

Extract of a letter from an officer on board the Queen Charlotte.

[before Algiers.] All our gun-boats were numbered, and it was good fun to see how No. 8 would pull to get into the fire before No. 6; in fact they were all nobly conducted, and the only number which nobody seemed to take care of was number one.

Now the grief of the story is, that we had no officer killed, so no promotion; the Day's balls seemed to have the navy list by heart, and took care to avoid every body who would have made a vacancy.

But the best of the story is, and I must take a new sheet to tell it, that the Prometheus brought us two new Midshipmen—Fenny little fellows; who do you think they were? The Consul's wife and daughter. I wonder how they behaved in the action; I did not see them.

He had a little child in the cradle, and the doctor promised to give it some dose that should make it lie quiet; and he engaged to bring it down in a basket like a roasting pig; but just as the poor doctor and his pig got to the last gate, the poor little devil began to squeak; so the Turks found out the whole affair, and clapped the doctor and three youngsters and the boat's crew into prison as they do the old women about London, for child-stealing.

The following is an extract of a letter from an officer of his Majesty's ship Newcastle (St. Helena), to his friend in London, dated July 29, 1816:—

The letter I took from Miss A., to Miss Balcome, introduced me to the father of the latter lady, who is here, not unusually, styled purveyor of the Ex-Emperor.—We all like Admiral Malcolm exceedingly; and we understand, both he and lady Malcolm are already great favourites with Napoleon. You perhaps suppose that Bonaparte can be seen at any time and by any body; quite the reverse; he has taken great offence with Sir Hudson Lowe, and will only be seen when it takes him in the humour.—Having procured Admiral Malcolm's permission to go to Longwood with Mr. Balcome, we set off. It is about five miles from where the Newcastle lies. Marshal Bertrand, resides with his lady and four children about four miles on the same road, in a small house of two rooms. On our way we called on the Marshal, and took a second breakfast with him. The youngest of his children as we were leaving them, called out "Doux avec le Fleur de Lis." The Marshal reprimanded him, but Madame encouraged him. We then rode on to Longwood. Mr. Balcome sent in his name, and Napoleon came forth.—They walked down the garden together for nearly half a mile, and as I went purposely to see this once great man, I used every effort in my power to throw myself in his way, so walked down the garden after them.—When they returned, Napoleon saw me, and asked Mr. Balcome whom I was. Being informed I was an officer belonging to the flag ship, Las Casas, who was walking behind with his hat off, was desired to introduce me, and I had the honour of a low bow from Bonaparte. Las Casas and Mr. Balcome being both uncovered, I was obliged to follow their example, although the sun was burning hot, by which I got a head ache.—My interview was short, and what passed was nearly as follows:—

Napoleon. How old are you, Mr.—? Ans. 27 years.

N. Are you married? No.

N. How many years have you been at sea? 12 years.

N. You are a young man to be in so large a ship as the Newcastle; pray how many tons does she carry?—Fifteen hundred and thirty five.

N. What metal does she carry?—Our long guns are 24 pounders, and our carronades 42 pounders. Mon Dieu! exclaimed Napoleon.

N. Where you ever on board the French ship Egyptienne ordered to be built?—Yes.

N. Where is she now? She is at Plymouth as a receiving ship.

N. Is she as large as the Newcastle? No, not quite so large; the Newcastle is 50 guns, the Egyptienne is only 48.

N. Do you think if the Egyptienne had guns on her gangways as you have, and the same weight of metal, you could take her?—Yes, in 15 minutes. The Ex-Emperor shrugged up his shoulders and laughed.

N. What change then would you have with a French 74 gun ship?—If it was blowing hard, so as to prevent her opening her lower deck ports, we would take her, not otherwise.

N. Very good. How long do you think you would be in taking one of the large 38 gun frigates?—Do you mean French? Napoleon smiled and said, "No, American."—In about 10 minutes. Napoleon laughed very heartily, and said, Adieu! and went to his carriage which was waiting for him.

