Minutes of proceeding of the Municipal Council of the County of Pontiac at a regular quarterly session held at the Court House, Campbell's Bay, on Wednesday March 9th, 1950, at the hour of Ten o'clock in the forenoon, at which session were present: His Worship the Warden, Mayor Michael Kennedy of the Township of Allumette Island, and the following County Councillors: Thomas J. McGuire Esq. Mayor of the Township of Allumette Island; J. Hilliard Beattie Esq. Mayor of the Township of Bristol; Irvine P. Cahill Esq. Mayor of the Village of Châteaufort; Lawrence Brennan Esq. Mayor of the Township of Chichester; Ira Hanna Esq. Mayor of the Township of Clarendon; H. R. Lunam Esq. Mayor of the Village of Campbell's Bay; Thomas Jewell Esq. Mayor of the Village of Fort Coulonge; George Dufault Esq. Mayor of the Township of Grand Calumet; Alphonse Vadneau Esq. Mayor of the United Townships of Leslie etc.; Thomas O'Brien Esq. Mayor of the Township of Litchfield; Alfred Belec Esq. Mayor of the United Townships of Mansfield and Pontefract; S. Wyman MacKechie Esq. Mayor of the Township of Onslow South; Roy Elliott Esq. Shown above is the wreckage of a British four-engined Avro Tudor V charter plane, which crashed recently, near Cardiff, Wales while carrying 83 persons, who were returning from a football game in Dublin. All but three of the passengers were killed instantly. One survivor is still in serious condition while the other two walked unaided out of the tail section of the plane. The accident is recorded as the worst disaster in aviation history.

Roads Are Terrible

Some time ago we wrote of the possibility that this side of the Ottawa river might well have been chosen for the route of the proposed Trans Canada Highway. Factors outstandingly in our favour were the much more varied and lovely scenic attractions. We have however been forced to concede the point that Ontario has already a fairly good highway in use from Ottawa to Pembroke. The Quebec counter part need hardly attempt to call itself by the title "Highway".

It has been rumoured that a number of the Morgans of Detroit have been considering the possibility to using Highway 8 as a testing ground for their products but in every case have decided that as an course it is just a shade difficult.

Spring is an unfair time to judge the state of

a road. It is then that the worst feature are magnified to the total obstruction of the few attractive points.

For they to whom the scenery of this country side would be a strong attraction there is no pleasure in driving the Pontiac roads.

The loss of that passing trade is something that we can ill afford to do without at the present time and will miss much more greatly when times harden.

Pontiac residents have often talked about their roads. This year a united kick from all parts and sections of the district might have an effect. Even the garagemen whose revenue from these makeshift roads must be considerable, would doubt less join in such a matter of civic pride along this route.

Value Of Hobbies

Winston Churchill, it is reported, divides his spare time between laying bricks and painting. Writing memoirs and his political activities lie for him in the vocational rather than the avocational department.

Psychologists and psychiatrists stress the value of hobbies as a means of relaxation and lessening the tensions caused either by the pressures or the monotony of modern life.

By a hobby is meant nearly any activity which you follow for fun and not for profit. It is interesting to look around us and see what hobbies are the favorites of our fellow citizens.

Music and singing is one of the oldest and most

wide-spread, but close to it in numbers we have painting and drawing, which long before the current vogue for more variety in hobbies has been the next most popular.

Women, more than men seem to go in most widely for hobbies as a change of activity. We find that the new vogue for leathercraft has attracted a great many of both sexes.

Hobbies are so varied that it is hopeless even to refer to more than a very few, but every day someone is always coming up with a new one something which suits his particular temperament but which startles others.

There is for example the head hunter who is just a somewhat too primitive hobbyist.

Tax Payers Pay It All

All across Canada municipal taxpayers are receiving bad news. Expenditures are going up and so are tax rates. In the last 10 years as a recent survey in the Financial Post revealed, municipal expenditure has increased almost 60 per cent with a 40 per cent gain since 1945 alone. And after a substantial period of steady decline, municipal dept is on the way up, too thus also adding to the burden on the taxpayer.

