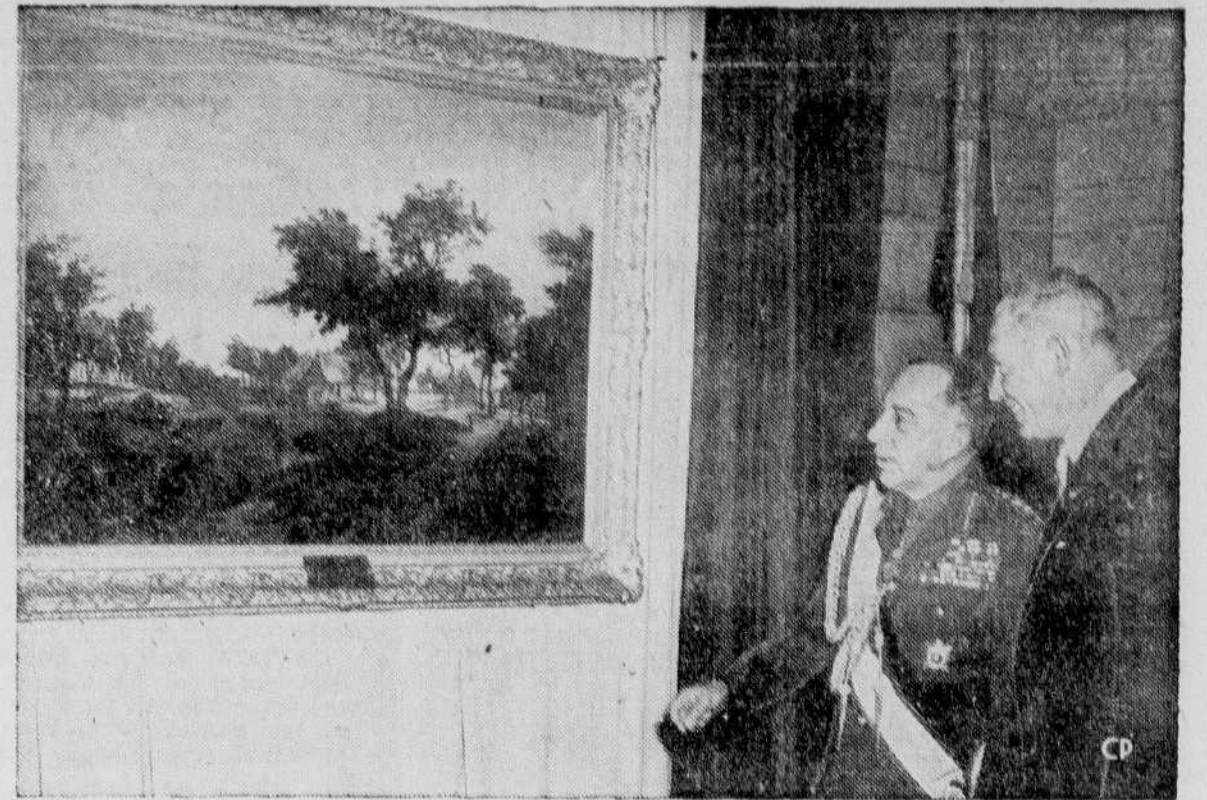

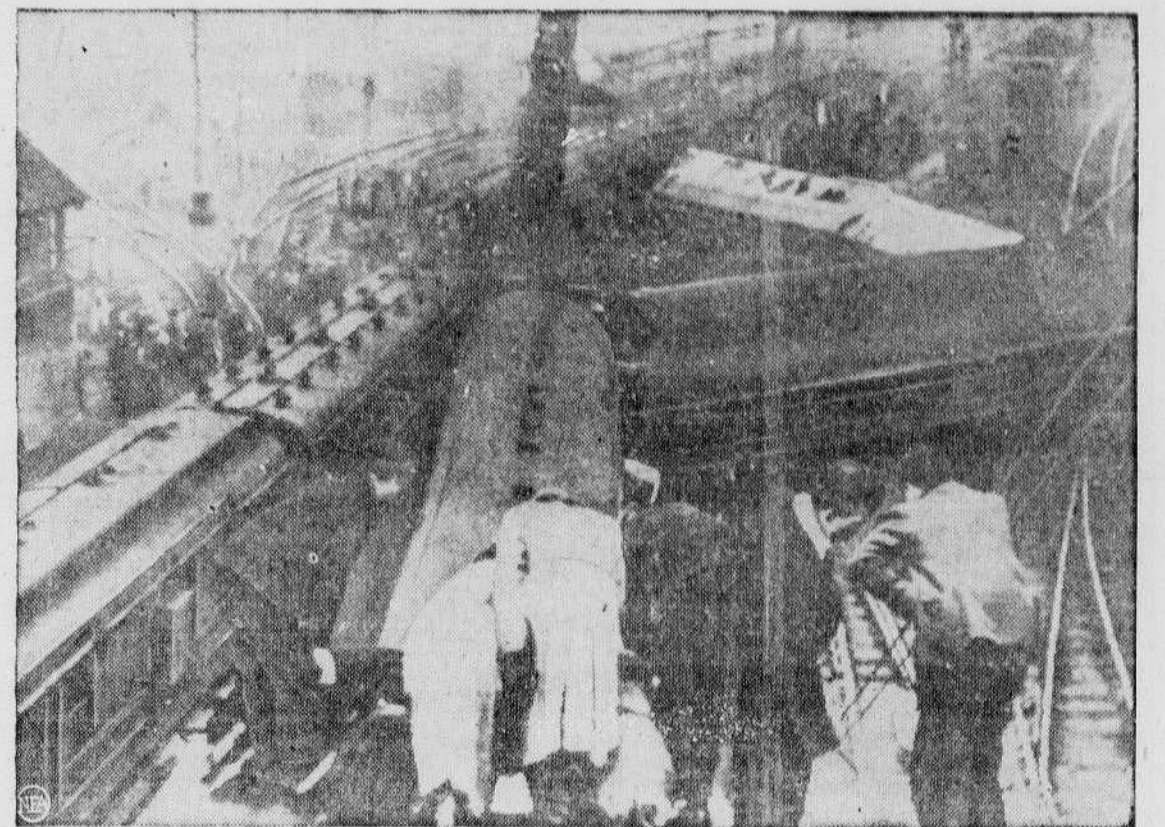

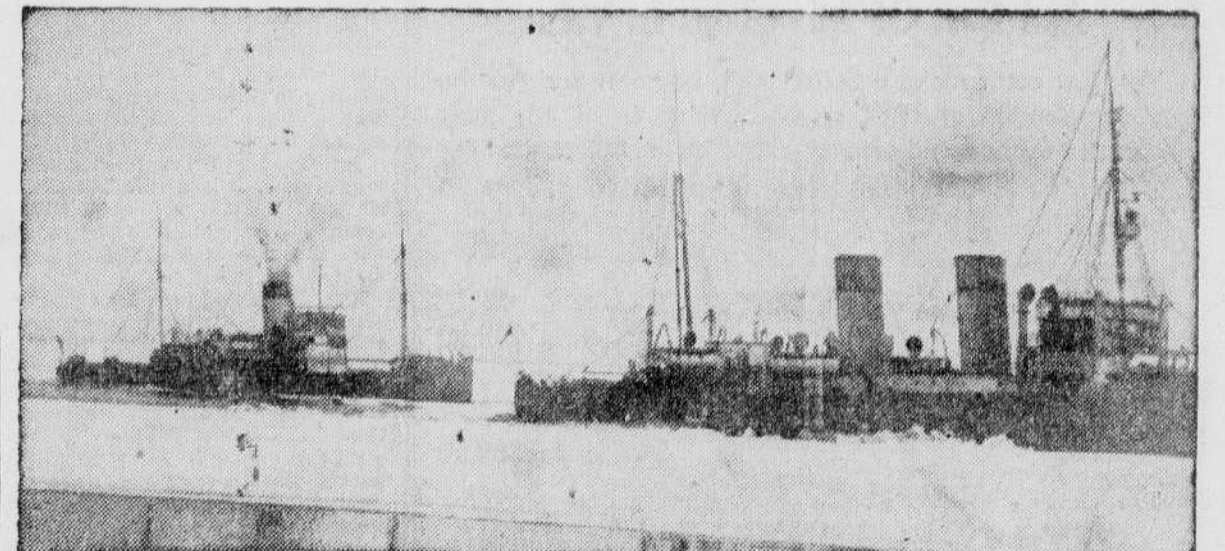

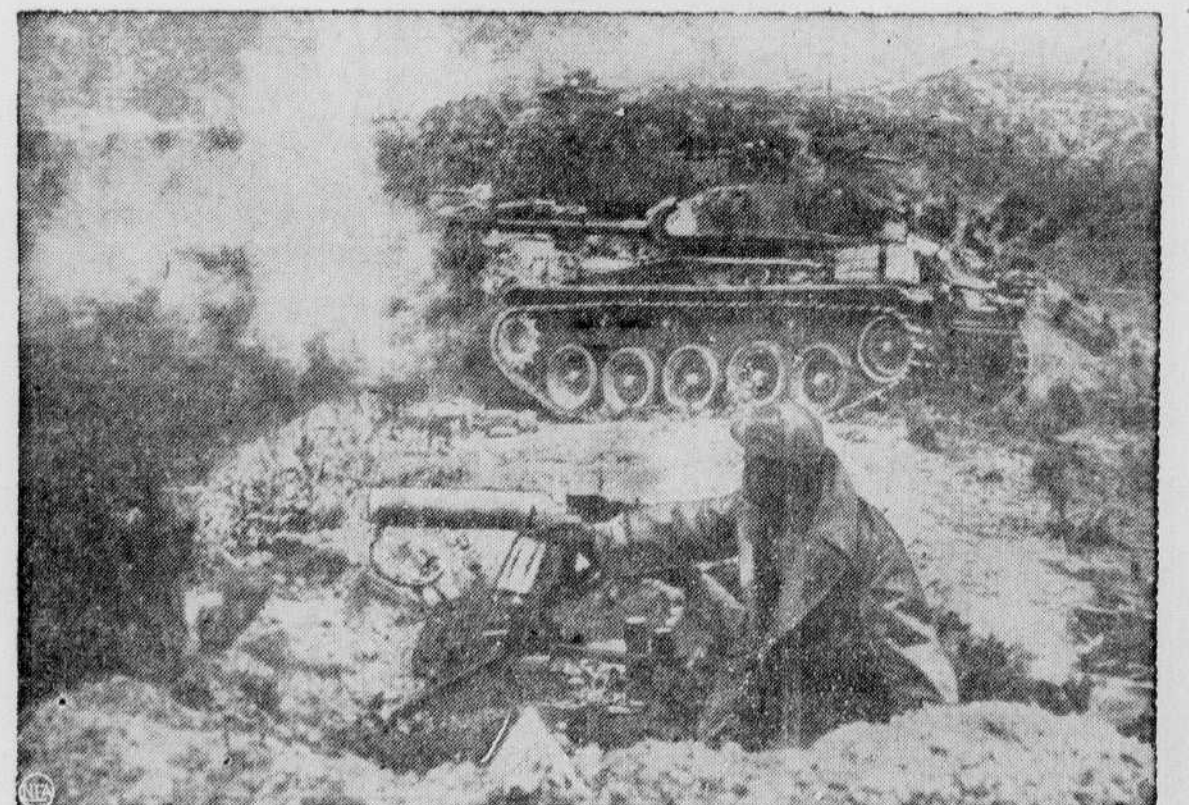

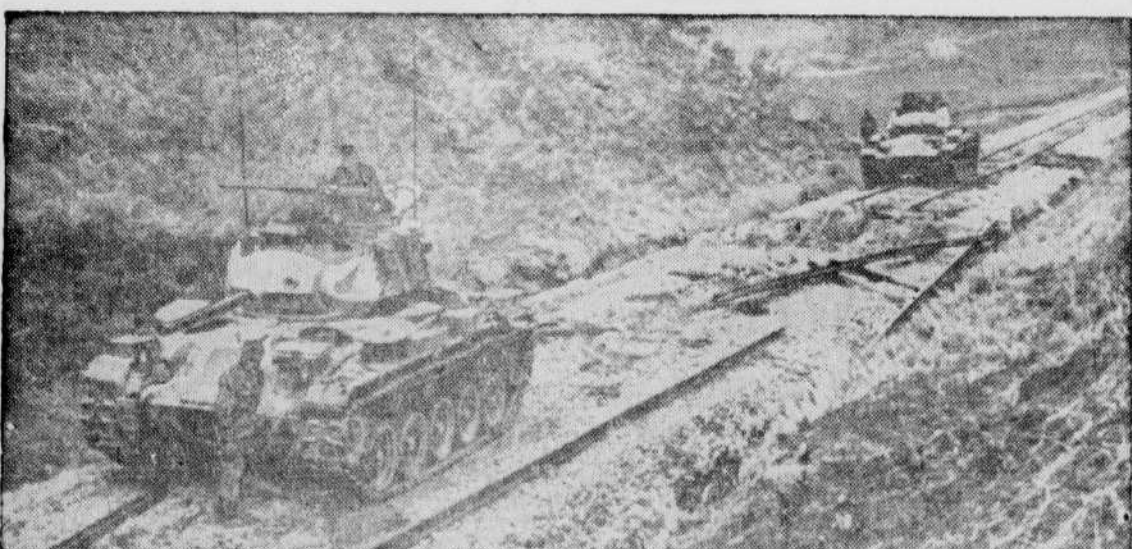

Annual reports were given of the work of the 1st Drummondville Company Girl Guides, the second Drummondville Company and the 1st Drummondville Brownie pack. Mrs. L. Doull is captain of the 1st Company. Sheila Walker is 1st lieutenant and

Mrs. Epps is second lieutenant. Captain of the second company is Mrs. J. MacPherson. Mrs. A. DeGaut is first lieutenant and Sheila Holland is second lieutenant.

Granby, March 21.—Some 80 citizens of Granby took off for a flight trip from the airport at Dorval, as guests of the Trans Canada Airlines, on March 14. This was sponsored by the Junior Board of Trade, and the guests were members of the Senior Board of Trade, Mayor P. H. Boivin and others.

The T.C.A. had two immense "North Stars" at the disposal of the Granby men and for about an hour they cruised over the Eastern Townships and particularly Granby.

The trips started with a fleet of automobiles, which left the City Hall at 8:45 a. m., and when reaching the Jacques Cartier Bridge buses took them to the Canadian Club, where they had luncheon and were welcomed by Mayor Houde, of Montreal, Representatives of the Montreal Senior and Junior Boards of Trade, were also there to meet them.

