### Two Boys Caught Attempting Theft

Two juveniles were caught trying to enter the back of the Greene Avenue Smoke Shop, 1311 Greene Avenue, Monday night, when Constable D. Stone was patrolling his regular beat.

Stone, who was inspecting the premises, spotted the two boys trying to pry open the back door of the building. Finding them in possession of tools, he placed them under arrest. They were brought before Recorder C. A. Hale of the Westmount Recorder's Court.

One of the boys, who had helped deliver Christmas mail was in possession of an old age pension check, and the Canadian Postal authorities are now investigating him thoroughly.

They have been reprimanded for sentence, both pleading guilty to attempted theft at the store.

### Priory School Blessing Highlights Achievement

Parents and friends joined the directors and staff of the Priory School one evening last week to celebrate a milestone in its history — the official blessing of the School's new permanent building by His Excellency Most Rev. Lawrence P. Whelan, Auxiliary Bishop of Montreal.

Less than three years before — more specifically, September '47 — the Priory School was established under the patronage of His Grace the Archbishop of Montreal as a private Catholic school for boys and girls of elementary school age. Twenty-five pupils

were enrolled that term. Today nearly 50 youngsters in four groups, kindergarten, 1st, 2nd and 3rd years, go to school in the three storey former Lindsay residence set in spacious grounds on The Boulevard. A new group is added each year to the Priory School, with the result that its original "charter" pupils are among the present number.

#### Rooms Are Blessed

The ceremony of the blessing of the new school took place last Wednesday evening, Feb. 1. As His Excellency, attended by Rev. G. Emmett Carter, director of the Priory School, went through the rooms of the house giving each its benediction, the guests, directors and staff followed. Before the blessing, Bishop Whelan spoke, noting the improvements since his visit last May when he administered the Sacrament of Confirmation, and encouraging those present to continue the work begun two years ago in the vital field of Catholic education.

Supper was served to the gathering later, prepared by Mrs. McGuire who has charge of the school catering.

## Snow Disposal Again Criticized; By-Laws Outdated

Royal Werry, K.C., apparently irked by the delay in answering a question put by him at the annual meeting of the Westmount Municipal Association held on December 6th., has written the following caustic letter to The Examiner. Mr. Werry states that he believes Westmount is stagnant, which is a rather strong denunciation of our civic regime.

He refers to The Examiner issue of December 16th, in which Alderman J. S. B. Pemberton is quoted, as having promised to give a reply to Mr. Werry's query as to why the tax rate in Westmount should be \$44.23 as against the Outremont rate of \$23.18.

#### Question Reasonable

Mr. Pemberton stated at that time, that he thought Mr. Werry's question was a reasonable one, and that he hoped to give an answer early in the new year.

Mr. Pemberton also pointed to the fact that Outremont likely had charges not included in the tax rate, and that he believed that snow removal would be one of these. Snow removal costs are included in the Westmount rate. The alderman also noted that Westmount maintained an Athletic Ground and also a Conservatory. The beautiful parks and landscaped boulevards were also an added expense to Westmount, but Mr. Pemberton declared that he thought that residents were rather proud of these.

Alderman Pemberton stated that he was of the opinion that assessments in Westmount were lower than in Outremont, and

## Civilian Guardians To Guide School Children, Started

The experimental stage of having part time guardians to handle children crossing the busy Westmount intersections was started Thursday morning when three residents began their duties at the corner of Roslyn and Western, Roslyn and Cote St. Antoine Road, and Lansdowne at Sherbrooke St.

Endorsed by the Westmount City Council three weeks ago, the plan for civilian supervisors on the busy Westmount streets, during the school hours has been considered for some time, but only recently was any action taken.

Chief Robert Byford of the Westmount Police Department pointed out this week that these civilian guardians, to be known as "School Crossing Guardians" are not to direct traffic, but to supervise the children in their attempts to cross the street.

He said he favoured the placement of civilians on this job, because it would relieve many of his own men from the responsibility so that they might carry on more serious police work.

It was pointed out by the City Council when the measure was passed, that should the experiment prove successful, more guardians will be hired on a part time basis for other busy streets in the City.

The guardians are expected to be on duty in the morning before school time, at noon, both when the children leave and return to school, and in the afternoon when school closes.

