Immediately following their weekly get-together at Victoria Hall, this week, local Rotarians added another praiseworthy accomplishment to their already notable list of good work when president Frank Carlin, on behalf of the members presented a fully equipped transportation vehicle to Mr. Douglas Bremmer, president of the School for Crippled Children for the use of his handicapped proteges.

Club members congregated on the steps of Victoria Hall and without any fanfare the keys were handed over to the president of the school and without any show of ostentation the transfer of the school bus was completed.

### Dinner Speaker

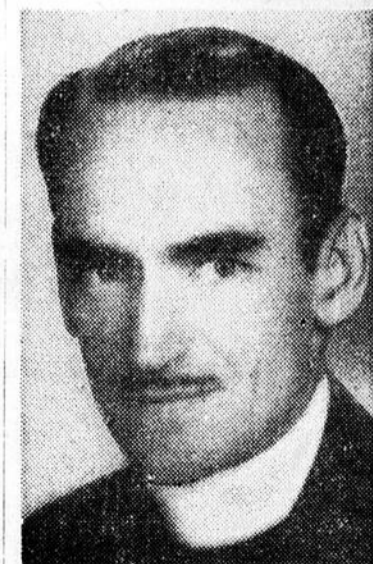
W. J. Tawse, a graduate of Ontario Agricultural College and Director of Public Relations for Steinberg Groceries was the speaker at this week's dinner meeting.

Employed in the food business he delivered a classification talk on 'The Development and Evolution of Better Food' prefacing his talk with the statement that "only twelve meals lie between civilization and barbarism." "Man," said the speaker, "will lie after missing three meals, will steal after missing six, will riot after missing 9 meals, and will kill for food after missing twelve meals."

Changes in the food habits of modern citizens were dealt with by Mr. Tawse who illustrated this phase of his talk by telling of the drop in oranges sold as fresh fruit from 92% in 1941 to 54% in 1951. The speaker also dealt with the changes in foods themselves, and in this respect mentioned the advent of hybrid corn, celery, spinach, eggs, bantam turkeys, Quebec apples and emphasized that some of the major changes, while mainly due to the work of the scientist, the effect of rising freight rates also had some bearing on the evolution and development of what we eat.

The speaker was introduced by Dave Youngston and thanked by Norm. Millington.

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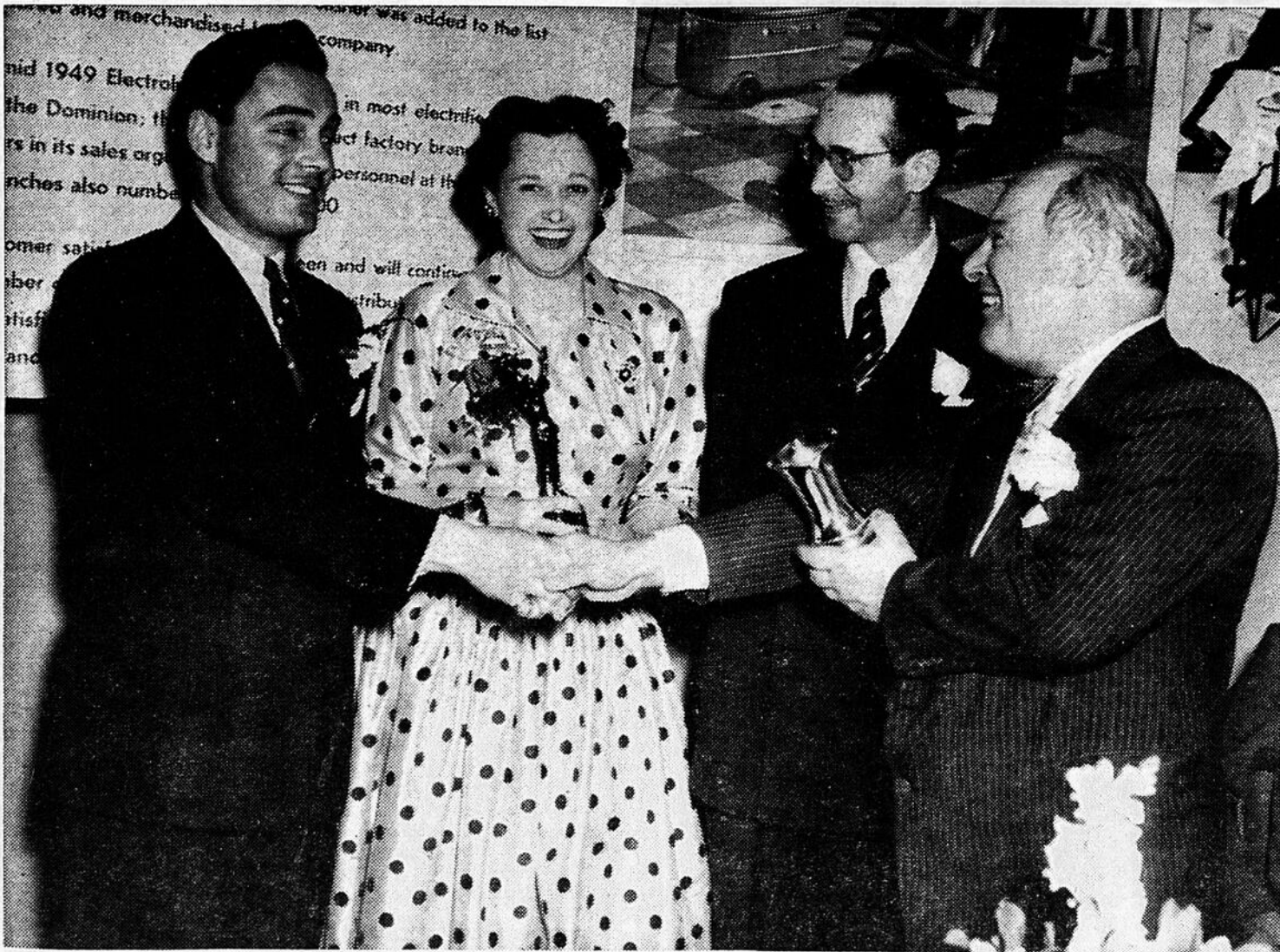

