## Fraud count brings man back here

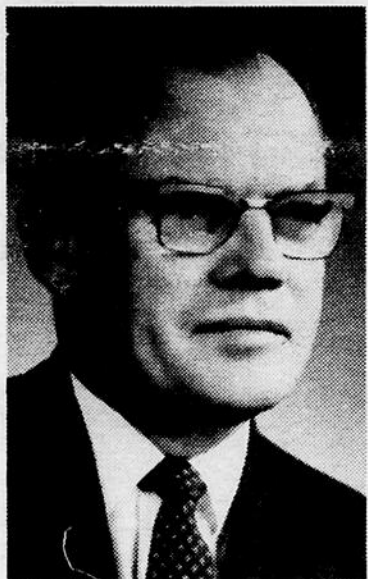

By coincidence, the Westmount Police blotter has been dotted with an increased frequency of cheque frauds over the past week, local merchants being the victims.

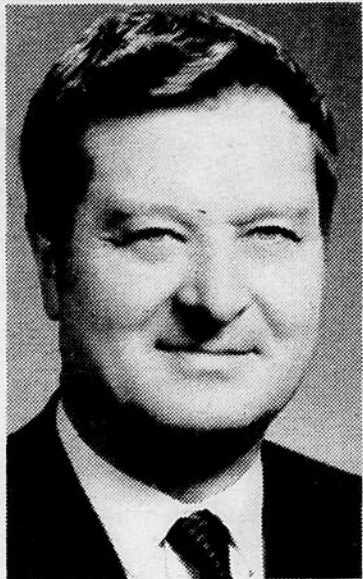

## \$3,500 damage early morning in collision

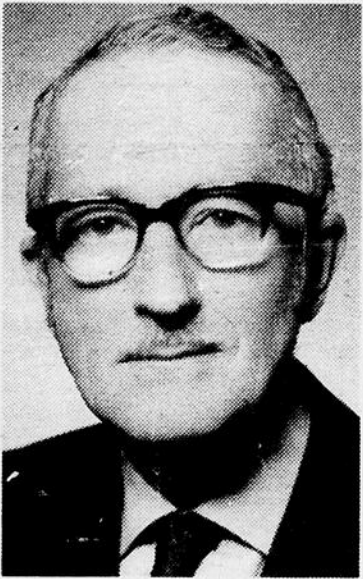

## Quiet council meeting seen; by-laws awaited

A less than exciting March statutory meeting of Westmount City Council is in prospect for Monday evening.

It is unlikely that two by-laws, for which notices of motion were given at last week's mid-month meeting, will be ready to be proceeded with. One is to implement the city's own public housing scheme and the other a revised loan by-law, potentially up to \$4,313,300, to enable the city to "go it alone" in its urban renewal program.

The housing awaits considerable ground work, gathering updated information under Quebec Housing Corporation requirements.

The renewal business is basically simple arithmetic — adding the federal and provincial grants, now foregone, to the city's share and subtracting the St. Antoine street portion of the project over

# Like 30s City nips work

With spring officially less than a month away, Westmount will be going into the season of capital works with the smallest program since the depression days of the 1930s.

City Manager Noman Dawe told The Examiner this week that only \$276,600 is budgetted for capital items in 1970, as part of the drive to hold expenses as tight as possible. Last year there was approximately \$900,000 spent in this category.

Not only is the city not going on a buying splurge. It is expected that the regular appropriations of various city departments will not allow for much in the way of public works or expansion of services. Normal street maintenance will be carried out, but on the same or even less of a nominal scale as seen last summer. No major work on thoroughfares is planned, he said.

There is one area, however, which could take up the slack for city works employees — but Mr. Dawe emphasized that no decisions have yet been taken.

As the result of last week's decision by city council not to enter into a rigid contract at this time with the Quebec Housing Corporation to implement Westmount's urban renewal scheme — which continues in law and in existence — there is a possibility that some of the renewal work planned in that program might be undertaken.

The central portion of the scheme, St. Antoine street, is of course off for the present, at least until a major developer appears. However, the renewal program called for a general rehabilitation of many other streets in the zone south of St. Catherine street. Council may decide to implement some of this work this year.

Unless it does, there is some very real prospect of layoffs in the months ahead for works employees once the preoccupations of winter's snow are past.

which the city broke off contract talks with QHC — but the implications are such that city council may want to study the program further before seeking authority for an enlarged sum under present economic conditions.

