Police Discount Kidnapping

Ransom Asked For Que. Boy

QUEBEC — (P) — An 11-year-old boy, who disappeared from a Scout camp at nearby Chateau Richer a week ago, may have been kidnapped for ransom.

The kidnapping possibility came to light Wednesday when the boy's father, Quebec City real estate broker Paul Boutin, told police of meeting a woman who asked \$8,000 for the boy's safe return.

However, provincial police said they believe the woman knows nothing of the boy and was trying to take advantage of his disappearance to make money. They said there is no evidence of kidnapping and their investigation is not being conducted along those lines.



Maple Leaf Only Emblem Says Pouliot

MONTREAL (P) — Senator Jean-Francois Pouliot told the St. Lawrence Kiwanis Club Wednesday the maple leaf is the only emblem acceptable to all Canadians for a national flag.

The fiery senator from Riviere-du-Loup, Que., suggested the Canadian flag should bear neither the Union Jack nor fleur-de-lis, but only a maple leaf on a plain background.

He said it doesn't matter what the two colors are, "so long as they do not clash."

Behind him as he spoke was a large red flag with a green maple leaf in the centre.

Parliament Delayed For Queen

LONDON — (P) — Prime Minister Diefenbaker strongly indicated today that the opening of Canada's 23rd Parliament will be delayed until mid-October, enabling the Queen to be present.

During the election campaign, Diefenbaker promised the new Parliament would meet in September. Since then, he said, complications have arisen, and "I don't think there will be any great delay."

The invitation was made public in the Russian embassy's news bulletin.

Reds Invite Canadian Musicians

OTTAWA (P) — Russia has invited Canadian musicians to enter an "international Tchaikovsky piano and violin competition" in Moscow next year. But the cost of the trip may be a stumbling block for any would-be Canadian contestants.

The invitation was made public in the Russian embassy's news bulletin.

Foolproof Inspection On Weapons Needed Before Ban, US Says

LONDON — (P) — The United States has told Russia an absolutely foolproof inspection system must be agreed upon before it will agree to a suspension of nuclear weapon tests.

U.S. disarmament delegate Harold E. Stassen added, however, that the United States is confident an inspection system can be worked out that will prohibit any cheating of consequence, provided all nations co-operate.

Stassen elaborated at Wednesday's meeting of the UN disarmament subcommittee on the U.S. offer to halt bomb tests for 10 months as part of a limited arms reduction treaty. He promised to complete his proposals Friday.

Quake Toll May Be 1,000

TEHRAN, Iran — (P) — Rescue teams roving the still trembling earth of North Iran expressed fear Wednesday that Tuesday's quake killed more than 1,000 persons.

The known death toll soared to 750.

More than 3,000 persons were missing from ruined villages that marked the quake's horseshoe-shaped path around the south end of the Caspian Sea from Soviet Turkmen to Soviet Azerbaijan. However, many of these were presumed to have sought safety in the open fields and woods.

100 MPH Hurricane Hits South Ontario

TORONTO — (P) — Hurricane winds raged across the southern end of Lake Simcoe Wednesday night, wrecking buildings, uprooting trees and breaking telephone wires in that area about 35 miles north of Toronto.

It was the worst of some 30 thunderstorms in Southern Ontario. Rains fell from Lake Michigan to Montreal.

Near Grand Bend on Lake Huron 14-year-old Paul Bluet was killed when hit by a car as he cycled through rain on Highway 21.

Judge Mystified Too

LONDON — (P) — A blushing male jury was called on Wednesday to weigh one of the most perplexing questions of the year: Is a girl in a tiny bikini less nude than a girl in a G-string when posed in a cage of lions?

Jean Quinn, a striking, 23-year-old brunette showgirl, raised the issue in a lawsuit against the tabloid Daily Sketch.

Jean accused the paper of saying, or implying, that she was nude—i.e. in a G-string—when she was in fact wearing a bikini, and with sequins on it. She asked appropriate damages.

IRA Kill Constable

BELFAST (P) — Attackers from the Irish Republic ambushed a police patrol just inside Northern Ireland early today, killing one police constable and wounding another. The attack was blamed on the outlawed Irish Republican Army.

Flagpole Sitter Quits, 3 Still Up

MONTREAL — (P) — Andre Lamoureux, Ville Jacques Carrier's flagpole sitter, quit Wednesday after 24 days atop his 50-foot-high pole.

Three other sitters, including newly-crowned world champion Albert Tremblay, remained at their positions.

Poor Rich Man

LONDON (Reuters) — Irish-born news vendor John McNamara owned only one tattered suit. His toes stuck out of his shoes. He lived in a 70-cent-a-week room. When the 63-year-old bachelor died 17 months ago, local authorities shelled out for his funeral bill. It was announced Wednesday police found almost £5,000 in his room.

Building Collapses

TONGANOXIE, Kan. — (P) — A two-story building collapsed in a shattering avalanche that wrecked two adjoining structures and killed three men in this small eastern Kansas town Wednesday.

Eight other persons, two of whom had to be dug from the tangled debris, were injured.

Overseas Commitments May Be Extended By PCs

OTTAWA (P) — Little change in Canada's overseas commitments is foreseen under the new Progressive Conservative regime.

Observers say, indeed, that these commitments may be extended by offers of economic aid to new and emerging independent Commonwealth nations.