## Three Juveniles Caught For Thefts in Westmount

Three juveniles were arrested by the Westmount Police Department Friday, one day after they allegedly stole \$57 worth of household articles from G. M. Collins, 30 Selby Street, Westmount.

Brought before Recorder C. A. Hale of the Westmount Recorder's Court, one of the youths was sentenced to three years at the Mount St. Antoine Home, while the other two were placed on parole. They were also found guilty of stealing a number of articles from the Westmount Park shack earlier this year.

### Prof. W. Osborne Buried Monday

William Frederick Osborne, 76, formerly professor of French at the University of Manitoba, died at his home here, 4031 Dorchester street, Westmount, on Saturday.

Professor Osborne had lived here since 1944. Born in Quyon, Que., he graduated from Victoria College, Toronto, in 1895 and joined the staff of Wesley College, Winnipeg. In 1913 he was appointed head of the University Dept. of French and held that position until his retirement in 1942.

He was active in promoting co-operation and friendship between the French and English-speaking communities in Manitoba.

He is survived by his widow, the former Maud Somerset; one son, J. S. Osborne of Edmonton; and three daughters, Mrs. G. Anderson Grant of 767 Upper Lansdowne, Westmount and Mrs. F. M. Aykroyd of 475 Lansdowne Ave., Westmount, and Mrs. F. O. Finch, Lemgo, Germany. A brother, Edward Osborne of Arnprior, Ont., also survives him as well as eight grandchildren.

that this factor would offset the effect of a higher tax rate.

Mr. Werry's letter reads as follows:

The Editor,  
The Examiner.  
Dear Sir,

In your issue of Friday, December 16, 1949, you referred to the question of heavy taxation in Westmount.

With a view to constructive criticism in this connection I would like to make a few remarks and ask a few questions.

1. What is the use, practical or theoretical, of the electric plant at the Glen?
2. What does the useless plant cost the taxpayers?
3. Why do we have to heat water to help dispose of the snow?

It has been stated that the present system of snow disposal is necessary as there is no vacant land in Westmount on which to dump the snow. This has been tried in connection with some of the parks unsuccessfully and with resultant complaints from citizens.

I understand the question of a distant haul is important and the Glen is supposed to save haulage.

#### Vacant Land Available

So far as vacant land is concerned, there is a large field just east of Claremont avenue, extending from Cote St. Antoine Road through to Westmount avenue; this field evidently enjoys freedom from ordinary taxation at the expense of other citizens while we cannot find a field on which to dump surplus snow. The same fact applies to a large field in front of the old M.A.A.A. grounds, presently occupied by the City, to say nothing about dumping snow on part of the grounds themselves.

I was almost amused yesterday to see a large snow removal blower picking up snow along the empty field, blowing it into a truck to take away to the Glen to be melted in the warm water at our expense.

#### Glen Plant White Elephant

Evidently at least one of our white elephants is at the Glen. As it is already white it does not need any white-washing.

It was reported that one of the Parks was not so well kept as suitable help could not be obtained. If we did not have the help, why the expense?

With regard to the City Parks of which we are all proud, we can only say other cities have parks and playgrounds and Outremont Parks are not so bad.

Does the operation of the Library result in a loss?

If the various operations above mentioned result in losses, is the City justified in continuing the losses at such heavy expense to the tax-payer?

Personally I believe Westmount is stagnant.

#### BUILDING LAWS OBSOLETE

For years we have been considering new building by-laws but I understand we still operate with those of horse and buggy days. Due to antiquated building by-laws owners of large homes cannot modernize them.

Due to heavy taxes they have to dispose of them at a loss. Many an old Westmount family has to see its sons and daughters leave the city because the building by-laws do not permit of altering the old homes to meet present day conditions.

So the old population is stuck with expensive old homes, mounting expenses with resultant heavy taxes and no sign of a vigorous young increased population to help bear the burden.

Trusting that these remarks will be taken in the constructive manner intended, I am,

## Potters' Club Seek Quarters

The "Potters' Club, a most enthusiastic group of adult pottery lovers, who spend much of their space time in the studio at 433 Lansdowne Avenue, Westmount, are looking for new quarters.

The studio, at the moment and for the next six months, is located in the basement of 433 Lansdowne. Mrs. Howard Reid, of 381 Prince Albert Avenue, the president of the club, states that she would be glad to hear of any suitable quarters which might be used as a studio.

