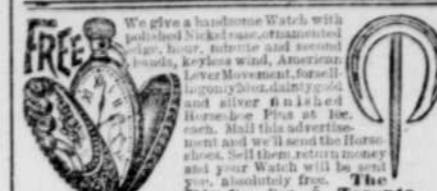

## HUNDRETH REGIMENT MAY BE REPATRIATED.

There is an impression in military circles in Ottawa although it cannot be traced to an official source, that the Imperial War Office has decided upon the repatriation of the 10th Canadian Regiment, or the Lincoln Regiment, as it is better known to day, and will establish a permanent depot for the corps at Halifax.

This virtually means that Halifax would be garrisoned with Canadian troops, but at the expense of the British authorities.

SEA FISH AT TORONTO.

A despatch from Toronto says: Fishermen from the island have reported to the fishery commissioner that a species of sea herring have made their appearance in Lake Ontario. Samples will be taken to the department for inspection. Herring have not hitherto been reported in Lake Ontario, but Fisheries Inspector Bastido thinks it quite possible that a colony of them have come up the St. Lawrence and decided to settle in the lakes.

HISTORIC CHURCH GONE.

Halifax, N. S., December 14.—The Garrison chapel, one of the historic buildings of Halifax, which since the early part of the century has been the place of worship of Her Majesty's forces, was almost completely gutted by fire this afternoon. The fire originated in the heating furnace. The loss is about \$2,000.

OVER 700,000 PILGRIMS.

The Rome correspondent of the 'Somaine Religieuse' states that the number of pilgrims who will have visited the Eternal City at the end of this jubilee year will probably exceed 700,000.

The names of the other nine were: Pilgrim's Progress, Grace Abounding, Imitation of Christ, Holy Living, and Dying, Confessions of St. Augustine, Love's Serious Call, Baxter Smith's Rest, The Pride of Devotion of Bishop Andrews, and Geo. Herbert's Poems.

The Principal's address was very instructive, and was much appreciated.
