CHAMBERLAIN'S POLICY PROGRESSING

Germany Prepared To Co-operate In Maintaining Peace

"Realistic" Programme for Bargaining With Fascist Powers Reported Advanced With German Acceptance of Plan for Withdrawal of "Volunteers" in Spain—Opposition Preparing New Attacks on Changed Government Foreign Policy.

London, February 24.—(P)—Prime Minister Chamberlain's "realistic" programme for bargaining with the fascist powers for the peace of Europe was reported today advanced by German acceptance of the British plan for withdrawal of foreign "volunteers" from the Spanish civil war.

Italy's acceptance in principle already has been indicated, paving the way for Anglo-Italian friendship talks to open shortly in Rome.

Dr. Ernst Woermann, German Charge D'Affaires, visited the Earl of Plymouth, British Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, and informed sources said he agreed to the British "volunteer" proposals.

This would indicate that Chancellor Hitler is but one step behind Premier Mussolini in conciliatory gestures toward the British Government from which Anthony Eden, whom both disliked, has withdrawn as Foreign Secretary.

Further Anglo-German negotiations are expected when Joachim Von Ribbentrop, Hitler's new Foreign Minister and retiring ambassador to London, returns here to take formal leave.

Soviets Have Not Approved Proposals.

Soviet Russia still has not approved the British formula on "volunteers," but it is confidently believed Germany and Italy are falling in line.

Britain has been the leading spirit in the cumbersome Non-Intervention Committee, of which Lord Plymouth is chairman, which has been trying for more than a year and a half to get foreign soldiers out of Spain. So far as is known, not a single alien fighter has left Spain as a result of the Committee's work.

Preparations for the Anglo-Italian friendship talks, first contemplated step in Mr. Chamberlain's programme, went ahead. Count Dino Grandi, Italian ambassador here, announced he would go to Rome this week-end to attend the session of the Fascist Grand Council before the talks open.

The Earl of Perth, British ambassador to Rome, returning to London to receive instructions for the Rome conversations, was to confer at once with Mr. Chamberlain. He is to go back to Rome shortly.

Opponents Prepare New Attacks.

Meanwhile opponents of the Government's changed foreign policy prepared new attacks. The House of Lords was to debate foreign affairs, with Labor peers attacking the Government. The Opposition press urged that the British Broadcasting Corporation put on the air the speech Mr. Eden is to make to his constituents in Warwickshire tomorrow night.

Mr. Chamberlain was reported to be determined to strive above all for a European pact uniting Italy, Germany, France and Great Britain.

Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador in Berlin, was understood to have been instructed to prepare the way for talks with Ribbentrop during his stay in London.

Emphasis on the prospects for a four-power pact was increased, it is reported that Premier Mussolini, who first proposed such an agreement, was eager to reach an understanding.

Keen Interest Apparent In Address Of Von Schuschnigg On Hitler Talks

Austrian Chancellor Goes Before Parliament Tonight to Broadcast to the Nation His Story of Berchtesgaden Talks with Chancellor Hitler.

Vienna, Feb. 24.—(P)—Chancellor Kurt Von Schuschnigg goes before Parliament tonight to broadcast to the nation his story of the Berchtesgaden talks with Chancellor Hitler. Those talks on February 12 led Von Schuschnigg to admit Nazi influence to his cabinet, after four years of fighting it, and all Austria awakened today to feverish excitement of uncertainty and expectation. Austrians were concerned whether the country gradually would become a part of the German Third Reich, whether it might be destined as an independent Nazi state, or whether it would remain a Catholic bulwark.

By the Berchtesgaden agreement five Austrians favorable to Germany gained cabinet posts, Nazi and other political prisoners were given amnesty, and for the first time Nazis were invited to join the Fatherland Front, Austria's only legal political party.

The invitation specified, however, that the Nazis must come as individuals and not as a party group.

That the Nazis were not yet to have complete freedom of action became apparent last night, when new restrictions were issued by the Department of Security.

They banned the wearing of Nazi insignia and Nazi uniforms, prohibited Nazi party activity and limited the use of Nazi songs and the greeting "Heil Hitler"—the latter to be permitted only if spoken without intent to political demonstration.

There was reservation among Austrian Nazis, particularly because the new orders came from a department under the Ministry of Interior, headed by Arthur Seyss-Inquart, who was Hitler's own choice for the office.

Von Schuschnigg worked all night on his address.

HUNGARY MAKES DEBT PAYMENT OFFER TO UNITED STATES

Washington, Feb. 24.—(P)—Hungary revived the whole question of war debts today by announcing a proposal for settling her obligation to the United States.

She offered to pay "100 cents on the dollar" of her original indebtedness, but minus interest. Payments would total \$1,207,000, divided into thirty annual non-interest-bearing instalments of about \$39,000. The original debt was \$1,685,000, from which Hungary would subtract the amount she already has paid on interest and principal—\$478,000.

Hungary's debt to this country arose through the purchase on credit of 13,890 tons of flour in the famine year of 1920. Her proposal brought opposition from some Congressmen.

Strengthening Of Solidarity With Britain Urged In France

Raising of National Defence System to Highest Possible Efficiency Also Urged by Radical Socialist Party, Second Largest Group in Chamber—Czechoslovakia Sees British Move as Leading to "Anarchy" in International Affairs.

Paris, Feb. 24.—(P)—Intensive strengthening of France's national defence and the maintenance of solidarity with Great Britain were approved today at a caucus of Radical-Socialist deputies, second largest group in the Chamber of Deputies.

Jean Mistler, chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee of the Chamber, was given a mandate to speak for the party in tomorrow's debate on international affairs after he had outlined his programme as follows:

1—Close relations with Great Britain must be maintained.
2—The military capacity of the country must be raised to a maximum through the development of all military, economic, financial and moral resources.

Mistler said that in future diplomacy will be based on "proof of force."

Leon Archimbaud spoke in favor of the principle of collective security and said the Franco-Soviet pact should not interfere with closer relations with Italy.

Principal opposition in tomorrow's debate to the policy outlined by Mistler is expected from the Communists. The political committee of that party this morning instructed Communist deputies to take a strong stand against "the pro-Hitler policy of Flandin and his friends."

URGE REFORMS IN COURSES OF RURAL SCHOOLS

Brief Submitted by Trustees of Fisher Trust Fund, Knowlton, Suggest Study Course Changes with Agriculture Stressed.

Montreal, Feb. 24.—(P)—Adoption of study courses more suited to rural schools, with study of agriculture prominently stressed, is suggested in a brief submitted yesterday by trustees of the Fisher Trust Fund of Knowlton to the survey committee examining Protestant education in Quebec. The trustees found rural schools were conveying a mistaken idea of the superiority of urban life.

The brief noted rural areas were unable to finance the improved educational facilities they should have and suggested the Government should provide additional services by grants through the Protestant Committee of the Council of Education.

The suggested services include scholarships covering tuition and board in superior schools where fees are charged; better transportation to and from schools; free text books; libraries and other equipment; free medical examination and treatment and improvement of school grounds.

Dealing with suggested changes in the course of study, the brief, signed by Edward Caldwell, R. Eric Fisher, R. F. Cowan and Orrin B. Rexford, explains that the purpose of agricultural study would not be primarily to develop farmers, but to develop men and women to live a full life in a rural community.

Agriculture should appear as a science subject in the course of a rural superior school and should be available in at least one superior in each large urban centre. More advantage should be taken of the educational value of such studies as domestic science, manual training, art and music, the trust believes.