Preferably, would she like to get a basement of a building in the business section of Westmount. She explains that the studio is fully equipped with two pottery wheels, two electric kilns, and a ball mill. All sorts of pottery is made by the members, who number at present 38. Some go in for large pots, others small, these are moulded, put on the wheel, baked in the kiln and then glazed.

J. M. Reynolds, of 512 Argyle Avenue, a former executive of the club, states that the pottery turned out in the studio is almost, if not equal, to professional quality. This, of course, is due to the proper facilities enjoyed by club members.

Mrs. Reid said that as far as she knew, the "Potters' Club" was the only one of its kind operating in metropolitan Montreal. Two private groups, under the guidance of two Westmount ladies, Mrs. Nancy Dawes, and Mrs. Stevenson, also turned out splendid pottery, Mrs. Reid stated.

One of the studio members, Miss Hazel Bryan, who teaches at Westmount Junior High, has started a class in the school, and has interested quite a number of the girls in making pottery.

At present the school is getting along on one small kiln. Miss Bryan had some experience in England before coming to Westmount Junior High.

The Potters' Club is just two years old. Before moving to their present location at 433 Lansdowne the studio was located on Shuter Street.

As most of the members are Westmount residents, the group would prefer to remain in Westmount, and would also like to open a small shop as an outlet for their wares.

The officers of the club are: President, Mrs. Howard Reid, 381 Prince Albert Avenue, Westmount; Vice-President, Miss Jean Hawthorne, teacher, Westmount Junior High School; Secretary, Miss Florence Buckler, and Treasurer, Mrs. Agnes Gordon, of Victoria Avenue, Westmount.

Membership in the club is open to all who have a working knowledge in pottery. An entrance fee is charged, and there is a small studio fee.

The studio is open afternoon and evening for the use of members.

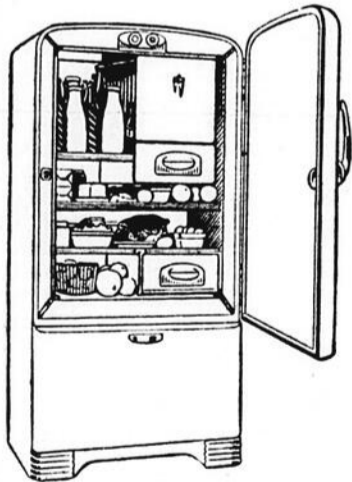

## Current Events Club Has Talk On Psychology

More than 125 members of the Current Events Club of Westmount High School crammed three to hear Mrs. T. D. Hughes, of the Mental Hygiene Institute speak on "Why Parents Are Interested in Psychology and its Effect on Teen-Agers".

Opening her talk with the three main reasons why adults study psychology, she said they were to learn to live harmoniously with

other in order to build a more co-operative world; to create happier people and more successful marriages and to educate children to be more mature citizens.

In a discussion on child psychology, Mrs. Hughes outlined many interesting ideas, pointing out that too few people realize that spells of anger, jealousy and hate are completely normal, and that it is far more important to deal with them constructively than to use punishment for them.

"When a young child says to his mother, 'I hate you'; the mother should not be filled with righteous indignation, and spank the child, but should merely say: 'I know exactly how you feel, for there are times when you will hate me and there is nothing you can do about it'. This attitude of understanding will bring about a much closer relationship between the mother and child", Mrs. Hughes said.

Mrs. Hughes also pointed out that modern psychology believes that it is necessary to give a child the maximum freedom he can handle so that he may, through his own mistakes and experiences, learn to be a truly mature adult.

Mrs. Hughes mentioned that the reason there has never been a lasting peaceful society in the history of the world is that there has never been a sufficient number of mature people in one place at one time to produce it.

The talk was extremely well received by the members of the club who showed their enthusiasm by asking questions for more than half an hour.

## Three Approvals Made by City Councillors

Three issues were brought up and passed by the Westmount City Council at their meeting, Monday.

They approved on an appropriation of \$2,000 to move a number of tram poles now situated in the gutters along Greene, St. Catherine and Victoria avenues. These poles are to be moved back on the sidewalk wherever possible, a City Hall official explained.

It was also decided to grant the Westmount Rotary Club a permit to hold their annual carnival at the Westmount Park grounds, near Lansdowne and St. Catherine streets. The carnival is expected to run from June 19 to 24.

