Only Last Minute Compromise Can Prevent Municipal Election As Proprietors Gear For Action

Only a last minute compromise on the part of the Westmount Municipal Association will prevent the city's first municipal election in 25 years.

Nominations for mayor and five aldermanic positions must be made by Monday, and at a meeting Wednesday members of the Westmount Property Owners Association decided on running opposition candidates — unless a bargain is struck.

The Municipal Association has traditionally nominated candidates, who have been elected without opposition.

Main points of strife between the two bodies are housing and zoning laws. Several meetings with the present administration have completely avoided the issue, according to Elphege Menard, president of the Property Owners.

At the meeting this week his group decided to nominate three candidates for aldermen: Mrs. R. Cardinal, A. J. Livinson, and Mr. Menard.

Menard told The Examiner yesterday that his group would not oppose James De Lalanne, mayoralty candidate, or A. Turner Bone. Both are candidates of the Municipal Association and present aldermen.

They will try to displace three of the other four candidates: T. W. Bassett, J. C. Cushing, A. Powis, and Gerald G. Ryan.

Mr. Menard said his group is determined to go ahead with the election, unless the Municipal Association is willing to co-operate and save the city expense.

This could be done, he said, by withdrawing two of their candidates. In this case, the proprietors would withdraw one of their own and have the other two elected by acclamation.

He said that if the administration is willing to change its stand on the issues at stake, the proprietors would reconsider their decision to enter the municipal race.

He said the proprietors, if the election does take place, would centralize their aims.

The group plans to hold another general meeting next week, to drum up support for their candidates and plot a course of action, he said.

Nominations for the election Jan. 17 must be filed by Monday.

ABBOTT IN AUSTRALIA

Finance Minister Douglas Abbott favoring abolition of preferential tariffs stirred a hornet's nest in Australia the week of Jan. 8. The same week Westmount snow-fight-equipment turned out en masse to battle the first blizzard of the winter.

C. H. Savage, secretary treasurer of the Westmount School Commission, blasted Dr. Hilda Neatby's book *So Little For The Mind* the week of January 15, and was fiery in defense of modern day education. The following week the Westmount Library announced more members and more books in year end totals, and Quebec's school system was praised by Rev. Dr. G. G. D. Kilpatrick.

Decision was made the week of Jan. 29 to run Victoria avenue one way only, along with Grosvenor avenue. The following week Finance Minister Abbott returned from the Antipodes, and declared a one world currency was closer. Fred Owen, a Selby street resident, was instrumental in foiling a holdup attempt the week of Feb. 12, while the annual Weredale House report showed it filled to near capacity.

Westmount YMCA reported its best year the week of Feb. 19, and H. C. Nourse was elected

Father Lapointe Of St. Thomas More Named Pastor Of Ascension Parish

Rev. Fr. E. J. Lapointe will succeed the late Msgr. W. E. McDonagh as pastor of the parish of the Ascension of Our Lord in Westmount, it is announced.

Fr. Lapointe, who was formerly parish priest of St. Thomas More parish in Verdun entered the priesthood in 1927. His first appointment was at St. Willibrord's in Verdun as assistant priest where he remained until April 1944. At this time he received his appointment to St. Thomas More as priest-in-charge.

At the time of his going to St. Thomas More in 1944, services were being conducted from the Chapel of Ease on Bannantyne avenue. Six years later the present St. Thomas More church was

built. The rectory was built in 1946.

Fr. Lapointe has been a member of the Verdun Catholic School Commission since 1946, representing the English-speaking element on that body.

A native of Montreal, Fr. Lapointe attended Catholic High School, Loyola College and the Grand Seminary. He graduated from the latter in 1927 and received his appointment to St. Willibrord's church. He is the son of the late Joseph Lapointe and Helen Dineen. A cousin of Fr. Lapointe's, Bill Dineen, is a member of the Detroit Red Wings of the NHL.

