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Education Week Editorial

LEAVE TEACHING TO THE TEACHERS

During Education Week a great deal is said by the educators about the teacher shortage, higher qualifications for teachers, more money for education and so on. Far too little emphasis is placed upon the role of the parents and the community in their relationship with the school. As parents, we, along with other members of the community, have a tremendous responsibility for education. Are we facing up to these responsibilities as we rear our own children to meet the challenges of a changing world? Are we cooperating with, and supporting our schools to advantage? No school can rise much above the community it serves. No community deserves a better school than it is willing to support.

The relationship between parents and teachers needs considerable overhauling. Parents, who as laymen, would never dream of questioning the methods or procedures used by their doctors, dentists, lawyers, nurses, or even the plumber or electrician, feel quite competent to say how the teacher should do his job. In this regard the teachers themselves are to blame, for teachers all too often do not emphasize the importance of their profession. — Without the teaching profession there would be no other professions. It is most encouraging to find that as teachers become better qualified they are defending their positions with a stronger voice. It is high time that all teachers become less humble, and start telling parents and other laymen who presume to voice opinions about their jobs, that they do not know what they are talking about. Teachers and parents are becoming increasingly aware that what the schools are doing is the work of experienced, highly trained professionals, not tyros or amateurs.

Many a good school has deteriorated because of community interference or pressure, not only in the classroom, but in the whole school programme. Schools that yield to pressures in connection with sports or other school activities, often find themselves with an unbalanced programme that proves disastrous to the real purpose of the school. Though parents should not concern themselves with those aspects of education which should properly be left to the professionals, they can exert a far-reaching influence on education by the training and supervision they give their own children. There are too many parents who admit they can't do anything with their children. As ridiculous as this may appear,

a look at our schools and communities verifies that a good number of parents are raising far short in training their children to be good citizens of the school and community.

It is often said that there are no delinquent children, only delinquent parents. Failure in school in many cases, may be attributed to the failure of the parents in the home. Children go to school to learn, not to spend valuable time unlearning, the hard way, many of the things they have been taught improperly in the home. Many of us do not fully realize the extent to which our children mirror us in their attitudes and habits; are we proud of what they mirror? As parents, our task is to develop in our children the proper attitudes, work habits and character and to continually supervise them, and demand from them the highest standards of conduct, sportsmanship and scholarship, of which they are capable.

The school cannot be expected to do its job fully and completely when the parents, as partners in education, fail. Though some parents are doing their job well, others are jeopardizing the future welfare of their own children and indirectly this is having an adverse effect on other children in the same group, grade or school.

Frequently parents who are falling down in the training of their own children are the very ones who speak with conviction about what other parents, community organizations, the church and the school should be doing, and how they should be doing it. Much of the unfavourable criticism directed towards our schools, although repeated by the gullible and uninformed, originates with those parents whose children failed their grade, or were in some difficulty at school. We, as parents, should learn the facts about our schools and not rely on hearsay. We should support our schools for work well done, and be in a position to offer well thought out constructive criticism, based on facts, when we feel that improvements can be made.

Education Week is an appropriate time to take an honest and an intelligent look at our schools and ourselves, and our relationship with our schools. To weigh what we are doing against what we could or should be doing, and to insure that we are playing our part to strengthen and improve our school and help provide the best educational opportunities possible for our boys and girls.

Handbook Going to Every Canadian Home Clarifies True Choice For Free World

TORONTO, March 7 — In a nation-wide distribution through the Post Office every home in Canada will receive a manifesto which is clarifying for hundreds of millions of people across the world the issues created by the cold war.

