One year business course offered here for H. S. grads and mature pupils with grade 10

The Protestant Regional School Board will introduce into the new comprehensive school curriculum a one year commercial course. In this course students would devote their full day to acquiring commercial knowledge and skills. There would be no charge for this course as it would be part of the present public education program.

Anyone who meets the requirements may participate in this course. The requirements are different for two separate types of students. First there are those who will have completed the High School Leaving requirements in the forthcoming June examinations. This includes eight subjects including two English and two French subjects but no commercial

courses. The second type of student will be the returned student who has been out of school for a year or more. For these students, the requirement is only a pass from Grade 10, because of the student's presumed increased maturity.

In either case no previous commercial courses are necessary to take this free course which will be a full time all day course of study and will prepare successful students for work in an office.

Registration for this course is now taking place and will close on May 15th. The course will commence in September in the new school on the hill above the tracks, the Pontiac County Regional. Students who will write June examinations should register provisionally before May 15th if they intend to come back to school for this commercial course. Contract let for Bryson Post Office

A \$26,850 contract for the construction of a post office at Bryson has been awarded to Beaulne and Lauzon of Mason by Public Works Minister George J. McIlraith.

The successful contractor submitted the lowest of four bids opened March 28. The high bid was 46,372.

Area of the single-storey post office will be 1,150 square feet. Built on a concrete foundation with wooden floors and roof deck, the new building will be faced with clay brick and colored asbestos panels.

Fixed insulated glass will form the front wall. Birch and fir plywood will be used on the interior walls. The exposed tongue-and-groove ceiling will be of Douglas fir glue-laminated beams.

A forced warm air oil-fired heating system will be installed.

Plans and specifications were prepared in the Capital Region offices of the federal Department of Public Works.

Supervision will be provided by E. C. Martel, director of the Capital Region of the Department.

C-B studying feasibility of building particle board plant

Consolidated-Bathurst Limited is now considering construction of a particle board plant and is conducting an engineering and marketing survey to determine the feasibility and economics of the matter. The decision on whether or not to proceed will depend on the outcome of the studies now in progress.

If the company were to proceed it would still take two years to bring the plant into production because of

the relatively long delivery dates on some of the intricate machinery that would be involved.

The plant, which would employ about sixty people, would cost an estimated \$6,000,000, and would probably be located either at Braeside or near Portage du Fort.

Material for the particle board would come almost entirely from the residue and waste wood from the Pontiac and Braeside mills.

Another argument is that the scenery is so beautiful that it deserves to be enjoyed at a slower rate than good roads would allow.

Well, those who worry about people leaving Pontiac County if we ever get a good highway up here, and those who are afraid that a faster trip to Ottawa would not allow them to admire the scenic drive, may just as well stop reading this paper now because from now until we get the road we need, THE EQUITY is going to harp on the subject incessantly.

No amount of progress in our towns, no struggling to update the institutions here, no amount of modernizing of our stores and services and work to improve our natural resources, nothing at all that humans can do to uplift this area will profit the County until the way in is a lot better than it is today.

People who drive to Montreal know that the trip from here to there is a snap, except for the first lap, being the dreadful stretch into Ottawa. Dear Editor:

Are we becoming too tolerant? It seems to me when we accept mediocrity as a way of life we are promoting more of irresponsibility, unproductivity and flaccidity.

Our politicians are generating a permissive society which accepts the criminal by tolerating lawlessness in the name of free speech; accepts high school dropouts and laziness by giving sophistication to "hippies"; accepts free love which is responsible for more than 20,000 illegitimate children in Canada each year.

The institutions which promote handouts should be preparing the recipients to become productive, not perpetuating the disease. One cannot have any objection to

More about the two day course for farmers

"Livestock Feeding" was the topic selected for a two-day workshop organized by the local Quebec Farmers' Association. Between 25 and 50 persons attended each of the 4 parts of the program. "Forage Feeding" was discussed at both sessions on Wednesday, April 3rd and on Thursday the afternoon program dealt with "Feeding the Dairy Cow" and the evening session was spent discussing feeding beef cattle.