N. We are badly supplied with provisions here. The arrivals from the Capes are but seldom, and the duty is very laborious.—There is a ship on each side of the Island, constantly cruising, and guard boats.

Nothing could exceed the firmness of Mr. McDonell the British Consul; and the enemy who threw him into confinement, tried his true British stamina by all sorts of threats and insults, but in vain. The room in his house, in which he was to have slept, was so perforated, that he would not have been safe in any part of it.

Rear Admiral MILNE is a native of Edinburgh, and entered the navy in the year 1778, and from that period to the conclusion of the American war, served as Midshipman and Master's mate of the Canada, which ship was latterly commanded by Admiral Cornwallis. During this long course of service, he was in most of the important general actions of the war. Amongst which is to be noticed the glorious victory of the 12th of April, 1782, in which action the Canada made so conspicuous a figure, the Ville de Paris having struck to her. It was unfortunate for the country, as well as individuals, that the same liberal principles which now pervade the Admiralty did not exist at that time; no provision whatever being made for long and able services, and the consequence was, that a great number of excellent officers were left destitute. In this situation the Admiral entered into the service of the East India Company, and continued in it several years, distinguished by all who knew him as a most excellent and highly capable officer. When Lord St. Vincent (then Sir John Jervis) and Gen. Grey, went to the West Indies, he again joined the navy and being considered by that great commander as an officer possessing extensive knowledge and great activity in his profession, he was soon made a Lieutenant in the frigate commanded by captain Falconer, and was in her when she captured the Blanche. History will be inclined to mark this private action as one of the most brilliant fought in the course of the war. And it is well known that after the death of Falconer, and when both frigates were in the most crippled and disabled state, all the boats being destroyed, that Milne accompanied by two or three gallant seamen, with cutlasses in their mouths, swam on board, and secured the prize. He was then made Master and Commander, and soon after posted into La Seine, in which ship he captured the Vengeance, the largest frigate then belonging to France; and it is believed that the whole of the navy who have a knowledge of this action will concur in saying, it was one of the most scientific and desperate fought battles of the war.

The excellent arrangements made by the Admiralty for the destruction of Algiers, were sufficient to ensure success (where success was possible, and no circumstance marks their prudence and foresight more than the selection of the Commanders. Of the great merits of Lord Exmouth, the writer of this will not attempt to dwell upon, further than observing that he is allowed to be one of the best officers and thorough bred seamen in the navy. Before they joined, he was personally unacquainted with Admiral Milne, but in him he found a second completely to his mind and wishes, as may be judged from his despatches, and every one acquainted either with naval or military warfare, must know how happy a Commander-in-Chief, under such circumstances.

Sweden and Russia, 44—4076 casks; making a total this year 18,592 casks. The foreign demand during last month has cleared of about 1900 hargels, and some few have been taken for Ireland—nor have we wanted a fair demand from the home trade, so that upon the whole holders have felt encouraged to support the market with considerable firmness. As, however, we are beginning to lose the foreign demand, and the shipments to Ireland having been discouraged by direct supplies; we shall feel the weight of imports more heavily; and it is understood that the quantity to arrive from Canada will prove fully as considerable as has at any time been anticipated. Our present stock of Ales consists chiefly of Pils; notwithstanding that the foreign and Irish demand has been dropping off almost exclusively. Pearl-ash is in a very narrow compass, and is likely to support their present currency.

Supplement to the Quebec Gazette, 5th December, 1816.

Timber.—The pungent results of Timber importations attracted for awhile the attention of the Country Dealers and the Trade here; but continued arrivals and pecuniary difficulties have checked all hope of speedy improvement. Nor is the mischief local.—London, Ireland, and every place of import alike inundated; cargoes abandoned for the freight only, and in some instances a premium has been paid in addition. The prices of common Pine are reduced about 14d per foot within a fortnight, (they had previously advanced about so much) and our market is still on the decline. Oak is entirely without demand, and a cargo of very fair Hardwood (in store and duty paid) have been forced off at 16d per foot. Staves of first quality, and good Redwood Deals are in demand, as are also Birch Pine Logs.