A third item approved was a deed of servitude to be drawn up for the right of way of a sewer from Wierdale Park to Atwater avenue. The old sewer, built years ago, was partly discovered when contractors for the welfare Federation began digging the basement

## J. B. Knox Fined F.E.C.B. Violations

Chief Judge Edouard Archambault, on Friday, imposed a fine of \$10,000 on James Blake Knox, of 3228 Cedar Avenue, Westmount, for having violated Foreign Exchange Control Board regulations in purchasing Canadian securities from the United States.

Judge Archambault stated that he was satisfied that no criminal act had been involved in the purchase of \$68,113 worth of Canadian securities in the U. S. which were later sold in Montreal for \$76,029.

Before sentence was pronounced, Harry Batshaw, K.C., special Federal prosecutor, explained the basic principal of Foreign Exchange Control Board regulations,

## Hon. D.C. Abbott Advocates Lower Tariffs Here

The Hon. D. C. Abbott, Minister of Finance, and member for St. Antoine-Westmount division, in the Federal Parliament, yesterday addressed The Canadian Section International Chamber of Commerce, at a luncheon meeting in the Mount Royal Hotel.

Mr. Abbott stated that he believed the only appropriate policy for Canada to follow with respect to tariffs and other trade barriers, is to get them down to reasonable levels, and keep them down, both here and abroad.

### Freer Trade Necessary

The Minister explained that this did not mean free trade in the classical sense — but it does mean freer trade. He said that he believed that the prosperity of Canada as well as other countries will be fostered, if, by removing excessive trade barriers, countries will specialize in the production of the things they are good at, and exchange them for the goods that other countries produce more cheaply.

For this reason, Mr. Abbott stated, we must encourage by every means at our disposal, policies and practices which make possible the broadest exchange of goods. Of course, he added, this means that we in Canada must practise what we preach. He thought that in the main, Canada has practised a reasonable and moderate tariff policy — with the

exception of a short period during the Great Depression of the thirties.

**Trade Restrictions Disastrous**

During this period of disastrous decline in world trade, and the breakdown in economic co-operation, each country tried to save itself at the expense of its neighbours by restricting imports. Nations in turn built up high tariff walls, introduced arbitrary methods of valuation, engaged in competitive dumping, and set up a maze of import controls. Mr. Abbott said that these policies for a country like Canada, geared to export trade, the results were all but disastrous.

The raising of the tariffs in 1930 and 1931 and the 1932 Empire Trade Agreements which raised the tariffs against foreign countries still further, was essentially an effort to hoist the Canadian economy by its own bootstraps. Since it did not take into consideration the needs of the basic primary industries of this country, it was he said doomed to failure.

Some industries may have benefited, but for the country as a whole, employment slumped even further, and investment remained in a depressed condition. Canada cannot live unto itself alone and hope to maintain anything like its present living standards, Mr. Abbott said.

**Empire Agreements Not Enough**

The Empire Trade Agreements of 1932 were designed to mitigate some of the handicaps suffered by the export industries, as a result of restriction of trade in other directions. While these measures were partially effective, he believed that they were too rigid to recognize that no one market and too short sighted. They failed can provide adequate outlets for Canadian production.

**Pins Hope on Geneva Agreement**

He spoke at length on the Geneva Agreement, entered into in 1947 by twenty-three countries. From this conference tariff schedules emerged, which contain more than 45,000 tariff concessions.

Mr. Abbott said that the Geneva Agreement is not merely a hope for the future, but already Canada was deriving substantial benefits as a result of the tariff concessions agreed on there. He stated that one benefit was the tariff concessions granted by the United States. The United States market had been considerably broadened to us by the Geneva Agreement.

**Restrictions Lifted**

The gratifying rise in Canadian exports since 1947, particularly to dollar markets has made it possible to add substantially to our exchange reserves, and at the same time, has made it possible for a relaxation in restrictions. The Minister reviewed the steps taken in regard to exchange and quotas from November 17, 1947, up to the present, which showed a gradual easing in regulations, and on Wednesday of this week he was able to announce further relaxations to become effective in the

second and third quarters of this year.

When the changes which he announced on Wednesday go into effect, the outright prohibitions will have been eliminated on all but a relatively small group of imports, he said.

**Oil and Iron Ore Development**

Mr. Abbott said he believed that the rapid development of the oil industry in Alberta, and the exploitation of iron ore in Labrador and Quebec, are only a few examples of what he hoped will mark a new era of economic expansion in Canada.

