WORLD'S WHEAT YIELD THIS YEAR EXPECTED TO SHOW BIG INCREASE

Canada's Surplus of 264,000,000 Bushels Greatest of Any Country—Primary Movement of This Year's Crop Compares Favorably With Last Year—Considerable Increase Shown in Exports of Wheat and Wheat Flour from Canada for August and September.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 18.—The Dominion Bureau of Statistics have estimated the world's wheat crop for 1930-31 at 4,470,544,000 bushels, as against 4,204,824,000 bushels last year and 4,709,304,000 bushels for 1928-29.

The estimated exportable surplus is given at 1,272,000,000 bushels, of which that of Canada (264,000,000 bushels) is the greatest of any one country. Russia's surplus is calculated at 48,000,000 bushels.

Estimated world requirements are 752,000,000 bushels or about fifty-eight per cent. of the surplus. The United Kingdom will require 224,000,000 bushels.

A considerable increase in the exports of wheat and wheat flour from Canada for the months of August and September is shown in the Bureau's report. For these two months last year, the exports totaled 13,050,873 bushels in August and 9,625,524 bushels in September. During the same two months of the current year exports were 20,461,776 and 32,121,623 bushels respectively.

According to movement by the different shipping routes, 25,825,480 bushels were billed via the United States seaboard ports and 23,867,130 bushels were cleared from Canadian seaboard ports, i.e., 15,262,445 bushels via Canadian Atlantic ports and 8,604,685 bushels from Pacific ports. The customs figures show that 31,819,891 bushels were billed to the United Kingdom, while the following countries were the next in order of importance: Netherlands, 2,488,923 bushels, Italy 2,076,865 bushels, Belgium 1,944,830 bushels and United States 1,894,694 bushels.

The primary movement of this year's crop compares favorably with last year. The quantity received at the western country elevator was 122,119,178 bushels, compared with 113,071,552 bushels for the same two months of the previous year. In addition to the foregoing 4,195,055 bushels were shipped of the 1930 crop over the loading platforms, while for the same two months in 1929, 3,660,307 bushels were moved. The shipments from the above elevators were 88,988,582 bushels.

The rail movement from the Prairie Provinces to the head of the lakes is shown to amount to 90,162,097 bushels for the two months ended September, 1930, just twice the amount for the same two months of 1929.

Lake shipments from the head of the lakes were 9,008,931 bushels, of which 90,707,533 bushels went to Buffalo and other United States lake ports. Of the balance 22,885,294 bushels moved to Georgian Bay and lower lake ports, 3,301,163 bushels to Montreal, 248,441 bushels to Quebec and 82,500 bushels to Sorel, Quebec. Western inspection for the two months was considerably higher than the same two months in 1929, being 93,271,805 bushels, and 55,885,544 bushels respectively. Of this former amount, 5,602 per cent. graded No. 3 northern and better, while 84.3 per cent. were placed in the same grades for August and September, 1929.

Revised visible supplies of Canadian wheat in Canada and the United States on September 26, 1930, were 152,210,868 bushels against 168,824,486 bushels for the same week last year.

PILOT HILL ESCAPED UNINJURED
BATAVIA, Java, Oct. 18.—Flight Lieut. C. W. Hill turned over in his aeroplane today, probably in doing so robbing himself of his opportunity to beat Bert Hinkler's fifteen and a half day record for a flight from England to Australia. Hill was not injured.

THE WEATHER

PARTLY CLOUDY AND COLD

SATISFACTORY ENDING TO DRAMA OF CALM COURAGE

Aeroplane Landed Safely in Oat Field After Neither Occupant Would Use Lone Parachute in Heavy Fog.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Two men in an aeroplane lost in a fog with only one parachute between them enacted a drama of calm courage in the face of danger, each refusing to jump and leave the other. The drama ended happily, with the plane down in an oat field and both men unhurt.

G. Allen Slater, of Long Island City, was flying from Pittsfield, Mass., here with Lucius H. Green, of Yonkers, as a passenger. When they arrived over Mitchell Field, the fog was too dense for landing.

Each man refused to take the parachute and jump. They cruised on blindly, narrowly missing several high tension wires, when the fuel was exhausted, they made a blind forced landing. The plane was damaged slightly.

INDIAN HEAD MASTER ENDS STRIKE OF HIS SCHOLARS

Caning of 183 Boys in Single Morning Said to Constitute Record for Whacking.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—A record for non stop whacking has been established by the Indian head master of a school at Mercara, in South India. A Bombay despatch to the Daily Mail said today.

In one morning the school master caned 183 boys who had quit their work and gone on a strike. Reaching their homes the boys complained to their parents, but most of their fathers and mothers gave them a second whacking.

Two of the boys went to hospital, desiring to be treated, but the surgeons gave them another caning, it was alleged. No more schoolboy strikes are expected at Mercara, it is naively added.

STINGING DEFEAT HALTS ADVANCE OF BRAZIL REVOLUTIONARY FORCE

Battle Starting Early Thursday Morning Near Itare and Lasting Several Hours Caused Many Casualties—Federals Claim Capture of Three Hundred Prisoners and Much Equipment—Rebel Policy of Massed Formation Led to Many Losses.

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 18.—Stinging defeat of revolutionary forces and sharp halt of their advance into Sao Paulo beyond Itare were indicated in stories of Federal troops returning today with prisoners from the Sao Paulo-Parana front.

Both sides suffered heavy casualties in the engagement, which began at 3 a.m. Thursday morning and continued unrelentingly for many hours. The federal forces took more than three hundred prisoners. Most of them arrived at Sao Paulo City last night by special train.

Rebel infantry and cavalry, with artillery laying down a barrage in front of them, attacked first in the dark hours before Thursday dawn along the entire Itare sector, which is a central point on the long Sao Paulo-Parana frontier, and a virtual gateway into the rich state of Sao Paulo.

The federalists withstood the first wild charge, decimating the advancing insurgents, who pushed forward in compact masses. These groups formed an excellent target for the machine guns and rifle fire, and after a while the federal artillery disabled some of the rebel guns.

With the coming of dawn Federal aeroplanes entered the fray, flying low over the rebel lines and dropping bombs. Some of the planes went much further south and bombarded, bringing up other troops for the battle. Some of the air missiles fell on Jaguara station and did great damage.

About noon the insurgent attack seemed to weaken and the rebel fire slackened. The federalists advanced for a counter-attack. There was heavy fighting over an extended period, but advice reaching here said that the federalists finally took a number of trenches, after which the rebels fled in disorder.

The rebels suffered heavily in the fighting. Their practice of advancing compactly led to virtual slaughter of many who would have escaped had the advance been in skirmish formations. In one instance the federalists had left an opening purposely in the barbed wire entanglements with which they protected their position. The rebels crowded into the opening and were mowed down unmercifully by hidden machine guns.

From prisoners captured, federal officers learned that it has been difficult to obtain provisions and ammunition, and that on this account the artillery entered action at Itare for the first time, and remained in the fighting only for a little while. The prisoners were all badly clothed, ill-fed and barefoot. Most of them being civilians of Rio

ARREST MADE IN BERT MARSHALL MURDER CASE

Austin Cassidy, Drug Addict and Gunman With Lengthy Police Record, Arrested.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 18.—Austin Cassidy shown by his lengthy police record as a drug addict and gunman, stands implicated today in the killing of William "Bert" Marshall through a confession police declare was made by him.