Mayor Peter M. McEntyre is expected to render a report on Tuesday's first regular meeting of the Montreal Urban Community council, which had a hefty agenda thrown at it by the powerful executive committee. Many of the suburban mayors, including Mr. McEntyre, are known not to be too happy about the prospect of becoming rubber stamps for the executive, especially when regular meetings of the Community's council are scheduled for only once every two months. They well may wish to question proposed steps and even

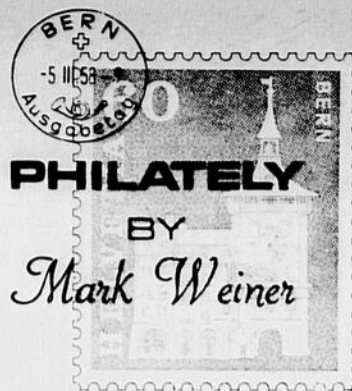

## Coin, stamp show set for March 8

The next regular monthly Mount Royal Coin and Stamp Show will be held on Sunday March 8, from 10 am to 10 pm in the Sheraton Room of the Sheraton Mount Royal Hotel. Dealers from all over Canada will be present to exhibit, buy, sell and exchange.

U.S. currency consisting of 17 stamps in value from the 1/2c - \$5, depicting ships from the 16th century to date, familiar to the islands. The stamps were printed by multicolor lithography on paper with the C.A. Block watermark. It is a very attractive looking set; however, my only complaint is the face value of over \$12. This puts it out of the reach of many of our younger collectors.

St. Lucia. A new definitive series consisting of 14 stamps illustrating many of the facets of the island's popular tourist attractions, was issued Feb. 1. The stamps range in value from 1c - \$5 and were printed by multicolor litho process. Considering that the values are in West Indian currency, this gives the set a face



value of approximately \$6 U.S.

St. Christopher - Nevis - Anguilla: "Piracy" is the theme for a new definitive series issued Feb. 1. The 15 stamps, ranging in value from 1/2c - \$5 W.I. currency, were printed by multicolor lithography on paper with the C.A. Block watermark.

Papua & New Guinea: Four



milestones spanning 3,000 years of Papua and New Guinea's historic past are depicted on the four stamps, National Heritage Stamp Issue, released Feb. 11. The stamps were printed by multicolor photogravure by Helio Courvoisier S.A., and I must state that better judgment has been shown with this issue by keeping the face value within a modest range.

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## We Say

### Single police phone would be mistake

Adoption of a single police phone number for Montreal Urban Community municipalities may, to some, appear logical.

But for a number of the cities and towns surrounding the big central city it could prove one of the unhappier consequences of metropolitan integration.

Westmount is a prime example of a prospective loser in the scheme.

Here we take great pride and comfort in the total "public safety" concept of both our police and fire protection. No incident or fear relayed to our public safety department is passed over as unimportant.

What's more, the relatively compact size of Westmount, in both area and population, assures our police and fireman having an intimate knowledge of their territory and the people they protect.

It would not be too bad if the idea of a single island-wide emergency number was to be merely a switchboard operation - though even this would interpose another voice and delay, however small, in a Westmount citizen's call getting through to a Westmount officer.

However, as we understand it the plan amounts to a total integration of communications. And we think that is for the birds.

Not to take away from Montreal's police and fire efficiency. It's just that we know ours - and some of our neighboring cities' - is a whole lot better.

It is the seeming little attentions given our citizens which are particularly appreciated and valuable. If Montreal's norms are to be applied, we shall no longer get the service we now enjoy.

In the name of efficiency?

No. Empire-building.

Mayor McEntyre, as our representative on the Community council, will have many questions to ask concerning barely-consulted plans and actions of the executive com-

mittee, the security council and other agencies of the Community as they proliferate.

This emergency phone bit deserves his highest priority.

### Prejudice wanes with affluence

Prejudice, it has been asserted, has no preserves.

It is found everywhere.

Yet we have another, perhaps unpopular, view for this, 1970 Botherhood Week. The Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, its sponsors, may not agree. Nor may some of our readers.

Stated briefly, our minor Examiner Law states: Prejudice tends to decrease with affluence.

We realize that this statement may class us by some as a minor, perhaps a major, bigot: "prejudice of money or wealth," we can hear it said.

Lest we retort about prejudice of the underdog, please hear our premise.

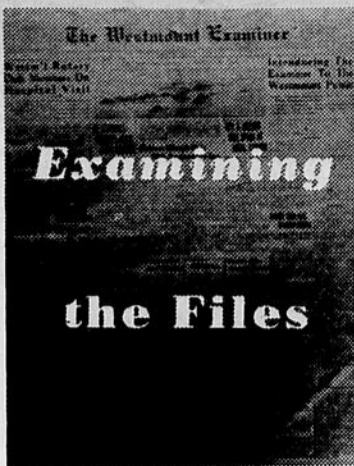
Westmount is a pretty good example of what we mean.