Fr. Lapointe will be installed in his new post on Jan. 16 by Bishop Laurence P. Whelan.

management chairman. A full turnout attended the Roslyn School carnival. The city asked the Westmount Municipal Association to investigate the Athletics Grounds the week of Feb. 26.

Westmount's pure milk law was tightened the week of March 5, and word was first heard the following week of a proposed hotel and shopping center site on the old Atwater baseball grounds. Westmount High School the same week presented fine performances in Berkeley Square, the school's annual dramatic presentation. The week of March 19 saw Westmount decide to step up its improvement and extension to the city's power and light facilities.

Unity's intermediate basketball team won the city championship, but lost to MAAA in provincial semi-final play, the week of March 26. The same week saw St. Leo's senior B hockey team capture the league championship.

SCHOLASTIC MERIT

Several Westmount residents were among teachers who received merit badges from the Greater Montreal Interscholastic Athletic Association the week of April 2. MacRae Electric lost the St. Laurent Intermediate Hockey League championship that week in the last minute of play to Royal Pharmacy. The week of April 9 saw the city report a surplus of almost \$50,000, and Borden Empey was elected president of the Westmount Rotary Club.

Easter tulips went on view the week of April 18 at the Westmount Conservatory, and the following week the annual Home Beautiful supplement was issued with The Examiner. Also the week of April 23, prizewinners in the Hobby Show were announced.

Revenue and expenses were both up for 1953, the city announced the week of May 7, and Mayor Roy L. Campbell said the city must stand firm against the inroads by commercialism, at the annual Municipal Association meeting. The same week saw Major C. Pratt take over command of the Royal Montreal Regiment from Lt.-Col. J.P.C. Macpherson.

Westmount district scout council received its charter the week of May 21, at a special event held in the armory of the Royal Canadian Engineers. The following week, at Westmount Rotary, George Nakash, of Nakash Studio, said Canada surpasses all other countries in offering safety and freedom to refugees.

ATWATER TUNNEL

Finance Minister Abbott opened the Atwater tunnel the week of June 4. Chris Carr and Margery Klein were named top boy and girl at Westmount High School the following week, and Westmount Rotary presented an iron lung to the Children's Memorial Hospital.

The week of June 18 saw one of Westmount's zoning laws declared illegal by the Montreal Superior Court, and the Westmount Rotary carnival occupied the spotlight the week of June 25. Westmount scholarship winners were announced.

Finance Minister Abbott and Defence Minister Claxton stepped out of their capinet positions the week of July 2, and Hon. George Marler was named Transport Minister and a likely Westmount candidate. Egan Chambers was named to carry the Conservative banner in the federal byelection the week of July 16, and Unity Indians clinched their section pennant in Little League Baseball play. The following week Unity coaches Jack McKissock and Dave Barnard were named pilots of the American B all star team. Egan Chambers started his door to door canvass the week of July 30.

Mayor Campbell opened the Province of Quebec gladiolus exhibition the week of Aug. 13. The following week park mayors and mayoresses were named in Westmount. Announcement was made the week of Aug. 27 of additions to the RCMP barracks.

'Y' CHANGES

Norm Millington left his post as executive director of the Westmount Y the week of Sept. 3, and was replaced by Roy D. Locke. George Marler was named Liberal candidate the week of Sept. 10, and the Bank of Montreal Westmount branch marked half a century of business the week of Sept. 17. Westmount was included in tram to bus changeovers announced by the Montreal Transportation Commission the week of Sept. 24.

Egan Chambers was instrumental in organizing a meeting between Prime Minister St. Laurent and Quebec Premier Maurice Duplessis the week of Oct. 1. Enumeration was completed the following week for the federal by-election. Civil defense courses opened the week of Oct. 15. Election interest renewed in Westmount the week of Oct. 22 with Montreal municipal elections out of the way, and a new addition — a hose wagon with auxiliary pump arrived at the fire department the following week.

By-election candidates stormed down the home stretch the week of November 5, and the following week George Marler ended up near 4,000 votes better than Egan Chambers. The Royal Montreal Regiment was adopted by the city the week of Nov. 19, with ceremonies celebrating its 40th anniversary and remembrance day. The Examiner commemorated the occasion with a special supplement, the week of Nov. 26.