Members of municipal councils who are supposed to protect and watch the interests of the municipal taxpayers should watch these trends closely. This is not the time to see how much money they can spend or what new projects they can start. There are few bargains indeed offered the municipal shopper in the present market.

Rhys M. Sale, the new Ford of Canada President refuses to be a pessimist regarding business conditions in this country. He says: "There is no excuse for any major depression in this country and we won't have one unless the gloomsters talk us into one. There may be some mild recession from recent record levels with three, four or even five per cent less prosperity all round. But we would still be miles ahead of any previous period."

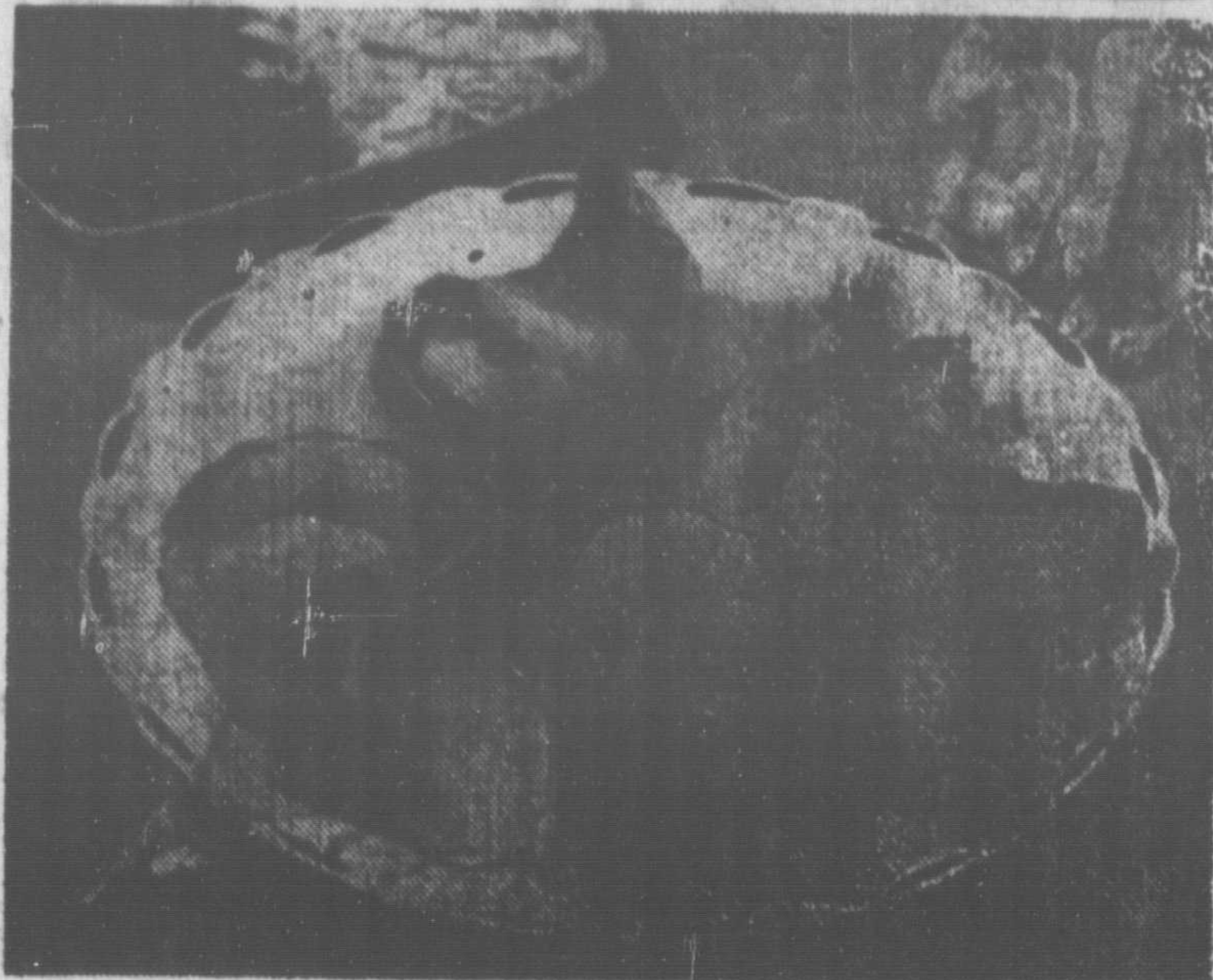
Nothing Is Free

British Columbia has what is called by unthinking people a "free" hospital scheme. Instituted 18 months ago, this plan charges everybody a modest fee (which is in effect a compulsory tax) and in return Mr. British Columbia and all his family are entitled to full hospital service without any additional assessment.

