Queen Elizabeth Apartments Now Ready To Rent

Nearly a year has passed since the excavation work was done for the new, seven storey Queen Elizabeth apartments at the corner of Sherbrooke Street and Rosemount Avenue and, after overcoming the usual difficulties encountered when embarking on a project of this magnitude, the building is now practically completed. It is soundproof, fireproof and contains 70 luxurious suites and no expense has been spared to ensure the tenants of every comfort and convenience.

The units range from 3 to 7 rooms and all those of 5 rooms and over have 2 bathrooms. Each apartment has its own balcony or terrace.

A feature of the building is the beautiful main lobby at the Rosemount Avenue entrance. This will be faced with granite and have bronze doors. It will be tastefully furnished with splendid rugs, mirrors and appropriate furniture. Flowers will always be in evidence, not only in this main lobby but also on every floor.

There will be 2 elevators, one self-service and the other in charge of a regular attendant. A doorman will also be on hand for the tenants' convenience.

Three of the suites facing on Sherbrooke St. will have a separate entrance and these will be occupied as medical offices. All in all, no expense has been spared and no effort has been too great to ensure the tenants of the finest in comfort and convenience. A quiet, homelike atmosphere is the aim of the builders and operators, the Rose Realities Company. 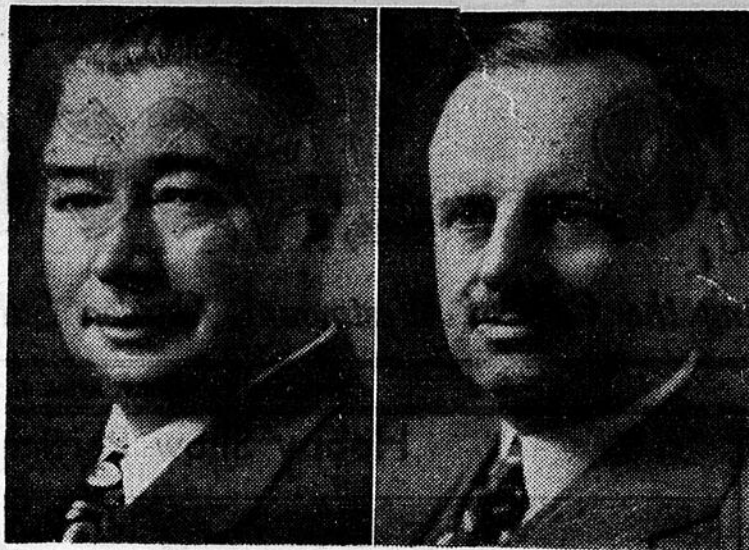
... That Const. Jamieson of our

A record crowd of approximately 200 people were on hand to see a major upset in the Provincial Class "A" Women's Foil Championships held at the Westmount Y.M.C.A. last Saturday night. Mme Yarmila Vokral, fencing independently, came through with a perfect score of seven victories and no defeats to win the provincial title. Mrs. Betty Hamilton of the Central Y.M.C.A. Club, a heavy favorite, placed third with four victories and three defeats, and McGill's Sue Bradley copped second place with five victories and two defeats.

This was one of the biggest turnouts for a fencing competition for some time and strikes an encouraging note for a revival of interest in fencing in the area. Much of the credit for the promotion of the meet and the smooth efficient way in which it was conducted is due to Coach Rolland Asselin and his Fencing Club of the Westmount "Y" who were hosts for the competition.

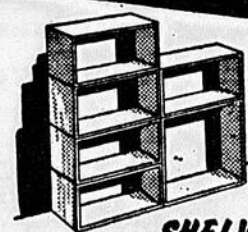

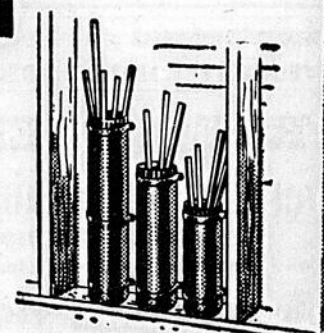

Everybody's idea of the word "important" is different. Who is to say what is important or who is important? Once a person has attained fame he is automatically considered "important". Most people who are important in someone's eyes. Importance mounts and importance wanes . . . some never lose their importance (once it is attained) and others are like flashing meteors that are transient.