The general feeling here is that if there are major changes in this country's commitments abroad, such as a withdrawal of troops from Europe, they would not result from the change in government here so much as a shift in the international situation.

Today's Chuckle

Stalinist Diehards Ousted

MOSCOW — (P) — Nikita Khrushchev and his policies of peaceful coexistence abroad and government decentralization at home emerged victorious today from the biggest Kremlin upheaval since the Stalinist 1930s.

These policies and everything else the pudgy Communist party secretary stands for won the overwhelming approval of the Communist party central committee that ousted his bitterest, diehard Stalinist opponents for opposing the softer line Khrushchev laid down at the 20th party congress in February 1956.

Little Change In Policy

WASHINGTON — (P) — Nikita Khrushchev emerged today as a far more powerful figure than he has ever been — possibly with the opportunity of building himself into a dictator.

This was the assessment here of the situation in Moscow in the wake of the expulsion Wednesday of four Soviet officials from the Communist party leadership.

Vote Padder Found Guilty

MONTREAL — (P) — Edward Rowland, 21, Wednesday was found guilty of padding an electoral list in Montreal's St. Lawrence-St. George riding in the June 10 federal election.

Judge Lucien Gendron said he will impose sentence today.

William Burt, 56, earlier had pleaded guilty to a similar charge and drew three days in jail. The maximum is a year's imprisonment with or without a \$500 fine.

Americans By The Millions Celebrate Fourth

New York (P) — In a gala mood, Americans throughout the United States today marked the 181st anniversary of their independence with parades, picnics, sports events of all kinds, fireworks displays and just plain relaxing.

The long holiday weekend — the last four-day "Fourth" celebration was in 1950 — saw millions travelling by auto, bus, train and plane headed for sun and fun at mountain and beach resorts.

Boats Ruined

On the lakeshore a few miles southeast, Saul Goldstein of Toronto said his cottage was destroyed and eight-foot waves pounded at boat houses and crushed small boats.

Reeve Roy Pollocks said at least 15 barns were flattened in North Gwillimbury Township.

Lawyer Indignant

The newspaper's lawyer said indignantly:

"It is rather ridiculous, rather monstrous—in fact complete nonsense—that she should ask for damages for a statement that she appeared posed as a nude, when she appeared very largely naked, dressed in a bikini."

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World News In Brief

OTTAWA — (CP) — Canadian armored cars in Middle East are patrolling in a desert for the first time in Canada military history along the Egyptian-Israeli demarcation line.

WASHINGTON — (P) — Senator William Knowland (Rep.-Calif.) said today he doubts Congress would readily agree to furnish Russia with information on how to make a "clean" hydrogen bomb.

BUENOS AIRES — (P) — Argentine Wednesday night banned travel to Russia on grounds that the Soviet government is blocking return of persons lured from Argentina by Communist propaganda. About 4,000 persons are estimated to have left Argentina for the Soviet Union.

WASHINGTON — (P) — U.S. defence officials say France has used some American-supplied arms in Algeria despite an agreement that the weapons were to be used only in defence of the North Atlantic treaty area.

ALGIERS, Algeria — (P) — Four Arabs were executed in Constantine prison Wednesday for the slaying of three European boys last year.

In A Trance

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (P) — Mrs. Golia M. Odom, put into a "trance" by a fortune teller, awoke Tuesday night to find \$186 missing from her home. The fortune teller apparently made off with \$25 in cash, two rings, valued at \$125 and six new bed sheets.

Four Honored For Contribution To Quebec Agricultural Growth

The 20th annual convention of the Quebec Corporation of Agronomes entered its third and final day today, the highlight of the morning session being the award to four men of the Order of Agricultural Merit. The four who received the award for their contribution to the advancement of agriculture in the province were: William Houde, president of the Quebec Corporation of Agronomes; S. J. Chagnon, Deputy Minister of Agriculture; Rene Tremblay, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Quebec; and W. H. Perron, president of the Quebec Corporation of Agronomes. The award was also given posthumously to Senator Adelard Godbout.

Yesterday afternoon delegates attended a series of forums to study soil, animal husbandry, plant life, rural engineering and rural economy.

Treating general characteristics of the soil, one group studied five regions of the Province, Lake St. John, Appalachians, Charlevoix, Three Rivers, North of Montreal and the Montreal Plain.

In the second session the different problems of plant life were discussed, with three speakers.

First, on the choice and improvement of pasture feed, Jean Beaudry led discussion, while on the subject of pasture feed uses, L. C. Larose was chairman. Speaking on the production of pasture feed, Edgar Chevrete, said the production of feed was inferior both in quality and quantity.

"The causes of this inferiority," he stated, "may be traced to several reasons. First the lack of sufficient drainage in pastures, and the acidity of the soil, inadequate fertilizer, poor preparation of the soil, and seeding of inferior quality seed, all cause poor production," he declared.

Statistics on the use of lime and other chemical ingredients showed application of lime is only 1.80 tons per farm while chemical ingredients are used much less, he explained.

Mr. Chevrete offered several remedies which would improve the quality and quantity of feed and amongst them he suggested increased help in drainage, both underground and above the soil. Also he recommended subsidies toward the purchase of chemical ingredients and a stepped-up program toward methods of better cultivation.

Farm contests, said Mr. Chevrete, have shown that even for those distant from the markets, it has been possible to practice a certain amount of rational cultivation.

