

INFANTRY OF BELLIGERENTS IN SOMME REGION OF FRANCE GENERALLY QUIET YESTERDAY

French, However, Make Small Gains East Of Denicourt — Violent Bombardments Featured The Day's Fighting—Russians Keep Up Pressure In Galicia — Central Powers Still Defend Halicz Which Is In Flames—Both Berlin And Vienna Admit Retreats In Various Sectors

The infantry of the belligerents in the Somme region of France was inactive Thursday, except south of the river, where the French, to the east of Denicourt, captured elements of trenches from the Germans and brought forward their front more in alignment with their newly acquired line running through Belloy-En-Santerre and Berny-En-Santerre.

The day, however, saw a continuance of the violent bombardments which always precede attempts at fresh advances by the Entente Allies. In addition great aerial activity was shown by French and British aerial squadrons in bombarding points of vantage behind the German lines.

South of the Somme so violent was the French artillery fire that under it the Germans were unable to make their customary counter-attacks, according to Paris.

The Germans are heavily shelling the French in the old first line German trenches a mile in length between the Vaux-Champire region and the town of Chenois, in the Verdun sector, which were taken by the French Wednesday night.

In Galicia the Russians are still actively in the quest of Lemberg, keeping up their pressure against the Austro-Germans westward from the regions of Brzezany and Halicz. Near Brzezany the Russians have driven back the Teutons from fortified positions and advanced to the Naraiuvka river, a tributary of the Cnita Lipa, and at some points have crossed the stream. Near Halicz the railway line has been cut by the Russians, who are now heavily bombarding Halicz, which, although in flames, the forces of the Central Powers are still stubbornly defending.

In Wednesday's fighting in the Halicz sector 5,645 officers and men of the Teutonic Allies were made prisoner. Both Berlin and Vienna admit retreats between the Zlota Lipa and Dniester rivers.

Likewise Vienna conceded a retreat of the Austrian forces before the Rumanians near Olah Toplitza, in eastern Transylvania, 80 miles from the Rumanian border. The retreat was made in the face of a threatened enveloping movement. To the southeast in this same region the Rumanians have occupied the Cyergyo-Ditro-Orsova Pass.

In the capture of Turtukai fortress the Germans and Bulgarians took more than 20,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns, according to Berlin. Bucharest says the fighting in this vicinity is of great violence and that the losses on both sides have been heavy.

The Russians in Turkish Armenia near Ognott continue to drive the Turks from their strong mountain defenses, according to Petrograd, and also have put down a Turkish offensive west of Erzingan. On the Macedonian front and in the Austro-Italian theatre the fighting is, still being done mainly by means of artillery.

In German East Africa two additional ports—Kilwa Kivinje and Kilwa Kisiwani—south of Dar-Es-Salaam, have surrendered to the British.

SUBMARINE'S VALUE EXAGGERATED.

London, Sept. 7.—According to definite information reaching Berne, Switzerland, from Germany, says a despatch to the Wireless Press, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German Imperial Chancellor, upon being questioned at the August meeting of the Federal Council as to why he yielded to the demands of the United States regarding the unrestricted torpedoing of ships on the high seas, replied emphatically that the value of the submarine was exaggerated by the adherents of wholesale torpedoing.

The Chancellor said that insistence on an unrestricted submarine warfare would cause war between Germany and the United States and that the results of unrestricted torpedoing would not justify such a policy.

Elaborating this point the Chancellor is quoted as saying that Germany could not effectively blockade England nor cut off England's food supplies.

but no tangible action was taken to extend the strike.

Thomas Wright, business agent, of the local branch of the Tidewater Boatmen's Union, said officials of the organization were investigating the strike and would make a report within a few days. Authorities for the Interborough, however, declared that the company would not abrogate the contracts in any event.

Failure of the union to tie up the subway and elevated lines is attributed by some union men to the fact that thousands of strike breakers, congregated here and in many nearby cities in preparation for the threatened nationwide railway strike, were available to the Interborough. Many of these men are being used now and the company, union leaders say, was confident of obtaining plenty of men.

In a statement issued tonight, Mr. Fitzgerald said he was highly satisfied with the strike situation.

ALLIED AVIATORS BOMB BRUSSELS

AIR VISITS BY ENTENTE
AEROPLANES HEARTEN
BELGIAN PEOPLE.

The Hague, Netherlands, Sept. 7. via London—Brussels was bombarded by a squadron of fifteen aeroplanes Wednesday, according to an eye witness of the raid who has arrived here. To The Associated Press he said he was sitting with friends in a hotel in the centre of the city when the squadron appeared over the city. Anti-aircraft guns immediately went into action.

It was then 1 o'clock in the morning, he said, and some time previously soldiers had issued warnings for the extinguishing of all lights.

The aeroplanes were seen distinctly, he declared, and some flew so low that they seemed to touch the roof of the hotel, but their nationality was not made out. Guests in the upper rooms of the hotel fled, hurriedly downstairs.

Intermittent bomb explosions and firing continued until daybreak. One machine, he added, was reported to have been brought down at Porte Louise on the outskirts of the city. He said the damage done had not been ascertained when he left Brussels.

"This was the most important raid in a long while," he said. "Smaller affairs occur almost every day. These frequent air visits by Entente aeroplanes hearten the Belgian people wonderfully and inevitably lead to exaggerated notions of the impending departure of the Germans."

This is the first report of an air raid on Brussels Wednesday. A British official statement issued on Sept. 4th reported that on the two preceding days British aeroplanes had made a raid on Hoboken, near Antwerp, and on a town near Bruges.

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AUSTRIAN TROOPS DRIVEN BACK BY RUMANIANS

VIENNA ADMITS REVERSE NEAR RUMANIAN BORDER — WITHDRAWAL ON THE RUSSIAN FRONT IS ALSO CONCEDED.

Vienna, via London, Sept. 7.—Austrian troops have withdrawn before a threatening Rumanian envelopment to the heights west of Olah Toplitza, south of Dorna Watra and twenty miles west of the Rumanian border, says the official statement issued at Austrian headquarters today. On the Russian front the Austrian troops between the Zlota Lipa and the Dniester rivers have also been withdrawn.