A Protestant school attendance law requiring the attendance of children at school up to the age of fourteen is recommended, as is a regulation requiring all Protestant schools to adopt a regular school year of ten months. The Education Act should be changed to permit Protestant women, with the necessary qualifications, to be eligible as school commissioners or trustees.

The Fisher Trustees strongly supported the above suggestions.

Violent Scenes Witnessed In Jap Diet Over Mobilization

Near Riot Marked First Five Minutes of Debate on National Mobilization Bill Providing for War-time Control by Government Over Business, Finance and Lives of Private Citizens—Opposition Claims Measure Breaks Constitution.

Tokyo, Feb. 24.—(P)—A near riot in the Japanese Diet (Parliament) marked the first five minutes of debate today on the Government's long-awaited national mobilization bill.

Under the proposed law the Government would have wide wartime control over business, finance and the lives of private citizens. It contains stern, detailed restrictions on foreign trade and internal and external banking. One article would give the Government the right to suppress newspapers.

Premier Fumimaro Konoe was absent from the session because of illness, so Foreign Minister Koki Hirota opened debate.

Takao Saito, leader of the Minseitō, Lower Chamber majority party, declared he believed the bill was in conflict with the Imperial Constitution. He charged the Government had followed "foreign examples" in drafting the measure.

Instead of rising to reply Hirota remained seated. Diet members began to hoot and shout, defying the Speaker's efforts to maintain order.

JAPANESE WAR DEAD ARE RETURNED HOME

Tokyo, Feb. 24.—(P)—Black funeral cloth decorated every flag flying in Tokyo today as Japanese dead in the China war were returned home for burial.

A crowd of about 30,000 watched in silence as the funeral train arrived and officers alighted, carrying white boxes in each of which were the ashes of a soldier lost in battle.

The number of dead was not announced.

London-Dublin Negotiations Stalled Today On The Problem Of Partition

Prime Ministers Chamberlain and Eamon de Valera Both Reported Standing Firm on Original Positions They Took at the Outset of Talks.

London, Feb. 24.—(P)—Anglo-Irish negotiations for a settlement between London and Dublin were believed stalled today on the problem of partition.

Prime Ministers Chamberlain and Eamon de Valera both were reported standing firm on the original positions they took at the outset of the talks. Mr. de Valera wants an agreement between Great Britain and Eire—even though it be only one in principle—looking towards a union between Eire and the six northern counties. London insists nothing can be done without North-

ern Ireland's consent.

Five Nationalist members of the Northern Ireland Parliament arrived from Belfast in connection with the talks. It could not be learned whether they came here by invitation or on their own initiative.

Although at an impasse on the partition problem, the negotiations on economic and defence questions have not been interrupted.

The British and Irish delegations met separately this morning to consider their respective positions. The talks were to be resumed at 4 p.m., when technical questions relating to the commercial accord will be considered.

RETENTION OF FREE SPEECH IS DEMANDED

Sherbrooke-Quebec Presbytery of United Church Condemns Any Attempt to Deprive People of Traditional British Right of Free Speech.

The passage of a resolution strongly condemning any attempt to curtail the right of free speech was the feature of this morning's session of the Sherbrooke-Quebec Presbytery of the United Church of Canada which is meeting in Trinity United Church here under the presidency of Rev. William Long, of Danville, chairman of the Presbytery. The resolution read as follows:

"We place on record our conviction that the right of free speech, won by heroic and sacrificial suffering by the British people and guaranteed by the British constitution must be continued without modification or impairment, and further that we deplore and condemn any attempt to deprive any section of our people of this right by any means whatsoever contrary to British justice and equity as established by the supreme authority of our Dominion and the Empire."

During the course of the proceedings, which opened yesterday, a resolution of congratulation and cooperation to be conveyed to Dr. George Kilpatrick on his appointment to the principality of the United Theological College was passed.

European Feeling Over Resignation Of British Foreign Secretary Cools

Public Opinion Now Is Inclined to Await the Course of Events and See Success or Failure of Anglo-Italian Negotiations Before Judging Results—Smaller Nations with Large German Populations Anxiously Awaiting Next Move by Hitler.

London, February 24.—(C.P. Cable)—The temperature simmers down. Both in Great Britain and on the continent reaction to the resignation of Foreign Secretary Eden is easier. Public opinion now is inclined to await the course of events and see the success or failure of the Anglo-Italian negotiations. Then judge the results.

The French still are skeptical of Prime Minister Chamberlain's chances of an agreement. The Germans, after their first outburst of glee over abandonment of the sanctions principle, now are troubled by misgivings. They note with disappointment that while Mr. Chamberlain would throw off the "shams and pretences" of the League of Nations, he still would leave the Covenant intact.

The smaller nations are rubbing their eyes, wondering which way they will move next. Anxiety centres largely in those nations with big German-speaking minorities. At present there are 80,000,000 Germans in Europe, of whom only 65,000,000 are in Germany.

Although these stepsons of Naziland are not Germans politically—many of them have never been German citizens—they are part of that wider "Deutschum," that ethnic bond cutting across political frontiers. It is reported that at Berchtesgaden Chancellor Hitler told Kurt Von Schuschnigg, the Austrian Chancellor, that he regarded himself the Fuehrer of all Germans, whether actually resident of Germany or not.

Hitler has already moved into Austria with its 6,500,000 people of German speech.

Cutting into southeastern Germany in a great salient lies Czechoslovakia, with 3,500,000 Germans, constituting 25 per cent. of the total population. Among these Sudeten Germans, Nazi propaganda has been intense.

Czechoslovakia Puzzled Over Next Move.

Czechoslovakia, the ally of France, now is puzzled over the latest moves on the international chessboard, wondering where she will turn next. Czechoslovakia always has been an ardent supporter of the League.

When the committee for reform of the Covenant last met at Geneva, when delegates of the small European powers almost vied with each other in pointing out the difficulty of applying sanctions, the representatives of Czechoslovakia, while recognizing the weakness of the present League, thought it the duty of governments to remove, rather than resign themselves to, that weakness.

"It is dangerous," he argued, "to allow the idea to grow that violation of a rule suppresses that rule or automatically confers rights of revision."

The policy of the Czechoslovakian Government in regard to the German minorities has been, so far as has been possible, to let concession precede demand. Thus, it was argued, Hitler will have no excuse for intervention. Further concessions in this direction are expected.

Doubts If France Could Fulfill Obligations.

None the less, Czechoslovakia is worried. With collective security existing only on paper there are those among the Czechs who are asking whether, in the present state of Europe, France would be able to fulfill her obligations toward Czechoslovakia should Hitler decide to strike.

For a small nation Czechoslovakia is militarily strong. She can on short notice put armies of training.

Proposal To Amend Parliamentary Procedure Met With Scant Support

Justice Minister Leads Opposition to Establishment of Committee to Revise Rules of House—Measure Extending Rail Commission's Power to Be Introduced Today.

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—(P)—Parliament will carry on for the time being under rules revised in 1927, it was decided in the House of Commons yesterday.

Led by W. R. Gladstone (Liberal, Wellington South), a group of private members criticized the present rules as inefficient in greater or less degree but at the end of the debate Mr. Gladstone withdrew a motion to establish a committee to study the rules.

He withdrew after the dean of the House, Justice Minister Lapointe, stated the present rules were "not so bad" and reminded the members the business of the present session would be heavy and that without advance study by individual members it was doubtful if a special rules committee could function to advantage.

Only definite opponent of the proposed committee was John Black-

more, Social Credit leader, who objected to giving a committee blanket powers to review the rules without submitting some concrete proposition.