With a few hours of the swearing out yesterday of a warrant charging Cassidy and his ex-convict friend, John Charentzky, with the slaying of the young Ottawa athlete in the neighborhood city of Hull last Wednesday night, the two accused were in the toils. Cassidy was arrested at the home of a friend in Arnprior, some forty-five miles northwest of the Capital. Reading in the newspapers that his pal was in custody, Charentzky surrendered to police late last night.

In the alleged confession, Charentzky declares he was not a witness to the actual shooting of Marshall during a short argument which followed a trivial automobile accident. The man claims he was talking to Marshall's friend and that his back was turned on the athlete and Cassidy at the time the shot was fired. Police report Charentzky as stating Cassidy showed him a revolver a short time before the shooting.

Some hours before Charentzky's surrender, Cassidy had been lined up with a score of other men in Hull, just and picked out as the killer by Arthur Ash, of Ottawa, who was with Marshall Wednesday night. Marshall was driving Ash's car and had pulled up at a street corner to purchase potato chips from a vendor's wagon. Another car came along and Cassidy, running on the sidewalk, was during an argument over the petty mishap that the prominent young Ottawa basketball player was shot through the heart.

Cassidy is now only thirty years of age but his short span of life is dotted with more than a dozen court trials. Even as a juvenile, when but eleven years old, court appearances are shown against him. He was released from Portsmouth Penitentiary a few months ago after serving five years for two attempted drug store holdups on the same night. On that occasion he was in quest of narcotics to which he was addicted.

PREMIER BRACKEN FAVORS DEBT ADJUSTMENT BUREAU

Accepted Proposal Made by United Farmers of Manitoba.

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 18.—Proposal of the United Farmers of Manitoba that a debt adjustment bureau be formed to aid needy farmers has been accepted by Premier John Bracken, at a parley on the credit situation with farm bodies and financial institution delegates yesterday.

ALASKA OFFERS STEADY SUPPLY OF NEWSPRINT

Belief Expressed that Alaska Can Become Material Factor in Combating "Exorbitant Demands" by Foreign Manufacturers.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Alaska is looked to by newsmen of the United States as a possible source of supply. The Federal Power Commission is expected to rule shortly upon applications for licenses to establish power plants for two pulp and newsprint mills in Alaska. Backers of these projects contemplate the ultimate production of 1,000,000 tons of newsprint a year.

E. F. Heintzman, of the United States Service, holds the opinion that Alaska can become a material factor in combating "exorbitant demands" by foreign manufacturers. Southern Alaska forests, he says, can produce 1,000,000 tons a year and sustain that production.

The United States now imports two-thirds of its newsprint, mostly from Canada.

UNITED EMPIRE PARTY TO FIGHT SOUTH PADDINGTON

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Lord Beaverbrook, entirely recovered from his recent illness, is back in the political arena. He presided at a meeting last night which nominated Vice-Admiral E. A. Taylor as the United Empire Crusade Candidate in the South Paddington bye-election to oppose Sir Herbert Liddard, the Conservative candidate, who pledged his support of the Beaverbrook cause, but later succumbed to pressure from the party headquarters.

The newspaper press was severely heckled but he appeared to have lost none of his platform vigor or ability to coin a ready phrase.

NOMINATION OF CANDIDATES IN ONTARIO TODAY

People Will Select Candidates in at Least Five of Nine Seats Now Vacant in Legislature.

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 18.—Today is nomination day in the provincial constituencies scattered throughout Ontario. Candidates will be selected to contest at least five of the nine seats made vacant in the Legislature by the elevation of five former members' resignation of two members and the death of two.

While four of the newly-appointed members' cabinet are expected to be re-elected by acclamation opposition is expected to be developed in Brantford, where Hon. W. G. Martin, appointed to the newly-created portfolio of Public Welfare, will seek his return.

Following the announcement of W. E. N. Sinclair, K.C., Ontario Liberal leader, that his party would not oppose the return of the recently appointed cabinet ministers, this party has refrained from entering candidates in the ridings of Algoma, where Hon. J. W. Robb, Minister of Public Health, will seek his return; Peel, the constituency of Hon. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture; Kenneworth North, riding of Hon. E. A. Dunlop, Provincial Treasurer; York South, represented by Hon. Leopold Macaulay, Provincial Secretary, and Brantford.

In the latter riding, however, Labor has entered the fray and today will nominate either M. McEwen, former member and present director of Provincial Traffic; or Ray Mann, president of the Labor party in that city. Mr. McBride was asked to reconsider his former decision not to enter the field and will give his answer today. If he declines Mr. Mann will be chosen to oppose Mr. Martin.

Contests were likely, however, in the remaining four seats. Before nominations closed in Lanark South it was expected three candidates would be nominated for the seat rendered vacant by the death of Dr. J. A. Anderson, Conservative. The probable opponents were Edward Steadman, Conservative; Captain W. G. Ferguson, Independent-Conservative; and Richard Running, Independent.

At Nipissing, Perth South and Waterloo South straight party contests were in order. J. L. Connell, Conservative, and Norman O. Hipel, Liberal, will battle for the seat in Waterloo South, once held by Karl Homuth, Conservative. Perth South, whose former member, David Bonis, Conservative, is dead, will be contested by Charles Richardson, Conservative, and George S. Keith, Liberal. C. R. Harrison, Conservative, will oppose J. L. Macrae, Liberal, in a keen contest for the Nipissing seat left vacant by the resignation of Harry Morel, Conservative, who entered the Dominion elections.

The bye-elections' campaign will terminate in polling on Wednesday, October 29th, in those constituencies where no acclamations are recorded today.

POPULARITY OF CIGARETTES IS QUITE EVIDENT

Figures Show that More and More Cigarettes Are Being Smoked—During Periods of Business Depression Smoking Is Heavier.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The people of the United States are smoking more and more cigarettes. Last year they consumed about 1,000 per man, woman and child, but the reports for the first eight months of this year show an excess over those of the same period by 200,000,000. Benjamin D. Hill, chief of the tobacco division of the Department of Commerce, assumes that the increase will continue until the end of the year.

In times of business depression or periods of great stress, it has been the experience of the tobacco industry that consumption of cigarettes increases. Mr. Hill points out, however, that the ratio of increase in 1930 as compared with previous years is lower.

IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENT TO ADMIT ST. THOMAS MAN
ST. THOMAS, Ont., Oct. 18.—After a prolonged investigation, Nathan Woods, described as "the man without a country," has been permitted to return to his home in St. Thomas after being barred for the past month by immigration officers. Mr. Woods, who claimed that he came under the contract labor regulation.

M. F. Hepburn, M.P., received a telegram from the Department of Immigration advising him that Woods' authorities had been instructed to permit Woods to return to this city. Woods has been working in Detroit, but still maintained his home here.

KINGSFORD-SMITH AT ATAMBOO HARBOR

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Oct. 18.—A message from Koepang, East Timor, said that Wing Commander Charles Kingsford-Smith turned back from his trip across the Timor Sea to Port Darwin, Northern Australia, and had landed at Atamboe Harbor. His return to Atamboe presumably precluded his reaching Port Darwin today.