Long term objectives must be kept closely before us, the Minister stated. We in Canada are continuing to seek a constructive approach to present trade problems by working out trade agreements on a wide basis.

**Negotiations to Continue**

Further negotiations will be carried on at Geneva next September, and he hoped that further trade large group of other important dom, the United States and a agreements with the United Kingdom trading countries would be completed.

He felt sure that the members of the International Chamber of Commerce would support these objectives which will promote the welfare of all Canadians.

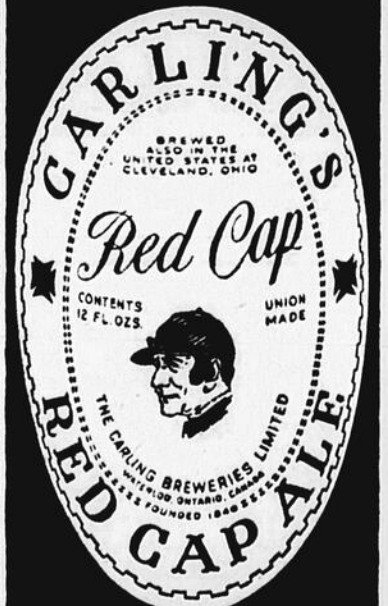

### The Road to Collectivist State

The argument that, if Britain won't or can't support a high-price market for our surplus food products, Ottawa must subsidize farm prices seems like the old "heads-I-win, tails-you-lose" game," writes Joseph Lister Rutledge, Chairman of the Canadian Unity Council. Mr. Rutledge was commenting on the demand by H. H. Hannam, President of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, that to maintain high prices for farm produce, Ottawa should immediately start a program of subsidies for farm produce —

a demand to which Ottawa is already acceding.

"Mr. Hannam argues," continues Mr. Rutledge, "that it would be folly for the Canadian farmer to accept 'ruinous prices' in an attempt to try to subsidize low-income families. But he does not speak for the low income families who, should his proposal be accepted, would have to do their part in subsidizing the farmer. Nor does he mention that the farmer himself would pay part of the subsidy as taxes. If we carried his argument for subsidies to its conclusion, any small businessman who felt his profit margin was in danger would have the right to ask Ottawa for similar consideration."

"But the greatest danger in this whole problem of subsidies," concluded Mr. Rutledge, "is that if the government is going to have to underwrite farm prices, government is going to have to regulate production. Government is going to have to tell the Canadian farmer what to grow and how much to grow. That is what the proponents of farm subsidies are demanding, though they may not realize it. And when that happens, we will not be looking apprehensively towards a possible collectivist state in Canada, we will have it."

**St. Andrew's Year Satisfactory One**

At the annual business meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's United Church, Westmount, very satisfactory progress was reported in all departments of the life and work of the Church. The Minister, Rev. D. M. Grant, opened the meeting with appropriate devotional exercises, after which the President of the Congregation, Allan H. McDougall, conducted the business of the evening, with Clifford E. C. Swift as secretary.

Various reports submitted portrayed a year of continued activity, faithful service and real progress. . . . The Women's Association received \$1,384 for Church and social work. The MacGillivray Auxiliary of the Woman's Missionary Society raised \$3,467. The Men of St. Andrew's, The Adult Club and the Young People's organizations all reported a successful year.

The membership of the Church increased substantially in 1949 — 110 new members being received, bringing the total membership to 1574. The Church School has an enrolment of 291.

The Missionary and Church Work Committee reported contributions of \$22,011. Of this amount \$19,842 was forwarded to the Missionary and Maintenance Fund of the United Church of Canada, \$1,650 was paid to the Presbytery Local Services Fund and the balance to sundry benevolences. A. Ogilvy Leslie was appointed Chairman for 1950, with Mortimer R. Rubenstein as Secretary and T. A. C. Sinclair as Treasurer.

Total receipts for all ordinary purposes were \$62,069. In addition \$2,550 was paid to the Pension Fund Committee in payment of pledges in the Pension Fund Capital Campaign, and over \$30,000 was subscribed to the Memorial and Rehabilitation Funds in connection with the Golden Jubilee of St. Andrew's, which will be celebrated in November of this year. In relation to the Jubilee a strong Committee is at work making the necessary arrangements for what is hoped to be an outstanding event in the life of St. Andrew's Congregation.