POWER PLAN

Transport Minister Marler urged power development at Lachine soon, the week of Dec. 3. The following week saw the Municipal Association nominate its candidates for municipal elections, and threats of a live election came

from the Westmount Property Owners Association. The annual Boys Parliament also took place in Westmount Baptist Church.

The Public Bills Committee of the Legislative Assembly in Quebec approved zoning bylaws of the city the week of Dec. 17, and The Examiner appeared with its annual Christmas Edition the week of Dec. 24. In the same week, city workers were honored for long service, three passing the 40 year mark. Myrtle Cook was the guest speaker at the first Unity Boy's Club Mother and Daughter Banquet. The year ended on a sad note the week of Dec. 31 with the death of Msgr. Wilfrid E. McDonagh, pastor of the Church of the Ascension of Our Lord, and one of the original founders of St. Mary's Hospital. A city vote, first in 25 years, still pending.

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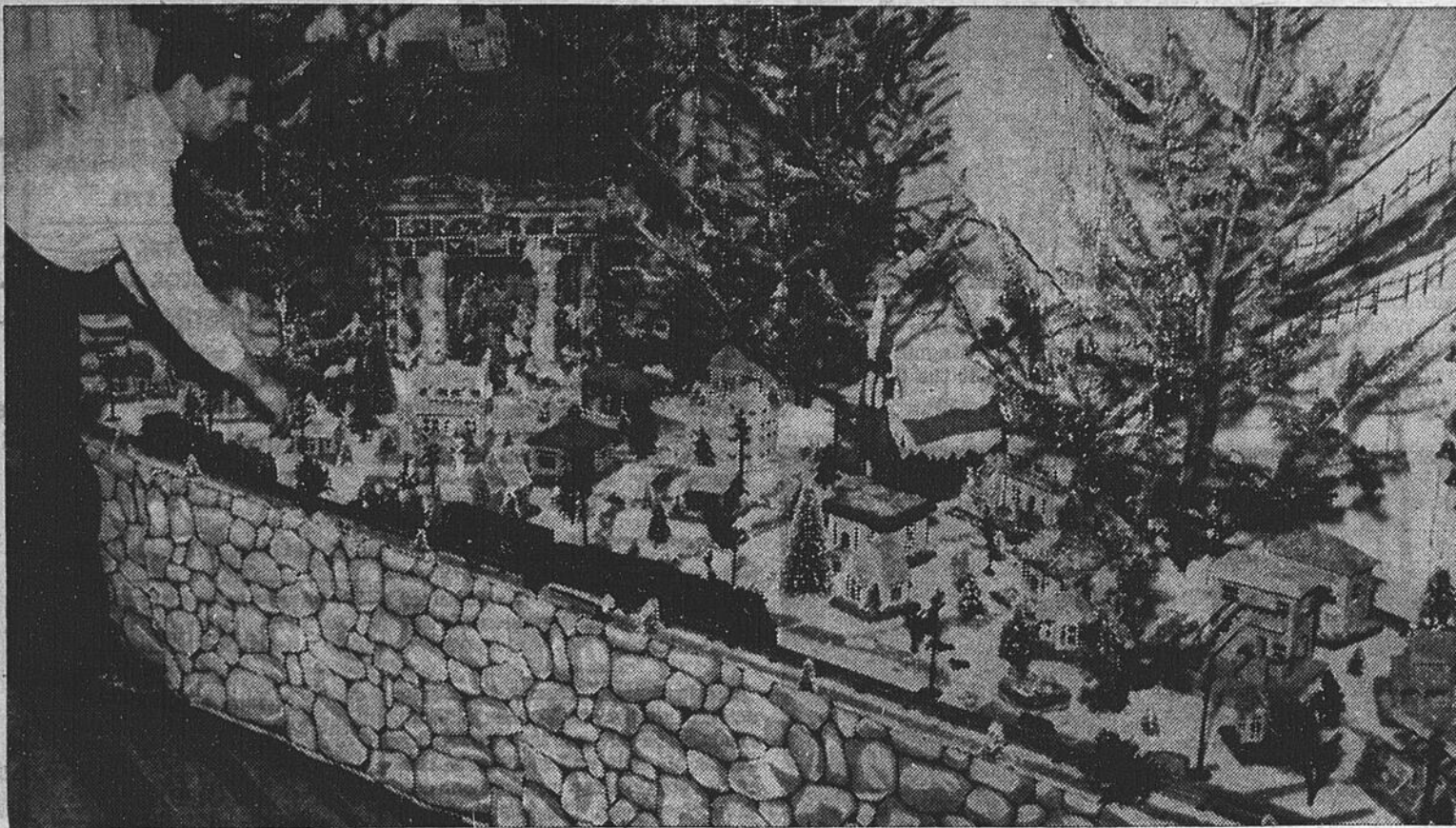