NEW PRESIDENT OF DENTAL ASSOCIATION TAKES OFFICE

Canadian Dental Association Concluded Its Annual Convention Yesterday—Dr. Faulkner, of Halifax, Elected President.

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 18.—Dr. A. W. Faulkner, of Halifax, yesterday took office as president of the Canadian Dental Association, the annual convention of which was concluded here. Dr. Phillip Hamel, of Quebec, will be the president for 1932. Dr. Faulkner succeeded Dr. M. H. Garvin, of Winnipeg. Dr. J. Stanley Bagnall, Halifax, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Plans were discussed for the participation of the Canadian Association of the International Dental Congress, to be held at Paris next year. Dr. A. E. Webster, Toronto, and Dr. Ernest Charron, Montreal, were appointed delegates to represent the Canadian body.

Committees were appointed to begin arrangements for the joint convention of the British, Canadian and Ontario Dental Associations to be held at Toronto in 1932.

FORMER FINANCE MINISTER MAY SEEK ELECTION AGAIN

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 18.—It is rumored here in reliable circles that Hon. C. A. Dunning, Minister of Finance in the King Government, will seek election to the House of Commons as the member for Russell County. It is understood that the present member, Alfred Goulet, will resign in favor of Mr. Dunning.

CHARGES OF TRAITOR HURLED AT CABINET MINISTERS BY FASCIST

Heated Debate Verges on Riot as No Confidence Measures Are Introduced in Reichstag by Fascist and Nationalist Parties—Government Spokesman Blames Fascists for Present Demoralized State of German Nation—Twelve Confidence Motions and Thirty Bills Await Discussion.

PLAN RETURN OCEAN FLIGHT IN NOVEMBER

Canadian Airmen State They Will Use Monoplane "Columbia" Again—Intend to Follow Steamer Route to Newfoundland.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Captain J. Erroll Boyd and Lieut. Harry E. Connor hope to start on a return flight across the Atlantic from Baldonnel, Ireland, about the first week in November, following the steamer route to Newfoundland.

This will be the first two-way North Atlantic flight, and the monoplane Columbia, which already has flown the Atlantic twice in three years, will be used again.

"We have great confidence in her after her splendid record," said Captain Boyd. "She is now five years old—quite an advanced age for an aeroplane—but we would rather trust her than any other for an Atlantic flight. We intend following the steamer routes, and our objective will be Newfoundland or Nova Scotia. If it seems advisable to make a more southerly course, we will do so."

"We will carry 450 gallons of gasoline and are contemplating carrying wireless on this trip, purely in case of emergency, and for transmitting purposes. We are making very careful preparations and if it does not appear advisable to attempt the flight, we will postpone it until weather conditions are more favorable."

Captain Boyd added that he hoped to come and live in London in a short time, saying that he thought it the most wonderful place in the world, and that he had made many friends here.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Appointment of a cabinet committee to cope with unemployment during the winter has been announced by President Hoover.

The group, composed of Secretaries Lamont, Davis, Wilbur, Hurley, Hyde and Mellon and Governor Meyer of the Federal Reserve Board, is to formulate and submit to Mr. Hoover plans for continuing and strengthening organization of Federal activities for increased employment.

NO SERIOUS THREAT TO CANADIAN MARKET STABILITY IN PAST WEEK

Canadian Exchanges Generally Showed Greater Resistance to Liquidation and Short Selling Than New York—In Larger Centres There is a Pronounced Disposition to Regard Future With Greater Confidence—Bank Reviews Stressed Possibility of Early Return to More Normal Conditions.

ARE SHIPPING NARCOTICS TO UNITED STATES

League of Nations Informed that All Big European Narcotic Factories at Present Appear to Be Working to Supply Illicit Traffic in U. S.

GENEVA, Oct. 18.—A report by the Austrian federal police to the League of Nations yesterday said that all the big European narcotic factories at present appeared to be working to supply the illicit narcotic traffic in the United States.

Their report was based on an extensive inquiry in European countries manufacturing narcotics. The Austrians were principally interested in discovering what was becoming of the opium products now being manufactured in Europe.

Summarizing the finds, the report concludes there is no denying one fact, and that is that the illicit traffic in narcotics puts the regular traffic in the shade.

CHARGES OF TRAITOR HURLED AT CABINET MINISTERS BY FASCIST

Heated Debate Verges on Riot as No Confidence Measures Are Introduced in Reichstag by Fascist and Nationalist Parties—Government Spokesman Blames Fascists for Present Demoralized State of German Nation—Twelve Confidence Motions and Thirty Bills Await Discussion.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—The Fascist and Nationalist Parties introduced motions of non-confidence in four ministers of the Bruening government when the Reichstag assembled today for debate on the government's declaration of policy.

Instantly the Plenary Hall was a scene of confusion. Hoegner had been delegated by his group to respond to the weary, continual harping of the opposition on Socialist weakness in respect to the Versailles Treaty. His words were greeted with furious shouts of "get out" and "French agent". One Fascist, with more lung power than the rest shouted "He's doing dirty work for the French!"

This turmoil reached its limit when, in response to incessant calls by the National Socialists, Gregor Strasser, yesterday's flaming Fascist speaker, the rumpus levelled to a dialogue between Strasser and Hoegner.

Hoegner cried: "Herr Strasser, don't provoke me or else I shall remind you of your broken pledge. In 1923 you broke your word of honor given to the Landshut police, the Landshut is a state guard body."

Strasser replied hotly "only because it was politically necessary."

A running fire between the two caused the delegates to momentarily forget that there were no less than twelve non-confidence motions against the government or its individual officers before the Reichstag and that thirty or more bills in support of the Chancellor's financial programme awaited their consideration.

The Socialist speaker sought to place upon Fascists responsibility for the economic and political woes of Germany in recent years. He indicated the fact that Germany had been subjected to unfavorable conditions in the Versailles Treaty and that these conditions had not since been ameliorated was due to the suspicion abroad of warlike tendencies in the Fascist policies. His speech also was aimed at Hitler's activities which had caused distrustful treatment in European financial quarters.

Hoegner came back at Strasser with "in other words breach of your pledged word is a political matter with you?"

"Absolutely", Strasser rejoined. "There was a chorus of socialist voices."

"We will remember that."

In the moments that followed it was a question who had the floor, with both delegates talking at once at the top of their voices. This kept the opposing sides in a state of agitation which finally grew worse when charges of accepting money from France were hurled from the Fascist benches at the Socialist Brietscheidt, who has been a friend.

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 18.—

Notwithstanding reassuring statements by bankers and other authorities that the worst phase of business depression has passed, stocks on Canadian stock markets this week displayed marked weakening tendencies.

The Canadian share list showed greater resistance to short selling and liquidation than New York, but it lacked sufficient underlying buying support to prevent the continuance of the decline. Selling, on the other hand, was not aggressive, with the result that the downward movement was accomplished in easy stages and with no serious threat to market stability.

Yet there was little evidence of definite improvement in trade and industry if the week's statistics and reports are to be looked upon as barometers. Commodity prices in general were authoritatively shown to be at the lowest levels since the end of the war. Uncertainty still exists as to the state of Canadian iron and steel production this winter, particularly in the case of companies supplying the automobile industry. Car loadings were reported at approximately ten per cent. below those for the same period of 1929, wheat continued to decline and current production statistics for iron and steel were not altogether favorable.

