THE AFTER-DINNER SPEECHES.

The fire of the speakers, at Saturday evening's banquet, was drawn almost wholly by Mr. McCarthy. To this result it seems probable that two causes contributed...

At the other plank in the McCarthy platform—drastic tariff reform—vastly fewer shots were aimed. This is no sectional cry. It is not even, as some attempt to argue, exclusively a farmers' demand.

Now, while we disagree with the Government and agree with Mr. McCarthy in thinking that a great measure of tariff reform could safely have been brought down last session—to be afterward added to it found advisable—still, now that Parliament has risen, the Government will be judged in the country by the way in which they fulfill the promise given by Mr. Foster's second clause, to the effect that the demand for this readjustment 'will be amply met.'

ARE THE LIBERAL UNIONISTS INDEPENDENT?

The Empire contests our statement that independence is a characteristic of British politics; and, conveniently passing over other cases we quoted by way of corroboration, charges that the Liberal Unionist leaders 'have been for a long time past practically members of the Tory party.'

It is very easy to produce cases in which the Liberal Unionists compelled the late Conservative Government to change its policy; as, for instance, in its local taxation scheme and the abandonment of the compensation to publican's bill.

Cleveland on the Nation's Finances.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—To a press representative the President said Saturday night: 'The inclinations on the part of the public, except newspaper reports concerning the intentions of those charged with the management of our national finances, seems to justify my emphatic condemnation of the statement that the redemption of any kind of Treasury notes, except in gold, has at any time been determined upon by the Secretary of the Treasury or any other member of the present administration.'

Norway's Ministry Resigns.

CHRISTIANIA, April 24.—The Norwegian Ministry has resigned, owing to the refusal of King Oscar to sanction a resolution of the Storting in favor of the appointment of Norwegian consuls to represent the shipping and commercial interests of Norway abroad, instead of Norway depending for consular representation, as at present, upon consuls representing both Sweden and Norway.

No Combines and Freer Trade.

HALIFAX, N.S., April 22.—The Prince Edward Island Legislature has adopted the resolutions, moved by Mr. Farquharson, demanding the repeal of the tariff on the lowest point possible to meet public requirements, and affirming the principle that all trade restrictions should be removed.

For a State Bank.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 24.—An act has been passed giving authority to state banks to issue a medium. The act requires a deposit of United States, State of Tennessee or county bonds, and the currency will be issued on the basis of these securities not in excess of 90 per cent on the market value, limited to \$25,000,000.

J. R. Arnold's Case.

OTTAWA, April 24.—The Government has decided not to do anything in the case of the imprisoned J. R. Arnold for the present. Mr. Justice Armour declines to recommend any interference in the sentence. All the papers have been sent to Sir John Thompson in Paris.

To Succeed Sir John Ross.

HALIFAX, April 24.—It is stated that Lieutenant-General John Davis, C.B., has been appointed to succeed Sir John Ross as commander of forces on this station. Davis has seen active service in the Indian mutiny and in the Sudan, when he commanded the Second Infantry Brigade.

In Honor of Shakespeare.

LONDON, April 24.—The anniversary of Shakespeare's birthday was celebrated yesterday at St. George's Hall, the Mayor of the town delivered a memorial address. At its close the audience remained perfectly silent for ten minutes and then dispersed.

ON ACCOUNT OF HOME RULE.

A DEMONSTRATION, RIOT, AND A MANIFESTO.

Great Meeting Against the Principle in London—Fighting in Belfast—Halfax Organized and the Clan-na-Gael Heard From.

LONDON, April 24.—Albert Hall was crammed on Saturday with ten thousand people, the occasion being the anti-Home Rule demonstration planned by the Unionists' Alliance. The Duke of Abercorn presided at the meeting. He said that they were entering upon a deadly struggle.

The news of the division in the House of Commons on Friday, the 22nd inst., on the reading of the Irish Home Rule Bill was received in Armagh with jubilation. The Nationalists made a counter demonstration, and the two nationalities were engaged in a street fight.

One thousand men from the Queen's Island shipyard marched through the streets of Belfast on Saturday morning, singing the National Anthem. As they were passing through Carrick Hill, a quarter in the morning, they were met by a mob of riotous Orangemen.

Sparks flew in showers as far as half a mile from the scene of the fire, causing great anxiety to the proprietors of the timber yard, who were pouring into his office an account of the fire.

THE ST. PAUL STREET FIRE. Inquest on the Body of Fireman Dagenais.

"Accidental death" was the verdict rendered by the coroner's jury on Saturday afternoon on the body of the late Fireman Dagenais, who was killed at the St. Paul Street fire. The jury returned a verdict that the man's back was struck by a falling beam and buried beneath the debris. It was found that the fireman's back was blackened. The inquest did not take long. Mr. J. A. Turanne, coroner, presided, and the witnesses had much the same story to tell.