He feared the proposed study would end in a revision more favorable to the Government than to private members as there appeared to be a movement afoot to curtail all expressions of popular opinion on the general theory that everything new was bound to be wrong.

Among the suggestions advanced in the debate were:

That a foreign affairs committee give intensive study to Canada's foreign policy, by Paul Martin (Liberal, Essex East);

That the hours of House sittings be changed from three to six and eight to eleven o'clock to from two to seven o'clock, leaving the members with mornings and evenings

CAROL TO HAVE GREATER POWER OVER RUMANIA

Adoption of New Constitution Which Abolishes Democratic Parliamentarianism Considered Foregone Conclusion.

Bucharest, Feb. 24.—(C.P. Havas)—Five million Rumanians went to the polls today to vote on King Carol's new constitution.

Adoption of the charter, which abolishes democratic parliamentarianism, creates a corporate state, and markedly strengthens the hand of the monarch, was considered a foregone conclusion.

Heavy fines confronted any eligible voters who declined to go to the polls. The regulations provided that a voter first give his name verbally and then an oral "yes" or "no" to the constitution. Voters opposing the constitution were required to give their address and sign a special declaration.

All Rumanian citizens over twenty-one were called upon to vote. Women were not eligible.

Although minorities long established on Rumanian soil are promised rights equal to those enjoyed by Rumanians, the new basic law laid down by King Carol reserves all administrative posts to "Rumanians of Rumanian race."

SUSPENDED SENTENCES IN MEGANTIC ORPHANAGE ARSON CASE

Arthabaska, Que., Feb. 24.—(P)—Three boys from an orphanage at St. Ferdinand d'Hallifax were given suspended sentence yesterday when they came to court after pleading guilty to setting fire to the Megantic County institution last month.

Sentence was deferred until March 7 on two other youngsters who also admitted setting the fire that caused considerable damage.

NAMES GALORE FOR THE BABY ON FILE

New York, Feb. 24.—(P)—"What shall we name the baby?" Ask the Brooklyn public library, which announced today it had 560,000 names on file for just such an emergency. Examples are Cello, Earline, Honin, Glanmureen, Nervertia, Shulamith, Zipperath and Flimpitz.

LENNOXVILLE SPAN OPEN TO LIGHT TRAFFIC

Traffic Limited to Maximum Weight of Two Tons Allowed Across College Street Bridge—Rushing Repair Work.

Light traffic was resumed across the College street bridge at Lennoxville for the first time since Monday, when the span was closed for the erection of a strengthening steel girder. The maximum weight allowed on the bridge today was two tons. Approximately two weeks ago the bridge was closed to traffic for several days when an unusual defect in the fabrication of the steel caused one of the longitudinal supports to sag.

Ice in the Mississippi River is reported to be melting gradually and no fears are held for the safety of the span in the spring break-up. Officials supervising the work of erecting the girder are very pleased with the progress made so far and expect the bridge will be open to normal traffic within a few days. A hydraulic jack is being used in the work.

Thomas Reid (Liberal, New Westminster) was the only speaker on his own resolution to eliminate Japanese from the British Columbia fishing industry. He indicated his willingness not to force it to a vote because he had received assurances from Fisheries Minister Michaud that something could be done about the problem.

Mr. Reid's resolution called for forty per cent reduction in the number of fishing licenses issued to Japanese this year and fifteen per cent reductions each succeeding year until none were left.

Argument for a reduction was based on the contention while fishermen could not compete with the low standards of living and the methods of the Japanese who practically dominated the industry, particularly on the Fraser river.

In one area, Mr. Reid said, a white fisherman would be taking his life in his hands if he attempted to fish. The Japanese regarded it as their special reserve.

The Japanese never regarded themselves as Canadian citizens, said Mr. Reid. If they got in difficulties they appealed to the Japanese Government. If something was not done the Canadian Government would soon have to ask the Japanese Government to tell its nationals to leave Canadians alone in Canada.

Today the House reverts to Government business and among items to come up will be introduction of Transport Minister Howe's bill to alter and extend the powers of the Board of Railway Commissioners, making it in effect a transportation commission.

ed reserves into the field. She has built a Maginot line of concrete and steel round her frontiers. Industry can be mobilized on short notice. Skoda armament works are being gradually moved from German points. Eight aircraft factories are working full speed, turning out planes to the smallest part.

Yet, while these preparations protect Czechoslovakia against surprise attack, her ultimate safety depends upon allies.

Today the Paris Epoque comments: "We agree with those who consider that if France drops her European friendships, betrays her formal understandings with Poland and Czechoslovakia, watches on while weak nations are crushed by Hitler as she watched Denmark crushed by Bismarck, and withdraws into her own shell in resignation and cowardice, then she would tomorrow be condemned to receive the contempt of all and perish in her turn, unaided."

Board gave notice of an ordinance setting out minimums and conditions for all workers not provided for under the Act respecting workmen's wages. Its operation was postponed to allow study of protests and suggestions from industries and workers.

Opposition leader T. D. Bouchard led the attack on the amending bills because they exempted contractors doing Government work from paying the wages specified for many regions. He said there had been complaints that contractors employed by the Government were not paying "salaries guaranteed workers by collective agreements."

Under the bills, he charged, "no one can pursue the violator of a collective agreement without permission of the Attorney-General. That is arbitrary and shows the Government wants absolute rule of the people of the province."

In reply, Mr. Tremblay demanded that a specific case of exploitation of Government workers be cited and added: "There is a law we forced the (Liberal) Government to pass in 1929 which guarantees fair wages to laborers employed on Government projects."

The Government needs certain latitude, he said, "and our policy of justice for everyone assures the workers of protection—and they know it."

BRITISH ACTION CRITICIZED BY CZECHS

Praha, Feb. 24.—(AP)—The newspaper Lidove Noviny said today Czechoslovakia fears the British swing toward the Rome-Berlin bloc is leading toward greater "anarchy" in international relations and spoke of "the tragic error" of Prime Minister Chamberlain.

"Czechoslovakia is not a second Spain, nor a second Austria," the paper added. "The whole world wants peace but there are various routes leading to this goal. We fear the British policy leads not toward peace but toward an anarchy in international relations more perilous than that which already exists."

The Republic's defence plan was outlined yesterday by General Ludw. Jan Krejci, chief of the General Staff, who said: "Our task in the event of war, is to hold off the enemy without outside help during the first phase of the fighting."

Then, he added, the country will look to her allies, France and Russia, for help.

"For this purpose a far-flung system of fortifications is being erected along our borders," the General said. "These should give our possible enemies reason to ponder whether plans of brutal aggression would have any chance of success."

Meanwhile the Government is endeavoring to settle peacefully the problem of minority populations by widening public and economic rights. A decree is ready for promulgation opening civil service and other Government positions to each minority group in proportion to numerical strength, and cultural autonomy is to be granted.

Already German schools in Czechoslovakia are being run by Germans, Polish schools by Poles, and so forth. A radio station to broadcast news in German is to begin operation next month.

AIR RAID WARNINGS ARE SOUNDED IN TOKYO

Tokyo, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Twelve high-flying Chinese bombers were reported roaring over the China Sea today to carry the Far East war to thickly-settled Japan.

Air raid warnings screamed in northern provinces of Kyushu, southwesternmost main island of this maritime empire. They sounded less than twenty-four hours after a Chinese squadron bombarded the Japanese island of Formosa in the first air attack Japan ever has suffered.

Four hours later the air raid alarm was cancelled. Naval officers expressed belief the Chinese armada had returned to its base when it became apparent its coming was known and Japan was prepared.

Defence headquarters at Fukuoka, on Kyushu, gave word of the approach of the Chinese planes, Dorei (Japanese news agency) reported.