The Canadian stock market's reaction to these influences was, however, more reassuring than otherwise, since in the larger centres there was a pronounced disposition to regard the future with greater confidence. Nearly all current bank reviews stressed the possibility of an early return to more normal conditions, and there was a growing belief that stock values have been unduly depressed by recent large scale short selling in New York.

Highly unsettled political conditions in the Republic of Brazil were reflected in liquidation of Brazilian Traction shares in Toronto and Montreal. The traction leader, which sold a week ago at 23 3/4, dropped to 20 1/4, only to recover a part of the decline in closing sales at 23 at the end of the week.

International Nickel, fluctuating irregularly in much the same fashion as the general New York list, was typical of the interlisted group, and closed yesterday at 16 7/8 compared with 18 last week. Nickel averaged fairly active selling at the close of the week, some of which was reported to have originated among the short element in New York.

Uncertainties of the outlook for steel and automobile industries in the coming months were reflected in moderate selling of Ford of Canada "A", which sold on Friday at 19 3/4 against 20 1/2 last week. But Massey Harris developed firmness in the face of the close of the week and stood at 13 1/2 against an extreme decline to 12. The Canadian implement leader was still two points net lower for the week, however.

The annual financial statement of Hiram Walker-Gooderham and Worts issued on Friday revealed that earnings of \$1.04 a share were below those of the preceding fiscal period, and after necessary deductions fell slightly below the dividend requirement of \$1 per share a year. The distillery was reacted slightly to this news on Friday and Monday, down to 55 5/8 after recovering from a new 1930 low of 51 1/4 reached earlier in the week. Selling pressure was not severe, however.

Steels as a group were irregular throughout the week, and price changes were of little consequence. Foods also moved in mixed fashion, and the oils failed to establish a definite trend.

British American Oil, closing the week at 14 1/2 compares with 15 1/4 last week. Imperial Oil has dropped from 18 to 16 1/2 and International Petroleum at 14 1/2 compares with 16 1/2 last week.

Power and utility issues, including shares of the leading Canadian power companies, were prominent in the decline, and at the close of the week losses were shown by these issues both in Toronto and Montreal. The following address was then read by Mrs. A. Ballard, of Montreal, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cleary:

"Dear Parents: 'Once again we your children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren with many other relatives and friends are gathered here tonight at the home of our childhood to congratulate you both on the fiftieth anniversary of your marriage and to wish you many happy returns of the day. So few are given fifty years of happy married life.

"Our thoughts travel back to another night, your twenty-fifth anniversary when we asked God to bless you with good health and to spare you to celebrate your golden wedding. Tonight we ask of Him for you, dear parents, another great blessing, that you will be here with us to celebrate your diamond jubilee.