The plan was set up on something of an experimental basis, because of uncertainty over the rates that it would be necessary to make it self supporting and a \$2,000,000, stabilization fund was provided by the government to meet any deficit. In the course of 18 months that fund was exhausted, and \$2,587,000 more had to be provided from the general revenues of the province, this despite some adjustment of rates. But the scheme still is far from self supporting, and the Vancouver Sun says it is expected that in the next 12 months another deficit of \$2,500,000 must be met by the taxpayers.

There is, of course, nothing free about any service provided by a government, because it has no source of revenue save the taxpayers.

Orange And Raisin Pork Chops

Your family will enjoy pork chops with orange and raisin sauce. To prepare this "pork beauty," select and brown 4 pork chops in a skillet. Lay 2 orange sections on each chop. Make a sauce by mix-

ing together 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, and 1/4 teaspoon allspice. Gradually stir into this mixture 1 1/2 cups hot water and cook until thick. Add 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/4 cup orange juice and 1/4 cup raisins. Pour sauce over chops and cook, covered, over low heat for an hour.

Urge Caution
In Recommending

Plant breeders who are responsible for the development and introduction of new varieties are usually cautious in making recommendations on adaptability, disease resistance, maturity and the like. Such recommendations are naturally based on extensive tests covering different soils and climate, and they do not apply to individual farms or even local conditions. Small soil differences, lack of good drainage, low fertility, weeds and other factors may offer sufficient handicaps to the performance of a new variety to condemn it in the opinion of the grower.

When new varieties are being tried for the first time the grower must bear this in mind, for unless normal growing conditions are provided, it is not a fair test. If an unfamiliar variety is offered for sale outside the area for which it is normally recommended, it is best to make inquiries from reliable sources as to its origin and possible adaptability for other areas. Failing this, the seed should only be used at first for small scale trials.

No Change In
Butter Prices

The Right Honourable James G. Gardiner announced on March 8th, that it was not anticipated that there would be any change in the selling price of Government held butter before the end of March. Mr. Gardiner also announced that if the Government did decide to change its selling price downward on butter, those who had purchased butter from the Government would be protected against loss resulting from the change to the extent of the stocks on hand.

1. I. Smith Auditing Services \$35.00

A total of \$1794.34. Carried.

It is moved by Councillor R. Lunam, and seconded by Councillor I. P. Cahill that this meeting do adjourn to 1.30 this afternoon. Carried.

Meeting is resumed at 1.30 p.m. with the same members present.

It is moved by Councillors S. Wyman MacKechnie, and seconded by Councillor Ernest Schwartz that the Sessional Expenses of the members of this Council be henceforth placed on the more equitable basis of a flat allowance of six dollars for each session attended, plus ten cents per mile each way from the member's home to the County Seat. A vote is taken showing fourteen in favour and four against. The motion is declared carried.

It is moved by Councillor McGuire that the annual School Fair Grants remain the same at Fifty Dollars each, and that other municipalities wishing to take advantage, be recognized when satisfactory proof has been produced that a School Fair has been held. Seconded by Councillor J. H. Beattie. Carried.

A study of the Budget for 1950 is made by Council and Councillors S. Wyman MacKechnie moves, Councillor Lawrence Brennan seconds, that this Council adopt a rate of one half of one mill in levying the rate of taxation for 1950. A vote is taken showing eleven in favor, five against. Carried.

Following notice of motion given at the regular quarterly session of December 14th, 1949, to introduce a By Law levying a rate of taxation for 1950, Councillor Cahill, moves Councillor Brennan seconds, that the By Law be now introduced and read a first time. Carried.