Students from two west end high schools will be among those taking part in the second concert festival sponsored by the Mount Royal Home and School Association.

The festival, which will be held January 13, 14 and 15, will feature pupils of 23 high schools, including West Hill and Westmount.

Some 400 young musicians, selected for talent and musicianship, will make up an orchestra, band and chorus of mixed voices. They hail from schools in Vermont, New York, the Eastern Townships, Three Rivers and the Island of Montreal.

The main concert will be given Saturday, Jan. 15 in the Mount Royal High School auditorium at 8.15 p.m. Seats are reserved, and tickets are on sale at the high school every day except Saturday and Sunday from 12 to 1 p.m. All proceeds go towards maintenance of the high school bands, orchestra and chorus.

Dr. Harrison Jones, director of the festival, has announced three guest conductors. They are Harry Norris, Montreal, orchestra; Ly-

man C. Hurd, Burlington, Vt., chorus; and Dr. Paul E. Wiggin, Oakland, Ma., band.

Dr. J. B. Stirling Presented With Kennedy Medal

Dr. John B. Stirling, 1612 Selkirk, and president of E.G.M. Cape and Company, has been awarded the Sir John Kennedy Medal for 1954, given for outstanding services towards the development of Canada, to engineering science and to the profession.

The medal is awarded annually by the Engineering Institute of Canada.

Dr. Stirling, native of Dundas, Ont., graduated from Queen's University joined E.G.M. Cape and Company in 1915, served overseas with the Royal Canadian Engineers in 1917, and returned to the company after the First World War. He became president in 1950.

A former president of the Montreal Board of Trade, Dr. Stirling has headed a number of professional groups during his career.

He is honorary colonel of the 3rd Field Regiment (Militia), Montreal, a member of the executive of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and president of the Better Business Bureau of Montreal.

Dr. Stirling joined the Engineering Institute of Canada in 1913 and has served on the executive committee of the Montreal Branch since 1939.