Sirens were sounded also in Yamaguchi Province, on the main island of Honshu. The great port of Nagasaki, with a population of 211,000, was warned of the approach of the planes, which would have to cross five hundred miles of the East China Sea to reach Japan.

A communiqué from the Japanese Formosa garrison said ten planes were sighted over the sea northeast of Formosa, heading eastward. (This would point them in the general direction of Kyushu.)

A bill authorizing formation of savings and credit unions following the pattern of similar unions in Quebec, Nova Scotia and in forty-two states of the United States, was given second reading yesterday.

Ten or more persons in Alberta could form a union under a supervisor and deputy supervisor to be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. They would create a local credit service to which they might have access and make deposits as in bank savings accounts.

The credit unions, known as "baby banks," could make loans to members for provident and productive purposes or merchandizing purposes.

The report of the Special Milk Committee was tabled in the House. It recommended that direction of the milk industry be placed under a Milk Control Board instead of the Public Utilities Board as at present.

The House gave first readings to bills increasing the surtax under succession Duties Act from ten to twenty per cent and advancing the unearned increment tax from five to ten per cent. Both bills were introduced by Premier Aberhart.

Later second reading was given the bill to impose a tax of three cents on an acre on freehold mineral rights and another tax bill awaiting second reading, would impose a tax of two cents an acre on wild lands.

The first credit union was started at Levis, Que., by Alphonse Desjardins in 1890. Now there are three hundred in that province.

In recent years the Credit Union movement has grown rapidly in Nova Scotia where there are about 20,000 persons in the various unions.

From Quebec the movement spread rapidly through the United States, following the Quebec plan of confining membership in any one union to a group of workers in one industry.

Minister Not Over-Confident
The question of what specific accord could be reached with Italy, however, became more involved as a Cabinet Minister hinted the Government is not over-confident regarding the prospects of agreement.

"This is not a wager as to whether in the end an agreement will be reached with Italy or not," Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, said in a speech before the Birmingham Conservative Club.

"The question is whether it is right to open conversations. If indeed they lead to ultimate agreement on honorable terms, this will be a happy conclusion. But even if they do not, this won't prove that it is not right to enter upon conversations."

Insistence by Italy on a greater voice in administration of the Suez Canal, it was feared in some quarters, would make it difficult to arrive at a full Mediterranean accord, but would not exclude a less ambitious agreement.

The Earl of Plymouth, chairman of the Spanish Non-Intervention Committee, meanwhile continued private conferences with ambassadors on withdrawal of Spanish volunteers from the civil war armies. Germany is expected to approve the British plan for volunteer withdrawal soon, leaving only Russia in the doubtful column.

Ernst Voermann, German chargé d'affaires, visited Lord Plymouth and informed sources said he agreed to the British proposals.

Flays Official Secrecy.
Following reports the Government plans to do away with the Foreign Office Press Bureau, published by the Leftist periodical "The Week," the Manchester Guardian (Liberal), expressed regret that secrecy may replace the frankness shown by Mr. Eden.

"There is a profound change in atmosphere," the Manchester Guardian declared. "Many human contacts have been broken. A certain frankness that made the work of those who are concerned with foreign affairs more satisfactory here than anywhere else in the world has gone."

"Quite apart from his policy, Mr. Eden spread frankness with a certain lightness and human interest that eased the problem of information."

"Secret diplomacy is of course unavoidable, but it has been realized here—as nowhere else—that some kind of communication between the interested public and those responsible for policy is needed, all the more so as there can be little doubt that the times demand psychological as well as material preparation for the worst."

"In a period of national emergency a certain understanding between the public and those responsible for policy may be a source of national strength. There is some reason to believe that the general course of British foreign policy will not change—but the charts will be locked-up and helpful explanations by the captain will no longer show where the ship is going."

AN IMPRESSIVE CONSECRATION CEREMONY

Thousands Filled St. Michael's Cathedral For Colorful Service

His Eminence Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve, Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, Presided at Solemn Consecration Ceremony this Morning—Large Number of Archbishops, Bishops, Clergy and Lay Members Attended Service.

With His Eminence Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve, Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, as consecrator, Mgr. Philippe Servule Desranleau was this morning elevated to the rank of Bishop Coadjutor of Sherbrooke Diocese in an impressive and dignified ceremony at St. Michael's Cathedral.

The solemn ceremony of consecration, enacted for the fourth time in the Mother Church of Sherbrooke Diocese, was attended by thousands of church dignitaries and lay people, the spacious and imposing Cathedral being filled to capacity.

Few of the lay congregation had ever witnessed such a solemn and religious event, colorful with its red-robed Cardinal, purple-attired archbishops and bishops, purple-sashed canons, white-surplined priests and scores of delegates from various religious institutions, such as the Redemptorists, the Marist Brothers, the Franciscans, Dominicans, Oblates and others. The Knights of Columbus were represented by delegates from Montreal, Sorel, St. Hyacinthe, Magog, East Angus and various other Councils from different parts of the Eastern Townships and the Province of Quebec.

At ten o'clock, His Eminence, flanked by J. E. Palmer, of East Angus, Commander of the Order of St. Gregory, and Armand Corriveau, his camaraderie, entered the edifice through the transept leading from the Bishop's Palace, and followed by the church dignitaries, visiting clergy and members of the Diocesan Chapter, led a procession through the Cathedral and up to the main altar, at the foot of which he knelt while the archbishops, bishops and other clergy representatives filed into their pews in the sanctuary.

The Pontifical mass was jointly celebrated by the Cardinal, as consecrator, and Mgr. Desranleau, as Bishop Coadjutor-elect. His Eminence being assisted by Mgr. A. E. Deschamps, Auxiliary Bishop of Montreal, and Mgr. J. A. Desmarais, Auxiliary Bishop of St. Hyacinthe. The Cardinal celebrated mass at the main altar, while the Bishop Coadjutor-elect carried out his ceremony at an improvised altar on the right hand side of the sanctuary. As joint celebrants, the Cardinal and Mgr. Desranleau used the same vessels and the same Sacred Host in the celebration of the Pontifical mass.

The ceremony included the examination, consisting of the oath of loyalty to His Holiness the Pope, the examination proper and the profession of faith; and the consecration, composed of the Litany of the Saints, sung to the accompaniment of the choir, the laying on of hands, the anointing of the Bishop-elect's hands and head, and the presentation to Mgr. Desranleau of the crozier, ring and the Gospels. The final part of the ceremony, comprised the laying on of the mitre and gloves, the "Te Deum," sung by Cardinal Villeneuve, the solemn benediction given by the new Bishop, and the expression of thanks by Mgr. Desranleau to Cardinal Villeneuve as consecrator.

Singing By Assorted Choirs.

At the beginning of the mass, the music and singing were furnished by choirs from various local churches, who were under the direction of Professor Oscar Carlier, with John Codere as organist.

This choir rendered the "Kyrie," the "Gloria" and the "Credo," all by Yon; the "Sanctus," by Nicou-Choron; "Agnus Dei," by Paladille, with arrangements by Professor Carlier, and the "Magnificat," by Vittoria. Solo parts were taken by Charles Emile Bachand, Francois Labrecque and A. Provost.

The St. Gregoire Choir of the St. Charles Seminary, under the direction of Rev. Father Herve Bergeron, sang the mass proper.