Heifetz, Toscanini, Churchill, Jack Dempsey, Rubinstein, Daphne du Maurier, Boris Chaliapin, Rogers and Hart, Cecil B. DeMille, Casals, and Aram Khachaturian, these people and many, many more keep their importance. They are

genuinely great. Which compositions are important? It is really amusing to hear the controversial opinions in regard to various works . . . One savant will say that Bach is the most important composer, while another will argue that Beethoven is more important! The great Franz Liszt is called a "hackneyed composer" by those who are tired of his works but—these compositions continue in popularity with each new listener so they MUST be important. Some of the awful so called "modern art" paintings that we see at exhibitions are called "important" contributions but will they survive the test of time? Will they be imitated and will they be sold? But, dear readers, they ARE important in the eyes of some! Isn't it amazing?

A build-up makes one important sometimes. This brings to mind an instance of many years ago that surprised us. (It still does). Two children of a prominent couple, (both parents being college graduates and interested in civic and communal affairs,) won minor school awards . . . the parents were so elated that they told everyone and word got around that the children were "brilliant." Today they are grown up, just ordinary citizens, intelligent but average people. Due to the parents, they were tabbed brilliant, but unfortunately — it does not apply to them today.

As an extreme contrast, a very intelligent woman we know was usually referred to as a "dumbbell" while in her teens. She is modest, retiring and not a "pusher." Her mother is . . . her father is not. This lady did not aspire to be a leader in school affairs, it is not her nature but her mother is a well-known club woman. Jokingly, she would say to her intimates that her daughter was a "dumbbell" because her daughter was not outstanding and probably this was a great disappointment to her. Result . . . the quip spread and some people believed her not too bright. She is an intelligent, happy individual with a prominent husband and two children. We wonder if the grandmother is doing the same with these? One can make or break an individual's importance and parents are not exceptions.

The Quebec Federation of Fish and Game Associations will market wildlife stamps in the Province this year. These will be sold

by Associations such as the Lake St. Louis Anglers netting the Federation half of all monies collected for their sale.