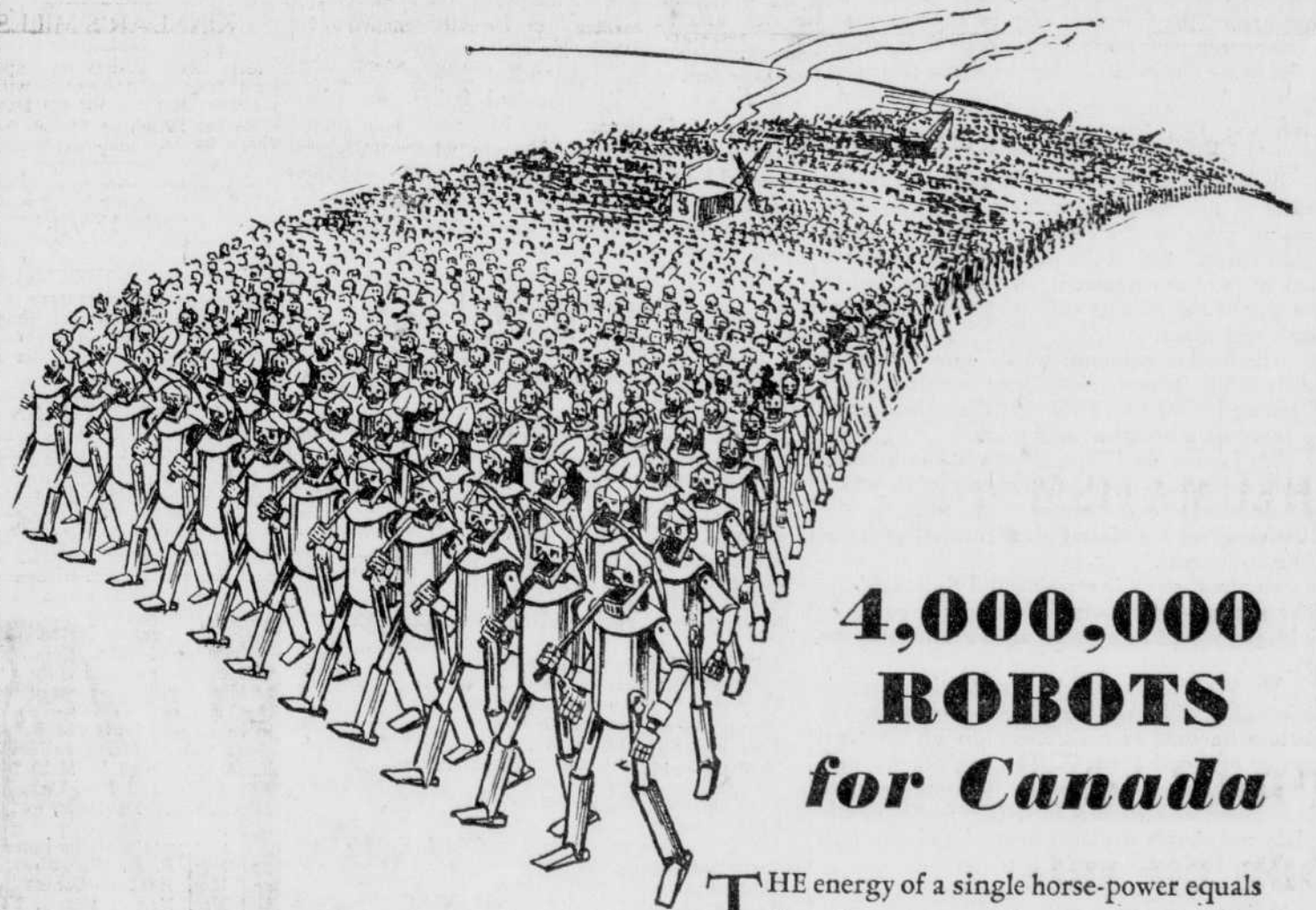

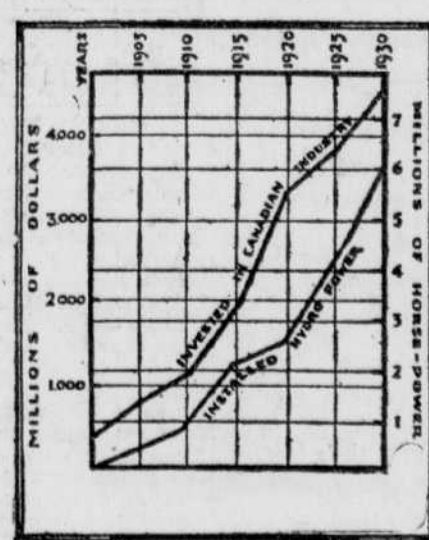

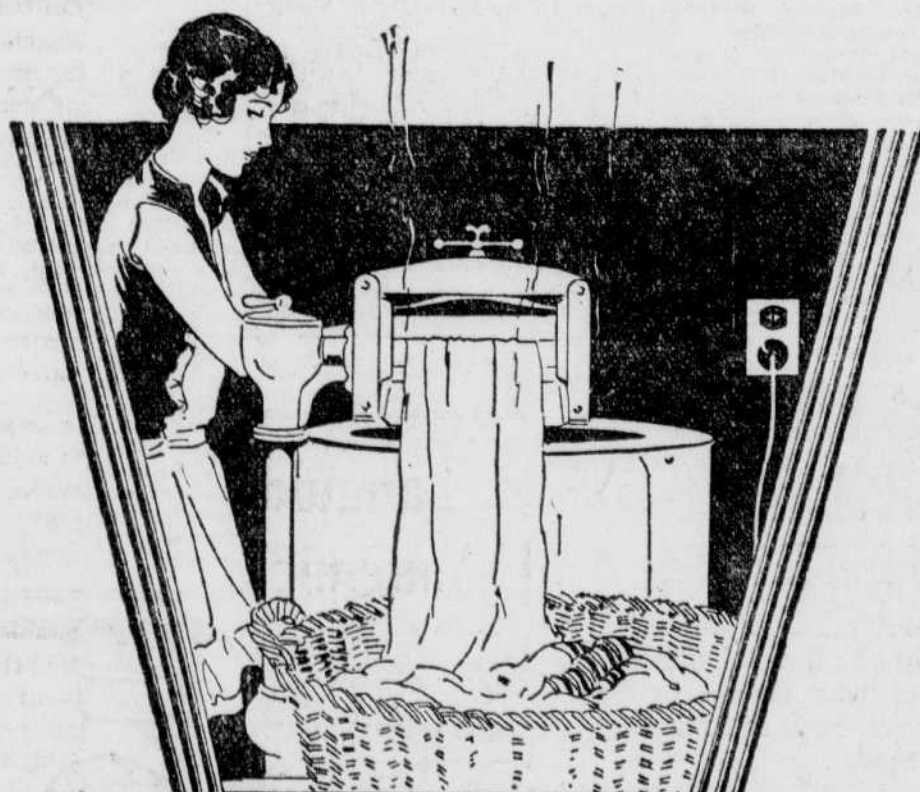

The urge to be "where you aint" and to have "what you haint" is responsible for the exodus from the farm and for the changing populations of the cities. Did we not inherit the restless spirit of our forefathers? Have we not behind us a long line of ancestors who moved away from one country to another, and who tarried not long in one place did they but see a rainbow behind the next mountain.

A MAN AMONG MEN.

The new Provincial Treasurer, Gordon W. Scott, whom we had hoped would represent some county in the heart of the Eastern Townships, will no doubt be elected in Huntingdon County early next month. Opposition to the English representative in the Quebec Cabinet could only be factious at the most, and we have had many experiences of that sort, with almost inevitable defeat.

It was a modest and diplomatic speech which Mr. Scott made on his presentation to the large gathering of Liberals at the convention held in Huntingdon. For a man who confesses that he is neither a politician nor a parliamentarian, his address was a gem of political diplomacy, and its perusal will add stature to the man, and convince Premier Taschereau that he has made a real selection of a man versed in business and in sound finance.

Modern business and modern education has developed men of a high standard of intellect, even when they decline to enter or to train for one of the professions. And in good time, with the intensive farming methods backed by the agricultural colleges the Quebec Cabinet constructors need not choose a lawyer for a Minister of Agriculture.

It is not often that a man of the world like Gordon Scott, he who had attained to a high position and who enjoyed a salary far beyond the emoluments pertaining to a Government portfolio, can be induced to forego the larger income and devote himself to public service.

Early in November, the electors of Huntingdon will have the privilege of endorsing the new Minister, who is the energetic and competent representative of the English residents of the province in the Quebec Cabinet.

Premier Taschereau respectfully complimented upon his choice of the new Provincial Treasurer. He has again shown his ability to gain the adherence of the foremost men in the province. He has proven once more his perspicuity in selecting the best men available for the work that is to be done.

COST OF THE VIADUCT.

By special request of the Record Mr. Henry Welsh, of the MacKinnon Steel Company, has prepared a sketch of a high-level bridge which could fit in with any of the three take-off locations which have been suggested. We shall be glad to have any of our readers call and examine the sketch and plans.

The bridge question, which is more than a decade old in its projection, has become more interesting by reason of the fact that Sherbrooke can now buy a bridge at half price.

We favour the Court street viaduct because it could be incorporated in another project which must ultimately come, to pass, and that is the driveway along the Magog river from King street to the St. Francis.

Montreal street is a residential thoroughfare, whilst a driveway closely following the gorge of the Magog would be a picturesque addition to the city.

Mr. Welsh says that "So far as the cost is concerned it will make no difference whether the structure be built as a continuation of Montreal street or of Court street." The engineering staff of the MacKinnon Steel Company have prepared this estimate of a viaduct forty-two feet in width, a plain and simple structure of steel and concrete.

The steel work would be:
240 feet span over river
140 feet span over railway
125 feet span over Bowen ave. \$190,000
65 feet approach spans

570 feet total length.

The concrete piers, including 3 main piers, concrete bents and end abutments, with concrete roadway and five-foot sidewalks on each side would cost 134,535

For paving, lamps, drawing and approach work and contingencies there should be set aside 33,465

This makes a total of \$400,000, which with the Federal and Provincial appropriations would mean a total cost to the city of \$200,000.

No amount has been set aside for the cost of any land expropriations, nor should any but a small sum accrue for this on the Court street plan.

So that on a forty-year amortization the cost to the city would be around \$25,000 a year, and the bridge would then be paid for.

WHO WOULD BENEFIT?

Objection has been raised that the new viaduct across the St. Francis River from Court street to East Sherbrooke would benefit the owners of land, and particularly those who might own lots on the hillside near Terrill avenue, the Eastern terminal.

To be sure it would.

All civic improvements benefit the citizens,

and oftentimes some gain more immediate vantage. The same objector might be so keenly envious of anybody making a dollar that he would have the viaduct put up a few miles down the river.

Every forty years the owner of land pays its full value in taxes. When that value is enhanced the civic treasury gets more money in taxes.

Why should any man object to an improvement for the general advantage of Sherbrooke when it is frankly admitted that the value of all land in East Sherbrooke will be enhanced by ten times the cost of the bridge. The Sherbrooke Country Club with its 400 members own the old St. Francis Golf Course, which is just across the Victoria Park from the proposed terminal. The Sherbrooke Exhibition has considerable acreage in the immediate vicinity. The hospitals would benefit.

Is there any man who is small enough or narrow enough to envy a thousand people who may be able to bring their properties closer in to the city so that their prosperity shall percolate through all the avenues of commerce?

EDITOR'S NOTE BOOK.

The shareholders of the J. S. Mitchell Company, Limited, join in congratulating George W. Murphy in the selection of two of his colleagues for distinguished public service. The President of the Company, John C. Newman, was selected by Mr. Bennett to aid in the administration of the Montreal Harbour Commission, whilst Gordon W. Scott another director and colleague in the Mitchell Company has consented to give up business for a time and devote his skill to the finances and to audits of the Provincial Treasury. So that we have two Sherbrooke business executive occupying positions high in the councils of their country. And the editor's adage comes true that the busiest man is the man who always has the most time to undertake further work.

