubt there is some right on both sides.

But the time has come for common people everywhere to demand that these disputes be squelched or isolated.

There is no reason on earth why the messy little squabbles of a group of desert states should be allowed to

imperil the lives of millions and perhaps civilization itself.

The United Nations now has the chance to show its worth. Is it a true instrument of peaceful co-operation, or just a gabby propaganda forum?

Justice should be done to both sides in these quarrels, if possible. But we would rather see a small number of Arabs, or Israelis, or both, suffer wounded pride, than expose the world to the risk of atomic war.

Wars sneak up on us. Have you ever heard of the declaration of war being decided by plebiscite? And yet if the people, on both sides of the Iron Curtain could make it clear to their representatives that they wanted peace, they would get their wish.

We never know what the Communists will do. But we can play our part by making sure that not so much as one rifle or one grenade goes to the danger zone from Canada.

We feel sure that 95 per cent of the people in every country would like to see the parties to the Middle Eastern argument lifted by the scruffs of their necks with instructions to behave or be stamped on.

Nature Must Be Restrained

Some people believe that there should be no meddling with nature. Their theme song is that old favorite of the 1940's, "Doing What Comes Naturally."

They oppose the chlorination and fluoridation of water. The more zealous of them also take a sour view of inoculation, vaccination and chemical sprays and fertilizers.

They may be right about some things. Public health officials here and there are nervous about the long-range effect of certain chemical sprays on the people who eat the produce.

But would we be wise to give Mother Nature all her own way? The old lady has some odd notions. You can never tell when she may get violent. Her idea of a joke is to smile sweetly while she draws a knife to stab you in the liver.

Let's be frank. Mother Nature is a dear old creature, but there are times when she must be restrained.

Suppose that we decide to live a more natural life. We quit chlorinating the water. We quit pasteurizing the milk and inoculating children against disease.

Now a cute little germ called Salmonella Typhosa appears on the scene. This child of nature launches himself into our natural water and our natural milk. Pretty soon a num-

ber of us are dead of typhoid.

However, we have the consolation of knowing that we died natural deaths. You might call that a return to nature on a large scale.

Our vanity leads us to assume that Nature's plans are made for the benefit of the human race in general and for ourselves in particular. This is a mistaken point of view.

It is quite possible that Nature wants to eliminate the whole race. The world could manage comfortably without us. At least the old lady is itching to cross about 90 per cent of us of the books. Left to her own devices, she could do so with speed and efficiency.

Many of us would have been dead long ago if only the fit had been allowed to survive. No doubt our departure would strengthen the race, and lessen the pressure on food supplies.

We are so prejudiced that we refuse to let Nature's plan run its course.

Other forms of life are equally selfish. The typhoid bacilli probably think that they have just as good a right to live as people have.

If the typhoid germs had a public relations department, they would be warning us about the peril of chlorinating the water, and the creeping menace of inoculation.

SOCIAL SYSTEM OF THE HENS

Advocates of a "one-class" society who like to go to the world of nature for evidence to substantiate their cherished theory can't expect any encouragement from the poultry family, if a survey recently conducted by a team of specialists can be relied upon. And who among us is bold enough to question the judgment of experts?

Hens, the survey discovered, have a strict social system from which not the slightest deviation is permitted.

It starts very early in the chicken's life—at four weeks old, to be exact. In every pen there is a No. 1 bird, a No. 2 bird, a No. 3 bird, and so on right down the line. The top bird has a right—and exercises it—to peck at any other bird. The second in the scale can peck at No. 3, but never at No. 1. So it goes. No. 10, for instance, can peck at any bird below his class, but never at one in a higher category.

The researchers discovered that hens remain in their own little groups; only the most contrary non-conformists among them wander any farther than 25 feet.

For economic purposes all this means that chickens should never be turned out into new surroundings after they are four weeks old. By then, their social system is established. If put among new faces, social anarchy sets in with the result that pecking becomes confused and the proper balance upset. This makes for improper development and, later on, poor production.

In emphasizing the need for sufficient waterers and feed hoppers for each social group the survey comes to this conclusion: "Suppose there aren't enough feeders. A hen is hungry. She starts out to get some grain. On the way she has to brave the pecks of other hens higher in the social scale. She gets discouraged, frightened. She returns to her own group (where presumably the pecking is less annoying) without eating. The result? Poor egg production."

It seems that science is doing something for the human race almost every day!

BAD TASTE IN ADVERTISING

St. Thomas Times-Journal
A recent issue of life magazine contained a double-page aerial colored photograph of the city of Washington with the United States Capitol building in the centre. Blazened across the two pages were the words: "One Nation, One Whisky, One Reason." The whisky so advertised is the product of a Canadian company.

The Capitol has come to be the symbol of the highest virtues of freedom, justice and honor of the American people.