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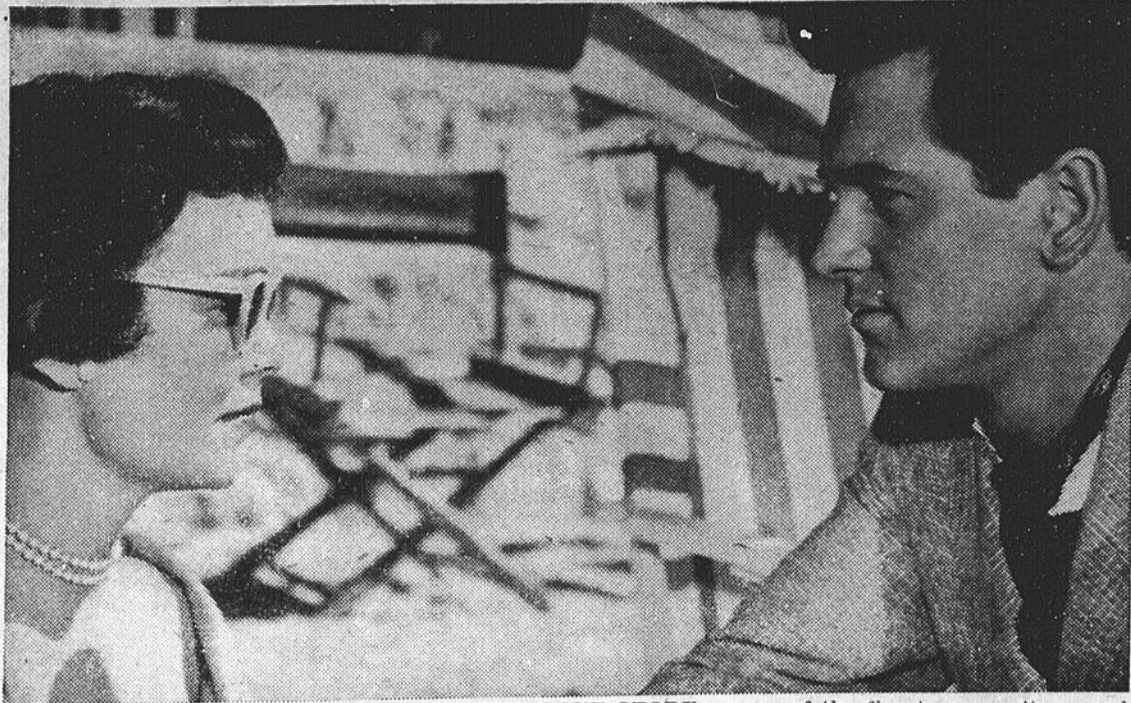

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Resident Presents Hospital With Nightingale Autograph

Harold R. Barnard, 1540 Summerhill avenue, this week presented the Alumnae Association of the Montreal General Hospital with an actual autograph of Florence Nightingale.

Mr. Barnard's sister received it in the form of a note from the famous nurse.

The note came to Miss Barnard through a meeting with Miss Nightingale in 1900. Mabel Mills Barnard, who later became Mrs. Charles Arnoldi and died at Oakville, Ont., last summer, wrote to her parents that year and described meeting Miss Nightingale while on a visit to London.

Miss Barnard had graduated from Mount Sinai Hospital in New York that year.

She called on Miss Nightingale at the latter's home, 10 South street, London, and found her reclining on a sofa, a sweet, dear old lady, about 80 years old, with a lovely face, a beautiful complexion, lovely grey hair and clear grey-blue eyes.

"I lost my heart to her at once," Miss Barnard added, "she was so kind and sweet."

At the conclusion of the visit, Miss Nightingale wrote and handed Miss Barnard a letter to the Matron of St. Thomas' Hospital asking her to show "Miss Barnard of Canada" through the hospital. The letter read

"Dear matron — Miss Barnard of Canada wishes to go visit St. Thomas'. Please let her see all you can of the working of the Hospital. Yours ever, F. Nightingale."

The letter was among Mrs. Arnold's possessions when she died.

A Good Resolution — Work Hard You Get Out of Life Not What You Deserve, But What You Work For

This is the time for the making of resolutions.

Perhaps the most important resolution anyone can make is to WORK HARD.

Much is contained in those words, HARD WORK. They mean careful living, keeping

health, maintaining the machine in good order. They also mean self control. Without the exercise of the will a mind is like a car without a steering wheel, going where chance directs it, not where the driver wants it to go.

It is not possible to do all we would like to do. We are in part, the instruments of heredity, environment, and training. But everyone possesses, in more or less degree, the power of will. More often than not success comes to those who best utilize that power, regardless of other physical and mental assets. You get out of life not what you deserve, but what you plan and work for.

The past can't be recalled, but mistakes can be mended. Failures of the past year can be wiped out by successes in the new one. The new year means a new chance.

Resolve on hard work and fixed purpose. If you can't gain a mile over past performance, gain an inch and keep on gaining inches.