Apart from the two Auxiliary Bishops assisting in the celebration of the Pontifical Mass, were Mgr. J. E. M. Vincent, Vicar General of the Diocese, as assistant priest; Rev. Canons Victor Vincent and J. B. Archambault as deacons; Rev. Father Georges Cabana, of the Grand Seminaire of St. Hyacinthe, as deacon of office; Rev. Father Charles Lamoureux, as sub-deacon of office; Rev. Canons Arsene Goyette and F. A. Laroche, as chaplains of the Bishop-elect; Rev. Father Athanasie Francoeur, as chaplain to Mgr. Desmarais; and Rev. Fathers B. Desrochers, O. Vel, J. Veilleux and Victor Quintal, as masters of ceremony.

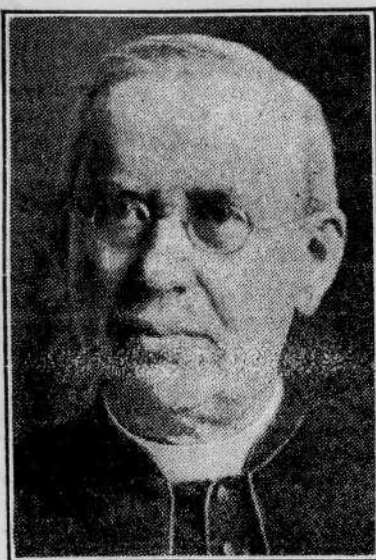

Mgr. Philippe Servule Desranleau Yesterday Afternoon Presented with Set of Liturgical Vestments from Clergy of Sherbrooke Diocese—Comes to Sherbrooke as "Your Protector and Your Defender."

Mgr. Philippe Servule Desranleau, newly-appointed Bishop Coadjutor, received the homage of the clergy of Sherbrooke Diocese at the Bishop's Palace yesterday afternoon after presenting his Papal Bulls to Rt. Rev. A. O. Gagnon, Lord Bishop of Sherbrooke. Surrounded by His Lordship and an imposing array of church dignitaries, Mgr. Desranleau—whose consecration took place at St. Michael's Cathedral this morning—with presented with a set of liturgical vestments.

In his few remarks of appreciation to the clergy, forceful as they were, deeply sincere, at times containing a touch of witicism, the new aide to the aging Lord Bishop of Sherbrooke made a strong impression upon the gathering of purple-sashed canons and black-robed priests. A robust man in his early fifties, vigorous, scholarly, masterful, Mgr. Desranleau has already carved an impressive niche for himself in things ecclesiastical and pertaining to the advancement of Roman Catholic teaching.

"I come to Sherbrooke as your friend, your counsellor, your protector and your defender," he told the Catholic clergy.

The ceremony at the Bishop's Palace, staged in the imposing salon, was attended exclusively by members of the clergy. Seated next to His Lordship Bishop Gagnon, Mgr. Desranleau was surrounded by the Rev. Canons J. A. Dufresne, M. Couture, H. A. Simard, J. S. Laroche, J. A. Bussiers, C. Roy, Leon Marcotte, Napoleon Codere, O. Z. Letendrie, J. P. Pilette, W. Larue, J. C. McGee, A. Goyette and Victor Vincent.

Mgr. J. E. M. Vincent, P.D., Vicar-General of the Diocese, who made the presentation to the Bishop Coadjutor-elect, stated that the clergy considered it "a privilege, an honor and a joy to offer you their homage at this time, and pray you to accept their felicitations and best wishes."

The appointment by His Holiness Pope Pius of Mgr. Desranleau as Bishop Coadjutor, to relieve Mgr. Gagnon of some of his burdens and responsibilities had come as a veritable blessing and a consolation for the Bishop in the evening of his life, the Vicar-General said. "Mgr.

Gagnon was a gifted and valued bishop; his manifold duties were shouldered without thought of self, devotedly, unselfishly; his counsel had been ever wise, studied and invaluable; he had led his flock as guided by the Divine Light, and his kindness and consideration for others had been as characteristic as his love and for his devotion to his faith and his God. But now, at three score years and ten—Bishop Gagnon celebrated his seventieth birthday on December 13th—the weight of his years had rounded his shoulders, weakened his physique, sapped his vitality, and he had prayed for such an aide as Mgr. Desranleau to share with him the heavy tasks of his office during his declining years. That wish had been fulfilled through the intermediary of the Sovereign Pontiff, and the members of the Diocese were overjoyed to welcome the new Bishop Coadjutor," Mgr. Vincent continued.

"You come among us preceded by your enviable reputation as a scholar and a staunch defender of the Catholic faith," he said, turning to the Bishop Coadjutor.

Mgr. Desranleau's life, he continued, had been one of zeal, devotion, activity, and he had ever been a preacher of the gospel of truth.

Mgr. Vincent recalled the names of Bishop Racine, Bishop La Roche and Bishop Chailfoux, and he had no doubt, he said, that Mgr. Desranleau would be a worthy successor to these bishops, as some day he would be a worthy successor to Bishop Gagnon—striving for the welfare, the peace, the contentment and the religious fervor of the Diocese, as these men before him had done.

Prior to the presentation of the gift-souvenir, Mgr. Desranleau presented his Papal Bulls to the Lord Bishop.

During the ceremony at the Bishop's Palace, His Eminence Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve paid an informal visit to the Mont Notre Dame Convent, where he was received by the Mother Superior and members of the staff.

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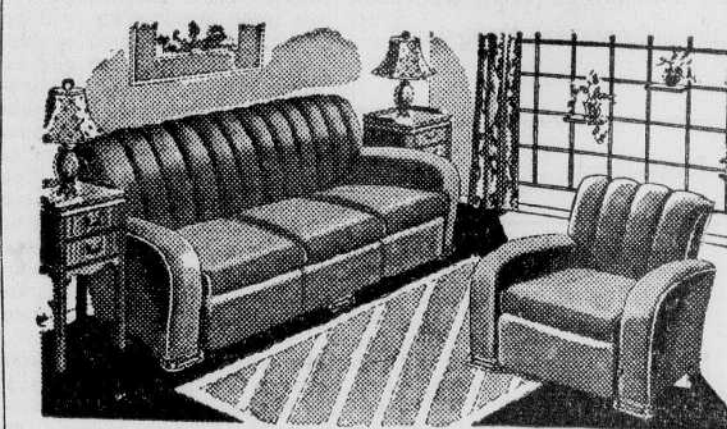

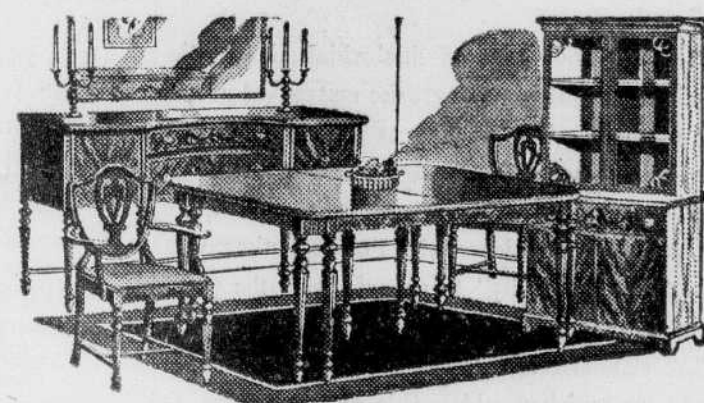

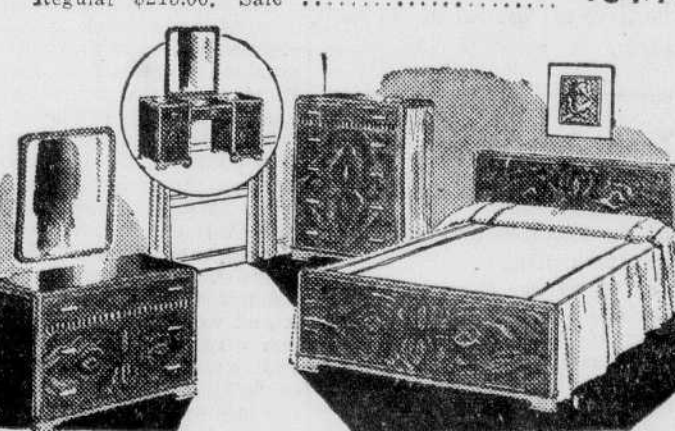

No Need For It.

