

PROGRESSIVE DEMOCRATS MAY JOIN ROOSEVELT PARTY.

Revolt Against Parker Selection as Chairman of Democratic Convention—Bryan Issues Call—Latest News From Chicago.

ROOSEVELT'S NAME MAY NOT BE PRESENTED.

Chicago, Ill., June 22.—(Special)—It was the hope of the party leaders as the fifty day of the fifteenth Republican national convention opened, to conclude the convention late tonight.

The leaders were inclined to think, without wishing to be arbitrary, that all the necessary work of the convention could be accomplished by that time. The leaders have agreed upon a tentative programme, which, however, will be subject to possible sudden change if there are unexpected developments on the floor of the convention.

According to this programme there will be morning, afternoon and night sessions, with nomination of presidential and vice-presidential candidates as the climax of the final session.

But if events force the convention over until Monday, it was intimated that there would be at least two days of debate next week before a conclusion had been reached.

Some of the politicians talk of elusive rumors which could be taken to indicate that perhaps yesterday's prosaic happenings were but the calm before another storm.

It was strongly indicated that Col. Roosevelt's name would not be presented to the convention at all, except without his consent.

His final instructions to his leaders were that his name should be withheld. It was pointed out, however that Colonel Roosevelt's expressed desire in this regard might not control those delegates from states where flat Roosevelt instructions were given.

With Colonel Roosevelt out of the fight in this convention, and President Taft's nomination apparently a foregone conclusion, the chief interest centred in the nominee for Vice-President.

Sherman, Governor Hadley, Senator Kenyon of Iowa, Senator Borah of Idaho, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, of New York, and John W. Wadsworth, of Philadelphia, were most frequently named in connection with the vice-presidency. The leaders chose to avoid a discussion of the vice-presidential question until they had completed the nomination of presidential candidates.

Chicago, June 22.—(Special)—That Theodore Roosevelt will be a candidate for the Presidency of the United States is probable, though his nomination will not come from the Republican convention as at present constituted.

An independent convention immediately following will probably name the Colonel, though this may even be delayed.

Roosevelt will, however, be on the ticket next fall, as a Progressive.

In view of Alton B. Parker's election as temporary chairman of the Democratic convention, there is talk of a Roosevelt combination with Progressive Bryan wing of the Democratic party.

At any rate Roosevelt will hope to draw large support from this section of the democracy.

BRYAN TO ATTACK PARKER.

Chicago, June 22.—Branding ex-

Judge Alton B. Parker as a "reactionary," William Jennings Bryan yesterday telegraphed to a number of prominent Democrats throughout the country, appealing to them to join him in preventing the election of Judge Parker as temporary chairman of the Baltimore convention.

The telegrams were addressed to Speaker Clark, Governor Wilson, of New Jersey, Governor Burk, of North Dakota, Governor Foss, of Massachusetts, Governor Baldwin, of Connecticut, and Mayor Gaynor of New York city. Mr. Bryan announced that he would leave for Baltimore to-morrow morning.

Colonel Bryan's appeal follows: "In the interest of harmony I suggested to the sub-committee of the Democratic National Committee the advisability of recommending as temporary chairman some progressive acceptable to the leading progressive candidates for the presidential nomination. I took it for granted that no committee member interested in Democratic success would desire to offend the members of a convention overwhelmingly progressive by naming a reactionary to sound the keynote of the campaign. Eight members of the sub-committee, however, have, over the protest of the remaining eight, agreed upon not only a reactionary, but upon the one Democrat who, among those not candidates for the presidential nomination, is, in the eyes of the public most conspicuously identified with the reactionary element of the party. I shall be pleased to join you and your friends in opposing his selection by the full committee, or by the convention. Kindly answer me."

Mr. Bryan declined to discuss his action further than to say that the telegram speaks plainly for itself.

WILL AID ROOSEVELT.

It came out to-day that the Bryan forces fear the spectre of Theodore Roosevelt. They believe he will run as an independent candidate for President and that he will make war on special interests and bosses as he did in the primary. In the selection of Parker it is pointed out that Roosevelt will be given an opening vigorously to attack the Democratic convention.

"Theodore Roosevelt will parade up and down this country," said one of Bryan's friends to-day, "with the battle cry that the Republicans at Chicago, at the behest of the special interests selected Elihu Root an attorney for Thos. F. Ryan, to act as temporary chairman and to sound the keynote speech, and the Democratic convention at the behest of the same influences selected Alton B. Parker, another attorney of Thomas F. Ryan. We are placing ourselves in the position to be classed with the Republicans at Chicago. With the cry of Ryan influence in both Wall street and both conventions, thousands of votes will be lost to the Democratic ticket."

It is not so much Judge Parker's keynote speech that the Bryan people fear as the act of selecting Parker, when he is favored by the Murphy-Ryan-Belmont-Sheehan forces. The effect of this upon the Progressive vote of the country, it is said, may prove disastrous, unless a man is nominated who is known to be beyond the influences of the Wall Street combination.