For generations these words have become familiar to Americans as an integral part of their solemn pledge of allegiance. In the period just after World War I that pledge ended with six words that either purposely, subconsciously, or accidentally suggest the headline of this advertisement, "One country, one language, one flag."

To have a whisky-maker deprecate these words from a hallowed pledge of all Americans and place his distorted version across the skies of a photograph that shows the nation's capital in all its beauty and majesty is cheap exploitation and hollow mockery.

It makes the selling point worse when it is sponsored by a Canadian producer.

Jacoby On Bridge

KING-JACK IS SLAM DANGER

Play the South hand at six hearts, assuming that you can see only your own hand and the dummy. You win the first spade trick, draw two rounds of trumps, cash the ace of spades and then leads a diamond.

West follows with a low diamond. If you cannot see the hands of the defenders, which diamond should you play from the dummy—the king or the jack?

This may seem like a sheer guess, but there is really a logical answer. The king is the correct play.

If the king happens to win the trick, you are safe. You can afford to give up one club trick, for you can ruff your last club in the dummy.

If the king happens to lose to the ace of diamonds (if East had the ace), you must then rely on a choice of finesse. You may play East for the queen of diamonds or for the queen of clubs.

Given the chance, you will play king and ace of clubs in the hope of dropping the queen; after which you will lead the jack of diamonds through East with the intention of discarding clubs if East plays low.

Now see how you stand if you play the pack of diamonds on the first round of that suit. Even if the finesse succeeds, you still need another finesse in clubs. That is, the best you can hope for is to drive out the ace diamonds, and you will get one discard on the king of diamonds. This will still leave you one trick short of safety unless you can win a club finesse later on.

The big difference between the two plays is simply that you are safe if the king of diamonds wins the first trick in that suit.

Para-Rescuers Find Snowshoes Are Essential

The Pas, Man.—Para-rescue airmen have learned one thing—next to their parachutes, a pair of snowshoes can be the most valuable equipment in Canada's Arctic and sub-Arctic territory.

RCAF and United States Air Force squads took some first-hand lessons recently in "Exercise Pushbutton" near here. Fifty airmen from the Lowry air force base at Denver, Colo., and the RCAF station at Winnipeg participated in the three-day joint search and rescue enterprise.

To most observers, their tree-top landings made the parachute jumps seem risky and uncomfortable. Actually, the jumpers preferred to land in the treetops where they were suspended upright. Landing in deep snow involves the risk of tipping head-over-heels under the weight of equipment and getting trapped in the 'chute.

Landings were all made within a short walk of the campsite, supposedly that of the missing fliers. Waist-deep snow made walking almost impossible without the aid of snowshoes.

The program, outlined in detail by the council last night, slashes Germany's economy in half and places future emphasis on production in fields of agriculture, coal and materials for the rebuilding of war-torn cities.

An increase in normal expenditures for agriculture and a decrease in special wartime costs for that department were shown last night in the main estimates for 1946-47 tabled in the House of Commons by Finance Minister Hsley.

Presenting the heaviest budget in Quebec's history, Provincial Treasurer Onesime Gagnon last night forecast a surplus of \$349,350 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1947.