Though we preserve inviolate the names of correspondents who may wish to write letters sub rosa, we do confess that the letter which is signed by the writer has more news interest. "Sub rosa" implies secrecy, which is not an asset. The term "under the rose" had its origin in the early ages, around 477 B.C., when the Spartans and Athenians were intriguing with Xerxes, the Persian, for the subjugation of Greece, and for the hand of the King's daughter to add to the harem of Xerxes. The secret business was transacted in a house, the roof of which was a garden or bower of roses. One would think there was such a garden on the roof of the City Hall.

The Hon. Honore Mercier, with his accustomed suavity and delightful choice of expression, was chosen to present Gordon W. Scott to the Liberal convention in Huntingdon. That there was no dissenting voice in the whole convention was no doubt due to the diplomatic manner in which the Minister of Lands and Forests presented his colleague-to-be. We have always had an admiration for Honore Mercier, the frankish youth in his college days, who has become one of the outstanding men of the province as was his distinguished father, one time Premier of Quebec. Mr. Mercier's year-round home is in Chateauguay County, where he is surrounded by a happy family, with a wife and sons and daughters, who enjoy the seigniorial atmosphere of their home on the shores of Lake St. Louis.

This afternoon at Forest Hill Cemetery, a shaft of native New Brunswick granite is to be unveiled over Carman's grave by the Premier of New Brunswick. Today's chief speaker is Sir George Foster, who was professor of classics at the university when Carman was a student there. Invocation will be pronounced by His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton, and the dedication prayer by Rev. George Telford of the United Church, while Carman's own conception of the spiritual in nature as expressed in his poem "Vestigia" will be read by Dr. H. V. B. Bridges. Dr. Theodore Goodridge Roberts, a cousin of Carman, will read a memorial poem.

A broadcast authorized by the Provincial Government, starting at 2:30 Atlantic Standard Time, will enable radio listeners across Canada to hear the unveiling ceremony.

OVER \$4,000,000 IN LAND VALUES HELP VIADUCT

Representative Citizens Sign the Petition for a High Level Viaduct to Join East and West Sherbrooke and Knit Them Together.

The proposed building of the new bridge or viaduct across the St. Francis river and the railway tracks has aroused the attention of the citizens. Already over 700 ratepayers have signed a petition urging a speedy undertaking of the work in view of the fact that advantage may now be taken of the plan with the knowledge that the viaduct can be built for half of its gross cost.

These 700 and more ratepayers represent over \$4,000,000 of the assessed value of the residential property of the city.

As Mr. W. H. Webster says, "I have met but one single ratepayer who has refused to sign." Mr. Webster, in a public-spirited way, has devoted a fortnight of his valuable time to discussing the whole project with his fellow-ratepayers.

At a future time it is proposed that the names of all who sign the petition and who join in the proposal to secure the viaduct shall be published.

Henry Welsh, the manager of the MacKinnon Steel Corporation, has prepared an outline plan of the proposed viaduct, which plan is now on exhibition in the windows of the Record office.

The estimated cost of \$400,000 he guarantees to be correct by an outspoken offer to undertake the work at that price.

The location of the take-off has not been definitely settled, but it will be from either the foot of Court street or of Montreal street. The Court street site would cost less in the long run.

The whole matter has been thoroughly discussed in these columns, and on Monday of next week a city delegation will go to Quebec to take up this and other projects with Premier Taschereau and his colleagues.

AN 'ACCIDENTAL DEATH' VERDICT WAS RENDERED

Inquest Closed Yesterday Morning at Farnham into Death of Armand Lapointe, Who Was Found Dead in Railway Yards Thursday Morning.

FARNHAM, QUE., October 17.—A verdict of "accidental death" was returned yesterday morning by a coroner's jury investigating the death of Armand Lapointe, twenty-five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Lapointe, of this place, whose body was found in the local yards of the Canadian Pacific Railway early Thursday morning.

The young man, who was employed as a spare brakeman, had gone to work as usual on the night shift Wednesday evening. He was found dead Thursday morning by fellow employees.

Evidence brought out at the inquest, which was opened Thursday morning, under the presidency of Dr. E. Jacques, district coroner, at the undertaking parlors of Mr. J. E. Brouillette, and adjourned until yesterday morning, when the verdict was rendered, pointed to the probability that the unfortunate young man was crushed between the cars of a moving train in the yards. The doctor's examination revealed that Lapointe had suffered severe internal injuries and several crushed ribs.

He is thought to have died instantly, as his watch was stopped at 4:45 o'clock, merely a few minutes before his body was found by a fellow workman.

The remains of the young man were removed to the home of his parents, with whom he resided. The funeral was held from there this morning, to St. Romuald Church.

MANUFACTURERS OF GLASS AND CONSUMERS BENEFIT FROM REDUCTION IN DUTY

Official Announcement in Canada Gazette States that Considerable Time Will Elapse Before Canada Will Be Able to Supply Demand.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 18.—The current issue of the Canada Gazette publishes an official announcement explaining that the recent reduction to its former level of the duty on glass was made in the interests of the consumers of glass and the manufacturers who utilize glass in their products. The announcement, referring to the amendments to the tariff assented to September 22, 1930, stated that "it has become apparent that considerable time will elapse before producers in Canada will be able to supply the demand, and in the meantime it is right and conducive to the public good that the ultimate consumer of this commodity and users thereof in Canadian manufacturers, should be protected."

TWO SPOTTERS FACE CHARGES OF PERJURY

Alphonse Plante and Georges Gagnon, of This City, on Trial as Result of Evidence Given in Recorder's Court in Vagrancy Case.

Two "spotters" employed to make cases Friday afternoon, were found themselves in difficulties in the Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon when the hearing of a serious charge against one of them was concluded and the trial of the second one started. Alphonse Plante and Georges Gagnon, the two men before the Court, are facing charges of perjury as an aftermath of their unsuccessful attempt to convict two local young women for accepting money.

The case against Plante started last Friday afternoon, was continued on Saturday when the evidence of an interested party now in the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital was heard, and was concluded with the evidence of the accused himself yesterday. As soon as Judge Lemay reserved his decision until next Wednesday, the charge against Gagnon was read, but before any witnesses could be heard, Mr. L. Forest, counsel for the defense, gave notice of a motion that he will submit to have the case against Gagnon dismissed. The hearing will be resumed next Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock.

The charge is preferred against the two police informers by the Crown, represented by Mr. Wilfrid Lazure.

From the evidence given during Plante's trial, on the night of March 1st, last, the two girls, accompanied by two friends, went into a local cafe. While there, according to Plante and his companion, money was offered to the complainant which she alleged to have taken. Later, a fight developed in the cafe and the police were called to the scene. After the disturbance had been quelled and the damage paid, the officers withdrew. On March 4th, the complainant and her sister were brought before Recorder Forest, who is acting as lawyer for the accused in the present cases, on a charge of vagrancy, and were acquitted. Statements made by Plante and Gagnon at the Recorder's Court were questioned by the complainant, with the result that she swore charges of perjury against the two men.