CONGRESS OF YOUNG CANADIANS.

Opens in Sherbrooke This Afternoon.

LARGE NUMBER OF DELEGATES HERE FROM PROVINCE AND ELSEWHERE.

The Convention of the Catholic Association of Young French Canadians opens in this city today and will continue till the 25th.

Delegates are arriving in the city today from all parts of the Province. The regular meetings of the Congress will be held in the Monument National when an interesting list of topics will be discussed.

The first meeting takes place this afternoon. The formal opening, however, will be at 8 p.m., when addresses of welcome will be given by Bishop Larocque, Mr. Dubuc, president of the Cercle Larocque, and Mayor F. H. Hebert.

Sunday will be devoted largely to religious observances. All will attend mass at the Cathedral at 10 a.m., marching in procession from the Monument National. Rev. Abbe Courtemanche will deliver the sermon.

At 2 p.m. the delegates will re-assemble at the Monument National, and at 8 p.m. an interesting programme will be carried out.

The closing events of the Convention will take place on Wednesday, including a trip through Lake Memphremagog and an auto trip around the city.

KILLS AMENDING AMENDMENT.

NEW HAMPSHIRE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION FAVORS CORPORATION INCOME TAX.

Concord, N.H., June 22.—The constitutional convention yesterday morning took favorable action on an amendment allowing the Legislature to impose a direct tax on the incomes of public service corporations, but killed the various amendments proposing a change in the future mode of amending the constitution.

ASROPLANE FATALITY IN GERMANY.

Pohrertitz, Germany, June 22.—(Special)—Another army aviator was killed here yesterday evening. Lieut. Von Falkenbain of the general army after making flight on military aeroplane attempted to land but made a false movement with one of the levers which caused him to dash to the ground with great force. His machine was totally wrecked and body of aviator was found among debris.

Petawawa, June 22.—(Special)—Major Geo. W. Paige, of the 35th Battery, Coaticook, returned to join the Battery Thursday morning. He was called away by a bereavement in his family.

PRINCE OF WALES REACHES MAJORITY.

Provisional Regency of Queen Ends To-morrow.

REVENUE OF YOUNG PRINCE WILL NOW BE \$500,000 A YEAR.

London, June 22.—(Special)—The Prince of Wales will attain his legal majority to-morrow, and although the day will not be marked by any general celebration of an official or popular character, it will mean a great change in the life of the young prince and heir to the British throne. To-morrow the provisional regency of the Queen, created in the event of the

prolonged absence of or dire misfortune to the King, terminates, for henceforth in any such eventuality the Prince of Wales, being of age, would be legally able to take the King's place, either as regent or as heir to the throne.

Heretofore the Prince of Wales, although the oldest son and prospective heir to the throne, has enjoyed few privileges beyond those which naturally fall to the lot of the royal children. It is true, the superiority of his age and position gave him some advantage over his brothers and sister, but like the latter he was under the strict control and supervision of his parents, a supervision not merely nominal, but actual and extending over his family life, his studies, recreations and associations. All this will in a measure be changed from now on.

For his use special separate suites have been prepared under the supervision of Queen Mary at Buckingham and Windsor Palaces, and later on adequate establishments will probably be arranged for the young prince at York House and Frogmore House. The Prince of Wales' suite at Windsor consists of a dining room, breakfast room, two reception rooms and a bed and dressing room, as well as apartments for the members of the prince's future household. Similar provisions have been made at Buckingham Palace. The young prince will be well able to maintain an establishment of his own, as his revenues as Duke of Cornwall, which with his majority, come under his own control, amount to about \$500,000 a year.

CAPTAIN ROSTRON DOUBLY THANKED.

BRITISH COURT AND GOVERNMENT SHOW APPRECIATION OF HIS RESCUE OF THE TITANIC'S PEOPLE.

London, June 22.—Captain A. H. Rostron, of the Carpathia received the united thanks of the British Government and the court at yesterday's sitting of the Board of Trade inquiry into the Titanic disaster.

Sir Rufus Isaacs, the attorney-general, said he desired to take the earliest opportunity the Government had been able to get of expressing to Captain Rostron "on behalf of His Majesty's Government how deeply grateful we are to you for your conduct and for the large number of lives you were instrumental in saving."

Lord Mersey, the presiding judge, and Sir Robert Finlay associated themselves in the congratulatory to Captain Rostron, who was loudly cheered.

NEW INDUSTRIES.

The Canadian Brake Shoe Company's new factory will, in a short time, be added to the present number of modern manufacturing plants.

Ground has already been broken and under the capable management of Mr. Phalen MacCullough, an old Sherbrooke boy, the work will be rushed through with all possible despatch.