This city has no ghettos, where persons of one or another particular race or creed concentrate. People "arrive" in Westmount, making their homes where their means alone dictate.

They or their parents may have struggled to get here, and in the process they have shed the dominant markings of their origin. If they retain distinctions to qualify their Canadianism it generally is quiet pride in being Scottish, or Jewish, or French, or whatever.

But it is not something flaunted, fussed over or, contrarywise, hidden and glossed over. Affluence or even just good middle-class comfort sublimates distinctions. There is, besides, no one to "blame" for ones misfortune - and if you are not blaming the "Wasps," "The Jews" or "The French" and, instead, living peacefully and happily beside them, you have removed much of your prejudice if it ever existed.

"Twas not ever thus here in Westmount. We have just been

The fifth and obviously the last session of the present Québec Legislature opened on Tuesday with minor changes in procedure but with every indication of an early general election.

Premier Bertrand himself de-

livered what has been expected to be a "state of the nation" speech and proposed himself the customary address of thanks to the Lieutenant-Governor for the inaugural or throne speech.

- Those who may have expected that the premier would take advantage of the altered procedure, and the first sitting of the house in 1970, to paint a broad picture of what the government hopes and plans for Québec throughout the new decade, were doomed to disappointment. In actual fact his speech was simply a warmed-over version of the partisan political speech which he made Sunday to the party faithful in Montreal and who paid \$50 each for the privilege.

### Changes

The first part dealt with the changes in procedure upon which all parties had previously agreed. He then proceeded to an enumeration of what he considered to be the accomplishments of the present government over the past four years. He ended by a bitter attack on all the opposition parties and in particular against the Liberals with whom he included the Federal Government which, according to Mr. Bertrand, must take the blame for all the problems facing Québec today.

The order paper of the assembly contained an enumeration of some 30 bills, many of which were left unfinished from the last session. Bill No. 1, entitled "An Act to Amend the Election Act," was introduced and read for the first time. This, of course, does not necessarily mean that the government considers it to be the first priority among the new bills!

New legislation announced, includes the Medical Insurance Act (Medicare), a Consumer Protection Act and Air Pollution Act, but details of these bills will not be known until the Government decides to table them.

The speech of Mr. Bertrand was perhaps most remarkable for its failure to recognize the many and urgent problems facing our province, particularly in the area of education, employment and the economy in general.

### Bill 62 out

Bill 62 was not even mentioned. It is perhaps understandable that up to now the premier has left his minister of education to deal with and to explain the government's stand on this bill. However, after the unprecedented controversy and the objections raised from every level and area of Québec society, surely this speech at this time was the ideal occasion for Mr. Bertrand to set out clearly what his government has in mind and to reassure the public and in particular English Québécois, that their doubts and fears no longer have any reason to persist and to state clearly how he proposes to foster an atmosphere where all can work together for the common good of our young people in their schools.

One thing clearly emerges from the premier's speech, and that is that he has left himself wide open to attack on many fronts by the new leader of the opposition, who is to make his reply tonight.