The New Page

We turned the pages last week, and some of us at least made resolves that the new page would be more orderly than the last; not whiter or more clear of writing, for we do not expect to sit still and think nothing, say nothing and do nothing. The page will fill up without fail, but we have some control over the quality of the things we put down on it. The trouble with so many of us is that what goes down is such a hopeless, inconsistent muddle, and such a repetition of the shape of last year. There are none of us who should be able to say that we are completely satisfied with the past and intend to continue to live and think on the old pattern. There is always room for the improvement of the old and for the bringing in of something new. If I may use that forbidden word Education, I may say that we are always being educated, and we have some say in the form the education takes.

Now that word has been introduced I should like to quote something I re-read a few weeks ago. I regret that I cannot locate the source. I think it is H. G. Wood's Problems in Modern Education. It propounded three marks of an educated man in the form of three questions. The first is: Do you know how to entertain a new idea? In that question is contained the problem of the pursuit of truth. If you wish this year to develop intellectually and to keep the page of your year in an orderly fashion, do not be content with the old half-truths, or with the muddled apprehension of old real truths, but order your mind. Not all new ideas are good, but you cannot sort the good from the bad unless you face them both.

The second question is: Do you know how to entertain the other person? To entertain is not to amuse, but to enter into relationships with the other person. In that phrase is contained the whole matter of our dealings with one another. As we entertain the other person or persons we may try to use them for our own ends, or we may set our minds to do them good. The choice between the two ways determines the development of our own education and character for the coming year.

The third question is even more searching. Do you know how to en-

ertain yourself? Modern man is very dependent on others both for his mental and physical welfare. If a city man is lost in the wilderness he perishes of hunger and cold; if an Indian is lost the wilderness is not a wilderness for him — he makes a friend of it. Similarly if some of us were separated from newspapers and books we should starve mentally because we lack interior resources; we could not entertain ourselves. Yet some of the world's greatest thinkers had few or no books to depend on. A year is a short time to develop interior resources, but any time is a good time to begin.

My author goes on to quote the English writer Traherne: "To think well is to serve God in the interior court," and then he goes on, "To behave well is to serve God in the outer court. The purpose of Education is to bring the two together."

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Final Tribute Paid To Late Chief of C.D.

Final tribute was paid this week at a private funeral service to Lt.-Col. Philip Waldron Cook, 6001 Cote St. Luc road, chief of operations for the Civil Defence organization of metropolitan Montreal, who died last Thursday after a brief illness.

A former member of the Canadian Military Mission in Washington, and a veteran of World War I, Col. Cook later served as Canadian trade commissioner to Brazil, the West Indies and the Argentine.

Born in Quebec, the son of the late William Cook, QC, and Jessie Cassels Cook, he was educated at Royal Military College, Kingston, and received his commission in the Royal Canadian Artillery, in the First World War.

On demobilization, he joined the

For a few years after the War he was associated with the CBC International Service, and when civil defence was organized in Canada, he joined the Westmount group and became its director.

His great interest in life was music and he devoted much time and effort to encouraging young artists, especially singers and instrumentalists.

He is survived by his wife, the former Helen Irvine Smith; and three sons, Geoffrey, a member of the Canadian Embassy in Ankara, Christopher and Anthony of Montreal.