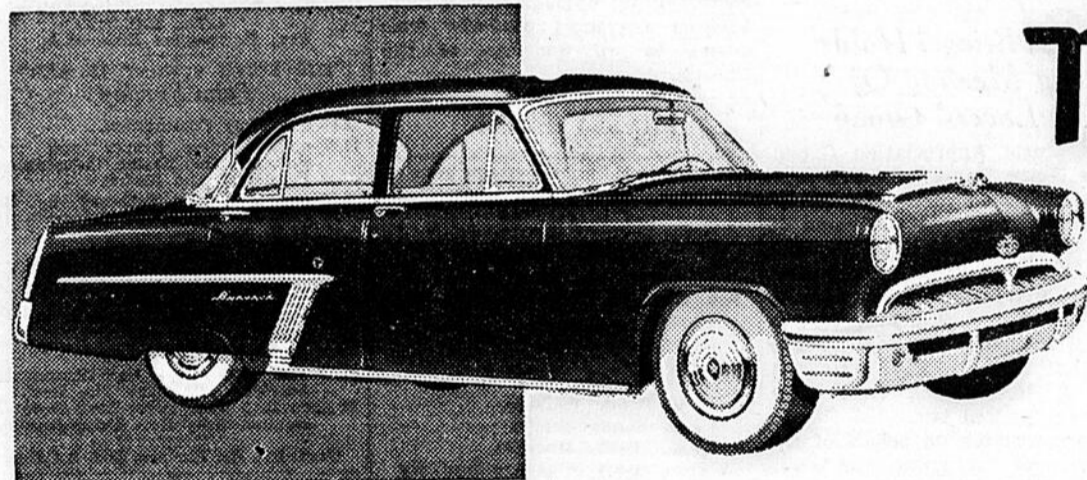
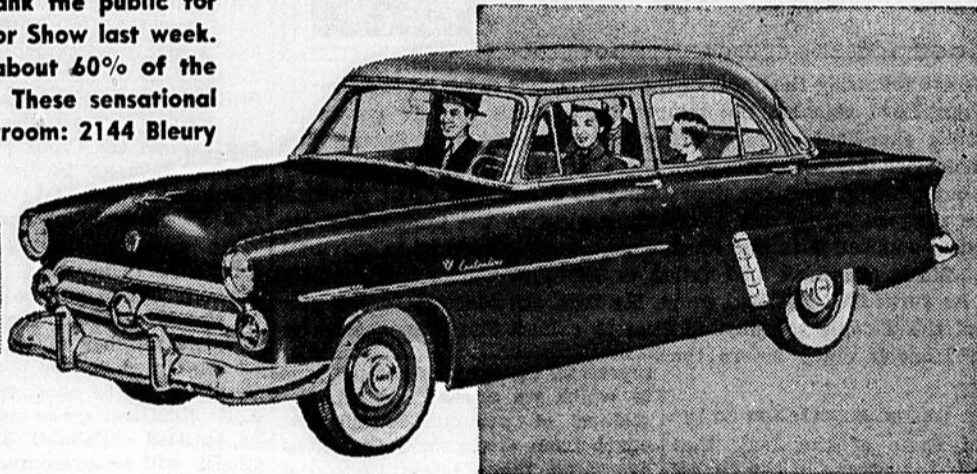

The Free Enterprise System

Labor, Management Co-operation
Is Only Hope of Survival

The future of the market-economy — of the responsible enterprise system as we know it — rests on the degree of tolerance and mutual understanding which we are aiming to attain in our business and social life. The Communists, of course, do not believe us capable of achieving this goal and already are convinced that the free nations of the world are split irreconcilably into two camps — Labor and Management — whose relationships are deteriorating rapidly and whose leaders are at hatchet ends with each other 365 days of every year. Common sense,

understanding and tolerance, they say, are sand pillars on which to build any society.

The real test of civilisation, free-nation style, resolves itself to this: Is the individual capable of using freedom advantageously — that is, is he capable of balancing its privileges and opportunities with restraint, responsibility and other qualities of good citizenship?

Organised Labor has now inherited the decisive power previously exercised by management and ownership. Consequently the fate of freedom rests mainly on the ability of labor to reconcile its power with its responsibilities. Labor over-all attitude, although marred periodically by irresponsible action, appears to be moving from violence to reason. Union leaders, for the most part, recognise the totalitarian menace, realise that a society built on co-operation is the only hope of survival.

The individual Canadian wage-earner, whether or not he belongs to a trade union, has as much common sense and is at least as good a citizen as other Canadians. Unfortunately the leaders of several important trade unions are under Communist control and, therefore, are enemy agents. Moreover even in the unions that disavow Moscow there are suitably disguised agents. These complications place a special responsibility upon those whose job it is to steer our trade unions through the shoals and obstacles designed to wreck them as a vital part of the apparatus of freedom.

Temptation IV

We are following the order of the temptations in St. Luke's Gospel. After our Lord rejected the temptation to seize worldly power by the simple expedient of recognizing the overlordship of Satan, then the devil tried his third weapon. There are men who scorn worldly power but will grasp at the opportunity to exercise spiritual power. I suppose that we clergy are peculiarly subject to the temptation; we sometimes suppose that our Master was most concerned in spiritual things. When the devil had failed in material things and worldly power he turned to spiritual pride. He took the Messiah to the pinnacle of the Temple and invited Him to exhibit His Messiahship by casting Himself down before the crowds.

