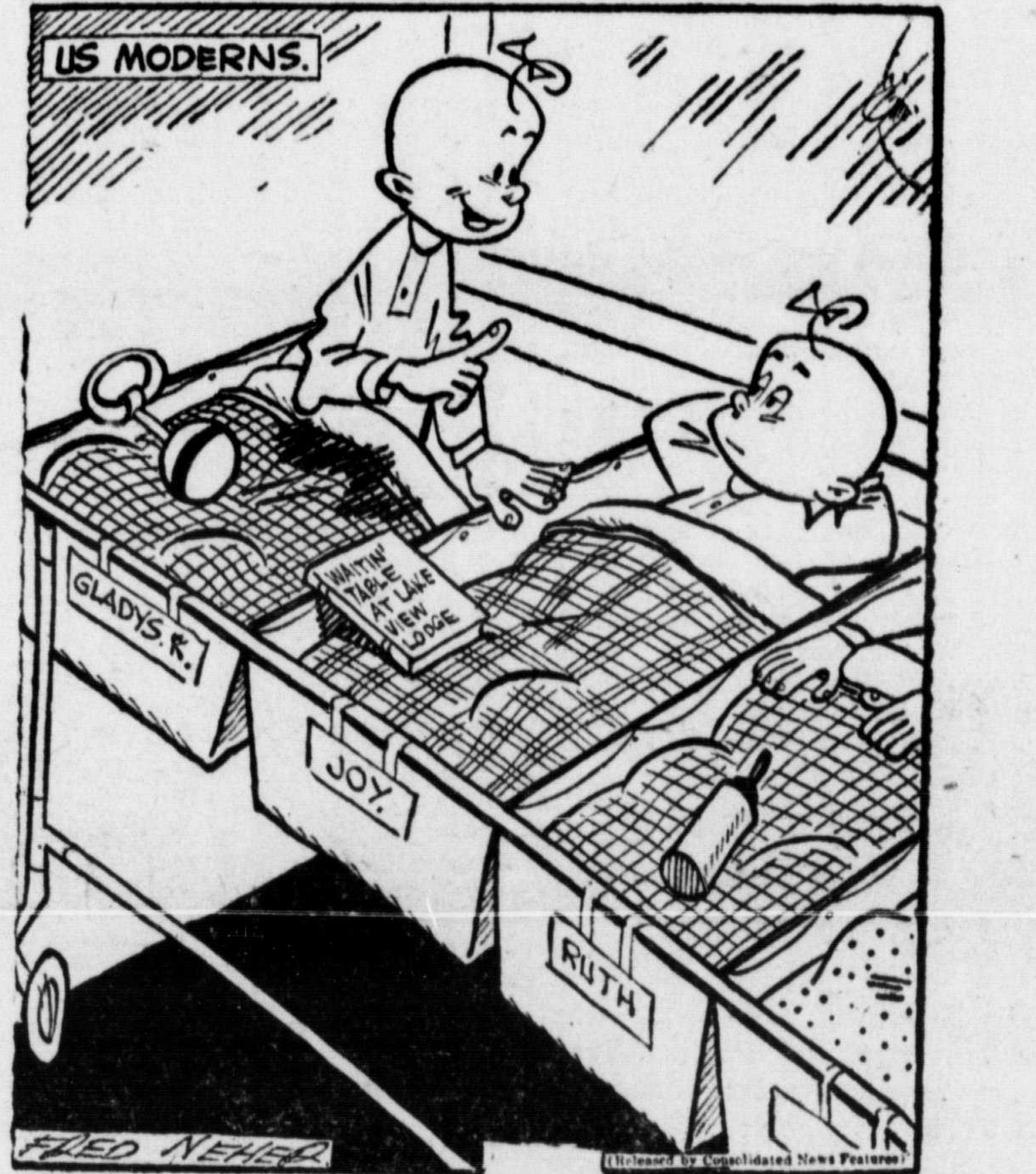

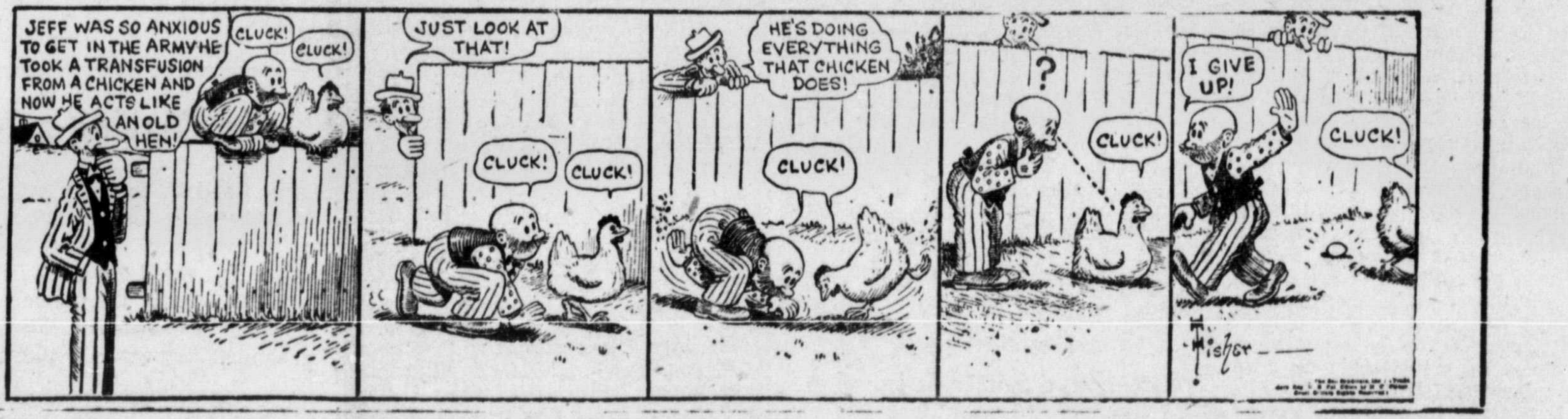

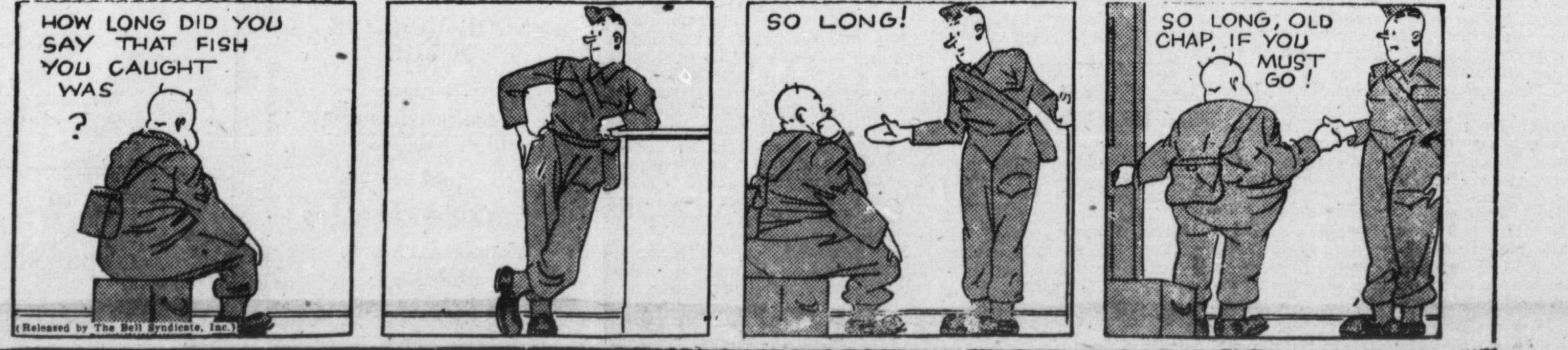

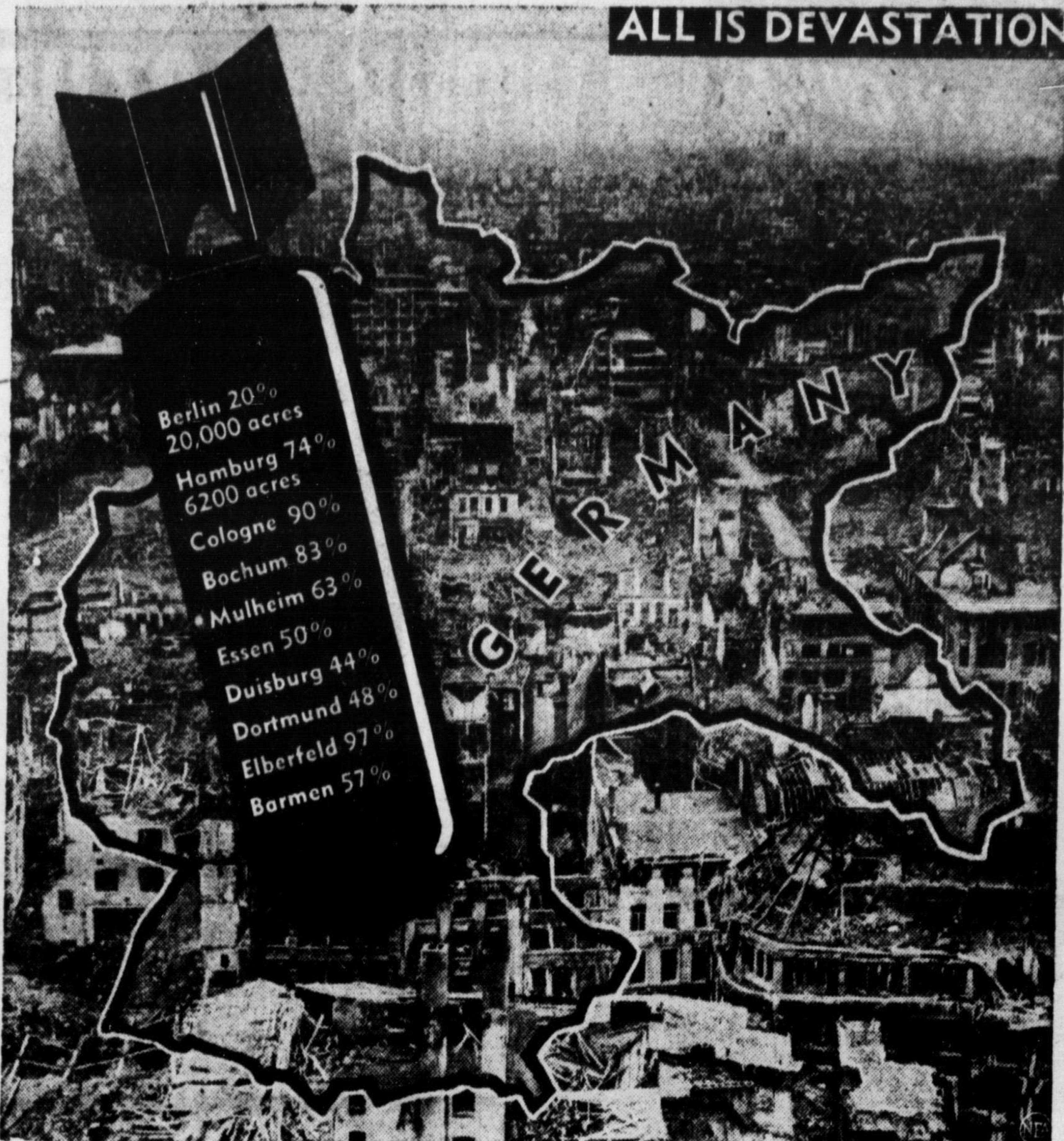

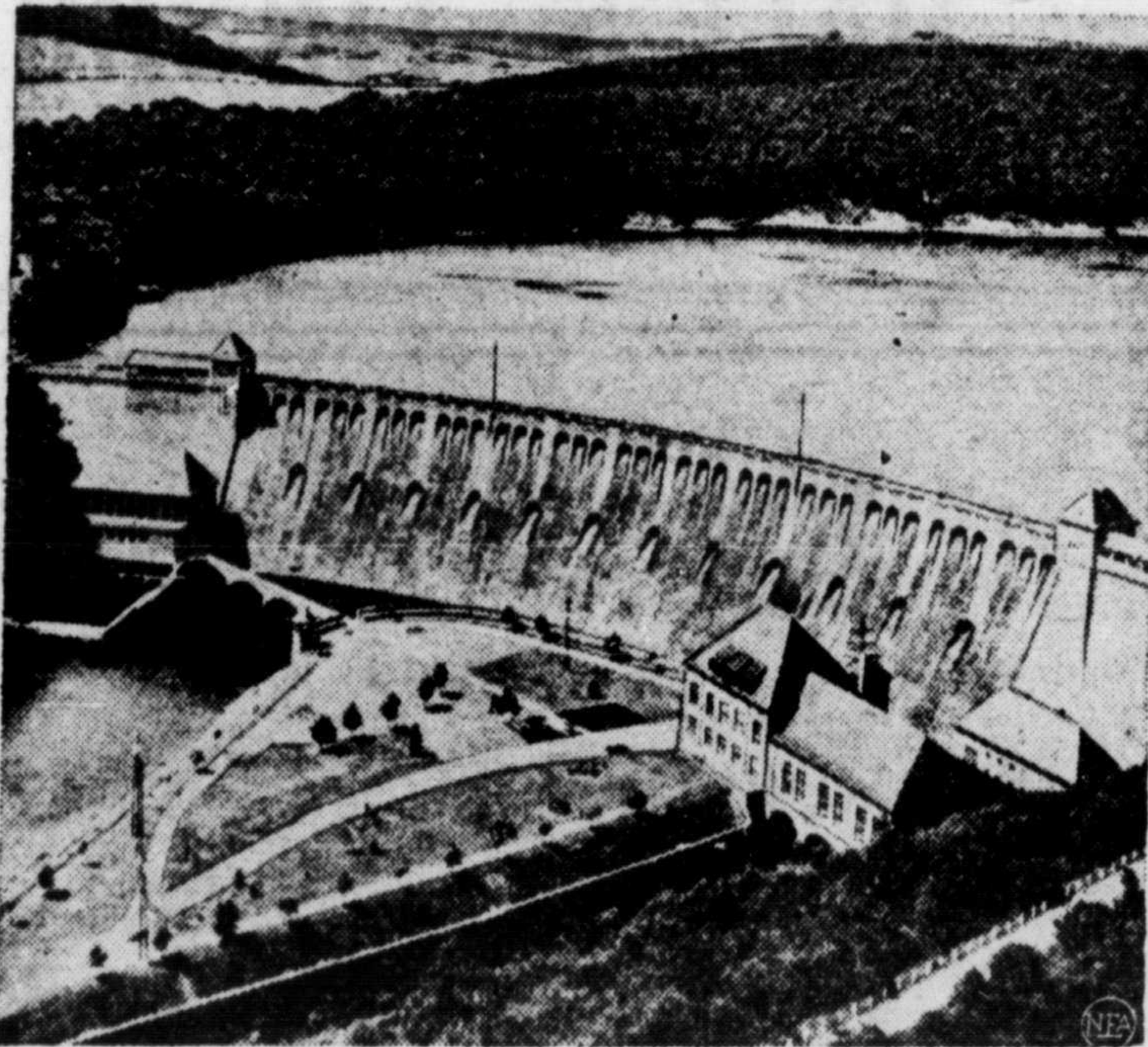
TWO AGENCY APPOINTMENTS



Brazil Fosters Poultry Improvement Program

The Brazilian-American Food Commission is fostering the development of the poultry industry in northern Brazil to meet war-expanded demand in that area for meat and eggs by armed forces and workers on strategic projects. The poultry program supplements increased production of fruits and vegetables to reduce the dependence of the area upon imported food-stuffs.

Nineteen poultry units have been established in five northern states of Brazil. Others are being added. These units soon will have more than 50,000 birds, according to reports received by the Office of the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs. Poultry specialists from the United States are working with Brazilians in the chicken-raising projects as part of a cooperative arrangement between Brazil and the United States for expansion of food output in the strategic northern areas. New poultry units are being stocked with improved strains from breeding stocks established from breeds largely imported from the United States and adapted to Brazilian conditions. Stock from these new units will be available for distribution to poultry raisers who wish to improve the quality of their flocks.