The said By Law shall become known officially as the By Law number Ninety Two (92) of the Municipal Corporation of the County of Pontiac.

By Law Number 92. It is resolved enacted and ordained by By Law of this Council as follows: A By Law to levy

assessment the sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred and Six Dollars and Twenty Nine Cents, to defray the necessary expenses and outlay of the Municipal Council of the County of Pontiac for the current year 1950, to wit:

1. For Sessional Expenses, The Warden and County Councillors \$700.00
2. For Grants to Agricultural Societies - Quyon, Shawville, Chapeau, \$200.00 each. \$600.00
3. For Grant Short Courses - Quyon \$50.00 Shawville \$125.00 \$175.00
4. For School Fairs Quyon, Bristol, Sheen, Otter Lake, Danford Lake, Ladysmith. \$50.00 each \$300.00
5. For Plowing Matches Chapeau \$125.00, Campbell's Bay \$100 \$225
6. For Sundry Grants Women's Institutes \$25.00, Coyament Fair \$75, Cercle des Dames \$25, Agronomist's Secretary \$100, Farm Forum \$150. \$375.
7. For Grant to Pontiac Community Hospital. \$1500.00
8. For Red Cross Grant \$550.00
9. For Bear and Wolf Bounty \$200.00
10. For Administration \$780
11. For Valuation Rolls \$200.
12. For Delegates \$150
13. For Centenary Expenses \$100 \$5805.00

Making a total of Five Thousand Eight Hundred and Five Dollars of which Five Hundred and Ninety Eight Dollars and Seventy One Cents will be provided from accumulated surplus.

Whereas it is expedient and necessary to levy the said sum of Five Thousand Two Hundred and Six Dollars and Twenty Nine Cents to defray the necessary general expenses and outlay of this Municipal Council of the County of Pontiac for the current year 1950, the said sum of Five Thousand Two hundred and six dollars and twenty nine cents is hereby levied by a rate of one half of one mill on the dollar, of each and every dollar of taxable property mentioned and assessed in the valuation rolls of the several rural and village municipalities comprising the County of Pontiac, as homologated and now in force for County purposes, the purposes above set forth and mentioned.

And whereas the further sum of One Thousand Five Hundred and Sixty One Dollars and Eighty Eight Cents will be required to provide the funds necessary to pay the Health Unit Levy of One and One half cents per hundred dollars of valuation upon all the local municipalities as provided by the Act 23, Geo. VI, Chapter 74, Paragraph 4, be it therefore also enacted herewith that the said levy of One and One half cents per each hundred dollars of valuation, be collected from each and every municipality comprising the County of Pontiac, after due authority therefore will be secured in a resolution of this Council, to be adopted after a demand for payment of the said account for the year ending March 31st, 1951 is submitted by the Ministry of Health for the Province of Quebec.

This By Law shall be promulgated in the manner provided by the Municipal Code of the Province of Quebec, and shall come into force and effect fifteen days after such promulgation.

Done and passed at Campbell's Bay, Quebec, this eighth day of March, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty.