The same may be said of the new buildings to be erected this summer by the Sherbrooke Iron Works, an old and well established Sherbrooke industry, which has found it necessary to move into larger and more modern quarters.

CHURCHES AND SCHOOLS.

While great commercial and industrial development is apparent by the large buildings erected on every hand the religious and educational interests of the city are not neglected.

The new Catholic Church in the West Ward is about completed. Tenders were recently called for to replace St. Patrick's Church, King St., with a larger and more modern building. (Continued on Page 3)

HALF MILLION IN BUILDINGS.

Extensive Operations in Sherbrooke This Year.

FINE BUSINESS AND INDUSTRIAL STRUCTURES GOING UP THIS YEAR.

The best proof that a city is growing, and prosperous, is the fact that extensive building operations are being carried on. Sherbrooke can furnish an abundance of this proof.

In view of the fact that there does not exist, at the present time, a Building By-law, it is almost impossible to ascertain exactly how many buildings are now under construction. There are, however, a number of large and very important buildings either proposed or under construction. These alone are sufficient to substantiate the fact that Sherbrooke is growing, and growing rapidly.

The first, and perhaps the most important of the proposed new buildings is the Quebec Central Office Building. This large structure, which will be modern in every detail, will soon be erected on the site of the present office building, which will be torn down. The offices have been moved to temporary quarters in the Brooks' Block, and it is expected that work on the new building will be started immediately.

Although the plans have not yet been made public it is stated that the building, when completed, will represent an investment of about \$80,000. Situated right in front of J.S. Mitchell & Co.'s new block, and beside the Court House, the erection of this building will greatly improve this already modern section of the street.

THE NEW PROTESTANT HOSPITAL.

Another important building will be the proposed new Protestant Hospital. This matter has been under consideration for sometime, and the Board of Governors, it is understood, has practically decided to erect a new and thoroughly up-to-date structure. The cost of the new building will be in the vicinity of \$75,000.

PAGE PRINTING AND BINDING CO.

A welcomed addition to the business section of the city will be the new block now under construction by the Page Printing and Binding Co. This building, located on Albert St., will cost in the vicinity of \$20,000, and when completed and equipped will be one of the most up-to-date printing establishments in the Province.

BANK OF MONTREAL.

The erection of a handsome office building by the Bank of Montreal will close up an unsightly gap on Wellington street. The foundation for this building is nearly completed and the other work will be rushed along as quickly as possible.

The plans are said to call for a first-class building, and when it is completed will represent an outlay of many thousand dollars.

BUILDING ON WELLINGTON ST. SOUTH.

Wellington Street South has just been improved by the erection of two modern buildings. P. T. Legare Company, of Quebec, has just completed and moved into a large three storey, brick building.

On the other side of the street is the modern cement block building erected by Messrs. Swallow and Placey. Both these structures are a credit to the city.

INDUSTRIES ARE EXTENDING.

One of the most pleasing features of the building boom is the fact that the large industries are increasing their plants. The Jenckes Machine Company has the preliminary work for the additions to the present plant well under way. The sum of \$100,000 will be spent in building and equipping these extensions.

The Canadian Rand, E. & T. Fairbanks, MacKinnon, Holmes, Ltd. and other industries have recently spent large sums of money in extending their plants, and intend spending considerable more during the present summer.

OLD RESIDENT GONE.

CANADA LIKELY TO RETALIATE.

REVOKE AMERICAN PRIVILEGES IN CANADIAN CANALS IF PANAMA BILL PASSES.

Ottawa, June 22.—The recent action of a United States senator in introducing a bill into the American Congress to compel all ships but those of the United States to pay high tariffs in going through the Panama Canal, is being considered here. While the bill is yet pending in the States, nothing will be done by the Canadian Government, but if the bill is ratified then it is probable that certain privileges now held in Canadian canals by the Americans will be taken away and strong retaliation will be indulged in.

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It is not sufficient to enter a drug store or a truss dealer's establishment and to secure any kind of trusses with or without spring. Such a truss must be a real and an effective one.

What are the qualities of a good truss? I will indicate them to my readers so as to enable them to make a proper choice of their appliances.

When you go to buy a truss remember well that the first condition of a good truss, the condition that primes all others, is that it must maintain the rupture perfectly at all times.

You must consider as a BAD TRUSS and therefore not wear it:

1.—If the truss allows the rupture to protrude when coughing or walking.

2.—If it displaces itself during the ordinary motion of your work, specially when you lean down. Wearing a truss which displaces itself is more dangerous than to wear none at all.

3.—If the truss creates fatigue or is painful to wear, especially if it bears on the kidneys.

4.—If it can not be left in place during the night.

5.—If the buckle is too small. The ball must cover not only the hole of the rupture but all the adjoining parts. If a truss offers such defects you must reject it without hesitation.