In conclusion Mr. Chevrete urged development of agricultural research which would help all branches of farming.

MILK PRODUCTION
Speaking before a group studying rural economy, Philippe Pariseault, general manager of a Granby Co-operative, told the group that the milk industry was being threatened by imports and substitutes.

Also speaking before this session were Judge G. H. Heon, president of the Quebec Farm Markets Board and Charles Gagne, dean of the faculty of Agriculture at Ste. Anne-de-la-Pocatiere. The former spoke on the manner in which the Farm Market Board can help the farmer and the latter analysed the Royal Commission Report on economic prospect.

Mr. Pariseault said the cost of producing milk had increased because of climatic conditions. He stated the industry, in order to become balanced, should be perfectly organized, well-directed, unified and powerful. He pointed out that the milk producer wants and needs higher prices for his product but can only obtain this through higher prices for finished products on the national market.

"This increase of price on the national market can only be considered while keeping in mind imports and substitutes," he declared.

According to Mr. Pariseault, there remains considerable work to be done to insure adequate protection for the milk industry such as higher tariffs and the banning or control of certain imports and substitutes.

"Later, or even in the near future it will be necessary to import some milk products," he

predicted, "but these imports must be in accordance with the needs of the nation taking into account price and volume on the national market."

In conclusion Mr. Pariseault, citing a report of the national president of the Milk Producers Association, said that those con-

cerned with the problem should stop and ask themselves whether or not the industry is on a solid basis. This can only be done by aggressive work on sales and distribution and greater efforts to convince legislators that the milk industry is worth keeping.

Really Warm

June Temperature Above 43-Year Monthly Average

You said it folks! June, 1957, was a warm month — in fact one of the warmest in the 43 years that records have been kept at the Lennoxville Experimental Farm.

The average temperature for the past month was 66.26 degrees, substantially above the average of 63.07 recorded for June, 1956, and away ahead of the 43-year June average of 61.92 degrees.

But no records were established for an individual day, the high of 91 registered on the 18th being four degrees below the record of 95 made June 28, 1948. On the other hand the low of 33 registered on the 9th was eight degrees above the mark of 25 established on June 6, 1934, and June 2, 1945.

Old Sol felt rather kindly to the human race during the month, hanging around for 268.8 hours, or almost nine hours daily.

His visitations exceeded by 47.9 hours the time he spent here in 1956 — 220.9 hours — and 51.8 hours above his average visits of 216 hours. The figure was just slightly below the record sunshine of 276.3

hours set in 1933 and nearly double the darkest June — in 1922 — when there was only 156 hours of sunshine.

Rainfall was only medium, totalling 3.63 inches for the past month, compared with 2.38 inches in June, 1956, and a 43-year average of 4.02 inches.

The highest June rainfall on record was 10.34 inches in 1922, when sunshine struck its all-time low, and the lowest month for rainfall was June, 1949, with 1.69 inches.

Twice during the past month on the 18th and 25th .67 inches of rain fell, compared with an all-time high of 4.08 inches on June 15, 1943.

Bail Granted Turgeon In Criminal Negligence Case

Bail of \$1,500 on property or \$800 cash was set by Judge Redmond Hayes in Sessions Court yesterday for Jean-Guy Turgeon, 21, Sherbrooke, who appeared on a charge of criminal negligence.

The complaint was laid by the Crown following a coroner's inquest held earlier in the morning at which Turgeon was found responsible for the death of Leon Dufresne in a highway accident between Deauville and Sherbrooke on the night of June 16.

The accident occurred near the Rock Forest turnoff a short distance from Deauville, at 2 a.m. June 16.

According to testimony given at the inquest yesterday, Turgeon, the driver of the vehicle, was returning to Sherbrooke with Leon Dufresne.

Witnesses at the scene said Turgeon was driving "fairly fast" as he approached the Rock Forest turnoff.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Carrier and Henri Sevigny, all standing in front of Carrier's store on the highway, said that as the car approached it sounded like a jet. They could not give any definite statement as to the probable speed of the car, but they said it swerved off the road, narrowly missed several mailboxes and then cut across the highway and rolled over a gravel embankment.

The three main witnesses, Paul Allard, Jules Bouchard and Turgeon himself, disagreed on the facts which apparently caused the accident.

Both Allard and Bouchard, who were coming in the opposite direction to Turgeon, said the headlights of the oncoming car caused Allard, the driver, to swerve to the right of the highway and consequently land in a ditch.

Turgeon told the coroner's jury that Allard's car was coming toward him in the middle of the road and he was thus forced to move to his right, losing control of the car and causing the accident. The jury apparently believed Allard's version.

Turgeon traced his movements prior to the accident and said that he had gone to a local hotel where he and Dufresne had consumed one bottle of beer each and had gone to Deauville for a swim together with a girl. They drove the girl home in Sherbrooke and returned to Deauville.

It was on their return journey to Sherbrooke that the accident occurred.

Provincial Police traffic officer Richard Blais told the jury he found two empty and two full bottles of beer near the scene of the accident and that there were several other broken bottles.

Turgeon testified that he had bought a case of beer several days prior to the accident which was to serve on a fishing trip which he planned to start the morning following the accident. He did not explain why there were so many bottles missing after the crash.

Robert Cote, 25, of 4 1st Ave., received cuts and bruises when the truck in which he was a passenger rammed into the Laverdure wood yard on Conseil St., after the brakes failed.