There was an expectation on the part of some of the Jews that God would intervene in the course of world affairs by sending the "Son of Man" straight from Heaven to represent Him. Jesus must have known of this expectation, and here was a temptation to take advantage of it, and show to His people by this outward sign that He really was the Messiah. Notice that there was the same doubt suggested, "If Thou be the Son of God," and the urging to prove the point for His own satisfaction. And notice too that, as in the other cases, the devil was able to back up his point by quoting scripture. There is probably no wickedness done in the Church which has not been backed up by words of Scripture, from the merciless dealing with heretics — "compel them to come in," — down to the meanest selfishness or the part of the individual Christian, who can argue about the freedom of the Gospel.

I used the word "satisfaction." I suppose satisfaction is what we all seek — material, worldly or spiritual. The steel-worker, the manufacturer, the bricklayer, the doctor, the school teacher, the parson, are all seeking the comfort and satisfaction that come from higher wages and profits. The Kingdom of God has come down to the level of food and drink. The politician, from the highest official to the lowest ward-heeler seeks satisfaction through exercising power over others. Yes, there are cases where the power is exercised for the services of others but they are not many. The priest and the prophet also look for their satisfaction in being the spiritual leaders of their people. There is the story of Bossuet, the great preacher, to whom one of his congregation remarked: "That was a magnificent sermon." He replied: "Yes, the devil told me go before I left the pulpit."

Those temptations of our Lord

represent the various temptations to which we are all subject, the seeking of personal satisfaction apart from God's will. Our Lord overcame those temptations not because He was the Son of God, but because He always sought His satisfaction in God's will.

Minute Mix

JEAN AND GINGER

Ella Wheeler Wilcox said in effect that every cloud has a silver lining and that she preferred to turn her clouds about and wear them bright side out. Another expert at this art — one of the best cloud-turners in this city in fact — is Mrs. Jean Crombie, of Westmount. She has had a lot of experience turning her dark clouds inside out, for she went blind at the age of 17, regained her sight, then lost it again during World War II when she heard that her Merchant Marine husband had been lost at sea.

Mrs. Crombie believes that splendid physical health is important to the blind, and aided by her Seeing Eye dog, Ginger, she walks a great deal. She is a good horse-woman and enjoys riding on Mount Royal with a friend. She is also an excellent swimmer, and all this exercise keeps her in tip-top shape for her work as a sightless home teacher with the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

This girl, whom I have heard described as "the prettiest thing you ever laid eyes on," has taught many blind veterans, including George Cohen who is now Publicity Director for CNIB, to read Braille. I have also heard her described as a great inspiration, particularly to the newly blind, her cheerfulness and her ability to carry on a useful and full life proving that there is still much left when sight goes. Not only does she teach both men and women how to read Braille, but she teaches women how to adjust to blindness, how to launch out in ways of self help as dressing themselves and fixing their hairdos; and how to take care of their homes and cook, sew, knit, etc. Jean introduces blind housewives to the different gadgets available to help them in the kitchen, such as measuring cups marked in Braille, and measuring spoons with Braille dots on the handles; and she shows them how to sew a button on a shirt and darn and knit socks. Many blind women excel with knitting needles. Just this week George Cohen was telling me about a lovely knitted set which his wife raves about—the outfit was given to George's baby, not to George!

Mrs. Crombie also teaches handicrafts such as making wallets, belts, etc., at a veterans' hospital. In this way the blind develop sensitivity in the hands and fingers, and as they gain confidence, they break out of the shell of withdrawal and begin to turn their dark clouds bright side out. Help the blind to help themselves — that is the great thing, says this teacher, echoing CNIB's slogan for the financial campaign, April 7 to 21.

One of the newest ventures in training the blind at CNIB headquarters, 1425 Crescent Street, is teaching young girls to act as receptionists and switchboard operators. An ordinary switchboard fitted with Braille attachments, is used. Another interesting piece of equipment at CNIB is a cook stove with Braille instructions on the various keys and handles.