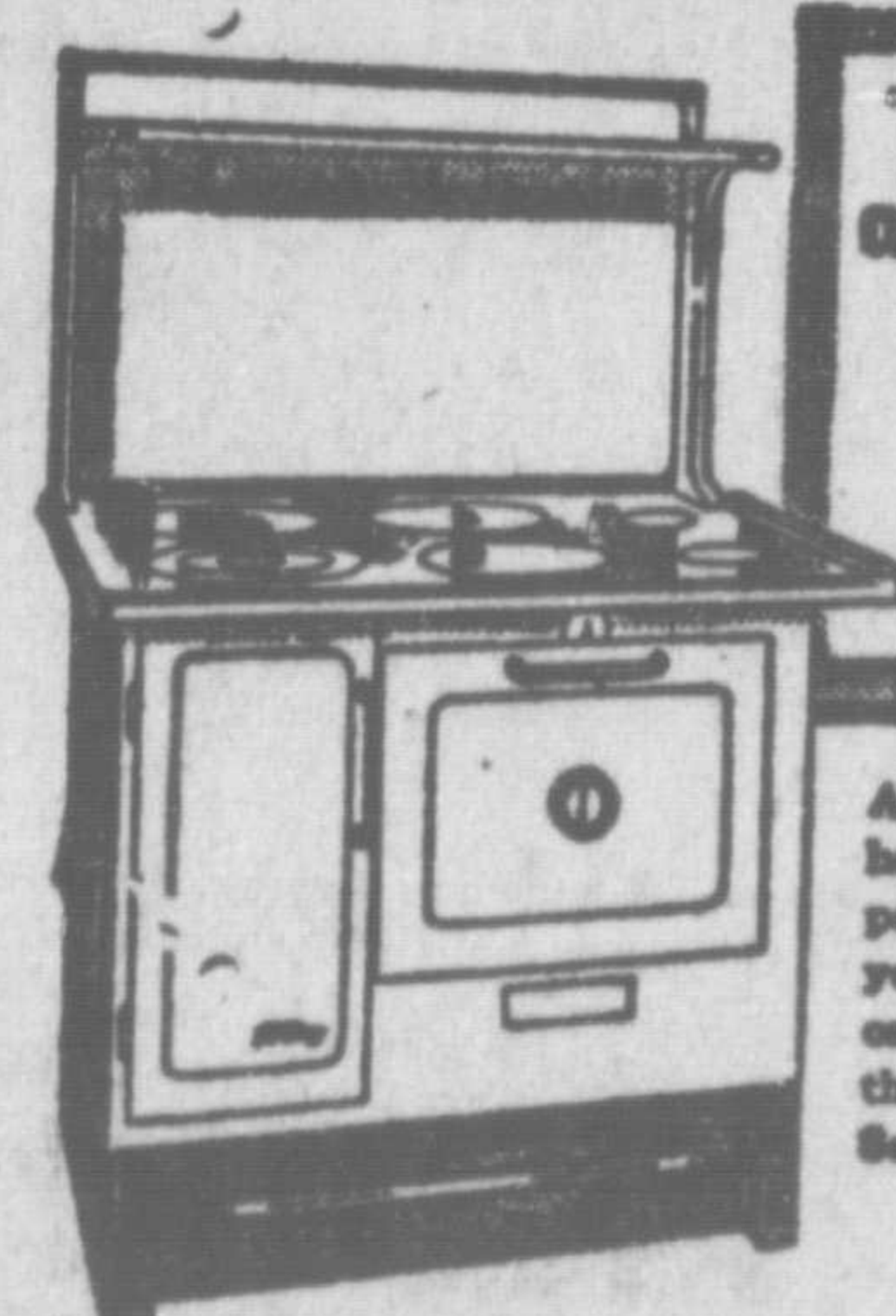

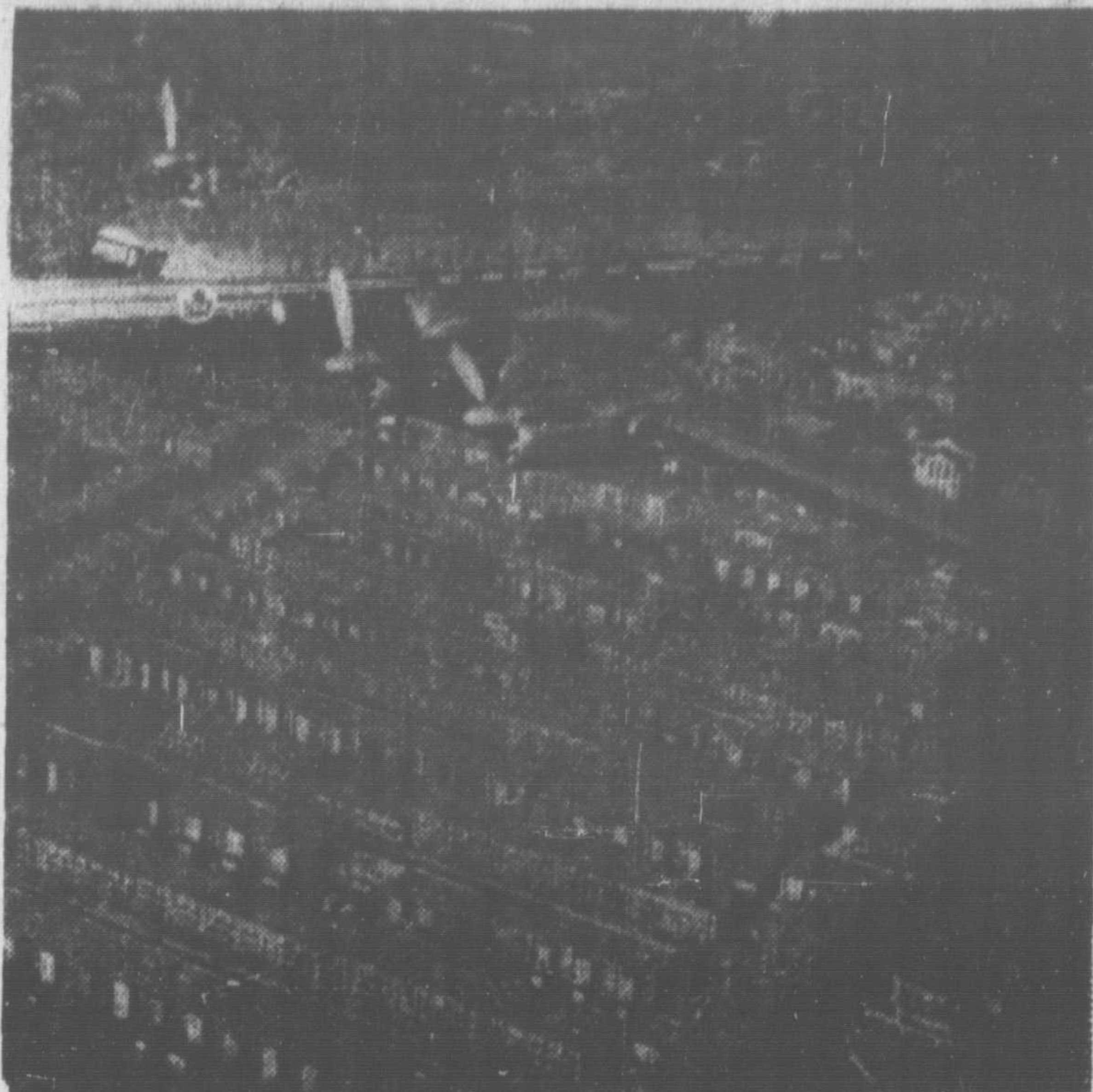

Ready for New York

Trans-Canada Air Lines will be ready to operate on the Montreal-New York run two weeks after U.S. Civil Aeronautics Board grants the necessary operating license. All arguments on presentation of the application to the board have now been waived, and it has been stated officially at Washington that the line is ready for action.

Romantic History Of The Hudson's Bay Company

The 280-year old Hudson's Bay Company is the oldest trading firm in the world, the second largest fur dealer (only the Russian state monopoly is larger) and still has 203 trading posts. Some of its early forts are now

great cities — Winnipeg, Edmonton, Victoria. Here the Company's original log houses have evolved into department stores still selling the famous Hudson's Bay blankets but also everything you can think of and some things you probably can't. Panties, for instance, in sets of seven with the day of the week embroidered on each.

The Company runs a Persian-lamb ranch in South Africa, a fur-breeding farm, vast beaver preserves, a shipping fleet, a cargo airline, and a radio network. It sells prairie farmland, owns oil and mineral rights on four and one-half acres, sells hay and timber rights on thirty islands it owns in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Once the Company owned two-fifths of Canada. It made the laws and enforced them. It could hang a man or marry him. It issued its own currency and levied its own taxes. It had the power to raise an army and to declare war. Once it did just that against the French complete with naval battles in Hudson's Bay.

Two French free-booting fur traders, Pierre Esprit Radisson and Medart Chouart, "the most daring pair of international promoters in the history of commerce" founded the Company. Trouble with the French Governor of Quebec drove them into the arms of the English. Impressed by the prospects for profit, King Charles II issued in 1670 a charter to "The Governor and Company of Adventurers of England trading into Hudson's Bay." This gave to the Company "the whole trade of those seas, straits, bays and creeks" — all the territory drained by Hudson's Bay. King Charles gave away to the original eighteen proprietors more of North America than he or anyone else knew existed — about a million and a half square miles.