He was taken to the Hotel Dieu Hospital and released after treatment.

Postman Stole His Own Cheque

Solving The Parking Problem

The parking problem in Sherbrooke, which has been evident for some time, will become more acute during the next two months with the influx of American tourists. Because of the lack of parking facilities in the centre of the city, local merchants will suffer.

Although the proposal has been made a number of times in recent years to City Council, no action has been taken on the most obvious solution to the problem. The city-owned lot east of Wellington street north could be converted into a two-storey parking garage at relatively little cost. Because of the demand for parking facilities from local residents and business people as well as visitors, financing of the project should present no obstacle.

The city should proceed immediately with this project. No elaborate survey of the parking situation by engineering consultants is needed. A glance out of a city hall window during rush hours should suffice.

In addition to construction of the garage, the city would be advised to erect a number of signs in prominent places directing visitors to the parking lot. Sherbrooke is close to the American border and on the direct summer tourist routes to Montreal and Quebec. A concerted effort should be made to encourage the visitor to stop here, for a meal, for shopping or just to have a look around.

Adequate parking facilities are essential in this automobile era. The longer the delay, the more Sherbrooke taxpayers will suffer.

An Astonishing Forecast

There have been many astonishing predictions about the future growth of the world's population. But probably nothing has ever staggered the mind like the recent one from a Chinese authority with regard to China's growth alone.

Prof. Ma Ying-chu, viewed as one of China's greatest economists in the period before communism took over in 1949, forecasts that if China's population continues to rise at its present rate, by the year 2007—50 years hence—there will be almost as many people in that country as in the whole world today.

As of 1955 the Chinese population was calculated at more than 630 million, roughly one fourth of the world's total. Some think the actual figure at this moment is closer to 700 million.

The natural increase is said to be at least 15 million a year, perhaps considerably more. And, according to Professor Ma, if this keeps up for 50 years, China will be bulging at the seams with 2.6 billion.

The mammoth proportions of this prospect are hard for anyone to accept. To make them real one would have to imagine all the world's people today suddenly converging on China and trying thereafter to scratch a living from its none too hospitable soil.

If the Communists manage to stay in power, it looks like they will have plenty to occupy them.

Waging Peace

Norman Cousins, editor of the magazine Saturday Review, told a graduating class in Vermont the other day that Americans don't know how to "wage peace."

It's not simply a matter of outsmarting the Russians, he said. Americans must have a clear idea how peace is created, and this involves "an understanding of the way relations between nations can be regularized."

What Cousins says is true enough. But he might have added that this is no special shortcoming of Americans. No other people seems particularly

equipped at this juncture in history to save the world.

He implies that waging peace is something that could be readily taught, if only someone had the good sense and vision to do it.

In truth the quest for lasting peace is a painfully complex and difficult task in this nuclear age. What is remarkable, in the light of America's relative inexperience at world leadership, is not how little they know of waging peace but how earnestly they keep searching for it in spite of the most discouraging obstacles.

The Conservative Mind

(Ottawa Journal)

It has taken the sharp pen and mind of Miss Dorothy Thompson to produce the most interesting and penetrating comment on that decision of the United States Supreme Court (already dealt with in this column), hailed widely as "ringing down the curtain on the witchhunting epoch". Says she:

"I find an element of humor in the fact that Mr. Justice Harlan, who was strongly influential in forming the decisions, is thoroughly conservative."

"But the conservative mind has usually been the guardian of personal freedom against the extremes of 'democracy' that can be so awfully tyrannous. Edmund Burke was a conservative, and the extent to which he is being revived in American universities is also cheering."

Not only cheering, but extraordinary. Only a few years ago to be a "conservative" was to be in disrepute; a conservative was a "reactionary", an autocrat, an enemy of freedom, a "Fascist". Liberal on the other hand was a sanctified word, the accepted label of the noble and the generous, of the friends of the oppressed and downtrodden of those who held the title deeds to progress.

The past two years have seen a change; scholarly philosophic volumes like those of Rossiter and Kirk have turned millions of people, and especially young people, to a more objective study of the "conservative mind", bringing better understanding of conservatism not only as a political doctrine but as an outlook on life—and more awareness, too, that over the past two centuries at any rate conservatives (as Miss Thompson remarks) have usually been the guardians of freedom.

Over the past two decades almost every university campus on this continent was the fortress of "liberals". But in the past few years this has changed, and notably in Canada; we have had repeated instances of university "parliaments" electing conservative "governments". Nor was any feature of our recent election more remarkable than the evidence of young people, many of them former Liberals, working openly with Conservatives to punish a Liberal Government which had grown careless of liberty.

Then, too, there was the distortion and misrepresentation of the liberal creed by so many on this continent who professed it. In England a liberal is mainly a person who has inherited the traditions of Fox and Gladstone or Mill or Bentham; people dedicated to individual freedom, suspicious of the power of the State. In the United States, and some

London's Famous Parks

One Hundred Oases In A City

LONDON — (Special) — London is the largest city in the world, but scattered through it are over 100 oases of country-parks and gardens, squares and playing fields, which are typical of London as St. Paul's Cathedral or the Houses of Parliament.