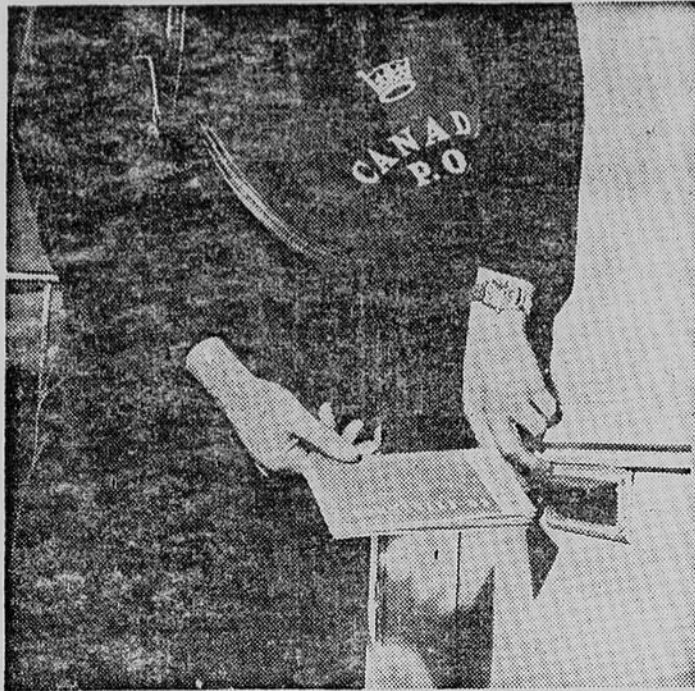
A handbook, "Ideology and Co-Existence", prepared by Moral Re-Armament, will this week go to 4,300,000 Canadian homes. Patriotic Canadians determined that Canada play her part to put the free world on the ideological offensive have taken this initiative.

Canadians will join the ranks of 18 million families throughout Europe who have already received "Ideology and Co-Existence" which expresses the ideology of the free world in clear terms and presents an answer to Communism. It has gone to every home in Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Iceland, Holland and Switzerland. Within the next weeks it goes to 40 million homes in Britain, France, West Germany, Italy, Australia and the key areas of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

In this handbook are expressed the forthright convictions of world statesmen such as: M. Robert Schuman, former Prime Minister and Foreign Minister of France; Prime Minister Diefenbaker; Chancellor Konrad Adenauer; John Riffe, late Executive Vice-President of the CIO; US Admiral William H. Standley; and Dr. Douglas Cornell, Executive Officer of the National Academy of Sciences, Washington, D.C.

Moscow has attacked "Ideology and Co-Existence" in over 100 articles noting that "it is putting an end to the ideological softening up of the free world".

In Switzerland, General Henri Guisan, wartime Commander-in-Chief of the Swiss Army, wrote in a foreword, "Our country follows a non-committal policy in international affairs. On the ideological plane, however, neutrality can be dangerous, for refusal to fight for what is right plays the enemy's game."



In Cyprus former EOKA freedom fighters distributed the booklet by hand to every Greek home.

The German Foreign Office ordered 1200 copies for its officials. National distribution will follow.

In Holland, "Volkskrant", the official organ of the Prime Minister's Catholic Party, stated, "In an age in which statesmen from the West are negotiating with great difficulty with the Kremlin to achieve peaceful co-existence . . . when representatives of trade unions and parliaments hurry to Moscow to undergo friendly brainwashing — in this age Moral Re-Armament hoists the storm signal: co-existence is impossible . . . The Catholic community of Holland wholeheartedly subscribes to the present call."

Scandinavia warranted the all-out attack of Moscow when "Ideology and Co-Existence"

went to 6,700,000 homes in five Nordic languages. Earlier, Premier Khrushchev had been forced to cancel his visit to Scandinavia by a group of leaders who had planned a strategy to keep their nations free from totalitarianism. These same men again took the lead to distribute the handbook. It went to every home from the West Coast of Greenland to Finnish villages on the Russian border and the northernmost town of Norway's Arctic coast to the Danish German border. On the East Coast of Greenland it reached tiny villages and snow huts by dog-sled. In remote areas it was dropped in postbags from aeroplanes.

In Kerala, India, recently freed from a Communist administration, leaders of the liberation movement are giving their State a unifying idea. "Ideology and Co-Existence" was carried in full by twelve main newspapers and will go to a million families.