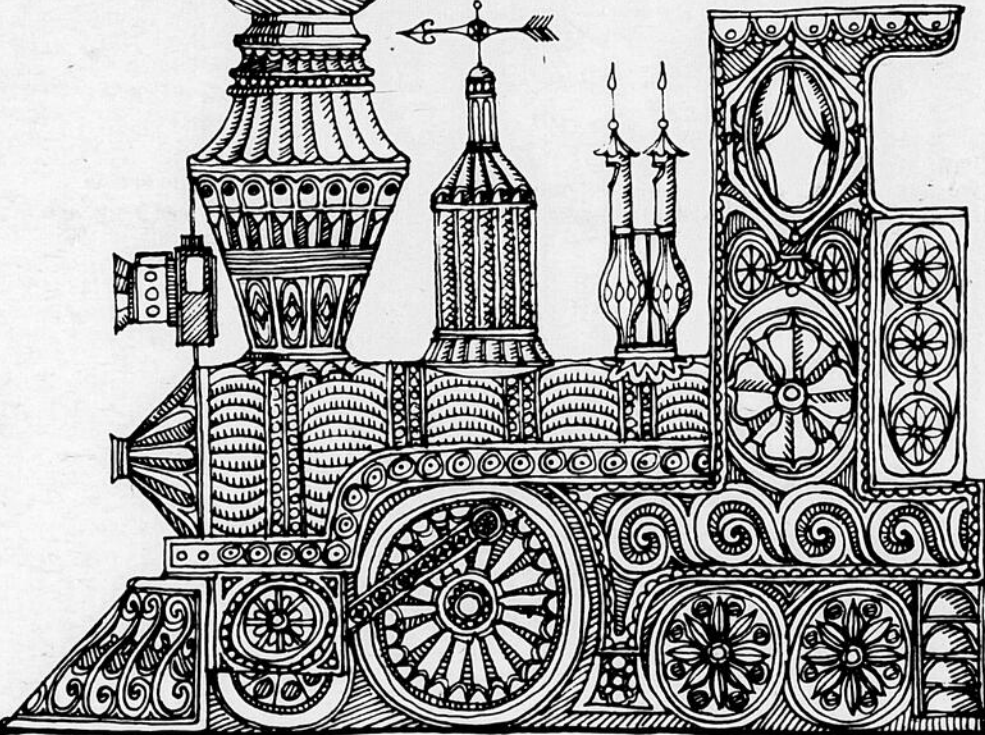

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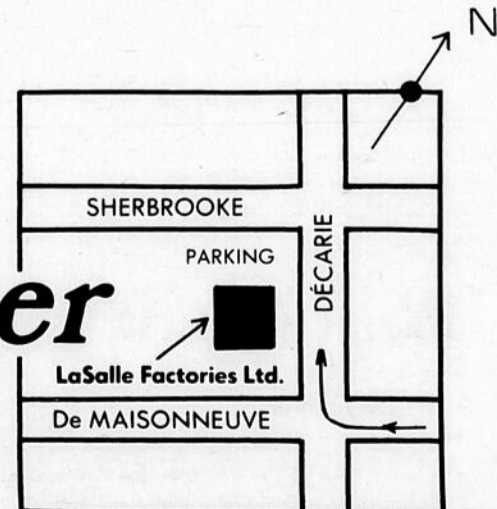

### Sabbath service

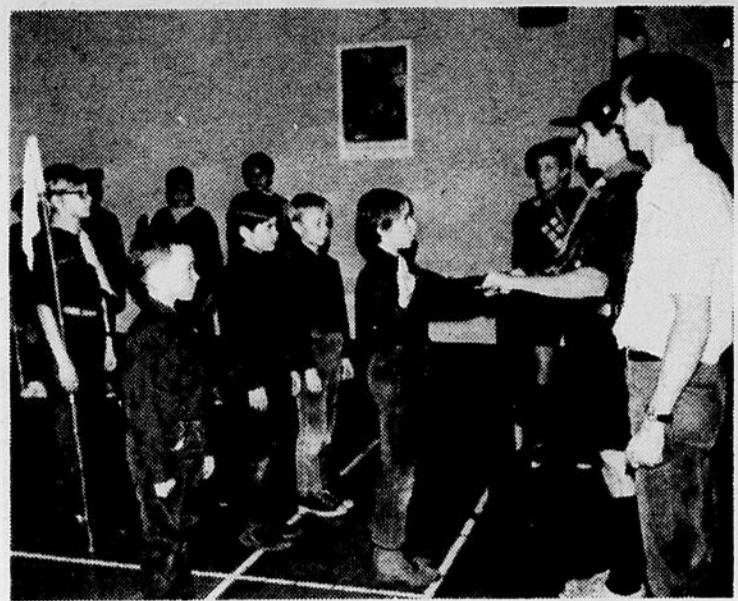

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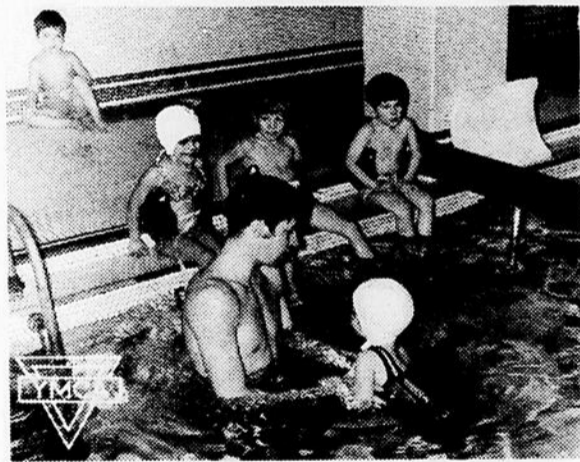
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It is a grand idea and contribution to the youth of today. Some people already have expressed the view that they ought to present some present day "groups."