Every Londoner has a passionate love of green things which is reflected in tiny back-yard gardens, window boxes, square gardens and riverside terraces, but the parks are quite different from all these: not carefully laid-out ornamental gardens, but stretches of natural grass, trees and flowers which have belonged to the Londoner from time immemorial. Wander through them and you will see family parties playing that most English of all games - cricket, old people doing in the sunshine, lovers walking hand-in-hand, children playing, dogs romping, as they have done for hundreds of years.

The most famous of them all are the royal parks - Hyde Park, Green Park and St. James' Park, which all lie round Buckingham Palace. Originally they were royal hunting grounds and each has special memories of past kings and queens; but since the restoration of the monarchy in 1660 they have been free for the people of London.

Hyde Park belonged to the monks of Westminster from Norman times until Henry VIII turned it into a royal hunting park. Charles I first threw it open to the public, but during the Commonwealth under Cromwell it was sold to raise money. Charles II and his parliament, however re-

stored it to the people and in those gay, racy days of the Merry Monarch it became a centre of fashion. Queen Caroline, wife of George II, loved it and created the artificial lake known as the Serpentine, and all through the reigns of Victoria and Edward VII fashionable London went riding in the park along Rotten Row.

Today Hyde Park is more democratic. At the north-east corner by Marble Arch you will hear the soap-box orators whom London tolerates with Cockney good humor. You can boat or bathe in the Serpentine, listen to the bands, or simply laze among old trees, young grass and brilliant flowers; the golden fringe of daffodils which grow among the grass are London's first flowers of spring.

Green Park, which lies between Piccadilly and the gates of Buckingham Palace, is the smallest of the royal parks and probably the most charming. It, too, was a deer park in Stuart and Georgian days, and for a time in the 18th century it became the centre where all the world of rank and fashion promenaded in the afternoon to flirt and gossip and display their finery. Now it is a peaceful plot of grass and trees in the very heart of the West End, where the weary shopper in Piccadilly can sink gratefully into a deck chair.

To the south of Green Park is St. James' Park. This is a great natural garden with a lake famous for its ornamental waterlilies, flowers and flowering shrubs, trees, path and bridges. It is said that Charles II brought over Le Notre, the great French garden designer who laid out the grounds of the Tuilleries, to develop St. James' Park, and that Le Notre said he would not alter such natural beauty.

One of the most famous of

all London's parks is Hampstead Heath on the heights to the north-west of the city. Here among the grassy hills and clumps of trees children sail toy boats on the ponds, elderly gentlemen fly kites with their grandchildren and memories of London's past remain in names like the Vale of Heath and the old inns, "Jack Straw's Castle" and the "Bull and Bush."

POISON IN A TROUT STREAM

(Toronto Telegram)
About a year ago, Burford Rod and Gun Club won a prize of \$1,000 for its work in improving London Creek and conserving its fish. A few days ago, on another conservation job, a tree-spraying crew destroyed the work of years by poisoning the stream.

Dusting pine trees to rid them of worms, the men had about 50 gallons of insecticide left over. This poison, a powerful commercial preparation, was dumped in a pond; then, worried about such concentration, the men dug a ditch drained the stuff into the creek, seven miles west of Brantford.

One result was to kill a couple of hundred trout. It is said that many persons ordinarily drink the creek water, so that loss of human life could have been caused.

Proper methods of disposal surely are familiar to companies engaged in tree-spraying. In any case, the authorities should by emphatic and widespread warning ensure that no such stupid means are employed hereafter.

GRAND SLAMS EVERYWHERE

Today's hand has enough fireworks for any Fourth of July. It decided an important team match some years ago and decided it thoroughly.

The bidding shown here took place at table one. West decided to play possum with his freak hand and did not overcall. Naturally he was surprised to hear his partner bid five clubs and eventually raised him to seven clubs after North pushed him.

When North went on to seven spades West doubled happily and laid down his ace of diamonds. Declarer ruffed in dummy and raked up 2,470 points for the doubled grand slam. Of course a club lead would have beaten him but West was looking at 13 cards only.

At the other table West adopted opposite tactics and leaped right to five diamonds over the opening spade bid. North bid five spades. He only held two jacks but 6-6-1 distributions don't grow on trees.

East raised to six diamonds and South bid six hearts. West went on to seven diamonds and, when it got back to South, he doubled.

KEEP YORK FACTORY

(Windsor Star)

The Hudson's Bay Company is abandoning historic York Factory, on the Hudson Bay 555 miles northeast of Winnipeg. It dates back 275 years and for many of them was a principal point in the fur trading and exploration of Canada. It now no longer has enough trade to justify its operation.

It should be retained, however, as one of Canada's most important historic sites. It is a heritage from a romantic and intrepid past. It should not be allowed to rot away in the wilderness.

Admittedly it is not on a regular route for tourists, and few would see it. But, with the time developing as it is, the time may come when it would be much more accessible. Even if few ever see it, however, it should be preserved. A nation which is not proud of its past, and neglects its historic places, is lacking in one of the important ingredients of nationhood.

JAPAN'S SHIPS ARE 'MARU'

(Japanese News Service.)
The Japanese merchant marine is again plying the Seven Seas. From the ports of Yokohama and Kobe to London, New York, Rio de Janeiro, Vancouver, Sydney, Bombay and Cape Town, Japanese vessels are flying the ensign of the "Rising Sun", all of them using the suffix "Maru" in their names.

The Japanese written character, or ideograph, for "Maru" means round. The dictionary defines the word as meaning a circle or ring when used as a noun, and round, complete or perfect when used as an adjective.