The statement follows:
"Rumanian front: Near Olah Toplitza (at the junction of the Maros and Toplitza rivers) to avoid a threatened envelopment our troops have been withdrawn to the heights west of the town.
"Russian front: In connection with the fighting described yesterday between the Zlota Lipa and the Dniester our troops have been removed to prepared positions."

New York train near the Port Credit station on Wednesday morning, committed suicide. It is believed the woman was drowned out of her canoe. The canoe has been found. It is said she expressed a wish to die, and this statement, made after the death of her husband, taken with the finding of the canoe, has convinced the authorities that the woman ended her life.

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AUSTRALIA SEEKS LIGHT ON PLAGUE

COMMISSIONER ARRIVES IN
N. Y. TO STUDY METHODS
OF FIGHTING IT.

New York, September 8.—Commissioned by the Australian government to study the methods employed in New York to fight infantile paralysis, Dr. William James Penfold, of the Lister Institute, London, arrived here the other day aboard the steamship Cameronia, of the Anchor Line.

Dr. Penfold told a newspaper representative that several cases have appeared in England. "I have studied the laboratory methods in the Pasteur Institute, Paris, as well as in the local board at Hendon; but the Australian government desire me to particularly examine into the methods employed in New York, which are regarded as being as perfect as human ingenuity can make them. This result, no doubt is largely due to the opportunities for research offered by the terrible epidemic here."

"The purpose of the Australian government in cabling me these instructions is to enable me to establish an institute for the government of Melbourne and later at Canberra, the federal capital of Australia."

Another passenger was Mrs. H. K. Eldridge, widow of the vice-president of the National City Bank, of this city. She and her husband had gone to South America in connection with a large loan which was being negotiated for one of the republics. The high altitudes in Argentina and Bolivia proved too much for his heart. He died in Argentina last November. Actuated largely by the feeling that she would have to do some active work to divert her mind from her bereavement, Mrs. Eldridge said to the reporter that she decided to go to Europe to aid suffer's there.

"I have been busy since," she said, "laboring among the orphaned children of France. Of the 150,000 orphans in that afflicted country, only 8,000 are being taken care of. Each of them receives fifty centimes a day."

Miss Cecilia C. Brown, of Kew Gardens, L.I., who went abroad July 15th last to join her sister, the widow of "The O'Rahilly, one of the leaders who were killed in the Dublin uprising, said that no attempt has yet been made by the government to repair the damage done by cannonading on that occasion.

Miss Brown said that although she protested as an American citizen, the authorities at Liverpool compelled her to submit to the taking of her thumb print.

"That they insisted in my case, I can readily understand," she said, "but why they compelled others, solely because they bear Irish names, to submit to a like indignity passes my comprehension."

CHARITY GRANTS VOTED BY CITY

WITH FEW EXCEPTIONS THE
AMOUNTS WILL COME FROM
CHARITY TAX.

The civic grants to hospitals and charitable institutions in the city were considered by the Finance Committee last night and were passed without any comment except those to the Lake Edward Sanatorium and St. Bridget's Home.

In the former case Aldermen Bois and Madden urged that the amount of \$1,000 be increased to \$2,000, as authorized by the Legislature at its last session. The Committee had practically decided to make the grant to the Lake Edward Sanatorium \$1,500 when Ald. Bouchard moved in amendment that it remain at \$1,000. Ald. Bouchard and Ald. Lockwell voted in favor of the amendment, while Aldermen Bois and Madden voted against it. In casting the deciding vote Chairman Verret said that while he had been favorable to \$1,500 he would vote in favor of Ald. Bouchard's amendment.

When the case of St. Bridget's Home came up Chairman Verret suggested that the sum of \$250 be increased to \$300, but Mayor Lavigne thought that since no request for increase had been received it might be better to wait and if there was a surplus from the charity tax an additional sum might be voted.

Ald. Madden pointed out that it was the only English Catholic charitable institution in the city and that a great deal of good was done for orphans and aged persons of both sexes.

No further action was taken in the matter and the grant was left at \$250. The amounts as voted are as follows: La Creche, \$2,100; Lake Edward Sanatorium, \$1,000; Protection de la Jeune Fille, \$200 (\$50. increase); Anti-Alcoholic League, \$300; St. Antoine, \$250; Sacred Heart Hospital, \$500; St. Francois d'Assise Hospital, \$500; Ladies' Protestant Home, \$250; Finlay Asylum, \$250; Catholic Sailors' Club, \$100; St. Bridget's Home, \$250; Goutte de Lait, \$3,000.

\$300 For Vezina Band.

The Committee voted a sum of \$300 in addition to the sum of \$1,500 already voted for the concerts given during the summer by the Vezina Military Band. The additional amount was to make up for the decrease of \$500 made by the Chateau Frontenac. At the opening of the season Mr. Vezina expected that the Chateau would pay \$1,000 as they had done other seasons, but the C. F. refused to give more than \$500, this year. Mr. Vezina had 40 musicians to pay and even with that \$2,500 which he will receive, it is stated that he will have a deficit.

Miscellaneous Matters.

Mayor Lavigne was authorized to subscribe \$100 to the Field Day at Valcartier Camp in recognition for the work done by the soldiers in repairing the road from Quebec to the Camp. Some discussion arose about the utility of the road and Ald. Bois remarked that most of the provisions required at the Camp were shipped here from Ontario.

In reply Mayor Lavigne stated that one Quebec firm alone did business with the camp to the extent of \$1,400 a week.

The Mayor was authorized to organize a reception for the delegates from Ontario who will come here this month to take part in the deliberations of the "Entente Cordiale Committee."

The gross receipts of the Quebec Street Railway for months of April, May and June of 1916 were \$112,193.49, or an increase of \$13,054.75 over the corresponding months of 1915. The receipts for the year 1915-1916 were \$496,132.99 or an increase over the previous year of \$39,484.89.