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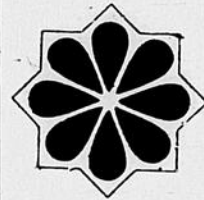

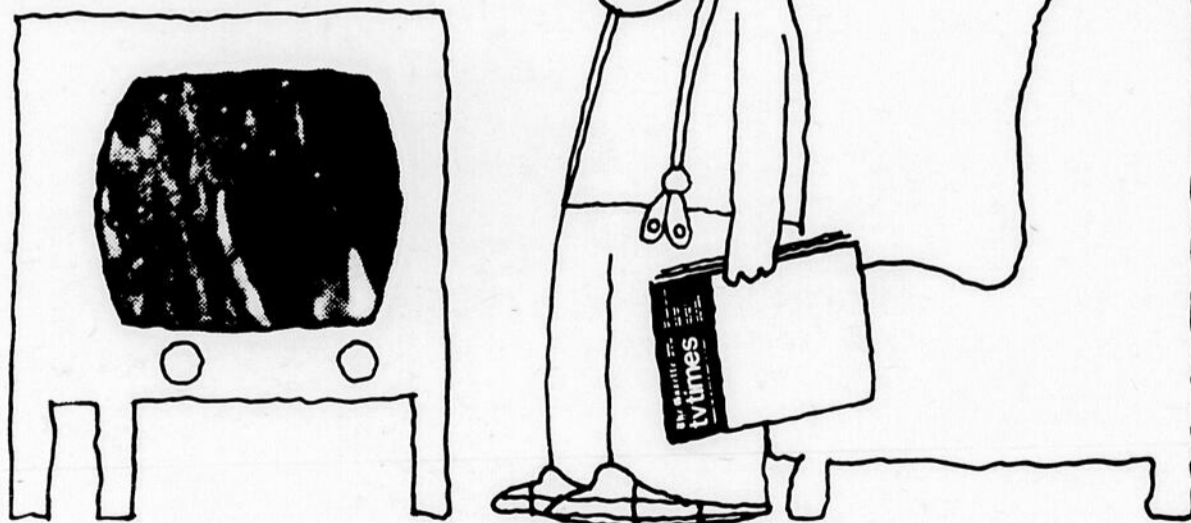

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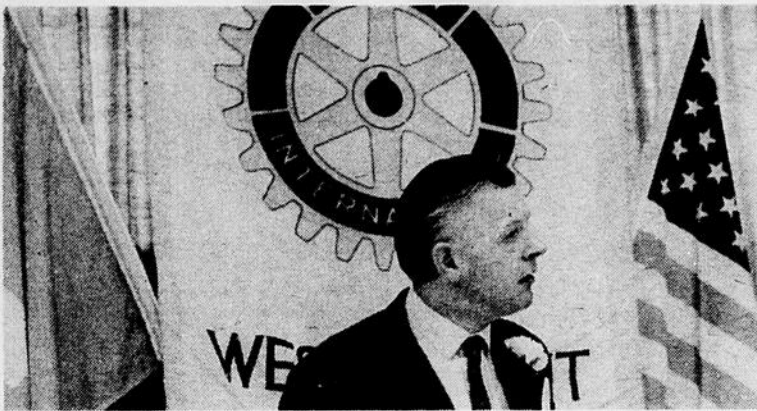

U.K. trade commissioner yesterday between Canadian and U.S. flags at Westmount Rotary.

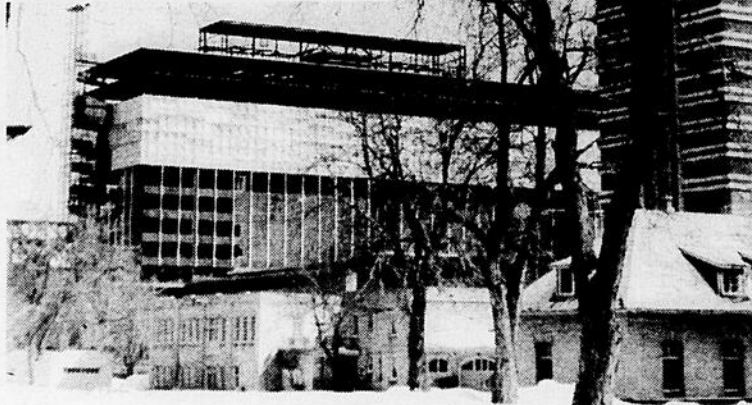