It is accepted that the use of the word "Maru" originated as a term for valuable property. And in the case of Japanese ships it is held that because a circle (maru) is complete, so is a ship complete in its equipment, its independence and its self-maintenance.

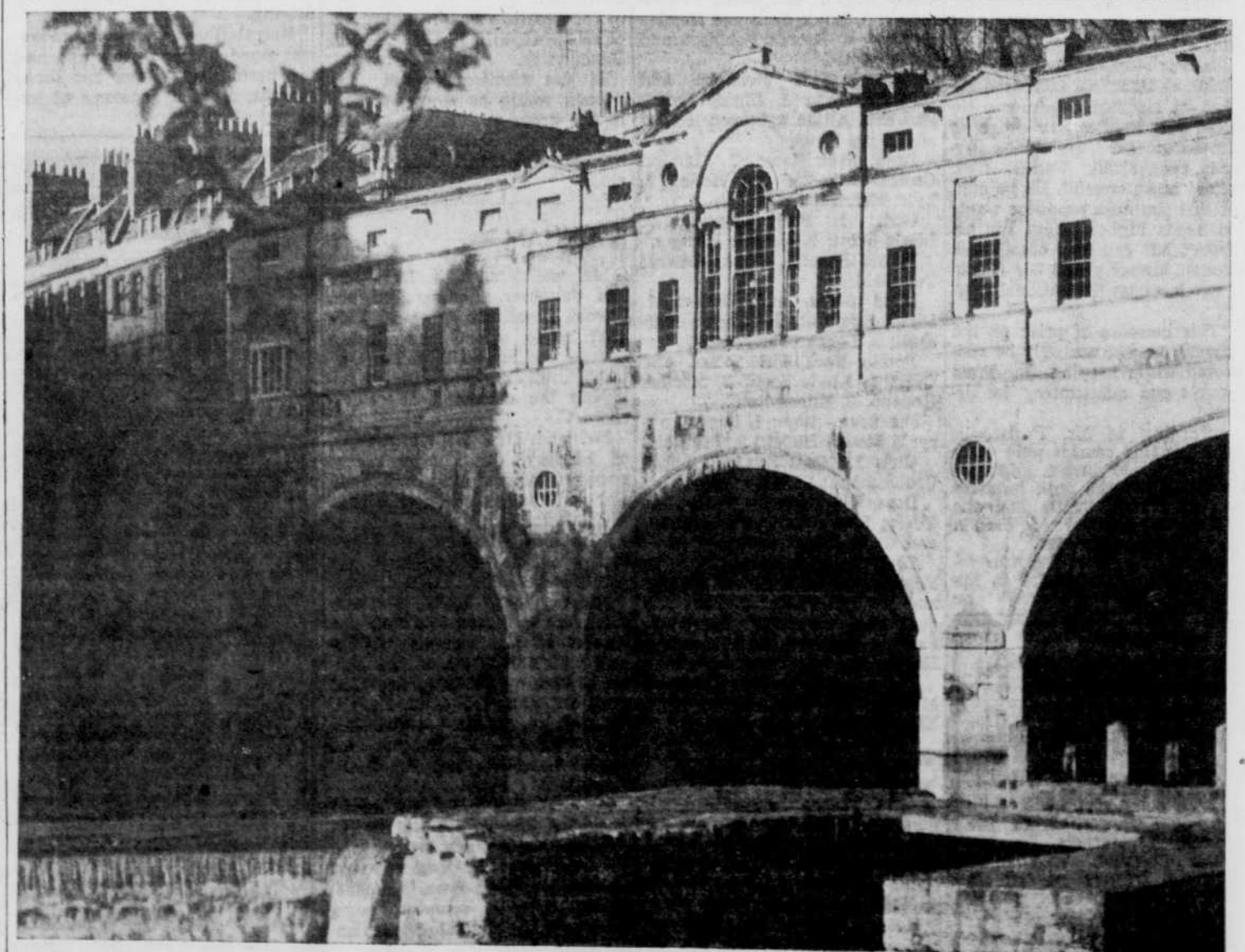

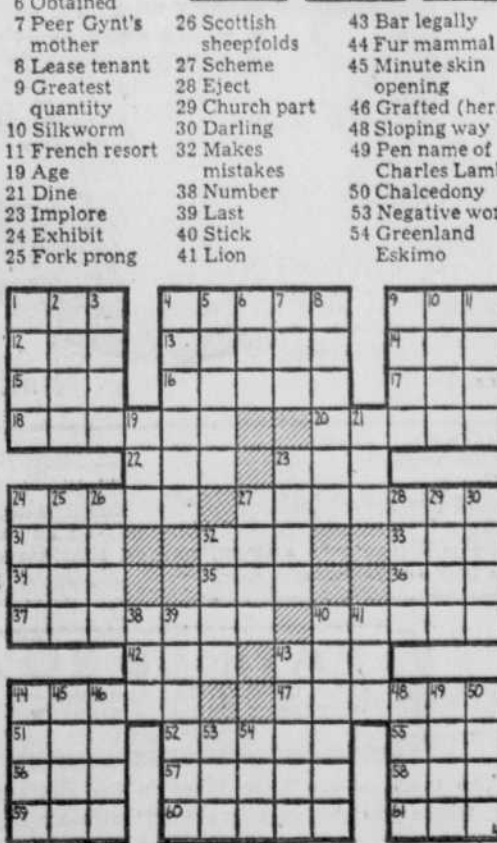
PULTENEY BRIDGE, BATH, ENGLAND, DESIGNED IN 1770 AND LINED WITH SHOPS.