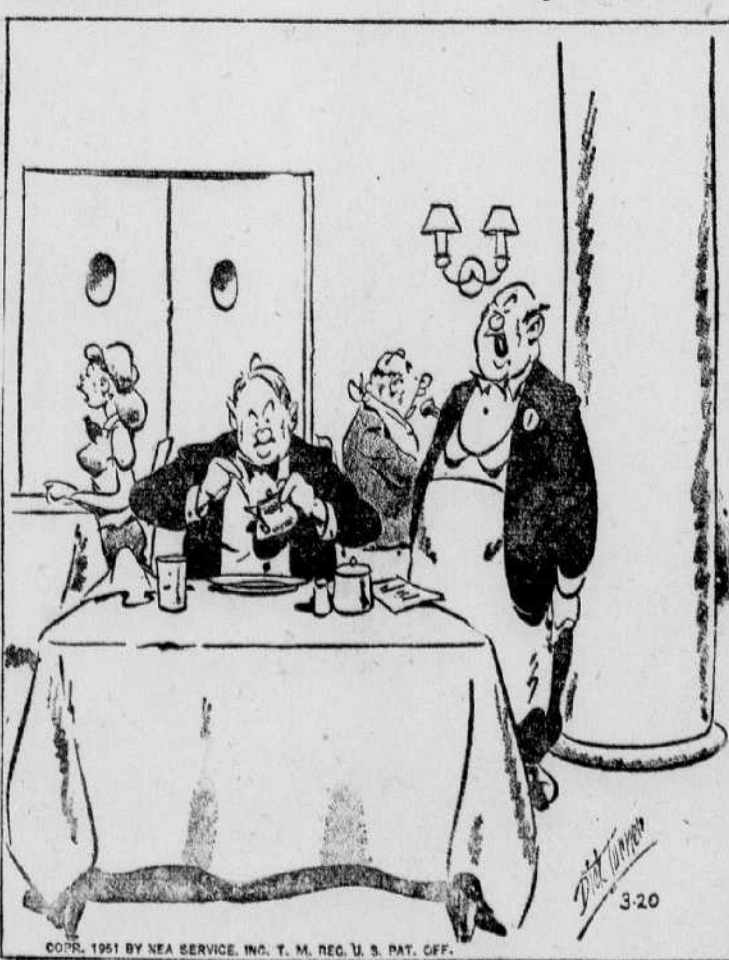

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OBITUARY

REV. ALLAN EDGAR MOUNT, OF LAKEFIELD

Bedford, March 21. — A funeral service was held in Trinity Anglican Church, Lakefield, on Tuesday afternoon, March 13, for a former rector of St. James Anglican Church, Bedford, the Rev. Allan Edgar Mount, veteran Anglican clergyman, who died on Sunday last, at his home in Lakefield, after a brief illness. He was in his eighty-seventh year. Burial was at Lakefield, where for many years, he had made his home.

Born in Bury St. Edmunds, England, on April 28, 1864, Rev. Mr. Mount came to Canada with his parents at the age of seven. He received his early education in Montreal and attended McGill University. After graduation from the Diocesan Theological College, in Montreal, he was ordained a deacon in 1894 and two years later, was elevated to the priesthood by the late Bishop W. L. Bond. He was incumbent of Lakefield from 1894 to 1899, when he was named rector at St. Andrew's East.

While rector of St. James Church, Bedford, in 1909-1910, he fell and sustained a serious spine injury. In view of this injury, he was superannuated in 1910, but continued his ministry until his death by serving as supply in a number of parishes throughout the Montreal diocese.

Establishing a permanent home at Lakefield, nine miles northeast of Lachute, he served in later years at Trinity Church there and at Boscobel, Poltmore and Beauharnois. He was the official incumbent at Lakefield from 1931 to 1935.