On Thursday evening Mr. Bob Sparrow of Kinburn, Ont. told those present how he fed his 116 feeders. Mr Sparrow has many years experience feeding "feeders", his down to earth comments were ap-

preciated by everyone. Mr. Sparrow keeps accurate records and knows what each animal costs him per day.

Prof. Peter Hamilton, extension specialist of the Animal Science Department and Galen Driver of the Extension Service both from Macdonald College spoke to the group during the two days. There was ample time for questions and those present had many specific queries which were discussed by the group.

During the workshop costs were figured out for several feeds always related to the quality of the roughage, grain or supplement.

When "dairy and beef" feeding were discussed spec-

ific feeding programs were explained.

Peter Hamilton outlined the feeding program for the dairy herd at Macdonald College and explained why this program was followed. During this discussion those present worked out a feeding program for a single cow and compared costs using different qualities of forages.

Those present, especially the ones who attended all sessions seemed to enjoy the discussion. This program's usefulness can be credited to the local Q.F.A. group. One person said "If I found out just one thing I didn't already know then the time here was well spent."

COURT REPORT

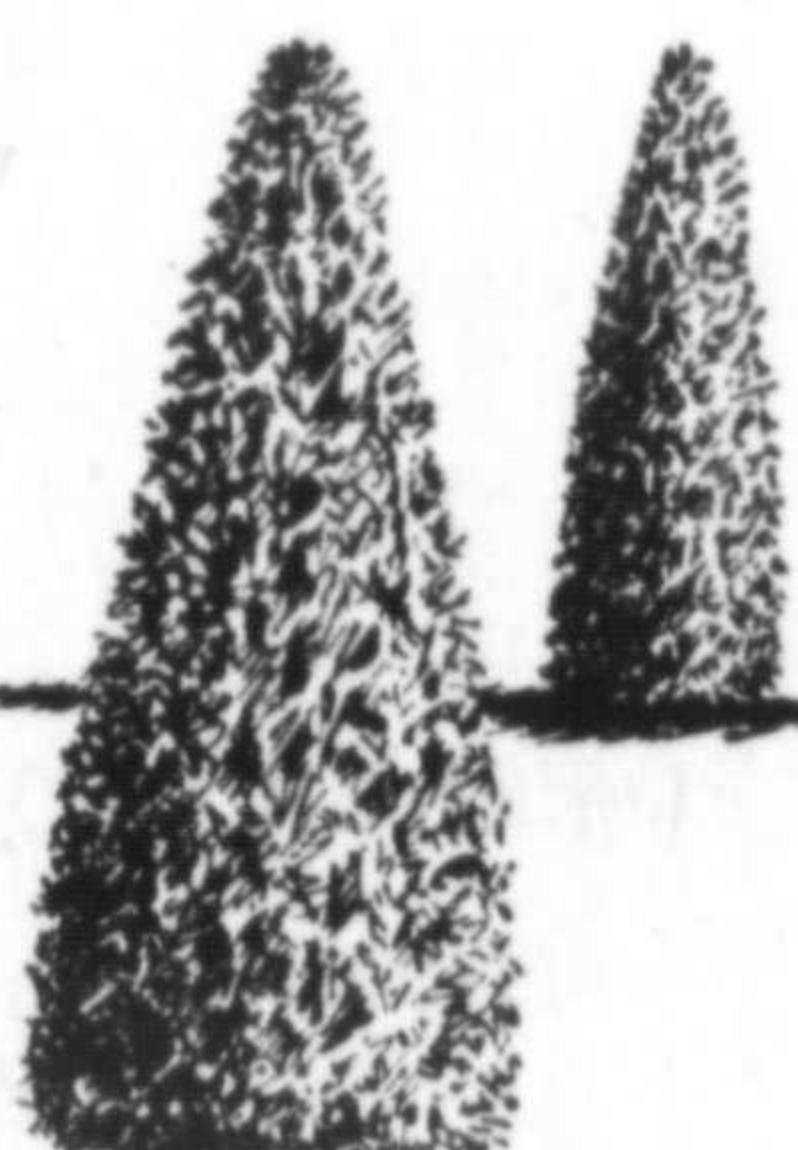

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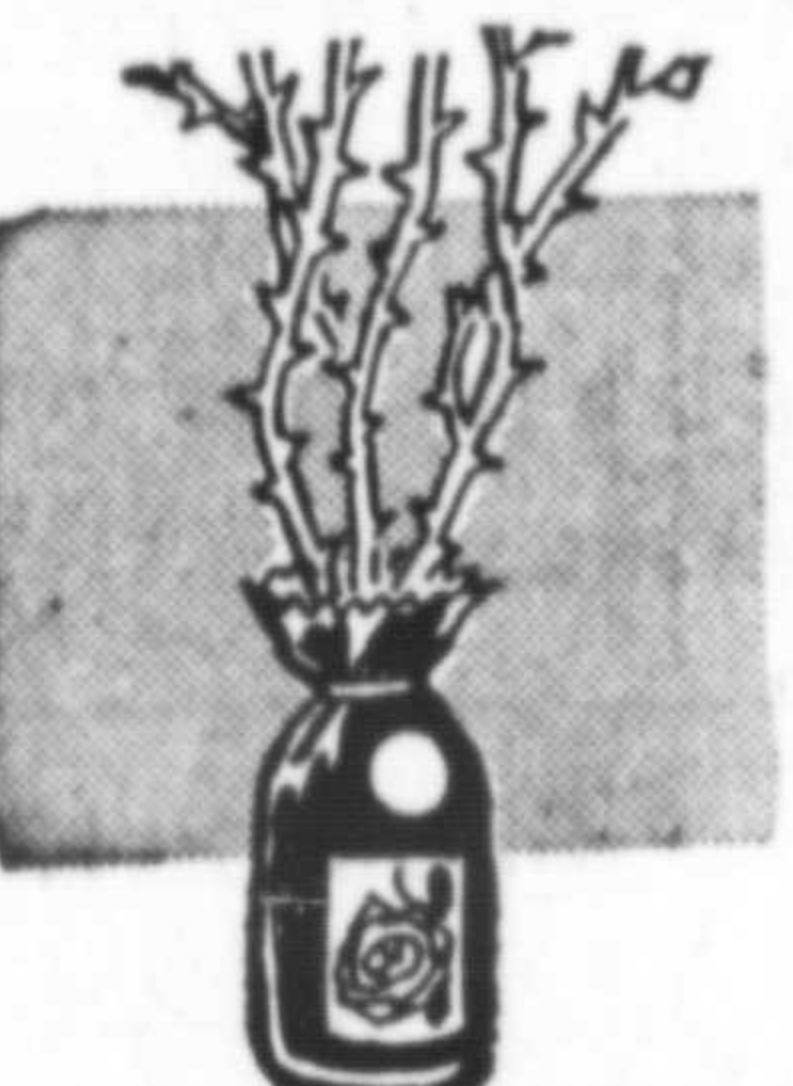


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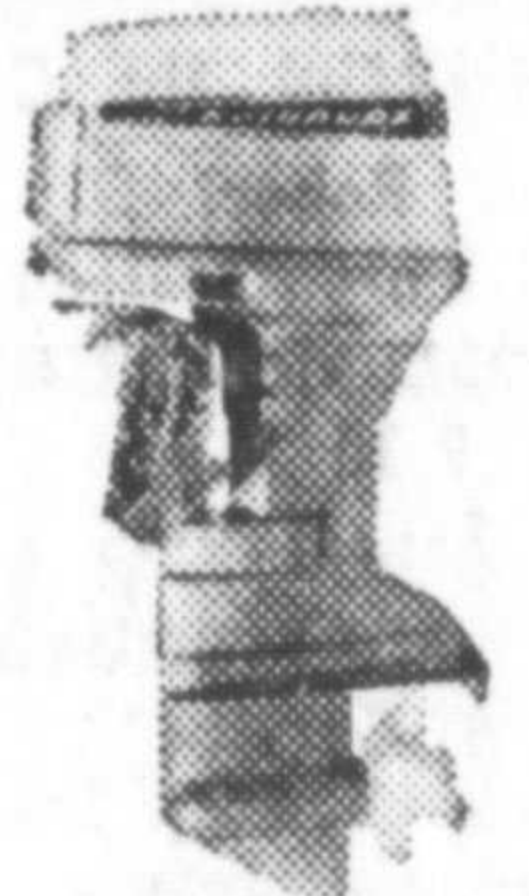
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Pastoral comment...

