Confederation placed Sir JOHN A. MACDONALD at the head of a powerful Government, backed by an unexampled majority, and the construction of the Intercolonial line of railroad has furnished him with a patronage sufficient to keep the incongruous party together.

It is stated that the whole matter was talked over thoroughly, and that the comparison of views among the Cabinet members developed a strong feeling favorable to giving the moral support of our Government to the struggling patriots of Cuba.