**Coronation Claimed Making Ship Space Easier To Obtain**

Contrary to popular belief, the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II, in London June 2, has served to ease the pressure on steamship accommodation to Europe this season rather than increasing it.

According to Fannie Coffey, Travel Adviser Ltd., the early date of the Coronation has worked to the advantage of the American tourist by spreading the peak load of steamship traffic to Europe over a wider period.

Miss Coffey cited a message just received by her travel agency from Arthur Randles, Canadian general passage manager of the Cunard line, largest transatlantic steamship line, pointing out that First Class and Cabin Class space is now available on several pre-Coronation sailings in Cunard ships in April and May.

Canadians who can go only in the conventional June-July-August vacation period are also discovering happily that they can obtain First Class or Cabin Class space on many of the summer sailings because thousands of other tourists who might have created an impossible demand on peak season departures will already have gone to Europe early for the Coronation.

In his message, the Cunard executive, whose company operates an 11-ship fleet of passenger liners including the Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary, world's largest, said that the effect of the Coronation in spreading the seasons gave promise of boosting total steamship carryings to Europe to new records in 1953.

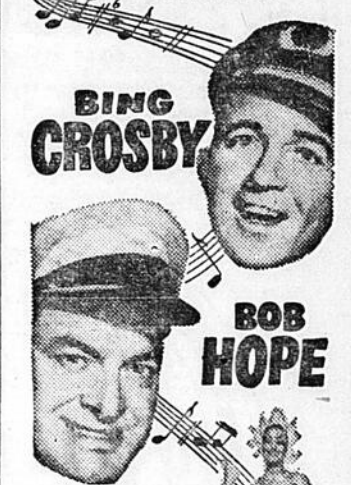

A total of 567 miles of new rail, all of which was 100 pounds or over, and 531 miles of relay rail of various weights were laid by the Canadian Pacific Railway in its 1952 track maintenance program.

A kind of inarticulate unfathomable speech, which leads us to the edge of the infinite, and lets us for moments gaze into that!

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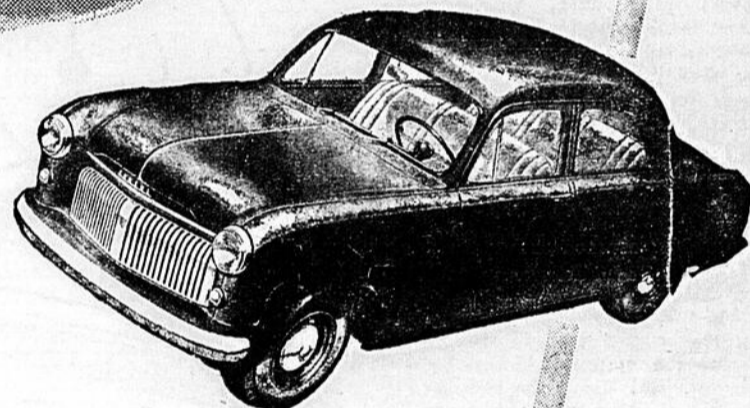


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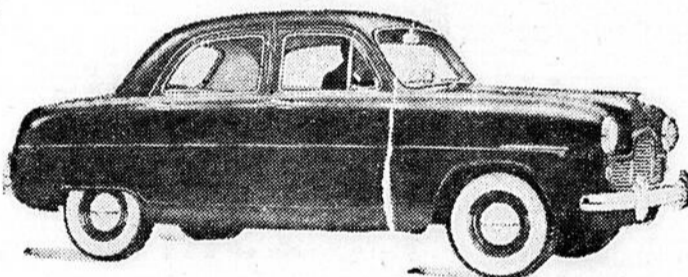


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