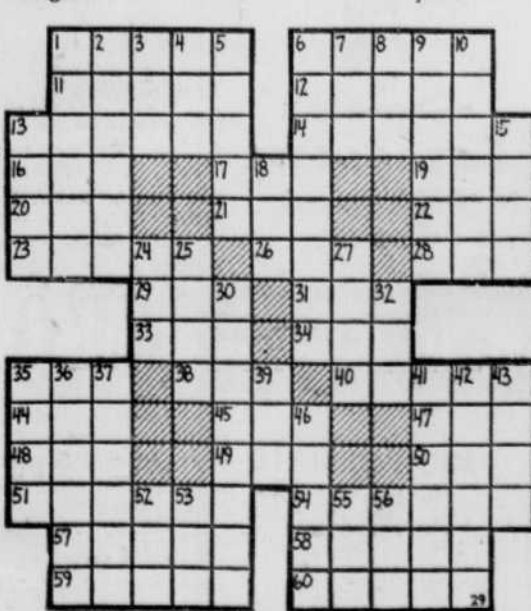

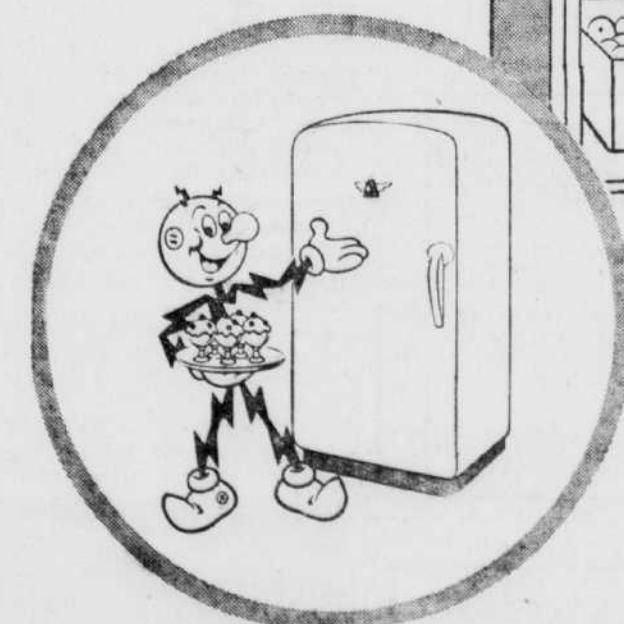

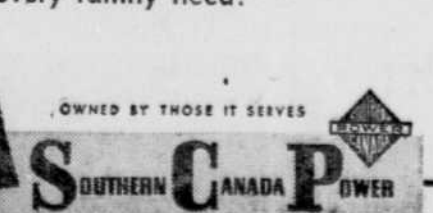

St. Lawrence Corporation Shows Substantial Gain During 1955

The year 1955 was one of great activity for St. Lawrence Corporation Limited, with important new facilities coming into operation on completion of the expansion and modernization program of the past five years, stated P. M. Fox, president, in submitting the annual report by the directors. The Corporation's mills produced a total of 563,521 tons of pulp and paper, nearly 19 per cent greater than 1954's 474,924 tons and 8 per cent ahead of the previous peaks of about 521,000 tons in 1948 and 1951. Sales amounted to \$79,360,594 compared with \$66,656,919 and gross operating profit (including investment income) was \$20,120,131, an increase of 29 per cent over 1954's \$15,537,081. Net profit was \$7,062,842 or \$6.40 per share of common stock, 59 per cent ahead of the 1954 net profit of \$4,451,038 or \$4.04 per share common. Among charges, provision for depreciation was \$4,010,894 against \$4,081,736; interest \$1,646,861, compared with \$1,710,923; and provision for income taxes \$6,569,625 against \$4,494,838. In making comparison, allowance must be made for the non-recurrent cost of \$1,367,000 for relocation, and the start-up of new equipment, which reduced 1954 profits.

Working capital amounted to \$22,347,602 at the end of 1955, an increase of \$4,624,236 for the year. Expenditure of \$8,632,604 for expansion and improvement of mills and properties in 1954 tapered off to \$2,885,919 in 1955, marking the completion of the 1951-1955 expansion program. The general result of the main program at East Angus and Red Rock has been to make each of these mills a completely modernized unit. In productive capacity for newsprint and finished kraft products, the two mills combined have been increased by 156,000

tons a year, or about 113 per cent.

Last October, the Board of Directors decided to proceed with a plan for improvement and speed-up of equipment at the Corporation's other two principal mills at Three Rivers and Dolbeau, Que. Now under way, the program will involve an expenditure estimated at \$9,400,000 to be spread over two and a half years, with completion in 1958, and to be met out of current earnings. The estimated result will be an increase in newsprint capacity of 40,000 tons a year; 18,500 tons at Three Rivers and 21,500 tons at Dolbeau.

The general outlook is for continuance of the progress made in 1955, states Mr. Fox. All present indications support an expectation that the Corporation's results in 1956 will be ahead of 1955 results, in volume of business and in earnings. These indications are in two categories: demand for products, and operating efficiency.

In demand for its products, the Corporation's contracts for supply of newsprint in 1956 fully cover its expanded capacity and maximum possible output. Full capacity sale of its finished kraft products is similarly indicated. The Corporations diminished surplus of unbleached sulphite pulps seems likely to find a ready market. The only inactive productive capacity apparently will be in the relatively small groundwood mill at Nipigon, Ont., which has been out of operation since the latter part of 1953 due to lack of profitable demand for groundwood pulp.

The Corporation expects results to continue to improve in 1956. New machines and equipment take time to reach peak performance and the new facilities, despite their notably improved performance in 1955 versus 1954, have not yet reached their maximum. They can be expected to make further progress in that direction during 1956.

The long-term outlook is also encouraging. Short of a world upheaval, by force or in economic conditions, there is nothing in sight that does not point to sustained high demand for the Corporation's products and continuing progress in its facilities and ability to meet demand.

The 1955 annual report is the most comprehensive yet issued by the corporation, consisting of 28 pages, divided into two main parts. Part One deals with the results obtained in 1955; in production, earnings and other developments. Part Two is concerned with the state of the Corporation in terms of properties and products, dealing with the primary factors of pulpwood and electric power resources.

Shawinigan Notes Great Upsurge In Power Demand

MONTREAL — The Shawinigan Water and Power Company expects capital expenditures over the next three years to reach a total of \$85,000,000, President J. A. Fuller told shareholders yesterday at the Company's annual meeting.

The figure includes the completed cost of Shawinigan's new hydro-electric development at Rapide Sans Nom, on the St. Maurice River, which is estimated at \$56,000,000.