GERARD BRUCHESI REPORTS From Ottawa

On Thursday, March 3, 1960, Finance Minister Fleming proposed a resolution to introduce a measure to amend the Federal-Provincial Tax-Sharing Arrangements Act to provide certain alternative arrangements for payment either by Canada through the Canadian Universities Foundation or directly by a province, of the grants to institutions of higher learning presently paid under the authority of the Appropriation Act.

In 1952, the Government was authorized to make payments to the National Conference of Canadian Universities on the basis of \$1.00 per head of the population, sums of money which were supposed to be paid to Canadian Universities.

In 1958, Parliament increased this to \$1.50 per head, per province. However, because of the refusal by Quebec Universities to accept the grants, a total sum, in the vicinity of \$26 million, was accumulated in favour of Quebec Universities. The Quebec Legislature, however, has just passed a law creating an amortisation fund in favour of Quebec Universities and we expect that the above sum will be paid to the Provincial Treasurer and will serve to create the fund guaranteeing the loans the Universities will be obliged to make to finance their future expansion.

In the future, Quebec Government will itself collect the equivalent of the grants because the Canadian Government has permitted Quebec to raise corporation taxes within the Province from 9% to 10% which will be entirely deductible on the Federal Income Tax.

Everybody will be pleased to hear about this settlement. Quebec, as all the other provinces, has complete jurisdiction in matters of education, and will have a bigger sum of money to look after student needs.

In matters of education the needs are numerous and it is important that we give our young people the best possible schooling so that one day they will be able to take over the leadership of our country.

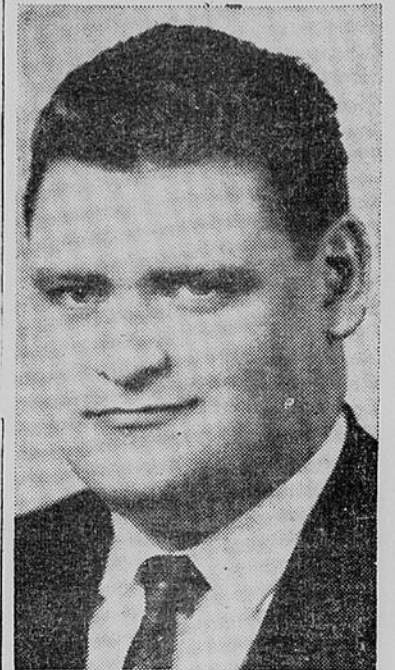
Since the present government came into power it has looked for a solution acceptable to both Quebec and Ottawa.

To be head of a country formed by an act of confederation and which is made up of ten separate provinces is not an easy task. Canada is a large country in size but small in population with different problems

in each province especially in Quebec where both the people and the provincial government wish to maintain their provincial rights which were given to them under the British North America Act in 1867.

For many years the Federal Government has been collecting some 75 per cent of all the taxpayers money in Canada and it is therefore very difficult, with all the social security commitments it has taken on, to surrender its taxation power to the provinces all in one year. Before 1962, the date of the ending of the actual fiscal agreements between the Central Government and the Provinces, we expect that new arrangements will be made to give the provinces a