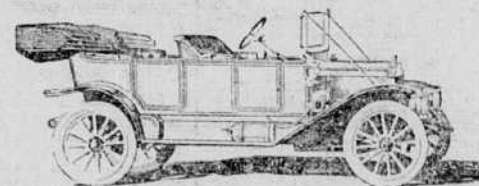

DAIRY INDUSTRY IN CANADA; PROGRESS SINCE EARLY DAYS.

The first permanent introduction of domestic cattle into Canada was undoubtedly made by Samuel de Champlain, at Quebec, in 1608 or 1610, although previous efforts had been made by other explorers in colonizing to bring them to Canada. This date may be said to have been the inception of Canada's great dairying industry, which has made such rapid strides in the past few decades and placed the country in the forefront of the nations of the world as a cheese and butter producing and exporting nation. This interesting information is contained in a splendid historical and descriptive review of the whole dairying industry of Canada, compiled by Mr. J. A. Riddick, dairy and cold storage commissioner of the Dominion department of agriculture.

In a foreword to the bulletin of the department containing a review Mr. Riddick says: "In view of the importance of the industry to a large section of the farmers of Canada, and through them to the people at large, it would seem to be worth while to make a permanent record, before it is too late, of the more important events connected with its early history, and particularly of those which relate to the factory system to which Canadian dairying owes so much."

Sable Island, that bleak and inhospitable sandbank off the coast of Nova Scotia, was in all probability the scene of the first introduction of domestic cattle on this side of the Atlantic. Mr. Riddick states, A Baron de Lery, who sailed from France in 1518 to found a colony in the New World, became discouraged on arrival at not finding a suitable spot, and after landing his cattle and horses on Sable Island returned home. The animals perished. In 1598 another attempt was made, and was more successful, but owing to certain circumstances the colonizing effort was not successful and some years later the cattle were exterminated by warring tribes. Still another attempt was made in 1606 at Annapolis, but the settlement was destroyed by pirates. Champlain seems to have been the first man to successfully bring the domestic cow to Canada and permanently settle her here. Records of his voyages make mention of "cutting hay for the cattle" in 1610 and in 1613 of "growing hay for the cattle." His farm at Cap Tourmente had between 60 and 70 head of cattle in 1629. In 1660 the great minister, Colbert, under Louis XIV. of France, began sending the best dairy cows of Normandy and Brittany to New France, as Canada was then known. Shortly afterwards fur trading and fishing were to a great extent abandoned by the inhabitants of Canada and their attention turned to agricultural pursuits. A census of the cattle in Nova Scotia towards the end of the seventeenth century showed over 2,500 at various points. After the expulsion of the Acadians from Nova Scotia the fertile lands which they had occupied tempted many settlers from the New England States, who brought live stock with them to the districts in which they settled, while a colony of German settlers who came to Lunenburg, N.S., in 1750-1752 were supplied by the Government with live stock.

THE FIRST SETTLERS.

These thirty Germans were probably the first Canadian exporters of butter and cheese, and by 1760 they were sending out their product to the neighboring districts.

Just when the first live stock was brought into Upper Canada has not been determined, and there were few cows until after 1830, while in the prairie provinces Lord Selkirk's colony brought out a number with them in 1812. Farther west in British Columbia cows were evidently, from records which have been discovered, taken across the border there as early as 1837.

In any event, it is quite evident that from the very outset the first colonists of Canada deemed the possession of cattle and oxen to be of prime importance. It is found, according to Mr. Riddick, that wherever a permanent settlement was made, the cattle soon followed, although they often were obtained under difficulties.

CANADA WAS FIRST.

"It will now be evident," declares Mr. Riddick, "that Canada may claim the honor of having been the first part of America, north of the Gulf of Mexico, at any rate to receive domestic cattle. The Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth did not have any until 1623. It is possible that the Spaniards may have brought cattle, as well as horses, to Mexico and Central America during the sixteenth century, but the writer has been unable to determine that point definitely. "It follows that the common cow

of this country comes from a very mixed ancestry. In the Eastern Provinces there is a strain of French or Normandy blood, along with various English and Scotch mixtures, and also a trace of Dutch brought by some of the Loyalists from New York state. In the Western Provinces there is reason to believe that many of the cattle which have come from the south were of Spanish ancestry."

From 1697 until the present time is a far cry, but a comparison of the number of cattle then and at the present time, according to the available census, were 3,107 cattle, while the census of 1901 showed that in the whole of Canada there were in the year 2,408,677, and during the years from 1901 until the census of 1911 the increase is phenomenal and shows the great advance in the industry in the short space of a decade.

BUTTER AND CHEESE.