To cover these expenditures, Mr. Fuller stated, "approximately \$35,000,000 will need to be obtained by means of new financing." He added that under any kind of normal circumstances this should not prove to be difficult in light of the Company's present sound financial position.

Discussing significant developments of 1955, in particular those which led to the decision to go ahead with construction of the Sans Nom development this spring, Mr. Fuller noted the "amazing upsurge in the demand for power" during the year. The peak demand on Shawinigan's system was about 14 per cent above 1954, approximately equal to the average increase in peak loads in the highly industrialized areas across Canada. Sale of primary power, in kilowatt-hours, was up 15.4 per cent.

Mr. Fuller termed the 14.1 per cent growth in revenues from primary power sales "a rather startling increase when compared with the 8.5 per cent increase of 1954 over 1953." However, he added, due to a very dry summer and fall, conservation of water storage reserves was necessary and only a very small amount of secondary power was sold in the second half of the year; hence secondary power sales decreased by \$275,000 or 17.7 per cent, a relatively small amount compared with the increase of \$5,760,000 in revenue from primary power sales.

In view of this large growth and with the knowledge that existing and new customers would require more power in 1956 and 1957, we carefully reviewed our power supply situation over a five-year period ahead and could come to only one conclusion, namely, that we must provide a new source of power supply which would be available in the fall of 1958, and this despite the fact that we will add to our supply 60,000 kilowatts each year starting this fall under our Beramis contract with Hydro-Quebec, until we reach the maximum contract amount of 300,000 kilowatts.

"Many of us today," Mr. Fuller went on, "are asking ourselves if we are not at the very peak of a boom, and therefore question the possibility of further continuation of the present upward course. It is a hard question to answer over any long period ahead, but for 1956 there is certainly not much indication of any reversal in a downward direction. For this year our estimates show a further growth in the peak demand on our power system of 130,000 kilowatts, or 8.7 per cent over 1955, and we know that these estimates are reasonably accurate as they are based upon direct communication with our major customers and on the historical pattern of our sales to domestic, farm, commercial and small power consumers.

"Beyond 1956, predictions, of course, become more difficult, but already we know of new plants under construction or planned which will come into operation in 1957 or later, and which will add some 50,000 kilowatts to the power demand. This figure is quite apart from any growth which will occur among existing industrial customers and does not include the normal growth of about 10 per cent per year in our distribution business and our sales at wholesale to other distributors. It is natural to expect interruptions from time to time in the growth curve by recessions in economic activity, but over the longer term continuing increases in electric power requirements appear to be assured."

CBC Director Notes Progress Of Canadian TV

Granby — Andre Oumet, director of the CBC's French-language television service, says television has developed more rapidly in Canada than in any other country.

Addressing a Richelieu Club meeting, Mr. Oumet said that since the CBC started operations three years ago the number of television sets has climbed to 2,000,000. There were approximately 600,000 sets in Quebec alone.

Montreal has become the world's leading centre in the production of French-language television programs. It ranked second only to New York in TV productions of all kinds.

Mr. Oumet said that since television was launched more than \$1,000,000,000 has been spent on TV sets and on programs. Approximately \$174,000,000 of the amount was spent in Quebec. In 1955 alone a total of \$62,000,000 was spent in Quebec province on the purchase of sets.

Syrup, Flowers Feature Local Market Display

Spring maple syrup made its debut at the Lansdowne Market this morning, top quality selling for \$6.50 a gallon. Maple sugar was selling for 55 cents a pound or two pounds for a dollar.

The colorful bouquets of flowers for Easter were the second feature of today's market produce, with colorful dozens of gladioli, tulips, lilies, and numerous types of potted plants on display at prices ranging from \$2.50 to \$5.

Prices were generally steady although all types of ham rose slightly but are expected to drop down again after Easter. New potatoes were selling for 15c a pound and strawberries for 45c a basket.

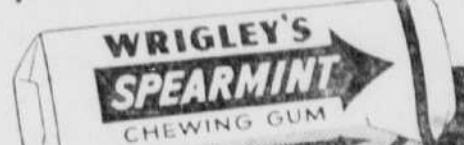

Good Friday Dish From Bermuda—Cod Fish Pie

Hamilton, Bermuda: A proper Good Friday dish is often difficult to find, so housewives might welcome the suggestion that they try an old Bermudian dish for this holy day.

The basic staples of an island cook, cod fish and potatoes, are in the main ingredients. Cod fish, diced potatoes and small onions are cooked together. The fish and vegetables, with a small amount of the stock, are poured into a baking dish (one of the pretty oven-to-table casseroles would be both attractive and practical, cutting down as it would on the washing up). A light crust cover is the final touch (your own favorite recipe here). The whole is then placed into a preheated moderate oven (about 350) for about twelve minutes, or long enough to brown the crust and set the liquid to simmering. Serve immediately, with perhaps hot biscuits, a green salad, and good hot coffee.