Many gray-haired women find that they have a problem of dryness when they use a temporary hair coloring. Their hair tends to become coarse, brittle and dull.

An answer to this may lie in a new color cream rinse that combines both cream rinse conditioner and temporary color rinse, according to the makers. The color lasts from shampoo to shampoo. The rinse is said to restore the normal moisture content to the hair while giving it color highlights.

The rinse is applied with a brush or cotton wad at the roots of the hair, then along the entire strand. After five minutes, the solution is simply rinsed off with warm water.

They come with dressy "demiseps" around the top, tiny laced weskits on the toe, and toe caps. Often this trim is in a contrasting leather color.

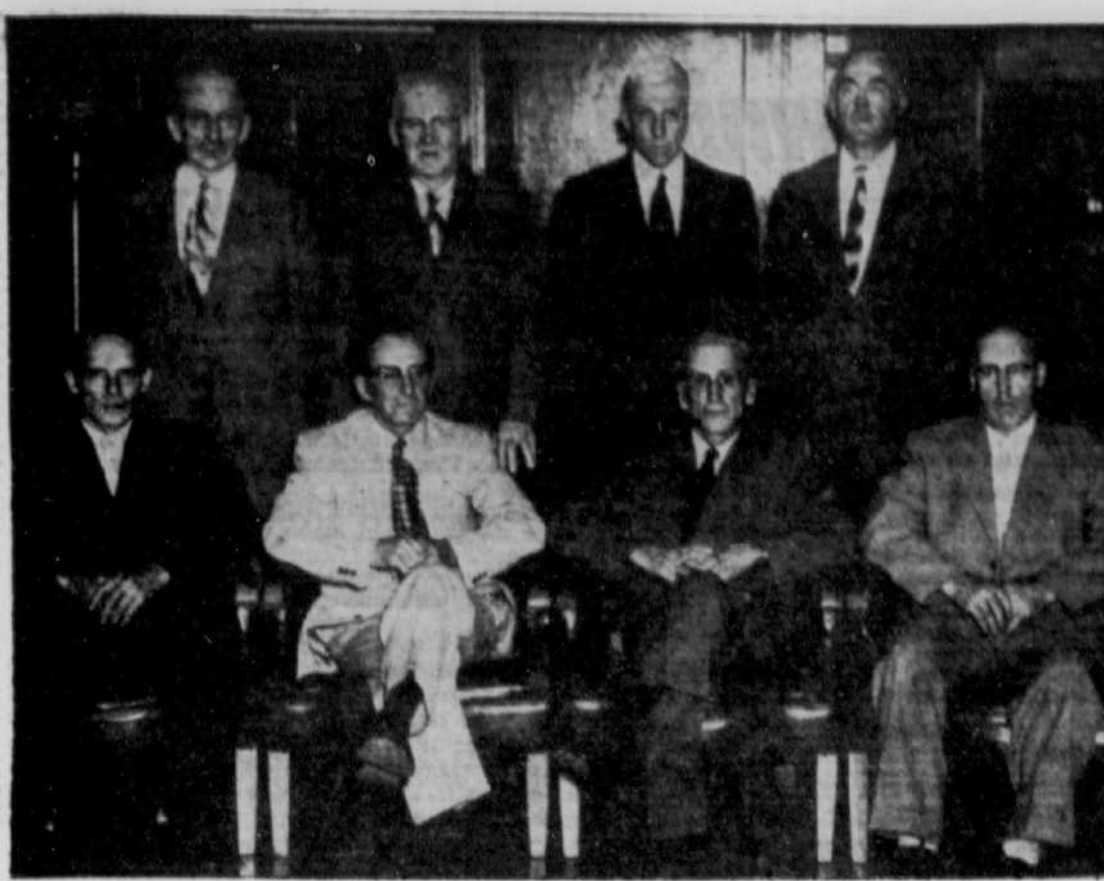

Cooper — tall, dark and handsome heart throb of the schoolgirl spectators — knocked off fellow Aussie Fraser, 1-6, 14-12, 6-3, 8-6, in a match that seemed as long as a day in the dentist's chair.

Hoad and Cooper will meet Friday for the title.

Don Budge of the U.S. was the last player to put Wimbledon men's titles back-to-back. He did it 19 years ago—1937-38.

While the American men were sitting out a Wimbledon semi-final for the first time in 30 years, the U.S. ladies were preparing for an almost all-American show in the women's singles today. Three of the four women's semi-finalists are Americans.

Top-seeded Althea Gibson of New York plays the six-foot, 16-year-old British amazon, Christine Truman, sensation of the tournament so far. Mrs. Dorothy Head Knode of Forest Hills, N.Y., seeded fourth, meets Darlene Hard, the Montebello, Calif., waitress, seeded fifth.

Both Davidson and Fraser made a great fight of it Wednesday in losing before 17,000 spectators. Davidson came up with good cut and drop shots and scored repeatedly with placements. He put all the steam he could

Heavy Downpour Drenches Islesmere But Fails To Dampen Predictions Of Record-Breaking; \$3,500 Top Money

NEW YORK — (AP) — Hank Bauer Wednesday sued Edwin Jones for \$150,000 for false arrest and malicious prosecution in the New York Yankee night club mixup.

