THE SYNDICALIST IN EUROPE (Christian Science Monitor.) Some months since, in tracing in the Christian Science Monitor, the gradual development of syndicalism in France and Italy, it was pointed out that the fundamental weakness of the movement lay in what might be termed its anarchic doctrine of the abolition of the state.

At the same time it is well to recollect that, because ideas are novel and brilliant, they are not ipso facto, models of political and social wisdom. Macaulay's story of the "rope of the barn" might often be remembered with advantage. Convicted of stealing and publicly flogged, he returned to his barn and preached on the following Sunday from the text, "Thrice was I beaten with rods."

What he failed to observe, comments the historian grimly, was that no number of beatings were in themselves sufficient to make a St. Paul. Because syndicalism is new enough to have pleased the philosophers of the Aepoagus, and revolutionary enough to appeal to the theoheds of the European proletariat, it is not necessarily the promised land of labor.

"Stones of Remembrance" Subject of Morning Sermon. LIVE FOR POSTERITY AND GET AWAY FROM IDLE EASE—THE FELLOWSHIP OF SACRIFICE.

The seventy-seventh anniversary services in connection with Plymouth Congregational Church were held yesterday. The pastor, Rev. G. E. Read, preached morning and evening, and appropriate musical selections were rendered on each occasion.

After recalling that the wanderings of the children of Israel in the wilderness had lasted some 40 years, and they were soon to enter Canaan, he said in part:

"Here were the twelve stones set up to commemorate the end of the wilderness wanderings. They, the children of Israel, could look upon them and reflect upon the history of the past and remember that God was with his people—surely one of the most important things that any nation could recall in connection with its own life."

It seems impossible for us to reflect upon this incident in connection with the life of the people of Israel without recalling the fact that they had most signally failed to accomplish God's purpose when they were delivered from Egypt. I have referred to the ten crowards among the twelve spies. In every community there are men who are in some way impairing the efficiency of the organization with which they are connected, because of their failure to give their heart and soul to it.

It seems impossible for us to reflect upon this incident in connection with the life of the people of Israel without recalling the fact that they had most signally failed to accomplish God's purpose when they were delivered from Egypt. I have referred to the ten crowards among the twelve spies.

The church to-day is called upon to do the work where its lot has been cast. We dare not only look backward and forward, but we must look out upon the world with all its needs and respond to those needs, and then God will bless us as a church. There is no holier fellowship than that of sacrifice. Greece realized what that was when her brave 300 men stood at the pass of Thermopylae to guard it from the invader, and England has again and again realized it when its disciplined troops have sustained the shock of a great conflict that threatened to overwhelm them, and drag her proud banner in the dust. The church of Christ has known again and again the fellowship of sacrifice in days of trial and persecution, when men have renounced everything they held dear rather than prove unfaithful to Him. The church needs men and women who can see that the world needs sacrifice, and what the church needs in general, this church needs in particular—the stones of memorial upon which we look to-day.