It is interesting to note here that potato was first introduced to North America from Bermuda after its arrival in these islands from England in 1613.

Mr. Tomkins traced the history of the university from its inception to the present, and paid tribute to the untiring efforts of Bishop Mountain and Mr. Doolittle to establish a school for higher education for students.

In 1843, in an unsuitable building in Lennoxville, a college was opened with 10 students enrolled and Mr. Nicholls as principal. After one year, the students were moved across the river, where Lieut. Morris helped to construct a new building, which was poorly equipped and offered few conveniences.

In 1853 the college was granted a Royal Charter, and became

a university, which could offer their graduates degrees. This building was burned and replaced twice before the 20th century.

In 1871, the university branched out and included a medical and dental faculty in Montreal, but it was found expedient to amalgamate with McGill University in 1905.

With Dr. Jewitt as its head, the college now has 285 students, good buildings and a staff of 25. Many bursaries and scholarships are available for the students.

Between 1957 and 1963, it is estimated that there will be double the number of students wishing to enter college, and the biggest problem will be how and where to obtain a large enough staff, as industries, business concerns and governments offer much better attractions to the graduate.

Mr. Carr thanked Mr. Tomkins for his interesting address, following which, light refreshments were served by the social committee.

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Derby Line Parents-Teachers Assoc. Hears Interesting Talk On Customs

Derby Line.—The March meeting of the Derby Line Parents-Teachers Association was recently held at the MacDonald School where G. Earl Heath of the Derby Line customs staff was the special speaker.

Mr. Heath chose the subject "The Customs, Protection for

You," pointing out that it does not matter whether the officer encounters on entering the United States has on a light blue immigration uniform or a dark blue customs uniform. The difference between the two services, however, is very simple: the Immigration handle people; the Customs handle merchandise. He explained the method of preliminary questioning called "screening," which is resulting in a continuous and rapid flow of traffic.

"Customs service," said the speaker, "was established in 1789, its principal functions to collect duties on imports, prevent illegal importations and exportations and otherwise regulate the nation's commerce with foreign countries."

There are about 8,700 employees in the service, and total collections in a year amount to around \$600,000,000. He also explained the tariff in detail and rules and regulations of the Customs Bureau.

Mr. Heath said "It may be hard for one to realize the customs are stationed at the Border for the protection of the public, and many regard them as a nuisance, but statistics show such is not the case, and all they ask is co-operation of the public, and the officers will speed them on their travel. Mr. Heath was introduced by the Association president, Robert Darby and thanked by Mrs. C. A. Bacon.

Other business brought up by the president was a letter to be sent to the International Water Company stating the association as being in favor of the fluoridation system being installed for drinking water. A letter of thanks is to be sent to Rev. Father A. Hugo LaPenna Heads Border Red Cross

The annual meeting of the Rock Island-Stanstead-Beebe branch of the Canadian Red Cross was held in Sunnyside School at Rock Island, with the president, W. J. C. Sutton, in the chair. A good number of officers, directors and members attended.

In the absence of the treasurer, M. L. Moore submitted the annual report, showing that the campaign figures for 1955 amounted to \$1,979.75, an increase of \$200.37 over 1954.

Mr. Moore, chairman of the Blood Clinic, reported no drawing had been held at the Boundary last year, as no request for one had been received from headquarters.

Mrs. Carlton Twombly, chairman of the women's work for Beebe, gave the following excellent report: "During 1955 the small Beebe group met once a week to sew. In that time they received eight shipments of materials from headquarters for sewing and knitting. Returned to them was 1501 finished articles, sent in 11 shipments. These included 56 crib quilts. From the 102 pounds of wool received from headquarters, 450 articles were knitted.

"There were 981 garments for children sewed, also five donations, one man's sweater from Mrs. Russell Perkins, two pairs of men's gloves from Mrs. Grace

Taylor, two infant's nighties from Mrs. L. Hamilton.

Assistance from others in knitting came from Mrs. Reginald Hatch, Tomifobia, Mrs. Lee Jenkins, Mrs. Charles Clark and Mrs. George Hatch, Rock Island. Three of the Beebe knitters, Mrs. E. Lee Sr., over 90 years of age, Mrs. Ella Boulais, 87 years, and Miss L. Eryou, have knit most of the socks and long stockings. The buttonholes on all garments were made free of charge by Snag Proof Company."

Mrs. Twombly was warmly congratulated by several members on the wonderful work she and her group are doing.

Miss Elsie McIntosh, chairman of the disaster and preparedness committee, reported that assistance had been given in August to a family of two adults and 13 children who lost their home and its contents by fire in Tomifobia. They were sent blankets and clothing and given two pairs of shoes and food for a three-day period. Mrs. R. A. Hatch of Tomifobia held "open house," the day the shipment arrived, with many calling to see for themselves how quick the Red Cross is to respond in cases of need.