The suit, filed in New York Supreme Court, asked \$100,000 damages for false arrest and \$50,000 for malicious prosecution.

The Yankee outfielder based his suit on the fact the New York grand jury refused to indict him after a civil arrest brought by Jones, a delicatessen owner, June 24.

Bauer and a group of Yankee players were celebrating Billy Martin's birthday at the club May 16, when a disturbance erupted and Jones claimed Bauer hit him.

"After the grand jury threw out the case I waited for a telephone call or a letter of apology from Jones but I never heard from him," Bauer told newsmen after the suit was filed.

Jones still has a civil assault suit pending.

Bauer reiterated that he never hit anyone, and said the Jones suit caused him a lot of damage.

Larry Baker Earns Win Over Gaspar Ortega

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Larry Baker, a hungry fighter from Indianapolis, punched his way into boxing's big money ranks Wednesday night by outpointing Mexico's Gaspar Ortega in a televised 10-rounder.

The defeat for Ortega, No. 2 challenger for the welterweight title, probably cost the Mexican a winter fight with the champion, Carmen Basilio.

Baker, a 3-1 underdog, owed his victory to a two-point penalty inflicted on Ortega for foul punches but the crowd thought the Indiana boy was a winner in any case and roared its disapproval when it was announced that one judge had voted for Ortega.

Bill Zock Named Coach Of Balm Beaches In ORFU

LONDON, Ont. — Bill Zock, veteran lineman who served as assistant coach of Toronto Balm Beaches football club last season, was announced as head coach of the team Wednesday night at a meeting of the Ontario Rugby Football Union senior clubs.

In a harmonious meeting a 1957 schedule was confirmed.

The coaches of the four entries, Joe Zaleski of Sarnia Golden Bears, Jack Jacobs of London Lords, Harvey Johnson of Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen and Zock recommended to the league that each team be allowed to dress 30 players, for both home and away games. Last year the limit was 28 players.

NEW YORK — (AP) — The result of the balloting made the National League all-star team look as if it was daubed with red paint. But instead of putting the blast on Cincinnati Redlegs fans for their favoritism in electing their players to the starting lineup, maybe they rate a pat on the back.

If other clubs commanded such loyalty they might have at least given their players an equal chance to be selected. Other clubs had the same chance, but their fans were too apathetic to take the trouble to send in their choices.

Cincinnati supporters were simply taking advantage of a weakness in the system of selecting the team.

As it is, the poll smacks of a popularity contest to name Miss Dil Pickle of 1957, with all the friends and relatives of the candidate padding the ballot box and soap-boxing around to get all their friends to do likewise, even though the candidate bears a strong resemblance to a dill pickle.

Naturally an all-star team is supposed to be chosen on merit. Stan Musial was the only outsider to break through the barrage of Redleg votes and win a starting position, although the Cincinnati fans made a valiant effort to land their George Crowe on first base.

Commissioner Ford Frick had no right to remove Cincinnati's Gus Bell and Wally Post from the starting lineup and replace them with the Braves' Hank Aaron and the Giants' Willie Mays.

If the teams are to be elected by popular vote, votes of the fans should be recognized. Frick's refusal to recognize it is an admission that the system is cockeyed. What good is the vote if someone in authority can change it?

Under the present system of fan voting there never will be an absolutely fair vote. Partiality, instead of hitting, throwing and fielding ability, govern the selections in too many cases.

Something will have to be done to make the all star teams really all-star teams, instead of one-club teams.

We believe the best bet would be to have the managers pick the squads. If they were tempted to be partial they would be fearful of the reaction of the fans and other managers. They would lean over backward to be fair.

Gordie Howe Cops Kiwanis Cup In Labatt Preview

MONTREAL — (AP) — Detroit Red Wing's pair of Gordie Howe, who shot a steady three-over-par 75, and Marcel Pronovost Wednesday won the National Hockey League golf tournament — the prelude to the \$29,000 open over the Islesmere Course.

Pung Incident Stresses Goller Must Intensify On Score As Well As Game, Disqualification In Book For Years

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Judging by the criticism leveled at the United States Golf Association as the result of the Mrs. Jackie Pung incident, you would suspect that its officials were running around looking to disqualify apparent winners of important tournaments.

In the cold, sober afterglow of the U.S. Women's Open at Winged Foot, you realize that the officials had no other choice under a mandate handed down by the executive committee last winter. That made the competitor solely responsible for the correctness of the score recorded for each hole.

There really is nothing new about the Pung case. Disqualification was the penalty for years. Paul Runyon was similarly disqualified in the U.S. Open of 1933, when his marker and playing partner was none other than the great Chick Evans. A professional named Wally Ulrich was the victim of poor mathematics in the Open of 1950.

When the USGA sought to modify the penalty last year, it was blasted for being too lenient because the offenders were not contenders. There were three incidents in the two Opens of 1956, and Jackie Burke, Gil Cavanaugh and Betsy Rawls each was penalized two strokes.

It was after this that the executive committee definitely decided that the book could not be rewritten on the spot every time a difficult situation bobbed up.

"While many consider the penalty too severe, there are very good reasons for it," explains Joseph C. Dey, Jr., executive director of the USGA. "It's a rule for orderliness and procedure. If