Domestic Rabbits Spend Entire Life in Hutches

The domestic rabbit spends its entire life cycle in an individual compartment called a hutch. Outdoor hutches must have solid backs and sides, and a good roof as protection against rain, storm and snow. Indoor hutches, as in the garage, barn, or outbuilding, may have wire-mesh floors of five-eighths inch mesh hardware cloth, allowing the droppings to fall to the floor. This type is usually preferred by progressive rabbitmen, since they are self-cleaning, cooler in summer, and a great aid to disease prevention. The floor space in hutches for breeding does should be 10 to 12 square feet—4 feet long and 24 to 30 inches deep. Hutch compartments for each doe range in height from 18 to 24 inches. Outdoor hutches usually have solid floors. In such case, straw or peat moss bedding is used, and each compartment must be cleaned at least twice weekly. If scrap lumber is used when possible, the cost of hutches should not exceed \$5.00 for each breeding doe, and are easily built by any saw and hammer carpenter.

Early Bombs

The bombing of Italian cities takes aerial warfare back to the region where its weapons were invented and forgotten 450 years ago. Experiments with bombs and airplanes were carried out in Italy in the decades of Columbus' voyages to America.

The 15th century inventor of aerial weapons was Leonardo da Vinci, an Italian now known as one of the world's greatest religious artists. For the same warlord who commissioned him to paint "The Last Supper," Da Vinci invented a fire-bomb; a copper core bristling with explosive rockets, embedded in burning pitch and other ingredients which released poison gas. While he was painting the quizzical smile of "Mona Lisa," he spent his spare time fashioning starched taffeta, willow rods, ox-hide thongs, and steel springs into models for a "flying machine."

Marshall Islands

The Marshall Islands are largely made up of two chains of atolls, extending northwestward from the Gilbert group in more or less parallel lines. Mili and its neighboring islet, Narik, form the southern extremity of the eastern, or Radak, chain. The name Radak means "sunrise." Given because of its geographic position, the word is also symbolic of the indicated promise of American action in this part of the world.

One of the 32 Marshall atolls, Mili comprises a roughly oblong-shaped cluster of islets and reefs surrounding a large lagoon. The lagoon is about 23 miles long and nearly 12 miles wide at its widest point. Navigable entrances into it are practically all from the north. The best channel, on the northwest, is about 250 yards across and deep enough to accommodate the largest ships;

Bolivia Noted for Highest Capital; Steamer Service

About twice as large as Texas, Bolivia has no seaport, must use rail connection with Peruvian and Chilean ports for Pacific outlet, or turn to the headwaters of the Amazon River for Atlantic contact.

Bolivia's land-locked Andean plateau, cradled two miles high between snow-capped ranges two miles higher, stirred the world's interest with its "world's highest capital, La Paz," and its "world's highest steamer service" on Lake Titicaca.

Low tropical plains to the east of the mountains make up about seven-tenths of the national domain. On the south they merge into the Gran Chaco region, scene of a recent boundary war with Paraguay.

More than half of Bolivia's 3,226,000 people are Indians, successors to one of the New World's oldest cultures. Influence of Spanish occupation endures in names and institutions. Sucre, the nominal capital, has a university founded in 1624. La Paz, biggest city, with 200,000 people, is the actual seat of government.

Letters in 37 Languages

In 37 languages, ranging from Albanian to Welsh, soldiers' dependents have supplied information or presented evidence requested by the war department office of dependency benefits, Brig. Gen. H. N. Gilbert, USA, director of the ODB, revealed.

Correspondence in the following languages has been received by the ODB: Albanian, Arabic, Armenian, Bulgarian, Chinese, Croatian, Czech, Danish, Dutch, Estonian, Finnish, Flemish, French, Gaelic, German, Greek, Hebrew, Hungarian, Italian, Japanese, Latin, Latvian, Lithuanian, Montenegrin, Norwegian, Polish, Portuguese, Rumanian, Russian, Ruthenian, Serbian, Slovak, Slovenian, Spanish, Swedish, Ukrainian, and Welsh.