Mrs. Howard Cass, R.N., chairman of the home nursing committee, stated that the hospital bed purchased by the branch a year ago had been used to great advantage, first for the home

nursing course given last winter and spring, since then by three elderly men suffering from heart ailments and by a woman with a fractured hip. Mrs. Cass stated all patients had now fully recovered and liked to think the bed partly responsible.

Letters of appreciation were read in regard to the bed, with gifts enclosed. Thirty-two women of the communities had taken the Red Cross home nursing course and received their certificates.

Mrs. Alfred Aldrich reported for the Red Cross swim project, showing a total of 456 youngsters took advantage of the course, with the instructors giving 3,589 individual lessons during the ten weeks. Many of these earned the Canadian and American Red Cross awards.

Mr. Sutton announced that last year the Red Cross had presented several members of this branch with service of merit badges. E. J. Struthers, chairman of Veterans' Welfare, announced he was assisting J. A. Bacon, of the Stanstead Frontier Branch of the Canadian Legion, on some worthwhile work for worthy veterans and so far it had not been necessary to apply to the Red Cross for assistance.

"However," he said, "we are appreciative of the Red Cross,

which we know is behind us and ready to help if requested."

He has won three, lost one and put together a 1.50 earned-run average, giving up only two walks and three earned runs in 18 innings. And with Ted Williams, Jackie Jensen and Sammy White on his side, there is little reason to doubt that Bob will improve on his 10-17 pitching record of last season.

The rub, however, is that he will have to steer clear of injuries. For if anyone can qualify for the title of the "unluckiest player in the majors" it is Mr. Porterfield.

Bob, now 31, came up to New York Yankees in 1948 with a fine reputation. The following year, Casey Stengel was ready to make him one of his front-line hurlers.

"But there was always something wrong," complained Casey, "sore arms, sore legs, sore head, always something sore."

After that Porterfield came up with sundry other hurts, including a fractured jaw and a concussion.

Last year with Senators he still was sore. But this time at manager Charley Dressen, who he claimed tried to change his pitching delivery. His performance with Boston so far, though, makes it appear that he psychologically as well as physically sound.

Wednesday, Porterfield gave up only three hits and one run in six innings as Red Sox downed Kansas City 7-2. Jackie Jensen slammed his first homer of the spring.

Injuries struck four players in the Yankees-Washington game, won 6-4 by Senators. This is the

Vancouver Is Aiming For Biggest Sports Spectacle Of All Time, Olympics; Would Be First City To Play Host

Vancouver — (P) — This Pacific coast city is aiming for the biggest sports spectacle of all — the Olympics.

Mayor Fred Hume, a strong backer of the British Empire Games in 1954 and the Grey Cup in 1955, recently went on record as being fully behind the Vancouver Sun proposal to hold the 1964 summer Olympics here.

No city in Canada has ever played host to the Olympics.

"Whatever the cost, it would be worth it to Vancouver in publicity alone," the mayor said.

The rapidly-growing movement has gained support from the Vancouver Trades and Labor Council (TLC), the provincial government and various individual labor groups.

This city, the mayor said, is the logical site for a Canadian Olympiad.

"Vancouver has more to offer than any other city in Canada," he said.

Sydney Dawes, president of the Canadian Olympic Committee, said recently either Toronto or Vancouver would be able to hold the 1964 Olympics, but said Vancouver could win the games "if the citizens really got after them."

The 1960 summer Olympics have been awarded to Rome. The summer games this year will be held in Melbourne, Australia.

"From what I know of the Olympics, they are not much different from the B.E.G., only bigger," Mayor Hume said.

"The Olympics are the greatest thing in the world, publicity gained for Vancouver would be that much bigger. If any city in Canada can handle the Olympics, Vancouver can. We are not going to wait behind anybody."

Vancouver citizens, polled by The Sun following Mayor Hume's statement, were almost unanimous in agreeing the city "should really go after" the games.

Only one man didn't think the idea was too sound. He suggested the Olympics be held in Toronto.

Hearts Blank Raith-Rovers To Reach Finals

Edinburgh. — (Reuters) — Hearts reached the Scottish Football Cup final Wednesday by defeating Raith Rovers 3-0 at Easter Road Ground here. Hearts led 1-0 at the half.

It was a replay of the goalless draw the teams played in the semi-final last Saturday. The winner meets Celtic in the final April 21.

Two league games scheduled for Wednesday, Clyde vs Hearts and Stenhousemuir vs Queen's Park, were postponed.

At Paisley, Celtic defeated St. Mirren 2-0 in a Division A game. Both goals were scored in the first half. The game had been scheduled for last Saturday but was postponed because Celtic was playing in the cup semi-final.

Olympic Games' Receipts Reach \$1,500,000 Now

Melbourne, Australia. — (P) — Gate receipts for the Olympic Games at Melbourne next November have already reached \$1,500,000.

