The St. Charles Branch and the Railway Ferry.

(The Editor of the Morning Chronicle.) Sir,—In a recent issue, one of your contemporaries in this city takes me to task in the following words: "You are, it is said, the electors of Quebec West have, no doubt, remarked the absence of Messrs. McGreevy and Carby from the deputation of the Harbor Commissioners and the Minister of Trade and Public Works, who waited yesterday on the Minister of Public Works..."

I am not in the habit of noticing every newspaper squib that happens to come under my eyes, but I must respectfully ask you to allow me the use of your columns to explain, in defence to my constituents and my fellow-citizens generally, whose good opinion I respect and wish to merit, the why and the wherefore of my absence from a deputation in aid with which I so fully concurred and heartily sympathized.

"DEAR SIR,—The Hon. H. L. Langevin, C.B., has signified his readiness to receive a deputation of this Council, the President of the Levis Board of Trade, and other gentlemen from Levis and Quebec, on the subject of a branch of the Intercolonial Railway from St. Charles to the Indian Cove, on a deep water point at Levis opposite to Quebec, at his residence, No. 78, St. Louis street, on Wednesday, 28th inst. at 10 o'clock a.m. sharp, and I am ordered to ask the favor of your punctual attendance there at the above named hour."

"DEAR SIR,—In answer to your communication, which I received yesterday at four p.m., requesting me to be present at the meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade to meet them at 11 a.m. this day to accompany them to meet Sir Hector L. Langevin, the Minister of Public Works..."

"I would have given me great pleasure to accompany these gentlemen on the important subject of a branch of the Intercolonial Railway from St. Charles to the Indian Cove, on a deep water point at Levis opposite to Quebec, had I not had a previous engagement to preside at the meeting of the Levis and Quebec and Levis Navigation Company and the Quebec and Levis Boat Company convened for a similar hour to-day."

"I need not state that the members of the district of Quebec, including myself, have never failed to urge the importance of the matter on Sir Charles Tupper, the Minister of Railways, as well as on the members of the Government."

"I have only to add in explanation that my friend Mr. Landry, M.P. for Montmagny, on this occasion, acted not only on his own behalf, but by previous arrangement on behalf of all the members of the Council of Quebec, myself included; and that the reply elicited from the Hon. Minister of Public Works, on behalf of the Hon. Minister of Railways, Sir Charles Tupper, was that the Government had no intention of building the St. Charles Branch this year, in order that the trade of Quebec, which interests the honorable member, when he puts that question, shall not suffer, the Government intends to regulate the charges on the Intercolonial Railway, between Quebec and Levis, according to the distance as if the St. Charles Branch was actually constructed."

"I have already remarked, Sir, that the mission of the recent deputation of my fellow-citizens had been assigned in time so as to have been able to contribute by my attendance to the furtherance of my objects. In fact, I am, and always have been, a supporter within the measure of my power, of the Board of Trade and every other body suggesting or desiring of advocating public works or improvements connected with the harbor of this district, and to advance our common property and the interests of our commerce. But I am also free to say that I repulse neither to be present at the meeting of the energetic or faithful discharge of my public duties, as I understand them, and in this matter in particular of the St. Charles Branch, which is the subject of my present communication. I need only refer to the following correspondence to show that as far back as April last I was before the Board of Trade, and in my capacity of Minister of Public Works I was long and earnestly laboring in my own way and to the best of my own light, for the attainment of the very object which you have in view, and which I have already said, and for which they have my hearty good wishes and the benefit, not only of my sympathy, but of all my influence I may possibly be respectively in pursuance of this correspondence, which is as follows:—"

"Hon. J. G. Blanchet, M. P., Levis, Speaker, House of Commons: DEAR SIR,—Having been in Ottawa a few weeks ago and having received from the Minister of Railways a copy of the report forwarded to the communications between the Intercolonial and Occidental Railways, he deputed me to try and find out if the property between the present Grand Trunk station and the Government property opposite the terminus of the Occidental Railway, could be put on reasonable terms, so that the Government might commence the extension from the Grand Trunk Railway to that point at once."

"I spoke to Messrs. Chabot and Davis on the subject and desired them to see you and ascertain, if something could not be done in the matter to forward this desirable work, but I have had no reply, nor heard anything since. If your people on your side of the river do not take sufficient interest in the work to push the matter, I am forced to write you as Minister of Railways that nothing can be done."

McGreevy: My DEAR SIR,—I think it would be better to wait and ascertain what action the Quebec Central and Levis and Kennebec Railway Companies are going to take this summer in relation to the terminus of those railways on the St. Lawrence. They are going to have the necessary legislation adopted next session."

COMMERCIAL. PURCHASES OF SPRUCE AND PINE.—Our correspondent "Wanderer," under date of Dec. 31, says, "that Mr. J. B. Charleston has purchased all the standing Spruce and Pine on the St. Lawrence, and the other lands bought on the river, makes the purchase of standing Spruce and Pine up to 27,000,000 feet. Both these lands are on three thousand miles from the purchaser's mill, and only from the mill to the Grand Trunk Railway one-third of a mile."

LABORING.—Reports from the St. John River district are to the effect that lumbering this year will be greatly retarded if heavy snow should set in. The men are coming out of the woods, being unable to continue longer at their work for want of snow.—St. John, N.B., Telegraph.

THE PATENT OFFICE OF CANADA.—A Year's Business.—The number of patents granted during the month of December, 1881, and during the year just closed, 1,700, or 500 more than the previous calendar year. The total number of patents granted during the year 1881, was 17,000, or 5,000 more than the year 1880. The losses were \$80,000,000 in 1881, as compared with \$75,000,000 in 1880.

BRITISH TRADE STATISTICS. LONDON, Dec. 31.—The Financial and Commercial Review, published this morning, says: "The year has been marked by a quiet, steady improvement in trade in spite of the bad weather and the heavy losses of live stock. After the first quarter of the year railway traffic returned to normal, and the improvement in the second half-year being at the rate of three to four per cent. The trade statistics are equally satisfactory. The enormous production of iron in 1880 has been exceeded in 1881. Home consumption has also increased on a large scale, and is largely on account of ship building. On the Clyde alone 100,000 tons of ships are being built. Probably 1,000,000 tons of iron are being produced in the United Kingdom, and the output of the iron and steel industry is increasing. The large number of ships being built is a sign that the nation once more possesses considerable surplus of capital available for miscellaneous investments."
