The winners had nine hits as compared to Shawville's three safeties of Jerry Hearty, who pitched all the way to pick up the victory. Hearty struck out five and walked one. The losing pitcher was Bryan Murray, who went 3 2/3 innings, giving up seven runs on eight hits, with 3 walks and one strikeout. The Tigers settled down to play steadier ball as Harv Sweetman for one inning and Glenn Morrison for three frames came on to shut out the winners the rest of the way. Sweetman retired four batters before arm trouble forced him off the mound. On the brighter side, the return to action of left hander Morrison after an early-season arm injury was good news to the defending champion Tigers.

Chairman Mrs. Robina Richardson introduced the recreation leader, Garry Paul Nesseth, who had been engaged to supervise the play program. Garry is 22, lives in Renfrew, graduated from Ottawa Teachers College, will teach grade seven and direct athletics in Toronto in September, earned his leader's crest at Ontario Athletic Training Camp at Couchiching, has come first in his class in every music festival he ever entered (Pembroke, Renfrew, Ottawa), worked for the Recreation Commissions at North Bay and Mattawa and was in-

Guard at the beach in Renfrew.

Garry will be staying at Hubert Dale's during the week days. The cost of his room and board is being undertaken by the Commission as well as his salary. With \$150 from Hilton Mines, \$100 from the Council and \$50 each from the Rotary and Lions Club, the Commission feels confident that other groups will add sufficient to this to cover costs of the entire program.

This situation has come about quietly and by the efforts of a small group of people but it has the support, both moral and real, of just about everyone here.

The management of Hilton Mines, recognizing the importance of this project, was the first to contribute financially. Then came in fast succession the Shawville Council, the Shawville Lions Club and the Shawville Rotary Club. Support from other organizations is pledged and others which haven't been heard from probably will be heard from this week. Individual contributions will also be welcomed by Chairman Mrs. Robina Richardson.

And just as important as money contributions are the articles being collected for the use of the recreation program.

Supervised by a trained recreation leader, the children will be engaging in many types of activities. Some of the items needed are here listed so that our readers can see what they might contribute: modelling clay, paint and brushes, softballs and bats, a volley ball, a play ball, crayons, checkerboards and checkers, jacks, blunt ended scissors, horseshoes for tossing, picnic type tables, odd rolls of wall paper.

A set of swings and a slide have been offered by two Shawville families already and it is possible that other such playground equipment might be contributed.

The grounds belonging to the school board adjacent to the Rotary Pool are being graded and cleared for the use of the recreation schedule. Lumber has been offered for the building of sand tables and registration cards and daily report sheets are being donated.

The cooperation of the town is firmly behind the new leader and all that is needed now is the children. Registration starts at 9:30 Monday July 4. Parents must sign the registration cards but there is no fee attached.
