OTTAWA CORRESPONDENCE.

Returns of Correspondence Respecting the Hydrographical Survey of the Lakes and Maritime Coasts of Canada—The Regulations Affecting American Bonded Whiskey—Fine Budget Debate.

From our Special Correspondent.

OTTAWA, April 3.

The returns moved for by Mr. Fortier, in reference to the hydrographical survey of the great lakes and the other maritime coasts of Canada, was brought down today. As early as 1877, Capt. Parsons, of Goderich, directed the attention of the Marine Department to the existence of a number of dangerous shoals and reefs in Georgian Bay and Lake Superior, which are not located in Bayfield's charts; and in response to a request from the Minister of Marine he indicated several shoals, including one six miles east of Lonely Island; a middle ground in Smith's Bay, near Wequenkong; a large reef in Heywood Bay; a small shoal north-east of Heywood Island; a shoal north of Clapperton Island, and another off the north-west end of Barrier Island; several shoals west of Grant's Island; a shoal near Old Bruce Copper Mines; a reef off Port Carbury; a large reef four miles south-west of Copper Mine Point; rocks and reefs two and a half miles north of Quebec Mine, Michigan Island; a shoal north of State Island; a shoal south-east of Pays Plat's Island; at the eastern entrance to Nepegon Bay; a small shoal west of Victoria Island in the steamboat channel, between Thunder Bay and Duluth; five reefs off the upper end of Isle Royal, near the Rock of Ages. Captain Parsons further stated that there was no channel of any depth between Flour Island and St. Ignace Island, though Bayfield's chart shows very deep water between them.

Charts were forwarded to Captain Parsons with a request that he would have the shoals and reefs, indicated by him, marked upon them. After some correspondence between Mr. S. J. Dawson and the Government, a copy of Captain Parsons' letter was forwarded to the Admiralty authorities, and a reply was received to the effect that the information furnished was sufficient to enable the authorities to fix the positions of the shoals in question, with the exception of some which had been previously indicated by the United States Coast Surveys. Corrected charts were also forwarded to the Marine Department by the Admiralty hydrographer. After the loss of the "Asia" in October last, Captain Scott was requested to report upon the existence of the newly discovered reefs. On September 20th, Mr. Allen, M.P., wrote to the Mayor of Collingwood, stating that from information obtained from fishermen, he believed several shoals, not marked on the charts, existed off Club and Lonely Islands. On the 16th of December last, Sir A. T. Galt was requested to confer with the Admiralty and ascertain if they would be willing to send a competent hydrographer to survey the lakes, it being understood that the expenses would be borne by the Dominion. The result was that after some correspondence, Captain Maxwell, the officer in charge of the Newfoundland Coast Survey, was authorized to confer with the Dominion Government on the subject, and his report is to form a basis for financial consideration. On the 14th February Hon. P. Fortin addressed a letter to the Minister of Marine, urging that a hydrographical survey of the shores of the Gulf and River St. Lawrence be undertaken, enclosing a letter from Captain Fox, Customs collector at Magdalen, attributing numerous wrecks to changes in the currents, etc., and requesting an investigation. This letter has been referred to Captain Scott, R.N., for inquiry. The Ministry have decided not to permit any alteration in existing regulations which prohibit the importation of spirits from the United States in less quantities than one hundred imperial gallons, Canadian distillers having protested against any concessions being made. Mr. Pratt, who is here on behalf of the American distillers, has, however, suggested a modification in the law, by which it is proposed that the United States whiskey shall be allowed to come into the country for immediate exportation and bonding in American customs warehouses. The concessions would give to these spirits an additional bonding period of three years, and will relieve the American whiskey market from its present depressed condition, and as the Washington Treasury Department has signified to the Dominion authorities that it has no objection to any such modification, and with the consent of the Dominion distillers, it is expected that the proposal will be adopted.

The Government seem anxious to rush public business and the budget debate excites no great interest. The speech of Mr. G. W. Ross this afternoon was a practical review of the financial condition of the country. Mr. Ross is a careful student of public affairs and his speeches are generally full of valuable information. His expose of the inconsistent course of the member for Cardwell on trade questions was most humiliating. Mr. Byrket, who followed, seemed to imagine that he was still stumping against the Mowat ministry, the greater part of his speech being devoted to Ontario local issues. Mr. Rinfret, of Lotbinière, is a fluent and graceful speaker and his well prepared defence of the Liberal party tonight did him infinite credit. Lower Canadian Liberals have reason to be proud of Mr. Rinfret, who is fast gaining a place among the first class debaters of the House.

UNITED PROTESTANT WORKINGMEN'S BENEFIT SOCIETY. MONTHLY MEETING. The regular monthly meeting of this society was held last evening in the Odd-fellows' Hall, St. James street, Mr. John Doyle, President, in the chair. The minutes of last month's meeting were read and confirmed. Dr. Finnie reported that there was on the sick and benefit list seven members; of these three were discharged; he had examined two candidates, had 88 office consultations, and attended at home, who were sick for less than a week. The Treasurer, Mr. Richard Seal, reported cash on hand, from annual meeting, \$157.19; paid out for sick benefit, \$134.19; total, \$157.11. Two candidates were proposed for membership, and two admitted by medical certificate and ballot. A vote of thanks was unanimously passed to retiring officers.