All of which goes to show that wearing dark clouds silver side out is smart business, uh?

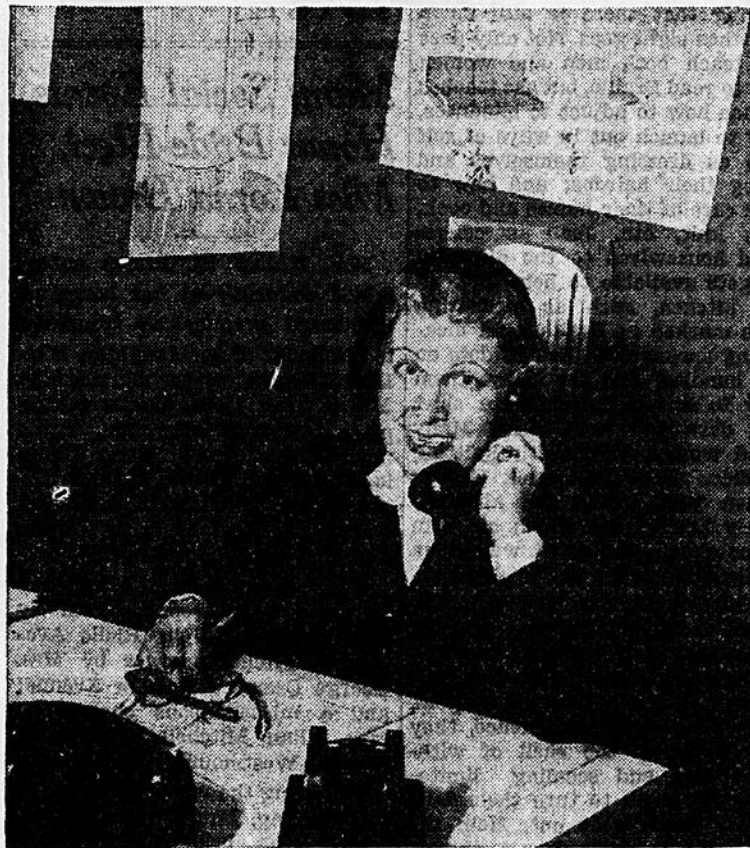

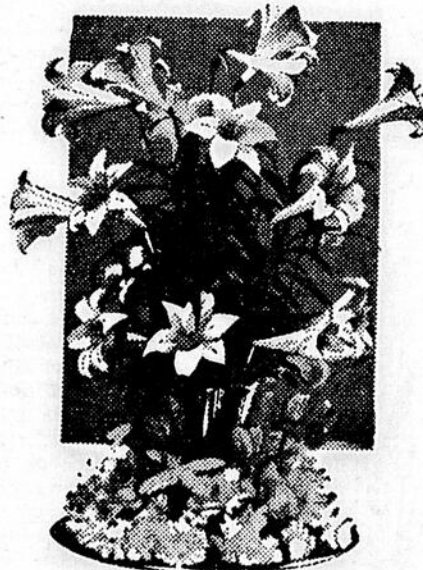

C. A. C. Reports

... On Progress In Quebec ...
... Conservation Of Strength ...

It is scarcely three years since the Quebec Provincial Branch of The Canadian Association of Consumers undertook the tremendous task of organizing its membership into Branches. At that time there were about 900 C.A.C. members in Montreal and scattered throughout the towns and villages of the provinces. As such "members-at-large" they were mostly unknown to each other, had no way of discussing consumer problems or presenting a united opinion.

The Provincial Executive, consisting likewise of housewives with their own families and in many cases, closely tied to home duties, did not have the means for planning a province-wide organization of members such as might be done by a large trade or labour association. But women are accustomed to overcoming difficulties; an incredible amount of detail work was done, the Provincial President herself travelled to various districts and the results show up in some amazing facts today. Your reporter learned last week from the membership Secretary, that she expects a total of nearly 1500 members by the time that all figures for the year are complete; that there are at present over 1200 members in the Province of Quebec and that only 290 of these are still carried as "members-at-large". All the rest are now organized in their own local units, have their own officers, hold their own meetings and bring their own suggestions, views and complaints to their Provincial Office.