"Reference is made to cheese and butter production in many of the records of the early settlements in all parts of Canada," states the report. "The art of butter making is easily acquired, but the manufacture of cheese, being a much more intricate and difficult process, requires more skill and experience to ensure success, although cheese of a sort can be made with very little previous training. The early French colonists made both butter and cheese, and doubt the old 'fromage raffine' still made on the Island of Orleans is a relic of the early attempts to follow some of the soft cheese processes known to them in France. The United Empire Loyalists brought the art of cheese and butter making to the Eastern Townships, to the St. Lawrence valley and to the Lake Ontario district. As early as 1801 there was a surplus of butter and cheese at Kingston, Ont., and some of it was exported to the United States. The prices given vary from 18 to 30 cents a pound for butter and from 15 to 30 cents a pound for cheese. Mr. Riddick states in his memo that there is no special kind of Canadian cheese, marked differences in the finished products being made by only slight modifications of the process of making. There are probably 100 distinct different varieties of cheese made in various parts of the world through the modifications, and many of them in Canada.

High class Canadian butter does not differ from the product of any other country and the process of making is practically the same wherever scientific methods are followed. In 1881 the total amount of butter made in creameries, according to records obtainable, was in all the provinces 1,365,912 pounds, while in 1907 this had increased to 45,855,294 pounds. Cheese made in factories amounted to 54,574,856 pounds in 1881 and in 1907 204,698,183 pounds, showing the great advance in the industry in the intervening years.

THE FACTORY SYSTEM.

That the introduction of the factory system into Canada saved the dairying industry from decay is the assertion of Mr. Riddick. Along in the sixties the outlook was not encouraging, although there were over one million cows in British North America at that time. Progress was impossible, however, under conditions which then existed. Cows were kept in most cases as a sort of side line, the butter and cheese being made by the women of the household, who, after supplying the needs of the family, "traded" the surplus for groceries and other requirements at a valuation often below the actual cost of production. The production was limited to the amount of labor which the farmer's wife and daughters could spare from other arduous duties.

A new impetus was given the industry with the advent of the factory system, which originated in Herkimer County, New York State, about 1851. It was introduced into Canada in 1861 along in 1863 when Mr. Henry Farrington, of Herkimer, a successful cheesemaker, paid a visit to some friends in Oxford County. He at once became impressed with the suitability of the country for cheesemaking and finally decided to move his family there and engage in the business. Accordingly the following year he came to Canada, and with his arrival followed the first inception of the great factory system which has been the real spirit in the dairying industry in Canada for the past forty-eight years. Factories sprang up rapidly all over the provinces and from this small beginning the total number of factories in 1910 had risen to 3,672.

The organization of the factory system into groups naturally followed, and the system of cheese boards now in existence was another side line made necessary to dispose of the product and with fairness to all in the business. There is that germ of co-operation in the business which makes for its success and its conditions.

Mr. Riddick concludes his very interesting bulletin with technical information for the manufacturer of butter and cheese and the owner of herds of cattle, as to how to get the best results in the work. The educational side of the work as established by the Ontario Government in its system of factory inspections is spoken of, as is the great and growing export business in both butter and cheese.

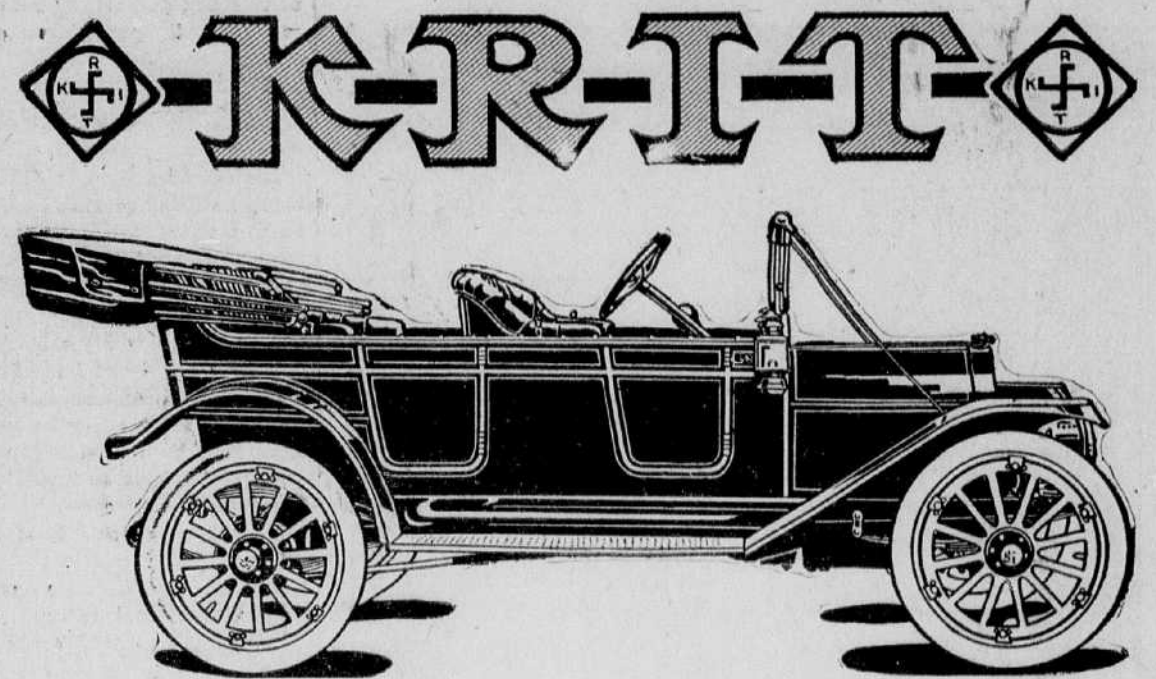

Omens

There are few people who put faith in prophetic happenings, but coincidence plays strange tricks with the occurrences of our practical everyday existence.