A question, everywhere heard today, is this: "Why should there be widespread poverty in this wonderful age of plenty?"

During recent years the application of science to the production of real wealth—a different thing altogether from money which is only a counter or symbol of wealth—has been so successful that whatever is needed to provide the primary necessities of life—food, clothing and housing—can be produced in superabundance.

In other words, says The Halifax Herald, the goods needed to dissipate poverty and distress are available, but the economic system needs to be adjusted to allow the goods to be more equally distributed.

It is the knowledge of this which lies at the root of the discontent amongst the masses of people of all countries. They realize, as never before, that there is today no need for poverty.

Their dissatisfaction arises from their quite understandable impatience with Public Authority in its "masterly inactivity" to grapple with the problem of distribution.

The standard all governments should have in view is one which would enable human beings to attain their full inherited capacity for health and happiness.

Legislation is good to the extent that it is calculated to promote that ideal.

The Casual Age.

One of the most amazing things about the present generation, or age, is the casual way we accept the most magical of miracles.

Some one announces: "Television is here." So we accept television as being here. Actually we know it is not exactly here, but we feel quite sure it is just around the corner for this is the age when anything, little matter how wondrous, can be perfected once conceived or begun.

Six "flying fortresses" of the United States Army Air Corps carrying forty-nine men hop off casually from Miami, fly 2,693 miles to Lima, Peru, nonstop, land for six hours and continue the flight to Buenos Aires. The trip is a matter of hours and of small comment in this present age.

Why not. Other airplanes hop around, here and there, across land and sea. We were told several years ago that big bombers would eventually be able to cruise thousands of miles, in war or peace, without difficulty. The time has arrived unnoticed, that's all.

Gilbert And Sullivan On The Screen.

One of the most ambitious efforts in production of favorite operas on the screen is said to be projected by Geoffrey Toye, who proposes to produce the complete set of Gilbert and Sullivan operas. It is said that he is determined to make this film revival as nearly as possible a reproduction of the operas as they were staged at the time of the first performances.

Mr. Toye is more to be complimented on his ambition than on his appreciation of the probable magnitude of his task. It will be possible, of course, and not difficult to reproduce the music, the costumes and the acting, but to anyone familiar with the de-

lightful works of Gilbert and Sullivan it is hard to see how he can carry into his screen versions the— for want of a better word, let us call it spirit—that has made these operas as fresh and appealing today as when they were written more than half a century ago. There is something about them—even those so definitely "dated" as Patience and Pinafore—that has made them live and give more pleasure to their hearers the oftener they are heard.

Perhaps it is on this very immortality Mr. Toye is counting; but this venture is a long-odds gamble. Either the people will take to the "canned operas" or they will not; and if they do not there will be no uncertainty about it. The venture will be either a huge success or a dismal failure. Before committing himself to a full programme it might be better for Mr. Toye to try one of the shorter productions, such as "Iolanthe" or "Trial by Jury." Better to go in off the shallow end, Mr. Toye.

Streamlining Aids.

Streamlining has come to the aid of the hardware business, a story which indicates that after setbacks, ingenuity and energy achieve come-backs rising to new heights.

When family purses ran low during the depression, a pot was a pot and a pan was a pan. The old would serve or could be repaired. Something had to be done about it in the hardware business.

Something was. The stew pot was made a work of art and the frying pan a thing of beauty, with new color, new form—streamlining.

The story is a remarkable one. Things in the hardware business are a lot better. It has met the depression and conquered, thanks largely to the development of new ideas. New things people want are being invented and the old ones are being improved.

A Newspaper's Duty

(Peterborough Examiner)

There has been some controversy in Oshawa because the Oshawa Times published a report of something that happened at an open meeting of the city council, despite a request from the latter body that nothing should be said about the matter. It seems that the council had decided to extend some assistance to a number of single unemployed and the members wanted publicity because of a fear that it might be followed by a flood of applications for similar assistance.

We do not see where the aldermen had any grievance against the paper in this particular instance. Obviously a newspaper, that is fair to its readers and to its own responsibility as a community paper, cannot afford to have its reports of what takes place at open council meetings censored. In addition there is always the danger that the omission of some of the proceedings from reports of council session where there is usually an audience of reporters, will set up a lack of confidence on the part of the public in the paper itself and that would be damaging indeed.

Newspaper readers have a right to know what takes place at council meetings and the journal that does not supply this information is failing down on its job. The Oshawa aldermen ought to be able to see the reasonableness of that for themselves and to realize that they made a mistake in trying to have part of the report suppressed.

Committee meetings are on a different footing. They are held in private in order that details may be threshed out before there is public discussion of the points at issue and while here in Peterborough, meetings of the city council committees are always open to the press, there is an understanding that a request for silence in regard to any particular item will be respected by the newspapermen present. There have been comparatively few such requests made and anyway when the matters under consideration reach open council no alderman here would think of trying to prevent the press from publishing the details.

PRESS COMMENTS

PLATINUM IN ALASKA

(New York Sun)

Eleven years ago platinum was discovered at Goodnews Bay, off Bering Sea, by Charles Thorsen, a "soundough" prospector. The working of deposits along certain streams by modern dragline excavators commenced in 1924, and by last summer operations had so increased as to merit the description of a rush. A bucket dredge was installed and is now in operation. Over 5,600 ounces of platinum, valued at nearly \$242,000 were produced last year by the new district, and indications are that this year production will be even larger. Annual world production rarely exceeds 300,000 ounces. Dr. J. B. Mertie, Jr., of the Geological Survey found that the probable source of the Alaskan platinum is an elongated ridge, seven miles by two, called Red Mountain. The platinum placers lie in an area which was not in the path of larger ice glaciers advancing from the mountain region north-east of Goodnews Bay, and the deposits thus escaped being gouged out and carried away.

A news note in Science says that the deposits resemble geologically the rich placers of the Ural Mountains. Like the Russian deposits the source rock contain insufficient platinum for profitable working, but the stream beds, where platinum freed from the source rock through millions of years of erosion has collected, can be dredged for the metal profitably. This year, unless the ponds freeze up too soon, diesel-powered dredges will scrape up nearly 20,000 ounces of platinum metals from the bed of Platinum Creek.

Planes and radio telephones have relieved the isolation and monotony that miners had to endure as recently as a decade ago. Mines and camps in the district that would have been cut off frequently from communication now converse daily over the radio telephone and in emergencies planes can bring aid in a few hours.

Platinum was first definitely recognized as a crude metal in the eighteenth century when chemists obtained samples from Cartagena. It received the names platinum in Spanish from its similarity to platinum. It has since been found in this country the Ural Mountains, Borneo, the Rhine sands, St. Domingo, Tasmania, New South Wales, New Zealand, Burma, Japan, Spain, Canada and Brazil. Although it has a very high melting point the Spaniards learned the art of fusing it and worked in into various ornaments such as buckles, snuff boxes and sword hilts. Spanish doubloons containing platinum, with a thin coating of gold, were successfully passed for gold coins. Russia employed the metal for coinage from 1828 to 1845.