During Exhibition week at the grounds alone the receipts from the sale of the Charity Tax tickets will net the City between \$1,600 and \$1,800.

FRENCH STATEMENT.
Paris, Sept. 7, via London, Sept. 8.—The French artillery fire south of the Somme has prevented the Germans from making a counter attack, according to the official communication issued by the war Office tonight. Some additional progress for the French troops is also recorded. The text reads:

"North of the Somme there has been a violent bombardment in various sectors without infantry action. In a trench recently captured four bomb throwers and sixteen machine guns were added to the material previously brought in.

"South of the Somme the enemy, reduced to impotence by the violence of our artillery fire, was unable to make a counter attack. Immediately east of Denicourt we captured some new trench elements in the course of isolat-

OFFICIAL

BRITISH STATEMENT.

London, Sept. 8, 12:19 a.m. — The British official communication issued shortly before midnight says:

"The general situation is unchanged. Our artillery dispersed enemy working parties east and south-east of Ginchy. Between the Somme and the Ancre the enemy's artillery was active during the day shelling the rear of our lines. Our artillery replied effectively, and, assisted by aerial observations, successfully dealt with enemy batteries.

"Between Souchez and La Basse canal our artillery and trench mortars bombarded the enemy's lines continuously, and north-west of Hollobecke we effectively shelled the bridgehead on the Ypres canal.

"Yesterday our machines bombed an important railway junction on the enemy's lines, causing great damage to the station and rolling stock. One of the enemy's aeroplanes was bombed. One machine was destroyed on the ground and other damage was

ed combats, in which we took fifty prisoners.

"In Champagne a German reconnaissance was caught by our fire west of Maisons De Champagne and dispersed; some prisoners fell into our hands.

"On the right bank of the Meuse (Verdun sector) the enemy bombarded our new positions in the Vaux-Chapitre wood. During last evening's attack in this sector we captured 280 prisoners, including six officers. Everywhere else there was intermittent cannonading.

"Aviation: On the night of Sept. 6th, in spite of unfavorable atmospheric conditions, sixteen of our bombing aeroplanes dropped heavy bombs on railway stations, bivouacs and enemy stores at Romilly Athis and Villers, a big fire being caused at the last named place."

BRITISH SAILORS' RELIEF FUND

As was expected the appeal for aid for the poor widows and orphans of British sailors who have perished in this war is not falling on deaf ears. The plea is meant for the general public and not alone for that section of the population which has been giving so generously to other funds for patriotic purposes. Let the present campaign to raise money for the needy wives and orphans of deceased sailors bring forth the best efforts of the whole population of the Ancient Capital. In this way citizens of all nationalities will show that they can at least appreciate what the British Navy is doing to protect them and their property from attack by the German Navy which would have come up the St. Lawrence long ago had it not been for that stonewall barrier—the British Navy.

It requires very little forethought to picture what a graveyard the city would be if it was subjected to a bombardment by an enemy fleet. A short reflection on the terrible results of such an attack should make the people of this seaport town all the more willing and anxious to contribute to the support of dependents of these brave men who have fallen while upholding Britain's prestige on the sea.

MARKET BAD FOR FLOATING BONDS

CITY'S FINANCIAL AGENTS ADVISE AGAINST PROPOSED SCHOOL COMMISSION LOAN.

Acting on the advice of its Financial Agents, the Civic Finance Committee last night decided to advise the Quebec Catholic School Commission to delay their proposed \$200,000 bond issue for which it was intended to call for tenders very shortly.

Taking up the question at the meeting of the Finance Committee last night Chairman Verret stated that after conference with the City's bankers, he had come to the conclusion that the present time was the most unfavorable that could be chosen for the floating of bonds. He pointed out that the Federal Government will shortly contract a purely national loan of between \$150,000,000 and \$200,000,000 and that the money will be subscribed exclusively in Canada. With such a bond issue in prospect, it would be poor policy for the Commission to call for tenders on their bonds, as they would risk receiving a few unfavorable bids and being obliged to refuse them they would call for new tenders later, which would materially injure their credit.

At the same time Ald. Verret informed the Committee that the School Commission deposits its funds in the Banque Nationale and pays a higher rate of discount than is paid by the City itself. He felt that such a state of affairs should not be permitted to go on any longer, since it was the City, after all, that had to pay the discount rate for the Commission. He reminded the Committee that the Exhibition Commission formerly paid as high as 6 p.c. and 6 1/2 p.c. for its discount, but that the matter had been settled and the Commission now paid 5 p.c., the same rate as the City.

Mayor Lavigne explained that he had remonstrated with Mr. J. B. Morissette, chairman of the School Commission, relative to the floating of bonds at the present time, and had asked him if it were possible to delay the transaction. Mr. Morissette, however, was opposed to any delay stating that the Commission owed the money, that the loan was authorized by the Quebec Legislature, that the Commission could float its bonds before the Federal Government called for tenders for its loan and that several banking firms had signified their intention to tender. He felt that the Commission would secure as favorable a price now as they would later on.

The Committee, however, decided to advise the School Commission that after consulting their Financial Agents they were of the opinion that the present time was not opportune for floating the proposed loan.

SUFFERING FROM LOCKJAW.
Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 7.—James Tyrell, of this town, was taken to the General Hospital here today suffering from lockjaw. Tyrell's affliction is the result of an accidental cut on his hand late in August. While there is hope for his recovery the doctors declare his case to be exceedingly serious.