Only One C.A.C.

It is with pride that your reporter notes that Canada is the only country in the world with a National Consumer Organization. There are some local housewives societies in England and in both Canada and the United States there have been one or two local manifestations of mushroom growth and equally rapid death due to their questionable backing. In Canada alone we have this unique idea an association formed by and for women — and women today, without realizing it are the strongest economic force in the country. We are accustomed to thinking of the power of big Labour Unions, of Trade and Agricultural Organizations and yet the woman in the home, in her numbers and by reason of her spending power, tops them all. Did you know that women spend 85% of the family income; are beneficiaries of 80% of all Life Insurance; handle 70% of estates left by men; hold 66% of all privately held Government Bonds; also hold 50% of all privately held Stocks and in their names are 65% of all Bank Accounts. The officers of C.A.C. at all levels, are appalled at these facts and at the terrific responsibility which rests upon them in helping to develop a wise and informed consumer opinion so that power may be used for the advantage of our homes and our country.

Saving Our Women-Power

The latest edition of the C.A.C. Provincial Bulletin carries some very pertinent remarks about that seemingly expendable source of power — our housewives. It points out that housewives are valuable, that they have only just so much time and energy, and that many outside demands are made upon today's homemaker, which were not made on her Mother or her Grandmother. While labour-saving devices have taken much of the drudgery out of housework, there are still too many women who have no leisure in which to recoup their energies. Some blame for this may extend to outmoded standards in the home. Old fashioned routines, the demand of menfolk for heavy meals, the housewives own insistence on polished silver and the housekeeping standards of more leisured days — all these may be to blame. There can be occasions where keeping house the way your mother did, may not be as important as keeping your community safe for your children and when the need for rest for yourself may be more im-

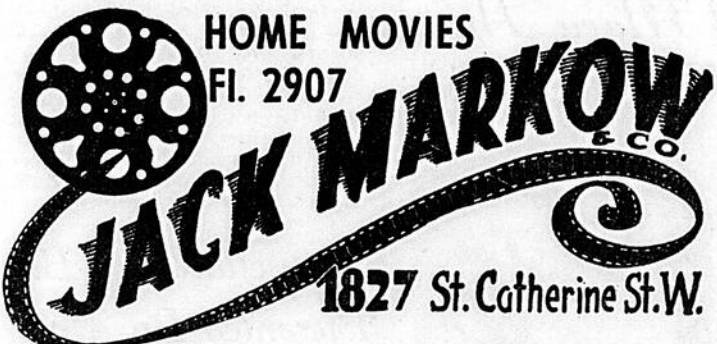

Before the season actually gets under way, stage a test by trying all the events there are. Keep a record of how well you do in each and then compare these to see in what events you made the best showing. Then, analyze your experiences and see what events you liked best, and what events seemed easier for you to perform. Add up your results and you will probably find that all evidence points to a couple of definite events. A good idea is to work with a group of pals, then you can compare your results and see how you do in comparison with the others. Here are a few facts that will help you find your right event:

1. If you are slender, tall, have long legs, and speed, the hurdles will be your best bet. If you are not too fast but have lots of bounce the high jump is your likely event. If you have neither speed or bounce to a marked degree, you might turn into a middle-distance or long-distance runner.
2. If you are very strong and heavy for your age, pay special attention to the field events such as shot-put, discus, etc., especially if your back, shoulder and upper arm muscles are well developed.
3. If you like gymnastics, especially the high bars, trapeze and parallel bars, love to climb, and have a fair burst of speed, it is likely that the pole vault is your natural event.
4. If you have a good throwing arm it's likely that you could do very well at the javelin throw.
5. If you can run away from your pals without too much trouble, the sprints are most likely your dish. If you also have lots of bounce and spring in your legs, the broad jumps and the hop, step and jump will come easy to you.
6. If you have some speed but can't beat a really fast runner, try

the 440, 880, 1000 yards or mile.
 7. If you can pivot well, are agile, and have a good throwing arm, try the discus.
 8. If you are not too fast but