The complainant and her sister declared that they had gone to the cafe and that on entering they had seen Plante and Gagnon, but had paid no attention to them. They were both emphatic that they had not accepted any money from either of the accused.

JUDGE WHITE****Chambers Brothers' Action for
\$1,500 Promissory Note
Against E. T. Brick and Tile
Co. Upheld—Back Wages Case
Was Dismissed.**A judgment for \$1,508.75 was
rendered by Judge C. D. White yes-
terday against the Eastern Town-
ships Brick and Tile Company, of
East Angus, in favor of Chambers
Brothers, of Philadelphia. The
plaintiffs claimed \$1,500 from
the defendant company as the am-
ount of a promissory note dated
at Megantic March nineteenth,
1930, signed by the defend-
ant and payable in one month.Added to this was the interest at
seven per cent totalling \$8.75 to
date, which amount the United
States company asked the court to
order the Brick and Tile Company
to pay.An action for back wages to the
amount of \$115.50 was dismissed by
Justice White in the Superior
Court. The complainant in the ac-
tion was Albani Dionne, of Paquet-
ville, against Ernest Robidas, of
St. Malo d'Auckland. In his declar-
ation, the plaintiff alleged that he
had worked on the farm of the de-
fendant from August, 1928, until

fense, Robidas claimed that he had
"tolerated" Dionne rather than en-
gaged him to work, and that the

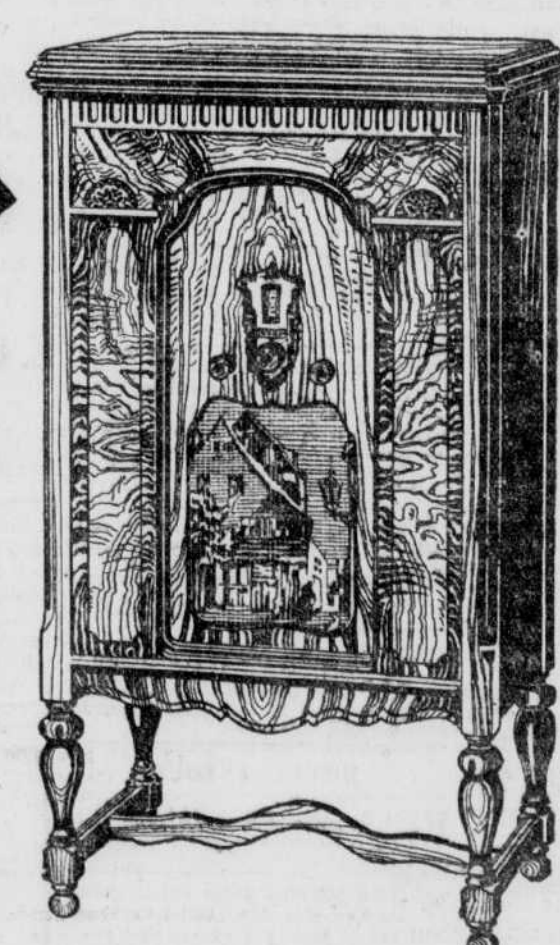

BEQUEST FOR DOG BURIAL

Attempting to Prove Insanity in Action of Former London, Ont., Man.

LONDON, Ont., Oct. 18.—The right of a testator to provide in his will for burial of his dog at a cost of \$100 will be challenged at the fall sittings before Mr. Justice Logie next week, when Mrs. Harry Windell, of Delaware Township, will seek to nullify the will of her brother, Thomas Owens, Carleton Place farmer. Mrs. Windell claims that the clause "Sport, dog, to be buried in box, \$100", and other provisions of the will reflect an unsound mind in her brother when he drew up the document. The defendants, who are the executors, and various other beneficiaries, maintain, however, that the will is regular, and they insist that Mr. Owens was capable when he made it. The executors, in a former action, asked the courts to construe a clause under which Mr. Owens left a sum of money "for the very poor".

IMPEROYAL WOMAN JUDGED
INSANE AT TIME OF MURDER

Acquittal of Mrs. Gertrude Drake for Murder of Daughter Made Short Record for Murder Trials.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 18.—After one of the shortest murder trials in the history of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, Mrs. Gertrude Drake, of Imperoyal, was yesterday found not guilty by reason of insanity at the time of the offence, or killing her five year old daughter, Gertrude, last March. Mrs. Drake will remain in custody to await the pleasure of Governor-in-Council.

Completion of the Drake trial, which was begun and completed yesterday marked the closing of the docket for the October criminal trial sittings of the Supreme Court.

The charged body of Goldie Drake was found by searchers last spring on a lonely country road on which mother and child had set out to visit a relative.

DARING AVIATORS RETURN
TO FRANCE WITH RICHES

Cheques Exceeding Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars Presented to Coste and Bellonte.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte, who sowed the seeds of daring on the eve of their departure by ocean liner for France.

At a luncheon in their honor they were presented with a cheque for \$25,000 representing the prize offered by William E. Easterwood, Jr., of Dallas, for extending the flight from Dallas to New York on to the Texas city.

Earlier they had privately received a cheque for almost twice that amount, the unexpended balance of the fund raised by the goodwill flight committee.

The presentation was made by Colonel Easterwood and Coste responded in French, telling of the receptions he and Bellonte had been given in many cities.

RALLY BEFORE ELECTION
EXPECTED

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The New York Advisory Service says: The market action of the past few days provides eloquent confirmation of the fact that large scale short selling cannot be deterred merely by leading stocks to the "short" on a flat basis, or even by charging them a premium. The bears will willingly part with any premium if they feel that they have a chance to make full points on the downside.

A man might be at the very edge of a precipice, but if no one pushes him, he can keep his footing. Of late, however, the sole province of the bears seems to be to furnish the pushing, this sounds a bit far-fetched, but literally that is what has been happening marketwise. If it were not for the bears, the pounding of the past month there would be no large blocks of distress stocks pressing for sale, nor would there be any comparable basis for the intermittently demoralized state of mind that has characterized the market since the beginning of the year.

A week ago we called to the mind of our readers that fact that, during the November election, the market last year the exchange sent out a questionnaire on short selling and that the list thereafter rallied some sixty-four points within a week, as measured by the industrial stock market averages, why not try a questionnaire again, in place of the present ineffectual and unofficial tightening of stock loans.

Might we add the additional suggestion that the exchange abolish inter-bank borrowing of stocks, compelling all loans to be made at the loan desk of the floor of the exchange. We have an idea the adoption of such a rule might materially alter the character of short selling activities. There is little to add to the suggestion, but we believe that the market will enjoy a sharp rally movement well before election day.

BROKERS' OPINIONS

J. S. Bachs and Co.—Permitting the inference that stocks have been passing from weak into stronger hands, recent loan decreases provide one of the most reassuring features in the existing market situation.

E. F. Hutton and Co.—We see no change in the market. Indications are that trading is likely to dry up even further. Here and there we can expect individual accumulation or liquidation as special situations develop.

MUCH CREDIT WAS CLAIMED BY SOCIALISTS

Reichstag Members Asked to Bear in Mind that It Was Socialists Who During War Did Most to Discourage Subversive Talk, and It Was Also Socialists Who Accomplished Liberation of Rhineland.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—Blame for Germany's adverse economic situation was laid at the door of Adolf Hitler's National Socialist followers today in the Reichstag by a Socialist spokesman when the Left Wing contingent suddenly flared up in the midst of an almost sleepy start of parliament's session.