CANADIAN MINING CAPITAL.
Twenty years ago the great mining boom in British Columbia was about at its height. In the famous Siocan area there were several score of mines and near-mines. Then came the collapse, and Siocan became practically a deserted village. But the district contained good mines, and the stimulus to mining accelerated by the war caused the re-opening of many. But of the 20 plants that have been started working, 17 are controlled by United States capital, and three by Canadian capital. This seems to illustrate the history of nearly all Canadian mining. It is not Canadian but American capital which develops camps and gets the profits from this country's mineral resources. Outside of a few mines, in Porcupine and Cobalt most of the capital put into real development has been from the United States. The Sudbury nickel development is an instance. The "nickel crowd" have also big gold-mining enterprises. Is this country too short of capital to do a larger share in exploiting its own natural resources? The Canadian banks have never been very friendly toward mining enterprises, as a class, looking on the business as gambling. Stock market rigging gave mining, which is legitimate business, a bad name. It has taken time to wear through the effects of the "booms," and bring districts into recognition through genuine development after the discarding fever has worn away. We need considerably stricter laws on the floating of mining companies, and a much more kindly encouragement of their pick-and-shovel operations. Canadian capital can be found in quantities for development projects in South America, Central America, Spain, the Southern States, Cuba, and other far-away areas. Why not more of it in the sound Canadian business of developing our mineral wealth for ourselves? A strong government policy of encouraging smelters, refining plants and metal industries connected therewith, is needed. The war brought about the establishment of a zinc refinery in British Columbia, and the erection of a copper refinery, and the decision to build a nickel refinery in Ontario immediately. All of these plants ought to have been serving Canadian mining before the war, but the old, old policy of looking to United States industries and capital to do our business and take the profits from our natural resources prevailed.

MORE PORTS IN GERMAN EAST AFRICA SURRENDER

BRITISH NAVAL FORCES AND MARINES OCCUPY COAST TOWNS WHICH GIVE IN UNDER THREAT OF NAVAL BOMBARDMENT.

London, Sept. 7.—The ports of Kilwa Kivinje and Kilwa Kisiwani, in German East Africa, respectively 150 and 175 miles south of Dar-es-Salaam, have surrendered to the British under threat of a bombardment, according to an official statement issued tonight giving details of the recent surrender of Dar-es-Salaam. The statement says:

"At dawn of the third of September, a naval attack by British forces in whalers, in conjunction with a heavy bombardment of enemy positions north of the town from the direction of Bagamojo, was followed by landings at Kunduchi and in Masani Bay. The enemy evacuated Dar-es-Salaam, which was occupied by combined naval and military forces. The British colors being hoisted with full honors. The town, except for the portions occupied by the German troops, was virtually undamaged."

"On the seventh, British naval forces and marines, with little landing parties, occupied the ports of Kilwa Kivinje and Kilwa Kisiwani, which surrendered under threat of a naval bombardment."

BARN BURNS WITH HORSES INSIDE IT.
Aylmer, Ont., Sept. 7.—A barn belonging to Sanford Caverley, a farmer residing south-west of here, was struck by lightning during an electric storm this afternoon and burned to the ground. A team of horses valued at \$600 and a large quantity of hay, oats and farm implements were destroyed.

HE DREW THE NINE.
On one occasion Mr. Justice Hawkins, who always wore his hair cropped was on circuit in the South of England, and went for a country walk with a brother judge. Being thirsty the two judges entered a wayside inn in the rear of which were two laborers playing skittles. They decided to join in the game, and each taking one of the players as a partner, entered into the game with spirit.

Getting hot, Mr. Justice Hawkins took off his coat; getting hotter, he removed his hat. His lordship's partner at once stopped playing. "Go on, my friend," said Hawkins; "why do you stop?" "I don't mind being neighborly," replied the man, looking at Hawkins' close-cropped head, "but I'm hanged if I be a-going to play skittles with a ticket-of-leave man!"

QUEEN WILHELMINA DIVES IN SUBMARINE.
Amsterdam, via London, Sept. 7.—Queen Wilhelmina of Holland has employed the experience of a plunge under water in a submarine. The Queen was present at the naval manoeuvres yesterday, according to the Nieuws Van Den Dagh, aboard a submarine which dived twice while Her Majesty was a passenger.

PROPRIETORS MUST PAY THEIR TAXES.
CITY DECIDED TO TAKE RIGOROUS MEANS TO SECURE PAYMENT.

Judging by the attitude of the Civic Finance Committee last night, bailiffs sales of property for arrears in taxes will not be uncommon unless property owners, who are behind in their payments, settle up without delay.

Mayor Lavigne explained that some property owners who were well able to pay their taxes were four, five and even six years in arrears, and he thought that an example should be made of some of them.

City Treasurer Blais explained that a few years ago when it was found impossible to secure payment he took two or three cases in each ward and had their property sold on them. The result was astonishing. When the other proprietors, who were in arrears saw that the City meant business they immediately settled up their accounts with the City.

On motion of Ald. Bouchard it was resolved by the Committee to authorize the City Treasurer to take proper means to make all those who were in arrears to pay up immediately.

COL. SHANLY DEAD.
Toronto, Sept. 7.—Through illness caused by overwork in France, Lieut. Col. Coote Nesbitt Shanly, D.S.O., of the Canadian Army Pay Corps, died at his residence, 15 Willocks street, this afternoon.

On the organization of the first Canadian division, Col. (then Major Shanly) was appointed chief field paymaster for overseas service, and served in that capacity at Valcartier, Salisbury and in France, with headquarters at Rouen, where his health broke down, and after several months in hospital he returned to Canada July 21.

WAR ADVANCES.
ITALY'S WOMEN.
Called Upon to Do Men's Work, They Win Honors in Agricultural and Other Fields.

Rome, Sept. 7.—No more remarkable result of the war has been seen in Italy than its effect on the status of women. The same phenomenon has been reported in England, and to a lesser extent in Germany, but it is in some respects more striking in Italy than in these countries, because Italy is near enough to the Orient to have felt its influence in the past upon its attitude toward womanhood.

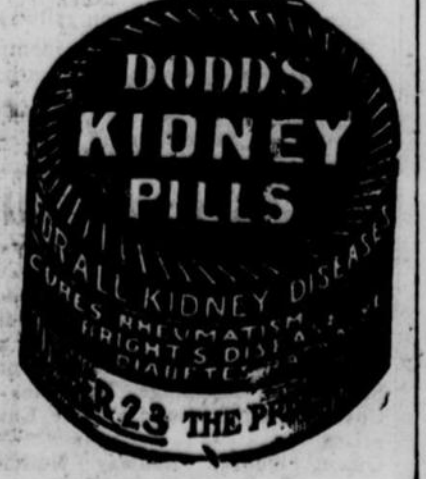
Italian women, indeed, often labored in the fields and vineyards in the days before the war, but their efforts went with scanty reward and their position was but little better than that of the beasts of burden. There was no woman's rights movement in Italy, before the war, worth mentioning.