Gen. W. Bridgeford, chief executive officer of the organizing committee, said last week that total box office receipts probably would touch \$2,500,000 when revenue from films and television is added.

Gen. Bridgeford said that all top-priced seats had been sold for the opening and closing ceremonies. All swimming and diving tickets had been sold. Final nights of boxing, basketball, cycling, wrestling, weight-lifting and gymnastics were also sold out.

But a total of 450,000 reservable seats were still available for other events, and there will be standing room for 45,000 people each day.

Gen. Bridgeford warned that forged Olympic Games tickets were likely to be circulated.

"Nobody should buy tickets except from an accredited agent," he said.

Johnny Podres' Departure And Don Bessent's Injury Cause Worry To Manager Walt Alston And Staff

Ft. Myers, Fla. — (P) — The loss by injury of righthander Don Bessent coming not long after Johnny Podres' departure for the navy is causing some concern over pitching in the camp of the world champion Brooklyn Dodgers.

Manager Walt Alston wasn't depending too much on young Podres, the southpaw pitching star of the world series. He knew stocky Johnny was ticketed for the services but if the manager had hoped Podres might stick around, you couldn't blame him.

The 18-year-old girl became the fourth to take the big prize. She had already become the sweetheart of this country where blondes are fairly rare, beauty is ever cherished and soccer is the national game.

Carlos claimed he was too "sick" to fight that night and there was no intimidation that Aragon was in any way involved.

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Red Wings Out To Tally First Marker Tonight; May Be Lumley's Last

No More Lagging, Says Coach Skinner; "We Were Looking Past Series But Not Any More; Just A Matter Of Time"

DETROIT — (CP) — Detroit Red Wings have Toronto Maple Leafs backed to the wall, but the Wings want to borrow some Leaf tactics to wrap up their Stanley Cup semi-finals tonight.

Leading 3-1 in the best-of-seven series, the Detroiters figure a little pressure in the right place will send them into the show-down championship final against Montreal Canadiens.

Detroit coach Jimmy Skinner believes a sure way to get the fourth and deciding win is to score the first goal when the two teams meet tonight at the Olympia.

"That game was a complete turnaround," Skinner added. "Up to then, the puck had been rolling for Toronto in the early stages. But Tuesday night it rolled for us for about 30 minutes—and we weren't able to do anything about it. We'll have to take advantage of the first thing that comes along."

Skinner saved some optimism just in case Leafs send the se-

ries into a sixth or seventh game.

"We feel that it's just a matter of time," he said.

Wings' failure to sweep the set in four games cost them at least two days' rest before the expected final series against Montreal. The Canadiens got the job done against New York Rangers in five games, winding it up Tuesday night with a 7-0 shut-out.

Skinner said:

"We might have been a little ahead of ourselves in Toronto—looking past the series at hand and into the next round. But not now. We have to win this one and we know it. And if we win it, and we're hot, we'll be ready for whatever follows."

Skinner also hopes Toronto netminder Harry Lumley doesn't stay mad.

Big Lum took a roasting in his hometown when his club was beaten 5-4 in overtime last Saturday. He kept Leafs in the series with a 2-0 shutout Tuesday.

2-0 Win Was "Reprieve" For Lumley; Was Openly Criticized For Defeats; Last Year, Says Smythe

DETROIT — (AP) — The pressure was on Toronto Maple Leafs Wednesday as they made ready for a task that only one hockey team in history has been able to accomplish.

Only the Leafs of 1942 ever lost the first three games in a Stanley Cup series and came back to win the best-of-seven playoff.

But the Leafs of 1956 are rated only the slightest chance of picking off a second win in the series against Detroit Red Wings when the clubs resume their semi-final action tonight.

Three games down and minus their leading goal-getter Tod Sloan, Toronto outthrust the Red Wings in Toronto Tuesday night to trim the Detroit edge to 3-1.

The only note of optimism that the Leafs might do it again tonight and go on to win the series came from their general manager, Hap Day.

"I think we can take the series," Day said, "but let's do it one game at a time. This is the same club that beat us three straight."

The Red Wings are convinced they can wrap it up in five games. They accepted their first playoff loss as "one of those things" and coach Jimmy Skinner said a Wing victory is "just a matter of time."

The Leafs' 2-0 shutout Tuesday night may have been a "reprieve" for Toronto goalie Harry Lumley. Openly criticized by fans and his club through the

first three Detroit victories, Lumley was the toast of Toronto after his 33-save effort in the fourth game.

Leaf President Con Smythe, quoted earlier as saying this season would be Lumley's last in Toronto, was asked if the performance made him change his mind.

"Let's see what he does next game," was Smythe's answer.

But Coach King Clancy said a lot of the earlier Detroit goals should have been stopped before they got to Lumley and Day praised the veteran goalie for "tremendous goaltending." But Lumley was deadpan after the victory and refused to talk with reporters.