Let us, for instance, take the strenuous Rough Rider Roosevelt, who now seeks the office of chief executive of the United States. If he is unsuccessful in his self-conducted campaign, he will fulfil the prophecy

of many noteworthy omens of such a possibility.

In the first place Roosevelt announced his candidature on the anniversary of Napoleon's return from Elbe. The convention for deciding the Republican nomination assembled on the 18th of June, the anniversary of Waterloo. On Roosevelt's journey to Chicago his train struck a boulder, which might have caused great destruction to himself and party. And on the second day of the con-

vention a lady in the gallery who had raised his picture to excite enthusiasm and cheering, inadvertently dropped it,—the fourth had omen. And on the same day, to quote a Taft follower, a sparrow alighted on the portrait of the President who seeks re-nomination.

Previous to the recent change of government in the Dominion, several incidents occurred during the Liberal campaign, such as fierce storms, and sudden insecurity of platforms, that seemed very inauspicious. While on the night of the returns the very elements engaged in the excitement pertaining to the political upheaval. As an afterthought, and the most aggravating of all little unpleasantnesses, the Laurier bust now in the new hotel in Ottawa, presents a broken nose to all gazers. A small irony of fate, vexingly contributive to humorous reflections on the former Premier's recent defeat.

Fortunately, omens have become coincidences, merely. But history has persisted in recording omens with faithful exactness and belief, and, at times, interesting relative incidents occurring in this wide-awake age, brings to mind the faith people of an earlier day placed in "coincidences," as natural prophecies of coming events.

At any rate the general public is not yet clamoring for a front seat in the "sky trolley," and will not for some time to come. Safety is still desired by the ordinary traveller, even in preference to sensation.

That Prayer

With all their lack of serenity, of unitedness in action and of adherence to the rules of order, the delegates at the Chicago convention have not forgotten that respectable prelude to their meetings, the opening prayer. "After the prayer," facetiously writes down the reporter, and then proceeds to chronicle such extraordinary actions and expressions of feeling as are noteworthy features of even a political gathering. The Taft and Roosevelt men alike impatiently hold their angry feelings in check for a few minutes of devotion, only to vent their feelings more decidedly when they have the opportunity. And while the convention has opened with prayer, the impossibility of any benediction is obvious. With an army of men calling another army "liars and thieves," amid uproar and fighting, there is little chance to interject any words of peaceful conclusion, and there is reason for thankfulness that they have been able to open their meetings with decorum even if they could not close them in an orderly manner.

It has been said that a little religion covers many sins, so possibly that perfunctory prayer of the Republican convention gilds the turbulence of the scenes that follow.

The Farnham Camp

The condemnation of the Farnham military camp grounds by the Minister of Militia brings up again as a live question a suitable permanent camp. The Townships are rugged, hilly, and do not offer many opportunities for choice in this matter of a military camp. Yet a really satisfactory ground is surely not an impossibility. There is certainly nothing gained in a continuous mistake, in expending money on grounds that are not permanent and in changing the location every year or few years.

Moreover, the soldiers under canvas are at a disadvantage, have not a proper opportunity for drill, and are liable to illness if the camp is not well located. Instead of gaining in health and benefitting from military practice, the men in a military camp unsatisfactorily placed are usually not in the best of spirits to commence with and undertake their several duties with half-hearted interest. Patriotism may make a man put up cheerfully with discomforts in a real campaign, but when out for a two weeks' military holiday and drill he prefers a few disadvantages as possible.

The Drowning Season

This is the open season for drowning, and every rash person who likes to "rock the boat" or to go out beyond a safe depth in swimming, or follow other methods common to careless people who drown, is in his element. Usually the man who rocks the boat can swim while the other occupants cannot, and so he will continue to enjoy his little joke alone, as formerly.

There is a real moral to be drawn from the formidable list of casualties by drowning recorded each season. Everyone who ventures on the water should know how to swim. A minimum risk is thus taken, and whatever happens there is always a chance of saving one's self.

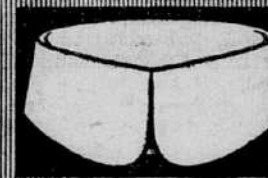

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FRANCE, SERIOUS OUTLOOK FOR NATION

FALLING OFF IN BIRTH RATE IS DESTROYING A GREAT PEOPLE.