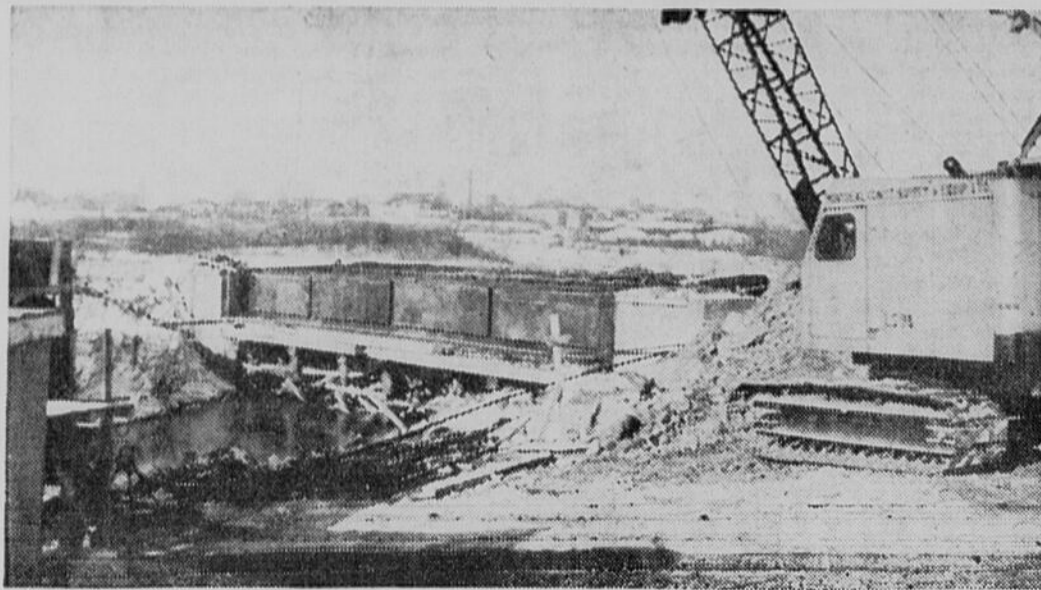

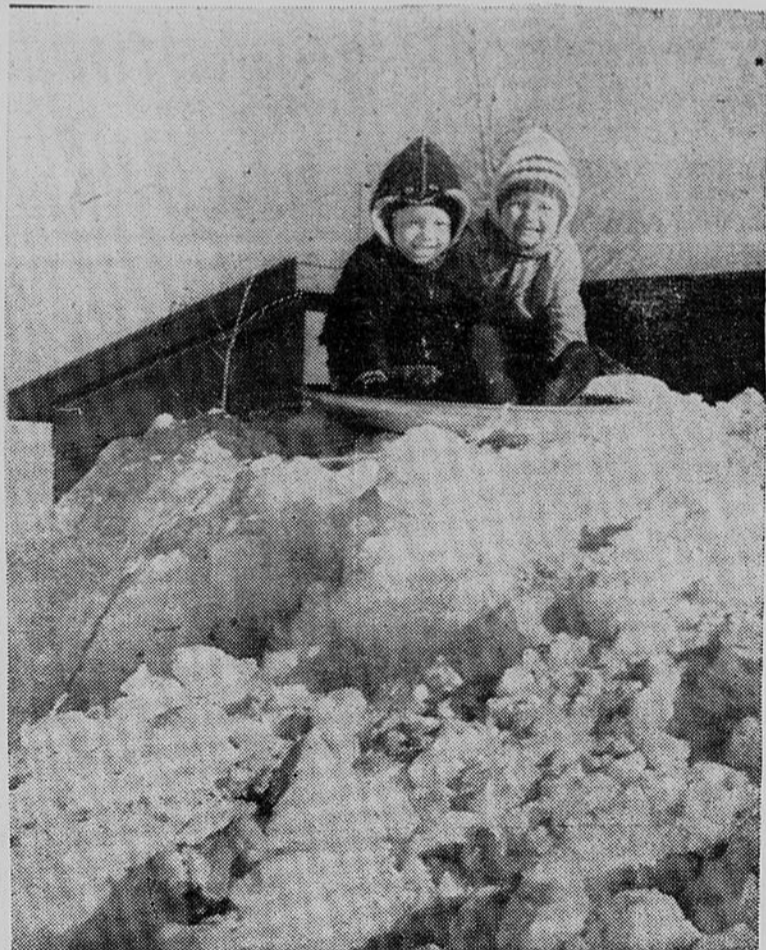

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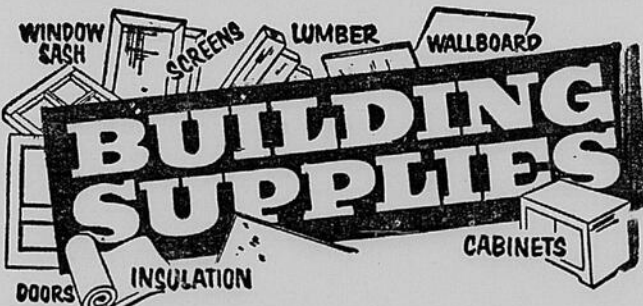


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Colonia-Comments