The war has changed all this. With all able-bodied Italians called to the colors, there was no one to step into the breach, get in the crops, run the street cars and perform other tasks save the women. And the Italian women faced by the emergency, suddenly demonstrated their capability in a manner to win them not only admiration but governmental reward.

THE QUEBEC BRIDGE.
The floating into position on Mon-
day night of the central span of the
Quebec Bridge is not considered by
the engineers in charge of construc-
tion as being in any way an official
event, nor as indicating the comple-
tion of the work, but is simply an in-
teresting engineering incident in the
ordinary routine of construction.
Consequently no invitations have
been issued, nor is it intended to
recognize the event in any special
manner. The formal opening will
take place at a later date. Such is the
information received by the Secretary
of the Quebec Board of Trade from
Mr. Monsarrat, the Chief Engineer,
in answer to an enquiry, for accom-
modation for the members of the
Board. The Chief Engineer adds
that owing to the limited work-
ing space on the bridge, specu-
lators will not be allowed on the
structure during operations, which
can be seen best from the south
shore at the end of the tramway line,
though excursion steamers will be
allowed within a certain distance of
the operations.

A COSTLY METHOD.
Too many married men are enlist-
ing while the single men are allowed
to stay at home.
The expense to the country under
this method is enormous, as the mar-
ried men costs the country about
\$37.00 per month more than the
single man.
It has been stated that as far back
as the first of 1916, the Government
was spending at the rate of \$1,000,
000 per month in separation money
alone (this to the families of married
men).

In addition to this, the Patriotic
Fund was paying over a half million
per month more, or a total of over
\$30,000,000 per year for married men,
many of whom will of necessity leave
dependents on the Pension Fund.
This would all be avoided if the
young, single men were enrolled and
ready for service when called upon.
The tremendous expense men-
tioned above is bound to keep on in-
creasing under the present voluntary
system, and soon the immense chasm
between income and expenditure will
be bound to be felt, while much of
this could be avoided with reason-
able organization of a qualified form
of conscription whereby the right
one would go and the right one re-
main.

PULPWOOD.
It may not be generally known to
what magnitude has grown the pulp-
wood and papermaking industry in
Canada, and it is safe to say that very
few people in the Dominion realize
how dependent are United States
publishers on Canadian pulpwood,
and what are the possibilities from a
Canadian national standpoint if the
Dominion government can be per-
suaded to take steps to compel the
manufacture of paper in Canada, in-
stead of permitting the export of
pulp, to be finished by big mills in
the United States.
In a report issued at Washington,
D.C., the other day, it was shown
that over two-thirds of the more
than one billion pounds of wood pulp
imported into the United States dur-
ing the year ending June 30, 1916,
and used in the manufacture of Amer-
ican paper, was taken from Cana-
da in its semi-raw state. This re-
port came as a result of the inquiry
of the U. S. government into the
cause of the increased cost of news-
print. The wood importations for
1915-1916, it has been shown, amount
to 180,000,000 pounds less than for
the previous year; yet the amount
shipped to the United States from

Canada during the past year was
130,000,000 pounds in excess of the
shipments during 1914-15. During the
year just closed 70 per cent. of the
1,730,000,000 pounds of pulp entering
the United States from outside sources
came from Canada, while most of
the remaining 30 per cent. came from
Norway and Sweden.

The immensity of the Canadian in-
dustry which is among the probabili-
ties, provided this pulpwood were
manufactured into paper in Canada,
can be understood by a glance at the
magnitude of the American importations.
The effect of the war has
been to curtail the supply entering
the U. S. from other countries, and
American mills have had to draw on
Canada for raw material. The Do-
minion has vast forest resources from
which to secure an almost unlimited
volume of pulpwood; but it is quite
clear that, if Canada is going to get
the greatest advantage from our own
natural resources, we must not only
do something to conserve those re-
sources for our own people, but
must also insist upon all the advan-
tages which should accrue through
finishing the product at home, instead
of allowing it to be finished in Amer-
ican mills by American workmen.
Up to the present there has been
no restrictive measure by any but
provincial governments, and part of
those have been rescinded within re-
cent years. It is, therefore, prob-
lematical just what action the Do-
minion government can take, though it
may be reasonably inferred that the
government can take national meas-
ures in the interests of what should
be a national industry.

THE DIFFERENCE.
The difference between the morals
of General Haig's victorious armies
and that of the formidable fighting
machine to which he is opposed, is
fundamental.
Paradoxical as it may appear, the
characteristic difference between the
German soldier and every other—the
English and French fighting men
more especially—is that Fritz has no
military education.

The Teuton commanders, —Hin-
denburg, the Crown Prince, Pflanz-
er, for instance — seem extraordinarily
ruthless, absolutely and inhumanly
indifferent to the losses sustained
either in action or inaction. This is
partly a studied "ruthlessness" (the
quality lauded by Bernhardi), but
chiefly it is a reflection of the attitude
of their rank and life.

The German historian of the al-
most mythical ages of the Niebelun-
gen Ring states that the Teuton sol-
dier's valor is of "so high an order"
that he regards his next file not ex-
actly as a comrade to be succored or
sustained, but rather as a competitor
for the praises of his captain. His
fall is therefore to be welcomed
rather than deplored. If 90 out of
100 men go down, the remaining 10
are wildly elated with the prospect
of entranced renown; they are ena-
mored of the idea that they are going
to succeed where others have failed.
Some thing of this self-centred
"Berserker" spirit of the ancient
German forests, characteristic of the
people who have spent whole cen-
turies in the engrossing occupation of
intercine warfare, survives in the
"Bosche" — a word which being in-
terpreted means "wooden-head." (In
the argot of the Paris streets, 'bois'
is pronounced "Boische.") Much as
Fritz dislikes being called 'Bosche,' it
is the naked truth.