CANADA IS WELL SERVED

(Ottawa Journal)

A gentleman from Wisconsin has been telling the Ontario Provincial Dailies Association that the small city daily newspaper is "the hope and salvation of a free press." The small city daily, he said—he was speaking to men from such towns as Kingston, St. Catharines, Woodstock, Stratford, St. Thomas, Hamilton—was "the reflection of the real life of a people," had "that human quality" denied the metropolitan press. In fact, he went on, the free press of Canada and the United States consisted of the "clean, honest, clear" newspapers printed in the little cities.

We do not know how well Mr. Bolles of Wisconsin knows the Canadian press, but we do feel that the compliments he pays the newspapers of the smaller Ontario cities—compliments increasingly well deserved—may be applied with equal force to most dailies in Canada, even those of the largest cities.

The independence of a newspaper, its right to be called clean, free, clear and honest, has nothing to do with the size of its city. These things depend upon the men who direct policies, and who, in turn, upon—and this is important—its financial position. A newspaper steadily losing money is not a free agent. Its independence, its freedom from entangling alliances, rises almost automatically with prosperity. A newspaper in a small town may be so hedged about with debt and misfortune that its voice is not its own. It must be discreet and innocuous if it is to survive, or so the publisher thinks. At the top of the picture is such a paper as the New York Times, with vast resources and an income of many millions, by those facts made immune to any influence that can be brought to bear upon it. As The Journal has said before, Canada is well served by her news-

papers. There are fewer dailies than a quarter-century ago—many cities today have one paper instead of the two or three they used to try to support—but the result has not been to the public disadvantage. The survivors for the most part are strong, public-spirited and prosperous, possessed of a "business quality" that they share with our metropolitan press. Because even Toronto is but a larger Stratford, and the Star and the Tely work in their shirt sleeves behind the marble of their front offices.

ONTARIO AND FEDERAL INCOME TAX

(Toronto Star)

It is frequently stated that the Ontario income tax on individuals is about half the Dominion tax. This misconception is due to the fact that the graded percentages in the Ontario income tax are half those in the Dominion charges. That is, the Dominion charges 3 per cent. on the first 1,000 of net income in excess of exemptions, while the Ontario levy is 1 1/2 per cent. On the second \$1,000 the Dominion charges 4 per cent.; Ontario 2 per cent. And so it goes, the percentages increasing with the size of the income.

But in reckoning the Ontario tax, the Dominion tax constitutes an exemption; a very considerable one in the case of large incomes which are so heavily taxed by the Dominion. Also the Dominion collects a surtax of 5 per cent. on the tax on incomes over \$5,000 and Ontario does not. Further, the Dominion regards everything over \$14,000 as unearned income, and subjects it to extra taxation, while Ontario does not. The result of all this is that in some of the higher brackets of income the Ontario tax is only one-fifth of the Dominion tax. On all incomes combined, it can hardly be more than one-third of the Dominion tax, and perhaps not that.

There are, however, no comparable totals available to indicate the exact proportion of the one tax to the other. Ontario collected \$5,418,651 from individuals in the fiscal year which ended last March, the first during which the tax was imposed. The Dominion's collections from individuals in Ontario during the same period included back taxes covering many years and are therefore not comparable.

CHINA FIGHTS ON

(Hong Kong News)

The Chinese managed successfully to delay the Japanese advance for three months, and now, with long lines of communication to be guarded by the Japanese, comes the much-awaited opportunity of guerrilla warfare on the part of the Chinese—sudden, sharp attacks and withdrawals, by an enterprising force, never leaving the enemy in peace, keeping him guessing where the next attack will be launched. It is clear that China will be able to get arms, despite the repeated bombings of the railways. Madame Chiang Kai-shek recently spoke of 500 of the latest type of fighter planes and bombers which could fight and outdistance any that Japan can send, and it is a well known fact that in the interior provinces there are arsenals which are working day and night to supply small arm ammunition. These depots can never be reached by the Japanese and they know it is useless for them to even attempt to do so. Japan can never stop these supplies from reaching the Chinese armies, and there is little doubt that much is coming through other avenues, both south and west.

Emphasis in fashion will be on dull-surfaced, rough, tailored materials, so your skin must be petal-smooth in contrast. Just as you wouldn't think of going out into the cold without a coat, neither should you go out without a protective coat for your complexion. Use a make-up film as a base for your rouge and powder. It conceals blemishes and lines so your skin looks smooth and youthful, and at the same time helps soften the skin.

Third, resculpture your throatline. Many of the new dresses are collared, and necklines generally are moving down into open V's and cut-out squares. Use a special throat and neck cream to do away with creases and lines, and a muscle-tightener with balsam and astringent ingredients to give you a firm, proud chinline above revealing necklines.

Fourth, put crow's-feet and tired eyes away for the winter. Give spring bonnets will demand eyes that are young and sparkling. At night use tissue cream around the eyes, massaging it well into the eye area with a gentle, rotary movement. During the day as a part of your make-up, smooth a speck of glistening tissue oil over the eyelids to keep them young-looking, moist and free from lines. Fifth, watch the extremities—hands and feet. Use on your hands the same cream you use for your face, massaging it into the fingers each night with the same movements you use when putting on gloves. Then, before going out of doors, apply hand lotion to keep your hands young and fair. Into the fingertips, massage an oil or nail lotion to take away dryness and brittleness. On the legs, to counteract chapping and roughness, use a body lotion or hand lotion. Finally, on your toenails that will soon be peeping out of open sandals, use cuticle oil or lotion to help keep them shapely and well groomed.

NOTED VIOLINIST TO VISIT SHERBROOKE

Mischa Elman, one of the world's greatest violinists, will present the first of a series of three recitals in the auditorium of Mont Notre Dame Convent on Monday evening. Born in Tolsna, Russia, Elman first showed signs of interest in the violin when only three. He was placed in the Odessa Imperial Academy of Music at an early age and at ten, his study with the great pedagogue, Leopold Auer commenced at the St. Petersburg Conservatory of Music.

Elman's first public concert at the Conservatory was greeted by such deafening applause that it was promptly decided the phenomenal art of the young virtuoso should be heard throughout Europe. His Berlin recital was an extraordinary triumph. His ensuing tour of Germany and the other principal European countries aroused the fervent enthusiasm of such outstanding conductors as Fiedler, Nikisch, Von Richter and won the steadfast friendship of the great Joachim.

Capital after capital acclaimed his genius. His success in England was so great that he was commanded to play before King Edward VII at Buckingham Palace.

In 1910 Elman's debut in America created a furore and he was soon established as the great new violinist. Annually since then his comprehensive tours of this continent have enhanced his reputation until now the name Mischa Elman stands supreme.

During 1937 this world-famous artist repeated his former triumphs in Orient, South Africa and Europe.

At his concert here Mr. Elman will play amongst others, the celebrated Concerto by Mendelssohn.