An example of the difficulties facing the opposition after an opening Three Heart South bid Three Clubs West and North passed, and East was on the spot. It will be seen that if the North and West hands are interchanged, Five Hearts is a lay-down. East therefore bid Three Hearts which was doubled by North. South led ♠A, East won in his own hand with ♠K and returned ♠Q to dummy's ♠A; he then finessed ♠Q and noted the fall of South's ♠10. To the next trick ♠7 was led, South winning and returning ♠A. North and East now fought out the end-play. East eventually making two tricks, one Diamond and four Hearts, securing a penalty of 500. (There is no game for North-South.)

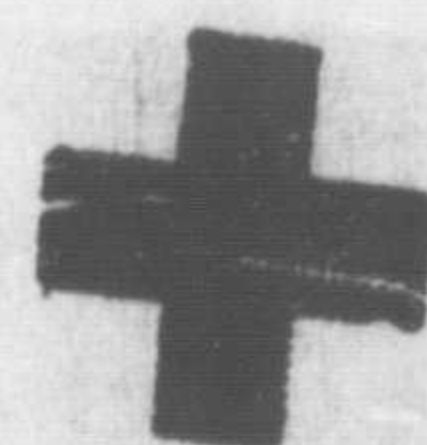

Hull Licence Bureau Demands Affidavits

The Hull car license bureau, which some weeks ago was refusing to sell license plates to residents of Quebec who had purchased their car in Ontario, came up with a new one.

As the deadline for use of old plates was March 20th, a number of former Ontario residents now living in Quebec, tried to purchase their Quebec plate.

They went to the bureau where they were asked the usual question. Did you buy your car in Ontario? When they answered yes, the plates were quickly shoved under a desk and the clerk asked: "Where is your affidavit showing that you were a resident of Ontario at the time you bought the car?"

When the majority replied that they did not have such an affidavit, they were told that until they got one, no permit would be issued to them. It would take them at least 10 days before they could get their plates.

The affidavits would have to go to Quebec first, where all instructions come from.

What if they were caught in Ontario with old plates?

"That's your problem", was the answer.

Like many Quebec residents who have refused to pay the two per cent tax, acting on their lawyers advice informing them that this tax was unconstitutional, these former Ontario citizens decided to fight their case in court if they get arrested.

Aylmer Council Approve Budget

Aylmer council on Monday March 21st, approved the 1950 budget for the town with revenue estimated at \$92,892 which is expected to bring a surplus for the year of \$2,472.54.

This is an increase over the 1949 revenue which was \$77,674. The additional revenue for 1950 will come from an increase in the town's assessment which this year stands at an all time high of \$2,116.215.

The mill rate remains the same for the next year at 16 mills. Alderman J. B. Laframboise, chairman of the revision committee, reported to council on the appeals by property holders against the assessed value placed on their property.

He reminded council that a general increase in valuation had been brought about this year because of the new method which council had authorized in assessing buildings according to cubic contents.

He reported appeals had resulted in decreases totalling \$12,275 or less than one per cent, of the increase in assessment.

He said the upward scaling of assessments in general had enabled council to carry on at the same mill rate as in 1949 despite increased expenditures and commitments.

Quyon Woman Dies In North

Friends and relatives in Quyon have received word of the death of Mrs. Calvin Martineau at her home at South Porcupine early on Monday morning.

The former Cecil Chevier, Mrs. Martineau was born at Quyon, 49 years ago, a daughter of Oliver Chevier, Quyon, and the late Agnes Bourgois. She married Calvin Martineau, of Quyon and took up residence there, later moving to South Porcupine.

The funeral took place Wednesday interment was in the United cemetery at South Porcupine.

Surviving besides her husband and father are: one daughter, Mrs. L. J. Philon, of Cobalt; five brothers, Joseph Chevier, Quyon, Edward, Harry, Arthur and Leon and Chevier, all of South Porcupine, three sisters, Mrs. L.