The most school-master-ridden
nation in Europe prides itself on a
soldierly who have no military educa-
tion.

No Prussian marshal ever dreamed
of inspiring the millions who his Krieg-
Wissenschaft or Krieg-Spiel depends by
an epigram like Napoleon's, "Re-
member, that every private soldier
carries a Field-Marshal's baton in his
knapsack."

France's greatest Captain was a re-
publican-leveillé: so long as he, Na-
poleon, might be the acknowledged
Eldest Brother in chief, he was all

for universal brotherhood. British re-
publicanism is more aristocratic, but
it is even more frankly fraternal.
Every private who, in his heart, con-
sents to exchange the ranks for the
more burdensome intellectual and
social sphere of the officers' mess has
a fair chance of such promotion, if
he shows high qualities in the field.
The allied commanders to the end
will seem to the lookers-on to go
slow. They will not mimic the Bern-
hardi ruthlessness, which deals with
the soldiers of Germany as if they
were herrings, whose mothers are
said to produce a million offspring at
a birth.

In spite of the shallow German
doctrine of "Frightfulness," it is safe
to assert that General Joffre, by his
obstinate and avowed caution in
respect of the lives of his men, and
the difficult patience of the allies in
France and Flanders, refusing to risk
great losses for the sake of those
super-human gallantry-shows, which
history will denounce as military
mistakes, if not as homicidal mad-
nesses, with which Germany has
achieved little else than head-lines
for newspapers—it is safe to assert
that the long spectacle of inexpu-
nible self-control which the French
and British leaders of this war have
so gravely and magnificently main-
tained, till their artillery were ready,
has slowly inoculated the views of
the German Berserkers in the high-
est commands with a creeping par-
alysis of dismay, a thousand times
more deadly than the German policy
of multiplying panics, and preferring
everywhere the maximum to the
minimum risk of lives.

PRESS COMMENT.

"Capt. Herbert Molson, of the
42nd Royal Highlanders of Canada
and Capt. Percy Molson, of the
Princess Patricia's, both of whom are
wounded, have been invalided home
and are now on their way to Canada.
Capt. Stuart Molson has arrived and
was met by Capt. Walter Molson, of
Kitchener's Own. On the arrival of
the two first-named, a re-union of the
Molsons in khaki will be held."

The above appearing in a Montreal
paper is evidence that one of the old-
est English-speaking families of Cana-
da is still doing its duty nobly by
the country and the Empire. Several
enterprises ranking amongst the
greatest of their kind in Canada are
associated with the name of Molson,
a name which is interwoven with the
progress of the Dominion's largest
city.

Not long after the cession of Cana-
da to Great Britain the Molson
brewery was established; it is still in
operation. The Molson's Bank, one
of Canada's leading financial institu-
tions, was incorporated in 1855. It
was a Molson who sailed the first
steamboat on the St. Lawrence river
over a hundred years ago. Half a
dozen beautiful old mansions scatter-
ed over the slopes of Mount Royal
still bear the name of this fine
pioneer family, the present-day re-
presentatives of which are apparently
as patriotic as the long line of fore-
bears who did so much for Canada in
its earlier days.

Here is living refutation of the old
saying that "it takes three genera-
tions to go from shirt sleeves to shirt
sleeves." There are at least in Canada
families that have not degenerated
with the passing of the years. In the
heartening work-a-day atmosphere
of this fair land of generous realities
even those "enriched by ancestral
merchandise" are playing their part
with the same inspiring self-devotion
as the youngest of its sons.—Calgary
Herald.

CITY WOULD PLEAD AT PRIVY COUNCIL

MUST SECURE SPECIAL PERMISSION FROM THAT TRIBUNAL FOR CASE.

The City of Quebec will make special application to the Privy Council, the highest tribunal in the Empire, for permission to plead in the case of Bastien vs. the City of Quebec, in which case the plaintiff secured judgment in his favor in the Superior and Appeal Courts.

Mr. Bastien is a mill owner on the St. Charles River below Chateau d'Eau at Lorette and alleged in his action against the City that with the installation of the new 40-inch main pipe the flow of water over the City dam was not sufficient to operate his mill. His action in the first case was for \$1,100 damages and it is understood that he has other actions pending.

The City Attorneys have advised an appeal to the Privy Council confident that the English Law, as interpreted there, would be more in favor of the City than the French Law here. The difficulty, however, is that the amount involved in the case disputed is less than \$5,000 and in that event permission to take the case before the Privy Council cannot be secured from the Court of Appeal. As a last resort it is next advised by the City Attorneys to make a special application to the Privy Council that the case be heard there and that explanations be given that while the amount at stake in the present issue is only \$1,100 that it is a question involving large public interests, and if not settled immediately, thousands of dollars in the future.

It was decided by the Finance Committee last night to leave to Mayor Lavieure and Chairman Verret the selection of a lawyer who when going to plead before the Privy Council would make the application for the City of Quebec.

COURT OF SESSIONS.

Two young men, named E. Brochu and P. Breton, of St. Lambert, were before the Court of Sessions yesterday charged with disturbing the peace. Mme. J. Turgeon, an old lady living alone, made the complaint. It appears that the lady's husband is dead some time, and on the anniversary of Mr. Turgeon's death the accused frightened the complainant by waving a lantern late at night in front of a window which resulted in Mme. Turgeon receiving a severe shock. The case was adjourned to a later date for the evidence of the Cure of St. Lambert.

E. Heilbronner, who was charged with vagrancy, pleaded not guilty and was remanded till a later date.

On a charge of desertion from the 150th Battalion, N. Jarry was sentenced to twelve months in jail.

PROPERTY CLAIMED BY TWO PARTIES

CITY BUYS LAND AND LETS CLAIMANTS SETTLE MATTER IN COURT.

A rather singular case was brought to the attention of the Finance Committee last night by Chairman Verret, in which the City is the purchaser of a small lot of land, while the ownership of the property is being contested between General Fages and the Hotel Dieu estate.