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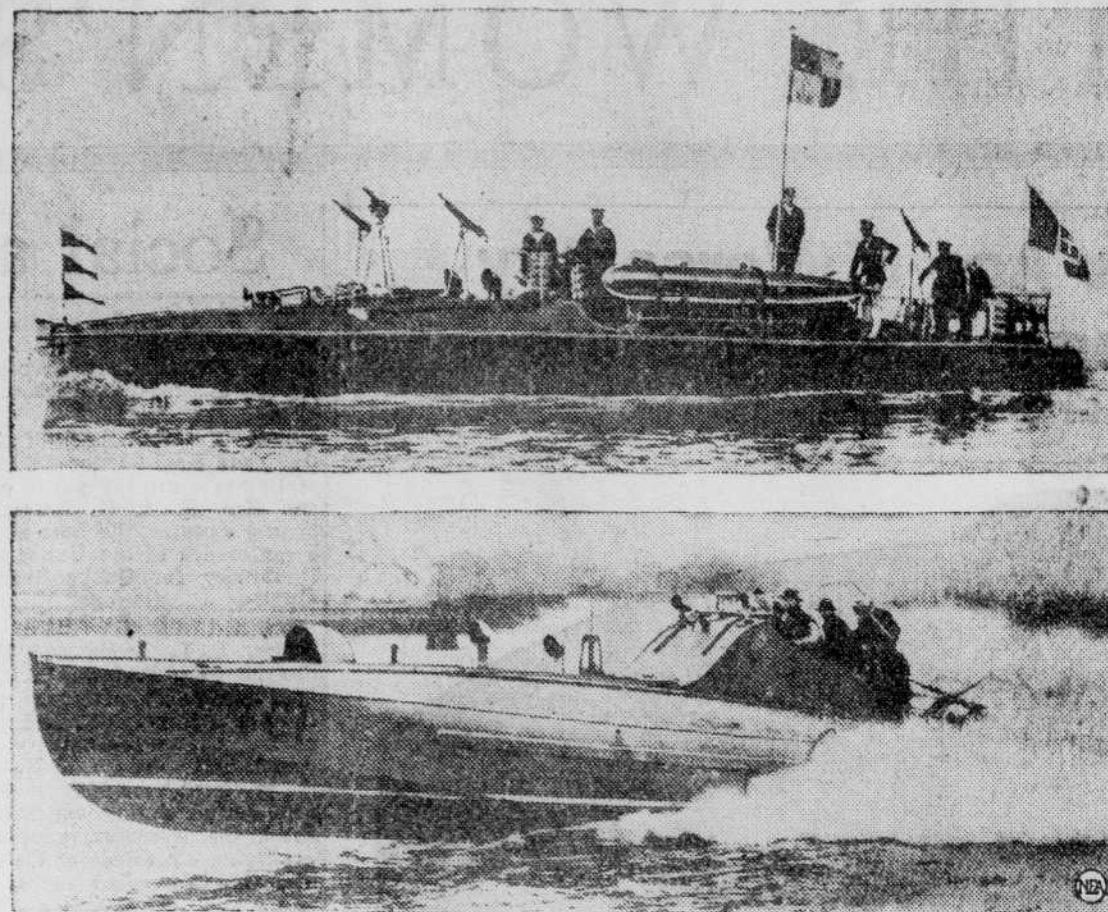

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U. S. NAVY MAY USE "SUICIDE TORPEDO" BOATS



Although Admiral William D. Leahy, chief of naval operations, told the House Naval Affairs Committee that it would be "unwise" to reveal details of navy plans to spend \$15,000,000 for small naval craft, many observers expect possible experimental work with "suicide torpedo boats" similar to those already developed by European nations, notably Italy.

The "suicide" warboats are small, high-powered craft, mounting a machine gun and carrying one or more torpedoes. They are believed capable of becoming an effective arm of war fleets for making quick attacks and escaping enemy gunfire by sheer speed. Most of the boats carry a crew of five or six.

Typical of the small warboats are the two shown above. The vessel in the top photo is a veritable battleship in miniature, privately built after the World War by the Italian poet and naval hero, the late Gabrielle D'Annunzio. Note the two torpedoes it carries on deck.

The lower picture shows one of the small warboats built by Great Britain, cutting through the water at tremendous speed. Operation of these "suicide" boats calls for extreme daring on the part of the crew.

BIDDING INTO BANKRUPTCY

A Determined Bidder Refuses to Take Partner's Warning and Reaps a Sad Harvest

Solution to Previous Contract Problem

South had a "powerhouse" and North had a minor suit bust. They were both determined bidders, but South with the higher ranking hand came off ahead in the bidding fray, and as a result, a seven-trick set resulted. As they were vulnerable and doubled, the price was a fairly heavy one to pay, and now, with the smoke of battle cleared away, the former partners have submitted their problem of bidding to me, asking which was "more to blame."

It is unnecessary to recount the sad result in detail. Perhaps South could have made another trick, but, demoralized by what he saw across the table, he managed to win only one trick in addition to his two aces combinations.

South: ♠ 6, ♥ 9432, ♦ 432, ♣ K42. North: ♠ AJ108, ♥ Q1076, ♦ QJ109, ♣ A. South opened 1♠, North responded 2♥, South bid 3♠, North bid 4♥, South bid 5♠, North bid 6♥, South bid 7♠, North bid 7♥. South won the trick with the ace of hearts.

South insists that North should have bid one no trump in response to his opening bid, instead of two clubs, because, he stated, "a bid of two shows a trick and a half."

Such a rigid requirement leaves absolutely no leeway to take care of freaks such as this hand. In my opinion, North has but one indicated reply to any bid that South may make, and that is the number of clubs needed to overcall. South's opening of one spade, North's overcall of two clubs and South's jump to three hearts were correct. North's bid of four clubs should have been a warning to South, and he should have simply bid four hearts to show two five-card majors.

North would advise his partner that he was not interested in either major with a response of five clubs, and this bid South should pass. Five clubs will be made if a heart or a diamond is opened. A spade or club opening should defeat the hand one trick.

AGRICULTURAL MEETING TO BE HELD

In order to organize a Farmers' Club at least twenty-five paid-up members are required and if there is that many at the meeting and it is decided to have a Club, the officers may be appointed at this same meeting.

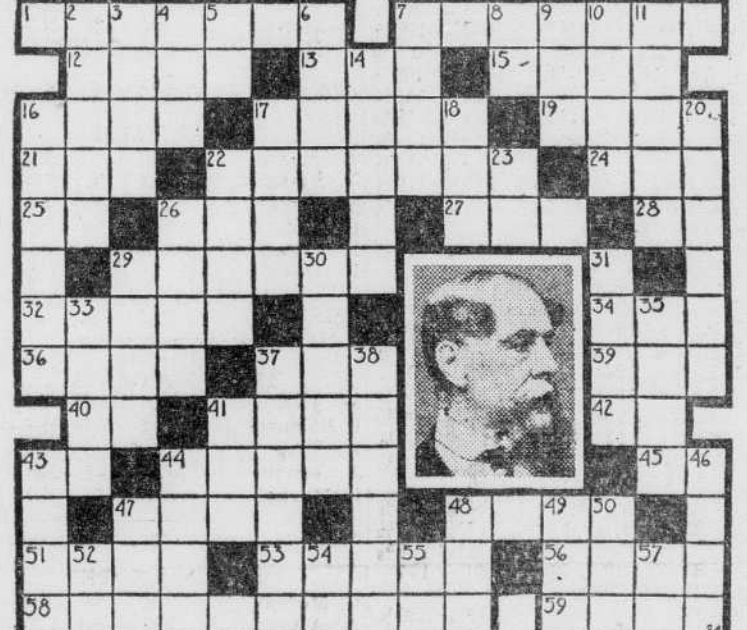

BLACK HAWKS RESUME CHASE FOR PLAY-OFFS

Canadiens, coming along strongly in the stretch despite a flock of injuries, tackle Boston in a game that can bring the home club to within four points of Toronto's leading Maple Leafs.

At home Wings will be favored to knock over the lowly Maroons, while Hawks' chances aren't rated so highly. A Detroit victory and a Chicago loss would pull the Wings practically—though not mathematically—level, for they have played two less games than Hawks.