GIBRALTAR, Sept. 14.—When Lord Exmouth hauled off from Bombarding the place (being out of ammunition) the seamen were so fatigued that they were not called upon to repair and set up the rigging till after day break on the following morning: from which time, in less than 24 hours, the whole fleet was again in readiness for action, and the ships which had expended their powder received the requisite supply from the vessels carrying the spare ammunition.

The Day's palace suffered greatly, and there was scarcely a house in town that did not receive injury. It was generally believed and asserted on shore, that the first broadside from the Queen Charlotte killed not fewer than 400 men; a great number having collected on the beach opposite to her, and who neglected to get out of the way when a signal was made so to do.

The Consuls, and others who were at Algiers, gave it as their opinion, that another hour's firing would have levelled the city with the ground; and the officers who landed after the action concurred in this opinion, that they thought the upper part, at least, of the houses would in that time be brought down by the fire.

LONDON, Sept. 20.

Extract of a letter from Paris, dated 16th inst.—The Medusa frigate, of the fate of whose crew an account was lately given in the Journal des Debats, was commanded by an emigrant officer, who had not seen any service for five and twenty years. Upon the second in command remonstrating with him on the danger which he was exposing the vessel by the direction he was giving it, this old, yet inexperienced commander, offended with the advice, put the officer under arrest.—Hardly had he taken this step, when the frigate struck. You will observe that the surgeon who furnished the account of the event given in the Journal des Debats, and whose conduct in so doing was severely censured in the Monitor, has been made to disavow his interesting, and but too accurate narrative. This latter circumstance, in which the hand of power is so visible, has filled the public mind with indignation.

From the National Advocate.

A number of French gentlemen, among whom are some of the most distinguished and enlightened men of the age, have formed, at Philadelphia, a company under the title of the Colonial Society, for the purpose of making a settlement on the banks of Ohio and Mississippi. One hundred individuals have already become members, among whom are to be found naturalists, agriculturists, and many mechanics. Commissioners have been appointed to visit the western country, for the purpose of selecting a tract of land in a genial climate, where the vine and olive will soon be seen to thrive, by the side of the cotton plant.

From the Boston Palladium, of Nov. 3.

Captain Upion, who arrived here this morning, in 29 days from Lagaira, informs, that he was detained 15 days by an embargo laid at that place, in consequence, as was generally supposed of a defeat of the Royal Troops in the vicinity of Barcelona, from the Insurgents, who had appeared in that neighbourhood, in great force, say from 1500 to 2000, with a considerable number of cavalry. The Royal troops amounted to from 1200 to 1500, under Lopez, and were defeated with the loss of 800 or 900 men killed and taken prisoners. This engagement took place about the 10th of September. In consequence of this, all the inhabitants of Barcelona, (except those who were in favor of the patriot cause) left this place, and arrived at Lagaira in a most wretched condition, destitute of almost every thing, and having suffered from want of provisions on the passage.

Extract from a Citizen of Baltimore to his friend, dated "PORT-AD-PAINEC, Oct. 25.

"Since I last wrote to you, there have been a number of arrivals here from different parts of the United States, among them, the Calypso, from Baltimore, commanded by Captain Boyle. The celebrated Gen. MINA came out in her; he will command the expedition which will sail from here in a few days for Mexico. Various opinions are entertained as to the final result of this business; all Americans wish success to the efforts for the emancipation of that region from Spanish tyranny.

South American News.—Communicated.

By the last arrival from Buenos Ayres, we have received from a respectable gentleman, the following brief account, which is believed to be correct, of the power of force of the new republic of the south.