Col. R. D. Harkness, D.S.O., M.C.,

was appointed President of the Congregation for 1950, with J. A. H. Henderson as Vice-President, C. E. C. Swift as Secretary and D. W. Sutherland as Treasurer. Messrs. Allan Turner Bone, J. A. D. Falkner, J. Knox MacLachlan, E. Carlyle Miller and Herbert R. Snuggs were appointed to the Board of Management. These, together with Messrs. A. H. McDougall (Past-President), E. M. Armour, T. H. Cosford, R. D. Crammond, F. R. Findlay, S. B. Fraser, E. H. S. Piper, H. J. Racey, Arthur H. Campbell, K. H. Copland, E. D. Gordon, C. M. Hodgdon and Leonard Martin will constitute the Board of Managers for the year. Rev. G. K. Ward is the Assistant Minister.

## Social Workers Stress Need For Mtl. Girls' Association

The plans of the Montreal Girls' Association to establish and operate a play-centre for girls in central Montreal are meeting with general approval.

In a recent statement, Mr. Charles Young, Director of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies, said, "There is an unquestioned need for a Montreal Girls' Association to ensure that much more adequate consideration is given to the development of girls' programmes than has been the case heretofore. Service clubs and other organizations tend to support boys' programmes almost to the exclusion of girls' programmes."

with the result that organized play projects for girls lag behind developments for boys, to a very serious extent. Anything that can be done to redress the balance and give the girls 'a decent break' in terms of community recreational facilities should be welcomed by everybody".

In a survey made in 1947 by the "Committee on Leisure Time Programmes for Girls in Montreal", which is a standing committee on the group work section of the Montreal Council of Social Agencies, it was estimated that 70% of English-speaking girls

from eight to sixteen years of age are not served by any form of planned recreational programme.

### Need After-School Programme

Many educational leaders and trained social workers believe that the lack of a planned after-school programme is most severely felt by the six to twelve-year-olds. School girls of these ages would provide a fertile field in group-work. They are both susceptible and pliable, and much basic work in the development of character and the training in skills can be accomplished.

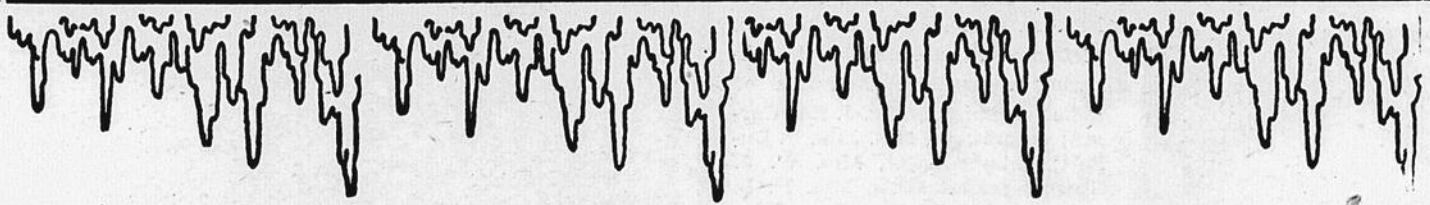

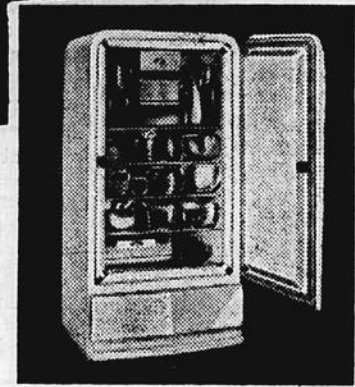

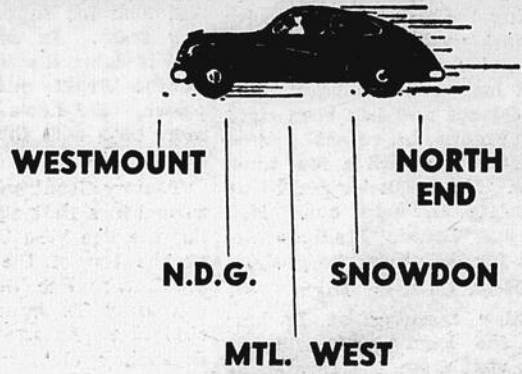