(By Rollin Lynde Hartt, in Boston Transcript)

Drop a tear for "the France that dies." It is dying faster than ever—or neglecting to be born, which comes to the same thing. Newly published statistics show that during the year 1911 deaths outnumbered births by 34,869. This surpasses the decrease of 1910, shocking though that was, and gives new vividness to an ancient terror, a new and more emphatic importance to a subject old as the hills. France is shrinking. If she has a population as large as before, it is thanks to "strangers"—strangers who line her pockets with gold in time of peace, but who might menace her safety in time of war. She realizes her danger. Once in the world, she was feared; to-day she seeks safety in alliances. Once in the world she could muster invincible armies; at present Frenchmen are crying: "Our future is in the air!" and hoping to offset the heavy German battalions by raising money for 5,000 aeroplanes. Where once there were men there are henceforth to be machines. It is a tacit self-rebuke from "the France that dies."

All this, so dimly familiar, must make dull reading in Boston, but in Paris it is eternally sensational, for everything one sees appears to belie the statistics. Innumerable big-letter signs announce "Sage Femme," or "First-class Sage Femme." Toy shops abound. Every few steps it seems one comes to show windows crammed with little embroidered caps, bewitching shoes and most adorable tiny dresses. Wagons go by, inscribed "Trousseaux pour enfants," or dedicated hilariously "Au Bebe Gourmand." In all the parks in all the quarters, babies and little children simply swarm, attended by "nou-nous" in gorgeous cloaks and caps adorned with immense gay-colored streamers, or by negresses in bright turbans, or by blue-clad English nurses, who speak peasant French as a rule, or by candidly French peasant girls, in their dainty provincial coiffes. On a holiday Paris bounces with baby-carriages. Better yet, two thousand peres-de-familie carry babies in their arms.

Nevertheless, facts are facts, and while "Bebe is king of Paris," and shown off and pampered and petted and trotted about, as his rank requires, he has another and less fortunate privilege of royalty—that is to say, scarcity.

FRANCE ALARMED.

Why? Years ago, a Parisian explained the thing to me by saying: "In the France, one aims pleasure. Doubtless, but it is still more evident that 'in the France one aims Bebe.' Moreover, it is evident that the scarcity of Bebe is a national nightmare. Consider the oceans of ink and the aeons of parliamentary debate the nightmare has cost. Consider the unnumbered remedies that have been suggested. Consider the appeals to patriotism, to religious duty, to the parental instinct. Sheer waste of rhetoric, all that. 'The France that dies' goes on dying, just as of old.

What ails France, really? She is not decadent. She is vigorous. She is not selfish. She has a genius for making sacrifices. She is not short-sighted. She is shrewd. What, then, explains this progressive race-suicide? Two things—the widespread ignorance of the care of children, and the passionate, the universal love for them.

Both these assertions sound odd, I know. How is it possible that a country that produces incomparable surgery and has contributed enormously to the advance of medical science, should kill babies and little children at an appalling rate? Well, it is not possible, it is actual. One reason why the death-rate exceeds the birth-rate is that such multitudes of deaths are those of victims who died too young to have children—too young by many a year. Think of never bathing a baby, and never even washing its head! Think of making children go bare-legged all winter, and dragging youngsters about the street late at night, and making them sleep in hermetically sealed bedrooms! Think of feeding them like adults almost from their babyhood. No wonder they perish. A lot is being done to lessen abuses, but infinitely more remains to be done before France learns to keep alive the children already born, let alone increasing the birthrate.

TOO MUCH PRUDENCE.

Now, the thing that continues to reduce the birthrate is what I have called "the passionate, the universal love for children." It is no mere flourish of the pen, this paradox. It represents reality. A Frenchman reasons thus: "If I allow myself one child I can give him a better chance in life than I had; if I allow myself two, both of them will begin only as I began; if I have three, not one will start as I did; if I have four, the result will be a pinch all around—not enough money to educate them properly, not enough to provide them with generous dots, not enough to leave each child an appreciable legacy. Voila!"

The French law affecting adoption takes exactly this view of the case. To adopt a child in France, you must be fifty years old, you must be French, and you must be without children of your own; the child you adopt must be at least twenty-one years old and consent to the adoption. In this way France safeguards children against having outsiders enter the tribe to cut down the present and future resources of those already there. One often hears that young Monsieur and Madame So-and-So have "adopted a baby." It is not adoption; it is "tutelle," meaning guardianship—quite a different affair as regards the matters of money involved.