Except for Toronto centre Tod Sloan, each team will be at full strength. Sloan was injured in the second game and will sit out the rest of the series with a fractured shoulder.

Maurice Richard Piles Up More Records, Holds Four At Present; Has Played In 11 Cup Series To Date

Montreal — (CP) — Maurice (Rocket) Richard, who holds the record for most goals in a Stanley Cup game and has just tied the record for assists, adds to four more of his records every time he figures in a scoring play.

Two of these continuing records for Montreal Canadiens brilliant right-winger are for play-off games alone; two are for regular-season National Hockey League games plus playoffs.

Richard's five goals in a single cup game have stood as a record since March 23, 1944, when he scored all Montreal goals in a 5-1 defeat of Toronto Maple Leafs.

Toe Blake, now Canadiens' coach assisted on each goal for a record five assists. Tuesday night, when Canadiens defeated New York Rangers 7-0 and took the semi-final series 4-1, Richard equalled the assist mark.

The Rocket now has scored 60 goals in Stanley Cup competition. He added three in the series with New York to the record 57 he already held. He has played in 11 cup series in his 14 seasons of campaigning.

With 10 points — on three goals and seven assists — against the Rangers, Richard has run his record string of total points to 92, made up of 60 goals and 32 assists.

Starting this season, Richard had amassed 479 goals — a record — in regular-season games and playoffs. He scored 38 goals in the NHL campaign and three against Rangers, bringing his grand total to 520.

In the same way, he has pushed his total points to 888 from his former record of 807. He had 71 points in the regular season, on 38 goals and 33 assists, and 10 more in the Ranger series.

Only one of the Rocket's present teammates is in the record class for Stanley Cup play. Captain Butch Bouchard, veteran defenceman who is about to retire after 15 seasons, has played in 112 playoff games in 13 series. He sat on the bench throughout the Ranger series and so failed to add to his record. Richard has played in 96 cup games.

Phil Goyette got the lone second-period tally for Montreal.

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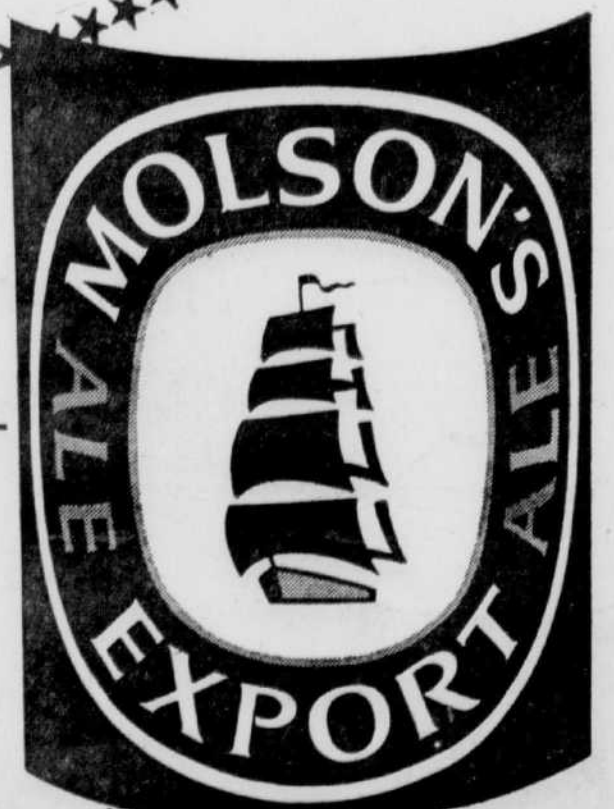
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Home And School Sponsors Supper At Rock Island

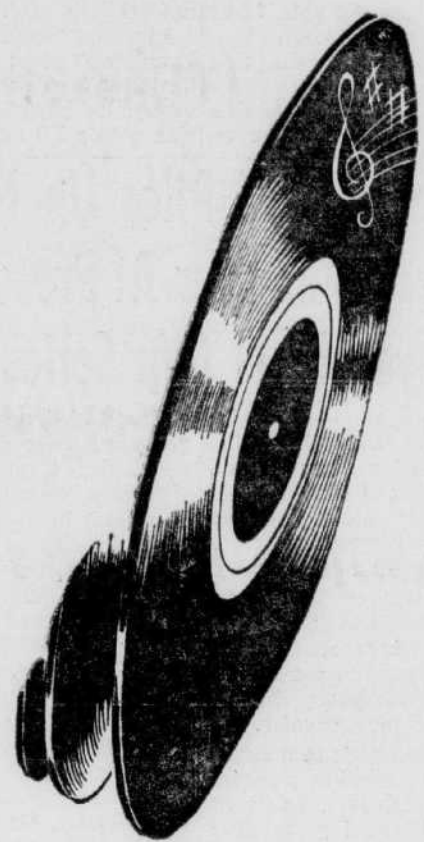
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