Dogs of War

Many nations have made use of dogs in war. In World War I Germany used 2,500 hospital dogs on battlefields to find wounded men. At least 8,000 were found by the dogs. Accompanying stretcher bearers at night, the dogs were especially helpful. A wounded man will seek shelter from shell fire. Once he finds cover, he is likely to be overlooked, but a dog will be able to find him by scent.

Germany used many breeds of dogs, but sheep dogs were in the majority. They were all trained to distinguish between soldiers wounded, and those already dead.

Black Shank in Tobacco

Black shank, a disease of tobacco plants, kills roots quickly and the entire lower part of the stalk becomes blackened up to a point several inches above the ground. Sore shin, or rotten stalk, differs from this in that the base of the stalk and the roots usually remain healthy for a longer time, thus confining the disease primarily to a blackened section of the stalk at and for some distance above the ground. Black shank usually kills out practically all the plants in contaminated spots in the field, while sore shin kills out scattered plants throughout the field.

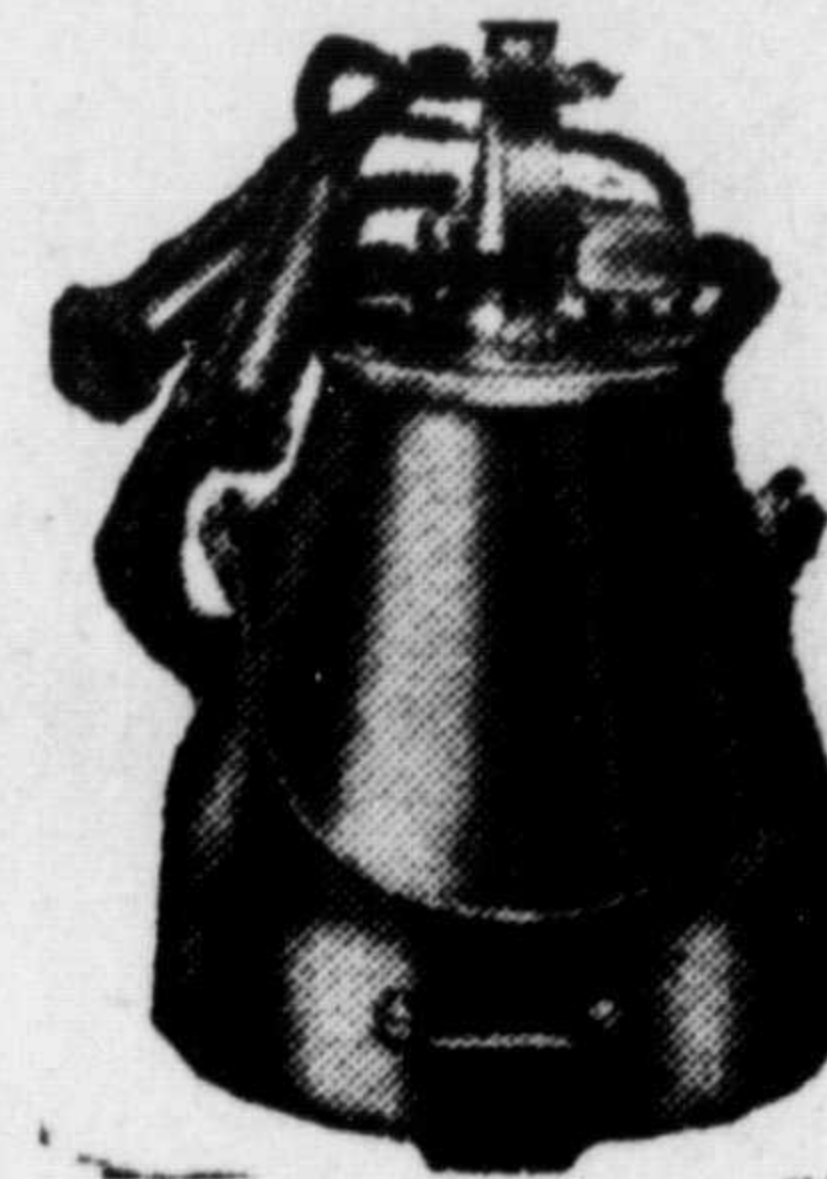

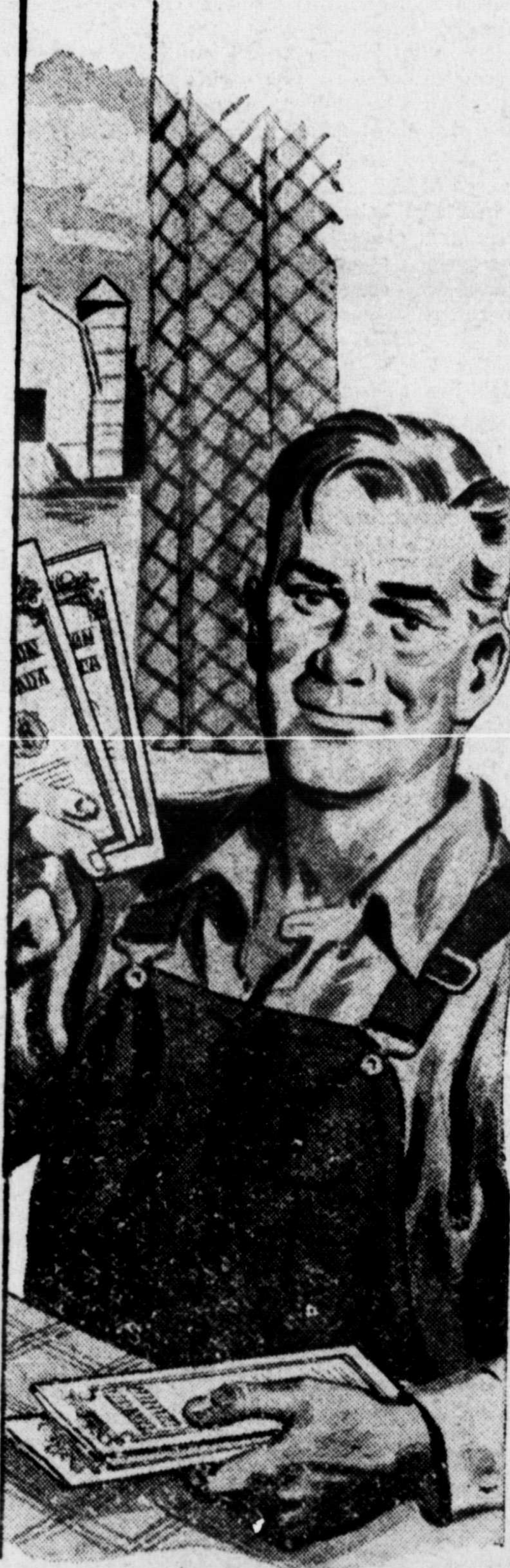

PROCLAMATION

In accordance with the plans of the V-Day Committee, I hereby proclaim a Civic Holiday on the day that hostilities in Europe cease and also the following day.

The Citizens of Shawville are requested to follow out the desire of the Council in a proper and fitting manner in regard to Holiday and Celebrations planned for the cessation of hostilities in Europe.

The V-Day Committee request the following programme to be adhered to for the observance of the momentous event:—

1—On the day that hostilities cease all stores, shops, factories, schools and places of business will close as laid down in the Proclamation by the Mayor.

2—A parade will be held at three o'clock in the afternoon, providing that word reaches us before noon that day. If, however, word reaches us in the afternoon, then the parade will be observed the following day at three o'clock in the afternoon.

3—All citizens who own cars are requested to decorate the same in an attractive manner, and so add to the splendour of the parade.

4—The parade will form at the School ground and will proceed to the Memorial Park for Service of Praise and Thanksgiving to Almighty God. All Clergymen, members of Council, Veterans of this war, and representatives of various bodies are requested to be on or around the platform for that service. The Mayor will preside.

5—All the local Churches are asked to regulate the time, manner, and place of their own services. Service will be held in each local Church. Listen to the announcement concerning the same from each local Pulpit.

We pray that the War will soon come to a close, and on the day of celebration we call upon all citizens to be sober, be vigilant, and be thankful.