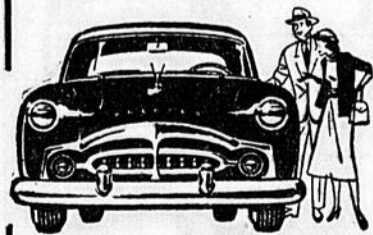

Take Care Of Your

Throwing Arm

Always warm up well before throwing hard or any trick pitches. If your arm gets sore, rest it until the soreness is completely gone and then start by throwing in easy stages increasing the pace of your throw every few days. When your arm gets sore, bathe it with water as hot as possible for ten minutes three or four times a day, apply a good liniment and rest it until all the pain is gone. 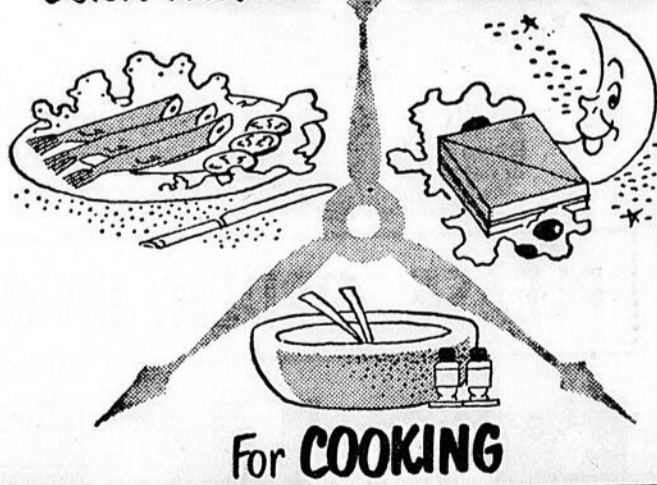

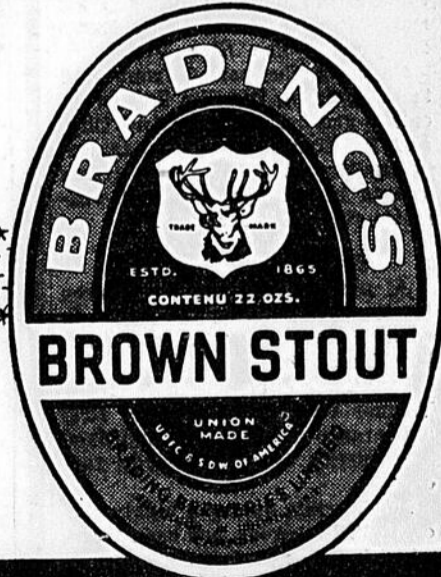

Fish Regulations
Now Available

Hon. Dr. C. E. Pouliot, Minister of Game and Fisheries, announced to sport fishermen of Quebec that the 1952 resume of fishing laws and regulations is available for them at Fish and Game Department's offices. The summary which is of convenient size to be carried, shows some new regulations designed to give efficient protection to game fish in Quebec waters.

An important change regarding trout fishing reads: "It is unlawful to use minnows as bait in waters frequented by speckled trout, save when such minnows were taken in these same waters." Another new regulation increases the minimum legal length of maslinonge to 30 inches, with the daily limit of three fish or 30 pounds, plus the weight of one fish unchanged.

The open season June 1 to November 30 with minimum length of 12 inches and no daily bag limit.

A third gives Quebec anglers a new species of protected fish in the Striped Bass, referred to as "striped bar," which are popular fish in the lower St. Lawrence.