Good News for Drop-Outs
 In world Olympics all eyes are fixed on the leaders, striding out in front to gain those coveted medals. But what does it feel like to trail at the end of the line? Are they tempted to drop out, to give up? Are you? How far down can the love of God reach? "If I ascend into Hell thou art there."

Remember Zaccheus; he was trailing the line; and when

he hid himself in the sycamore branches it was not only to get a good view of Christ, but to avoid the sneers and jeers of those who had branded him a sinner. He was hated and derided, yet as the Redeemer came into Jericho, how he yearned for the sight of that face which brought peace to broken spirits, calm to fevered hearts. Jesus was surrounded by those who needed his healing touch, but there were none who needed him more than that tax collector. He thought that his work and way of life had cut him off from God's grace,

just as it had cut him off from respectable society. He hated himself even more than his neighbors hated him, but now a Saviour was near—he had come to his town, walked down his street, stopped under his tree and looked him in the eye. "Zaccheus, hurry and come down, for I must stay at your house today."

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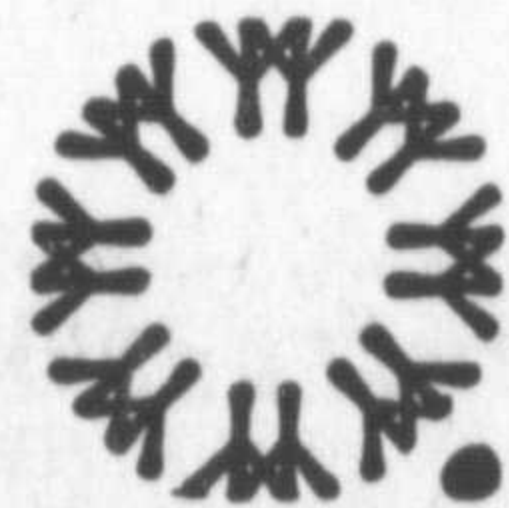

Quyon wants R C High School at Campbell's Bay

Another of a series of meetings being held across Pontiac County in recent weeks, took place at St Mary's School in Quyon on the evening of April 17, 1968. The chairman of this meeting was Cecil Vibert, president of the Central Pontiac PTA. About 175 representatives from all parts of the county were present.

The president briefly outlined the purpose of the meeting—a discussion of the English-speaking Roman Catholic High School question — and whether the people of the Quyon area favored a central high school in Campbell's Bay. He also reported on the meeting between the Pontiac delegation and the Deputy Minister of Education, held early in April. He then gave a resume of recent PTA meetings held in Chapeau and Bristol. Mr Vibert explained how membership is attained in Central PTA and expressed a wish that as many people as possible would join. The fee is \$1 per family.

A discussion and question period followed. Then a vote was taken on the question of favoring a central high school at Campbell's Bay. This vote was restricted to persons from the Quyon area. The proposal was carried by an overwhelming majority.

Representatives from Quyon were elected to Central PTA. They are Lester McCann, vice-president, Leo Foran, parent counselor; Stan Callaghan, teacher counselor.

Last week we reported that the present enrolment of English-speaking Roman Catholic students in Pontiac is 739. This should have been 439. The projected enrolment by 1970-71 is approximately 800.