The fascists, the Socialists charged, had, with their "wild" war-time talk of annexation and tributes, "brought upon Germany in defeat" just that kind of treatment. The speaker, Wilhelm Hoegner, asked the Reichstag member to bear in mind that it was the Socialists who, during the war, did most to discourage subversive talk and that it was the Socialists, as Nationalists after the war, who accomplished liberation of the Rhineland.

BISHOP CLAIMS MINISTER TOOK WRONG ACTION

Threat Made by Clergyman to Excommunicate Three of His Parishioners Brought Severe Reproach from Bishop of Diocese.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—A Durham clergyman, who professed to excommunicate three of his parishioners has been sharply called to order by the Bishop of Durham, Rt. Rev. Hensley Henson. The bishop has written the clergyman, Rev. A. E. Merryweather, informing him that his action was entirely unauthorized and contrary to ecclesiastical law. The bishop has requested him to publicly declare from the pulpit next Sunday that his action is null and void. Furthermore, the church warden has been instructed to report to the bishop on whether these orders have been complied with.

The dispute arose over the introduction to the church at Pelton, Durham, by Rev. Mr. Merryweather, the rector, of certain ornaments. A group of the parishioners protested to the chancellor of the diocese against these and the chancellor ordered the removal of the ornaments. Then the clergyman professed to excommunicate the trio who had represented the protesters.

LOTBINIERE, Que., Oct. 18.—Influential citizens representing the various municipalities from the town of Nicolet to Levis have been active in their requests for the construction of a branch line which would be the continuation of the old Quebec, Montreal and Southern Railway, now operated between Montreal, St. Lambert and Nicolet, but with no direct outlet to Levis and Quebec.

Municipal councils have taken the matter up and resolutions unanimously adopted by the municipalities of Beaucourt, Gentilly and St. Pierre-les-Becquets in the county of Nicolet; of Deschambault, St. Emile and Lotbiniere in the county of Lotbiniere; and "valuable suggestions" are on file concerning the opening of one of the oldest and richest farming districts lying at a short distance from the capital city of the Province of Quebec, but still without railway facilities of any kind.

To follow the lead taken by the municipalities, influential citizens representatives of those in the district met at Lotbiniere recently to elaborate a plan of closer co-operation in studying ways and means to push energetically their demands.

MISS COLLETT TO DEFEND HER 'CROWN' TODAY

Champion Will Face Miss Virginia Van Wie in Final for United States Women's Golf Title—Miss Collett Eliminated Helen Hicks.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 18.—For the second time in three years, Miss Virginia Van Wie, one of the middle west's foremost links stylists, today found herself pitted against Glenn Collett in the finals of a women's United States golf championship.

Miss Van Wie, from the Beverly Country Club, Chicago, climbed to the heights in 1928, only to be plunged to the depths by a thirteen to twelve defeat by the great Glenma, who was winning her third national title.

Two years have elapsed, during which time Miss Collett set a record by taking her fourth championship in 1929, while Miss Van Wie lost out in the second round. Now Miss Van Wie is back to challenge Miss Collett once again.

The Chicago lass yesterday withdrew and even out-putted Mrs. O. S. Hill, of Kansas City, to win two and one in the semi-finals. Mrs. Hill also lost out in the semi-finals last year.

Miss Van Wie's triumph was not as impressive as that of Miss Collett, who turned in the only par-obligating round of the four semi-finals to defeat her neighbor from Long Island, Miss Helen Hicks, five and three.

The fact that Mrs. Hill was off her game may have been something of a deciding factor in Miss Van Wie's advance to the finals, but the failure of Miss Hicks to sustain her par-passing pace apparently had nothing to do with Glenn's victory yesterday. The "Queen" was out in eighty, one under par, and finished with a potential seventy-seven, duplicating her own feat Thursday and that of Miss Hicks on Wednesday.

CREWS ANXIOUS TO COMPLETE RACE SERIES

Light Wind Yesterday Forced Schooners to Again Postpone Contest for Sir Thomas Lipton Cup.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 18.—Completion of the International Fishermen's Race series, for the Sir Thomas Lipton cup, off here, which has languished a week, today depended entirely on the weather.

Both schooners, the Gertrude L. Thebaud, of Gloucester, and Blue-rose, of Lunenburg, champion of the Canadian fleet, were ready, and their crews anxious to get the series over so that they might clear for Halifax, where another two out of three series is scheduled for the Dennis cup, emblematic of the sailing championship of the North Atlantic, and therefore of the world. Yesterday's race was called off owing to the breeze being too light to enable the schooners to complete the course within the time limit.

Before the Thebaud can depart, rough work must be done on her, and her departure may be a week later than that of the Blue-rose. It was discovered that the Gloucester schooner's masts were misstepped, that the foremast must be shifted more than two feet, and the main mast more than three feet aft. Whether the designer or the builder was responsible for the mistake was not discussed by the owners of the schooner.

Thebaud, under Captain Ben Pine, has one race to her credit, the only decisive contest sailed. One more victory would give her the current series, and her owners apparently prefer to go through with it without making a change in her rigging at so late a date.

It has been hoped that the schooners would make a race of it to Nova Scotia for the Halifax series, but Captain Angus Walters felt the expense of laying over in Gloucester a week while Thebaud shifted her spars could not be borne by himself and his crew.

Captain Charlie Johnson was expected to continue as skipper of the Gloucester boat, unless physicians permitted Captain Ben Pine to leave a Boston hospital and return to her wheel. Captain Ben is suffering with a sinus infection.

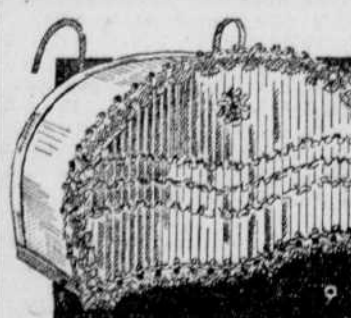

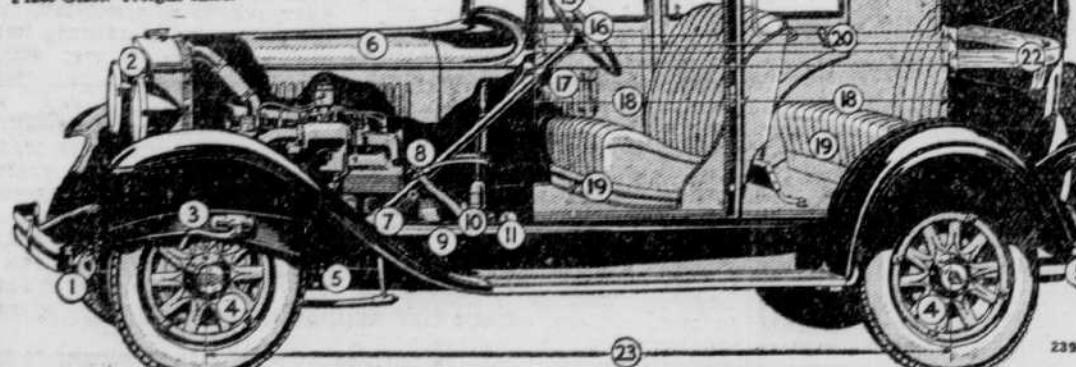