The property in question is situated at the foot of Sauvageau Hill and the City having taken possession of it for the installation of its 40-inch main pipe thought it better to acquire the land by purchase. They sought out the owner who until then was apparently General Fages, and he agreed to accept a sum of \$600.00 for the land, but in the meantime the Hotel Dieu Nuns through their attorney have laid claim to the ownership of the land.

Not knowing which party is the rightful owner of the land the Finance Committee, acting on the advice of the City Attorneys, decided to deposit the money in the Provincial Treasury or in the hands of the attorneys of both parties claimant to the ownership and leave to the Courts the task of resolving which party is rightfully entitled to the purchase price.

QUEBEC BRIDGE ABSORBS ATTENTION

BRIDGE MEN NOW PRACTISING WITH JACKS THAT WILL LIFT SPAN.

The connecting of the central span to the main spans of the Quebec Bridge is at present the absorbing topic in the city. Many boats have been chartered to convey citizens and visitors to the scene of operations.

The men who will take part in the work are practicing with the jacks that will be used in lifting the span. Eight jacks of 1,000 tons capacity, will be in operation, four on each side of the river.

Six barges will be required to float the span and to convey it to the site of the bridge, and a small fleet of tugs has been engaged to tow the barges.

About two hundred members of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers will hold their summer meeting on Saturday next, and it is expected that many of them will stop over until Monday to witness the lifting up of the span.

On Monday the tide will be high at 5.14 a.m., when there will be a depth of 16.6 feet for the floating into place of the center span of the Bridge.

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SOME SIDELIGHTS FROM GERMANY

Reserve Recommended in Peace Discussions—Wit and Humour of
Hun Comic Journals.

London, Sept. 7.—The "Weser Zeitung" of Bremen, in discussing the acrimonious controversy raging about "peace aims," appeals to the combatants in all camps, to moderate the bitterness of their debates, to show more reserve in the expression of their convictions, and, above all, to remember that the entire discussion is inopportune so long as Germany's enemies show neither the will nor the disposition to conclude a peace. The will for peace may be widespread in Germany, and her people may have a great longing to know something of the terms on which peace will be concluded, but this one-sided discussion of peace, while the enemy is not thinking of peace, is, says the "Weser Zeitung," undignified and probably harmful.

The Bremen journal says: "The protagonists of this newspaper controversy have not the least notion whether in London and Petrograd the will for peace exists. Nothing has been heard at least of its existence. The adherents of a peace with England must admit that England's conditions are much more unacceptable than Russia's conditions, and as Russia now finds herself on the verge of total defeat her conditions may soon be still more in our favor. But for the present we see not the faintest sign that either on the one side or the other is there any disposition to take the present military situation as a basis for peace negotiations. In time they must do so, but this time is not yet. They will learn it after further blows, and as soon as they learn their lesson it will be time enough for us to speak. But until then no more of this rancorous squabbling."

Turks in Galicia.

The German Press publishes a telegram from Constantinople descriptive of the joy and pride felt by the Turks that their troops have been sent to the assistance of the Austrians in Galicia, and that "successes have already rewarded their efforts."

We are informed that the Turkish newspapers in eloquent articles speak of the magnificent unity between the Austro-Hungarian and Turkish troops. They point out that after their victories at the Dardanelles and in Mesopotamia they have a large number of troops at the disposal of the Central Powers, and that nothing pleases them better than that these troops should be employed against their hereditary enemy and for bringing about a speedy termination of the war.

"Tanin" writes: "We applaud the idea of Turkish troops fighting in Galicia against the Russians, our greatest and nearest enemy. Their object will not be merely to demonstrate, but to fill a gap in the Austrian armies and to help our heroic Allies to final victory. The Russians will yet see that the Turks everywhere and at all times are ready to meet them, and to display the same and even greater courage than they displayed in the Caucasus."

"Sabah" says: "We remind our readers that when the Allies of Turkey found their fronts cased against the British, French, Russians and Italians they sent their troops to Turkey's assistance. Now Turkey can return the gift and show how real to her is this great brotherhood in arms with Germany and Austria-Hungary."

The Hun as Humorist.

The latest number of "Ulk," the comic supplement of the Berlin Tageblatt, deserves to be held up as a shining example of German humor after two years of war. The front of the loathsome rag has a picture of Mr. Asquith stooping over the grave of Casement, tramping on it with his hands and feet, and exclaiming, "Day and night I am watching that he causes no trouble in Ireland." On the next page are two French soldiers, one of whom says to the other, "Sacrebleu, what an unfortunate I am—here three days at Verdun, and not yet taken prisoner."

A picture headed, "The German Bulwark," shows us a gigantic rampart of rough-hewn granite blocks at the base of which a mouse is nibbling. At the foot of the picture we have the interpretation: "The British Mouse—'Patience, and sometime I shall have eaten away even this mountain of stone.'"

Turning to Russian affairs the German satirist produces a picture called "The Last Batch." "Schub," the word which we have translated batch, is the word generally applied to a company of vagabonds being sent compulsorily to their own parish. The "schub" in the picture shows a body of Russian infantry being hounded to the front by Cossacks with heavy whips. One of the soldiers, with raised fist, is threatening a figure standing in a window and watching the passing troops. The figure wears a death's-head mask, and is touched-up to represent the Tsar. As the "last batch" passes the Tsar exclaims, "Splendid! Russia is now empty. I'll be able to breathe freely."

The back cover shows us a picture headed "The Protector of the Weak," and in parentheses the following legend: "The Russian Jews, who have fled to England to escape the persecutions of the Tsar's government, are to be sent back to Russia."

The picture shows a lion and a bear beside the bear a vodka bottle. In the lion's jaws is a gentleman of Semitic physiognomy with a top hat falling from his head. The lion, addressing the bear, says: "Come on Bear, fall to and devour!"