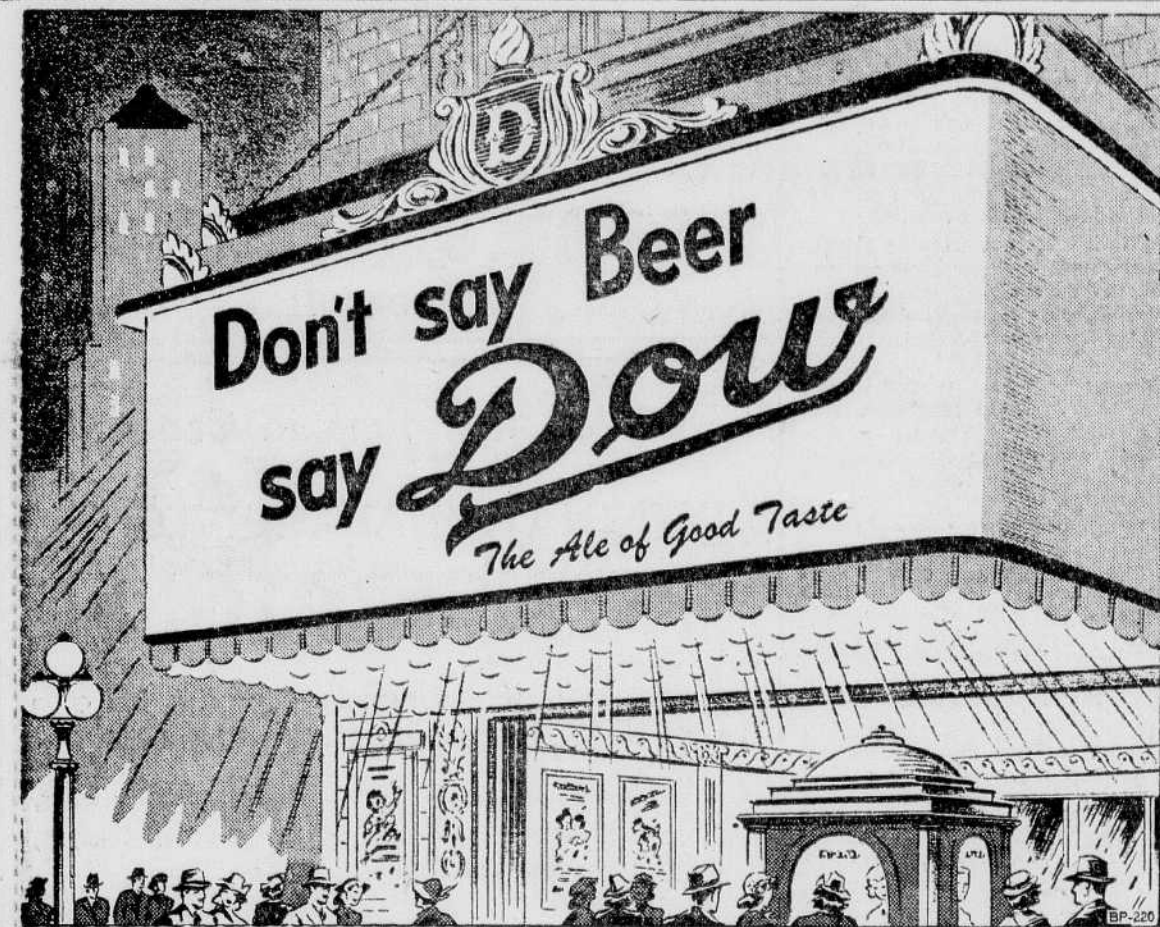

Toronto.—Lost any relatives or car keys lately?

If so, just get in touch with the War Amputations Association of Canada. Their tag services here do wonders.

An example was a Toronto man who never lost his car keys but had trouble with two small wandering nieces. He wrote to the key service which supplied two big, shiny tags with the girls' names and phone numbers. They haven't been lost since.

The main job of the service is returning lost keys. Since 1946 the business has been greatly enlarged. Tags now go out to registered car owners in Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Last year, 1,129,395 of these tags were purchased by Canadian car owners. And 1,709 sets of lost keys were returned to their owners.

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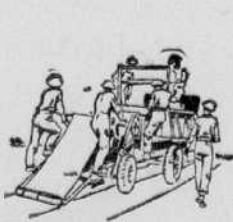

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The Doctor Says:

MORE RESEARCH IS NEEDED TO SOLVE PROBLEM OF BLINDNESS

By Edwin P. Jordan, M.D.

The appalling problem of blindness cannot be discussed too often, because much of it can be prevented. To do so requires some knowledge on the part of people generally as well as by the medical profession. Imagine all the people in a city the size of Miami, Omaha, or Providence being blind and one gets an idea of how many are involved. It has been estimated that 260,000 persons in the U. S. are blind. But this is only part of the story since each year about 22,000 more lose so much vision that they are able to see but little.

Much of this loss of ability to see could be prevented and some progress in this direction has been made, but we are still devoting too little money and time to the necessary measures. For care and services to the blind about \$125,000,000 a year is being spent; for research in blinding diseases less than \$1,000,000 and about half as much for preventive services.

Compare this with the nearly two billion dollars spent each year in the U. S. for candy and chewing gum or over eight billion for alcoholic beverages. We must certainly increase our efforts on the eyes.

What are the causes of blindness and what can be done about them? About one-fifth are the result of various kinds of infection. This is on the decrease, thanks in large part to the drops which by law go into the eyes of newborn babies. It is not unreasonable to

look to the time when infections can be entirely eliminated as a cause.

Injury is another source of blindness. Loss of vision in one eye from injury is much more common than in both. This can also be improved by avoiding dangerous practices such as the use of air rifles or fireworks and by the establishment of safety devices in industry.

Eye Diseases

Two important eye diseases, glaucoma and cataracts, are responsible for more than one-quarter of all cases. Much can be done for these, especially if treated promptly. They have been discussed in this column on other occasions. But the methods of preventing some cases of blindness are unknown — hence the need for

Kite Capers

TYPE flying of kites is good sport
for any windy spring day
whether the day falls in March,
April or May.