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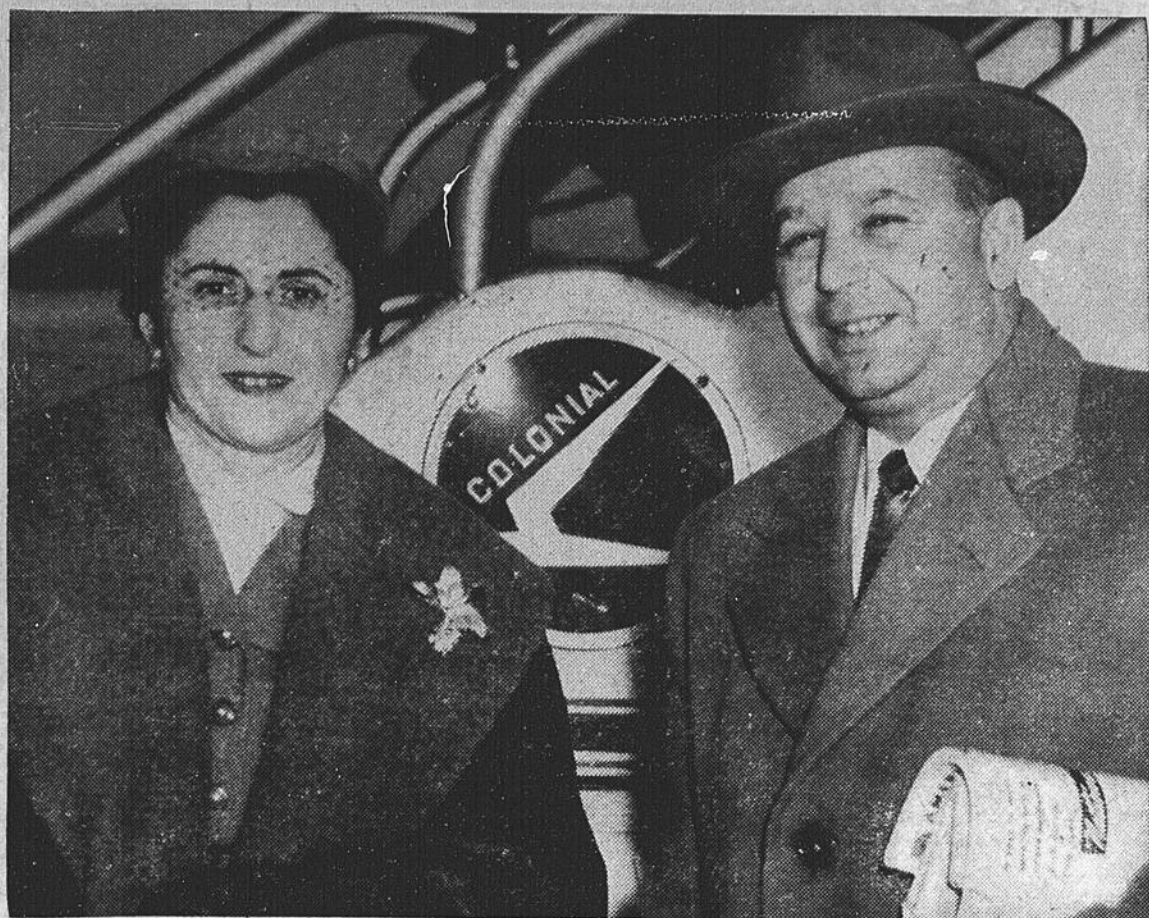

Poor Ball Handling Is The Main Weakness In Canadian Basketball

Last season members of the Sports College staff interviewed a representative number of basketball coaches, and watched many age-limit games. They reached the conclusion that ball handling (especially in passing and pass receiving) is one of the main weak spots in the basketball skill of young Canadians.

Here is a list of hints compiled after checking with a group of top basketball experts, including Paul Thomas, coach of the 1952 Canadian Olympic team.

(1) Generally speaking, aim your passes so that they reach the receiver chest high. This is the easiest position he can take the ball. There are exceptions to this rule, of course, such as when using a "close to the floor" system against taller opponents.

Lead The Receiver

(2) Always "lead" your receiver if he is moving. Pass so that he can run into the ball and not have to slow up or stop to take it. Aim slightly ahead of him.

Pass To Proper Side

(3) Be sure you pass to the side of your teammate away from his guard.

(4) Don't "telegraph" your passes. Learn to fake and feint, with your eyes, the ball, your body position, etc., before you pass. Do everything in your power to fool your guard and your teammate's guard into thinking you are going to pass, shoot or dribble in a different direction. Basketball is a game in which the "art of faking" plays an especially important part, so work on your "acting" ability until you can fake and feint in a convincing manner.