The Patriot army of Peru is augmenting and improving daily, and its respectable force and towering spirit all fears of the advance or progress of the enemy, who occupies Potosi with the greatest apprehensions, because the Provinces of Santa Cruz, Cochabamba and Fomina are all in possession of the Patriots, who are active, and make continual attacks and skirmishes even to the Arrabales of Chacabuco. According to this, it may be reasonably expected that they will form a rear guard of a number of divisions capable and able to impede the retreat of general Peruca, and compel him to pay bitterly for all his atrocities and transgressions on the persons of the innocent and oppressed inhabitants, by the most cruel tyranny.

General St. Martin, who commands a division of the patriotic army of four thousand soldiers well disciplined, was stationed in Mindoca at the foot of the Andes, waiting only for the favorable season, to march across the Cordillias, to attack all the forces of the Royalists united in Santiago, the capital of Chili. There is very little doubt, that in the course of the next year, Chili will be completely free of her oppressors. In support of this belief and opinion, and to satisfy the friends of the glorious cause of freedom, that Spanish America never can or will return to the galling yoke under which it has suffered 300 years—it will be sufficient to read the following official despatch, taken from the Ministerial Gazette of Buenos Ayres, of the 17th August:

Despatches from the General of the army of Peru, to the Director of the nation.—TUCUMAN, July 26, 1816.

Most Excellent Sir,—I send you a design of the flag which the amazon lady Juana Azurduy took near La Plata, about 11 leagues to the eastward of Chuquiaca, in the action referred to by commandant Don Manuel Acasio Padilla, whose modesty prevented him from rendering this glory to that lady who is his wife; but it is evident to me from the statement of others worthy of full credit, that she with her own hands wrested from the standard bearer their ensign of tyranny, by the force of her valor and the superiority of her skill in warfare, so uncommon to her sex. The Spaniards who make a parade of their cruelty; who spill the American blood in our days so profusely as to convince us by their acts of the truth of the narrations of Bishop Las Casas, which might otherwise appear fabulous, excite and aggravate the mind to such a degree by their atrocities, that we take pleasure in presenting to the world these phenomena, to convince the European nations and the obstinate wicked one in particular, that the more she provokes our hatred, the sooner will South America cease to be a prey to her vile cupidity. I recommend to your Excellency, the above mentioned lady Azurduy, who perseveres in her military toils in the most energetic manner, and is accompanied by several others of her sex whose names are not yet known to me, but I have made enquiries respecting them, and shall have the satisfaction of presenting them to your Excellency's consideration. God preserve your Excellency many years.

IT IS ORDERED.—That the Regulations for the winter road of the 3d December, 1814, & 21st January 1815, be continued in force, and executed by the Surveyor of Highways during the present winter, with the exception that the double roads in the Banlieue be formed by tracing the width of the roads in such double roads, to be not less than ten feet, and the rows of Balises not more than fifteen feet asunder, and thirty feet distant from each other along the road.

The Order of the 21st day of January 1815, in the preceding Order mentioned and thereby continued in force, is as follows, to wit:

IT IS ORDERED.—1st. That the snow in the streets be levelled immediately after every fall of snow, and kept level upon the whole width of each street from house to house.

2dly. That the level of the snow in any street within the walls, be not suffered to be more than one foot above the general level of the thresholds of the doors of the houses in such street; and that the surplus quantity of snow accumulated above this level be carried away by the occupiers of lots respectively.

3rd. That where excavations in the snow are necessary for cellar doors, such excavation be covered with a door of plank with its surface on a level with the snow.

4th. That all water courses, which it may be necessary to cut in the snow be cut as near as possible to the cut side of the parapet and do not exceed one foot in width.

5th. That the Surveyor of Highways cause the above Regulations to be proclaimed by the Bellman, and cause the same to be fully executed: the whole under the penalty of the Law.

The Order of the 3d day December 1814, in the herein before published Order of the 12th day of November 1816, mentioned and thereby continued in force, is as follows, to wit:
