THE SITUATION GRAVER.

While the news, or rather the absence of news, from the Transvaal frontier to-day is undeniably grave, it would be hasty to assume that the situation is precarious or uncertain. The Boers, assisted by the German tacticians whom they have in their service, may have obtained a strategic position of some importance at Dundee, from which the British force at the command of General Yule is unable to dislodge them, but the moral effect of the victories at Glencoe and Elandslaagte will make them hesitate before advancing upon British positions that are well defended by a numerically inferior force. They will hesitate to go far because they must know what the result will inevitably be when the British army corps, which has now been mobilized, reaches South Africa. It was expected that they would invade the Natal frontiers at the points where the main divisions of their army are concentrated; it was expected that they would invade Cape Colony in the vicinity of Cofseburg from the southern part of the Orange Free State; it was expected that they would invade Rhodesia, and it was expected that Mafeking and Kimberley would be attacked. All this it was known they would do in such force and by such routes as would enable them to count upon being able to return into the Transvaal to guard the heart of their country from attack if need be, and to find refuge behind the Drakensberg when the British forces became too powerful for them to cope with.

The surprising fact in connection with their operations thus far is that they have made so few of the anticipated raids for the purpose of cutting off detachments of British troops, and winning a real victory or two which could be bruted far and wide, in order to gain adherents among the wavering Dutch or natives; for the purpose of destroying the railways wherever possible, and preventing the British troops from passing along the frontiers at vulnerable points, and of inflicting as much damage as they could upon any property with which the detested name of Mr. Rhodes is associated, whether the Cape Town-Bulawayo nucleus of a contemplated trunk line from the Cape to Cairo, the transatlantic telegraph, the De Beers diamond mine at Kimberley, the Consolidated Gold Fields mine at Witwatersrand, or even some of the towns and public works in Rhodesia. It is really astonishing that so little of this programme has thus far been carried out. This may partly be owing to the fact that the Transvaal and Orange Free State Boers are not accustomed to working in unison. It may account for the fact of Commander Erasmus having failed to go to the assistance of Commander Meyer in time to take part in the battle of Glencoe—a fact which rendered that victory easier of accomplishment than it would otherwise have been. Beyond the occupation of the abandoned territory in the Natal triangle, and the doubtful capture of Vryburg and the breaking up of the line between Ladysmith and Dundee, the Boers have only been able to place thus far to their credit the successful attack on the armored train at Kraspan, which, by the way, affords a curious example of the Boer military methods. Now that full particulars as to that have come to hand, we can see how well it fitted in with the Boer plans. The train had successfully conveyed to Mafeking two seven-pounder guns for the use of the half battery of Kimberley volunteers who had joined Col. Baden-Powell's small force at Kimberley some days previously. After this the train left Mafeking with 300 women and children, and having picked up 60 more at Vryburg, it proceeded south to Kimberley taking in tow two more seven-pounders. Then it started on the return journey to Mafeking, and when within about forty miles of its destination, it was derailed. The Boers had crossed the frontier after removing the rails, and retired to some distance with their artillery. When the train was perceived to be wrecked, the Boers made it an artillery target for half an hour, and then rode in and made the men accompanying the train prisoners, with the exception of the engine driver, who managed to escape. It is as a specimen of an ambulance that the episode is interesting. The train, with those in it, and the two guns, fell into the hands of the enemy. The real significance of the affair lies in the fact that Kimberley has since been cut off from all communication with the south, and we are consequently ignorant whether Col. Baden-Powell has been able to keep in touch with the British force under Col. Plummer in Rhodesia. It is comforting to reflect that after the armored train left there were only a few devoted women remaining in Mafeking, and they stayed with the object of making themselves useful as nurses. Col. Baden-Powell's little garrison is commanded by a man who knows his business thoroughly, and who enjoys a fine reputation for caution as well as courage. At present we are not prepared to accept either the

Boer story of heavy British losses there, or the statement telegraphed to the Daily Mail correspondent yesterday, to the effect that Col. Baden-Powell had captured General Cronje and 30 Boers and had killed 500. When a place is cut off from communication, it is only to be expected that a great many unfounded rumors will gain currency.

LIBERALS MUST CLOSE THEIR RANKS.

The Soleil, Quebec's French Liberal paper, in the course of an article upon the attitude of Mr. Bourassa, points out what a difficult task it is to govern this country when a large part of the English press condemns Sir Wilfrid Laurier because he contemplates with allowing Canadians to volunteer for the war without undertaking the entire cost of the expedition, and a French-Canadian member resigns on the plea that Sir Wilfrid has acted too promptly under the circumstances. The Premier, it says, cannot ignore the sentiment and aspiration of the great majority of this country, a majority composed not only of English and Protestants, but also of French-Canadians who have come to identify themselves with our parliamentary institutions so much that they have quite as much desire to go and fight for the Mother Country as their English fellow-citizens.

"Independence of character and opinion," says the Soleil, "freedom of speech, is a fine thing, one of the finest traits of Liberalism. But for this it is unnecessary to make a fool of oneself, to believe one self authorized to run everything and to substitute oneself in the government of the party in place of those to whom the party and the country have confided the responsibility of management." The step so profoundly regrettable of Mr. Bourassa ought to have the effect of engaging all the French-Canadian Liberals to close their ranks around the eminent fellow-countryman whom we have for chief. Liberals of Quebec, we must affirm our position in an exceptionally energetic manner under these circumstances. The hall for the banquet will be given to the officers of the Canadian contingent must be crowded. But especially must the popular demonstration which is being prepared for the thousand gallant soldiers be magnificent in numbers and enthusiasm.

THE PARLIAMENT OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND.

For the first time in history the Church Congress—the Parliament of the English national church—has held its annual session in the capital of the Empire. The step was avowedly bold, for many doubted whether the utterances of the divines and laymen who assembled on the 10th inst. would prove, in depth of thought or penetration of insight, to be of the ecclesiastical character which befits the capital of the British Empire. The occasion was one of interest to many besides churchmen—was, in fact, admitted to be of more interest to curious and critical observers outside the Church than to many of her own members. In the magnitude of the attendance and the interest attracted to its proceedings, it surpassed all its predecessors. Even the Albert Hall, South Kensington, in which the principal meetings were held, was taxed to its utmost capacity. The principal services were held in the historical fane of St. Paul's Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, and St. Mary Abbots, the parish church of Kensington. The city of London paid due honor to the Church by the attendance of the Lord Mayor, aldermen, and sheriffs of the city in state at the opening service at St. Paul's, after a civic reception at the Guildhall.

Apart, however, from the mere fact of the Church Congress being held, there was more than ordinary interest attached to the gathering because it came at a time of unworldly excitement in church matters, when many burning questions were to the front and party spirit was strongly aroused. The conflict between the two opposing elements of Catholicism and Protestantism in the Church, between what has been termed for convenience sake the sacerdotal and personal aspects of religious life, has been kindled to such a heat as to endanger the wide basis of toleration and compromises that has hitherto been the strength of the Church. Truly, the Church had her own burning questions, and yet during the session complaints have been made by critics outside the pale that too great pains have been shown to avoid polemics. Just as the Congress was assembling Mr. W. T. Stead wrote:—"In the long list of questions to be debated there are many of considerable dialectical interest, but that such matters as questions of ritual should absorb so much interest at the present time recalls the hackneyed historical parallel of the preoccupations of the Byzantines when the Turks were thundering at their gates. It is an interesting question this, perhaps the most interesting of all, as to how far a great organization, created for the purpose of making the moral law supreme in private and national life, has practically ceased to exist as an effective force in the sphere of national politics. It might have been thought that the National Church would have been the last to succumb to the temptation to retire altogether from the political arena. I am not discussing whether this influence, if exerted, would tell on the one side or the other of the present controversy. I am only pointing out that the National Church practically does not exist as an institution exercising a direct influence in restraining the passions of nations." What Mr. Stead really wanted was a review by the Church Parliament of the proceedings of the Peace Conference at the Hague and a condemnation of war and an attempt on the part of the Church to avert hostilities in the Transvaal. His plea was impossible. It cannot be said that the subjects that

were debated were not sufficiently controversial when they included such topics as "The Principles of Ritual," with Lord Halifax as one of the speakers. No practical solution of such a question was arrived at, nor could any be expected. A Church Congress is not favorable to real discussion. When three or four set speeches upon a given subject have been delivered the audience has had enough, nor is there the stimulus of a coming division to sustain its interest. No resolutions are proposed, and this tends to make discussion unreal and abstract, academic rather than practical. The Bishop of London's presidential address had very little to do with any burning question of the hour. It was an eloquent expansion of the theme that true civilization is impossible without Christian faith, and that the Church is responsible for keeping alive both at home and throughout the Empire a standard of aim and of life. A very vital question discussed was the necessity for reorganization of the government of the Church, by which a more real share in its administration may be conceded to the laity, and through which the Church, with a really representative assembly, may hope for some measure of independence in the management of her own affairs doctrinal and practical, subject only to the authority of the Crown and the veto of Parliament.

BOERS ARE RELEARNING RESPECT

Mr. Chamberlain put into a nutshell the situation in South Africa when, in his speech on the address, he referred to the contempt entertained by the Dutch burghers for British soldiers. We are all familiar with the story of the Boer who thought the British flag was all white because he had seen it only three times and always, he said, it was that color. Kruger himself voiced the contempt in which the British are held by the burghers when he boasted at the opening of the war of the price the British would have to pay, and there are numerous stories to like effect. "I am sick," said a burgher, "but well enough to shoot a red neck." Another only remarked, when warned of the numbers possible for Britain to send to the field, "must I go on shooting Englishmen all the rest of my life?" A prominent Boer official had no other comment on the prospect of a war than that "We shall give the English a worse flogging than ever this time." They have all made the mistake of supposing that the fight at Majuba Hill and the raid which ended at Kruger's drift represented the utmost ability of Great Britain, and they have in consequence behaved themselves towards Britishers in the Transvaal in a way not much different from that which distinguished their earlier dealings with the Kaffirs.

A "TRAITOR" IN THE CAMP.

To be sure, had the same opinions been enunciated by a French Liberal paper in Quebec we would have had "the heather on fire" again:—"It looks to this great family journal as if the Boer trouble is being very unduly magnified. Like Britain's many other petty wars, the whole affair will probably be over in a few weeks. At this distance it appears on the part of Britain very much like a spectacular display for the benefit of Europe. Contingents are being accepted from the colonies, which are really not needed, while a whole British army corps of 50,000 men, which could have been sent to South Africa long ago by piecemeal, is held back until the last moment and then hurried bodily against a few thousand Boers. All this is evidently calculated to make powers—European or American—before looking around for trouble. Fifty thousand armed visitors poured into any country in a week's time would be liable to cause more or less inconvenience to the visited."

THE KEY TO THE DETRACTION.

The following unique production appears in the Halifax Herald of Friday last, being a clipping from the special Montreal correspondence of that Conservative journal. It furnishes a key to the abuse and detraction which have for some weeks been hurled at Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues, and particularly Mr. Tarte, in connection with the much-discussed Canadian contingent for the Transvaal:—"Montreal, October 17.—There is a reactionary element in the Conservative party in this Province which still refuses to believe that the Manitoba school question is a dead issue. Mr. Tarte, proprietor of the Verite, and the Hon. Mr. Desjardins, may be said to be the leaders of this section, which, like the Bonbons, never learns any thing. The Conservative campaign has opened with vigor, but the rank and file of the party have heard with astonishment that the Manitoba school question is a dead issue, that it is a question to be dealt with and that in the next election it is not to be ignored. I asked Sir Charles Tupper the other day what he thought of this attitude, and the leader of the opposition promptly replied that the Conservative party know no Manitoba school question. That was settled by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, or said to be settled, in any case the Conservatives have nothing to do with it. He had taken his stand upon that question. He had gone to them and to the issue was dead as far as he was concerned. Certain French-Canadian Conservatives might have their feelings in relation to it; that is natural enough; but the question could never again be a plank in the Conservative platform. In mentioning this, because the reactionary element to which I have referred has more than once placed the Conservative party in peril. This is the element which wants a French-Canadian state on the shores of the Middle Ages, the French-Canadian people as a separated nation, living their own exclusive lives apart from the trend of the age, pious, simple, obedient to ecclesiastical authority, never asking questions, saying their prayers, and sowing their bit of corn—a peculiar people, living in its own world and feeling its soul—all without the presence of the glance of the alien to embarrass. This element did much to an act was settled by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and yet it pursued its own ideas—ideas which, if realized, would make for a fatal stagnation. There may be said to be a new Conservative party in the country to-day. It is young and generous. It regards the Dominion as a whole. It does not exalt tradition into a fetish. It sees the possibilities of the future. The Hon. Mr. Foster has urged the young men of the country to come forward and identify themselves with political questions. This is good advice. If the Conservative party is to win at the next election it will be because the appeal is made, not to sectional feeling, but to the patriotism which the young feel, a patriot-

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len which looks beyond the parish and racial desire, and feels the thrill of nationhood. Passing over the smearing, ungenerous and uncalled-for allusion to the French-Canadian people, the paragraph makes several things very plain. Sir Charles Tupper and his lieutenants have given up all hope of making a break in French Liberalism—they give up Quebec as hopelessly gone to the Conservative party. Messrs. Graham and Dalby, as the leaders of the New Movement, have felt the pulse of Quebec. Its passions give them no hope along old lines. Read between the lines Sir Charles Tupper's declaration, as given by the correspondent, simply means: "We will have to do without the French-Canadians and arouse the Protestantism of the other Provinces against them and endeavor to snatch a victory by working the loyalty racket."

Having ridden the Catholic horse on the Manitoba school question until he barked, and threw them, the Conservative leaders now propose to ride the Protestant horse in the hope that he will carry them out of the wilderness into the promised land.

This explains the tirade of abuse levelled at Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Mr. Tarte, the cries of French domination which find a place in the chief Tory organs and the infamous fabrications and innuendoes circulated respecting the action of the Government in sending the Canadian contingent to South Africa. The "plan of campaign" is to make the English-speaking people—and particularly the Protestants—of Canada believe that the Liberal French-Canadian leaders and their followers are not loyal to the Crown and Empire.

All this is clearly implied if not fully expressed in the paragraph quoted above from the Montreal correspondence of the Halifax Herald. It is so plain that he who runs may read the determination of the Conservative leaders to launch Canada into an anti-French campaign. With the Conservative leaders it is either rule or ruin. MR. FISHER VISITS THE BOUNDARY. The Minister Visits the Boundary Mining District. GOT A CORDIAL WELCOME. Canada Has Shown Its Loyalty to Britain in an Unmistakable Manner in the Preferential Tariff.

HON. J. W. CHRISTIE DEAD. Was a Prominent H. B. Co. Official for 31 Years and Rendered Much Service to Canada in the West. Brookville, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—Hon. J. W. Christie died at his residence at Seelye's Bay, yesterday, in his 76th year. Deceased was born at Fort Albany, East Hudson Bay, in 1824. His father entered the service of the Hudson Bay Company in 1830, became chief factor in 1831, and for many years Governor of the Assiniboia District, now Manitoba. The late Mr. Christie was educated in Scotland, and returned to Canada with Sir George Simpson in 1840. He became engaged to the Hudson Bay service. He rose rapidly, and his first important station was at the mouth of the Mackenzie River. In 1852, upon the reorganization of the Hudson Bay Company's business, he was made inspecting chief factor and supervisor of the country from Fort Garry to the Arctic regions, comprising the territories of the Saskatchewan, Assiniboia, Athabasca, and the Mackenzie River Districts. On returning from his tour of inspection, Mr. Christie resigned and settled in Montreal in 1857, after 31 years of active service. During the Riel rebellion he was in charge of the Saskatchewan and Assiniboia Districts. He was a member of the Legislative Council of the Province of Manitoba, and was also a member of the Legislative Council of the Northwest. He was a member of the Dominion Government one of the commissioners to make a treaty with the Plain District Cree and Sisseton, and was appointed to aid the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba in the Northwest. He was requested to form one of that body. Through the administration of Governors Simpson, Dallas and McTavish, he was a commissioned officer and member of Council, and in various ways rendered considerable service. In later years he assisted in negotiating treaties with the Indian tribes in that country. He married Miss Mary C. Sinclair, daughter of Alex. Sinclair, a prominent Hudson Bay official. His three surviving sons are all in the Hudson Bay service, John at Fox River, James at Moose Factory, and Charles at Fort Simpson. His widow, who has since lived in Brookville until six years ago, when he removed to Seelye's Bay, to live with his son, Dr. Christie, who died a few months ago. He was a Conservative in politics, and in religion a Presbyterian. The remains will be interred here to-morrow.

RICHER ON DUTY AGAIN

Policeman Whos Wa Suspended in the Tremblay Affair Goes on Duty Again Without Police Committee's Authority,

Constable Eugene Richer, No. 88, of No. 6 police station, Chaboullier Square, who was suspended by Chief of Police Hughes for his alleged participation in obtaining money from Aram Tremblay to get him a position on the police force, is again on duty, and Sunday night displayed unusual zeal in effecting arrests. Directly or indirectly Constable Richer was connected with the apprehension of no less than eight persons whose names appeared in the list in whose names the Recorder's Court yesterday was being charged with vagrancy, loitering and fighting. They were: John O'Brien, Richardson Street, carter, aged 21; Edward O'Brien, St. Patrick Street, Joiner, aged 18; Charles Vertrie, Archaon Street, laborer, aged 26; John Murphy, Shannon Street, brakeman, aged 35; Geo. Spearman, Grand Trunk Street, aged 22; Patrick Leonard, Prince Street, aged 21; Mary Hunter, Latour Street, aged 40; Thomas Boudry, St. Antoine Street, porter, aged 25. Richer was walking along St. James Street about 3 o'clock in the morning

when he was accosted by five men, who assaulted him. Richer was not in uniform. The funny thing about it was the statement the men made that they were now constables, and had to arrest him. Of course, Richer showed his badge, and in consequence the men disappeared. Three ran in one direction and two in another. Richer followed the three men up Latour Street, where they entered a house, Richer after them. They escaped through the yard, but ran into a blind lane, and Richer cornered them. By a special dispensation of fate, Constable Chartrand came along and rang up the detective office. Detective Joseph Gallagher came and the men were arrested. They gave the names of John O'Brien, Edward O'Brien and Charles Vertrie. They were charged with posing as policemen and pleaded not guilty. Murphy was arrested for drunkenness and was fined \$5 or fifteen days. Spearman and Leonard were caught fighting on Craig Street, and were run in by Richer and Constable Meloney. Boudry, for the same offense, were fined \$10 or twenty days.

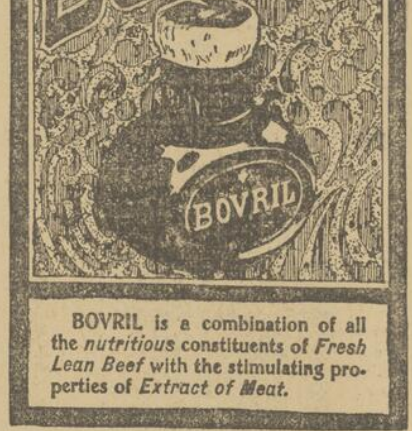