Now, while a pere-de-familie looks far ahead—to marriage, dowries and the provisions of his will—he expends legitimate anxieties upon a much less remote future. If his tribe increases, where is the tribe to live? No landlord bids it welcome. In fact, one hears from time to time of the "Odyssey" of some "Rooseveltesque" tribe that has been evicted repeatedly and is still seeking lodgment. Not long ago in the great open space in front of the Invalides I chanced to see a vast concourse of people "manifesting." They had placards and banners. Policemen arrived in squads to keep order. I asked: "Who are these in bright array?" and was told that the "manifestants" belonged to the "League of the Families Numerous." They were speaking their minds about landlords.

I wish they had devoted a few words to the "Neo-Malthusians," those federated cranks and scamps who make a religion of discouraging an increase of population. Happily, France handles Neo-Malthusians without gloves, and Heaven knows they deserve rough handling. They have been caught circulating "literature." There are ways to attend to such poison. For sending it broadcast, several publishers are now in prison.

TOO MUCH FUSS OVER INDIVIDUALS.

But it is neither the Neo-Malthusians nor the child-hating landlords who are most responsible. It is the doting, the over-prudent pere-de-familie. He realizes that France needs children, but what are three or four against a deficit of 34,869? When enough other Frenchmen heed the nation's outcry to make adding three or four of his own worth while, patriotically he may feel like joining the movement. At present, he considers the one or two he has, and refuses to limit their prospects. It is not as I have said. Frenchmen are unwilling to have children because they love them so.

In America, the "land of opportunity," parents take risks. They add to their broods, then hunt about for ways in which to add to their incomes. They have faith in the future, whereas French parents dread it, and make all manner of provisions against its fortitudes. Instead of counting upon a possible maximum of resource, they reckon with a minimum. They think of themselves not as getting ahead in the world, as we do, with the idea of earning more next year than they earn this year, but of going a set pace. To provide for what is to come, they must "make economies." They are cautious. They are wary. They have little aptitude for adventure.

Moreover, the pere de famille intends to retire "on his rents" at fifty. Custom and long tradition sanction the idea. It runs in his blood. If dowries for his children exhaust his savings, how can he retire? We should answer, "Then don't. Work on, and die in harness; you will be happier that way"—which is a sign that New England is not in France.

In France, despite all one hears about the mercurial French temperament, custom and traditions have an astounding longevity. You will hear Frenchmen say: "France is still sleeping in Napoleon's bed." You will hear other Frenchmen say: "The France of to-day is essentially Roman." So be it. To every nation, its national genius, its national ideals, its national order. Just now the genius and the ideals and the order of France are diminishing the population. It is unfortunate. It is a thing perilous, a thing regrettable. But it is by no means blameworthy. It results, not from selfishness, but from affection and parental far-sightedness. It displays the defect of a virtue—the virtue being prudence, the defect timidity. It overworks logic, and to overwork logic is in the end the very extreme of illogic. If you will look back through the years I think you will discover that for the most part the coolly calculated things you did were mistakes, and that success came of rashness, of inspired madness, of fiery and impulsive audacity. The art of living is ever so slightly an affair of the head. It is supremely an affair of the heart. When the French find this out there will be more children in France and fully as much money in the French savings banks. This I say in the belief that a special providence takes care of drunken men, the United States of America and parents.

POWERS AGREE TO FINANCE CHINA.

Russia Finally Acquiesces to the Terms of Other Signatory Nations.

BOTH CZAR AND MIKADO MAY REPUDIATE PLAN IF THEIR SPECIAL INTERESTS ARE MENACED.

Paris, June 22.—The reorganization of China has been made possible by the complete understanding reached yesterday by the bankers representing the six great powers, Great Britain, the United States, Germany, France, Russia and Japan, to loan China \$300,000,000. Russia joined the five other powers in acquiescing to the agreement, but stipulated a slight change in the original formula. This was quickly accepted by all the powers, including the United States. Although the official statement which was given out by the groups does not mention it, it is understood that Russia and Japan specifically reserve the right to withdraw from any participation in the loan at any time should they decide that their special political interests in China were becoming jeopardized.

Russia and Japan tried to exact an agreement that the loan should not be applied in any way likely to compromise their interests. The four other powers refused to agree to this, and it is understood that the final agreement was restricted to the financing of China, all political questions as such being left to the powers.

NAME ROYAL COMMISSION.

Quebec, June 22.—The Quebec Government appointed yesterday a Royal Commission to re-organize the license system of the province. The commission is composed of Justice Carroll, president, and Justices Cross and Tessier. The secretary is A. Brosnan, comptroller of provincial revenue.

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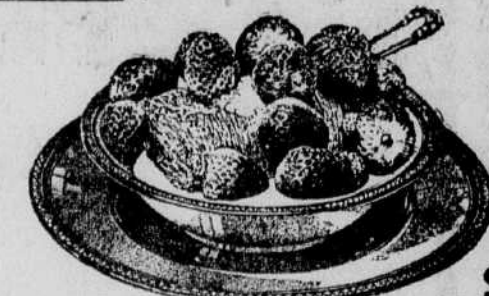
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