A zoo kite race provides ample
competition for a group. Every
contestant makes his favorite ani-
mal into the shape of a kite, using
broom straws, tissue paper, water
color and paste. The straw frame
is made first, all ends tied secure-
ly together with thread. Over this
is pasted the tissue paper which,
when dry, may be painted any
color desired. Last of all, a light-
weight tail is affixed. It is amus-
ing to see which animal leaves
the ground first, a cat, a dog, or
an elephant. The animal kite that
reaches the highest altitude wins
a prize.

Signal kites are used in summer
camps and out-of-the-way places.
A hoisted red kite could be a dan-
ger signal that signifies: help-
wanted-come-running. A green
kite might say: come-on-over-
we're-having-fun-and-want-you-
to-join-us. Two kites could de-
scribe their own code of colored kite
signals and use the sign-language
when their fancy dictates.

Have you ever set a kite loose
that contained a message? Write
your message on a postal card,
stamped, of course, and then you
tape it to the kite, the idea being
that anyone who finds the kite will
put down the location in which he
found it, write his own name and
address and mail the card to you.
Most kites do go astray, landing in
an inaccessible treetop or the middle
of a lake. But, occasionally, a
journeymen kite does get found and
the maker has the thrill of learn-
ing how far his kite traveled and
who discovered it.

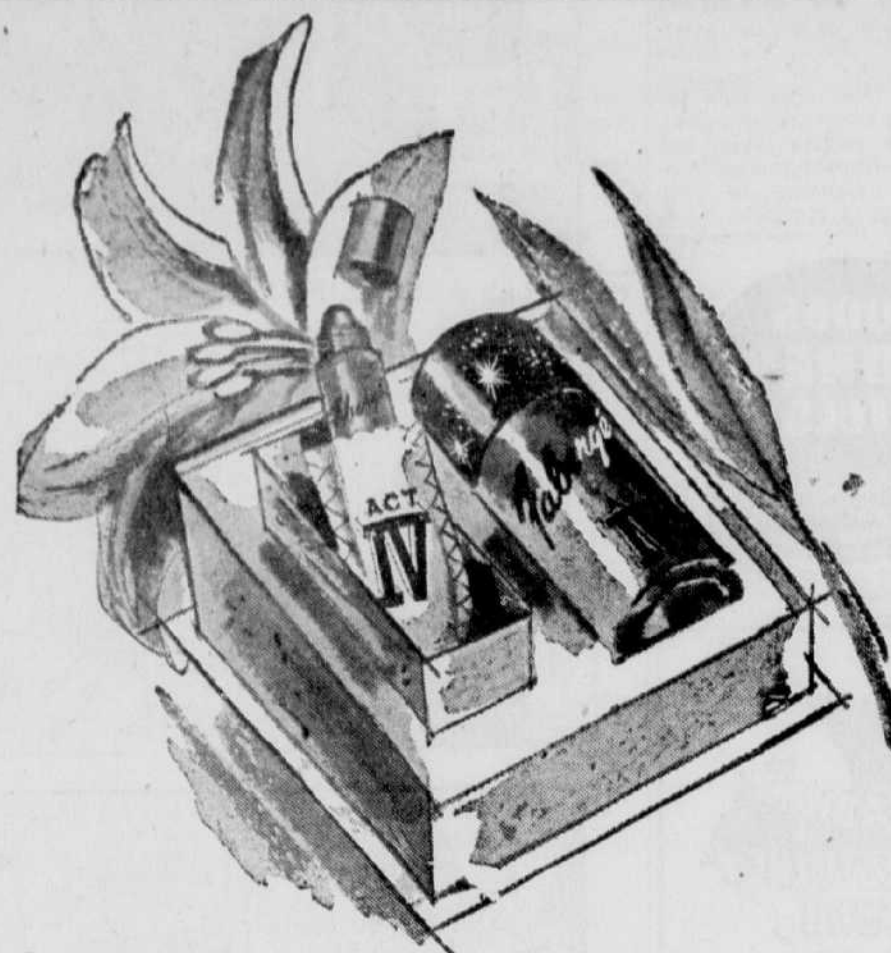