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest
Land Regulations.**

The sole head of a family, or any
male over 18 years of age, may home-
stead a quarter-section of available
Dominion land in Manitoba, Sas-
katchewan or Alberta. Applicant
must appear in person at the Domi-
nion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for
the District. Entry by proxy may be
made at any Dominion Lands Agency
(but not Sub-Agency), on certain con-
ditions.

cultivation of the land in each of
three years. A homesteader may live
within nine miles of his homestead
on a farm of at least 80 acres, on cer-
tain conditions. A habitable house is
required except where residence is
performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader

stead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

each of three years after earning
homestead patent; also 30 acres extra
cultivation. Pre-emption patent may
be obtained as soon as homestead
patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his
homestead right may take a purchas-
able homestead in certain districts.
Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must
reside six months in each of three
years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a
house worth \$200.

The area of cultivation is subject
to reduction in case of rough, scrub-
by or stony land. Live stock may be
substituted for cultivation under cer-
tain conditions.

STEAMSHIP TO PAY

ANOTHER DIVIDEND.
Directors of Canada Lines Yester-
day Declared 1 3-4 p.c. on Bank
Account.

Montreal, Sept. 7.—Directors of
Canada Steamship Lines met here
yesterday afternoon and declared
another dividend of 1 3-4 per cent.
on account of accumulated back di-
vidends on the preferred stock.
Payment will be made November
1st to shareholders of record Octo-
ber 1st. It will be the third con-
secutive quarterly distribution since di-
vidends were resumed in May after a
lapse of nearly two years.

The action of the board was in line
with expectations and is in continu-
ance of the policy decided on last
winter. As announced more than a
year ago, the company will make no
dividend declarations in respect to
any year until that year is closed
and the balance sheet struck. Six
months ago, however, the company
decided to pay a quarterly 1 3-4 per
cent. on back account and the same
policy was followed three months
ago. By doing this the position is
held steady, a back dividend being
paid off as a new one accrues, leav-
ing the arrears at 10 1-2 per cent.

if the dividends now accruing are
counted in.

Officially there has been no intima-
tion as to what the directors pro-
pose to do when the accounts for
the year are closed, and unofficially
there is a good deal of divergence of
opinion. Street estimates are plac-
ing the current year's profits at 20
to 25 per cent. on the preferred.
Earnings are, at any rate, believed
to be ample large to permit the slate
to be cleaned of all arrears when the
mid-winter dividend meeting comes
around. But among the directors
themselves there is believed to be a
considerable weight of opinion in
favor of "playing safe" and not risk-
ing a depletion of cash resources
that would jeopardise the recent re-
covery in the company's finances. If
that opinion is followed perhaps half
the dividend arrears will be wiped
out in February and action on the
balance until later on in the year.

Apart from the dividend decla-
ration there was no announcement of
special interest from yesterday's
meeting. Earnings are continuing
satisfactory in all directions and
early season expectations are being
amply verified.

MISHAPS TO TWO VESSELS.

Detroit, Sept. 7.—The steamer
Masha, of Toronto, which grounded
Sunday at Victoria Island, Lake
Superior, was released late yester-
day afternoon and will be taken to
Port Arthur according to word re-
ceived here last night. The extent of

went ashore early today in Lake
Michigan, near the entrance to Green
Bay, was still hard aground. Tugs
have gone to her assistance. The
Reiss is of steel construction and
was built in 1910.

There was heavy selling of the Mercantile Marine's, the common making an extreme decline, of 2 points, with 2 for the pfd. United Fruit forfeited 2 points, but Pacific Mail, controlled by Marine interests, made a gross gain of 4-1-2.
United States Steel reflected steady realizing for profits on yesterday's advance to a new record, though losing only half a point on the day, but Kelly Springfield Tire, one of the strongest issues of the motor group, broke four points to 80-1-2, only part of this decline being remained.
Reading's strength was the outstanding feature, mounting 4-5-8 to 110-3-8, its highest price since last May with moderate activity and strength in other coals, New York Central, Baltimore & Ohio & New Haven, Pacific's helped the movement in rails for a time, but fell back on light offerings.
Improvement in copper's did not make much headway until the final hour, when Inspiration rose 3 to the new record of 69-1-8, with average gains of 1-1-2 points in other metals. Favorable trade primary reasons for the movement.

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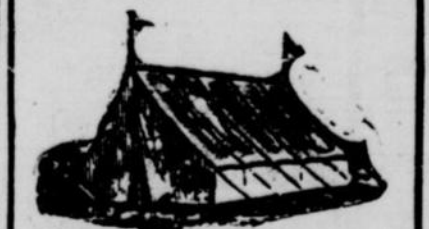

Quebec Harbour Commission

Regulations Governing the Traffic in the Harbor of Quebec on Monday, September 11th, 1916.

After 3.00 a.m. vessels arriving from seaward will anchor at any point between the Examination Anchorage at St. Patrick's Hole, Island of Orleans, and the Fly Bank Buoy.

Vessels on the way down from Montreal or Three Rivers must come to an anchor west of Cap Rouge.

From 4.00 a.m. to 8.00 a.m., traffic on the North Side of the river from the east end of Woodfields Cove to the Quebec Bridge is strictly prohibited until such time as the Center Span of the Quebec Bridge is connected.

Excursion boats, ferry boats and vessels of any description carrying passengers may take up a position on the south side of the river, inside the line of bateaux anchored between Gravelly mill and the east end of New Liverpool.

Vessels taking up a position between these two points will anchor between the hours of 5.00 a.m. and 9.00 a.m. Any vessel on the move must go at slow speed.

Vessels must anchor in line astern of each other.
Guard boats showing the Commissioner's flag at the masthead, will be stationed on either side of the Bridge, to indicate the limit of approach.

Vessels are on no account to go nearer to the Bridge than a line from shore to shore through the Guard boats.

West of the Bridge, a Guard boat will be stationed abeam of Pointe-a-Esail Signal Station.
East of the Bridge a Guard boat will be stationed near the center of the river with the east point of Chaudiere Basin abeam and the Basin shut in.

Four long blasts will be blown when the Center Span is connected, this will indicate to vessels that both sides of the river are free for traffic up to a line from shore to shore through the Guard boats, but not beyond.

The Guard boats leaving their stations will indicate that there are no further restrictions for small craft.