Be sure you don't use favorite tricks too often. Always try to add new and different stunts to your bag of tricks. If you work one or two "fakes" too often they will soon lose their effectiveness.

(5) The moment you find yourself guarded by two men, always look to see which of your teammates is open. One of them must be if they are "double-teaming" you!

(6) Watch the speed of your

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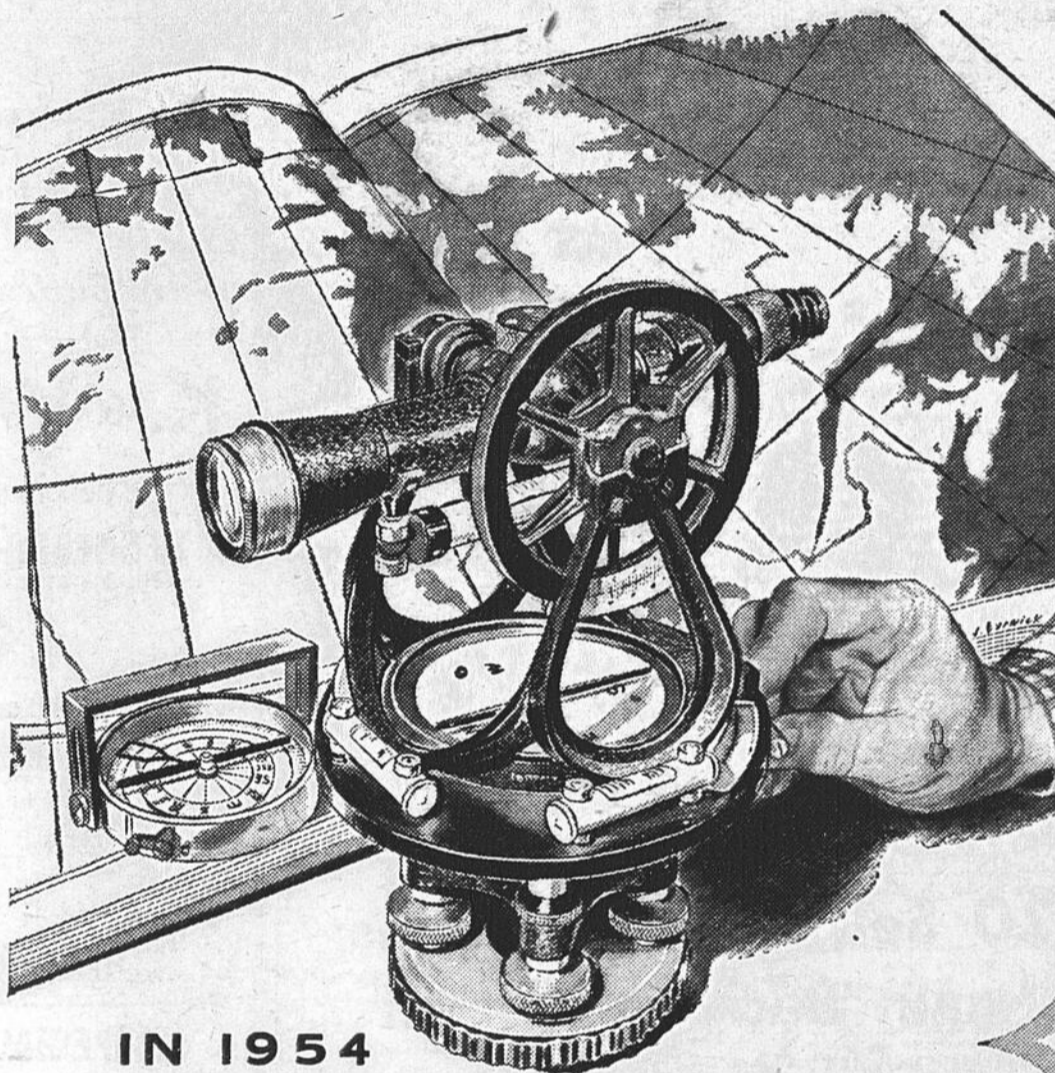
